



Girl Talk

A SHY AND POLITE BOY

WHEN I first met Ricky Hill—nine years ago, on Luton station—I was struck by his politeness and his diffidence. He is the same today. I was not surprised, therefore, to learn his family rarely watched him as a schoolboy at numerous cup finals or with the Under-19 side while he was still in third year. He simply didn't bother to tell them.

They mattered to him, of course—football was his life. Many hours were spent juggling with a ball rather than doing homework. He didn't even go and watch football much—only Leeds a few times when they were in London. Ricky doesn't get much active support from the rest of his family. His mother has seen him play at Wembley and his sister 14 years his senior, watches him when she's in England.

Skill

His father played football in Jamaica, but Ricky is more admiring of his brother's skill. He said it was more difficult when his brother, Ian, was young to make the grade but added that, although his brother was interested in the game, he, Ricky, lived for it.

But his unwillingness to push himself forward almost stopped his career before it began. He never wrote to a club for trials and when Luton and, reputedly, West Ham were watching him he didn't struggle for recognition. In fact he nearly didn't sign at all. Luton wanted him to play one evening but he didn't want to make the journey. He pretended he had a school function. Finally, Harry Haslam spoke to him and persuaded him, to play for Luton reserves. He was offered forms and, despite his mother's reluctance, he signed. The rest is, as they say, history.

Now, in the future, Ricky wants to put something back into the game. He wants to show ordinary fans that footballers aren't prima donnas, but are ordinary humans, too. And he wants to coach youngsters, perhaps in Africa or the West Indies. He has deserved his success and his testimonial. **Gale Waller**



First Team ACTION

Luton Town 1 Tottenham 1
A last-minute equaliser from Mike Newell at the end of a brilliant move created by Ricky Hill's perfectly-weighted pass and Rob Johnson's accurate cross to the far post brought the Town a deserved share of the spoils against Tottenham here on Saturday and extended their unbeaten league run to five games.

Spurs had taken an early lead in the first half when a long punted clearance by Ray Clemence bounced clear of the Town defence for Clive Allen to race clear and send a fine volley beyond Les Sealey at the Kenilworth Road end.

Stein's return

It was a fine goal by Allen and gave Tottenham the initiative in the early stages as the Town fought to recover their rhythm and regain control. Brian Stein, returning for the first time after surgery on a ruptured knee ligament, worked hard and created several half-chances, but the Town were out of luck in front of goal.

Mick Harford and Mike Newell were particularly unfortunate as chances came and went, but the Town refused to concede and continued to play with purpose and pattern until the final minute when Hill's flighted pass sent Johnson clear on the right. Newell's header was perfection and earned the Town a deserved point.





from the bench

Club physiotherapist John Sheridan has been able to relax and draw on his pipe recently for the first time in several weeks as everyone in the first team has returned to training. For months now, his treatment room has been like a hospital ward with so many players recovering from surgery, needing treatment or seeking advice as they fought their way back to fitness. Today John reflects on the busy winter he has worked through and discusses the successes of his now-recovered patients.

"It is the first time in months that it has been so quiet. Everyone is back in training now except for John Kennedy who is back home in Wales resting and recovering after a minor operation on his feet—something I felt I wanted to have cleared up now rather than later in his career if he became a full professional.

"John will be out for the rest of his season, but it is for his own long-term benefit to get this done now and we believe in looking after young lads properly all the time here. He had the operation at a Harpenden clinic and it has been a success.

Successes

"We have also seen success with several other injured players this season—Brian Stein, for example, who is now well on the way back, Emeka Nwajiobi, Ricky McEvoy, Stacey North, Rob Johnson, Mick Harford, Steve Foster, Tim Breacker, Ashley Grimes. they have all done well in different ways—

some to keep playing and some to make the recoveries they have after bad injuries.

"The most troublesome has been Emeka's injury. He fractured the fifth metatarsal in his foot. It is quite a bad injury. After his operation, however, he still had trouble and later further surgery found he had a nerve lying loose right by the bone. This is what caused the problem. The fracture probably caused it to move. But he is better now and it is only a matter of working off the discomforts of the operation.

"He had a good run-out during Ricky's testimonial match without ill effect and he has kept bright most of the time. He'll be okay. It has been some help to him having Brian to keep him company I am sure because Brian has a tremendous will to play and always pushes himself.

"Brian partially ruptured the anterior cruciate ligament quite severely. It was a bad blow for him, but he has come back well and is working hard to get over the few niggles and things he is bound to feel.


"Ricky McEvoy's was a very similar injury to Emeka's and interestingly both came from kicks. It is an increasingly used professional foul—stamping on feet—which has caused several injuries this season. The lighter, slipper-style footwear of modern players probably makes them more vulnerable than in the past. Tim Breacker's injured toe was also due to stamping."

It is a reflection of the growing strength of our first team squad that this season three players have played full international football for their countries in the build-up to the World Cup finals. Mal Donagh has become a fixture in the Northern Ireland team. Peter Nicholas has also proved himself a regular in the Welsh team—he will be in action against Uruguay, injuries permitting, next Monday. Ricky Hill, of course, has forced himself onto the fringe of the England world Cup squad and could yet join the Mexico-bound squad.

NATIONAL PRIDE

The recent selection of Tim Breacker, Mitchell Thomas and Mike Newell to play for England against Italy in the semi-finals of the European under-21 championship served only to highlight the number of internationals now on our club staff.

For in addition to the three England youngsters—who were joined in Pisa by former Hatter Garry Parker, now of Hull City—the Town can point to a seasoned group of international stars including captain Steve Foster, who played for England during the 1982 World Cup finals, Brian Stein, who has proved himself more than worthy of adding to his cap for England against France in 1984, Ashley Grimes, holder of more than a dozen Eire caps, and Emeka Nwajiobi, a veteran of World Cup action with Nigeria.

Dream

But the trio currently enjoying most international recognition have been Mal Donagh with Northern Ireland and Peter Nicholas with Wales and Ricky Hill with England. It is, of course, everyone's dream that Mick Hartford will also gain a full cap soon.

"All I can do is keep on trying," said modest Mick, who now plays in a team that has seven full internationals in the first-team squad, not to mention five players who have won under-21 caps and several youth internationals.

Not since the 1950's when Syd Owen, Billy Bingham, Allan Brown, George Cummins and Co were at their best can the Town have enjoyed so much strength in depth. "It is great for the club," said Mal Donagh, now well on his way towards his 50th cap while Ricky Hill is hoping for a fourth to show for England.


That tells you all about the professionalism of our former skipper. I felt it was important that all the efforts of the many players who gave up their evenings for Ricky should have been recognised.






Alan Hansen—The new Liverpool captain is one of the finest central defenders in Britain. Alan is a Scottish international and very experienced.



"Tottenham manager Peter Shreeve revealed his players felt as if they'd lost because they conceded such a late equaliser. David Pleat, his Luton counterpart, was far from disappointed. He said: 'My boys never gave up, and their efforts were rewarded'."

Daily Mail: "Gary Mabbutt was the toast of Tottenham after putting Luton's Mick

Harford in his place during the 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road. But it looks like team-mate Gary Stevens will have the last laugh on both of them when it comes to the World Cup."

Glum-looking

Daily Star: "A glum-looking Peter Shreeve summed it up for Spurs after the 1-1 draw at Luton. 'We feel as though we've lost this afternoon,' he said. Spurs had 80 per cent of the play then conceded a brilliant equaliser to Mike Newell just two minutes from time. Even the class of Ray Clemence and Gary Mabbutt could not lift the gloom for the Londoners.

"Luton boss David Pleat angrily brushed aside suggestions that his team had an off-day. 'Not true,' he said. 'We stuck to it and proved you're never down until you are out. We pumped away and eventually took our reward'."



The day Bill Shankly was incensed

Although our first league meeting with Liverpool was as recent as 1954-55, we did, in fact, meet Liverpool twice much earlier in FA Cup action between the wars.

The first match took place on January 31st, 1920, at Kenilworth Road in a second round tie and, despite the gap in divisions, there was high hopes of a Town success after wins over Chesterfield Municipal at home, 6-2, Brighton away, 1-0 and at Coventry, 1-0, following a 2-2 home draw.

Alas, Luton failed to perform to their best on the big day and the Reds won rather more easily than the 2-0 scoreline suggested.

Our next meeting did not take place until January 7th, 1939, in a third round tie at Anfield where a 3-0 scoreline this time masked the Town's quality and superiority in defeat.

A typical match report stated that "Luton played a magnificent fighting game and on the day were the better side. The 42,500 crowd could hardly believe their eyes as the Luton forwards missed a hatful of chances."

Two-goal Morton


Our first league meeting took place on November 13th, 1954, following Liverpool's relegation from the First Division. As we were travelling in the opposite direction that season our 3-2 win came as no surprise to the 15,887 crowd who saw Bob Morton score two of the goals.

Morton also scored twice at Anfield later that season in an incredible 4-4 draw. We were actually 3-1 down at one stage in this game, but fought back to lead 4-3 only to concede a late equaliser after an injury to goalkeeper Bernard Stretton.

We rejoined the Reds in the Second Division in 1960-61 and following a 2-1 home win and a

Paul Walsh joined Luton from Charlton in 1982, made 80 league appearances in the First Division, scored 24 goals and left for Liverpool for a £750,000 fee in 1984. An old-fashioned dribbling forward, he delighted the Kenilworth Road crowd.



Richard Money joined the Town from Liverpool in 1982 as the final part in the promotion jigsaw that season. A left-back, he started his career with Scunthorpe and later played for Fulham. He left Town for Portsmouth.

2-2 away draw met them for the first time in the League Cup. This new competition drew only a lukewarm response and only 10,502 turned out at Anfield for a 1-1 draw. The crowd at Kenilworth Road for the replay was a paltry 6,125. Liverpool won 5-2.

The following season, Liverpool walked away with the Second Division title. But not until we had served them some shocks on the way. At Anfield on November 11th, 1961, Liverpool appeared to be cruising to victory following an early Kevin Lewis goal.

But with three minutes left Gordon Turner snatched the Town an equaliser from a seemingly off-side position. The 23,921 crowd were seething and as Liverpool launched a last-ditch attack on the Town goal, a header from Ian

St. John appeared to have crossed the line but was knocked away by Brendan McNally's hand. The referee was unsighted, and so too was the linesman, and the Town escaped with a lucky point.

The Liverpool newspaper scribe stated afterwards that "It would require a sheet of asbestos to quote safely manager Bill Shankly's views of the incident."

In the return at Luton the following March, we won with a solitary Dave Pacey goal in a match of incident in which an Ian St. John penalty was saved by Jim Standen. Standen dived the wrong way, but deflected the ball

over the crossbar with his ankles.

Our paths did not cross again then until 1974-75 following our promotion to Division One. Liverpool were our first visitors. An early Barry Butlin goal put the Town ahead and in good spirit. But experience told and Liverpool scored twice for victory.

In recent years, the most memorable matches were the 3-3 draw at Anfield in 1982-83 when Luton used three different goalkeepers, but sparkled in attack and the following year when the Red machine played with awe-inspiring efficiency to win 6-0.
