

In the close season, we have said goodbye to Ray Daniel (Hull City), Andy King (Aldershot) and Mitchell Thomas (Tottenham Hotspur). I wish them all well, but would have hoped the circumstances of Mitchell's move had been different and we had received a true valuation of his ability.

We face a tough fixture tonight and will do our utmost to maintain our high standards. Thank you for your support.




# 1st Team ACTION

A thumping long-range goal from Peter Nicholas and a second-half equaliser by the Mexican champions' Reinaldo Gueldini provided the highlights as the Town completed their warm-up programme for the new season with a 1-1 draw against Monterrey here ten days ago.

The Mexican first division champions, with World Cup star Francisco Javier Cruz – nicknamed "El Abuelo" or the 'grandfather' – sitting on the substitutes' bench were the first foreign visitors to Kenilworth Road since Dynamo Zagreb in 1978 and the first South Americans here since La Paz of Bolivia in 1961.

The Town won both of those fixtures 5-0, but there was little hint of any repeat scoring spree except when Peter Nicholas trained his sights on goal. In addition to his 22nd minute strike, Nicholas also saw one effort rebound from a post.



# VIEWS from the BENCH

## Ray Harford



Chief coach Ray Harford joined the Town during the close season as manager John Moore assembled a new coaching staff for the new season. Born in Halifax in June 1945, Ray began his league soccer career as a junior with Charlton Athletic. He later moved on to play for Exeter, Lincoln, Mansfield, Port Vale and Colchester as a centre-half, between 1965 and 1974. After retiring as a player at Colchester, he began his coaching career with the Essex club before moving on to Fulham where he became manager. In his views today he describes his views on football and looks at the challenge which lies ahead at Kenilworth Road this season.

"The players on the staff here are very good. That is clear to me after watching carefully over the last few weeks. They have been educated into wanting to play football – to "play and move" as I like to say. They prefer to play the ball rather than concentrate on the physical side of the game and that is in line with my own thinking.

"In a nutshell, though, it is also my own problem. I can't make changes to the pattern because I have to sit back and see how they go to make a real assessment. Unfortunately, during the tour of Sweden we picked up a lot of injuries to the senior players – Steve Foster, Mick Harford, Brian Stein, Stacey North and Ricky Hill – and these severely disrupted the team.

### Pattern

"It made it very difficult for me to judge the team because there were a lot of younger players coming in to do a job who clearly were not used to the first team pattern. However, I have been able to gather some ideas about everything. They were certainly a good team last year – but now I am concentrating on this year.

"I want the players and the team to show what

they can do. I want to see things. My basic beliefs in football revolve around passing and controlling the ball well. It is obviously desirable to have pace and strength too, but you can be a weaker or slower player and still be a good player if your technique is good.

"I think English football has fallen behind on technique in recent years. The World Cup showed us that some of the so-called poorer nations eg Morocco, are very good on techniques and ahead of us while we may be stronger on tactics. I think English players have been complacent about their techniques for a long time. We always train to be competitive and have a different mentality about skill.

"The Italians and the Brazilians are quite different to us in that way. They enjoy the ball and have all sorts of techniques that they like to show off. It is an exhibitionism of skill in a way which we do not have. For me, the West Germans mix it up. They have the technique and the power. They have married them both.

"Finally, a word on the synthetic pitch here at Kenilworth Road. I think it is brilliant. I have been amazed how good it is to play on. After a while, you just forget it is synthetic at all."

## Sir Stanley Rous

Former FIFA president and former secretary of the Football Association Sir Stanley Rous CBE died on Friday, July 18, 1986, following a brief illness. He was 91.

Sir Stanley was a great friend, lover and ambassador of football who was a former referee. He was in charge of the 1934 F.A. Cup final between Manchester City and Portsmouth and also officiated in 34 international matches. He invented the diagonal system of refereeing and re-wrote the laws of the game during his 27-year spell as F.A. Secretary.

Sir Stanley attended the 1986 World Cup finals in Mexico during June and maintained his extraordinary contribution and devotion to the game until his final days and will be hugely missed throughout the world.



The response of our loyal Bobbers' has been fantastic to their move from the old stand to the new seating at the Oak Road end. New catering facilities are on the way for both the Oak Road stand and the Kenilworth Road stand.

On behalf of you all I wish him well and without hesitation can say that all of us are completely with him and his new chief coach, Ray Harford, second team coach, Jim Ryan, the youth team coach, John Faulkner, and the physiotherapist, David Kirby, in their efforts for us all. This season could prove to be the moment when Luton Town really arrives on the football scene as a powerful force on and off the field.

Off the field we now have offices in Dunstable Road to first division standard and the new ticket office and club shop in Oak Road has been considerably improved on our previous facilities. The most exciting and radical aspect of all, of course, is the members-only scheme which will enable us to present to football a family environment in safety with pre-match entertainment in an atmosphere which has not been seen on football grounds for many years. As for the stadium itself, how many of us could have believed at the end of last season that so much could be done to give us the excitement of playing in a stadium which we now can say is first division. To our main sponsor, Bedford Trucks, thank God you are there to pro-

vide the confidence which has enabled us to bring other money into the club via the executive boxes – to those who have taken a box, thank you. Additional income from this source is so necessary for success in these days of high-running costs and to all our other sponsors sincere thanks are due for their support in the coming season. We have had an unbelievable response to what we are trying to do from companies, and individuals, in their continuing support of our club. I know the players will respond to the challenge which has been presented by you, the fans (members) with regard to the deep wanting, yearning and aching for success.

I am also pleased to tell you that we have not spent all the money on the fabric and John Moore has a substantial amount available to him to strengthen the squad if he feels it necessary. A word of warning however – remember that any player who lacks the necessary feeling of pride when he pulls on a Luton shirt will, via me on your behalf, very quickly find himself out of work. The players and the game, which is what it is all about, have to produce honesty, integrity, loyalty, and love which will enable them to look after the game which we respect and from which they earn their living.

Finally, we will continue to have open meetings when you, the fans, can come to the club and put your point of view directly to me and the management team because at the end of the day, without the fans, the club is nothing.


**Steve Baker** - A sharp-tackling young right-back, Steve is establishing himself in the Saints team and will be hoping for a consistent run of good performances. He is 24.

He has always maintained a special place in the Town's history after proving his exceptional ability as a dominating centre-half in the Town defence of the early 1970's. He later went on to join Aston Villa, Southampton and Grimsby Town where he became assistant manager before returning to take charge at The Dell in succession to Lawrie McMenemy. A long-serving regular in the Northern Ireland defence, he played for his country in the 1982 World Cup finals in Spain when he was a hero of the 1-0 victory over the host country.

**Glenn Cockerill** Midfielder Glenn joined from Sheffield United last October for £200,000 after starting his career with Lincoln City and Swindon.

**Steve Moran** - Ex England under-21 striker Steve is now 25 and respected as one of the best finishers in the First Division. Discovered in local football. Quick and nimble.

**Colin Clarke** Northern Ireland striker Colin was signed from Bournemouth for a £400,000 fee in the close season.

**David Armstrong** Former England midfielder David joined Saints from Middlesbrough in 1981. A reliable stalwart.



# LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

## SHILTON HIT BY MAGNIFICENT SEVEN

For "goalden" memories of this particular fixture you have only to look back to last season and the resounding 7-0 home win on a day when everything went right for the unstoppable Town.

Saints' goalkeeper Peter Shilton has now conceded 14 goals in his last four appearances at Kenilworth Road which contrasts with his first four games against Luton when the only goal scored in his net was put there courtesy of his Leicester teammate John Sjoberg in an Easter Monday 1971 promotion battle.

Goals have certainly been plentiful in games against the Saints with 145 scored in only 42 league games and although last season's win took the top prize, other commendable performances took place before the war with a 6-3 win at the Dell in 1937-38 and a 6-2 home win the following season.

### Blot Out

All this talk of goals must make present Southampton manager Chris Nicholl wish he could turn the clock back, pull his boots on, and, as was certainly the case in his Luton days, blot out the opposition scoring threat.

One of the best central defenders to play for the Town, Nicholl was signed from Halifax in 1969 immediately after subduing Malcolm MacDonald in a league game at Kenilworth Road. The fee, £35,000, was a lot to pay for an inexperienced player in those days but manager Alec Stock was aware of the potential of Nicholl who went on to play at the highest level for club and country.

In Nicholl's Luton days only one player, Peter Cormack of Nottingham Forest, beat him in the air – and he only did it once!

### Sterling

It is debatable whether Southampton saw the best of Chris Nicholl as a player but one ex-Town player who was certainly at his peak at the Dell was Ron Davies who gave sterling service to the Saints in the late 1960s. Davies was signed from Chester in October 1962 and scored 21 goals in only 32 appearances for the Town before his transfer to Norwich in September 1963.

His goalscoring record is all the more remarkable as he was playing in a relegation-bound Luton team.

Davies was sorely missed but he was too good for the Third Division.

Although he only played once in Southampton's first team following his transfer from Luton, goalkeeper Sandy Davie will always be remembered by Town supporters for a string of brilliant performances and a brave fightback from serious injury.

Signed by Allan Brown from Dundee in September 1968, he quickly became first choice keeper in a newly-promoted Town team that threatened to storm through the Third Division at the first attempt. Poor away performances in the middle part of the season left a home game against Southport during Easter 1969 a "make or break" affair.

### Stretcher


In a violent encounter, Davie was left heavily concussed following a challenge by Eric Redrobe and as he left the field on a stretcher so went the Town's promotion hopes as they struggled to a 0-0 draw.

Davie returned to the first team the following season but was perhaps not the same player which is understandable considering the injury. He joined Southampton soon after and managed a single Division One outing – a 5-1 defeat at Old Trafford!

If Davie was unlucky spare a thought for poor Tommy Hare. Another Allan Brown capture in the summer of 1967, he had not quite made it at Southampton making only 13 appearances in four years but the future looked bright as he started the season as first choice right-back.

After nine games, he suffered a bad knee injury at Doncaster and by the time he was fit again the Town team had a rather settled look as it sailed on to the Fourth Division championship. Hare left at the seasons end.
