This afternoon we extend a cordial welcome to Luton Town as we again anticipate what should be a very open and keenly-contested game.

And there will be no need for any introductions on the management side as David Pleat, his First Team Coach Trevor Hartley and Physiotherapist John Sheridan all joined us from Kenilworth Road in the summer as did left-back Mitchell Thomas who has since forced his way into England's senior squad.

Games with the Hatters are usually eminently watchable as both sides share a positive attitude to their play and there have, over the years, been some exciting conclusions to our games, particularly those at Luton.

Yet we have only met 14 times in the League and although we have won 11 of those past encounters and Luton only three, they did have the satisfaction of winning last season's corresponding fixture 3-1. That was Luton's first win on this ground for 37 years and their first against us — home and away — since 1959. No doubt our players will be keen to re-establish a similar run this afternoon!

It was an impressive all-round performance in which Clive went close to another hat-trick late in the game following astute work by Glenn Hoddle

while Paul saw a good shot well saved by the Everton goalkeeper as we dominated with impressive determination.



If everyone plays to maximum ability we should be in for a cracker today. Rome wasn't built in a day and nor was Luton. They have a very good group of Division One players.


Enjoy the game. May the headlines not be about hooligan Chairmen, Manager gossip and slander but entertaining football.

Tribute to Sir Stanley Rous

Chairman Irving Scholar and Secretary Peter Day represented the Club at a Service of Thanksgiving for the life and work of Sir Stanley Rous, C.B.E., J.P., at Westminster Abbey on Thursday, September 25, 1986.

Sir Stanley, one of the most distinguished officials in the history of football, died in July at the age of 91. He was a former President of F.I.F.A. and Secretary to the Football Association.

Both the Duke of Edinburgh and the Duke of Kent were represented at the ceremony which was also attended by players and officials, both past and present. Bert Millichip, Chairman of the Football Association, read one of the lessons.

One of the most poignant aspects of the whole tribute to the great man was contained in the Order of Service and it was a quote from Sir Stanley himself in 1984.

"I don't want to look back instead of looking forward, but I do hope football never becomes anything other than a game," he said.



SPOTLIGHT ON GLENN HODDLE

GLENN HODDLE clocked up another Tottenham milestone when he made his 350th League appearance in our colours against Everton last week.

And Glenn joined a real White Hart Lane "Hall of Fame" when his name was pencilled in at number ten on the dressing room team sheet because he is only the seventh player to reach that figure in our history.

Former skipper Steve Perryman, who joined Oxford United in March, leads the way with a massive 655 followed by such greats as Pat Jennings (472), Ted Ditchburn (418), Cyril Knowles (401), Jimmy Dimmock (400) and Maurice Norman (357).

GREAT PRIDE

Yet, although Glenn takes great pride in the achievement, he admits that he is more interested in looking forward. And he wants to add a great deal more to his tally before he finally considers hanging up those Hummel boots.

"I'm always looking to the next game and I'm sure that would be the same for any footballer," says Glenn. "Few of us are aware of the exact facts and figures concerning our careers but it is very pleasing when you are told.

"I take great pride in playing for Spurs and I am honoured to join the other six. In fact, if somebody had told me when I was a 16-year-old apprentice that I would play 350 games for the club I would have been very happy.

"Yet reaching that figure does make you stop and look back. I can still remember my first game clearly as if it happened yesterday. It is frightening how quickly the time has passed.

"Now, having knocked up 350, I have to look at the next 100 and more," continues Glenn who has also made 102 appearances in major cup competition for us. Add to that his England caps at senior, "B" and Under-21 levels and the total for first class games reaches 505.

"I still feel that I've got at least another seven years in the game and I certainly possess the

enthusiasm to go on until I'm 35. But then, who knows? You might get to the stage, as Trevor Brooking did, when you suddenly stop enjoying what you are doing and say 'right, that's enough.'

"But that's the furthest thing from my mind at the moment although I'll admit that I am feeling a bit jaded after the World Cup. I take great pride in my performance, even in a five-a-side game, and I am not feeling as sharp lately as I did last season and in Mexico.

"Yet, I can remember feeling the same after the Spanish World Cup when I only had 10 days off and I soon felt my old self so I'm sure that will happen again. I'm certainly not worrying about it because I'm still the same player as last season when I had what was probably my best ever season at White Hart Lane.

"There is something of a mental and physical peak to overcome and I know that I am not playing as well as I can on a consistent basis. Hopefully that will put itself right in the near future because football's a much nicer game and the life's much more enjoyable when you are playing well. It's totally different when you are struggling!

"I know that it will all come back just as quickly as it's gone — it's just a matter of sticking at it.

STAYING POWER

Meanwhile, Glenn has to admire the staying power and consistency of captain Ray Clemence who recorded his 1,000th senior appearance against Newcastle last September having made his League debut for Scunthorpe way back in the 1964-65 season.

"That's some going and represents an incredible 22 years in the game — exactly twice my total," says Glenn. "It's a fact that goalkeepers certainly last longer than outfield players but it is still an amazing figure.

"I know that he claims to be 36 but there have got to be question marks about that!"

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

DEFENDER Jimmy Holmes was part of the great Spurs squad of the Seventies, a key figure in the back division master-minded by Steve Perryman.


Born in Dublin and capped 30 times by the Republic of Ireland, Holmes remembers the days at Tottenham as among the best in his footballing career.

Jimmy went to Canada after his four seasons at White Hart Lane: "Those were a really good couple of years. I went out to join the Vancouver Whitecaps at the same time as Johnny Giles, another Irishman, and we had a tremendous time. We were certainly the best side in the League. We didn't actually win anything, but I enjoyed every moment of it.

"I've been all over the place since Vancouver. It's hard to remember all the clubs I've been with. I spent a couple of months at Leicester City, then went to Brentford for a while, then back to Coventry, my club before Spurs.

"Then Bruce Rioch asked me down to Torquay and I spent a year with them. I was looking around for something else to get into when John Wile invited me to join Peterborough as Assistant Manager and player. That was good experience for my present

job as player/manager at Nuneaton Borough.

"I'm thirty-two now and still enjoying my football. I also really love the management side of the game, but find it incredibly difficult. I suppose it's the same for every manager, but I just keep wishing we had more money.

"That's the direction I'd like to see my career moving in, managing a top-class side. I take great encouragement from the fact that David Pleat started out at Nuneaton Borough. I'll just

have to hope I can follow in his footsteps.

"My favourite memory from my playing days at White Hart Lane has got to be the promotion decider against Southampton when we spent that single season in the Second Division. Southampton were already sure of going up, we were under tremendous pressure, having led the division until just a few weeks from the end. No goals were scored, but what a game, and we got the result that saw us back up. Unforgettable.

"Of all the footballers I've been lucky enough to play with, I'd have to pick Steve Perryman as the best of the lot. He was my captain in those days and he really was special. But I'd also have to find a place for Chris Jones, a forward who I don't think ever really got the recognition he deserved. He did an immense amount of work up front for other players and was a real asset.

"As for remarkable opponents, they were all difficult in the First Division. But I always think of Steve Coppell as the toughest man I had to mark. He was a real handful."

And for the future?

"I think I can go on playing for a while yet, before I have to finally settle into the manager's suit on a permanent basis."

- 12: Another thrilling FA Cup encounter, but this time Luton are beaten 1-0 by Everton at Goodison Park.
- 22: Luton gain revenge for their Cup defeat by denting Everton's title hopes with two goals from Steve Foster.

APRIL

- 12: Clive Allen gives Tottenham an early lead at Luton, but Mike Newell, signed from Wigan earlier in the season, heads an equaliser minutes from time.
- 26: A superb hat-trick from Mick Harford gives them an exciting 3-2 victory over neighbours Watford.
- 28: Harford is one of six players put on standby by Bobby Robson in England's squad for Mexico.

MAY

- 3: Emeka Nwajiobi's second-half equaliser earns them a point at Manchester City in their last game of the season, leaving Luton in a respectable ninth position in the League.
- 17: Manager David Pleat joins Tottenham, and takes his assistant Trevor Hartley and Physiotherapist John Sheridan with him.

JUNE

- 12: Midfield player Ray Daniel, who could manage only a handful of first-team appearances last season, joins Hull City on a free transfer.

JULY

- 2: England Under-21 left-back Mitchell Thomas joins David Pleat at Spurs.


AUGUST

- 10: Tottenham to pay £275,000 for full-back Mitchell Thomas after the fee is set by an FA tribunal.
- 14: Mal Donaghy turns down a move to Chelsea.
- 21: John Moore signs his first player in charge at Luton when he snaps up Millwall midfielder Robert Wilson for a bargain £40,000.
- 23: Brian Stein scores the equaliser for Luton in their 1-1 draw at Leicester on the opening day of the season.

26: Luton, who have banned all away fans at Kenilworth Road this season, win their first match of the season 2-1 at home to Southampton. Robert Wilson, making his Town debut, opens the scoring with Brian Stein getting the second.

- 20: The 'Hatters' go down 2-0 at West Ham.
- 22: Luton are removed from the Littlewoods Challenge Cup by the Football League after refusing to relax their ban on away fans for matches at Kenilworth Road.
- 27: Manchester City defeated 1-0 at Kenilworth Road.

LES SEALEY (Goalkeeper). Luton secured his transfer from Coventry City in August, 1983. He's a Londoner from Bethnal Green and a cousin of Alan Sealey, the former West Ham United winger. He developed through the apprentice ranks at Coventry and made his League debut away to Queen's Park Rangers in April, 1977. In season 1984-85 he played six League matches on loan to Plymouth Argyle.

TIM BREACKER (Defender). Born at Bicester and developed through Luton's apprentice ranks to become a full professional in August, 1982. Made his League debut away to Ipswich Town in March, 1984 and has since established himself as a

senior player. Was in the Luton team that beat Spurs here last season. **STEVE FOSTER (Defender).** Transferred to Luton from Aston Villa in November, 1984. Born at Portsmouth, he developed through the apprentice ranks of the Portsmouth club to full professional status, and later joined Brighton and Hove Albion. Attained full international status as a Brighton player, making three appearances for England, and was in Brighton's F.A. Cup final team with Gary Stevens in 1983. Left Brighton for Villa in March, 1984.

MAL DONAGHY (Defender). A well-established Northern Ireland international who was born in Belfast and joined Luton from Larne,

the Irish League club, in June, 1978. Made his first appearance in Luton's home match with Oldham Athletic on the opening day of the following season. His full first name is Malachy. Wore the No. 6 shirt in the League match here last season.

ROB JOHNSON (Defender). Drafted into Luton's League team last season and held a regular place towards the end of the campaign. Born at neighbouring Bedford and can therefore be classed as a local discovery. Signed as a full contract professional in August, 1985 and has therefore made rapid progress. Was in Luton's team against Spurs at Kenilworth Road last April.

ASHLEY GRIMES (Defender). A full Eire international who was born in Dublin and made his name with Manchester United. Had previously played for Bohemians, who transferred him to United in March, 1977. Left United for Coventry City in August, 1983 and made the further move to Luton in August, 1984.

ROBERT WILSON (Midfield). Transferred to Luton from Millwall just before this season opened. A Londoner from Kensington, he started his career as an apprentice with Fulham, making 175 League appearances for the Cottagers before moving across South London to Millwall in August, 1985. Made 28 League appearances for Millwall last season, scoring 12 goals.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield). Born at Bridgnorth and established himself as a League player with Walsall. Developed through the apprentice ranks at Walsall, making 111 League appearances for the Staffordshire club before moving to Luton in December, 1984. Atones for lack of physique with skill and effort.

PETER NICHOLAS (Midfield). Transferred to Luton from Crystal Palace in January, 1985 and made his debut for the Hatters against Spurs at Kenilworth Road the same week. A full Welsh international, he was in the team that drew with Finland in

Helsinki last month, and is also a former Youth international. Developed through the apprentice ranks of Palace and returned to the Selhurst club after a spell with Arsenal. Was contemporary with Clive Allen as a Palace player. Born in Newport. **RICKY HILL (Midfield).** A full English international. Born in London and developed through Luton's apprentice ranks to achieve full professional status in May, 1976. At that time he had already made his League debut as a substitute in a home match with Bristol Rovers in the preceding month. He celebrated that debut with a goal in a 3-1 win. He made three appearances in the full England team. **BRIAN STEIN (Forward).** Attained full

English international status three seasons ago. Born in Cape Town, South Africa, and joined Luton as a full contract professional in October, 1977, having previously played for Edgware Town. Made his League debut for Luton as substitute away to Mansfield Town in the Second Division in November, 1977. Currently under suspension.

MIKE NEWELL (Forward). Transferred to Luton from Wigan Athletic last January and made his first League appearance for the Hatters in that month away to Chelsea in the No. 9 shirt. A native of Liverpool and he started as an amateur with the Liverpool club but made his League debut in the colours of Crewe Alexandra. He made 72 League appearances for

Wigan before moving to Luton.

MARK STEIN (Forward). Younger brother of Brian Stein and also born in Cape Town. First signed as a non-Contract Player for Luton in July, 1983 and first appeared in their League team in the No. 9 shirt at home to Everton in April, 1984. Made two League appearances on loan to Aldershot last season.

STAR OF OLD



BERNARD STRETON was a great favourite between the posts for Luton.

Although born at Gillingham, he was a product of Norfolk junior football and went on to gain goalkeeping distinction with Notts County and Shrewsbury Town, winning amateur international recognition.

In season 1946-47 he commenced his successful spell of service with Luton and in 1949 gained a full England cap against Northern Ireland on Manchester City's ground. England won 9-2!

Streton served in the R.A.F. during the war and after his League days were over he played for King's Lynn. He played here in the League for Luton against Spurs on a number of occasions in the seasons just after the war.

MISERABLE START BY TYKES

Barnsley will be coming to White Hart Lane looking for some Cup relief to what has been a miserable season so far. The Tykes lost their opening six League matches, they have been on the bottom of the Second Division all season and they were knocked out of the Full Members' Cup at the first stage by Sunderland on penalties.

The Yorkshire side produced one of its best performances against Spurs in the first-leg of the Littlewoods Cup at Oakwell. Spurred by their best crowd (9,979) of the season, they scored twice. Even though they come to White Hart Lane next Wednesday trailing by 2-3, they are expected to have a go at us as they have nothing to lose now.

It was certainly been a worrying season for manager Allan Clarke, the former Leeds and England striker. During the summer he lost two of last season's leading scorers. Ian Walsh and David Hirst scored 24 goals between them and Mr Clarke (pictured) has certainly had a few problems in finding a new combination up front.

Winston Campbell, Rodger Wylde, Steve Agnew and Ian Chandler have all been used at centre-forward and, though Steve Lowndes — the Wales international signed from Millwall this summer — has been playing up front, their most consistent goalscorer has been Stuart Gray, who has been playing in midfield and defence. He got both of their goals against Spurs.

The defence has looked reasonably secure and has been playing together for much of the season. Larry May and Paul Fletcher are dominating figures in the centre with Joe Joyce at right-back and either Paul Cross or Stuart Gray at left-back. Clive Baker is in goal.

When results continued to disappoint, Mr Clarke signed Jim Dobbins, a midfield player, from Doncaster and gave young Ian Chandler and Darren Foreman their first taste of League football. Another debutant was Mark Ogle, who played a couple of games at centre-back when May was unavailable.


Barnsley failed to score in any of their opening three away games in the Second Division, going down at Oldham (0-2), Millwall (0-1) and Shrewsbury (0-1).

They did manage to score at Shrewsbury in the Full Members' Cup, a goal from Stuart Gray giving them a 1-1 draw at the end of extra-time. But they then lost 7-8 on penalties.

On paper, Barnsley appear to have little chance of saving the Littlewoods Cup tie for they would need to score at least two goals — and that's double what they managed in their first four away games of the season.

But, of course, we can expect them to change tactics here. They will come looking for an early goal but, by committing more men to attack, they will take the risk of leaving gaps in that usually sound defence.

It promises to be an interesting cup-tie — with the expectation of a few goals. And we shall be looking forward to a big crowd to support the team in its effort to move into the third round.
