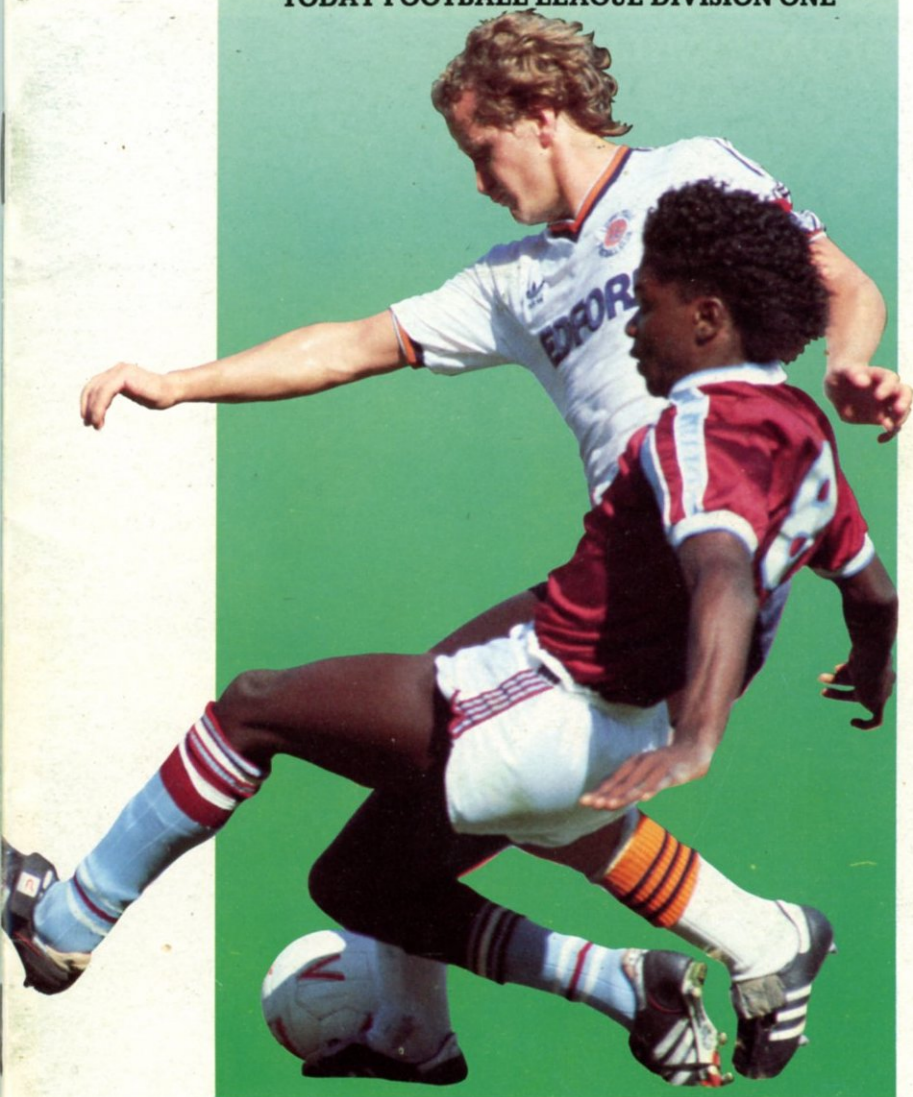

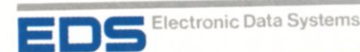

Sporting ethics

At school I was taught that co-operation was more important than competition. We did compete – for form prizes, subject prizes, and the most coveted, the Merit Prize, awarded to the girl who'd made the most effort to improve. Netball was valued because, being a team game, it required co-operative effort. We wanted to win, and frequently did, but that didn't stop us admiring the skills and efforts of our opponents.

I have been reminded of this at Kenilworth Road this season as Luton's opponents have been applauded – without weakening support for our team. Now refreshment sellers, some of them quite young, peddle their wares up and down the aisles of the stands without fear of being menaced by louts. Elsewhere refreshment vendors are often behind counters and re-inforced glass barriers.

Impromptu gesture

Police are little in evidence, and stewards can help people rather than be little more than bouncers. Recently Gareth Owen photographed Cancer Research collectors with Kenilworth the Cat. As an impromptu gesture, he included girls and boys from the Oak Road Stand. These children climbed on to the pitch, posed with scarves held high, and

returned to their seats: minimum fuss – maximum enjoyment.

If there were away fans would this have happened? Barriers between fans and pitch would have made it difficult, and the away fans would probably have been jeering at Kenilworth anyway, making the atmosphere unpleasant.

Civilised

Of course we'd all like to see support for the opposition at our ground but we don't want the mindless partisan idiots who've attached themselves to football over the years. I don't want to listen to obscene chanting, cheers when a foul has been committed or a player injured, or verbal abuse of our players.

I do appreciate being able to travel to the ground and watch the match with no fear of being attacked. If the only way to make football civilised is to ban the away supporter then that's what clubs must do. Kenilworth Road might be slightly quieter this season. It is certainly a more pleasant place to be.

Tottenham 0 Luton Town 0

No goals, but a good performance and a decent result was the outcome as the Town extended their unbeaten run in First Division fixtures against Spurs to four games at White Hart Lane last Saturday. Although the style of last season's 3-1 victory was not to be equalled, there was still plenty of good football to enjoy... and a few missed chances to rue.

With Brian Stein suspended and Mick Harford unfit to return to action for the first time this season, the Town fielded a relatively inexperienced front line. But Mike Newell, Marc North and Mark Stein worked hard to create chances and were unlucky not to snatch a goal.

Tottenham were also under-strength in attack with Clive Allen injured, Mark Falco transferred to Watford and new signing Nico Clausen not eligible to play and, as a result, both defences dominated.

Mark Stein, in particular, impressed among the Town's young attackers and his twisting and turning runs provided most of the danger. In the first half, Stein was thwarted by Clemence when the former England goalkeeper made a superb save and in the second he set up Mike Newell. Again, Clemence made a miraculous save to prevent the Town going in front.

Steve Foster and Mal Donaghy were well in command with Peter Nicholas also in commanding form and Les Sealey saved brilliantly, when called upon.

VIEWS from the BENCH

Ray Harford



Chief coach Ray Harford believes the indefinite ban on English clubs from European club competitions can only lead to an increasing rift between our domestic game and the Continental and world game. As a lover of skill, fine techniques and cultured tactical football, he thinks this will leave the English game at an increasing disadvantage on the international stage. Today, in his Views, he explains why:

Brilliant Di Stefano

"One of my best and earliest memories of European football came with the great Real Madrid side and their fantastic 7-3 win over Eintracht Frankfurt in Glasgow in the European Cup final in 1960. They were brilliant and they set a style and a standard to follow. In Alfredo Di Stefano, their centre-forward, they also had a brilliant total footballer who could look comfortable with the ball anywhere on the pitch.

"We, in England, have never really learned from that match or tried to adopt the Continental styles until recent years with the success of Liverpool. Unfortunately, Liverpool are almost an island in the English game now as they set their standards on their own and no-one has a chance to compare and compete with the Europeans.

European football

"I said in my last programme notes that we are a bit impatient as a nation and don't like to see the ball spend too long on the ground or being passed around. But at least European football gave us and our fans a chance to see the wonderful football played that way and would have helped us to adapt our standards.

"Football is really about skill and technique and good play with the ball. What makes Diego Maradona such a brilliant player is not that he can jump high or tackle powerfully - it is his sheer genius with the ball.

"He can beat players and score goals, but he also knows when to play it long and when to play it short and he can play it one touch or two or three touch. He has enough football intelligence to make the right selections.

"All this variation and thought allied to high skills is what, to my mind, makes the top soccer played in Europe so valuable as an experience for our game and our players. We cannot advance if we don't get that experience and it is a shame.

Continental techniques

"For example, in technique, the Continentals are way ahead of us. They are encouraged to use the outside of their feet for playing the ball and when running. Not the inside. That gives them a great advantage over our old-fashioned style. Of course, we have some players here in England and some at Luton who have high-quality techniques, but they are not in common use in the English game.

"And unless we can find ways of keeping our players in contact with these sort of skills in competitive games we are going to drift more and more into our own sort of game away from the mainstream.

"It is very important to coach technique. How to kick the ball in different ways, how to control and love it. Supreme skill with the ball is the key to high quality."

Norwich City arrive here this afternoon sitting proudly on top of the First Division level on points with Nottingham Forest who have a marginally superior goal difference. A single victory over Queen's Park Rangers lifted them to their highest position in the Football League for several years last Saturday.

After winning the Milk Cup (now the Littlewoods Cup) in the 1974-75 season and then being unexpectedly relegated, the Canaries came chirping back last season when they convincingly won the Second Division championship. 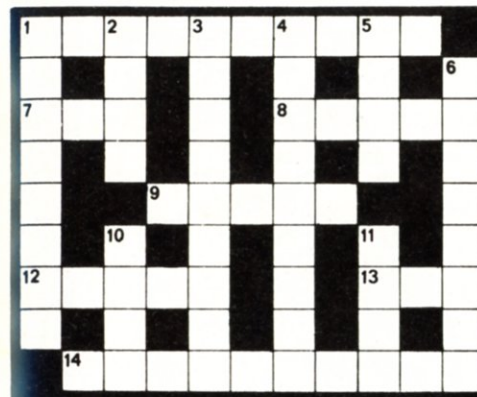

Stein was thwarted by Clemence in the 13th minute when he blasted a right-foot shot which had goal written all over it. Then in the second half, Stein skipped past the Tottenham defence to set Mike Newell up from six yards out. But Clemence again saved the day."

Hill's vision

The Sunday Times - "Mark Stein's ability to turn and go past defenders kept Tottenham's two full-backs - Danny and Mitchell Thomas - at full stretch and Hill's vision, Preece's industry and Nicholas's distribution created much the better chances for the visitors. Twice Clemence had to make important saves in the first half."

The People - "Quite simply, Pleat's old team was better than his new one. Only the lack of a goal-grabber kept Luton off the scoresheet."

Runaround

Sunday Express - "Pleit was left with plenty more problems as his expensive assembly of stars were given a first-half runaround by a smart Luton outfit inspired by Mark Stein, the smallest and the brightest player on view. The industrious Stein set up enough chances for Luton to have won this match but they were spurned by his over-eager team-mates."

LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

CANARIES, GNASHINGS OF TEETH AND SEVERAL UNPOPULAR TRANSFERS!

We welcome Norwich City to Kenilworth Road fresh from the transfers involving Chris Woods and Dave Watson to Rangers and Everton, *writes club*

statistician Roger Wash.

But the misgivings of the Norwich supporters to those transfers was nothing compared to the gnashing of teeth amongst Town fans when ex-City forward Sam Bell was sold by Luton to Tottenham in March 1935.

Bell, signed from Norwich a year before, scored two goals on his debut in the final game of the season in 1933-34 and then proceeded to notch 19 in 29 games the following term before his transfer.

The summer of 1934 had seen several costly signings by the Town including George Stephenson and Jack Ball.

When Fred Roberts was signed from Birmingham, over Christmas, it was suddenly realised that the Luton board had overstretched the mark.

They had mounted up an overdraft of £10,000 as well as being unable to pay all the players the permitted maximum wage.

Problems

Town supporters were unaware of the financial problems and when the directors sold trusty Bill Brown to Huddersfield and then Bell to Tottenham many letters threatening a boycott of home matches followed until the board admitted to the previous problems.

This cloud certainly had a silver lining as it was discovered when the bills had been paid that a certain amount of money was left over enabling the club to sign such stalwarts as Jack Nelson, Billy Fellowes and Jock Finlayson who were to assist the Town to promotion in 1937.

Another book-balancing exercise a decade later also upset Town supporters when Bobby Brennan was transferred to Birmingham City. Brennan, signed from Belfast Distillery in October 1947 for £2000 was regarded as a bargain and he soon became a firm favourite at Kenilworth Road.

Inevitable

Many First Division clubs were upset that Brennan had been snapped up by Luton and as his fame spread still further it was inevitable that an offer the board could not refuse would be forthcoming.

This came in July 1949 when Birmingham offered £20,000 which was a record fee received by the Town at the time.

The fans were not placated in this instance however as the Town struggled to avoid relegation from the Second Division over the next two seasons.

Brennan did not fare too well either as he lasted only one season at St Andrews before transferring to Fulham and then to Norwich in 1953.

Equaliser

He remained at Norwich playing Third Division football for the rest of his league career and, in fact, scored the Norwich equaliser against the Town in the 1959 FA Cup semi-final. By then, he was 35.

Another transfer that did not go down too well at the time was that of John Ryan to Norwich in 1976. Although receiving £46,000 for a player who cost nothing when signed by Alec Stock in 1969, Town fans could not help feeling that another good player had gone to Carrow Road at a bargain price following the path of Ron Davies twelve years previously.

Perhaps now Norwich have got their revenge over Luton for the 1959 FA Cup defeat!

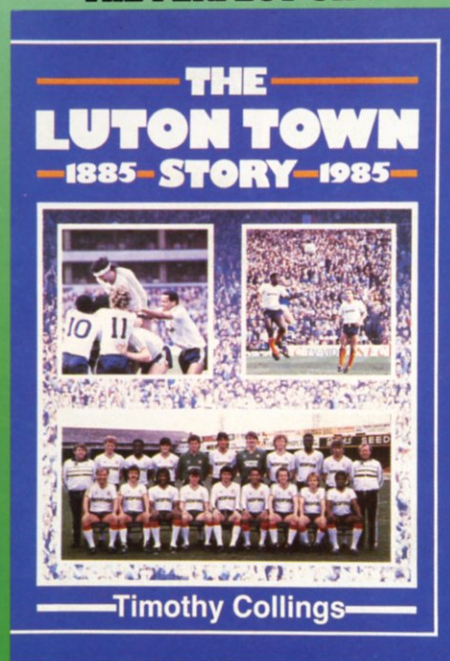
