



We're now just seven days away from the first Whitbread Trophy Bitter Test between Great Britain and Australia. The match kicks off at 2.15pm and there may still be a few seats remaining; up-to-date information will be announced this afternoon. Admission to standing accommodation will be by payment at the turnstiles and costs £4.00 for adults, (£2.00 for children). Rugby League Secretary, David Oxley, led the welcoming party when the tourists arrived in Manchester ten days ago and was suitably impressed. He told us, "I only had to shake hands with them and they terrified me!" Having said that, they hold no such fears for the British lads and with a huge crowd roaring them on, they're brimming with confidence. Whilst this is something of a deviation for us, it isn't the first time that Old Trafford has been used for something other than soccer. In the late '50s, Salford played a rugby match on our ground and just five years ago last month, we staged a seven-a-side cricket competition which featured Lancashire, Yorkshire, Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire. Those present that night, (the game was played under floodlights), will never forget the sight of big Clive Lloyd as he smashed the ball all over our Old Trafford. Going back even further, to July 1927 to be precise, we

staged lawn tennis when a professional tour stopped off at Old Trafford. The centre of attraction was Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen - the Martina Navratilova of the day - and a crowd of over 15,000, mainly young women, witnessed the event.


**FLOODLIGHTS**

. . . or should we say 'Kiddo in the community!' Ex-United favourite, Brian Kidd, is thoroughly enjoying his new role which involves forging closer links between the Club and the community. We've already told of his involvement with the local schools, but Brian has also been heavily involved with the Greater Manchester Federation of Boys' Clubs, through their under-16 representative side, and he's spent much of the last six weeks preparing the lads for the Gillette Inter-Counties Cup tie against Yorkshire in November. Apart from regular coaching, Brian also arranged a game with United's younger players at The Cliff and, although the Reds won comfortably, it was invaluable experience for the Manchester boys.

**TICKET NEWS**

Next Sunday, 26th October, United are away to **Manchester City**. Both seats and standing tickets have been on sale this past week and the latest position will be announced today. City expect a full house and have asked us to emphasize that there will be *no* cash admissions. On Wednesday, 29th October, United are at home to **Southampton** in the 3rd Round of the Littlewoods cup. Reserved seats, at their usual prices, go on general sale on Monday and it is likely that admission to seats in Stands A, E, F & J will be by payment at the turnstiles marked 'Cash Only' on the night. **IMPORTANT NOTE.** There will be no cash turnstiles for United fans in Stand K, although tickets are still available in advance. To complete a busy week, we're at home to **Coventry City** on Saturday 1st November and reserved seats priced £5.20 in Stands B & C - together with seats in the Family Stand - adults £4.30, children £2.20, are now available on Monday to personal and postal applicants. Just one week later, United are away to **Oxford United** and although there are no tickets available to visiting supporters, admission to the standing accommodation will be by payment of £4.50 at the turnstiles.

**NEXT AT  
OLD TRAFFORD**  
**SOUTHAMPTON**

Southampton will be making their second trip of the season to Old Trafford when they come here in the third round of the Littlewoods Cup on Wednesday October 29th. As far as we are concerned, we hope we can see an action replay.

Two goals from Frank Stapleton with singles from Jesper Olsen, Peter Davenport and Norman Whiteside gave us a morale-boosting first win of the season by a 5-1 margin. That defeat at Old Trafford prompted Saints' manager Chris Nicholl to make changes. Two of his veteran players returned to the side after that - one of them former United and Scotland international Joe Jordan. He has been playing alongside that prolific goalscorer Colin Clarke, whose recent hat-trick against Newcastle took his tally to ten goals in as many games.

David Armstrong was another old stager to win a recall and he has reclaimed his place in midfield.

Perhaps the most welcome news for Saints' fans was that England centre-back Mark Wright came safely through his first League game since breaking his leg six months earlier in the semi-final of the F.A. Cup. Wright came back in the home game against Newcastle but England manager Bobby Robson felt it was too early to consider him for this week's game against N. Ireland at Wembley.


Southampton have shown a marked improvement since their disaster day at Old Trafford and they remained unbeaten in their next five games. A week later they defeated Liverpool (2-1) at The Dell and then drew at Wimbledon (2-2). They also crushed Newcastle 4-1 at The Dell.

In between they achieved a 3-0 aggregate victory over Swindon in the Littlewoods Cup to earn their forthcoming third round trip to Old Trafford.


So, while United will be looking for a repeat performance, much-improved Southampton will be coming for revenge.

As far as Brian Kidd is concerned . . . he has come back home.

The one-time Manchester United forward has roamed the football world but now he is in old familiar surroundings again.

Brian is back where he started . . . working for Manchester United after one of the quietest transfers ever to take place at Old Trafford. I suspect United launched their former forward into his new job because they weren't too sure what it was really all about or whether it would be a success.

I can understand their difficulty because his appointment is an experiment and the areas he operated in are not easily defined. Basically he is charged with the responsibility of trying to link Manchester United more closely with the community in terms of trying to help youngsters in their football, or for that matter any other sport.

The idea was the inspiration of the Professional Footballers Association who got the financial backing of the Manpower Services Commission to run a pilot scheme at six clubs in the North West – Manchester United, Manchester City, Oldham, Bury, Preston and Bolton.

United recruited Brian Kidd to run their project, and all I can say is that they made a brilliant choice. Even with the backing of a big club like United, the task of trying to take football to the community is daunting, something like trying to paint the Forth Bridge single handed.

But Brian has not let the enormity of the operation discourage him. Even though he cannot do everything, he has concentrated on doing what he can with imagination and enthusiasm, and it is surprising just how much he has achieved in the three months since they gave him a little office at Old Trafford.

He has found working with schools, youth clubs, the unemployed easy, because though

## PROFILE BRIAN KIDD

Brian rose to the top of his profession as a footballer he has no pretensions.

In terms of education for his



children and the kind of house he lives in, Brian reflects a comfortable lifestyle these days, but at heart he has not changed much from the Collyhurst boy who started out in life much more modestly.

He is back working where he started . . . at the grass roots of life and loving every minute of it.

Unlike a lot of contemporaries, he still lives north of Manchester.

"South of Ardwick Green I get homesick", he says.

Brian joined United straight from school and will be particularly remembered for celebrating his 19th birthday by scoring in the European Cup final at Wembley in 1968 to help the Reds become the first English champions of Europe.

He also played for Arsenal, Manchester City, Everton and Bolton. He spent four years in America playing and tried management with Barrow and Preston.

"I have travelled and have been very lucky. I appreciate what the game has given me. I love football and never really looked on it as a job.

"Now I am more than happy to go back to where I started. I can still relate to the lads and perhaps they think of me as a local boy who made good.

"I'm one of their own. The important thing is that we have got to get interest back in football, so I am visiting schools, coaching boys' clubs and trying to organise games for unemployed at sports centres . . . anything to promote the game among young people.

"I cannot say enough for the backing I get at Old Trafford from the administration right through to the players. They can't be out every night but they do as much as they can."

Brian, now 37, and his wife Margaret have three children, Mark 13, Clare 11 and Gemma 5. The family also have a father happy in his job back home where he started.



# FANS ROAR REDS HOME

Just eight days earlier United did more than enough to earn a creditable 1-1 draw at the City Ground, home of League leaders, Nottingham Forest. Three days later they won through to the 3rd Round of the Littlewoods Cup with a convincing 5-2 win at Port Vale, and the Old Trafford faithful poured into the stadium last Saturday hoping to see the revival continue.

The visit of Sheffield Wednesday is one the Red's don't seem to relish, even when things are going well. Our record since the Sheffield club returned to the top flight is both painful and consistent – played 4, won 0, drawn 0, lost 4.

It was with some trepidation then, that our supporters approached the game. That concern seemed well-founded when, in only the fourth minute, a cross to the far post found Mark Chamberlain unmarked. The former Stoke and England winger had both time and space to spare and a well placed header gave goalkeeper, Chris Turner, no chance, (pic 1).


That setback seemed to have little effect on the Reds as, slowly but surely, they began to dominate the game and it soon became a question of 'when' not 'if' we would score. 

area only to be tripped by Nigel Worthington. Referee, Don Shaw, immediately pointed to the spot and up stepped our new penalty taker, Peter Davenport. In view of the fact that Bryan Robson, Jesper Olsen and Gordon Strachan had all missed from the spot recently, it was probably an equal mixture of relief and joy when the ball was thumped into the back of the net, (pic 2).


The scoreline stayed at 1-1 for almost another 50 minutes, but United didn't panic and their patience, and flowing football, finally paid off. Norman Whiteside, (pic 3), made it 2-1 after a crossfield ball from Peter Barnes found Peter Davenport, who in turn squared the ball for the Irish International to sidefoot home.

The Reds, as they say, were really rolling now and the game was put out of Wednesday's reach when, just two minutes later, a Peter Barnes corner was knocked on by Graeme Hogg (pic 4), to Peter Davenport, who scored with a neat overhead kick, (pic 5).

A super crowd of 45,890 – our biggest of the season – would certainly say that we're back in business. United's man-of-the-match? Happily, you can take your pick, two-goal Peter Davenport had his best game yet, as did full back John Sivebaek. Peter Barnes, with a string of good crosses, played as though he'd never been away and Bryan Robson played a true captain's role as he drove his men forward time after time.



## Welcome to Old Trafford

### Cliff Butler previews today's game

Salutations winged their way to Kenilworth Road from, of all places, White Hart Lane, following our game there last October. The reason being that 'The Hatters' success in holding United to 1-1 draw meant that Tottenham Hotspur's record, set in 1960, of opening a season with 11 straight wins remained intact. Mark Hughes' goal in sixty-one minutes set United up for a record-equalling victory, but Brian Stein had other ideas and his goal, in the 69th minute, ended our 100 per cent start to the season and prompted a sigh of relief in North London. Hughes was on the mark against Luton in the return engagement at Old Trafford (Peter Davenport made his home debut in the game) along with Paul McGrath to register a 2-0 win. It was our 12th successive home League victory over the Bedfordshire club, who haven't taken a point from a game against United in Manchester this century.

'The Hatters' line-up is likely to be selected from the following players:  
**LES SEALEY** (Goalkeeper) Les served his apprenticeship with Coventry and made his League debut for them at Q.P.R. in 1977. He made more than 150 League appearances for the Sky Blues prior to his £120,000 transfer to Luton in 1983. During 1984/85 he spent a brief loan period with Plymouth.  
**ROB JOHNSON** (Defender) Rob can play in both full-back positions. A former Luton apprentice, he actually first played League football for Lincoln City, whilst on loan in 1983. He returned to Kenilworth Road to make a couple of appearances in Luton's First Division side and has won a regular place this season.  
**STEVE FOSTER** (Defender) Steve was signed from Aston Villa in a £70,000 deal two years ago. He began his League career with Portsmouth in 1976 but moved on to Brighton for £130,000 in

1979. Whilst with the Seagulls, Steve won three England caps and he played against United at Wembley in the replay of the 1983 F.A. Cup final. Aston Villa signed him for £200,000 in 1984.  
**MAL DONAGHY** (Defender) Mal was ever-present in N. Ireland's World Cup squad in Mexico, picking up his 45th cap against Brazil. Luton signed him from Larne Town in 1978 and he is now approaching his 350th League appearance for the club.  
**ASHLEY GRIMES** (Defender) Ashley used to play in midfield in his United days but he has settled in well at left-back for the Hatters this season. United signed him from Bohemians twice. On the second occasion he cost £35,000 but he soon won international recognition and he now has 15 Republic of Ireland caps. After making 90 appearances in our League eleven, Ashley was transferred to Coventry for £200,000 in 1983 and Luton signed him a year later.  
**TIM BREACKER** (Defender) Tim is a former Luton apprentice who got his chance in their First Division side in 1984. He had been holding a regular place at full-back for two years until recently suffering an injury.  
**PETER NICHOLAS** (Midfield) Peter is a hard-tackling midfield ball-winner who has played for Wales on 46 occasions. He started his career with Crystal Palace and, after four years in their senior side, he was transferred to Arsenal for £500,000 in 1981. He held his place in the Gunners' side for two years before returning to Palace. Luton signed him for £150,000 two years ago.  
**RICKY HILL** (Midfield) Ricky rose from the apprenticeship ranks to make his League debut in 1976. It took him a couple of years to earn a regular place but he now looks back on well over 350 League appearances for the Hatters. Ricky was capped by England on three occasions.



**ROBERT WILSON** (Midfield) Robert is enjoying his first spell of First Division football following his recent transfer from Millwall. He developed in Fulham's junior teams and made more than 150 League appearances for the Cottagers before joining Millwall in the summer of 1985.

# LUTON TOWN

by Tony Pullein



Luton Town have done more than most other clubs in the battle to lead football back to respectability and a return to European competition. They have taken positive action to rid football once and for all of the tiny minority of foolish people who have brought the game into disrepute.

The Hatters' membership scheme - which bans all visiting supporters from their Kenilworth Road ground - has had its critics. And it has cost them money. But chairman David Evans is insistent that it will benefit Luton, and football generally in the long run.

It is now possible to enjoy football at Kenilworth Road without being inflicted with foul-mouthed drunks who have done so much to damage the English game. To go to Kenilworth Road today is like going back in time to when all football matches were played in an atmosphere of humour and good sportsmanship.

Attendances have not declined, as some critics forecast. In fact, the trend is now in an upwards direction as Luton fans can be guaranteed a trouble-free afternoon.

Luton's stand caused them to be expelled from the Littlewoods Cup, because they could not comply with the rule demanding that visiting supporters must be supplied with tickets, but the Football Association has stated that they will be permitted to enter the F.A. Cup.

Whilst Luton's administrators have been leading the fight against hooliganism, manager John Moore and his team have been quietly impressing in the First Division. Mr. Moore took over in the summer, following the departure of David Pleat for Spurs, and for much of the season so far the Hatters have been holding a place in the top half of the table.

Luton have won away to Chelsea (3-1) and drawn at Leicester (1-1) and Tottenham (0-0). They were beaten at Aston Villa (1-2) and West Ham (0-2).

One member of the Luton side who will be particularly anxious to shine this afternoon is former United and Republic of Ireland international Ashley Grimes. He had an unhappy time with injuries during his early months at Kenilworth Road but now he seems to have cleared himself from those problems and is playing exceptionally well at left-back in what has looked a very solid defence.

The internationals Steve Foster (England) and Mal Donaghy (N. Ireland) are playing confidently in the middle with young Rob Johnson settling down well at right-back. In goal, Les Sealey has been in splendid form. Luton have a nice balance in midfield where Ricky Hill, Peter Nicholas and Robert Wilson have been operating for much of the season. When Wilson was missing recently, his place was taken by Mark Stein and then Mark North.

The younger of the Stein brothers is now challenging strongly to join striker Brian as a regular member of the side. Brian has been partnering Mike Newell in the centre of the

Luton attack with either David Preece or, until he was injured, Chuck Nwajiobi on the flank.

Luton have now re-established themselves as a First Division club following their promotion in 1982. This was something no one could have envisaged in the seventies when the club almost collapsed.

Indeed, the Hatters have survived many problems both on and off the field. Between 1960 and 1965 they dropped from the First to the Fourth Division and they are the only club to have suffered that experience and then recovered to regain their place at the top.

They returned to the First Division in 1974 and were unlucky to suffer immediate relegation. That triggered off their financial problems and it was something of a miracle that they survived.

The club was formed in 1885 and initially joined the Football League in 1897. After three years in the Second Division they failed to gain re-election but they returned to the League fold in 1920 as one of the original members of the Third Division (South).

Though they have never won any of the major honours, Luton did reach the F.A. Cup final in 1959, losing to Nottingham Forest. They have won the Championships of the Second, Third (South) and Fourth Divisions and have twice won promotion as runners-up in the Second Division.

### Man To Watch STEVE FOSTER

Steve started out in soccer determined to win fame as a top goalscorer. But he switched roles at a fairly early stage of his career and went on to play for England as a central defender. He played his first game for Portsmouth in August 1975 and during the course of that season made a total of 11 appearances in attack and as substitute. But Portsmouth finished bottom of the Second Division and faced a future of further uncertainty.

Steve could scarcely look back on his first season with satisfaction. That he looked unhappy in a striker's role was not entirely his fault. The service provided from midfield did not make life easy for any Pompey forward of that time.

So Steve decided to try his hand as a central defender and, after a few games as substitute the following season, he returned to the Portsmouth side in the number five shirt in November 1976 - and hasn't really looked back since then.

Brighton paid £130,000 for him during the summer of 1979 and that move gave Steve what is believed to be one of football's off-beat records. During a period of just three years and five months, he played in all four divisions of the Football League.

After winning under-21 honours, Steve won his first full England cap against Northern Ireland in February 1982. He won a total of three caps. Steve played for Brighton against United in the replay of the 1983 F.A. Cup final.

Brighton were relegated shortly after that and Steve was transferred to Aston Villa for £200,000 the following season. Luton signed him in 1984 and now he is skipper of this season's very successful team.





# PRESS CALL

There have been many great nights in Manchester United's colourful history but none can compare with Wednesday May 29, 1968 when Charlton, Best, Stepney and Co. defeated Benfica 4-1 at Wembley to bring the European Cup to Old Trafford.

Denis Lowe, the Daily Telegraph's chief Northern soccer writer for the past 17 years, remembers the occasion as the night when Sir Matt Busby's cherished dream became glorious reality at the end of an eleven year quest for the biggest prize in club football. "Beating Benfica in the final was the climax of Sir Matt's ambition to win the European Cup but it was also a vindication of his policy that English clubs should be allowed to compete in Europe" says Lowe.

"When the European Cup was formed as a competition in 1956 the Football League were opposed to any English club going into the tournament. Chelsea, as League champions that year, could have gone in but they opted out. The following season United rode the objections and entered. "Sir Matt knew that to develop as a nation we had to play the best in Europe and that vision ultimately resulted in United winning the trophy."

Only sheer guts and character had taken United to Wembley that May evening for in the semi-final they had faced a monumental task of defending a 1-0 first leg lead in the Bernabeu Stadium against Real Madrid. A 3-3 draw, having been 3-1 down, swept them into the final on a wave of confidence but Benfica proved to be no pushovers. "The first half contained some fierce challenges and wasn't very memorable but the second half saw the match come alive. Bobby Charlton scored with a rare header in the 55th minute but after that United lost their way and Graca

equalised with 10 minutes of normal time left. "Alex Stepney then kept United in the game with two quite superb saves from Eusebio to force the game into extra time. Sir Matt had a big job to lift his players at that stage because they looked weary having been so close to victory. "He told the midfielders during the break to get their grip back on the game and his team talk seemed to work because in the first period of extra time George Best scored with that magnificent run past a couple of defenders before taking the ball round the 'keeper Henrique.

"That was vintage Best and it finished Benfica off. Shortly after Brian Kidd celebrated his 19th birthday with a header to make it 3-1 before Charlton scored a brilliant fourth for his second of the match.

"After the game the press went into the United dressing room which was the scene of some celebration. Sir Matt hugged every member of the team and said: "This is the proudest night of my life and the end of an ambition I have held for 11 years. You all did me proud on this magnificent night."

"I think I was overwhelmed by it, but managed to do this for Matt at last. I was satisfied with most of all." Stiles, whose after his constant urging and prompting throughout the 120 minutes, said: "We should never have let them off the book after playing so well, but once it was done. They hadn't the heart to be any more."
