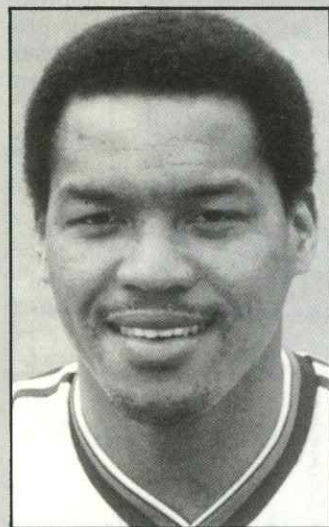

## STEIN BROTHERS INSPIRE LUTON'S TITLE HOPES

A superb double act from Luton's Stein brothers bewitched Charlton's defence at Kenilworth Road last Saturday and kept the Hatters very much involved with the Championship chase.

Brian Stein rounded John Humphrey to provide the perfect pass for younger brother Mark to fire home Luton's winning goal in the 21st minute. Brian also set up his brother for another goal and only a brave dive by goalkeeper Nicky Johns denied him on that occasion.

Shortly after the break, Mark broke on a solo run but his finishing was weak.

Mark, who has only recently won a place in Luton's senior team, might well have had a hat-trick whilst Brian's 66th minute pile-driver looked to be on target until Johns produced another of several fine saves.

Luton didn't strike the sort of form that saw them crush Nottingham Forest 4-2 in their previous home game but they made Charlton look very inferior. And it was only the visitors' battling spirit that kept down the score.

Mark Stein has now scored four times in his last four games and will be trying to maintain his goal-per-game record at The Manor this afternoon.

Charlton were without injured striker Jim Melrose and midfielder Colin Walsh, having just recovered from injury, played late in the game as substitute. Even so, they offered little resistance as they slumped to their fifth successive League defeat.

Arsenal's youngsters gave manager George Graham a perfect birthday present last weekend, running up a magnificent 4-0 win away at Aston Villa. With Mr Graham continually telling us his team is not yet ready for a title bid, many critics are finding him difficult to believe.

The Gunners have scored 11 goals in their last three games and haven't conceded a goal in five matches. Victory at Villa Park extended their unbeaten run to 12 games in League and Cup.

Last weekend's success was no real surprise, though, for Arsenal have a tremendous recent record at Villa Park. Last season they won there 4-1 whilst three seasons back they came away 6-2 to the good.

Ironically, it was a former Arsenal player who set them on the road to victory last Saturday. Martin Keown, the defender sold to Villa in the summer, conceded an own-goal in the 22nd minute. Second-half goals from Martin Hayes, Perry Groves and David Rocastle gave Arsenal their fifth successive away win in the League.

It's an impressive run—Everton (1-0), Newcastle (2-1), Charlton (2-0), Southampton (4-0) and Aston Villa (4-0). If that's not Championship form, it is difficult to appreciate what Mr Graham expects!

Nottingham Forest ended a run of four successive away League defeats with a good 3-2 win at Tottenham. Forest had a dream start when Spurs' goalkeeper Ray Clemence gave away a penalty in the first minute. Stuart Pearce gratefully tucked his spot-kick away.

But the irrepressible Clive Allen took it upon himself to put Spurs back into the game with two goals to take his season's tally to 21—putting him on top of the country's scoring list.

Another mistake by Clemence, who failed to hold a free-kick, enabled Chris Fairclough to fire home the rebound for Forest's equaliser. Neil Webb scored Forest's winner with his 12th goal of the season.

Spurs did not have their injured striker Nico Claesen and manager David Pleat must wonder what would happen if Clive Allen, injury-prone in the past, should take another knock. Of 21 goals scored by Tottenham in the First Division, 16 have been credited to Allen.

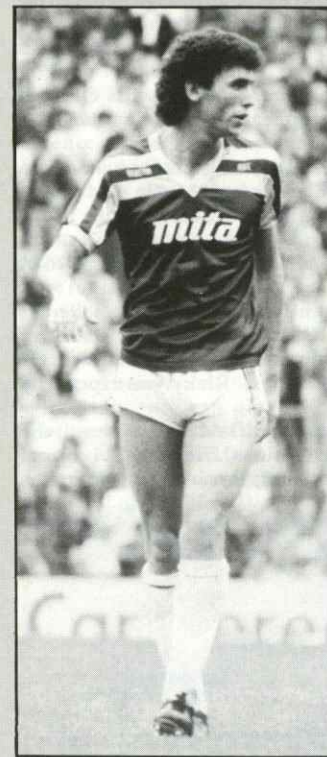
Does Mr Pleat suffer sleepless nights over his decision to sell Mark Falco, top scorer for the past two seasons? Since moving on to Watford, Falco has scored seven goals in eight First Division games for the Hornets.

Falco didn't manage to score at Southampton last Saturday, though. It was left to another of our natural

goalscorers, Colin Clarke, to steal the limelight. After Mark Wright had scored an early goal for Southampton, Clarke's 15th goal of the season made it 2-0 after only 12 minutes.

Though Steve Terry pulled one back for Watford, the Saints' new striker Gordon Hobson celebrated his First Division debut with the clinching goal that made it 3-1.

Southampton manager Chris Nicholl is placing great hopes on his new forward duo of Clarke and Hobson. His new player led Grimsby's scoring list with 19 goals last season and, though he has not played in the First Division before, it is hoped that he will follow in Clarke's

footsteps. The N. Ireland striker is also experiencing First Division play for the first time this season.

## LOOKING BACK

5 YEARS AGO: Kevin Brock gave us the lead soon after the interval in our Third Division game at Burnley. But Tommy Cassidy and Billy Hamilton netted for Burnley to give them a 2-1 win.

Goals from Steve White and Mal Donaghy gave Luton a 2-2 draw at Shrewsbury and they remained on top of the Second Division with a nine point lead over Oldham.

# OUR VISITORS

## LUTON TOWN



Luton Town have become one of the surprise teams of the season and, after achieving their fourth successive victory at home to Nottingham Forest last month, the Hatters emerged with a real chance of winning the League Championship for the first time in their history.

This is in spite of the fact that they have been without last season's top scorer Mick Harford who is battling to regain match fitness following an injury. Mick scored 25 times last season.

Not unexpectedly, the Hatters' goals supply dried up a bit though Brian Stein got several important goals early on. Mike Newell had been playing in attack alongside Brian but manager John Moore has recently changed tactics to 4-4-3, bringing in the younger Stein brother, Mark, up front.

Brian Stein, who is top scorer with six goals, was blooded in Luton's first-team in 1977 and led their scoring list for the first time in 1980/81 with 19 goals. The following term, when they won promotion, he led the way again with 21. Brian has played once for the full England team and also has three under-21 caps.

Newell was signed from Wigan towards the end of last season and scored six times in 16 matches. He began his career with Liverpool as an amateur but turned professional with Crewe Alexandra. After only three games in

their League eleven, he was transferred to Wigan in 1984. Mick has scored six times this term.

Mark followed his older brother Brian into the Luton side in 1983/84 and is now establishing himself as a regular. Last season he spent a short period on loan to Aldershot. He scored three goals in a two-game spell last month.

Darren McDonough and David Preece have also played in attack.

McDonough served his apprenticeship with Oldham and made his first League appearances during 1980/81. Luton signed him for £85,000 a few weeks ago.

Preece grew up with Walsall, getting his first chance in their League team against Chester in 1981. He made more than 100 League appearances for the Sadlers prior to his £150,000 transfer to Luton last season.

Ricky Hill and Peter Nicholas have been holding two of the midfield positions.

Hill rose from the apprenticeship ranks to make his League debut in 1976. It took him a couple of years to earn a regular place but he now looks back on well over 350 League appearances for the Hatters. Ricky was capped by England on three occasions.

Nicholas is a hard-tackling midfield ball-winner who has played for Wales on 46 occasions. He started his career with Crystal Palace and, after four years in their senior side,

he was transferred to Arsenal for £500,000 in 1981. He held his place in the Gunners' side for two years before returning to Palace. Luton signed him for £150,000 two seasons ago.

Ashley Grimes, who made a successful come-back this season at left-back, recently returned to his old position in midfield. Manchester United signed him twice from Irish club Bohemians. On the second occasion he cost £35,000 but he soon won international recognition and he now has 15 Republic of Ireland caps. After making 90 appearances in United's League eleven, Ashley was transferred to Coventry for £200,000 in 1983 and Luton signed him a year later.

Robert Wilson and Mark North has also played in attack. Wilson is enjoying his first spell of First Division football following his recent transfer from Millwall. He developed in Fulham's junior teams and made more than 150 League appearances for the Cottagers before joining Millwall in the summer of 1985.

North completed his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road but first tasted League football as a Lincoln player, whilst on loan to the Red Imps, two seasons ago. He was introduced to Luton's senior team last season.

Steve Foster and Mal Donaghy play in the middle of defence with Tim Breacker and Rob Johnson filling the full-back positions.

Donaghy was ever-present in N. Ireland's World Cup squad in Mexico and he picked up his 47th cap against Turkey last month. Luton signed him from Larne Town in 1978 and he is now approaching his 350th League appearance for the club.

Breacker is a former Luton apprentice who got his chance in their First Division side in 1984. He had been holding a regular place at full-back for two years until recently suffering an injury.

Johnson, who can play in both full-back positions, is another former Luton apprentice. He actually first played League football for Lincoln City, whilst on loan in 1983. He returned to Kenilworth Road to make a couple of appearances in Luton's First Division side and has won a regular place this season.

Goalkeeper Les Sealey served his apprenticeship with Coventry and made his League debut for them at Q.P.R. in 1977. He made more than 150 League appearances for the Sky Blues prior to his £120,000 transfer to Luton in 1983. During 1984/85 he spent a brief loan period with Plymouth.

Luton have won two away games at Chelsea (3-1) and Wimbledon (1-0). They drew at Leicester (1-1) and Tottenham (0-0) but were beaten at Aston Villa (1-2), West Ham (0-2), Manchester United (0-1) and Sheffield Wednesday (0-1).

## IN FOCUS

### Steve Foster



Steve Foster started out in soccer determined to win fame as a top goalscorer. But he switched roles at a fairly early stage of his career and went on to play for England as a central defender.

He played his first game for Portsmouth in August 1975 and during the course of that season made a total of 11 appearances in attack and as substitute. But Portsmouth finished bottom of the Second Division and faced a future of further uncertainty.

Steve could scarcely look back on his first season with satisfaction. That he looked unhappy in a striker's role was not entirely his fault. The service provided from midfield did not make life easy for any Pompey forward of that time.

So Steve decided to try his hand as a central defender and, after a few games as substitute the following season, he returned to the Portsmouth side in the number five shirt in November 1976 — and hasn't really looked back since then.

Brighton paid £130,000 for him during the summer of 1979 and that move gave Steve what is believed to be one of football's off-beat records. During a period of just three years and five months, he played in all four divisions of the Football League.

After winning under-21 honours, Steve won his first full England cap against N. Ireland in February 1982. He won a total of three caps.

Brighton shocked everyone by reaching the F.A. Cup final in 1983 but Steve had received a caution in one of the League games leading up to Wembley and took his total of penalty points to the limit. The cold truth hit him — he would miss the F.A. Cup final.

In spite of vigorous Brighton appeals to get the decision changed, Steve had to watch from the stand as his colleagues played splendidly to hold Manchester United to a 2-2 draw.

Steve was then free to play in the replay so he did get an unexpected chance to savour the Cup final atmosphere. Sadly, Brighton had given their all in the first game and were well beaten 0-4 in the replay.

Brighton were relegated shortly after that and Steve was transferred to Aston Villa for £200,000 the following season. Luton signed him in 1984 and now he is skipper of this season's very successful team.

The winner of each Group will play-off on the Tuesday night to see who goes through with the five seeded teams on the Wednesday evening.

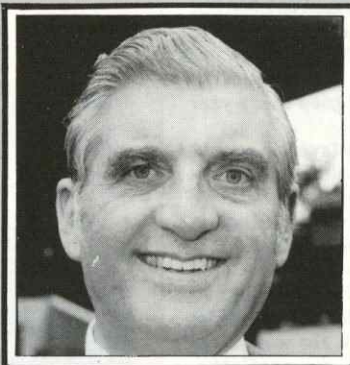
We are seeded as last season's Milk Cup winners and our section will be highly competitive as we are in with Manchester United and Chelsea.

Furthermore, we have suddenly found ourselves without players we really need and that certainly hasn't helped us.

First Les Phillips was sent off at West Ham, and as the crime was foul language, which carried an automatic two match suspension, he misses today's match, Monday's at Truro, the Soccer Sixes and the fixture at Leicester, plus all reserve team matches.

He always gave credit where it was due to friend or foe alike and although it is always easy to say they don't come like that any longer, it would nevertheless be fair to say the Oxfordshire sporting fraternity has lost someone who can never be replaced.

## LOYAL SUPPORTER

Deborah is in the W.R.N.S., based at Yeovilton in Somerset, but she is still a season ticket holder and a member of the London Road Club.

Despite her weekend duties which obviously is an essential part of her contract with the W.R.N.S. she managed to witness every game we were involved in last season with the exception of Leicester, Northampton (Milk Cup), Fulham (Full Members Cup), Stoke City (Full Members Cup), Chelsea (Full Members Cup), Tottenham Hotspur (F.A. # Over the AIRWAVES

That long foggy trip back from Norwich gave me plenty of time not only to reflect about that particular match but also many of the other current talking points in the game.

Referees seem particularly high on the discussion priorities with United fans at the moment after some critical decisions in the last couple of weeks have gone against the team. While not wanting to go into particular incidents it was brought home to me at Norwich just what a difficult task referees have in First Division football because the game is played at such a pace.

The press box at Carrow Road is right down on the touch line level with the pitch. While at most grounds, including the Manor, you are high in the stand above the play which gives you a good view and perspective of the game, being down in the action gives you a very different picture. Things, both good and bad, happen very quickly and instant decisions have to be made.

I've certainly not agreed with some of those critical decisions recently and felt that perhaps if the referee had just taken a breath and taken time to consult his linesman he may have changed his mind. However, sitting in the stand it's very easy to make those type of decisions when there is no pressure on you. I know that many managers, including Maurice Evans, are campaigning for full-time referees. It would be nice to think that the system could produce referees in the same way cricket employs full-time umpires and perhaps even some ex-professional players may be interested. Again, it works very well in cricket.

Despite the fog I was very impressed with the ground and set-up at Carrow Road which I felt showed just what United could do with a new stadium. I always link United and Norwich as very much the same type of club. Neither have enormous support but always produce good foot-

balling sides and foster the family type atmosphere. However, Norwich have made enormous strides on the stadium front and left United, through no fault of their own, way behind. It just shows what can be done with co-operation all round from a City who are proud of their football team.

It will be interesting to see who is voted the Radio Oxford November Player of the Month after a sticky patch during the last couple of weeks. It's always easy to pick somebody when the team is going really well but when the chips are down selection is much more difficult. I've certainly made my choice and I have a sneaking feeling it will also be yours. I'll tell you if we agreed in a couple of weeks' time.

Finally, the press box will seem a bit empty today with our Sports Producer Peter Baker working in London. He's in the big time for the next six months working for Radio Two. Last Saturday he covered QPR/Sheffield Wednesday. His heart was really at Carrow Road as it will be at the Manor today but I'm sure we all wish him the best of luck. Certainly since he went a couple of weeks ago United's fortunes have slipped and so hurry back Peter.

OXFORD United and Luton first met during the 1970-71 season but it was four years later that the two sides were involved in more memorable clashes.

The fixtures pitted the two sides against each other twice in five days over the Easter period. By the time they met, United were desperate for points to avoid relegation; Luton needed them to go into Division 1.

As it was, both United and Luton got what they needed with United drawing 1-1 at home then shocking the promotion hopefuls with a 1-0 win at Kenilworth Road.

That victory, earned with a single Ken Skeen goal, was enough to keep United in the Second Division while Luton earned promotion a week later with a 3-0 win over Millwall.

The first meeting came on September 1, 1970 at Kenilworth Road when Luton dominated to win 4-0.

United, unchanged for the seventh time after a good start to the season, were rocked by two goals apiece from Luton's Matt Tees and Malcolm Macdonald.

However, it wasn't all Luton. United had their chances but were rocked by three goals in a 20 minute spell with Macdonald completing the victory with his second and Luton's fourth towards the end of a game watched by 16,173 fans.

Of the 12 meetings in the League, United have won five times, the most recent being last season when they beat Luton 2-1 on the plastic Kenilworth Road pitch, thanks to goals from John Aldridge (penalty) and Jeremy Charles with David Preece scoring one of only two League goals that season, replying for the Hatters.

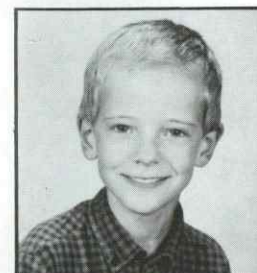

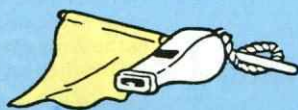
