



**Welcome** to Leicester City and their manager Bryan Hamilton. We met Leicester on the opening day of the season and today's return fixture is an indication that we are now in the second half of the season. We shall expect a really tough match. They may be struggling near the foot of the table, but they have some good players and will be going all out for points just as we shall be keen to win to keep up our challenge at the top. Sometimes a look at the league table can tell you a lot about a team and sometimes it does not. But it is interesting to note that before today's game, Leicester had scored 31 goals to our 26, but conceded 43 compared to our 23. They are obviously scoring enough goals, but perhaps letting in a few too many ... As to personal memories of playing against Leicester, there is one I recall - when a header from Don Givens, a deliberate downward header, bounced down and up so forcefully it cleared the bar after beating Peter Shilton!

### Concentrate on job in hand

I prefer not to discuss the Liverpool match here two weeks ago in these notes since we are due to play there on Monday and I prefer us to concentrate on the job in hand. It is no use dwelling on the past. However, I am sorry for the fans who had managed to travel up to Merseyside for the replay last week which was called off. It is easy to be wise in hindsight, but we have no control over the weather.

On the injury front, I am pleased to say I have nothing serious to report. Andy Dibble was due to see a specialist again this week and we were hoping he would be cleared to resume full training. On the pitch, we seem to have steadied the boat again after injuries threatened our good run over Christmas. Now we must hope to consolidate. It is good to have the long-term injured players back and challenging for places again. We were without David Preece for nine weeks and Ricky Hill for eight weeks and remember Mick Harford has played only four games all season. Unfortunately, because of the weather, we have not been able to enjoy our usual training. The plumbing here is the same as anywhere and vulnerable to freezing temperatures. But we have been able to have a true surface to practice on - our synthetic pitch which has really shown its value for everyone at the club in this weather. Enjoy the game today.





# GIRL TALK



## My first away match

Every home match I read with enjoyment the Luton Town programme and think I would like to contribute to Girl Talk, but have never really had anything to say. However, this all changed on January 1st when for the first time myself, my husband and two children travelled to an away match.

The weather didn't look too promising but we made our way up the M1 and M6 and found the ground, before we looked for somewhere to eat. My daughter, aged nine, had seen a really big McDonalds - another first, it was a 'drive thru'. On the way to the match we walked quite a way. My daughter wore her cap and scarf and my son his hat, we were treated with a kind of indulgence bordering on condescending tolerance.

During half time, my daughter was talking to a couple of lads. They then started talking to us. They are both away fans because they live in Worcester and can only travel to the games in a 40 miles radius of their home. One regularly phones Radio Bedfordshire to guess the goals and is an official fan with a membership card. He hopes to be going to

Hatfield Polytechnic in the future so he can travel to some home matches.

He was very interested in the away-fans ban and the boxes and artificial pitch. We told of the win over Liverpool and Notts Forest. He said he had never seen Luton win - only lose or draw. I said that would all change! He doubted it, but I wish I had had money on it. After the match, we were rewarded with a little jig by Les Sealey and Ashley Grimes.

We stood, for the first time after a match, waiting to be 'let out'. Outside was a feeling I haven't experienced before. It was like 'run to your car as fast as possible'. There were police everywhere, horses, vans and on foot. Lots of fans from the opposition were standing looking at us. My husband made my daughter and son take off their colours but you still felt in a minority. That doesn't happen when we leave the Oak Road, where we are season ticket-holders!

I think my New Year Resolution will be to attend at least a couple more away games.

Cup tie here on Sunday, January 11. Mick Harford was particularly unlucky on two occasions – in the first half he sent a thunderous drive against the Liverpool woodwork and in the second was within inches of touching home a loose ball before Craig Johnston made a miraculous clearance off the line.

But, it was not to be the day for a Town win and Liverpool escaped with a draw and the chance to clinch victory at Anfield when the teams meet in the replay on Monday night. But, as Liverpool's player-manager Kenny Dalglish admitted, there is no way the tie is over yet.





# VIEWS from the BENCH

## Ray Harford



Chief coach Ray Harford has always enjoyed studying tactics and techniques and today, in his Views from the Bench, he pinpoints the importance of midfield players with the ability to move forward and score goals in the modern game.

### Goalscoring midfielders – new jewels of the modern game

"The game is always changing and this season in England I think we have seen more than ever the importance of having players capable of getting forward from midfield, turning defenders, getting behind them and scoring goals. You only have to take a look at the transfer market to see that.

"The names in the news these days are often midfielders who fall into that category. Ian Snodin, who has gone to Everton, is just one. Then there is Stewart Robson, who has joined West Ham from Arsenal, Steve Hodge at Tottenham and of course, the Northampton lad, Richard Hill who has scored a lot of goals from a midfield position.

"It is a tremendous quality to possess. Remember how, earlier in the season, young Neil Webb at Nottingham Forest was being raved about. He went to the top of the scorers' charts for a time. I think Forest perhaps play a little bit too much football for their own benefit, however, and this has contributed to his goals supply drying up. Webb, of course, was another attacking midfielder who scored goals.

### Platini the example

"Nearly all the young boys in football, the youngsters who come along for trials and so on say it is the role they want. Ask them what position they play and they will say midfielder running on or attacking midfield. In some ways, it is a position best exemplified by Michel Platini. He came from deep and scored goals. So too did Bryan Robson of England and Manchester United.

"With so many teams playing tight football, making it difficult for the opposition to open up the play and find space, it is important to have the players who can break through. You need to have players who can get behind the defence, get

behind the centre-half, if you like and make chances. The job is more and more becoming that of the midfield players.

"It means the strikers job has changed too. He is almost a decoy now for the other players. A target. A sort of mobile target up front, trying to make the space for the others to come through.

### Regular scorers

"Liverpool have always been very good at this in the past. In players like Terry McDermott and John Wark they had excellent attacking midfield players who had the ability to run on. They scored goals regularly. Liverpool would push the ball wide on one side and then the other and try and pull the opposition back four out and then get their midfield player in.

"Kenny Dalglish was particularly good at this during his consistent run in the team. He was a very unselfish player. His ability to turn and run and pull players out wide was one of the key reasons for the success of the midfield men.

### Quality passing

"We have been unfortunate here this season in that David Preece has missed so many games and his running on the left and crossing could have helped our forward penetration. Mind you Ashley has done well and so too have all the other lads brought in and asked to play in different positions at different times.

"Sometimes it is difficult however to make chances. That is when patience and good-quality passing are important. I do not know if the English fans are able to really appreciate it, but these qualities are vital. We do tend to like the all-action blood-and-thunder games in this country and always call them the most entertaining."

# DRESSING ROOM

by Les Sealey

*Les Sealey is enjoying life behind a defence as tight as any he has played with during his career at Kenilworth Road and after three clean sheets following matches against Coventry City, Chelsea and Liverpool, he looked back on the team's progress and his own this season:*

"We have done brilliantly this season considering the injuries we have had and the number of players we have had out of the team. I must say that honestly I did not think we would be able to produce quite such consistent form, but I am pleased to say I was wrong. We deserve to be where we are - Luton Town used to have the reputation as one of the soft touches defensively, but not any more. Now we have one of the best defences in the First Division.

"I remember when I came here to start with it used to be really different. The manager then used to have a different outlook and felt it a great thing to go out and play and try to win 4-3. He changed his mind of course when we signed Steve Foster, Peter Nicholas, Mick Harford and David Preece. The whole strength of the team and the club changed at the same time.

"In my first season, I think we conceded 66 goals which was a lot better than the year before when we let in 88, but still not good enough. It was really hard work and I used to know I was in for it every week with shots coming in all the time. I had so much to do it was like a bad joke sometimes.

"Paul Elliott was only about 19 then and it was a bit much to expect him to have the experience and so on for it week in and week out. He was a great player mind you. Steve Foster though has done a tremendous job and he and Mal are one of the best, if not the best, partnership in the league. I think Mal has been and still is the best number six in the country and has been for a long time. "Tell me one who is better! I cannot think of another I'd rather have playing in front of me. Their efforts and the whole work and attitude of the team have helped us get rid of the old Luton reputation and make the team successful.

"Now I do not want to say too much about Liverpool who we play next week because that is another game and today is the most important match for the moment, but it is sure to be a difficult fixture at Anfield. We should really have beaten them at home when we had the chance, but we have another chance on Monday.

"Last season we were beaten 3-2 at Anfield and really should have won and this season we have been breaking a lot of old records - by beating Liverpool at home, winning at Coventry and so on. There is no reason why we cannot win again up there except that we know we face a hard game. They always make it very difficult.

"When I was with Coventry, we always managed a good performance and got some good results at Old Trafford and I have had good results at other places. But Liverpool is different. They seem to close in on you, give you no room. No way out at all.

"Still, with Mick back in the team up front, we have a good way out. If anything is hit long in the air, Mick will win it. He is the best centre-forward in the country and it is a real bonus to have him back. We shall be going for a good result whatever."

### SURVEYS BACK SCHEME

Two separate independent surveys have revealed overwhelming approval among Luton Town supporters for the Club's membership card scheme. By a huge majority, they say the system is preventing hooliganism at Kenilworth Road, would have a similar effect if introduced elsewhere and would restore football's missing spectators.

Luton's own home support has increased by an average of seven per cent since the start of the season, as families become increasingly confident of the safe and friendly atmosphere at matches. Both surveys took place in November, after seven matches without a single arrest or disturbance.

The first, by a professional research company, revealed 98 per cent of the Club's 24,000 supporters favoured membership cards. They were adamant the away fans ban should be relaxed only with strong safeguards. And 85 per cent would prefer to keep it in force, rather than return to segregation and fencing inside the ground.

A number said they once avoided specific matches for fear of the visiting supporters' reputation. Because the membership scheme had removed this fear, 45 per cent said they would be attending more matches than before.

The second survey, by students from Trent Polytechnic, found 87 per cent believed the membership scheme would reduce hooliganism at Luton and 78 per cent recognised a general need for such schemes at the current level of hooliganism. Eighty-two per cent attributed Luton's rising home support to this policy and 80 per cent believed it would work for other clubs too.

# CLUB COMMENT

## John Smith, Chief Executive.

They are only pieces of plastic three inches long but our membership cards provide greater protection than 10ft steel fences. More than half-way through the season, we remain totally trouble-free, without a single arrest or incident inside or outside the ground.

Now, our membership system is under the national spotlight once more. Among our guests today is Richard Tracey, the Sports Minister, who will be meeting the Football League shortly to discuss the Government's wish for a national membership scheme.

It is fair to say that the League has doubts about operating a scheme like ours on a national scale. Obviously our concern has been to develop a system to succeed at Kenilworth Road rather than create a prototype for the country at large.

However, as I trust Mr Tracey will see today, there are conclusions to be drawn from our efforts here, to assist the national debate.

Firstly, our critics said supporters would never accept it. In fact, nearly 28,000 people have joined our scheme already, and in our recent independent poll, 98 per cent of you were in favour of the system. Secondly, they said visiting supporters would throng the streets demanding entrance to the ground: in fact only a handful have travelled. The result has been a significant reduction in police numbers, thus reducing our costs, and much less tension in the town centre,

with traders reporting increased business in consequence.

The scheme is restoring spectators to the game: our home support has risen by an average of 10 per cent since the season started. And ordinary, decent football supporters are keen to join.

To quote from letters received this week alone: "I am a genuine sports fan who wishes to watch a good game in relative peace..."

"Unfortunately, due to the violence against Millwall a couple of years ago, I haven't been to a football match since. But after seeing the friendly atmosphere of the crowd for the live television game, I feel I can go to Luton without any fear of this sort of violence recurring..."

"It is a bold policy and I am proud the club I have supported since I was a small boy are initiating such a scheme..."

And finally, "I have attended football matches throughout London and I am shell shocked at the constant bad language and violent chanting from one set of supporters to another."

Surely, sentiments such as these must be taken into account before condemning total membership schemes as unworkable. Of course, many clubs have partial schemes which operate successfully. But the strength of a 100 per cent system is that it would allow clubs to outlaw the thug and the hooligan.

# Views from the media

## Town scheme sets example to Holland

The success of our membership scheme at Kenilworth Road continues to attract attention at home and abroad. A report in the Daily Mail on January 9 showed how much support there is for the scheme. The newspaper reported that the Dutch FA were considering following the Hatters' example with a similar scheme of their own.

*Daily Mail* - "The Dutch are ready to put English football to shame by adopting Luton Town's ban on visiting fans. While the major Football League clubs persist in opposing Luton's example - as well as resisting pressure from the Thatcher Government to introduce club membership schemes - Holland are preparing to prohibit hooligans.

"Proposals for a card membership scheme, due to be ratified before the summer will mean the exclusion of not only visiting supporters, but also trouble-making fans of home clubs. Holland, plagued since the Brussels disaster by copycat violence in the English idiom, sent representatives of their F.A., government and police to study the Luton experiment.

## The fight against violence

"The official proposal was published yesterday (January 8) by the security committee of the Dutch FA who are expected to ratify and enforce the recommendation well in time for next season. By a clear majority the committee concluded: "We want our league clubs to ban visiting supporters. We believe also that a pass system will help in the fight against soccer violence."

"The report is the answer to increasing hooliganism at Holland's football stadia, much of it related to excessive beer drinking. The Dutch are to act to avert a possible ban from European football like the indefinite suspension currently imposed on English clubs.

"Their attitude is in positive contrast to the intransigence of most English clubs even during their post-Brussels exile."

# LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

## MAX DOUGAN – A NO-NONSENSE FAVOURITE OF THE 1960's

We welcome Leicester to Luton today for their 23rd visit. The Foxes have won seven of their previous games here which is a fair record comparing favourably with other Midland teams, Birmingham and Coventry who used to hold the Indian sign over the Town here at Kenilworth Road, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The bogey has been buried in recent years,

however, as Leicester have not beaten Luton home or away since 1978-79, the season the Town narrowly avoided relegation to Division Three. One of the reasons they were not demoted was down to the inspired signing of ex-Leicester player Alan Birchenall whose dressing-room influence was invaluable when things became rather tense at the season's end.

## Slump period

Although there have been many direct transfers between the clubs over the years, including Frank Soo and Peter Small from the immediate post-war era, two signings from Filbert Street made during our slump period of the mid-sixties deserve a special mention.

Allan Brown had taken over as Luton manager in early November 1966, at a time when the club was at its lowest ebb. Three defeats out of his first four games in charge had seen the Town plummet to 91st position in the Football League and when, on December 3rd, 1966, we lost 8-1 at Lincoln, who were 92nd, it was naturally decided that changes had to be made.

The defence was bolstered by the signing of Max Dougan from Leicester for a fee of £5,000, which the club could ill afford, and he made his debut at centre-half the following week in a welcome 3-2 home win over Chesterfield.

Dougan was a big signing in those days and a crowd of 5,096, the best for two months, turned up on a miserable day to perhaps herald the return of the good times.

Present Town manager John Moore and Dougan then forged a good partnership in defence which apart from the occasional relapse was generally tight and saw the team finish above the re-election candidates at the season's end.

In the following close season, Brown secured another player from Leicester, this time for £7000! Billy McDerment was 'big time' having played 23 games in Division One and it was that one signing that had we success-starved Town fans believing that 1967-68 was going to be our year.

## Title winners

McDerment, a whole-hearted trier, was, frankly, a disappointment and failed to gain a regular place in a Town side that walked away with the Fourth Division championship. But Max Dougan, now playing at full back, missed only four games.

In the following season, Dougan, a terrace favourite because of his no-nonsense style and refusal to play anything other than a long ball down the wing was again virtually ever-present and it was not until a young John Ryan forced him out of the side in our next promotion year of 1970 did he let go of his defensive slot having made 118 appearances.

In a team that was so free-scoring as to include a goalkeeper, Tony Read, who could boast a hat-trick in League football, it is surprising that Max Dougan never managed a goal apart, that is, to those of us who saw him play!

Dougan, by his own admission, was never going to be an ace striker, but if he had managed to get into a scoring position and, for once, keep the ball down and score the roar would have been heard in Leicester.

For those young Town supporters who on reading this feel it was only yesterday that he was providing sterling defensive service to the team – Max Dougan will be 50 next year!
