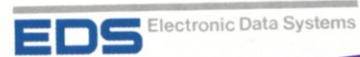

VIEWS from the BENCH

John Faulkner



Youth team coach John Faulkner has been working busily this week in one of the most hectic weeks of the season for him and reserve team coach Jim Ryan. The Town youngsters performed brilliantly on Tuesday evening to beat Tottenham 3-0 in the semi-final of the Southern Junior Floodlit Club and the following day John was busy with under-16 fixtures to help select youngsters for apprenticeships for next season. Today, in his Views from the Bench, he reflects on his busy and satisfying job:

A busy time as we plan for the future

"I have been very busy. We have had fixtures here this week during the school half-term holidays involving boys at under 12, under 14 and under 16 level and as well been running the youth teams and the schools of excellence. It is a very important time as we have to make decisions which will be very important to us for next season. I must have seen more than 120 boys playing. We have to look at them and see if they have got what it takes to become a professional player.

"The standards are very high. Anyone who enjoyed the tremendous entertainment of our game here on Tuesday night when we played exceptionally well to beat Spurs would have seen that. I always thought of our current group of youth team players as setting a high standard and they have proved it.

Half-term holidays

"Of course I also had a busy week last week - as did everyone else involved - with a lot of Welsh boys coming up to play. They had their half-term holidays a week earlier. It is the same very holiday time.

"We already know many of the boys as they may have been along to play and train with the Schools of Excellence we run at Kenilworth Road on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday nights. And also at Milton Keynes where Les Shannon is in charge. We have boys from under-12's upwards. They love it at the young age and it is great fun, but we try to make it a little bit more serious for the older ones with the help of teacher and qualified coach Paul Lowe's help.

High standards

"At the end of the season the youth players will be taking part in two end of season tournaments in Holland - the Feyenoord tournament and the Blau Wit tournament. We won at Feyenoord last year of course so we shall be anxious to maintain our reputation and our very high standards. They provide a marvellous opportunity for education and experience for the boys.

"The Feyenoord tournament is backed by General Motors and so a lot of clubs connected with GM are given the opportunity to take part. It is a prestigious tournament with a lot of top European clubs taking interest in it.

"That is of course for the older boys. In the under-19 age group. There is a big difference between them and the lads Jim and I deal with at other times during the week and it goes to emphasize the difference in strength and confidence between boys as they grow up. The Blau Wit tournament is for boys under-20.

Future professionals

"The entire policy of youth work is an ongoing thing. We are always looking for players trying to help them and turn them into professionals who can play in the First Division.

"Sometimes it seems easier than it is. But the rewards are great when you see a team play as well as we did against Tottenham. The lads really showed a lot of confidence and maturity in the second half and played the ball around beautifully.

"Now they can look forward to a place in the final which will be a two-legged match. I hope we will get plenty of fans along to watch that one."

CHAPLAIN'S CHATTER

In all the games I have seen at Kenilworth Road, there has been one occasion when I could not get into the ground. It was the corresponding fixture to today's, a few years ago. I came in a friend's car and by the time we found somewhere to park and had walked to the ground all the turnstiles were shut.

Shut out! What a horrible experience, I've made certain ever since then that my son and I get here early enough to make sure of seeing the game.

I now work with one particular group of handicapped people - the blind. But they are only one amongst a number of groups who can so easily be shut out of so many of the activities which 'normal' people can enjoy, and often only because a few simple rearrangements principally of access and accommodation have not been made.

So I am very proud of Luton Town F.C. because we are looking at plans to convert a small part of the stadium into an area where handicapped people can come and enjoy the game just like you and me. But, of course this will depend on financial support.

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road. I hope the entertainment can match that on offer here on Tuesday night when our youth team played quite superbly to beat Tottenham Hotspur in a Southern Junior Floodlit Cup semi-final.

Unfortunately, only 115 fans came to the game on Tuesday – a big disappointment, particularly as I remember when we had a crowd of about 4,000 to see a Youth Cup semi-final against Norwich a few years ago. In the same season, more than 23,000 turned out for the FA Youth Cup final at Goodison Park.

Bring a friend

I do hope all our fans will try to come along and bring a friend to the final when we will play Arsenal or Chelsea. This is a great bonus for the club.

A lot will be said in the coming weeks and months about membership schemes and synthetic surfaces, both subjects

close to our heart. I do feel there are some clubs who are not prepared to accept defeat on any surface or under any conditions and I hope we will be able to play home ties next season in the two cup competitions.

The proposed ban on synthetic surfaces for cup-ties is not in line with the conditions of the Football League's moratorium on synthetic pitches for four years. The same policies and experiments should apply for league and cup.

Youngster with a big future



Richard Harvey joined the Town as an apprentice professional in July 1985 with a reputation as one of the best young players in North Herts. Born in April, 1969, in Letchworth, he quickly developed into a valued member of the youth team and played a prominent part in the youth team which won the South East Counties league title.

His powerful play at left-back earned him a full contract as a professional on January 1 this year. Two months earlier he had made his Football League debut when he played in our First Division match against Queen's Park Rangers at the age of just 17. It was an experience he will hope to repeat as often as possible in the future.

His performance that day showed great maturity and skill and clearly impressed many observers. But Richard has had to be content with a return to the reserves since then and will be pressing for a return to consideration for senior duty next season - barring another run of injuries giving him a second unexpected opportunity.

DRESSING ROOM

with David Preece

After two seasons of consistent success with the Town following his move from Walsall in 1984, David Preece has suffered a run of illnesses and injury this term. His bad luck culminated in surgery for the removal of a piece of bone, a foreign body, in his knee recently and he is now on his way back towards fitness with remedial exercises in the build-up for a return to training. today he reflects on his good times and bad times at Kenilworth Road:

"It has been a great move for me and I am very happy here. I felt I was playing for a good side at Walsall in the Third Division and now I am with a very good First Division team. I like the style we play. It puts the accent on skill which is important to me.

"This season I started off with a bout of flu. I think I am allergic to it. I get it a lot. At first, I thought it was glandular fever, but fortunately it was not. Then I managed to get over that and get into the team for a run of games. But that ended with another injury. I knocked knees with Warren Neill and that was it. Then I got back again but got injured during the game against Liverpool here in the cup and ended up having the operation.

"At least it is over for now, and I have a target to aim for. I am hoping to be back in contention for a place before the end of the season. I shall be trying to get back sooner, but I don't want to rush and for anything to go wrong again. It is frustrating but you have to put up with it. It is the first serious injury I have ever had and I hope it is the last.

Played well

"I think the team have done really brilliantly this season. The First Division has levelled off a bit over all, I think, but the lads have done really well. I think we probably played more attractive football last year. Played better really in my way of thinking, but we are very effective this year and difficult to beat.

"The team is full of good players all the way through. This is the main reason we are high in the table. Mind you, I have got to say Everton are the favourites to win the title. They have looked very classy to me when I have seen them this season. We beat them down here though and they did not look so good that day and I think it is up to us to keep on winning.

"A lot of things have been said about our synthetic pitch this season, but I personally like to play on it. It encourages skill and touch and I think that is a good thing. It also reduces the risk of serious injury from reckless tackling which is more often seen on bad pitches all over the place at this time of the year. I would

always prefer to play on our pitch given the choice.

Cold spell

"Sometimes it plays differently to other depending on the weather. For example, it is more difficult after a cold spell when there is a lot of frost in the ground. After it has been warm and wet, it is brilliant and you can really play. It plays much better then.

"When I was a lad I was always a left-side or middle player in the midfield and I have always thought of Kevin Keegan and Graeme Souness as the two players I have admired the most. I used to live in the Midlands and did not see a lot of games. The team I like to watch most was Liverpool though. Just for their sheer skill and class.

Police force

"It is a funny thing though that my dad was offered a trial at Liverpool and turned them down. He did not want to go to play for them! He played most of his football in the police force and for Stafford Rangers and like to think he has passed on a lot of the family's football skills to me!

"He will be pleased for me if I can get back in the side and make up for the disappointments we have had in the cup in the last two seasons. They were my worst moments - losing to Everton in the semi-final and then the quarter-final even though I was cup-tied and did not play the first season."

David Evans, Chairman

Bring a friend for our title challenge

As you will know by now, the Football League and the Government agreed to a 50 per cent membership scheme, which I applauded as a step towards a 100 per cent scheme wherein all true fans would apply for and receive (subject to their credibility) an identity card which, in future, would allow any member to attend any ground in the country.

This scheme for the future would be monitored by the fans themselves. I do not believe it is the responsibility of the police or the Government to provide law and order inside grounds. Anybody who attends rugby league, tennis at Wimbledon, hockey championships, international matches, cricket matches at Lords or the Oval, the theatre, cinema, golf or tennis clubs knows perfectly well the behaviour of the members is controlled by members.

I see no reason whatsoever why the same feeling of pride in belonging, and the standards of behaviour acceptable to all, should not prevail in football grounds in the very near future. Integration is the answer – not segregation accompanied by police, dogs, horses, cameras and frogmarching to and from stations.

It is interesting to note that the same clubs who oppose synthetic surfaces and members-only schemes were opposed to floodlighting for ten years of bitter argument when they tried to

persuade smaller clubs that playing under floodlights was unreal and unacceptable. Will they ever learn?

We at Luton Town will continue next year with our 100 per cent members scheme because we believe mums and dads and their children, together with grandma and grandad, have enjoyed coming back to a safe and relaxed atmosphere. However, we may be forced by the Football Association and Football League cup committees to allow a certain number of away fans to enable us to compete in these competitions. I believe it is unfair for the players to ask them to sacrifice an important part of their careers for a principle, however worthy.

To help the players, management, board and myself to ensure we continue to build a team to win the First Division, the F.A. Cup or Littlewoods Cup it is of paramount importance that you, the hard core, bring a friend with you. It must be obvious that on average gates of 9,700 our bold attempt to establish Luton Town as a First Division team will flounder unless there is a substantial increase in attendances.

May I take this opportunity of thanking you on behalf of us all for your consistent support. I have no doubt we will, in the final weeks of the season, not only sustain our challenge for the league title, but, if the ball runs for us, even win it.

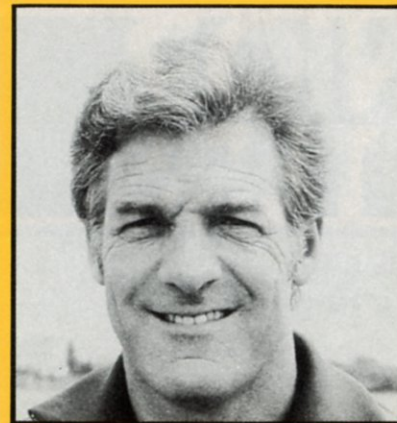
Tony Gale - Born Victoria, London, Tony played for England boys as a trialist and then joined Fulham before moving to West Ham in July 1984.

"Paul Lake City's 18-year-old striker, is unlikely to be presented with an easier chance than the one with which he opened his league account on his home debut. Luton full-back Rob Johnson failed to find his keeper with a dubious back pass two minutes before half time."

The People - "One swing of Brian Stein's right foot - brilliant though it was - was enough to undo all Manchester City's efforts. City's babes, thanks to a gift goal, by Paul Lake, had their eyes fixed on three precious points to ease their relegation doom until Stein, Luton's former England striker, struck his 11th goal of the season."

LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

HAMMERS' BUBBLES BURST BY DAVID MOSS

We welcome West Ham for our 44th league meeting. With honours remaining remarkably even over the years, it is perhaps surprising that a Luton home win has not been seen since 1980 when a late David Moss goal gave us a 3-2 win in a memorable match, *writes club statistician Roger Wash.*

That win completed the "double" over West Ham that season as we triumphed 2-1 at Upton Park in the opening game. It was that man Moss again who scored two penalties at the death to give us an improbable win against a side who appeared to be coasting to victory for most of the game.

Controversial circumstances

Those satisfying results contrasted sharply with the happenings of two seasons before when the boot was on the other foot and the Hammers beat us home and away in controversial circumstances.

Season 1978-79 had started with a home game against Oldham. With seven players making their debut in the Town colours David Pleat's new look side had attracted more than a few casual onlookers along to Kenilworth Road to witness the start of supposed better times.

At half-time, however, the new look side had fared no better than the old one going in 1-0 down, but the tea must have been special as the Town went rampant in the next 45 minutes scoring six without reply.

That autumn saw some magnificent home wins: Charlton were beaten 3-0, Cardiff 7-1 and when Notts County were thrashed 6-0 in October the Town moved up to fourth position in the table and were being talked about as strong promotion contenders.

Problems of winter

That game, however, proved to be the Towns

'swansong' for, with the approach of winter, problems set in.

Milija Aleksic was transferred to Spurs, Chris Turner seemed to feel the cold and began looking for a return to the warmer United States, but the biggest blow was the loss of Lil Fuccillo with a badly-broken leg, following a cynical tackle by a Brighton player, in the away game at the Goldstone ground.

With David Moss suffering from a recurring pelvic strain, but being forced to play because he was a potential match winner, the Town gradually slipped down the table and by the time West Ham visited us in February things were starting to look desperate.

This game and the return later in the season summed up the Towns winter. In the first game three late goals on the break completely flattered West Ham who won 4-1 while at Upton Park an own goal by David Carr handed the points to the Hammers.

Own goals

Own goals however were to be the Towns saving grace as incredibly in four successive games late on in the season the opposition generously planted the ball past their own goalkeeper.

We were not safe until the final home game of the season when an own goal by John Beck and a cracker from Alan West earned us the points against Fulham while Sheffield United, our main rivals in the battle to avoid the drop, were missing penalties at Bramall Lane.

We all breathed a huge sigh of relief and travelled to Wrexham for the final game of the season with happy hearts. We did not even mind losing!

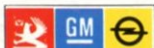
