Saints v Luton

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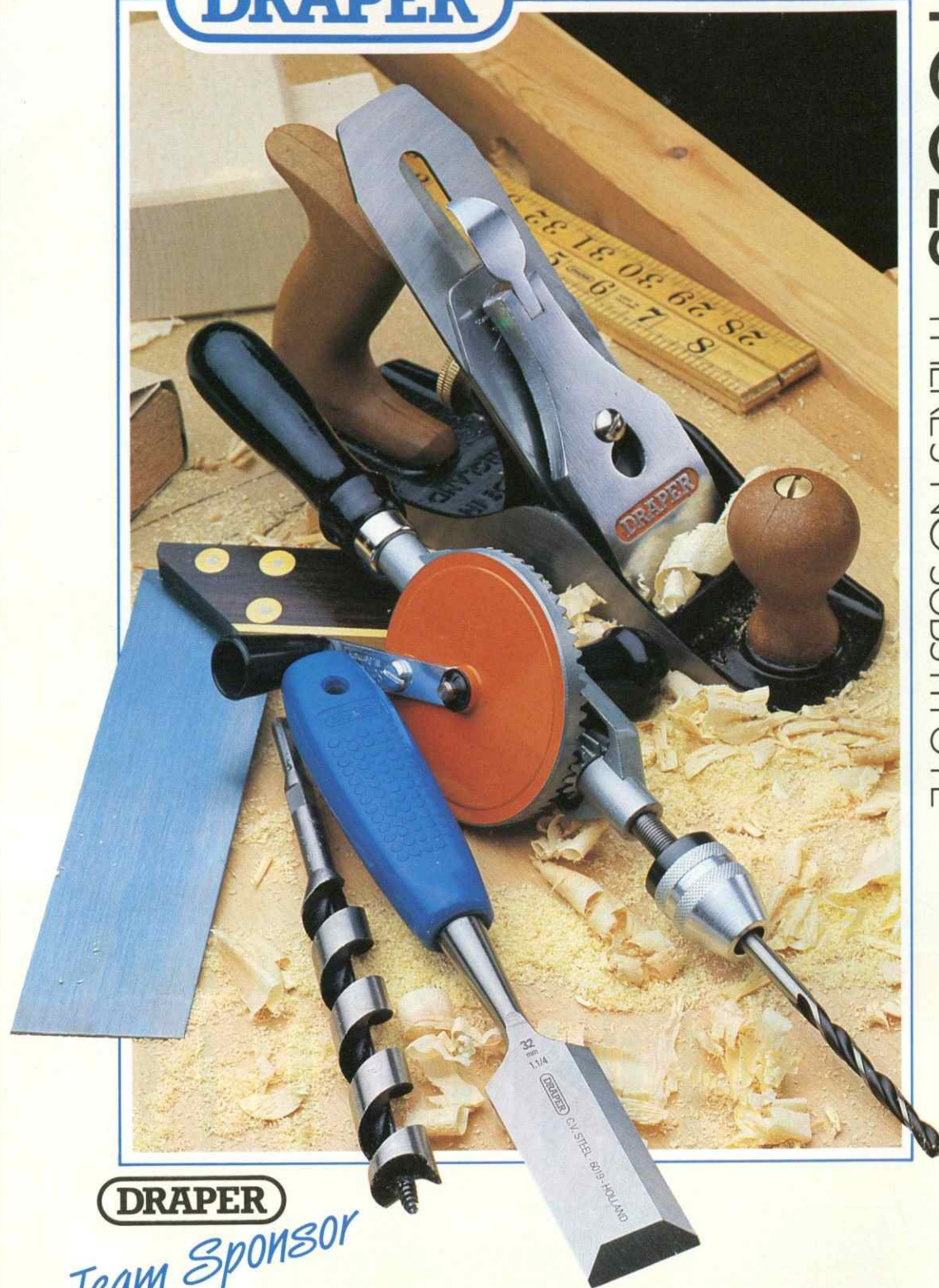
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We were somewhat anxious before Saturday's home match against Aston Villa as three points were so important and affected our position critically near the bottom of the First Division.

Now it is important to get our feet back on the ground and start with the right attitude and application against Luton Town tonight.

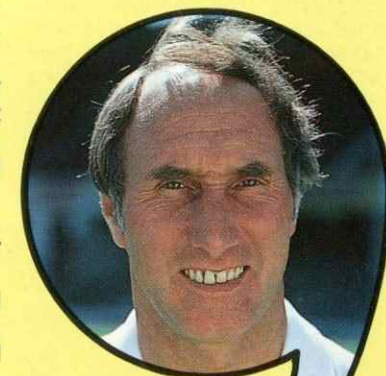
Like Villa, the Hatters are one of my former clubs and I will never forget that day last season when they beat us 7-0!

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What a magnificent season this has been for Luton! It's almost certain that they will smash a club record by achieving their highest-ever placing in the First Division. Indeed, the Hatters still have a chance of winning the League Championship.

Their previous best was eighth place back in 1958 and on current form they will improve upon that. Luton's success has surprised many people in view of the many upheavals that have taken place at Kenilworth Road over the past year. Manager David Pleat left to become Spurs' manager last summer taking left-back Mitchell Thomas with him. The Hatters also had the disadvantage of playing the first half of this season without last season's top scorer, 25-goal Mick Harford, who was injured. The club also decided to ban all away supporters this season, introducing a members-only scheme. Strangely, the Hatters found themselves heavily criticised from some quarters even though they won their battle against hooligans at a stroke. Mr Pleat's former assistant John Moore took over as manager and saw no reason to change the policy which, in just over six years, has

lifted the club from its modest Second Division surroundings to become a power in Division One. Luton have won three away games in the League — at Chelsea (3-1), Wimbledon (1-0) and Coventry (1-0). They drew at Leicester (1-1), Tottenham (0-0), Nottingham Forest (2-2), Newcastle (2-2) and Manchester City (1-1) but were beaten at Aston Villa (1-2), West Ham (0-2), Manchester United (0-1), Sheffield Wednesday (0-1), Oxford (2-4), Arsenal (0-3) and Liverpool (0-2).

Manager John Moore is expected to name his side from:

LES SEALEY (Goalkeeper). Les served his apprenticeship with Coventry and made his League debut for them at Q.P.R. in 1977. He made more than 150 League appearances for the Sky Blues prior to his £120,000 transfer to Luton in 1983. During 1984/85 he spent a brief loan period with Plymouth.

TIM BREACKER (Defender). Tim is a former Luton apprentice who got his chance in their First Division side in 1984. He had been holding a regular place at full-back for two years until recently suffering an injury.

MAL DONAGHY (Defender). Mal was ever-present in N. Ireland's World Cup squad in Mexico and he picked up his 47th cap against Turkey this season. Luton signed him from Larne Town in 1978 and he recently celebrated his 350th League appearance for the club.

ROB JOHNSON (Defender). Rob, who can play in both full-back positions, is a former Luton apprentice. He actually first played League football for Lincoln City, whilst on loan, in 1983. He returned to Kenilworth Road to make a couple of appearances in Luton's First Division side and has won a regular place this season.

ASHLEY GRIMES (Defender/Midfield). Ashley, who made a successful come-back this season at left-back, returned to his old position in midfield when Hill was injured. Manchester United signed him twice from Irish club Bohemians. On the second occasion he cost £35,000 but he soon won international recognition and he now

has 15 Republic of Ireland caps. After making 90 appearances in United's League eleven, Ashley was transferred to Coventry for £200,000 in 1983 and Luton signed him a year later.

RICKY HILL (Midfield). Ricky rose from the apprenticeship ranks to make his League debut in 1976. It took him a couple of years to earn a regular place but he now looks back on well over 350 League appearances for the Hatters. Ricky was capped by England on three occasions.

PETER NICHOLAS (Midfield). Peter has played for Wales on 46 occasions. He started his career with Crystal Palace and, after four years in their senior side, he was transferred to Arsenal for £500,000 in 1981. He held his place in the Gunners' side for two years before returning to Palace. Luton signed him for £150,000 two seasons ago.

DARREN McDONOUGH (Midfield). Darren served his apprenticeship with Oldham and made his first League appearance during 1980/81. Luton signed him for £85,000 a few weeks ago.

ROBERT WILSON (Midfield). Robert is enjoying his first spell of First Division football following his recent transfer from Millwall. He developed in Fulham's junior teams and made more than 150 League appearances for the Cottagers before joining Millwall in the summer of 1985.

BRIAN STEIN (Forward). Brian was blooded in Luton's first-team in 1977 and led their scoring list for the first time in 1980/81 with 19 goals. The following term, when they won promotion, he led the way again

with 21. Brian has played once for the full England team and also has three under-21 caps.

MARK STEIN (Forward). Mark is Brian's younger brother and he made his League debut in 1983/84. Further opportunities were rare and, after a loan spell at Aldershot last season, Mark was anxious to establish himself. He went on the transfer list this season but later got his long-awaited chance to play regularly in the Luton first-team.

MIKE NEWELL (Forward). Mike was signed from Wigan towards the end of last season and scored six times in 16 matches. He began his career with Liverpool as an amateur but turned professional with Crewe Alexandra. After only three games in their League eleven, he was transferred to Wigan in 1984.

MICK HARFORD (Forward). Top scorer with 25 goals last season, Mick has only just returned after a long injury lay-off. Once a top scorer with Lincoln, he commanded a then record fee of £200,000 for a Fourth Division player when he joined Newcastle in 1981. He later had a short stay at Bristol City before joining Birmingham in 1982. Luton signed him for £250,000 two seasons ago.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield). David made a successful return to the side, after missing many weeks through injury, for last Sunday's televised Cup tie against Liverpool. A one-time Walsall apprentice, David made his League debut for the Sadlers in 1981. Luton signed him for £150,000 two seasons ago.

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SAINTS LOSE UNBEATEN RUN TO THREE SLOPPY GOALS!

Saints Reserves have a home match against Charlton on Thursday night, having just lost for the first time in 11 Football Combination outings.

But George Horsfall, who is in charge of the Reserves, was loath to criticise his team after the 3-2 defeat at Swindon.

"They gave away three sloppy goals from set-pieces," says Horsfall, "But at the end of the day they worked so hard I couldn't have a go at them.

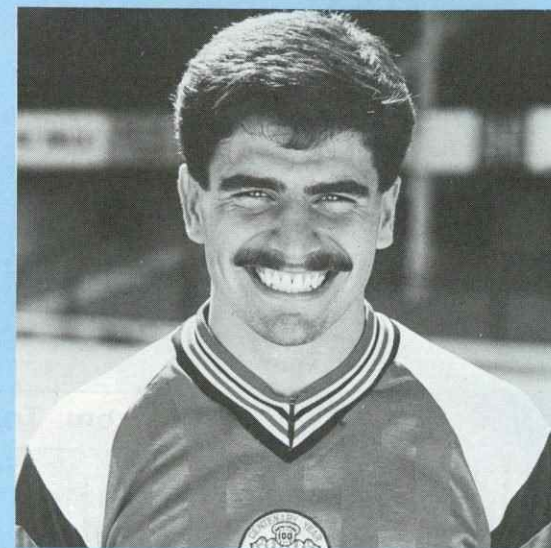
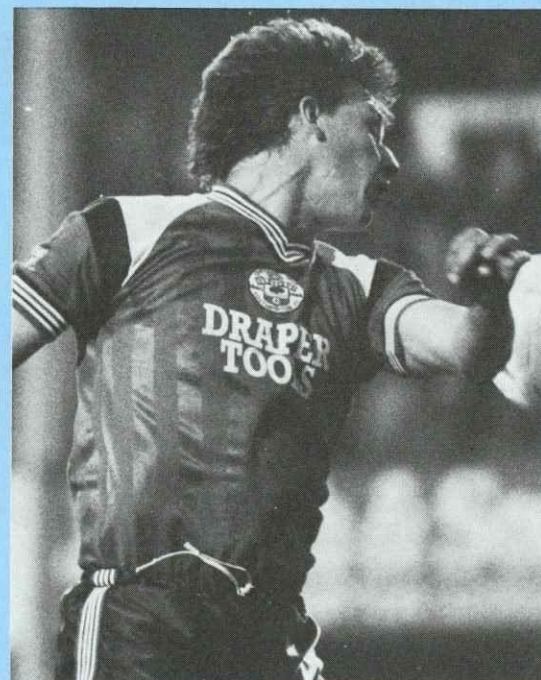
"The pleasing thing was the workrate and attitude. If they keep that up they won't go far wrong." Indeed, Swindon swept into a 2-0 lead, ex-Portsmouth striker Dave Bamber scoring goal No. 2 early in the second half.

But Saints, having struggled in a high wind before half-time, then got their game together against a side which also contained Chris Ramsey, Brighton's right-back in the 1983 FA Cup final at Wembley.

With two wide men, Craig Maskell and substitute Andy Cook, Saints began to look menacing. And when Cook got away and squared the ball back, Francis Benali helped it on for Maskell to score.

Then, from Ian Hamilton's corner-kick, centre-half Mark Blake equalised with a far-post header. But Swindon, rocking by now, came back to scramble in an 89th-minute winner.

Even then Saints nearly saved the day. Straight from the kick-off, Gary Bull went past three men to lay on a chance for Benali, but his first touch let him down. "We did so well to claw our way back into the match," reflects George Horsfall. "Swindon had gone in those closing stages."



This week Saints Youth have been celebrating after retaining the South-East Counties League Division 2 title. They made sure — with two matches left — by beating Tottenham 3-0 at Cheshunt on Saturday.

"We took the match by the scruff of the neck and played as well as at any time this season," says Youth team manager Dave Merrington. "It was good to win the League with a bit of class.

"Having finished top last year, teams have gone out of their way to stop us winning the title again. But we've picked up the gauntlet, done things in style and scored a lot of goals while giving away very little at the back."

Saints Youth led Tottenham 2-0 at half-time and afterwards manager Merrington singled out for special praise defender Steve Davis, midfielder player Peter Spargo and front two Francis Benali and Leroy Whale. Without injured top scorer Alan Shearer, Saints went ahead with a superb volley by Benali after a corner-kick had been flicked on. The lead was increased by a move straight off the training ground, Rodney Wallace heading back across goal for Whale to head in.

Goal No. 3 was also a coach's delight. Whale held the ball up for Wallace to take on the overlap, beat two men and cut in from the right to score just inside the far post.

Saints Youth's penultimate match is at Brentford on Saturday. They finish at home to Reading a week later.

HAMPSHIRE IS BACK ON THE SOCCER MAP

Southampton is the oldest professional club in Hampshire and for much of its 100-plus years it has been the leading light in this part of the country. Portsmouth, of course, had their glory years when they won the F.A. Cup and two League Championships but who had ever taken Bournemouth or Aldershot too seriously in soccer terms — until just now?

Aldershot have usually resided in the lowest available division of the Football League. When there were only three divisions, they played in the old Third Division (South). Then a Fourth Division was formed and the Shots were very soon mixing at that level.

Now they have a wonderful chance of becoming the first Fourth Division club ever to appear in a Wembley Cup final!

Aldershot are through to the Southern final of the Freight-Rover Trophy and, if they beat Bristol City over two-legs, they will go to Wembley. The first final at Wembley, two seasons ago, drew 40,000 fans. Last season's event attracted more than 54,000.

That's more than they get to see most England games these days!

So, though sophisticated folk may look down their noses at the Freight-Rover, the final does provide a wonderful day out for supporters of less fashionable clubs who could not otherwise expect to see their favourites at Wembley.

And, of course, there is a fat financial pay-out to the competing clubs. And Aldershot could do with a cash injection.

Aldershot have been enjoying the sort of luck needed by any team with its eyes on Wembley. After winning their qualifying group, they achieved a 2-0 home win over Swansea City, one of the Fourth Division's leading clubs.

They were then held at home to 1-1 after extra-time by Third Division Fulham and ultimately won a nail-biting penalty shot-out by 11-10.

It seemed their run would end away to Swindon, an outstanding Third Division side. The Shots went 0-2 down soon after the interval and that seemed to be that. Then the Swindon goalkeeper was sent off for

arguing with the referee. Aldershot scored three times to win 3-2.

They have a very tough tie against the trophy holders Bristol City who would welcome a return to Wembley. But, judging by their luck in earlier rounds, Aldershot could pull off another surprise.

If the Shots do get to Wembley they will meet the winners of the Northern Final, in which Mansfield meet either Wrexham or Chester.

Aldershot could still finish high enough in the Fourth Division — among the top six — to qualify for the end-of-season promotion play-offs.

Whilst Aldershot are no more than rank outsiders for promotion, Bournemouth are now hot favourites to win promotion from Division Three and reach the Second Division for the first time in their history.

Strictly speaking, of course, Bournemouth is now in Dorset but we still think of them as "one of us" in football terms. The Cherries' 3-0 win at Doncaster last Tuesday was their fifth win in a row and it gave them a six-point lead over their closest challengers at the top of the table.

Many Bournemouth fans contend that this is the best team in club history and, if that is the case, it is a tremendous compliment to manager Harry Redknapp and his coaching staff for no fewer than seven members of their current side only joined them this season.

This includes former Saint Mark Whitlock who scored the winning goal against Bury recently.

David Puckett, sadly, has been out of the side through injury though he remains their leading scorer with 16 goals.

Bournemouth have been playing in the Football League since 1923 and will not believe they have finally made it to the Second Division until it is mathematically certain.

There have been near things in the past. In the days when only one club was promoted from the Third Division, Bournemouth once finished second. Later, when they increased the number of promoted clubs to two, the Cherries once managed third place.

The quota was later raised to three promoted clubs but Bournemouth had dipped into the Fourth Division then and now that the definite number of promoted clubs has been reduced to two, the horror for Bournemouth fans is that they could finish third and then fail in the play-offs.

We must hope not after such a fine season.

Portsmouth, of course, know what it is like to be in a position of power as Liverpool enjoy today. They played in the Wembley F. A. Cup finals of 1929, 1934 and 1939, winning the trophy on the latter occasion with an astonishing 4-1 victory over hot favourite Wolves.

Just after the way, in the vintage days of Jimmy Dickinson, Reg Flewin, Jimmy Scoular, Reg Harris, Douggie Reid and their mates, Pompey won the League Championship two seasons in succession.

The came those dark years when they disappeared right down into Division Four. Following their welcome

recovery, Portsmouth missed promotion on goal-difference two seasons ago and by three points last year.

Saints' fans remember Alan Ball very much as a winner. He hated to lose. His feelings as a manager are much the same. He was absolutely shattered when Portsmouth missed for a second time last season. But now, surely, they must be about to return to the First Division for the first time since 1959?

They have been leading the Second Division for weeks and look good for one of the two certain promotion places. I rang Fratton Park to see what Mr Ball's feelings might be now.

But I was warned off before I got anywhere near him. "I shouldn't if I were you," I was advised. "He just refuses to talk about promotion. The word is not in his vocabulary. I think if you were to approach him now he would probably bite off your head."

So I made an excuse, and hung up.

Given the great rivalry between supporters of the Saints and Pompey, I think it is fair to say that all football fans in Hampshire would love to see Portsmouth back at the top after all these years.

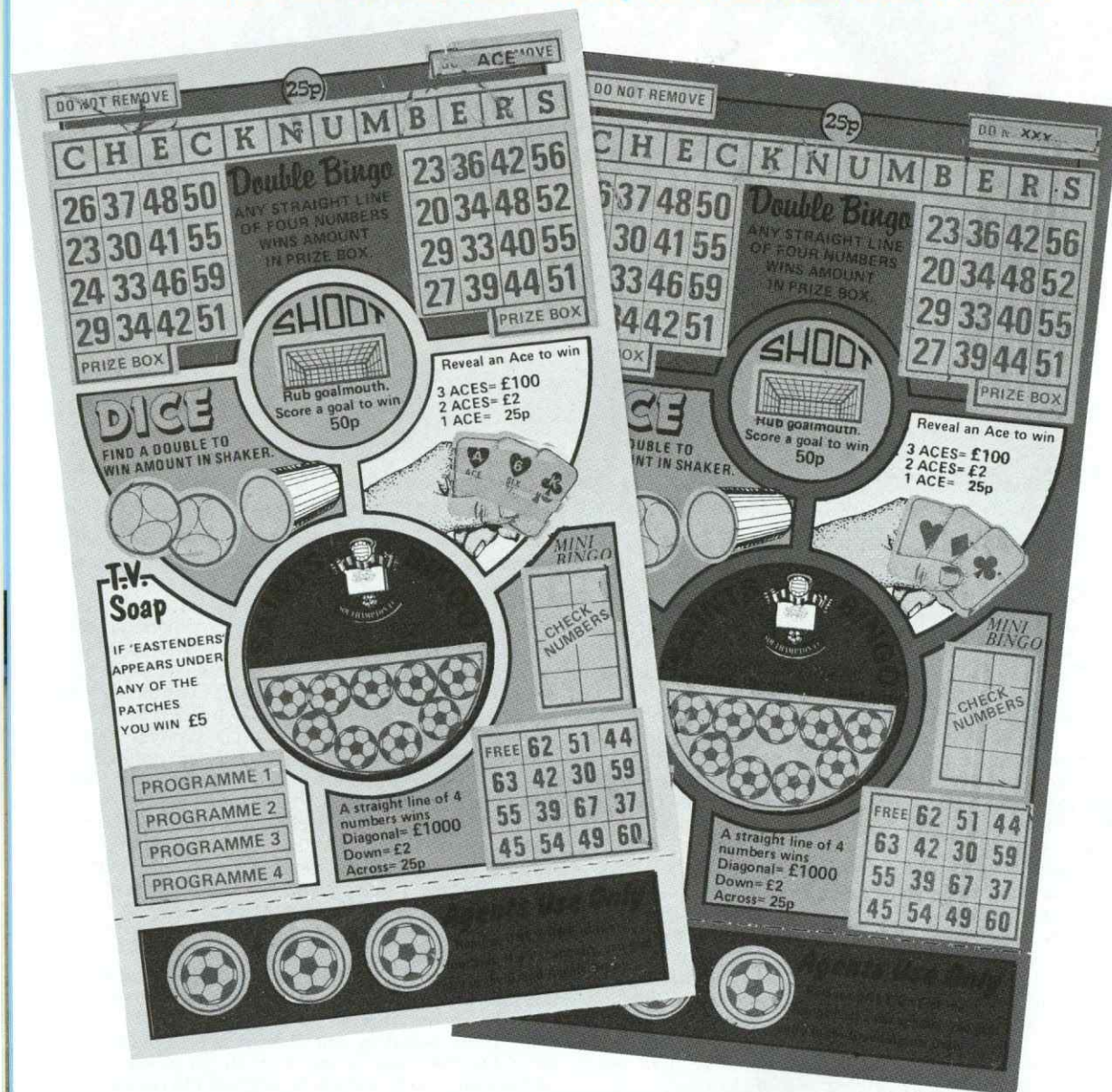
And, when recording one of Hampshire's most successful soccer seasons, let us not forget the wonders of Fareham Town who are through to the semi-finals of the F.A. Trophy and who are themselves on the threshold of Wembley.

They, too, have a tough game against Kidderminster Harriers but I'm sure that thousands of Saints' fans would like to come along and swell the crowd when they stage the second-leg of that semi here at The Dell on Sunday April 12th.

It would be quite something, wouldn't it, to see Aldershot and Fareham at Wembley this season. And to welcome Portsmouth back to the First Division next season and see Bournemouth tread new ground as a Second Division club.

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front to back success for STEVE FOSTER

Steve Foster started out in soccer determined to win fame as a top goalscorer. But he switched roles at a fairly early stage of his career and went on to play for England as a central defender.

He played his first game for Portsmouth in August 1975 and during the course of that season made a total of 11 appearances in attack and as substitute. But Portsmouth

finished bottom of the Second Division and faced a future of further uncertainty. Steve could scarcely look back on his first season with satisfaction. That he looked unhappy in a striker's role was not entirely his fault. The service provided from midfield did not make life easy for any Pompey forward of that time. So Steve decided to try his hand as a central defender and, after a few games as substitute the following season, he returned to the Portsmouth side in the number five

shirt in November 1976 — and hasn't really looked back since then.

Brighton paid £130,000 for him during the summer of 1979 and that move gave Steve what is believed to be one of football's off-beat records. During a period of just three years and five months, he played in all four divisions of the Football League.

After winning under-21 honours, Steve won his first full England cap against N. Ireland in February 1982. He won a total of three caps.

Brighton shocked everyone by reaching the F.A. Cup final in 1983 but Steve had received a caution in one of the League games leading up to Wembley and took his total of penalty points to the limit. The cold truth hit him — he would miss the F.A. Cup final.

In spite of vigorous Brighton appeals to get the decision changed, Steve had to watch from the stand as his colleagues played splendidly to hold Manchester United to a 2-2 draw.

Steve was then free to play in the replay so he did get an unexpected chance to savour the Cup final atmosphere. Sadly, Brighton had given their all in the first game and were well beaten 0-4 in the replay. Brighton were relegated shortly after that and Steve was transferred to Aston Villa for £200,000 the following season. Luton signed him in 1984 and now he is skipper of this season's successful team.

"I'M KEEPING MY FINGERS CROSSED"

Peter Osgood, the former Southampton favourite, is keeping his fingers crossed for a Saints-Portsmouth clash next season in the First Division.

"I had five very happy years at The Dell and fell in love with the place," says the man now working just along the South Coast as Portsmouth's Youth team coach.

"I'm disappointed to see Southampton in trouble this season. But they mustn't panic and I'm sure things will work out alright.

"It would be great to see Saints and Pompey together in Division 1 next season. And though I'd obviously want Pompey to beat them, I'll always have a feeling for Saints."

Under manager Alan Ball — another Dell old boy — Portsmouth are once again pushing hard for promotion from Division 2 after missing out narrowly for the past two years.

"Alan Ball is destined to be a great manager," declares Ossie. "He's got a superb football brain, has kept us in the top four for three years and has brought credibility and respect back to Fratton Park."

Peter Osgood, centre-forward in Saints' 1976 FA Cup-winning team, was re-introduced to the game this season after a four-year absence during which he and one-time Chelsea team-mate Ian Hutchinson ran a pub-restaurant at Windsor.

"After 18 years as a player I'd become stale," explains Ossie, "but then Bally got me involved in coaching at holiday camps — and the buzz was back.

"Portsmouth then took me on and this is an experimental year. But I'm making progress and love working with the kids."

Now 40 and living at Maidenhead, Ossie made his Chelsea debut as a precocious 17-year-old and went on to win FA Cup and European Cup-winner's medals while becoming the idol of Stamford Bridge. In 1974 he joined Saints in a sensational quarter-of-a-million pound move. But the big man with exquisite skills — he was capped only four times by England — is scarcely enchanted with today's robust game.

"Football shouldn't be all running, bustling and knock-downs," he insists. "It should be about passing and creativity — things I always tried to achieve.

"The game has changed out of all recognition over the past few years and teams favouring the long-ball game, Watford, Sheffield Wednesday and Wimbledon, have done really well.

"But I tell you at Portsmouth we won't change our ideals. We'll go on trying to play football and eventually I think the tide will turn with the game reverting to a situation where skill is once again the main factor."

SAINT Jim

Tim Flowers, Saints' talented young reserve goalkeeper, has only one regret about joining the club. He has yet to taste victory in the senior side! "Saints are a really good club and my game's improved a lot," he says. "Mind you, constant tuition from a fellow like Peter Shilton helps considerably". Tim remembers ruefully the second of his three appearances when he smashed his cheekbone against Arsenal at The Dell in mid-November. "It was like being hit by

Mike Tyson, the pain was terrible. And to make matters worse I conceded a penalty in the same incident!"

Earlier this season the former England Youth international — he made his Wolves debut at 17 — was called into the England Under-21 squad.

1987 SOTONIA INTERNATIONAL CUP



Norwich City and crack teams from Iraq and Italy are among the early entries for the 1987 Sotonia Cup, to be held between August 2-8.

"The news that a First Division club such as Norwich are in so early is great," says organiser Bob Higgins, Saints' Youth Development Officer.

"We've also received a telex from the Iraqi president confirming their entry. We're delighted about that, too, because they're obviously very strong."

Indeed, the widely-travelled Iraqis will arrive for their first visit to England with an impressive track record. They have won the Dallas Cup in America, Gothia Cup in Sweden, Dana Cup in Denmark and Helsinki Cup in Finland.

The Italians, always strong competitors in this event, will be represented by Adessio Poligno, from Carpentato. In 1986 an Italian club, Scuola, lost in the Under-14 and Under-11 finals.

Run by Southampton Football Club, the Sotonia Cup will include two Saints Youth teams in the Under-18 section which was won last year by the Northern Ireland side Star of Ireland. They pipped a local team, Wellington Juniors, after a penalty shoot-out in the final.

Hundreds of youngsters including girls will descend on Southampton for the week's football festival. A procession through the city centre will kick things off and the itinerary includes coaching, lectures, discos and visits to Southampton.

Last year's record entry of 36 teams looks certain to be broken in this fifth annual event. "The tournament has become firmly established and

is on the up and up," claims Ted Bates, chairman of the organising committee.

"People everywhere now seem to know about the Sotonia Cup. We're looking with confidence for an entry of 50, as against 18 when it was launched in 1983.

"The whole object is to develop goodwill and a large family atmosphere. We want everyone to enjoy themselves and go away having made a lot of friends."

Ted Bates, Saints' former long-serving manager and now a director, adds, "Personally, this has brought me back to the grass roots level of the game and made me realise how hard people work. And if something is done correctly it develops itself.

"We're not talking about professionals here. A team which loses every match is as welcome as one which wins every match."

Main sponsors are Panini, the world's largest sticker manufacturers, with Southampton-based Day-Raven Trophies donating Cups and medals. Support sponsors include TVS, Ocean Sound, Southern Evening Echo, Southampton's Wessex Hotel, Hendy-Lennox, Medisport International, DER Ltd and the City of Southampton.

The tournament is split into seven sections, Under-11, 12, 13, 14, 15-16, 18 and a Ladies Open. The finals are scheduled to be staged at The Dell.

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SAINTS SEEM TO BE ON COURSE FOR SAFETY

If the Saints, and all our relegation rivals, maintain current form we should finish eighth from the bottom of the table and seven points clear of danger. Yet, manager Chris Nicholl will be quick to impress upon his players that the latest form table in no way gives his team licence to relax.

At the moment the Saints are keeping marginally ahead of the real strugglers solely upon form here at The Dell. A few more away points will be needed to give peace of mind and, of course, we are going to have to battle all the way at The Dell as we face relegation rivals Sheffield Wednesday, Oxford and Charlton during the closing weeks of the season.

If all clubs continue to collect points at the same rate, Aston Villa and Manchester City will finish in the bottom two places with Charlton and Newcastle level on 37 points above them. The one with the inferior goal-difference would go down automatically with the other going into the play-offs.

Obviously, all clubs are not going to amble along at the same rate. All eight clubs are making a determined bid to make a last-ditch escape so that form table could well be turned upside down.

Manchester City, for instance, last week signed Blackpool's scoring sensation Paul Stewart and finalised plans to loan Republic of Ireland international Frank Stapleton from neighbouring United. There is a spot of neighbourliness going on between the two Manchester Clubs.

A United official declared last Thursday: "We don't want City to go down under any circumstances and we shall do everything in our power to help them." Oxford and Charlton have both been active in the transfer market and, with so many of the bottom clubs still to play each other, it is going to be an exciting finish to the season.

On paper, the Saints certainly look to be in a better position than most rivals. We do not have to meet any

of the clubs involved in the Championship chase though, of course, clashes with relegation rivals will prove every bit as difficult.

Newcastle have one of the most difficult fixture lists, having to travel to Arsenal, Everton and Nottingham Forest among the leaders plus relegation rivals Oxford. And Charlton's away list looks formidable with trips to Arsenal and Spurs and relegation battles here at The Dell and at Newcastle.

It now seems certain that the survival battle will be won by the clubs producing the best home results. Our own away record is certainly in need of repair but it can be seen that all the relegation-haunted clubs have exceedingly poor away records. Indeed, Oxford are the only one among the eight to have recorded a recent away victory.

A look at the Saints' forthcoming home games does

not make daunting reading, particularly in relation to the away form of clubs like Sheffield Wednesday and Charlton.

Charlton seem to have a reasonable remaining list of home games, as do Leicester City.

Manchester City appear to have the toughest task of all, with some tricky encounters both at home and away. But, as we have mentioned, certain action has been taken to try and avert disaster even at this late stage.

In reality, of course, every remaining fixture — for each of the clubs in danger — will be difficult. At the end of the day it will be the clubs who best cope with the tension who will survive.

The first objective is to avoid the bottom three positions. Each of those clubs will go down automatically. The fourth-from-bottom club will have to meet the club that finishes fifth in the Second Division in home-and-away games. The winner on aggregate will then play the winners of a similar play-off between the third and fourth clubs in Division Two in another two-legged nail-biter.

The winners of that game will next season play in the First Division.

It all looks pretty exciting. But that's one bit of excitement we could well do without!

The aim must be to finish at least fifth from the bottom.

Suddenly, Luton Town have become a bogey team to the Saints. We have lost our last three League games against the Hatters — including that massive 0-7 reverse at Kenilworth Road last season.

We had an outstanding home record when Luton came to The Dell in February last season, having been beaten here only once in the League. Mike Newell gave the Hatters an interval lead but David Armstrong's 65th minute leveller seemed to have earned us a point. But, with the referee looking at his watch, Brian Stein nipped in to grab Luton's winner.

Earlier in the season we had suffered our heaviest-ever defeat by Luton. Chuck Nwajiobi started the ball rolling with a goal after only five minutes. Brian Stein completed a hat-trick with a last minute penalty whilst Ricky Hill, David Preece and Ray Daniel all scored singles as Luton ran up a 7-0 victory.

When we returned to Kenilworth Road soon after the start of the current season, we were a goal down after only three minutes — Robert Wilson registering his first goal for his new club. Brian Stein increased their advantage after 58 minutes and, though Colin Clark later netted for the Saints, we lost 1-2.

So the incentive is there for us to end this poor sequence and go for our tenth home League win over Luton this evening.

The Saints' biggest wins of the series were all by a three-goal margin — two of them in the same season. In September 1961 George O'Brien scored a hat-trick at Kenilworth Road with Harry Penk adding another before Gordon Turner scored a consolation for Luton close to the end.

When Luton came to The Dell in February, O'Brien scored again and efforts from Derek Reeves and Tommy Mulgrew made it 3-0 to The Saints.

We equalled those victories when we went to Kenilworth Road in October 1976. A penalty from David Peach set us for a win and the same player scored again to make it 2-0 by the interval. Brian Chambers pulled one back for Luton but Ted MacDougall and Nick Holmes both scored in the later stages of the game to make it 4-1.

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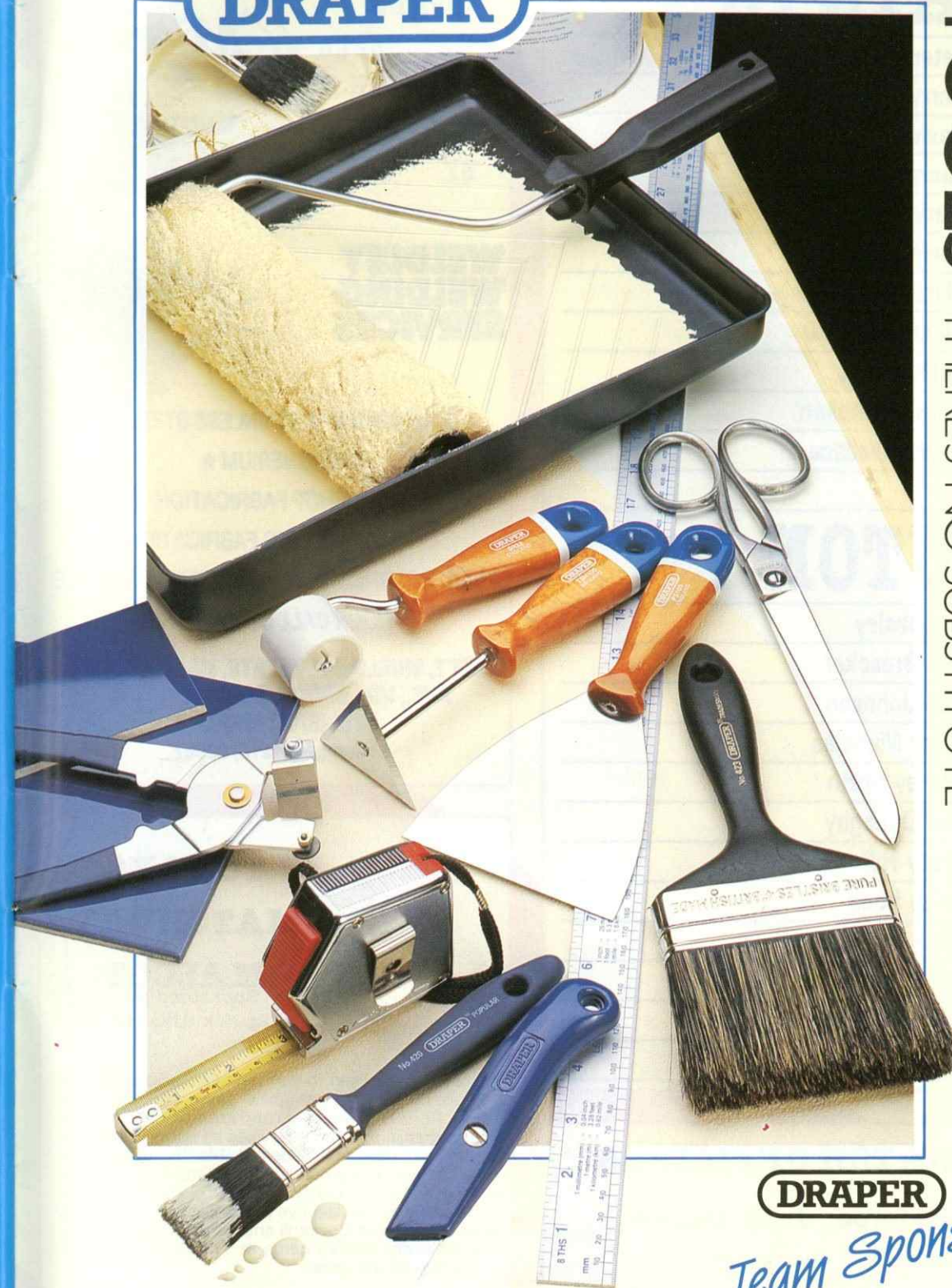
