Dear Sir,

Congratulations! You and your colleagues on the F.A. Cup Committee must feel extremely proud of your ban on synthetic pitches. It is yet another example of the 'nobodies' in our national game being crushed by power and influence.

Before you crush this letter in similar style, I would just like to say that I am an ordinary, life-long supporter of one of your 'nobodies', Preston North End, and justifiably proud of their history, tradition and, more appropriately, their recent innovation in laying a synthetic pitch. This enterprise has brought a new sense of purpose and direction to the club and its supporters, and they and the whole community are reaping the benefit in more areas than just football.

Yet, in one fell swoop, undoubtedly bowing to the totally unjustifiable pressures being brought to bear by the likes of Messrs. Dalglish and Kendall of Liverpool and Everton respectively, you have succeeded in killing the hopes and aspirations of Preston, Oldham, QPR and Luton, and the dozen or so other 'unimportant' clubs who also wished to go some way towards securing their futures.

The argument against synthetic pitches is utterly fallacious. Most of the opposition has come from the

so-called 'super' clubs, and for them, particularly, to say that their players, who are professionals at the highest level of the game, cannot control a ball properly on this type of surface is, on the one hand laughable and, on the other hand, a sad reflection on their level of skill.

The truth is, of course, that that is merely a cheap excuse and clubs like Liverpool, who are so accustomed to success, react like spoilt children in defeat and blame extraneous circumstances to cover their own shortcomings. Unfortunately for clubs like Preston, and supporters like me, it is the Liverpools of this world who hold the balance of power.

The fastest game of all

It is widely believed that football descended from medieval inter-village battles fought over an inflated pig's bladder. But the game of lacrosse boasts perhaps the strangest history of all. Apparently it was first played on horseback by North American Indians, passing a skull from stick to stick!

Nowadays a ball is used, similar in size to hockey, and the goal resembles that used in ice hockey. Lacrosse, a game with no boundaries demands a very high level of fitness and dedication. It is very fast and flowing with few stoppages, with the players either running with the ball held in the small net on their sticks or giving high passes which are caught in the net and on the run.

On Sunday 29th March, 1987, England's Women's U 21's met Scotland here at Luton Town FC. The match was a first in two aspects; one being a new fixture and the second that it was played on astro-turf. Most players were slightly apprehensive over the surface. The result was an even faster game, demanding more skill, speed and stamina, bringing out the attractive aspects of the game. The main difficulty was that picking up ground passes was awkward with the ball running away from the player.

Spectators commented that they'd rarely seen a faster game with a lot of running involved and the ball moving from one end to the other within seconds. This unique characteristic of lacrosse was highlighted on the astro-turf and supports the claim that lacrosse is the fastest game on two feet. By comparison to grass, the astro-turf didn't drain your energy while playing, with its soft spongy surface, and it got a vote of approval from most players.

The match was very competitive with England coming out on top. The young Scots though much less experienced, never gave in, being encouraged by vocal Scots support and your score-board displaying 'Come on you Jocks!... We'll be back.'

Scottish lacrosse is on the up and up at present, targeted towards improving on the current Bronze medal position. Sights are set on the 1988 World Cup in Sydney, Australia.

Perhaps one day, we can return to Luton Town and demonstrate lacrosse prior to one of the home games.

Meanwhile thanks a lot Luton Town.

The win gave us a rare double against a club which has been a bogey opponent for a long time.

Stein's goal was a classic. It came in the ninth minute, six minutes after a Greg Downs shot had rebounded from a post, and followed a Luton attack on the right which ended with Tim Breacker firing in a head-high cross. Stein moved alertly to beat Brian Borrows and then steer a downward header across Steve Ogrizovic.

The Town then went on to dominate in midfield and control most of a lively and interesting game. Coventry frequently showed their own powers in attack with David Phillips and David Bennett both playing well and Livingstone and Gynn missing from good openings.

The Town ended all doubts about the result with their second goal in the final minute. Stacey North won a ball in midfield, fed Ricky Hill who in turn found Brian Stein wide in space on the right. His accurate cross found Mike Newell at the far post and a clinical finish secured all three points.

JOHN MOORE

Town favourite for two decades



• **Town manager:** John Moore

John Moore has been a favourite for more than 20 years at Kenilworth Road where he began his career in England as a player in 1965, signing on from Motherwell where he had spent his early days. Now the club manager and proudly steering the club towards its highest-ever finish in the First Division, John can justifiably look back and say a lot has changed during his spell in Bedfordshire.

When he arrived as a player, Luton were in the Fourth Division. He made 263 appearances during his Town playing career, scoring 13 goals, before leaving in 1974 when the club were on their way to the First Division. He was a leading figure, a sterling, robust defender, in the 1968 and 1970 promotion teams. He completed his playing days with spells at Brighton and Northampton before moving into management at nearby Dunstable.

He returned to Kenilworth Road as youth coach in 1978, climbed to take charge of the reserves and took over the first team and the manager's office last summer.

HATTERS IN GEAR



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DRESSING ROOM

with John Moore

Luton Town manager John Moore has enjoyed a highly-successful first season in charge at Kenilworth Road, leading the team towards a very high finishing position in the First Division. Demands upon him and his time have grown with the increased success of the club and the team and he has been able to take a close look at the pressures of his job and those of other top managers. Today, in Dressing Room Talk, he reports on the way such pressures have affected the managers of First Division clubs:

"Recently I joined the other First Division managers at a meeting to discuss ways we could improve the image of the game. We talked about the precarious nature of a manager's job and how the fear of being fired can lead to over-cautious football.

"Also, we talked about whether or not you can manufacture a more exciting game by changing its laws.

"We didn't put the world to rights, but just by giving these issues an airing we did some good. And at the next meeting, we will invite representatives of the lower divisions too. In this way a manager's view of football should gradually emerge, just as the PFA now so ably represents the players.

Eliminating risk

"But what about fear? No one can do a good job if he has to look over his shoulder all the time. When one mistake on the field brings defeat and one defeat sometimes costs the manager his job, its no wonder that managers sometimes set out to eliminate risk at the expense of entertainments.

"Managers need more job security. Not just for themselves but for the good of their team and spectators. Contracts binding on both sides for an agreed time would encourage managers to risk going for a win.

"But this still would not eliminate cautious play entirely. Managers are highly competitive and if they like to win, they hate losing even more.

"Would new laws help? Well, the introduction of three points for a win has certainly made it worthwhile for sides to risk going for the winning goal. But changes to the laws of the game itself could do more harm than good.

Slower game

"You could easily double the size of the goal, for example, but the resulting cricket scores would soon devalue the game. Another popular suggestion is to ban offsides except in the last 18 yards of the pitch. This would stretch out the play and prevent midfield congestion, but it would create a slower game.

"What British spectators want is fast and thrilling end-to-end stuff with plenty of goal attempts. Everyone can help achieve this, without teams committing themselves to reckless attack of new laws.

"Referees too can keep the game flowing and young players should develop a 'get on with the game' attitude, not waste time talking to the referee and suchlike. In the end, the future is down to the application of sound good sense on the field."

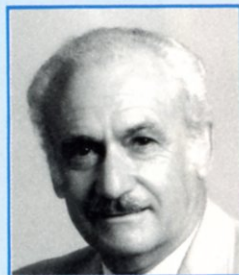

NEW DIRECTORS



We are pleased to welcome **Brian Cole (left)** and **Mike Watson-Challis (right)** to the board of directors of Luton Town, writes our chairman **David Evans:**



"The Board of Luton Town FC has appointed two new directors, following a shareholders' extraordinary general meeting to increase the club's share capital.

The new directors are businessmen Brian Cole, a Vice President of the club, and Mike Watson-Challis, President of St Albans FC.

I am delighted to welcome them to the Board. Their business expertise and financial support will help to ensure our future as a leading First Division club.

However, this does not close the door on new appointments. Sufficient new shares were created for one or two more directors, when people of the right calibre can provide the time.

I intend to remain as a director after resigning as chairman this autumn, during which period, my successor for the next three years will be appointed.

About 800 shareholders were invited to the meeting which voted to create an additional 100,000 'B' Supporters Shares at £1 each, providing an authorised capital of £371,000. This allows each of the new directors to hold approximately 20,000 shares.

Both new directors share a sporting background

and past connections with Blue Arrow, a company founded by Mr Watson-Challis' wife, Sheila.

A former Blue Arrow director himself, Mr Watson-Challis is director of various travel companies, Freeman of the City of London, Lord of the Manor of Debenham, Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Farriers, and member of the Guild of Freemen.

A footballer at school and in the Army, he also competed at cricket, athletics and fencing. Nowadays he is a keen golfer, motor racing driver, and pilot. He is a long-standing Luton Town supporter.

Mr Cole, aged 46, was born in Letchworth, where he still lives, and has supported Luton Town since he was a boy. Married with three sons, he used to row and play badminton, though now he prefers golf. He is president of the boys Welwyn Pegasus FC and is a Freeman of the City of London.

He was a founder of Cleandustrial Services Ltd, which was sold to Blue Arrow two years ago. Subsequently, he became a director of blue Arrow Cleaning Group and then Aldwick Associates Ltd, another Blue Arrow company.

Last September, he became chairman of his own company, Cole Management Services."

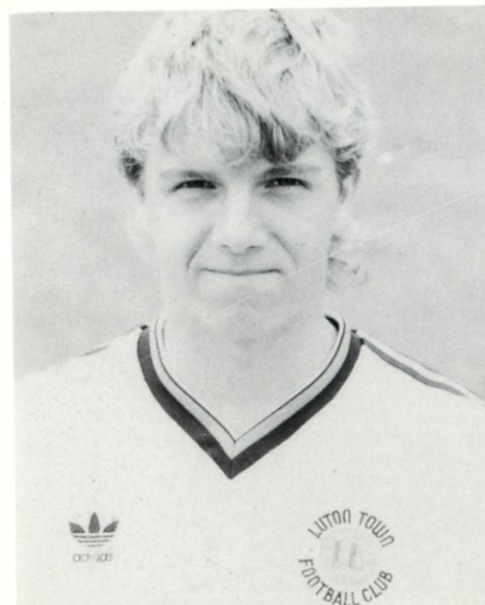

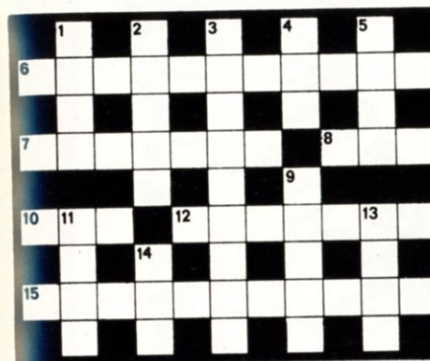

The Times - "As it was Luton showed Coventry how chances should be taken with splendid goals that kept them in fourth position.

"After eight minutes, Stein reacting quicker than Borrow's converted Breacker's cross with a fierce downward header. With two minutes remaining, Coventry were caught upfield as the ball broke to Hill. His perceptive pass released Stein, whose excellent centre was met by Newell's decisive volley."

The People - "Luton demolished FA Cup finalists Coventry with two of the sweetest goals they've every put together on their plastic pitch."

Sunday Mirror - "Luton capitalised on Coventry's pre-Wembley jitters to stay among the top four in Division One.

"Brian Stein and Mike Newell notched a goal apiece while the Sky Blues were thinking more about the FA Cup Final than this encounter."

"Stein's 15th goal of the season after nine minutes was a perfectly placed glancing header from eight yards that bounced inches inside Oggy's far post."



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LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

THE FORMER OWLS GOALKEEPER WHO HIT A HAT TRICK FOR LUTON

We welcome the 'Owls' to Kenilworth Road for our 40th league meeting today. As we have won only ten of our previous encounters, some catching up is needed to improve our record writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Nine of those ten wins have been here which must make Hillsborough one of our least favourite away grounds. Our solitary win was on 10th October 1970 when Malcolm MacDonald scored the perfect hat trick in a 5-1 win.

He also hit the national headlines due to the presence of Yorkshire TV cameras.

Attending the game that day was Jack Ball who before the war had given sterling service to Manchester United, Sheffield Wednesday and Huddersfield from whom he was signed by the Town in October 1934.

He made his debut against Bristol City at Kenilworth Road on 27th October 1934 and scored the Town goal in a 1-1 draw. The 8,956 crowd were first to witness the almost telepathic understanding between Ball and Sam Bell and it was obviously a great disappointment when Bell was transferred to Spurs in February 1935.

Even so, Jack Ball scored an astonishing 30 goals in only 31 league games in his first season, but unfortunately could not maintain the average the following year.

After an initial flurry of goals in 1935-36 the supply dried up, but because he had become such a crowd favourite many letters of encouragement were sent to the 'Luton News'. These letters did not work, however, and Ball was relegated to the reserves from where he saw his first team position further undermined by the remarkable exploits of Joe Payne.

Injured Payne

During the early games of 1936-37 the Town could not come up with a winning forward combination with the absence through injury of Payne and after a disastrous 3-0 defeat at Cardiff Jack Ball was recalled for what was regarded as his 'swansong'.

He, however, did very well playing as a foil for Joe Payne and managed a creditable 8 goals in 15 appearances before Albert Dawes was signed from Crystal Palace and took his place. Ball waited for the Town to win promotion at the season's end before linking up with Vauxhall Motors.

Another player with Sheffield Wednesday connections later to become a firm Town favourite was Tony Read - Beryl to the Oak Road faithful.

Signed as a 17-year-old by Wednesday in 1960, he had four years at Hillsborough without making the first team before being transferred to Peterborough where he enjoyed two league appearances in 1964-65.

The Town, that season, were fighting a rearguard action against relegation to Division Four and the situation became even more serious when England International goalkeeper Ron Baynham was severely injured, coincidentally, at Peterborough on February 6th 1965.

The injury, in fact, forced Baynham out of the game completely and left the Town with only one recognised keeper, Colin Tinsley.

Another goalkeeper was therefore a priority and the Town signed Read, but typical of the club's ill-luck or perhaps lack of forward thinking, bordering on panic, it was discovered that the new keeper had a broken bone in his foot and was unable to play for the rest of that season.

Tinsley remained an ever-present and started off season 1965-66 wearing the goalkeeper's jersey. Read however had shown his aptitude as a striker in the reserves and his first 27 league appearances for the Town were in the forward line.

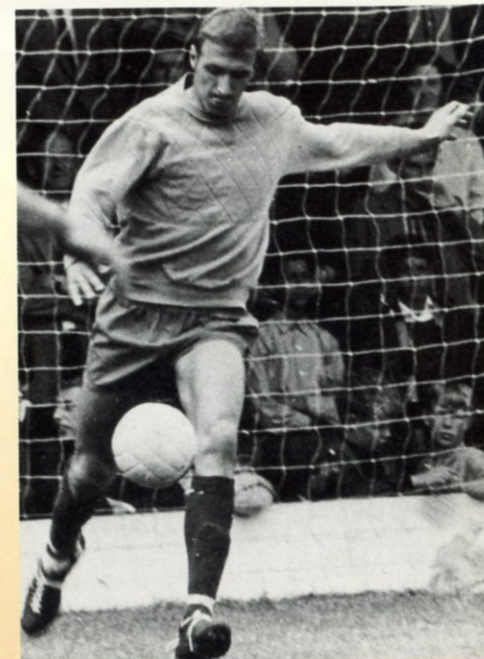
Never particularly graceful, he nonetheless notched twelve goals, including a hat-trick against Notts County at Kenilworth Road in a game where he could do no wrong.

Agility noticed

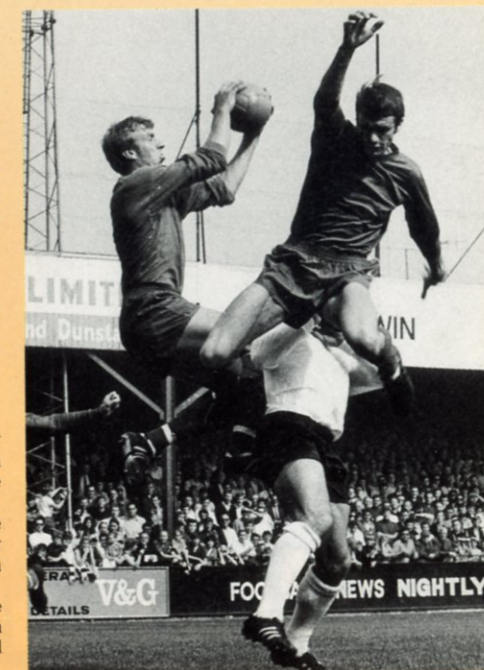
Towards the end of that particular season the goal supply started to dry up and with Tinsley suffering from a recurring injury, Read went back in goal from where he started to make a name for his agility and safe handling.

Tony Read then enjoyed six further seasons with the Town before finally losing his place to Keith Barber following a 2-1 home defeat by Sunderland on 19th February 1972.

I say 'finally losing his place' because during his time with the club he had to fight off goalkeeping claims from Ron Swan, George Ramage, Bill Taylor, Sandy Davie and Alan Starling, but he always bounced back.
