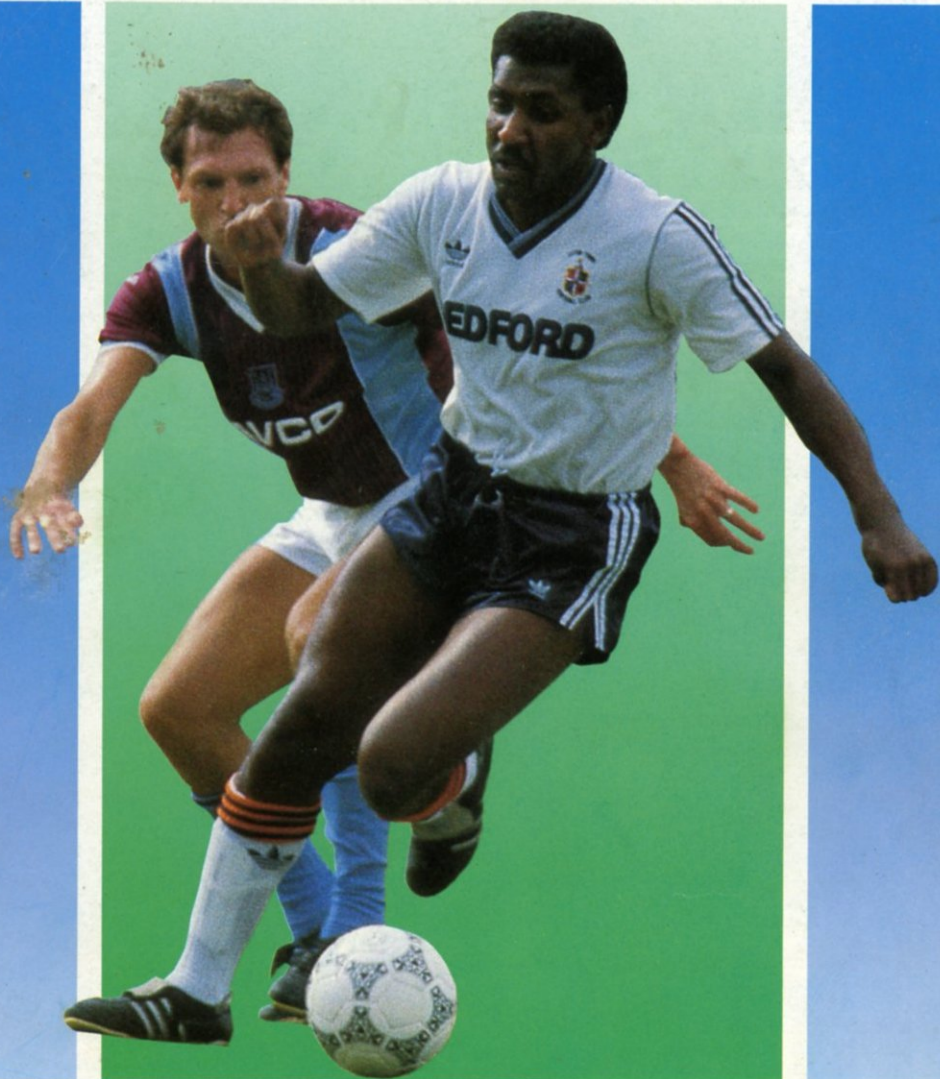

RAY'S REVIEW

I was very pleased against West Ham too by the way our supporters applauded all the good points in our play and West Ham's. It is good to play in front of a crowd which appreciates good passing football and gives the team plenty of support.

CHIT CHAT



Are footballers – both men and women – really lacking in brains – Emeka Nwajobi's degree and Brian Stein's 'A' Levels notwithstanding? My reason for asking this is some of the things they shout during matches. "Hold it" is a classic. The player being shouted at usually has not even controlled the ball – let alone got into a position to hold it and even if he was he probably knows himself that's the best thing to do.

"Pass, pass" is another strange shout. Presumably it would be rare for a player not to pass – and, yes, I can remember Bruce Rioch's feat of collecting the ball from Tony Read, dribbling the entire field, and then scoring. But nowadays we have a passing game and most players on the ball are looking to get rid of it. That's not to say they always do so successfully. What's happened to the accurate short pass (it seems cross-field passes are easier) or, better still, a pass into space for a player to run on to?

A call that always confuses me is "man on". Who or what is this man on? Is it a weird form of piggy back or has the sub arrived? And – by the way – "man" is still "on" in the ladies' game! Perhaps, then, it is something to do with the referee. As he's the only man on the pitch in the ladies' game he must be the man "on". And judging by the players frequent failure to respond to each other's calls it's not just me who's confused!

Would the game be better if they were all quiet except the director of affairs, the captain? Of course not. Football is a team sport and for teams to be successful they may play together and communicate with each other. Talking, or shouting, on the pitch is a necessary and vital form of communication. I only wish we could all sound more intelligent when we do it!

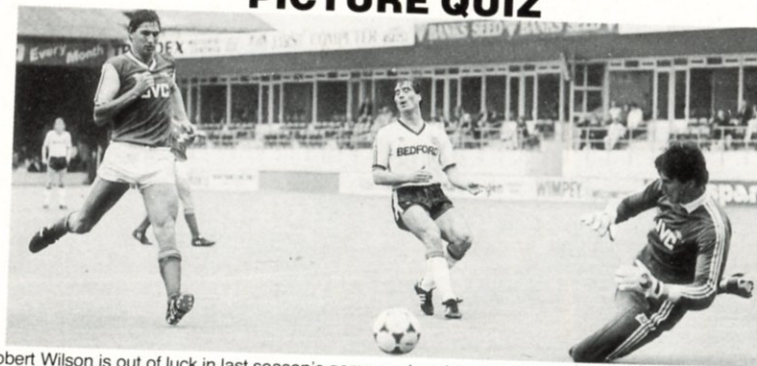

TOP-CLASS THRILLER

Luton Town 2 West Ham Utd 2

After limp performances against Derby and Coventry, the Town recovered their best form in a scintillating match against West Ham here on August 22. Two goals by Mick Harford, one in each half, were worth at least a point, if not three, on his last outing before starting a two match ban for his harsh opening day dismissal at Derby.

With Brian Stein still absent through injury, Luton began with another reshaped line-up which featured Danny Wilson alongside Ricky Hill in the centre of midfield, Gary Cobb wide on the right – for the first half at least – and David Preece on the left. Mike Newell partnered Harford in attack.

TREMENDOUS

Harford opened the scoring after five minutes with a tremendous far post header to a Tim Breacker cross and, for a while, the Town looked ready to rip the Hammers to shreds. But a deflected shot by Liam Brady brought them level after 19 minutes and a penalty, the second against luckless Darron McDonough in a week, after his foul on Tony Cottee, put them 2-1 ahead, Ray Stewart blasting home.

Harford's second goal came after 50 minutes. A Ricky Hill drive cannoned off the angle and from Mike Newell's cross, Harford slipped the ball in from close range to set up an end-to-end finale.

FOOTBALL FOCUS



Jim Ryan

Town coach Jim Ryan is a dedicated student of the game and enjoys watching football played with style and expression at all levels. In Football Focus today, he reflects on the arrival in this country of the first Brazilian international signed by a league club:

Mirandinha Deal Deserves Success

"I have to say I really admire the enterprise of Newcastle United. Mirandinha will be the first Brazilian to play in our First Division and is of course a bit of a risk. You never know how a player is going to react.

"But in trying to sign a player with undoubted skills and flair, Newcastle deserve to be well supported and earn success. Foreign players always have so much to offer. And Newcastle have learnt themselves that it is always a good thing to have a very skilful and inspirational player in their team - like Kevin Keegan for example.

Settled

"It may take him a bit of time to get settled in, but he should be good for Newcastle and the game as a whole. Sometimes we get too stereotyped and that is not a good thing at all. I am sure Mirandinha will give Newcastle something different and should be a big attraction for all the fans.

"Whenever I have been involved with foreign players myself, I have found them to be very good to work with. Of course, they are reluctant at first and their feelings are different and strange. But after a while you get used to things and both begin to feed off each other.

"You only have to look at the list of foreign

players who have come to this country to appreciate the good they have done our game. I remember Alex Sabella at Sheffield United, Ricky Villa and Ossie Ardiles at Spurs, Johnny Metgod and so on. I think Nico Claesen is a very exciting player. They are all good for the English game.

"Brazil is the last real football country in the world we have been to to sign players though and proves that at last we are taking the whole world seriously. But I don't know if we shall see lots of foreign signings in the future, including Brazilians.

Different

"Mirandinha is obviously going to be very different from the line of traditional British centre-forwards they have had at St James Park - including Malcolm Macdonald, Wyn Davies, and so on. He will be different, lay off, play in a different style and it could be a while before we see the best of him. He has to get used to the Newcastle players and they have to get used to him.

"I just hope he is a success for Newcastle's sake and the sake of the game which needs to have more flair and adventure and provide the unexpected. I am sure that is what the fans want to see. I hope Mirandinha can provide it for them."

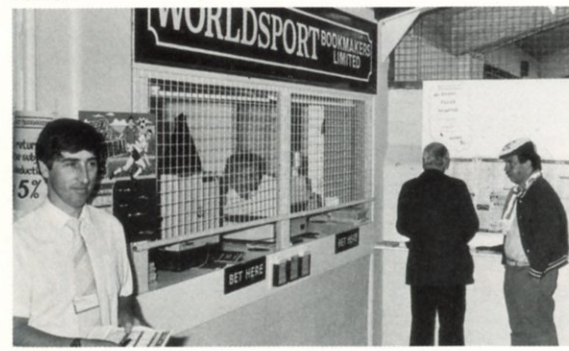

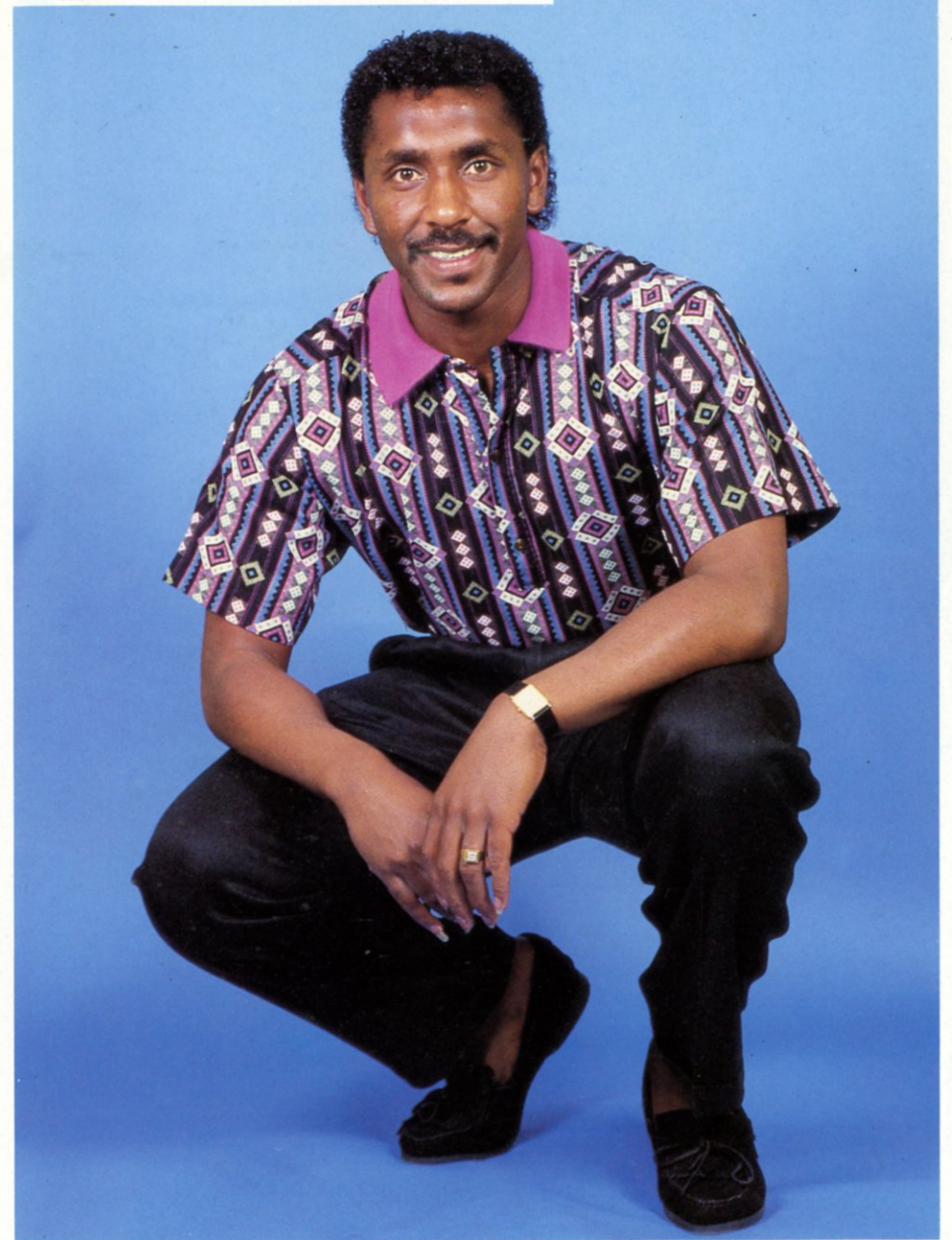

DRESSING ROOM

with David Preece

Last season David Preece made only 15 full appearances in the Town's first-choice line-up. It was a big disappointment for the midfielder signed from Walsall in December 1984 as injuries constantly interrupted his bid to maintain a regular place in the First Division. Now fully-fit again, he is looking forward to another exciting season at Kenilworth Road, but with a realistic view of what the future may hold.

Rarin' to go

"I am feeling fit and well and really keen this year. Last season was a nothing season for me. I find it tough to be injured and out of the side and I couldn't get excited about the great run. I don't mean I didn't want the lads to do well – just that I find it difficult to enjoy watching matches I really wanted to be playing in.

"Anyway, the new season has come and I am back and enjoying it. I have a slightly different role too with a bit more space. The manager wants more goals from the midfield four this season and has encouraged us to go forward more.

"That doesn't always mean I shall score more goals, but I will be trying to. I'm not really saying I'm a goal-scorer because I don't go in where it hurts often enough – I leave all that to Ricky and Danny! But I shall be popping up a bit more.

Dividends

"The new system we use is difficult to evaluate after only a few games, but I think it will pay dividends for us when everyone is fit. We have been without some really important international-class players – like Mal Donaghy, Brian Stein and Mick Harford – and that is bound to make a difference.

"I mean, we played well at Derby with only 10 men and were unlucky to get nothing and were just out of luck completely against Coventry. Then against West Ham, when we played well, they played well too and although we felt we should have won and taken all three points it could also have ended 5-5. Maybe with a full squad, some of the results might have been different.

"I re-signed on a two-year contract with the club and was very happy to sign. The club has got great players and a good chance of doing very well when everyone is

fit. The only trouble is the small squad. We really do have to take each match as it comes.

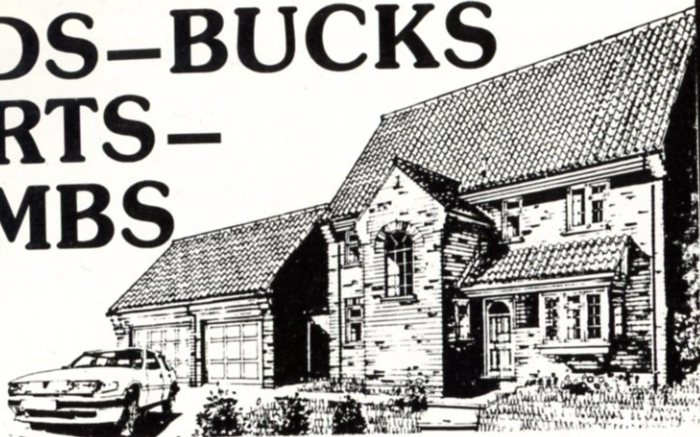
"I mean, Liverpool, for example, have allowed their standards to drop and are beatable, but still no-one can catch them up – it is much more even altogether and everyone has a chance. At least six or seven different teams could win the league.

Opportunities

"People often talk about the levelling out and a lot of it is due to players going abroad. I say good luck to them because football offers only a short life to the players and they have to take their chances. Of course, no-one wants to see good players leaving their own team or club but if they have an opportunity, they must be allowed to take it.

"Everything happens so quickly it is difficult to keep up sometimes with all the changes. You never know what lies around the corner... It makes sense to take good offers when they come along. And that is why I am happy to stay at Kenilworth Road. I think we have an excellent chance to challenge at the top again – especially if we have a kind run without injuries. But then, only time can tell."

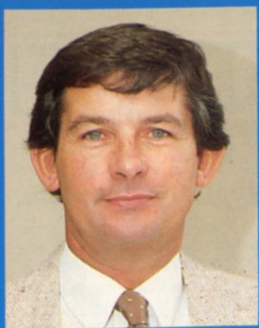

CLUB COMMENT

John Smith, Chief Executive THE CUP COMPETITIONS – WHERE WE STAND

Much has been written in the course of the last 12 months about our club's position in regard to the two major English cup competitions. I felt it was correct to put the up-to-date position forward to our members so far as Luton Town are concerned with the F.A. Cup and the Littlewoods Cup.

In the F.A. Cup, we are not permitted to play at home on our synthetic pitch. If we are drawn at home, then of course we shall have to play either on a neutral ground or away from home. Under the Football Association regulations, we are not allowed any appeal against this. There is no procedure. We have, therefore, taken the matter to court.

It is likely that our case will be heard in November. If we are successful, then we may be able to play our F.A. Cup ties at home, if drawn at home. Of course, the F.A. might appeal again. Or the F.A. might win. So, the position will remain unclear until the case is resolved on way or the other.

It does seem that it would be sensible if a moratorium could be brought in for this season at least until all is sorted out. The Football League have agreed to just such a moratorium until 1990-1991 to allow the use of synthetic pitches to continue and be studied properly.

As to the Littlewoods Cup, we shall be playing in this competition. If we are drawn at home, we shall be allowing visiting supporters into the ground. We did request the Littlewoods Cup committee to assist us in the matters of safety by restricting entrance to our own members, but they did not agree to do so. Therefore, if there are any crowd problems at the Littlewoods Cup games, we shall hold them responsible.

If we are drawn at home, we shall seek the cooperation of the visiting club in not asking for tickets. However, if they make a claim for their full allocation of 25 per cent of the accommodation, it will be extremely difficult for us to comply with the request and, in such circumstances, we may have to play elsewhere. We plan to accommodate visiting supporters in the K1 section of the Kenilworth terrace.

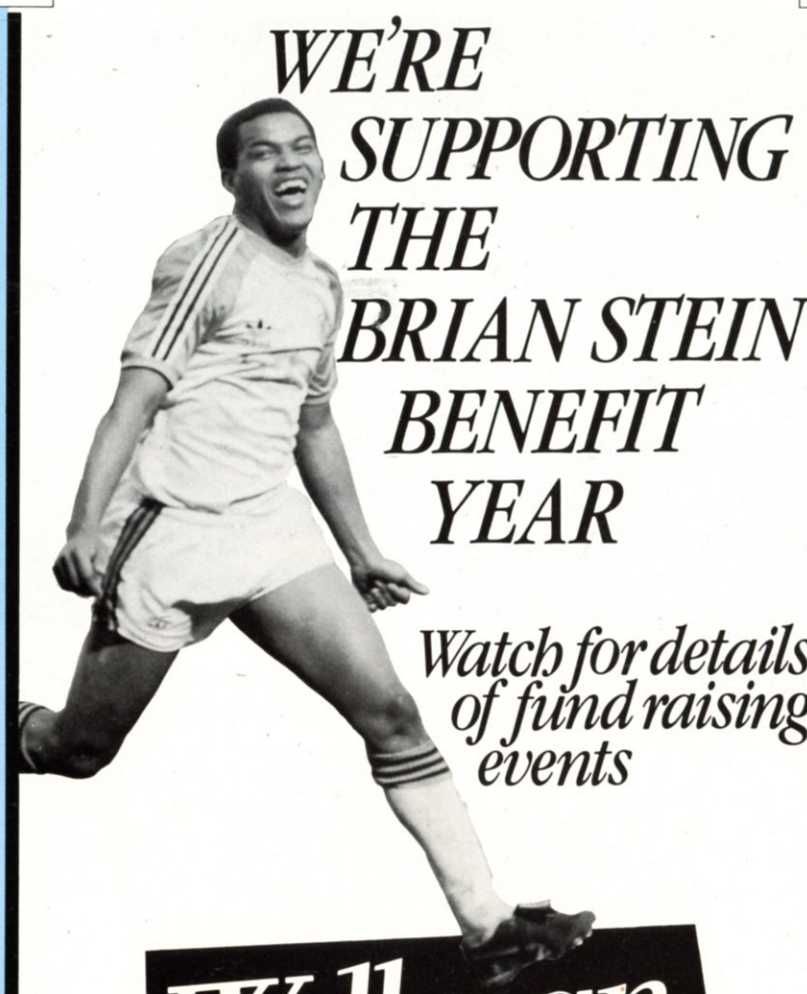
On the whole point of playing on neutral grounds, I have to tell concern about possible crowd disorder. There are three sets of supporters to consider and one only has to recall the incidents at certain F.A. Cup ties last season on neutral grounds to see what sort of problems there could be.

"Nigel knows that Kenny Sansom is our regular left-back and England's number one. He's accepted the position and he's ready to fight for his place. That's the sort of competition I want throughout the squad," said Graham, who last week added Watford's Kevin Richardson to his squad.

Last season's results were a 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road and a 3-0 Arsenal win at Highbury.

Players likely to be on duty today:

John Lukic – John took over from Pat Jennings two years ago and has since settled down to become the established first-

choice goalkeeper at Highbury. He joined Arsenal from Leeds United in the summer of 1983. Born Chesterfield.

Kenny Sansom – One of the finest attacking left-backs in the First Division, Kenny is the Arsenal captain and proved his position among the world's leading defenders with his England performances during the World Cup finals in Mexico.

Michael Thomas – Michael has taken over from Viv Anderson at right-back. An England Youth cap with pace, skill and big ambitions.

David O'Leary – Arsenal's longest serving player, stopper David is an Eire international and former captain of the Gunners. His experience will be an asset to them this afternoon.

Tony Adams – Essex-born Tony made his debut as a 17-year-old against Sunderland in November 1983 and is now in as first-choice alongside O'Leary. An England under-21 star, he has a big future.

David Rocastle – A promising young midfielder with thrilling speed and great all-round skills, David forced his way into the Arsenal side while still only 19 and is now a regular.



George Graham – A member of the famous Arsenal double team of 1970-1971, George was known as stroller for his elegant and educated style of play. But as Arsenal manager now, after a spell at Millwall, he has instilled energy and discipline and last season led them to Wembley and a Littlewoods Cup triumph against Liverpool. He succeeded Don Howe in the hot seat at Highbury when Howe resigned in 1986. Determined and eloquent, he is building up a strong squad and hopes to see Arsenal bidding for the league title this term.

Paul Davis – Another former England under-21 player with a big future, midfielder Paul has re-established himself in the engine room of the Arsenal side after terrible luck with injuries.

Charlie Nicholas – Joined Arsenal from Celtic in 1983 after a blaze of publicity, and has continued to attract the headlines. On the pitch, his individual skills and goalscoring ability cut him out as an outstanding striker. A full Scottish international who played for them in the World Cup finals in Mexico.

Alan Smith – A big money buy at the end of last season from Leicester City, Alan is a tall and powerful goal-scoring striker who made his name as the foil to Gary Lineker before his move to Everton. A mobile target man.

Martin Hayes – One of the least known of Arsenal's successful team of last season though he weighed in with many vital goals and led Arsenal's scoring charts. A quick and nimble forward with an eye for goal.

Steve Williams – Abrasive, hard-tackling midfielder whose competitive instincts have often earned him some unsavoury headlines, Steve has gained England caps and controls matches in midfield on his day. Ex-Southampton.

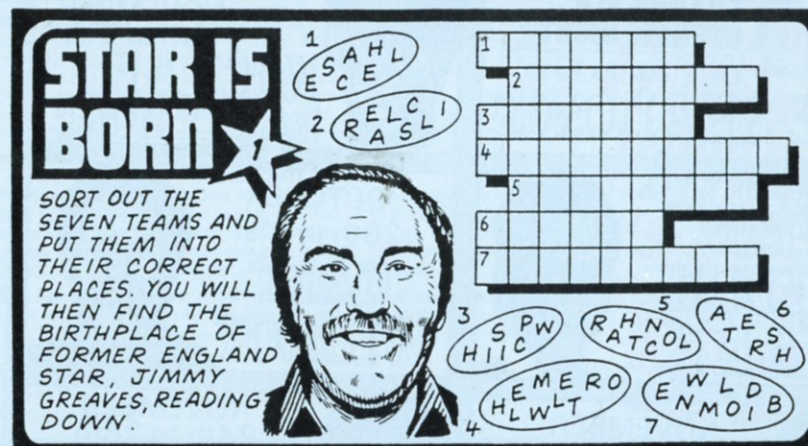

TWO GOAL MICK GRABS THE GLORY

Luton marginally deserved to win... The draw leaves both sides still searching for their first victory. Yet, on this evidence, neither deserve to struggle for long. Luton boss Ray Harford said - 'We were probably too cavalier. And my back four complain because they don't get enough protection. But I believe in playing that way, even if we make mistakes.'"

Vibrant form

Sunday Telegraph: "Striker Mick Harford scored twice to earn Luton their first point of the new season at Kenilworth Road. Harford who now starts a two-match ban, was in vibrant form and scored in each half. Luton began with urgent enthusiasm and Harford put them ahead after five minutes. Breacker's deep cross was met by Harford's head."

The Sun: "Steve Foster reflected on the battle of the strikers and then pronounced Mick Harford a clear-cut winner. Luton centre-half Foster said: "If Frank McAvennie is valued at £1.5 million, then Harford should fetch at least £3.5 million."

The Star: "A soaring far-post header and then an opportunist tap-in after Ricky Hill hit the woodwork earned Harford a bottle of bubbly as Luton's man of the match."

LUTON TOWN GOALDEN OLDIES

PAUL FUTCHER – AND A YEAR OF STRUGGLE, SWEAT AND TEARS

The summer of 1974 was a good time to be a Luton Town supporter. In winning promotion the previous season the Town had become the first side to go from the First Division to the Fourth and back again – and in only 14 years to boot!

Manager Harry Haslam's pre-season signings included Paul Fitcher from Chester for £100,000, closely followed by his twin brother Ron for a nominal fee. We all regarded it as a silly amount to pay for a teenager but Haslam was, of course, proved right in his judgement, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Overshadowing this transfer however was Secretary Bob Readhead's flight to Australia to sign World Cup star Adrian Alston. This long-distance trip took the public's imagination and guaranteed plenty of headlines for the Hatters as they embarked on what was to be a momentous season.

Butlin opener

The first game could not have been better stage-managed for then, as now. Liverpool were the team you had to beat if you expected to win anything and although the Town scored first through Barry Butlin, the 21,062 crowd was silenced as the Red know-how won through on the day 2-1.

The First division was proving tough, for after seven games the Town had yet to win and a 4-1 home defeat by Ipswich on September 14th was perhaps even more comprehensive than the scoreline suggested.

The long awaited first win came in game 10 when Carlisle were beaten 3-1 at Kenilworth Road, but the victory was soured by the news that leading scorer Butlin had been transferred to Second Division Nottingham Forest for £120,000.

It was soon revealed in a Sunday newspaper that Butlin wanted to move while at the same time Haslam was aware that Ron Fitcher would eventually prove to be a bigger crowd favourite.

Haslam was obviously keeping his cards close to his chest as a run of eleven games which produced only two points left the Town hopelessly adrift at the bottom of the table as Christmas approached.

Rejuvenated

With exactly half the season gone, future champions Derby visited Kenilworth Road and were surprisingly beaten by a suddenly rejuvenated Town. The only goal came when mid-season signing Peter Spring was brought down in the penalty area, breaking his toe in the process. Current Town coach Jim Ryan stepped up to give Luton a morale-boosting victory.

Spring's replacement in the following game was Ron Fitcher who joined his brother, a veteran with three games under his belt, in a highly improbable win at League leaders Ipswich. In true 'Roy of the Rovers' style Ron scored the winner with the seconds ticking away in a game that the home side should have won at a canter.

Two days later a crowd of 19,642 came to Kenilworth Road partly to look at the Fitchers and partly to see if the Town's luck had really turned. Visitors Wolves were taken apart as Ron Fitcher scored a hat-trick in a memorable 3-2 win which took Luton off the bottom of the table for the first time in two months.

Confidence came flooding back personified by the slightly indisciplined play of Paul Fitcher whose party piece was to juggle the ball in his own penalty area facing the goalkeeper the, when attackers converged, he would flick the ball over his head and play an inch perfect pass to his brother.

Three straight defeats in early March proved a setback and when mighty Leeds visited Kenilworth Road on March 22nd, the Town were still in one of the relegation positions. Leeds were seen off in a thrilling encounter and when Arsenal were literally destroyed at home three days later hopes were running high.

Easter crash

Unfortunately, Easter, so often a problem period for Luton teams over the years, saw three away defeats. Roger Davies of Derby scored all his side's five goals at the Baseball Ground, in a terrible Town performance, but worse was to come as Wolves won 5-2 at Molineux.

The third reverse turned out to be a make-or-break game at struggling Tottenham who won with a late goal scored by Alfie Conn who was so blatantly offside that Paul Fitcher was sent off for arguing and it appeared at one stage that the whole Town team were about to walk off in protest.

Surprisingly, three straight wins followed but it was rather too late as Tottenham gained an improbable 4-2 win over Leeds in the last match to send the Town, Chelsea and Carlisle into Division Two.

It was therefore a season of two halves for if the Town had performed in the first half of the season as they did in the second they would have finished sixth and perhaps qualified for Europe!
