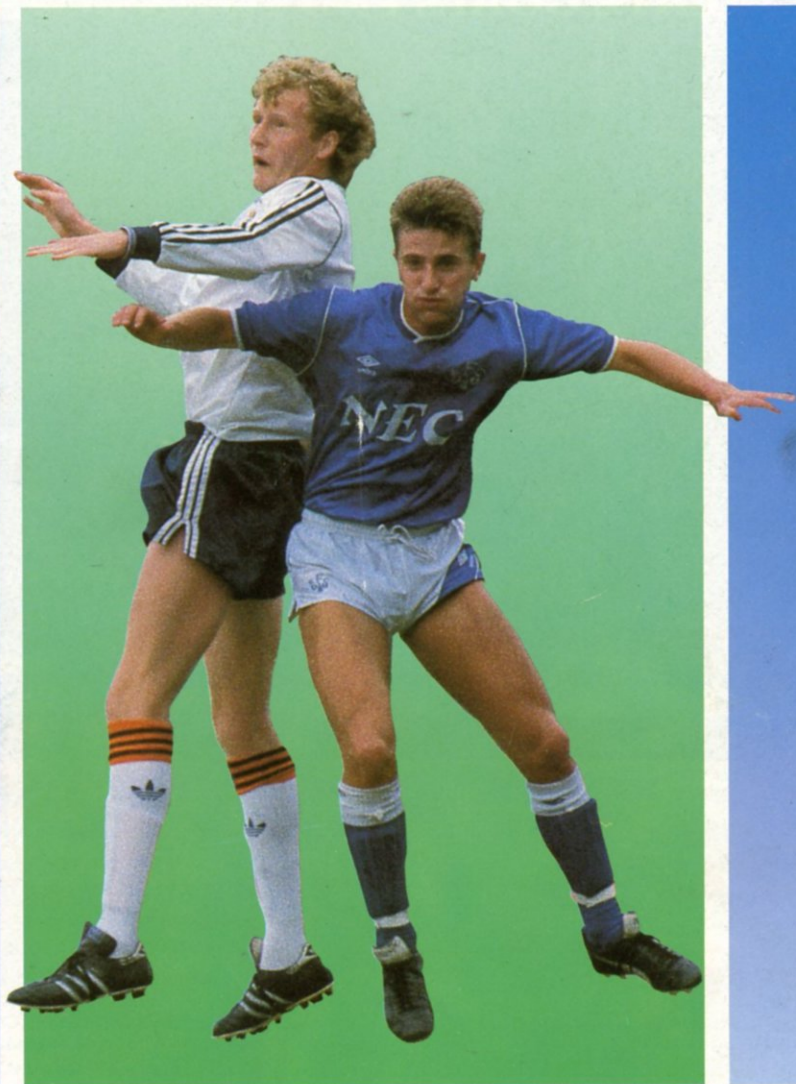

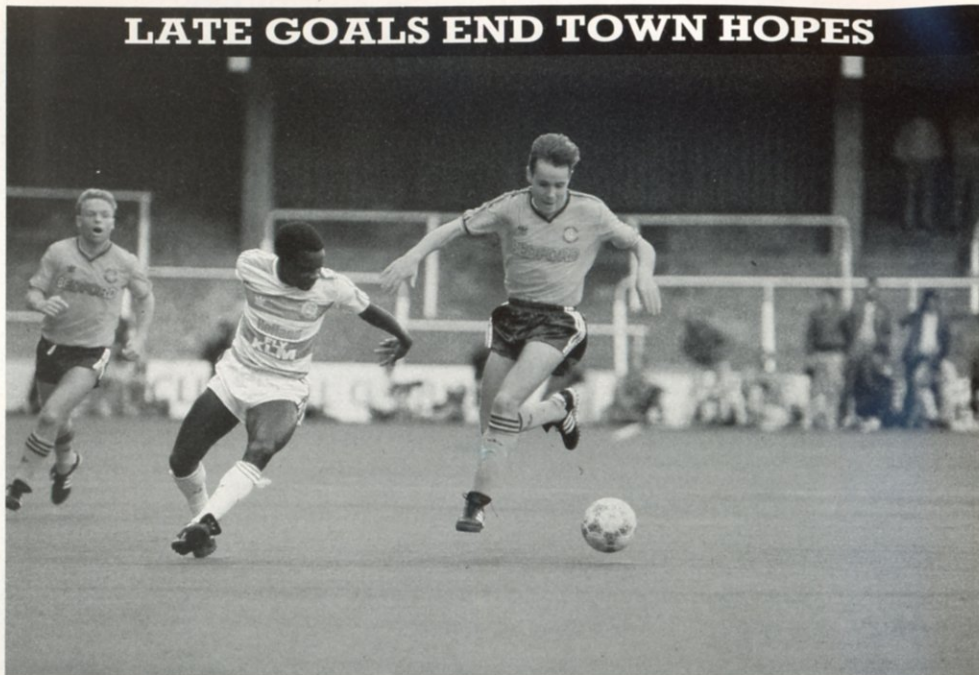

I am certainly not thinking of changing my philosophy overnight.

Since the Everton game, we have been busy off the pitch as well as on it. We have said goodbye to two of our senior players – Mike Newell who has signed for Leicester City and Robert Wilson who has moved to Fulham. I wish them both the best of luck with their new clubs – Mike of course returning to work with one of his former managers, Bryan Hamilton, and Robert to one of his former clubs. In addition, to these two, Mark Walton has had his loan period at Colchester extended by another month and congratulations are due to Ashley Grimes who, after his recall to the Republic of Ireland team last month, has been retained again by Jack Charlton. Neil Poutch and Michael O'Brien have also won international recognition. They have been called up by the Republic's youth squad.

On the injury front, things should be showing signs of improvement today. I hope Richard Harvey came through his reserve outing in midweek unscathed and without a reaction and also hope David Preece will be fit to return. In David's absence, Kingsley Black made his senior debut at QPR last week and did very well. He has had a bleeding now and will be all the better for it.

Nightmare journey

For 21 years I have been going to football matches home and away, from Portsmouth to Sunderland, Bristol to Ipswich, but never have I been so uncomfortable as on the journey to Selhurst Park this season.

The behaviour of the gangs of young men I encountered at the railway station and on the train were so disturbing I almost turned round and went home.

Their 'songs' were the most obscene I've ever heard - and I've been to some rugby club dos - and their conversation, at full volume, was so liberally peppered with sexually oriented swearing that it was impossible to follow what they were actually trying to say.

They stood on platforms either side of a three line track throwing coins across the line in an attempt to hit each other - and didn't care who else they hit in the bargain. They were spitting, too, and jostling other travellers.

Once on the train other passengers had to move; and when I got off the train they leant out of the windows and, in the basest Anglo-Saxon, made their fantasies towards me perfectly clear.

Not fans

These young men, aged about 18-25, were the sort who've got English football a bad reputation. But the people who advocate National Service to discipline them have got it wrong because these particular young men weren't football fans, they were squaddies let loose on weekend passes. Their behaviour and regard for fellow travellers was far worse than anything I have ever seen from football hooligans.

It's all very well for the media and, indeed, the Government, to criticise Football for the problems caused by some supporters and we all know that the Football Authorities have not all been 100% active in trying to improve matters, but the reasons behind hooliganism cannot be cured by membership schemes, family enclosures or, indeed, banning fans.

All these worthy measures succeed in doing is moving the trouble away from football. We need, instead, to consider how we have educated these young men to make them behave in such an antisocial and threatening manner.

STYLISH VICTORY

Luton Town 2 Everton 1

The Town maintained their good form shown the previous week at Oxford when they came from behind to beat Everton by the odd goal in three at Kenilworth Road three weeks ago. Neil Pointon put Everton ahead after only five minutes, Brian Stein equalised 14 minutes later and Ricky Hill drilled in the winner six minutes into the second half.

But while it was a team victory achieved through fluid football and precise finishing, there were outstanding individual performances by several players, notably Mick Harford, which caught the eye. Everton, lacking several regular first team men and using a system with five men in midfield, were unable to cope with Harford's power in the air and sheer presence around their penalty area and ended the game in desperate search of an equaliser.

On a rain-affected and therefore slippery pitch, there were plenty of thrills and spills before Pointon took advantage of a loose ball to open the scoring. Harford led the Town revival, heading down an Ashley Grimes cross to give Brian Stein the opening for a brilliant half-volley. Harford was in the thick of it again when he laid on Hill's winner – jumping to challenge for Mal Donaghy's centre, Pat Van Den Hauwe misheading his clearance and Hill shooting accurately, low and true, past the recalled Neville Southall.

FOOTBALL FOCUS

Jim Ryan



As a former player with both the Town and today's visitors Manchester United, Town coach Jim Ryan looks forward to today's match with extra anticipation. In his spell at Old Trafford, he was kept out of the side by such players as Denis Law, Bobby Charlton, George Best and another former Town star John Aston. The last two as wingers were Jim's principal rivals for a place in the team with Best, naturally, commanding a regular place on his world-class ability. Today, in Football Focus, Jim looks at the heritage every player has to live with at Old Trafford and reflects on the great days he enjoyed with both clubs:

Memories revived as my old club visits

"For me, both clubs have a bit of magic. I enjoyed my time as a player at both and I am now working for Luton Town. Manchester United will always have a bit of special charisma. They are one of the world's greatest clubs. But all my allegiance today will be with my present club Luton Town...and not just for professional reasons. I won't be tempted to shout for anyone other than our team because I know all the players personally, because I am a Town fan now through and through and because I want them to win.

"I don't know the current United players. But I do know the pressures and the problems they face. I am sure their manager Alex Ferguson has also learned a lot more about them in a short space of time. It is not like anywhere else I know of. I remember being in the party for all the great European trips in the 1960's. The semi-final in Madrid and the final against Benfica at Wembley when United won the European Cup and became the first English side to do so.

Romantic

"They were vivid memories and still are. I shall not forget them easily. It was a very romantic period. Billy Foulkes, a survivor of the Munich air disaster in 1958, scored the crucial goal in Spain to take United to the final and then Bobby Charlton, another survivor, scored twice in the final. That made it a very emotional and very special final. That decade from 1958 to 1968 really created the whole magic of Manchester United. They had a team made up of really great individuals and no club has measured up to it since.

"Law, Best and Charlton and Co were all great players. Lots of very fine English club teams have

had tremendous success since then, but no-one has had as much individual talent in one team. Liverpool, even with Ian Rush, were still a team essentially. The Arsenal double side is an even better example of a team based on teamwork not individuals.

"That is not to say they were not very fine teams with very fine players. But the United side had great players. Great individuals. George Best, who kept me out of the United side for my eight years at the club, although I did make appearances when there were openings through injuries and so on, was one of the top six players there has been. Since him and since then, every United player has been measured up against their ghosts.

Craving

"That is not easy at all. Now we are out of Europe – the English clubs that is – it somehow makes all the United years in Europe seem even more vivid. At United, I think they are all craving for it again and again. They have not had a championship-winning team since I was a player at Old Trafford and that makes me feel old. So their management and players are under pressure all the time.

"But that does not make it easier for them. Nor for us. There is pressure for success at every club and we at Luton Town are also aiming to win every match and to entertain too. When our team are playing well, we are a joy to watch. The football is beautiful. And we have a good record against United here in recent seasons. I hope it will continue today in a really great and entertaining game which adds to the Luton Town heritage."

DRESSING ROOM

with Tim Breacker

It was an overlooked landmark at the start of the season when the Town lost 1-0 at Derby County, but on that day Tim Breacker started his 100th First Division match for the club to join a healthy number of experienced players with experience in three figures – in league games – behind them. This term Tim has held down the number two shirt with a series of confident and often swashbuckling displays and he scored in the 5-2 win at Oxford to add to the goal he scored at Newcastle last season, his first for the club. Today he reflects in Dressing Room Talk on the Town's recent performances and the various tactics being used in the First Division:

Happy with open style

"It's been a bit of an in-and-out start for us. We have played well and we have got good results, but we have also had a lot of possession without getting a result, like we did at QPR, when we were beaten on the break really. They were just waiting for that sort of chance for a breakaway goal. The second goal was one we could not believe. I thought it was not a penalty. But it counted.

"Everyone is talking about the QPR style. The way they play with a sweeper and so on. It was a difficult system to play against. We had two wingers playing with Micky Weir and Kingsley Black playing – Kingsley making his senior debut. The idea was to try and get around them and stretch them at the back. But it was difficult. I thought we did well, but they seem to play so deep with their back men marking man for man and a sweeper behind them that they always have a spare man.

Sweeper

"It is not a style I would like to play. And I am glad to say we don't play that way here. In fact, we play a much more open style this season and it has led to quite a few really open games, I think. The way that QPR play it is difficult to open the game up and it makes it all very tight. It is a bit like the Continental teams, but they at least play with a versatile sweeper, a midfielder behind the defence who can come out and attack. You often see them making long runs. Like Raddy Antic when he was with us.

"Raddy always played as a sweeper when he was in Spain with Real Zaragoza. In England it is more usual for the sweeper to be a centre half who has moved over a bit. It makes it more defensive really.

"I don't think we shall have that sort of game today against Manchester United. They are a more attacking team like us. It is going to be a difficult game but we know we are capable of a good result when we hit our form.

Midfield

"Last week we had two wingers and it has meant quite a change in our tactics. But we have to get used to different systems all the time in the First Division. We have not played with a four man midfield before since I have been in the team but it is still quite good in a defensive way even when we have two attacking wide players.

"Micky Weir for example, who has really settled in well with the lads, likes to go forward, but he is also good at getting back and tackling and getting into good defensive positions. You know, since he came into the team, or rather since he came to the club, he has been playing for the youngsters' team in our five-a-sides and we haven't lost a match yet! He is a good omen.

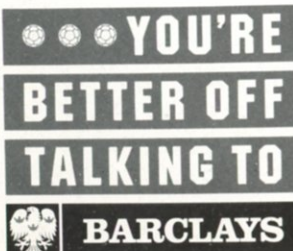
"He got off with a goal at Wigan which is a good start too. Talking of good starts, I have been quite pleased with my form this season and will be looking for another goal if I get the chance today. Although I keep a low profile as the PFA rep at the club, I like to get the chance to have a shot now and then and make some headlines."

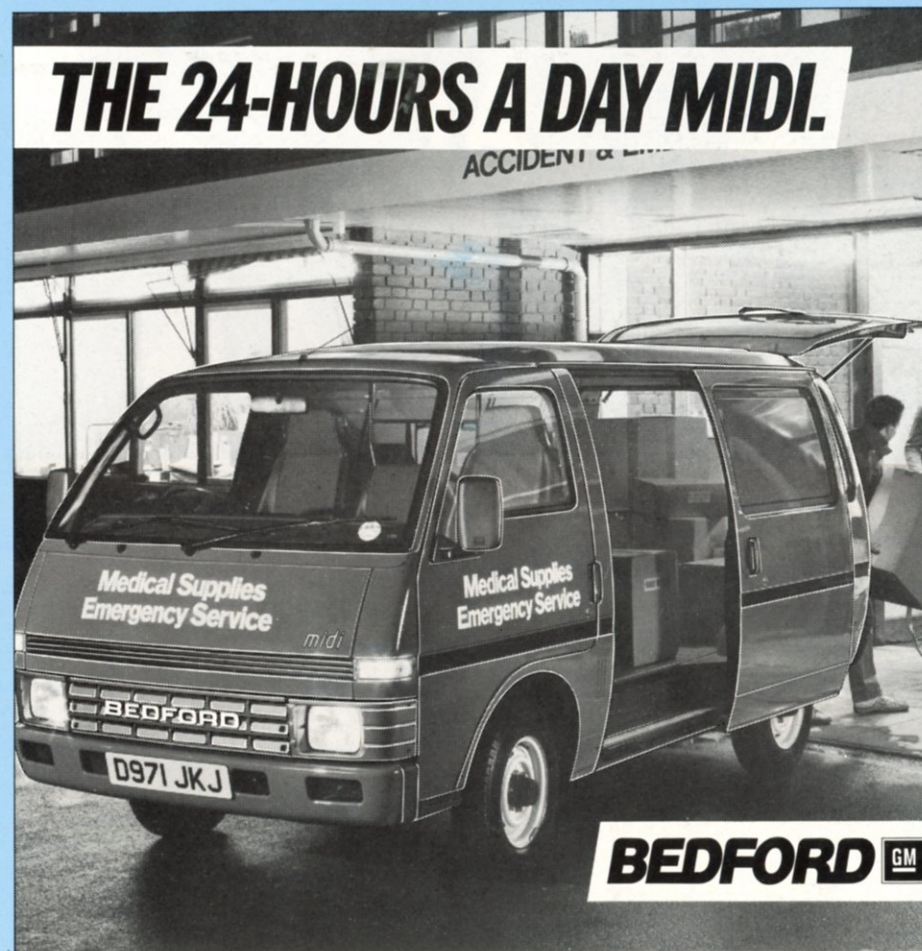

INTRODUCING...

MANCHESTER UNITED

Manchester United arrive at Kenilworth Road today keen to avenge their defeat here last season. They are likely to provide a stern test in what many people feel could be the season in which they end their long spell without a major honour. New boy Brian McClair, from Celtic, could be just the vital piece in Alex Ferguson's jigsaw that was missing last season. His penalty match winner against Spurs last week was his sixth goal of the season.

Founded in 1878, as Newton Heath, by a body of Lancashire and Yorkshire railway workers, they secured their first ground on a piece of land adjoining the North Road. They won the Manchester Senior Cup in 1888 and joined the Football Alliance a year later, just two years before their neighbours Adwick, now Manchester City, joined that league.

While City became founder-members of Division Two in 1892, United were elected directly into Division One in the same year. They were still known as Newton Heath at that time and by the time they changed their name to Manchester United in 1902 they had slipped into Division Two. They won promotion in 1906, took their first Division One Championship in 1908 and won the FA Cup for the first time in 1909.

In five separate spells, they have spent a total of 23 seasons in Division Two, the most recent of these comparatively short spells lasting just one season in 1974-5. They bounced back

with what was virtually the fourth great United side since the war. The first of these sides had been captained by Johnny Carey in the late forties and had won the FA Cup of 1947-8, with a front line of Delaney, Morris, Rowley, Pearson and Mitten that has rarely been equalled at club level.

The second was the 'Busby Babes' side so cruelly destroyed by the Munich air disaster of 1958 when such giants of the game as Tommy Taylor, Roger Byrne and Duncan Edwards were killed. The third was the European Cup winning team of 1968 which included Bobby Charlton, George Best and Brian Kidd. In the meantime Harry Gregg and Denis Law had shared in their triumphs of the earlier sixties that included the FA Cup in 1963 and the Football League in 1965 and 1967.

The Docherty team that climbed out of Division Two in 1975 went on to win the FA Cup in 1977 just a year after losing in the final. The key men by then were Alex Stepney, Stuart Pearson and Martin Buchan. Since coming back from Division Two they have finished successively 3rd, 6th, 10th, 9th, 2nd, 8th, 3rd, 3rd, 4th, 4th and 11th.

Last season they kicked off with three successive defeats and a Littlewoods Cup defeat at Southampton left them without an away win by Bonfire night. This signalled the end of Ron Atkinson's five-year run as manager.

Alex Ferguson moved in from Aberdeen and on Boxing



Alex Ferguson. Born Govan, Glasgow on New Year's Eve, 1941, Alex took over at Old Trafford last season after establishing a reputation for himself as one of the most successful managers in the Scottish game. He was in charge of Scotland's 1986 World Cup campaign following the untimely death of Jock Stein and earlier in his managerial career led East Sterling, St Mirren, and Aberdeen. He took over from Ron Atkinson last November and has quietly rebuilt the United squad declaring nothing less than a challenge for the league title will do this season.

Day United chalked up their first away win at Anfield of all places! Later they completed the double over champions Liverpool, but they did not again win away from home.

So far this season they have won at Charlton, drawn at Coventry and Southampton and lost at Everton. At home they have beaten Watford, Chelsea and Spurs and drawn with Arsenal and Newcastle while in the Littlewoods Cup they took a 5-0 leg win over hitherto unbeaten Hull.

Brian McClair, an £850,000 signing from Celtic, is already among the goals and links up with that muscular handful, Northern Ireland international, Norman Whiteside. In midfield Scottish international Gordon Strachan (ex-Dundee and Aberdeen) is well settled, linking up with Danish winger Jesper Olsen, who came from Dutch club Ajax in 1984, and Remi Moses who came from West Bromwich in 1981 and has recovered from a string of injuries.

England skipper Bryan Robson is equally happy in midfield or defence where Paul McGrath the Republic of Ireland man has linked up with Kevin Moran, unluckily sent off in the course of the 1985 FA Cup final win over Everton.

On the right flank, Viv Anderson has settled in since he came earlier this year from Arsenal. Both he and home-grown Mike Duxbury are England internationals while the other wide defender Arthur Albiston has Scottish caps to his credit. In goal Gary Walsh is a tall 19-year-old steadily making the place his own in succession to injury victim Gary Bailey.

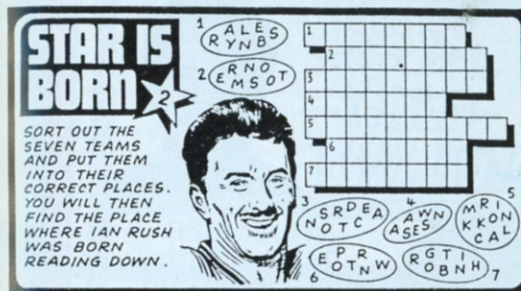
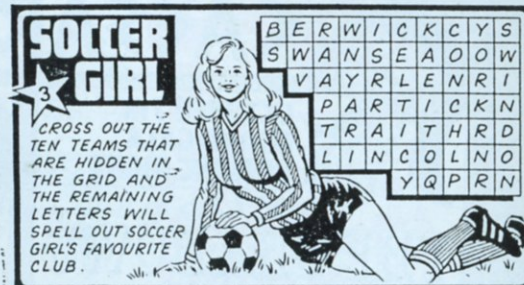

Views from the media

TOWN SWEEP ASIDE BY LEADERS

After a trio of promising results against Arsenal, Oxford and Everton, the Town's fortunes have fallen with defeats at Charlton and QPR in the First Division. Last week's defeat by the leaders at Loftus Road came with two late goals, one a penalty, and reporters at the match noted with interest how much possession the Town enjoyed. Here is a selection of the newspaper comments:

Sunday Telegraph: "Ray Harford the Luton manager, summarised the tactics that have carried Rangers four points clear at the top of the First Division. 'I thought we'd got sick of the ball' he said. Luton certainly enjoyed territorial advantage for something like 75 per cent of the game, but with Mick Harford subdued by Alan McDonald they could not capitalise."

Angry Sealey

Sunday Times: "QPR's win was achieved through a spectacular diving header by Dean Coney and a fiercely disputed Terry Fenwick penalty in the last 20 minutes. The penalty was awarded when John Byrne appeared to be tripped by Mal Donaghy. Luton goalkeeper Les Sealey who had earlier been booked angrily threw the ball at Byrne and then clashed with Bary Bannister. Later Luton manager Ray Harford praised Bannister for telling the referee that Sealey had not made contact with him. 'But for that, he could easily have been sent off.'"

Mail on Sunday: "It might not be pretty but eh QPR sweeper system remains effective. After last week's hiccup at Oxford they regained a four-point lead at the top of the First Division. But it took two late goals after a stuttering display to calm manager Jim Smith's nerves."

LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

MEMORIES OF MUNICH

Season 1957/58 proved to be the most successful in the history of the Town to that date with a final position of eighth being attained. In direct contrast today's visitors suffered a year of extreme tragedy with so many lives lost in the Munich air disaster, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Gordon Turner, who had finished top scorer with 30 league goals the previous term, started the Town off on a winning stretch by scoring the only goal of the home game against Bolton at Kenilworth Road watched by a crowd of 17,591.

Telepathic

Early season displays were excellent with Turner, once again, forming a telepathic partnership with Allan Brown and Bob Morton reverting to the forward line weighing in with important goals. Five of the first six games were won to put the Town up amongst the leaders and although this fine form was not maintained we were always challenging for the top spot.

Highlights of the first half of the season included a 3-1 win at Chelsea with Turner scoring a hat-trick on his first visit to Stamford Bridge and a 5-1 home win over bogey team West Bromwich. This win came only a week after a 5-0 reverse at Portsmouth!

Caring Planners

In those days games were played on both Christmas and Boxing day and true to the form of the caring fixture planners the Town were down to play Manchester United over the holiday period! One has visions of a 'five-a-side' kickabout being arranged in the corridors of the train taking the two teams to the return game.

Luton fans did not care about the players problems as Manchester United, the reigning league champions, were then, as now, a major attraction. The first game at Old Trafford saw the Town suffer their customary defeat - 3-0 - before a crowd of 39,594 but excuses could be made as Morton, Turner and Captain Syd Owen were all injured and as a league debut was made by Dave Pacey and first games of the season given to Terry Kelly and Tony Gregory.

England international goalkeeper Ron Baynham was injured in the defeat so with Eddie Marsh making his debut the Town team for the return had a rather inexperienced look about it. Despite this a festive 2-0 interval lead.

Equaliser

Five minutes into the second half however John Groves pulled one back for the Town and from then on it was all Luton. The deserved equaliser came in the last minute

when Brown scored with a header to send the crowd wild. Six of the great United team of that day were to lose their lives in the Munich air crash only six weeks later.

If the Town were not going to win the league then the FA Cup was a distinct possibility and with the Third Round draw pairing Luton away to Third Division North Stockport the 'Twin Towers' beckoned.

In the shock of the day, however, the Town were beaten 3-0 by a team who were superior in all departments. A Wembley trip would have to wait until the following season.

Luton bounced back from this defeat with a run of four wins and a draw from the next five games including a 7-1 home win over Sunderland with Turner scoring four. Sadly Sunderland were to be relegated that season (for the first time in their history) as the Town liked playing them at Kenilworth Road - 8-2 in 1955/56, 6-2 in 1956/57 and now the latest thrashing.

Shock

Soon after this win came the shock that Reg Pearce was to be transferred to Sunderland for £20,000. Liverpool born Pearce was playing particularly well and was on the fringe of an England call-up.

Despite the annoyance of the Town fans it transpired that Pearce had asked for a move saying his health had suffered since coming to Luton. The clean air at Sunderland would apparently ease his sinus condition!

At the same time as the Pearce transfer, respected coach Jack Crompton answered the call of a beleaguered Manchester United and returned to Old Trafford to help set up the 'new' Reds.

These departures, together with a further spate of injuries to senior players meant that the Town's fortunes took a down turn and the remainder of the season was somewhat of an anti-climax. It did however remain a highspot for the Town until last season and Gordon Turner's 33 goals proved to be his best total for the club, Luton's best since the war.

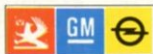
