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

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FRONT COVER ACTION FEATURES: Town's number one goalkeeper, Jon Hallworth.

Oldham Athletic next

The next first team match at Portman Road is on Saturday, November 21, when Oldham Athletic are the visitors.

Last season the Lancashire team were the front runners for a large part of the season, but eventually had to settle for third place and were beaten in the promotion play-offs by Leeds United.

Manager Joe Royle, the former England international striker in his playing days, has done a fine job at Boundary Park on limited resources. This season, however, has seen a change of fortunes and Oldham are struggling near the bottom.

Royle is always having to try and make ends meet and recently he was forced to part with Andy Goram, the Scotland goalkeeper, who joined Hibernian for £300,000.

During the summer Royle signed former Ipswich defender Glenn Keeley from Blackburn Rovers.

Last season Oldham installed an artificial surface and are now one of four clubs to have such a surface — QPR, Luton and Preston are the others.

The injury crisis that has hit youth and reserve team players at the club has not surprisingly made life difficult for the second team, and this of course will be reflected in performances and results with young players coming in to make their debuts.

We went to Reading for Saturday afternoon action and immediately lost the services of Chris O'Donnell who was called back to Portman Road to be a substitute for the first team after a lunchtime call off by Romeo Zondervan.

Lee Howey saw the game from centre-half instead of centre-forward and did a good job.

David Gregory gave away an early penalty and we went behind. But **Gary McDonald** scored an equaliser after a fine run by Dalian Atkinson.

We made it 2-1 when **Simon Milton** capitalised on some good play by Atkinson and Lee Honeywood.

Then Gregory was up to his old tricks again and amazingly gave another spot-kick away to allow Reading to draw level.

But **Milton** came to the rescue and converted the winner after a shot from McDonald had been saved.

The match was particularly special for our goalkeeper Ron Fearon who was making a return to a club where he made over 60 first team appearances.

Last Wednesday afternoon we entertained a very experienced Watford side here at Portman Road and were weakened even further because of an injury to Gregory.

Neil Currie and David Ellis made their debuts in a game that was always going to be an uphill battle for us.

Watford scored early on but **Atkinson** equalised with a splendid effort at the end of a determined run.

Just when we looked like holding out for what would have been a good draw considering the inexperience in our side, the visitors got the winner when former England man Luther Blissett rattled home a cracker.

John Deehan had a good match in midfield while Chris O'Donnell and Andy Barnet worked very hard at the back.

YOUTHS

The youth team squad have been crippled by injuries more than I can ever remember. But the players carrying the flag are battling hard and doing the club proud, particularly the young schoolboy lads that I have been forced to call on.

In the away league match at Gillingham we put out the youngest side the youth team has ever fielded with nine schoolboys and four YTS boys in action.

We lost that match 2-1 but it was a very encouraging show against more experienced opponents down in Kent.

A penalty and a deflected free kick put us 2-0 down but the team bounced back and to pull a goal back through **Matthew Barbrook**. In the closing stages we should have equalised but Neil Grice lost his footing.

Prior to this match we were away to Arsenal at London Colney. The side went down 4-1 in a League

Cup competition in which we lost in the final last season.

This game was a familiar story for us with the better chances coming our way, but mistakes being made at the other end of the field.

After 70 minutes the score was 1-1 but the own goals, one from Oxbrow and the other from Reader, cost us dearly and we came away defeated.

But with so many players out injured I can certainly not criticise the efforts of my team too much and I feel that a lot of valuable experience is being gained throughout this period.

Lessons are being learned by young players who have been thrown in at the deep end at a time when a large percentage of the squad, including so many stalwarts, are being forced to watch from the touchline.

Making the big step from schools soccer into the junior professional ranks at a club is a big one, and all young players making this transition realise very quickly that they need to work very hard.

For 16-year-old Chelmsford boy Neil Grice, a player who once rattled in 163 goals in a season for three different sides, the need to improve his stamina is of paramount importance.

"I am working hard at it and it is getting better all the time," says Neil who scored his mountain of goals while turning out for the Chelmsford schools side, his school team and a club team.

A striker or midfield player, Neil had 18 months training with Arsenal before being arranged trials at Portman Road by Dave Emerick, a friend of Town reserve team coach Brian Owen.

A first year YTS trainee who took up his duties at Portman Road in the summer, Neil was particularly delighted with his performance in the youth team's 3-0 away win at Norwich this season when in a 3-0 victory he cracked the second goal with a stunning volley.

As a schoolboy last season he also had appearance for the youths and came on as a substitute to score against his former club Arsenal.

Born in Walthamstow, Neil attended the Moulsham High School in Chelmsford where he and his family have lived for the past eight years.

The son of a company director, Neil also represented Essex schoolboys and at this high level weighed in with his full quota of goals.


Neil, who played for Town Reserves in a pre-season friendly match, goes to the Suffolk College every week along with the rest of the trainees to further his education.

Here he is studying in sports leadership, communications and computers.

Learning more thoroughly the rules of the game is something that greater emphasis is being put on these days at the club, and with the rest of the trainees Neil is preparing to sit his referee's examinations.

"I always wanted to be a professional footballer," says Neil who went on: "I just hope that I can go on and progress to full professional level."

Unlike so many of his team-mates Neil is not in digs in Ipswich, preferring to commute every day by train from his Chelmsford home.



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The Mad Hatter who is full of confidence

No one is looking forward to tonight's Littlewood's Cup tie more than Robert Hadgraft, a lifelong Luton Town supporter, but who, somewhat ironically, lives within sight of the Portman Road flood-lights.

Robert, 31, is a sports journalist employed by the East Anglian Daily Times and covers Colchester United for the paper, but he is also a season-ticket holder and shareholder at Luton.

"Ipswich against Luton is the most important match for me" says Robert (pictured above) as a Mad Hatter, the outfit he wore when taking part in this year's London Marathon.

Born very close to Luton's Kenilworth Road ground and brought up in Bedfordshire, his father Bob used to take him to watch matches as a toddler.

"My earliest memory is of kicking a ball underneath the stand as a three-year-old. Even when we moved to East Anglia I always stayed loyal to Luton despite all the barracking I take."

Disappointed when Ipswich were relegated from the First Division, Robert was delighted when the teams were drawn together in the Littlewoods Cup.

"There will be a family split over this match" admits Robert "because my father and brother Paul are both Ipswich supporters."

Covering Colchester has a distinct advantage because most of the U's matches are played on a Friday night which enables Robert to see more of Luton than he might have expected.

The 180 mile round trip does not worry him in the least and he says: "It's worth driving all that way to watch them because they always play good football. I used to get some stick when Luton lost, but now it's the business of the artificial

pitch and the ban on away supporters."

Robert, who remembers when Billy Bingham (now the Northern Ireland manager) was the folk hero at Kenilworth Road, worked for the club for a while on their electronic scoreboard and also wrote a column in Luton's first season back in the First Division in 1982-83.

He only has to walk out into his back garden to get the "feel" of a piece of Luton. He said: "When the club decided to lay an artificial pitch, I was determined to have a piece of the turf. When the final whistle went after the last game of the season against Everton, many people, myself included, raced onto the pitch and grab a piece of turf.

"A little while later the turf went on sale, but I had got my piece in my pocket and brought it back to Ipswich to lay in my garden."

He admits that "people think I am


mad to go all the way to Luton when there's a team on my doorstep, but I have no intention of changing."

He has some fond memories of Luton, especially the 1981-82 season when the club romped away with the Second Division title. He regards as a "bit special" Boxing Day, 1974 when Luton won 1-0 at Portman Road with a goal from Ron Futcher on his debut. Ipswich were then top of the First Division and Luton were rock bottom.

Tonight he will be on the terraces among the many regulars from Kenilworth Road, and he has no doubts about the outcome."


"I'm very confident Luton will win," says Robert. "Having seen both teams this year, I think there's a difference in class. If Luton hit their top form, they will cruise through."

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
OFF THE PITCH

TOP MARKS Brennan has made most appearances

Although only just turned 22 Mark Brennan has made the most senior appearances of anybody presently at the club with 190 games behind him.

Making his debut at the age of 18 against Arsenal, the former England Under 21 international is very much a seasoned campaigner at Portman Road where he used to be considered one of the babies of the side.

Not surprisingly this tough and competitive schemer misses the bright lights of the First Division, but he has knuckled down to life in the Second and is enjoying his role in the new look John Duncan side.

"I miss going to all the big grounds such as Manchester United and Arsenal, but then again who wouldn't," says Mark. He quickly added: "But it would be nice to think that next year we can be back at these places as a team again".

And Mark is hoping to score more goals than ever this season as his club bid to get back into the top flight.

The scorer of nine last term, the Lancashire born Brennan has set his sights on topping the 15 mark in a campaign where so far he feels the best side Town have played against is Hull City.

"They have got a good team and also work very, very hard for each other," says Mark whose own midfield game is based on a mountain of hard work which can sometimes be underrated.

"At the start of the season I wasn't possibly getting as forward as much as many of the supporters liked," explains Mark who went on: "But at that stage we were working things out and now I feel that I am managing to get into the final third a whole lot more."

He continued: "I like to go forward and get in cracks at goal as much as possible. But in my position you have to be in the

thick of things at both ends and in the middle."

Taking time to adapt to the different style of the Second Division which at first looked unsuitable to his more cultured passing style of play, this powerful midfield general was this season given the honour of captaining the side in the ab-

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sence of both Ian Atkins and Ian Cranson.

"That was a great honour and I enjoyed the experience very much," says Mark who was asked to lead the side out by manager John Duncan shortly before the start of the home Littlewoods Cup game with Northampton.

Looking forward to the rest of the season, Mark has seen nothing in the division so far that makes him feel that promotion cannot be achieved.

"We have nothing to fear. There is a great team spirit in the dressing room," continued a player who away from football likes nothing more than to get out on the golf course.

An 18 handicapper, Mark is not a member of a club but hopes to be joining one soon.

WELCOME LUTON TOWN

Controversy follows Luton Town because of their decisions in recent years to install an artificial playing surface and introduce a membership scheme which resulted in a ban on away supporters.

But on the pitch itself, Luton continued to play entertaining football — a hallmark of their game down the years.

Luton are indeed welcome visitors for tonight's big Littlewoods Cup-tie, and the man in charge needs little introduction. **Ray Harford** finished his playing career down the road at Colchester United before the Layer Road club offered him his first coaching post.

Ray has gone from strength to strength and is now regarded as one of the brightest managers in the game. From Colchester he went to Fulham where he was number two to Malcolm Macdonald before being appointed manager himself.

Moved to Luton in the summer of 1986 as first team coach and when manager John Moore decided to pack it in at the end of last season, Ray was the natural successor.

His first move was to appoint club captain **Steve Foster** as player/coach in recognition of the former England international's exceptional qualities of leadership.

Foster was signed by Luton in December, 1984 for £70,000 from Aston Villa, and he has proved a bargain buy. Made his name at Brighton where in his four years spell played in the 1982 World Cup in Spain and also in the F.A. Cup Final a year later.

Steve, the pioneer of the headband which Ipswich captain Ian Cranson is now forced to wear,

still leads the Hatters from the heart of the defence where he has developed a long and successful partnership with Northern Ireland stalwart, **Mal Donagh**.

Ever present for six of the last nine seasons, Donagh has made close on 450 appearances for the club since being signed by former manager David Pleat for £20,000 from Larne in 1978. Luton's most capped international player with over 50 caps and two World Cup campaigns under his belt.

Right-back **Tim Breacker** has established himself in the team ever since he made his debut at Portman Road three years ago. Capped by England at under-21 level, he can also play in midfield, but his best position is in defence.

Ashley Grimes, now 30, is a versatile player who has been playing at left-back this season. But with recent signing **Ian Allinson**, the former Colchester winger who joined the club from Stoke last month, cup-tied, Grimes is likely to play in midfield.

Rob Johnson's career was held back by two serious knee injuries, but he fought back to make his debut in 1983 and last season enjoyed a good run at left-back.

Behind this talented back four is goalkeeper **Les Sealey**, who was signed from Coventry for £100,000 in August, 1983. Although born in the East End of London, he made his name at Coventry where he played 178 games before joining Luton.

He has been first choice for more than the past two seasons, and recently signed a three-year contract. Sealey's form has meant few chances for **Andy Dibble**, capped twice at full level by Wales, but having to spend his time in the Reserves.

Luton have been forced to chop and change in midfield this season. Peter Nicholas, the Welsh international, was sold to Aberdeen just after the start of the season for £300,000 while England international **Ricky Hill** and **David Preece** have been sidelined by injury for some time.

The absence of both Hill and Preece have hit Luton hard and one of the reasons why Ray Harford paid Stoke £10,000 for Ian Allinson recently.

Harford's first major signing when he took over was to bring **Danny Wilson**, who qualifies for Northern Ireland through parentage and made three international appearances last season, from Brighton after the Seagulls had been relegated to the Third Division.

born, was signed from Oldham early last season for £87,000. Scored on his debut for Oldham in December, 1980 thus joining an exclusive club.

Grimes, who also plays on the left-hand side of midfield, spent the early part of his career with Manchester United before being transferred to Coventry in 1983. Joined Luton a year later in a straight swap with Kirk Stephens, but was plagued by injury in his first two seasons at Kenilworth Road.

The player Ipswich will have to keep a close rein on tonight is striker **Mick Harford**, who was Luton's record cash signing when he was signed from Birmingham for £250,000 in December, 1984.

Recently turned down a £1 million move to West Ham, Harford is regarded as one of the best strikers in the game and unlucky not to have been capped by England at full level.

He has scored five goals to date in this season's Littlewoods Cup with a hat-trick in the second leg of the second round against Wigan and two more against

Coventry in the last round, but also missed a penalty.

His striking partner is **Brian Stein**, South African-born, who has been with the club for ten years. Currently enjoying a deserved Testimonial season, he was capped by England at full level on just one occasion against France in the 1983-84 season.

Ray Harford strengthened his squad when he paid Hibernian £220,000 for **Micky Weir**, the fee decided by a tribunal. Scored on his debut against Wigan in the Littlewoods Cup and got another in the 3-1 third round win over Coventry.

Brian Stein's brother **Mark** is a valuable squad player who made his first team debut in January, 1984, but who has never been able to command a regular place.

Nigerian international **Emeka Nwajiobi**, who burst onto the scene with a scoring debut against Nottingham Forest in January, 1984, is unpredictable, but can be a matchwinner on his day.

Luton-born **Stacey North** is regarded as Steve Foster's

deputy, while **Richard Harvey**, who toured South America with the England under-19 squad, made his breakthrough last season.

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




