

CHIT CHAT



Follow the Hatters!

Reading Andrew Jamieson's excellent 'Chit-Chat' on the importance of local pride within football in the Liverpool programme brought a smile to my face whilst sitting on the train home. Yet behind the humour of Tottenham's 'flared collars' and Chelsea's 'duvet covers' lurks a serious message for the game today.

If football is to remain the national game in times to come, then a greater sense of respect must come the way of the people who pay at the gate every Saturday afternoon. The true football fan is a dying breed - a glance at falling attendance figures (not just at Kenilworth Road, but from the Kop to the Valley) will confirm that - but he is far from extinct. Admittedly, the advent of hooliganism has played its part in accelerating the demise, but the clubs themselves are in no way innocent.

Local pride is important in football, as Andrew Jamieson rightly pointed out, yet times have changed and the game has long since shed its tag as an integrated part of the British male urban psyche. The money-makers who surround the game, of course, have been quick to realise this, and sponsors and kit manufacturers have capitalised on what essentially is nothing more than the fan's love of the game. Yet surely that fan deserves more than a new 'duvet cover' in return? The fact is that whilst the game, and its

associate enterprises, has played with the times, the fan has been left still changing in the dressing rooms and, what's more, changing into 1970's-style cotton round-neck shirts.

That is why it is encouraging to see clubs like the Town not just providing better facilities for fans to watch football every Saturday, but also giving them the chance to share in the affairs of the club they donate so much time and love to. For instance, in the holding of 'open' meetings throughout the season, where ordinary members of the public can air their views about the game on a more audible platform than the terraces!

If this can be achieved and at the same time local traditions kept alive, such as in the preserving of traditional club badges, then football will be rewarded with the support it deserves. If it can't then the game will see harsher times yet. Let's hope at least more people follow some of the examples set by the Hatters in the future - in looking after their supporters.

Luton Town 1 Norwich City 2


After taking a 20th minute lead through Brian Stein, the Town looked set to sweep to a convincing victory and extend their run of wins to six when they met Norwich here at Kenilworth Road on December 5. But a low-key second half, in which nothing went right, saw the Town fall away badly and the Canaries score twice to record their first victory in nine outings.

Stein struck to complete a smooth passing movement involving himself, Emeka Nwajiobi and Darron McDonough. Unlucky Emeka was later to go off with a fractured ankle and will be out for three months...the final blow on a day when everything went wrong. "In the end, I think we were flattered by the scoreline," said Town manager Ray Harford.

Norwich replied after the interval with a spirited display and goals from Dale Gordon and Ian Crook, the second a lob over Les Sealey when the Town defence was torn open two minutes from time.

FOOTBALL FOCUS

Jim Ryan



Reserve team coach Jim Ryan grew up in Scotland and developed a deep love of football and the game's star players as a boy. He was an avid reader in the age before televised sport. Today, in Football Focus, he reflects on the big changes in the presentation of sports heroes in the national press:

What have they done to my heroes?

"The heroes of my Caledonian youth were people like Jim Baxter, Dave Mackay and Alex Young. "Slim Jim" Baxter, the first footballer I ever heard described as elegant, able to beat opponents with "contemptuous ease", the man whose left foot sent "guided missiles" into the heart of the opposing defences...he played the game with an "arrogance based on a total belief in his own abilities."

"Dave Mackay was different. Mackay was "indomitable." Not so much a man as a "human tank." There was a school of thought at the time that believed that "given a decent goalkeeper, Mackay could beat most teams in Scotland on his own."

"It was a well-known fact that when Dave Mackay tackled you, your body shuddered "with the impact for minutes afterwards."

"Almost diametrically opposed to Mackay was the "Golden Vision" Alex Young. Alex was "silky smooth" a man who could "slice open defences with the skill of a surgeon." He was "poetry in motion" was Alex Young. He was a man who appeared to play football "bathed in a radiant light."

"True heroes all, for a football-crazy youngster. But the strange thing about my heroes was that, coming from a poor mining family, I could hardly ever afford to go and see them play. And we had no television in those days. My heroes were created and brought to life for me in the pages of the national newspapers."

"The phrases describing the players above are not mine but those of countless newspaper reporters. They were descriptions written by enthusiasts. Descriptions which fired the imaginations of little boys and their fathers all over the country."

"Those reporters created heroes in my mind and for that I will always be grateful. What a lovely

business to be in - the business of creating heroes.

"But times change! Nowadays, it seems the press are in the opposite business...the destruction of heroes. The downfall of heroes. This scandal, that scandal. We are being given unpleasant accounts of people and attacks on our heroes."

"Our heroes, in all sports, are merely human after all, we are told. So they cease to be my heroes any more. Heroes are allowed to be many things, but not human. Then they are but merely names."

"And 'names' just do not excite me as much as my heroes did. Not like Mackay, Baxter and Young. So, my plea this Christmas is to the hearts of the gentlemen of the press - go ahead, please, and create heroes again. Create more and more heroes, but stop destroying them. They feed our imaginations, our heroes, and we need them."



We felt Ray fully deserved the award.





with Steve Foster

Club captain and player coach Steve Foster was on the mark with the winning goal at Watford last Saturday. He headed in during the first half from a free kick by Danny Wilson. After an inconsistent start to the season, Steve and the lads have found a streak of good form and results. In Dressing Room Talk tonight, Steve reflects on the team's progress this season and his hopes for the New Year:

Hard work pays off

"Like all professional players, we know we shall be away for most of the time at Christmas and the New Year, but just get on with it and enjoy the football. With the team going well at the moment and everyone working very hard, we are looking forward to trying to get a few more good results.



INTRODUCING...

SOUTHAMPTON


Welcome to Southampton, who have taken just one point from their last four visits and have conceded 16 goals in the process. They are currently in mid-table, but their recent win at Arsenal – and a 2-2 draw with Liverpool showed just what they are capable of.

Founded in 1885, they were known first as Southampton St. Mary's and won the Hampshire Junior Cup in 1887-8, repeated the feat the next two seasons and graduated to win the Hampshire Senior Cup in 1890-1. Four seasons later, they joined the Southern League and topped the table in 1896-7 and again the next two seasons.

Though not yet in the Football League, they took Nottingham Forest to a replay in the 1896-7 FA Cup semi-final and went down to Bury in the 1899-1900 final

'they took Sheffield United to a replay in the 1901-02 Cup final'

By the time they became founder-members of Division Three in 1920-1, they had won another three Southern League Championships and had taken Sheffield United to a replay in the 1901-2 FA Cup final. In their first season in Division Three, they were pipped for promotion by Crystal Palace, but a season later they topped Division Three (South). As members of Division Two, they beat Liverpool en route to the 1924-5 FA Cup final in which they went down to Sheffield United.

They missed promotion to Division One by four points in 1947-8 and by one point in 1948-9 after looking certain to go up with a month to go. They had to wait until 1966 for their first taste of Division One and by then they had returned to Division Three (South) again from 1954 to 1960.

They returned to Division Two with Terry Paine coming up to his prime, soon to be joined by ace strikers George Kirby and Martin Chivers. Mike Channon had just earned a first team place too by the time they won promotion to Division One in 1966. Once there, they held their place largely to the remarkable goalscoring of Ron Davies.

They lost their First Division place in 1974 but 1975-6 saw them winning the FA Cup for the first time against Manchester United. It was not until 1978 that they regained their First Division place, but in their first season back, they reached the League Cup final and in their best-ever season in 1983-4 they were runners-up to Liverpool and reached the FA Cup semi-finals.

Since then, they have finished fifth, 14th and 12th in Division One, ending last season with an unbeaten run of twelve games.



Chris Nicholl, the one-time Town centre-half who became a regular in the Northern Ireland team for many years, is the man in charge of Southampton. He took over when former Saints boss Lawrie McMenemy left to move on to Sunderland. As a tall and commanding centre-half, Nicholl was one of the favourites at Kenilworth Road alongside Malcolm Macdonald and Co. He played for Northern Ireland, in the same team as Mal Donaghy, during the 1982 World Cup finals. As manager, he has helped rebuild the Saints team in recent seasons into an entertaining and established First Division force.

'Burridge is now with his 10th league club in a chequered career'

This season they have won at Norwich, Coventry and Arsenal and have drawn at Portsmouth, Nottingham Forest and Charlton. At home, they have beaten Watford, Chelsea and Oxford and lost to QPR, Everton and Derby.

In the first part of the season, Northern Ireland cap **Colin Clarke** was their most regular scorer in away games while in recent weeks home-grown England cap **Danny Wallace** has been the man on the mark.

Graham Baker has returned from Manchester City this season to resume his place in midfield alongside **Andy Townsend** (ex Weymouth), **Lenn Cockerill** (ex-Lincoln, Swindon and Sheffield United) and **Jimmy Case**, the one-time Liverpool man who came from Brighton two seasons ago.

In defence, **Kevin Bond** (ex-Norwich and Manchester City) links up with **Kevin Moore** (new this season from Oldham, after many years with Crimsby), while on the flanks **Gerry Forrest** came from Rotherham two years ago and **Derek Statham** arrived from West Brom this season.

In goal, **John Burridge**, who broke into league football with Workington in 1968-9 is now with his 10th Football League club and recently took over from **Tim Flowers**, who succeeded him at Wolves a few years ago and is actually 16 years younger.





He agreed Luton should have gone ahead after only four minutes when Ian Allinson's shot hit the bar and appeared to cross the line."

LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

RIOCH THE HERO OF A CHAMPAGNE SEASON

If ever a season dawned full of optimism it was 1967-68 for with an encouraging end to the previous campaign and with the squad strengthened by such players as Terry Branston, Bill McDerment and Rodney Green much was expected by the success starved Town faithful, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The first match was away to Wrexham who boasted an unbeaten home record the previous season and who took the lead shortly after Brian Johnson, a half-time substitute for Alan Slough, was carried off injured.

Luton were reduced still further when Graham French was sent off with Wrexham's Terry Bradbury for fighting, but still managed to secure a draw when Rodney Green netted two minutes from time.

The opening home games saw competent Luton displays with wins over Barnsley, Hartlepool and York but the public certainly began to sit up and look when manager Allan Brown, in order to solve his striker problem with Green sidelined with cartilage trouble went to Derby to pay out £11,000 for Ian Buxton.

'Buxton made his debut at home in a 3-1 win over Southend'

Buxton made his debut at home to Southend and a crowd of 13,332 turned up to see a 3-1 Town win.

The long-awaited first away win came on 7th October when the Town won 3-1 at Chester, thus in seven away games equalling their away points total for the whole of 1966-67.

The victory then set up a run of eight consecutive wins including 5-0 at Exeter, 5-3 at home to Doncaster and 4-0 home wins over Workington and Swansea, the latter game seeing Luton score all four in six minutes near the end.

A defeat at Valley Parade against fellow promotion contenders Bradford City brought the run to an end but as Christmas approached the Town still boasted a 100 per cent home record and a crowd of 16,599, the best for three years saw Luton's eleventh straight home win when Bradford P.A. were seen off 2-0 on Boxing Day.

Luton faltered slightly after that win as they lost in quick succession at Bradford, in the return, and then at snowy Hartlepool, both by 2-1. There then followed the dropping of the first home point of the season when Newport hung on to a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road.

The winning trail was soon resumed, however, when Rochdale were thrashed 4-1 at Kenilworth Road with all the goals coming in the first half. The Luton display was irresistible that day and emphasised the all-round teamwork that had been coached by Allan Brown and Doug Davidson. The power play of Bruce Rioch, the wing wizardry of

Graham French and the sound captaincy of Terry Branston combining to devastating effect.

The just reward was gained the following week when the Town won 2-0 at Brentford to go top of the league for the first time – a position that would have been achieved sooner had the Town played as many matches as their rivals.

The toughest game of the season was seen to be the visit to Chesterfield but the 14,075 crowd at (Saltergate) were silenced as Luton held out quite comfortably for a 0-0 draw. Soon after followed a memorable 1-0 win at Aldershot, courtesy of Ian Buxton, in a game we thought would never be played as it had been postponed twice before due to the weather.

Easter arrived and the Town gave their normal displays reserved for this time of year. Although no defeats were suffered a lacklustre 2-0 home win over Notts County, a 0-0 home draw with Chester followed by a 2-2 draw in the return at Meadow Lane after Luton had been 2-0 up were not what the fans expected.


All this was forgotten, however, the following week when a goal from Bruce Rioch gave the Town a 1-0 win at Halifax thus securing promotion with four games still to play.

'a night to remember as the Town clinched the title in true style'

A night to remember was conjured up the next Wednesday when Crewe, who were lying second in the table, were taken apart as the Town won 4-0 to clinch the championship. The 18,904 crowd refused to go home until the team had carried out a lap of honour but the champagne celebrations probably went too far as Bradford City became the only side to win at Kenilworth Road, three days later, to bolster up their own promotion chances.

The championship trophy was duly awarded at the last game of the season when Brentford were the visitors and it was fitting that the television cameras were there to record highlights of a game that the Town won 2-1, thus equalling the points record for the Division – 66.

To a lot of Luton supporters, this was the first bit of success encountered after the plummet from the First to Fourth Divisions in five years. Whether you were one of only 47 Luton fans witnessing the first away win at Chester, saw Bruce Rioch's volley in the 2-2 draw at Barnsley or enjoyed the marvellous occasion when the championship was won, it is true to say that the first successful season remains in the memory longest.


