# CHIT CHAT



**This one's on me!**

We are now into the New Year. What has it brought you? I hope the festive season, at least, brought you lots of fun, but not too many hangovers. It seems impossible nowadays to have a good time without alcohol; and we can even give added support to football by drinking. If we drink Fosters we might be helping the F.A. Cup because of sponsorship, and here in Bedfordshire we can drink Charles Wells' products and support Peterborough.

It's the big boys, though, who seem to benefit most from brewery sponsorship. Holsten are reputed to have backed Spurs to the tune of £1million over three years; and if you support Manchester United you can buy canned "Red Devil" - their own lager. The game needs as much sponsorship as it can get but I do wonder, sometimes, whether sponsorship from breweries is altogether ethical. After all, the government and others have made it clear that alcohol is a major factor in football's hooligan problems. We cannot buy alcoholic drinks in many football grounds now,

and certainly not in sight of the pitch. We all know alcohol makes us feel more relaxed and, as a result, our behaviour is less restrained and it is this that allows the natural aggression of some young men to become dominant.

Some research was carried out a few years ago where alcohol free lager replaced the real stuff at a football club's bar, unbeknown to the supporters. The behaviour of the fans showed exactly the same high spirits and verbal aggression as when alcohol had been sold. So perhaps it's not the alcohol but the atmosphere of the game that gives us a "high".

Nevertheless, alcohol can cause health problems and, like tobacco products, is, I think, a questionable source of sponsorship for any activity whose image is health and fitness, such as sport. What are your views?

An accomplished all-round team performance finished off with a fine headed third goal, by Mick Harford, sent the Town into 1988 as the First Division's first winners on New Year's Day. The early start did not seem to agree with Chelsea who were a pale shadow of many of their former teams and submitted to defeat with little real fight.

A careless back pass by Clive Wilson supplied the Town with the best possible start after 13 minutes. Mark Stein snapped it up, picked his spot and scored his fourth goal of the season.

Brian Stein scored the Town's second. Chelsea failed to clear the ball after a Town attack five minutes into the second half. Tim Breacker hit a great ball forward and Brian nipped in to lob Chelsea goalkeeper Roger Freestone in class style.

Breacker was the provider of the third goal after 64 minutes. He broke down the right wing, ran direct to the line and hit a perfect deep cross for Harford to power in a great header at the far post. It was all over for Chelsea and as a contest.

# FOOTBALL FOCUS

Geoff Evans



Long-serving Town fan Geoff Evans will face a night of mixed emotions when his two favourite football clubs meet in a Littlewoods Cup quarter-final here on Tuesday, January 19. In Football Focus, he explains why:

## Hatters and Bantams will be tearing my heart apart!

"Although Luton have been my 'first-love' as soccer teams go, - and have been for some 22 years, I enjoy watching football matches at all levels whenever 'The Town' are not in action.

"My work commitments take me frequently into the Pennine towns and Cities, where, after carrying out my business duties I'm often able to take in matches at such places as Halifax, Barnsley, Huddersfield, Leeds or Bradford. In fact, over the past five years or so I would say that 'The Bantams' have become my second favourite soccer team.

"When the name 'Bradford City' is mentioned most people automatically turn their thoughts to that awful fire disaster. My recollections though are for a side similar to the Town climbing from the depths of the lower divisions and becoming a good footballing side who have their sights firmly set on the very top.

"Under managers such as Roy McFarland, Mick Jones and then Trevor Cherry, and more recently Terry Dolan, I've watched players like Stuart McCall and John Hendrie develop into footballers who, in my mind, will be at the 'hub' of Scotland's next World-Cup challenge.

"Even when the club were struggling last season, it wasn't difficult to see that 'City' had the basis of a very good side. I felt very sorry for Trevor Cherry when he was sacked as his team languished near to the relegation places in the second division.

"What didn't help his cause was the fact that most 'home' games were being played away from their ground of Valley Parade, either at Leeds Road, Elland Road or the huge 'soup-bowl' Odsal, although a great stadium, has no atmosphere - when only a fraction of the ground is full of spectators. Obviously

the team suffered and the results at that time proved this. When City did move back into their rebuilt ground it obviously took time to readjust to the more enclosed atmosphere. Many Bradford fans felt these factors were not taken into consideration when Mr Cherry was dismissed.

"But that must not take any credit away from Terry Dolan and Stan Ternent for the job they have done since taking over.

"The use of three central defenders with Dave Evans acting as 'sweeper' behind Gavin Oliver and firstly Tony Clegs, and more recently Lee Sinott, have made all the difference to their once-leaky defence. I've also been impressed by City with the way their attacking full-backs Brian Mitchell and Karl Goddard, and more recently Steve Staunton get forward into supporting positions. Similar, in fact, to the way our own Ray Harford encourages Tim Breacker and Ashley Grimes or Rob Johnson to go!

"Yes, I'll have very mixed feelings when the Town entertain City next week for a Littlewoods Cup semi-final place. Obviously I want the Hatters to win and believe they will, but I know it's going to be some game to stop the tenacious and speedy Bantams McCall and Hendrie and that goal poacher extraordinaire former Town favourite Ron Futcher.

"At the end of the day, I want to see a good footballing game, conducted in a sporting manner, even taking into account the tension that will obviously be present. I am sure we are all in for a footballing treat. City will obtain their main 'goal' next May - that being promotion and next season we'll all be able to watch these super teams 'do battle' once more!

After the excitement of the FA Cup, we return to league action this afternoon with the visit of Derby County. We were very pleased to win at Hartlepool where we faced a difficult tie and, incidentally, enjoyed tremendous hospitality.

When the match was over, we were very keen to see all the other results and in particular Everton's as we were due to visit them in the Simod Cup last Tuesday. They drew at Sheffield Wednesday, of course, and faced a replay which meant the postponement of our trip to Goodison.

**Pleased**

As a result, we remain alive and kicking in three Cup competitions this season but will be without Mick Harford's services this afternoon. If he had met Everton, that match would have served as the second in Mick's two-match suspension.

We were pleased with the fourth round draw. Southampton are known opponents. Our manager Ray Harford told me he is always pleased to be in this situation as he prefers to know the opposition.

The tie against Southampton will be all-ticket, but there will be up to

2,000 standing Southampton supporters at the match. This is thanks to the FA's continuing support of our experimental scheme. It seems, sometimes, that we are playing to three different sets of rules with our membership scheme - and we are.

In the league, we maintain the scheme in full. In the Littlewoods Cup, the visitors can claim up to a full allocation and in the FA Cup, they are restricted to 2,000 standing places only. These visitors must be season ticket holders or members of the visitors' club. All Cup-tie arrangements are subject to police approval.







## David hoping for a change of luck





# DRESSING ROOM

with Ashley Grimes

*After holding down the left-back spot for most of the season, Ashley has been hit in recent weeks by a series of niggling ankle and Achilles tendon injuries. But he is aiming to get fit again as soon as possible and go for a special treble in 1988, as he says in today's Dressing Room Talk:*

## My special treble

"The main thing I am looking for in the New Year is an injury-free run so I have a good chance to go for my special treble. That is the Littlewoods Cup, the European Championship finals and a baby - my wife Joanne is expecting our first in April. It could be a very exciting Spring, couldn't it?"

"There is no special feeling really about the Littlewoods Cup. Most of the lads have been so busy thinking about all the league matches in the last few weeks that we haven't had much of a chance to consider it. But I suppose it is there in the back of our minds after having such a good run so far.

"I reckon I have got a fairly good chance of being in West Germany for the European finals with the Republic of Ireland. I hope to be able to squeeze into the squad, but of course you never know. All I want to do is avoid injuries, get fit and play well so that I have a good chance.

"The spirit in the Irish squad is great. Just like it is here. There is always a great family atmosphere when you have a lot of good honest lads working hard together. We all work for each other at Luton and in the Irish squad.

"Of course, the tactics are a bit different. To start with it is international football with the Republic of Ireland and

Jack Charlton also likes us to get the ball into the opposition's half of the pitch as quickly as we can. That is a quite different approach from most European teams.

"I am 30 now so thoughts of the World Cup could be a bit ambitious. But I believe I have another five or six years left in me. Don't forget Billy Bonds is 41 and Ossie Ardiles is well into his thirties. They show it can be done.

"A lot of nonsense is talked about old players and their legs going when they get past 30. Look at Ed Moses. He is still trying to win races and aiming for the next Olympics too. If you look after yourself you can go on longer.

"I thought Billy Bonds was terrific for West Ham against us and a great example to everyone. There was no question about him at all. A real professional and one for all the youngsters to watch."



Visiting standing supporters, up to a limit of 2,000, will be accommodated in the K1 section at the Kenilworth Road end.




# CLUB COMMENT



# INTRODUCING...

## DERBY COUNTY

Welcome to Derby County, currently battling to establish themselves back in Division One after their meteoric rise of recent seasons. It is hard to believe that it is just six seasons since we beat them 3-2 here in their last visit. Since then, they have slipped into Division Three and come close to financial extinction. Happily, they are now on a firmer basis both on and off the field.

Though a local railway side, Derby Midland, had played in the FA Cup at an earlier date, it was in 1884 that Derby County were formed largely on the initiative of a member of the Derbyshire County Cricket Club committee.

A year later, they chalked up their first notable win, a 2-0 success over Aston Villa in the second round of the FA Cup. And in 1888 they became one of the 12 founder-members of the Football League.

They remained in the top division until 1906. Their players of that era included defender Steve Bloomer who scored 331 goals for them in 524 games before the First World War.

They reached the semi-final of the FA Cup four times and the final twice in the 1890's and, though they had two short spells in Division Two before the First World War and two more between the wars, they were a consistent First Division team with a flair for attacking football.

In the thirties, two of the most prolific strikers of all time, Hughie Gallacher and Jack Bowers wore their colours. But it


was not until the first post-war FA Cup competition that they won their first major honours, beating Charlton 4-1 at Wembley with a side that included those ace forwards Raich Carter and Peter Doherty.

Then came a decline. They were out of Division One between 1953 and 1968, even slipping for two seasons to the Old Division Three (North). They were jogging along in the Second Division when, in 1967, Brian Clough and Peter Taylor were in charge. They embarked on a remarkable run with promotion in 1969 a First Division Championship in 1972 and a European Cup semi-final appearance in 1973.

Later that year came the shock resignation of Clough and Taylor and though Derby managed to win another First Division Championship under Dave Mackay in 1975 an alarming slide began. Managers came and went with Colin Murphy, Tommy Docherty and Colin Addison all having little success as they slid to Division Two in 1980. Then Johnny Newman and Peter Taylor (back on his own this time) could not prevent them slipping to Division Three in 1984.

At this stage, Arthur Cox took over as manager and, with former secretary Stuart Webb and the Maxwell family masterminding a financial rescue, they picked up both on and off the field. They were seventh in Division Three in 1984-85 and won promotion a season later, pipping Wigan to third place in the final run-in.

Last season, the momentum was maintained as after an uncertain start they put together an unbeaten run of 19 league games between December and March and then held on to top place with a finishing burst of five wins in six games.

Arthur Cox may have a reputation for being one of soccer's fiercest sergeant-major figures, but he is also one of the games most respected coaches and an astute manager.

Having shown his ability in the lower divisions, he came to the fore when he took charge at Newcastle United and signed Kevin Keegan. Together, they inspired the Magpies back to Division One. Cox has done the same at Derby where, with Robert Maxwell's backing, he has put the club back on the map and pulled off a transfer coup with the arrival of Peter Shilton.

### 'Derby have suffered a remarkable run of five 2-1 defeats'

They kicked off this season with a 1-0 win over us and then proceed to lose only one of their first seven away games. Their home form was however rather shaky with 1-0 defeats by Wimbledon, Oxford and Nottingham Forest. But since winning at Southampton, at the end of November, things have gone adrift with a draw at home to Watford and remarkably five successive 2-1 defeats - at Swindon in the Simod Cup, at Sheffield Wednesday and Wimbledon in Division One and in home games with Spurs and Norwich.

Striker Bobby Davison has been clearly missed since his move to Leeds and Rams will be hoping that Phil Gee, who hit 17 goals in his first full season in 1986-87, can recover his scoring touch. Local lad Brian McCord, who made his debut recently, and Nigel Callaghan, who came from Watford last season, may also be looking for goals today.

In midfield, John Gregory the former England man who has seen service with Aston Villa, Northampton, Brighton and QPR, scored the match-winner against us in August and may be a danger.

Linking up with him, we may see David Penney, a former Pontefract man in his first full season, and Geraint Williams (from Bristol Rovers two years ago).

In defence, England man Mark Wright cost £750,000 when moving from Southampton during the close season and he is likely to be linking up with Paul Blades, a former England Yough cap. On the flanks, Ross MacLaren came from Shrewsbury two years ago and Mick Forsyth came from West Bromwich last season.

In goal, Peter Shilton is still going strong after around 990 league and Cup games, this being his first season at Derby after distinguished service with Leicester, Stoke, Nottingham Forest and Southampton not to mention England.







## STEIN GOAL GRABS A POINT

Mark Stein's late equaliser ensured a point for the Town when they drew 1-1 at Upton Park against West Ham on January 2. On a wet and heavy pitch, a thrilling match kept the fans and the media excited. Here is a selection of comments which produced two wins, one draw and one defeat:

**Sunday Mirror:** "Substitute Paul Ince fired Hammers into a 60th minute lead, but Luton almost had the last word after Mark Stein plundered the equaliser 13 minutes from time. Only an instinctive save by Tom McAlister denied Stein."

**Sunday Express:** "Luton striker Mark Stein's flair and zest brought further frustration to West Ham. The Hammers, looking to complete their holiday programme on a winning note after three successive defeats, were pegged back to a point by Stein's 76th minute equaliser."

# LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

## DERBY WELCOME FOR ONLY OUR NINTH MEETING IN A LONG AND EXCITING HISTORY

We welcome Derby County to Kenilworth Road today for only the ninth time in a League fixture which is quite remarkable as both clubs have been in existence for over 100 years, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Our first meeting took place at the Baseball Ground on 14th November 1953 when newly relegated Derby were beaten 2-1, both goals coming from winger Bert Mitchell.

The Club Notes from the Luton programme of the following week make interesting reading due to the lack of sympathy shown towards a "Rams" side obviously having problems. "We enjoyed our second away success of the season at the expense of Derby last Saturday, a success most richly deserved on the run of play.

### 'Bob Morton and John Downie scored as Town won again'

Certainly if we played here at Kenilworth Road as poorly as this Derby side we should be very worried indeed, for it was apparent we had not met the County on just one of those off days; they lacked sparkle, confidence and the ability to work the ball.

The days of Raich Carter and Peter Doherty are now just dreams and some hard thinking will have to be done soon if further relegation is to be avoided."

Does anyone know who penned the programme "Club Notes" in the fifties as the correspondent makes the likes of Oliver Phillips of the "Watford Observer" seem positively impartial!

In the return at Kenilworth Road the Town repeated the scoreline with the goals this time being scored by Bob Morton and John Downie.

The following year saw the Town promoted to Division One and Derby relegated to Division Three North and it was no surprise when Luton won the home game 2-0 through goals by Bob Morton and Jesse Pye. A bombshell was dropped after this match when crowd favourite Pye asked for a transfer and was subsequently signed by the "Rams".

His promptings, unfortunately, were wasted as by the time of the return, played on 2nd March 1955, Derby were anchored to the bottom of the table and a crowd of only 5987 witnessed a dismal 0-0 draw.

We did not meet again until our relegation from Division One but this time the boot was on the other foot as we were thrashed 4-1 at Derby on 15th October 1960 in a game marking the last appearance of goalkeeper Alan Collier. The next season we did a little better in only losing 2-0 at the Baseball Ground but followed it up with a crushing 4-2 home win with goals from Harry Walden, Alec Ashworth and a brace from Tom McKechnie to send a 15380 crowd home happy.

Season 1962-63 was the Town's turn to suffer relegation to Division Three and in proper fashion Derby were able to do the double winning 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in a game marking the final appearance of Jim Fleming and 1-0 at the Baseball Ground where the Town were effectively down to 10 men for the final hour following an injury to Brendan McNally.

Eleven years were to pass before paths crossed again but this time the clubs were both in Division One albeit for only one season as far as the Town were concerned.

Derby visited Luton shortly before Christmas 1974 enjoying a position in the League where they were hard on the heels of the leaders. Luton on the other hand were bottom with only nine points to their credit after a run of six straight defeats.

It was therefore one of the surprises of the day when the Town won 1-0 courtesy of a Jim Ryan penalty to spark off a mini-revival of three wins on the trot. The penalty came about when Peter Spiring was fouled in the penalty area and breaking his toe in the process thus leaving the way clear for Lil Fuccillo to come on as substitute for his first Luton appearance.

When the return was played both the Town and Derby were going through "purple patches" and unfortunately it was the Luton record that had to go with the Rams winning 5-0 and Roger Davies scoring the lot and missing half a dozen more.

Another gap of five years were to elapse before the clubs met again, this time in Division Two and in an early season game played on 23rd August 1980 the Town went down unluckily 2-1 at Kenilworth Road after outplaying Derby especially in the first half when a Brian Stein goal had given us an early lead.

Derby equalised on the stroke of half time through Keith Osgood and with the Town pressing forward Dave Swindlehurst scored the winner thus ending the Towns 100% record and sending the 11025 crowd home frustrated.

The return at the Baseball Ground the following January produced a cracker for the television cameras as David Moss and Godfrey Ingram goals earned a 2-2 draw.

Season 1981-82 saw the Town win the Second Division Championship and a further parting of the ways with todays opponents. In the home game that season the Town won 3-2 in a contest more one-sided than the scoreline suggests with goals from Moss, Clive Goodyear and Mal Donaghy followed by a 0-0 draw at the Baseball Ground in a game marking the debut of Richard Money.


