Dear Sir,
I was totally amused listening to Saturdays radio cup reports from various grounds around the country. Ground conditions were described in various manners ranging from: a quagmire, a paddy field, a rice pudding, a farce, and it was a certain goal until the ball stuck in the mud.

What amused me? Well, I'm a Luton Town fan and the club has been ridiculed for our plastic pitch ever since it was laid – ridiculed by the very same people describing Saturdays "natural" conditions – and we haven't had any real winter yet!

I have long been of the opinion that if instead of the smaller clubs it had been the "super" clubs that had first introduced artificial surfaces the league by now would have issued directives to the effect that all grounds would have to have such surfaces by a certain date.

There have been times since we won through to the quarter finals of the Littlewoods Cup that I wondered whether this tie would be played at all! Certainly, having been drawn at home, it seemed unlikely that the Local Authority and the police would allow 3,500 visiting supporters. Fortunately for us Bradford City's fans have a good reputation and it seems that it is possible to erect temporary barriers, and so everyone is satisfied - at least as far as arrangements inside the ground are concerned. Outside, of course, has caused more controversy.

I'm still not sure why it should be like this. The match against Wigan, the first to which we officially welcomed away fans since our "ban", was peaceful enough. One elderly gentleman I saw, clutching umbrella and shopping bag, made the most of his evening as his bag disgorged a veritable picnic at half-time. He was on his own and obviously enjoyed himself, unmolested. Ironically, there were probably fewer away supporters that night than at any League game here for the last two years.

However, it's not just when we play the lowly clubs with few away fans that the atmosphere's so relaxed. At a recent First Division game, coinciding with the Christmas sales, I saw two supporters enter the ground clutching huge carriers containing the spoils of their bargain hunting. They viewed going to a match as simply part and parcel of their everyday lives. And that is how football should be: another form of entertainment that's as relaxed to attend and as much fun as going to the cinema or pub. It's a pity that clubs have to have membership schemes, or "lock in" away fans at the end of matches. But that is still the soccer climate in this country, and in Europe, too.

Tonight our sympathies extend to our guests from Bradford as we remember the tragic fire at their ground, and hope that we all have a peaceful and entertaining evening.

HAMMERS NAILED

West Ham 1 Luton Town 1

The Town completed their Christmas and New Year holiday programme with a well-deserved draw at Upton Park on January 2. In a thoroughly entertaining match on a wet pitch, a late goal by Mark Stein earned the Hatters a point after Hammers' substitute Paul Ince had beaten Les Sealey with a well-struck volley which escaped the goalkeeper's grasp.

The Town side was unchanged from that which had beaten Charlton and Chelsea in the two previous home matches, following the sad loss of Ricky Hill with a broken leg suffered at Everton. West Ham, desperate for a result after three successive defeats, played with furious effort inspired by veteran midfielder Billy Bonds MBE, but little fluency or belief.

Ince's goal came on the hour. He had replaced the unfortunate George Parris on the left of midfield after Parris was carried off with a broken right ankle. It set up a storming finish in which the Town levelled through Stein's close-range goal and might have won with several other efforts.

FOOTBALL FOCUS



Ron Howard

Chief scout Ron Howard has used a lifetime's experience in the game in his judgement and valuation of players all over the country. But he is nearly always most enthusiastic and excited when he uncovers a young talent who he feels will "make the grade". Ron is delighted to see so many young players at Kenilworth Road proving themselves successfully. And today, in Football Focus, he reflects on the current crop of youngsters as the season passes the half-way mark:

Delighted by youngsters' progress

"Having reached the half-way period in the season, I am pleased to report that the current crop of apprentice professionals are all making more than satisfactory progress. Our high standards at the club are being maintained.

"This is extremely encouraging. Already, in the last couple of seasons, home-grown players like Ricky McEvoy, Kingsley Black, Gary Cobb, Richard Harvey and David Oldfield have all made appearances in the senior side while Marvin Johnson has sat on the substitutes' bench.

"Others who look set to press hard and make a challenge in the near future include those who have already made the professional ranks like Ian Scott, Aaron Tighe, Sean Farrell, Colin Barker and Mick O'Brien.

"When consideration is taken of the fact that already many young second year trainees have made numerous appearances in the reserves side, it is easy to see that the future looks rosy. Indeed, it seems to be so promising that one is tempted to hope that the outlay of big fees for transfers can be kept to a minimum – so proving that all the hard work with the youngsters has been really worthwhile.

"It will have been noticed by our regular supporters that we have been acquiring a steady stream of young players from the Republic of Ireland. This is in no small way due to Eddie Corcovel who is in charge of our operation in that

country and with whom I have built up a very close working relationship following my journeys over the Irish Sea.

"The quality of players received has led to several making appearances for their country. Those currently involved are Neil Poutch and Mick O'Brien at youth level and Alan and Brian O'Sullivan and Ken Gillard at under-16 level.

"In Wales, mention must be made of our first class representative Cyril Beech who looks after all our schoolboy scouting in the south. Here again, the quality is of a high standard and against intense competition success only comes after constant hard work.

"At present, on the staff, we have Jason Rees and in their first year Kurt Nogan and Ceri Hughes. Two young 14-year-olds have just signed Associate Schoolboy forms and I am already excited at the prospect with several more as yet not old enough to sign.

"In our bordering counties, Ken Hoffman and Brian Bond operate and although only with us for a couple of seasons, Brian has already produced a trainee professional.

"Ken has been with the club for many years and his tireless efforts on our behalf have been invaluable. Let us hope that the flow of talent continues. I can assure our supporters every effort will be made to ensure that it does."

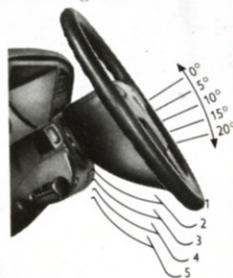

DRESSING ROOM

with Mark Stein

Young striker Mark Stein has fought his way into the first team on a regular basis this season and scored five goals in his first eight starts in league matches before Saturday's home game with Derby County. Tonight, in Dressing Room Talk, he reflects on his successful run in the first team:

Happy striker

"I don't think I am established yet...whatever anyone may think. I am still on the fringe and fighting to hold on to my place. But I have enjoyed playing in the team and, of course, managing to score goals.

"I do go out with the idea and the hope of being able to score a goal, but I must say I also enjoy being involved in helping to create goals too. It is all part of the game. The boss just tells me to go out and enjoy myself without any real restrictions.

"The only thing I have to try and do defensively is to stop their full-backs getting out on the attack when our own attacks break down. I must admit I am not the best of trainers, but I find I am getting much fitter with regular first team games and enjoying everything a lot.

Cricketer

"I find I am usually okay once I have caught my second wind after the first 20 minutes or so. That is usually the toughest time during a match. Then I just get on with it. I have always been with Luton and they are my club, so I know the way we play well. I just get on with my game – the way I think and like to play. It seems to work out fine.

"As a boy, I used to support Manchester United. They were the glamour team, but I never actually went to see them play. I used to come here when I was about 13 and watch Brian playing. That was when I decided to give up cricket and concentrate on football

– I was in the Middlesex Colts XI as a batsman.

"Who is the best player, the most talented in our family? Not Brian or me! Or my brother Edwin...I think it is probably Karl. He had a lot of ability with the ball. Lots of skills and so on. He is a decorator now!

"Playing in the same team as Brian has lots of good and bad points. Of course, we both enjoy it...but it is not always a perfect thing. We have a good understanding and we tend to know what the other one is going to do, but for me there are always comparisons and so on.

"I have really enjoyed playing alongside Mick Harford in the team. He works hard all the time. He talks and so on and keeps me going. And he really does take the weight off me. I enjoy it a lot and have no ambitions to take over his job behind the front two!"

John Smith, Chief Executive ALL WORKING TOGETHER FOR THE TOWN

After more than two years of hard work, it was very satisfying to attend the meeting last week at which the interim report of the Luton Town Football Club Joint Working Party was announced. The most impressive point was the unanimous determination now being shown by the Party – which represents a cross-section of our entire community in Luton – to satisfactorily solve the problem of our need to relocate. Where once there was division, there is now unity of purpose.

Despite many setbacks and disappointments, as the Working Party chairman Eric Fountain pointed out, the effort to find a new site has finally ended in agreement to move to the new Sundon Springs development on the Borough boundary adjacent to the M1, subject, of course, to planning approval.

This decision has been made recognising the fact that it will take between five and seven years to develop the site. So, Kenilworth Road will remain our home for that period. Bearing this in mind, the Working

Party has agreed upon ways of providing the club with positive financial support, until relocation.

Several meetings have taken place since November, 1987, when the club made a presentation to the Working Party and an audience which included many councillors and local businessmen. As a result of these, the Working Party has formulated proposals which should assist the club in that period.

These include various sponsorship arrangements, community use of the Kenilworth Road stadium and a possible sale of the ground to the council, who would then lease it back to the club.

Most encouragingly for those of us who love Luton Town FC, the attitude of everyone involved and notably that of the business community has been able to sustain the club in the First Division. The Luton area benefits from the club and this has been recognised. And everyone is now working to ensure we have a safe, secure and successful future.

INTRODUCING...

BRADFORD CITY

Bradford City arrive at Kenilworth Road tonight determined to continue their Littlewoods Cup success this season to help boost their Second Division promotion challenge. When the draw for this round was made back in November following our victory at Ipswich, Bradford were top of the division, but in recent weeks they have slipped back. But, whatever the final outcome tonight or in the league, Bradford City have made a magnificent recovery from the tragedy of the Valley Parade fire in May 1985.

'the first Yorkshire club to take on professionals'

Founded in May, 1903, Bradford City were immediately elected to the Second Division of the league without even playing a match. Not one match at any level, anywhere! One day they were the Manningham Rugby League club and the next they had changed their code and become members of the Football League. They went on to become the first club to take on professionals in Yorkshire.

By 1908, with a settled side, they had graduated to the First Division as Second Division champions. It was to be the start of their glory years. They stayed in the top flight until 1922, reached fifth place in 1911, and won the FA Cup in the same season. They beat Newcastle 1-0 in a replay after a goalless draw at the Crystal Palace in the initial match.

Newcastle were regarded as red hot favourites to win as they were appearing in their fifth final appearance in seven years. But the Paraders had other ideas and a goal from Jimmy Spiers did the trick in the replay at Old Trafford. A huge 100,000-strong crowd cheered the team through the streets when they returned with the cup to Bradford.

Alas, Bradford City lost their First Division status in 1922. A fall through the divisions gradually followed with them ending up in the newly-formed Fourth Division in 1961. In 1969, they won promotion. But they fell back again in 1972.

It was in this period, however, that local businessman Stafford Heginbotham became club chairman and began to inject the club with his ideas and energy. He salvaged the club from the brink of extinction and finally earned lasting promotion for the club when they went up in 1982 as runners-up to then-Fourth Division champions Sheffield United.

Three years later they were champions of the Third Division - but their celebrations were soured by the dreadful fire which took 56 lives. The response from the club and the city has been extraordinary since then.

Under Trevor Cherry and Terry Yorath, with Heginbotham at the helm, they became a force. Then, when the former Leeds pair were dismissed, Terry Dolan took over and consolidated their earlier successes, leading them to the brink of their first taste of First Division Football in 54 years.



Terry Dolan had an unenviable task when he took over from Trevor Cherry last year as the former Leeds man had done a marvellous job in leading City to recovery after the traumatic fire at Valley Parade. But Dolan has proved himself to be his own master with a considerable impact as City have joined powerfully in the promotion race. He has twice broken City's transfer record with the signings of Lee Sinnott from Watford for £130,000 and then Mick Kennedy from Portsmouth for £250,000. Remarkably, Dolan was on the staff of Bradford Park Avenue when that club went out of business. He went on to play for Huddersfield and Rochdale. He became City's youth team coach in 1983.

One man with a special taste for tonight's match will be striker Ron Fletcher who came to Luton from Chester in 1974 along with brother Paul. They left together for Manchester City in 1978.

In goal for City will be Paul Tomlinson, a £47,000 close-season capture from Sheffield United. Brian Mitchell, a £70,000 signing from Aberdeen, and Karl Goddard, a free signing from Manchester United in 1985, will take the full-back shirts.

David Evans, a free transfer signing from Halifax in 1984, has missed only a handful of matches since then in the middle of defence alongside former Sheffield Wednesday defender Gavin Oliver, who came for a £30,000 fee in 1985.

'highly-rated local boy'

The midfield will be orchestrated by captain Stuart McCall, a highly-rated local boy who has been the subject of intense transfer speculation. He may be accompanied by former Portsmouth man Mick Kennedy, a £250,000 signing last week, John Hendrie, a free signing from Coventry, and former Watford favourite Lee Sinnott.

Fletcher, former Nottingham Forest man Leigh Palin and locally-born winger Mark Ellis will also be likely to feature in the City attack.

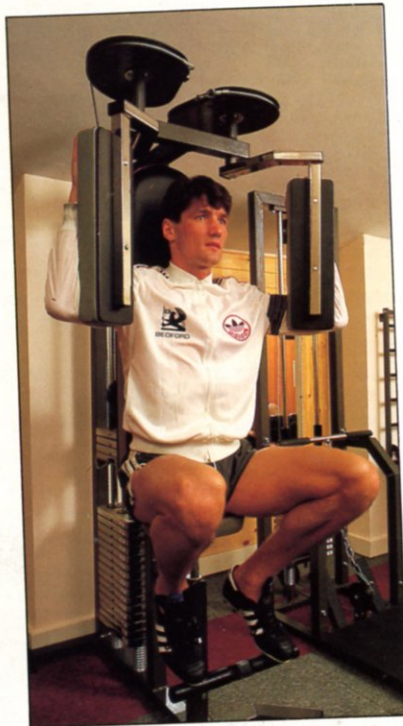

LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

HATTERS HOPING CUP HISTORY WILL REPEAT ITSELF

We welcome City to Luton for tonight's Cup-tie and obviously hope that the result is similar to the last time they visited Kenilworth Road – for a 4th Round FA Cup tie on 26th January 1974 – when the Town won 3-0, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

That particular game was over almost before it started as City full back John Fretwell put through his own net very early on and a further goal by Barry Butlin gave us a comfortable half time lead. Jimmy Ryan scored in the second half to earn a Fifth Round tie at home to Leicester when we were well and truly walloped 4-0.

If our cup record against City is something to crow about our league results most certainly are not as we have won only once in our eight meetings.

'Graham French made his Luton debut against Bradford City'

Our first league meeting took place at Valley Parade on 16th October 1965 during our initial season in Division Four. Graham French, to become a star of so many Luton games in the late 60's, made his debut that day but did not particularly shine in a 2-2 draw.

It was inevitable that goals would be scored that day as in the Towns previous two games they had beaten Doncaster 4-3 and Barnsley 5-4 after being 4-0 up after only 20 minutes.

In the game at Bradford City Roy Ellam gave City the lead but John Moore equalised within minutes. Goalkeeper Colin Tinsley was injured after 34 stitches and had to be taken to hospital to have stitches inserted in a head wound his place being taken by goalkeeper turned inside forward Tony Read with Billy Stark coming on as substitute.

John O'Rourke put Luton into the lead shortly before half time but Ellam equalised in the second half and was denied his hat-trick by some five saves by Read which were warmly applauded by the crowd of 2635.

The return took place on December 18th shortly after the infamous cup defeat by non-league Corby and a reshuffled Town side despite controlling the game contrived to lose 3-2 before a crowd of 5550. The Luton goals were scored by Bruce Rioch and Read now back in the forward line while City's marksmen were Peter Rodon and Ken Leek with two.

Season 1966-67 proved to be the most dismal in Lutons history and the 0-0 home draw with City on 20th October 1966 was typical of the Towns performances of that time – desperate stuff with little goalmouth action to excite the 4150 crowd which turned out to be the lowest of the season.

If the Towns home record was nothing to write home about the away performances were terrible – only one away point and two goals in the eight games played prior to the visit to Valley Parade on 16th November – the worst in the Football League.

The Town lost again that night but at least scored a goal in the 2-1 defeat.

David Pleat opened the scoring in the 12th minute to shock the 3097 crowd, but Leek headed an equaliser 10 minutes from half time.

As he had played so well in goal at Bradford the previous season Read was back between the sticks and performed miracles to prevent the City forwards from scoring a hatfull. He was however unable to stop Steve Ingle scoring the winner in the 75th minute and was grateful to see a John Hall shot hit the bar and rebound back into play in the closing minutes.

The following season saw an upturn in fortunes for both clubs and when they met at Valley Parade on 2nd December Luton were third in the Fourth Division table while City were fourth.

The Town had won eight league games on the trot whilst City had won seven and drawn one over the same period so the stage was set for a classic and the largest crowd to watch the fixture at the time – 7957 – gathered to see which unbeaten record would go.

Keith Allen who had been ever present since joining the Town from Stockport the previous season twisted his ankle in training and his place was taken by 19 year old trialist Hugh McLeish.

City started the game at a searing pace and it was no surprise when Paul Aimson, whom the town had tried to sign earlier in the season, put the Bradford side in front. The Town, more by luck than judgement, managed to hold out until half time but early in the second period Charlie Rackstraw scored the second leaving the Hatters with mountains to climb. To their credit Luton did not give up and it was a post that prevented McLeish scoring on his debut ten minutes from time.

The Town were crowned champions of Division Four on 24th April 1968 before an ecstatic crowd of 18904 and three days later Bradford City came to Kenilworth Road with ideas on promotion themselves.

"Too much champagne" was the excuse offered for the Towns 3-1 defeat that afternoon – the only home reverse of the season – and although Luton credited plenty of chances City were fully deserving of their win.

Bobby Ham capitalised on a misunderstanding between Alan Slough and goalkeeper Read in the 12th minute but Ray Whittaker equalised from the spot early in the second half following a handling offence by City's Barry Swallow.

Swallow got his own back in the 73rd minute sending over a speculative centre which completely deceived skipper Terry Branston and Read before bouncing in the net and then seven minutes into injury time Max Dougan was adjudged to have tripped Bruce Walker in the penalty area and Rackstraw saw his spot-kick saved by Read.

The referee, however, ordered the kick to be retaken because of an encroachment offence which must have been a relief to Rackstraw, who had scored from all his 38 previous penalties, and who this time made no mistake.

City still missed out on promotion but joined the Town in Division Three a season later and when the teams met at Valley Parade on 13th September 1969 it was in a similar situation to that two years before at Bradford in as much that both sides had got off to a flying start and the contest which attracted 10851 was seen to be another "Clash of the Titans".

As it turned out the match was a non-event with Allen heading in a cross from French in the 52nd minute and Ham

equalising 13 minutes from the end. The first goal scored against the Town on their travels that season.

Amongst all these tales of woe the best story is kept until the end for in our last league meeting, at Kenilworth Road on 13th December 1969, the Town actually managed to beat City and 5-0 to boot!

'Malcolm Macdonald rapped in a hat-trick'

The Town were leading the table at the time but had lost at non-league Hillingdon in the FA Cup the week before and although we had remained unbeaten at home since the last time City had been here we were all apprehensive about playing one of our bogey sides.

So often happens in these situations we need have had not fears for the Town played brilliantly that afternoon and were two up in the first 14 minutes courtesy of Matt Tees and Malcolm Macdonald and three up at half time with John Collins scoring just before the break seconds after Ham had hit a post for City.

Luton slackened the pace in the second half but still managed to score two more both by Macdonald – his hat-trick being scored from the penalty spot in the last minute.
