Malaysians fed on a Mersey-rich diet of English football cannot understand how these teams, great and glamorous as they are, will never usurp the unsung heroes who have made up the Hatters teams over the years.

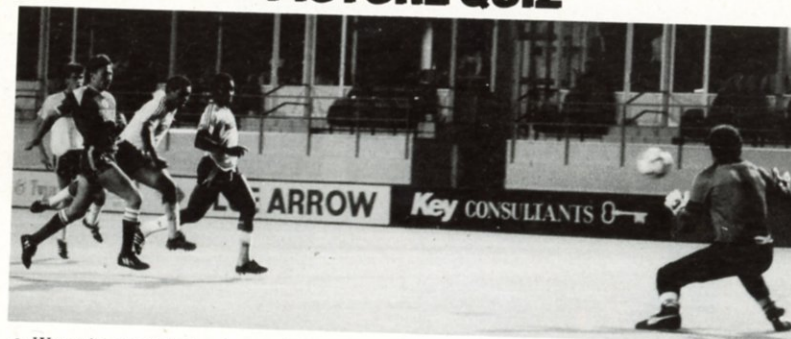

RAMS TAMED

Luton Town 1 Derby County 0

Darron McDonough was the Town hero here a fortnight ago when he blasted in the late winner which finally beat Peter Shilton to earn all three points. The goal came after 86 minutes of frustration during which Shilton had produced a series of dazzling saves, most notably one low instinctive stop from Ian Allinson midway through the second half.

Danny Wilson, who enjoyed another busy afternoon in midfield, broke away on the right to create the Town goal in the closing stages. His cross fell kindly for McDonough in the goalmouth and, though Shilton managed to move his hands in the way, his powerful strike ballooned into the net.

The win was the Town's fourth in five matches since going down to Everton at Goodison Park on Boxing Day and helped establish them in the top eight of the First Division. And further good news was provided with the very promising performance of Kingsley Black on the left side of midfield, filling in for Ian Allinson who had moved forward to replace the suspended Mick Harford.

FOOTBALL FOCUS



Hugh Billington

Hugh Billington, one of the Town's finest centre forwards, died in the Luton and Dunstable Hospital on January 16, aged 71. Hugh, who succeeded Joe Payne in the number nine shirt at Kenilworth Road, was regarded as a player as fine as his predecessor and would have equalled his reputation had it not been for the interruption to his career of the second world war. His funeral took place on January 22. Robert Alexander pays tribute to one of our greatest goalscoring heroes in today's Football Focus:

Had it not been for the interruption of World War Two, Hugh Billington would almost certainly have become as big a favourite as Joe Payne in the hearts of all Luton Town fans. Born in Amptill, but brought up in Luton, he followed Payne as a scoring sensation in the Hatters team, but was robbed of his most productive and glorious years by the war.

The Town knew him well long before he joined them from Spartan League Waterloos in 1938. He had been in the Luton schoolboys side and had played local league soccer for several clubs. He made his league debut for the Town in November, 1938, when he scored twice in a 3-2 win over Tranmere. In his first season, he topped the Second Division scoring charts with 28 goals in 27 appearances.

But, at 24, when he was approaching his peak, war broke out. Army service kept him out of the game for six years. He resumed his career in 1946 and his output that term was 35 goals. How many would Hughie have scored if there had been no war?

In 1948, as with Joe Payne, Billington joined Chelsea. His three-year spell at Stamford Bridge yielded a further 28 goals in 83 appearances. He went on to play for Worcester City. In one of his most memorable times for the Town, he scored two hat-tricks against Southampton over Easter in the space of four days. Hugh is survived by his wife Rene to whom we all send our deepest sympathy.

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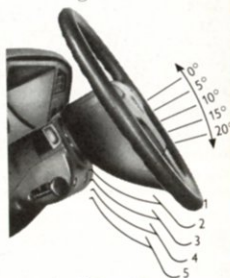

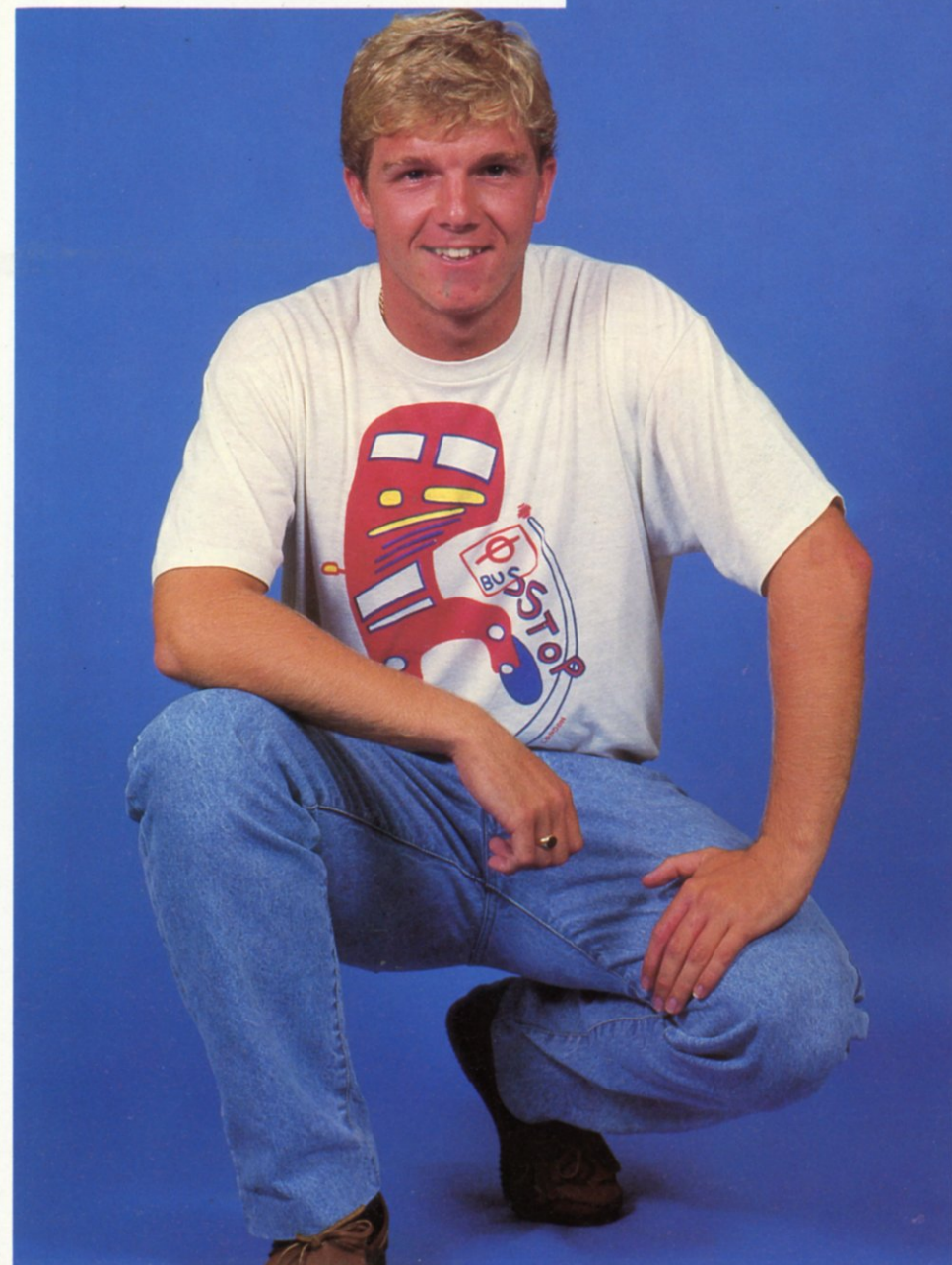

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DRESSING ROOM

with Kingsley Black

After just 18 months as a professional, Luton-born Kingsley Black has begun to establish himself as a regular member of our first team squad and impress experienced judges with his balance, temperament and high-quality ball control. Now 19, Kingsley has shown remarkable maturity – particularly as he did not have the benefit of a spell with the club as an apprentice professional, as he explains in Dressing Room Talk today:

Special honour

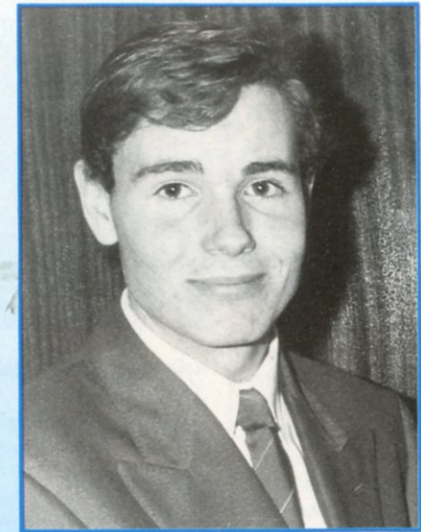
"I was born in Luton and have grown up in the town as a local schoolboy player and supporter of the club. So, for me, it is a special honour when I pull on the Luton Town shirt to play for the first team. It really means a lot.

"I played a lot of local football and obviously enjoyed it. I was watched by club scouts and, while I was playing regularly for St Joseph's in the Chiltern Youth League, was approached and invited by John Moore to come down to Kenilworth Road.

"I started off playing a few games in the youth team and then later on I played in the reserves. But I did not get offered apprentice professional forms. When I finished at Cardinal Newman School, I went on to Luton Sixth Form College to study my 'A' levels in maths and economics. That kept me busy for two years up to my 18th birthday.

"At the same time, I kept on playing for Luton and enjoying it. I played quite a lot in the reserves. I signed full professional forms and a one-year contract when I was 18 in June 1986. My contract was updated and I signed a new two-year contract at the start of this season.

"When I was at school I used to play a few games at centre-forward, but I have always been mostly an attacking left-side player. I am naturally left footed. I prefer to play the wide role in a four-man midfield than to play as a pure out-and-out winger – there is more involvement. I don't have to wait for the ball.

"When I was younger I used to come and watch the team regularly. Ricky Hill was an attacking midfielder player on the right side then and David Moss was on the left. It was a very exciting team. I used to watch regularly from the terraces and I can remember running on to the pitch when we won the Second Division title in 1982 and standing below the directors' box!

Enjoy a dribble

"I made my first team debut at Queens Park Rangers in September last year when we lost 2-0, but that has been my only losing appearance in the team. I had a run of three games, playing against Manchester United and Wigan after that. And since then I have played a few more, mostly at home, so I am feeling more and more at home in the first team.

"Last season, I scored eight goals in the reserves. But, although I like to try and get a shot in and enjoy a dribble, I think my main job is to get crosses in. Like David Moss, I am working on my game in the air! I think that is typical of wide players."

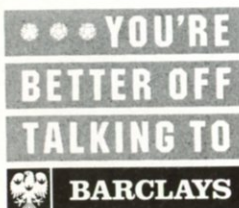

CLUB COMMENT

John Smith, Chief Executive DYNAMIC LEADER NEEDED FOR THE FUTURE

The administration of our great game has been the subject of considerable discussion in private and public this season with many suggestions made as to the future direction we should be taking. Bobby Charlton went so far as to suggest the answer lay in the appointment of a 'supremo' who could over-see the purpose and direction of football...and I must confess to holding great sympathy with this viewpoint.

Bearing in mind that the football Association Secretary Ted Croker will be completing his term of office in 1989 after a long and loyal period of service and that the FA Chairman Bert Millichip's term of office will also be due for renewal or change in the same year, it may be that we are approaching a time when we should give such possibilities all serious thought.

With so many changes already taking place in football, and so many more obviously lying ahead, it seems that someone capable of taking a really strong and radical look at the top administration of the game is going to be needed. We need to consider all the possibilities and to study, for example, the way both the FA and the Football League are run.

It seems to me that the time has come to consider appointing a high-profile high-powered forward-

thinking person. We need someone who can not only maintain all the various good things being done within football, but also lead the game forward, who can have good connections in order to keep the commercial side right, but also to open doors for the game at the highest level in business, politics and education.

It would need to be someone who could command the respect of everyone within the game both locally and nationally, but also internationally. And it needs to be someone who is well-known and respected in all walks of life. A natural leader. Someone who can take football into the next decade, a person capable of achieving such formidable ambitions as the creation of a new national stadium and headquarters for football, who can lift the game to new, respected and successful heights.

Many of us may think we would struggle to find the right man, but we must think along these lines and consider such men as leaders of industry and commerce if we are to bring back the game's reputation, morality and popularity.

One man I would offer as an example would be Lord Aberdare who is well-known and respected in the House of Lords and also in industry. He is also chairman of the Football Trust.



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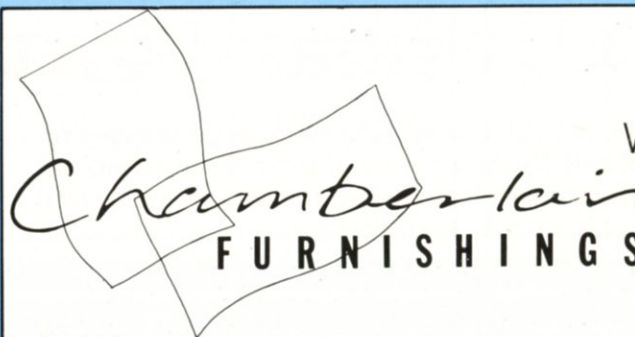

INTRODUCING... SOUTHAMPTON

We welcome for the second time this season a Southampton side who were here six weeks ago, forcing a draw in a First Division game. They followed up that result with a win at Reading in the FA Cup and two wins in the course of their next four league games.

Southampton began life in 1885, as Southampton St. Mary's, one of their players at that time being George Muir, who was later Secretary of Hampshire County Cricket Club. They first entered the FA Cup in 1891-92 when after beating Reading 7-0 in the second qualifying round they were disqualified after protests about the eligibility of two players. They joined the Southern League in 1894-95 and in the same season progressed to the first round proper of the FA Cup for the first time, losing 4-1 to Nottingham Forest.

'Saints reached the semi-finals in 1898

They topped the Southern League in 1896-97 and reached the second round proper for the first time, losing in a replay at Newton Heath (now Manchester United). The following season not only did they win the Southern League Championship again but they reached the semi-final, before going out in a replay to Nottingham Forest.

By the time they became founder-members of Division Three (South) in 1920, they had won the Southern League title another three times and had reached the FA Cup final of 1899-1900, going down to Bury, and again in 1901-02, going down to Sheffield United in a replay.

It took the 'Saints' only two seasons to win promotion to Division Two, conceding only 21 goals in the process, a

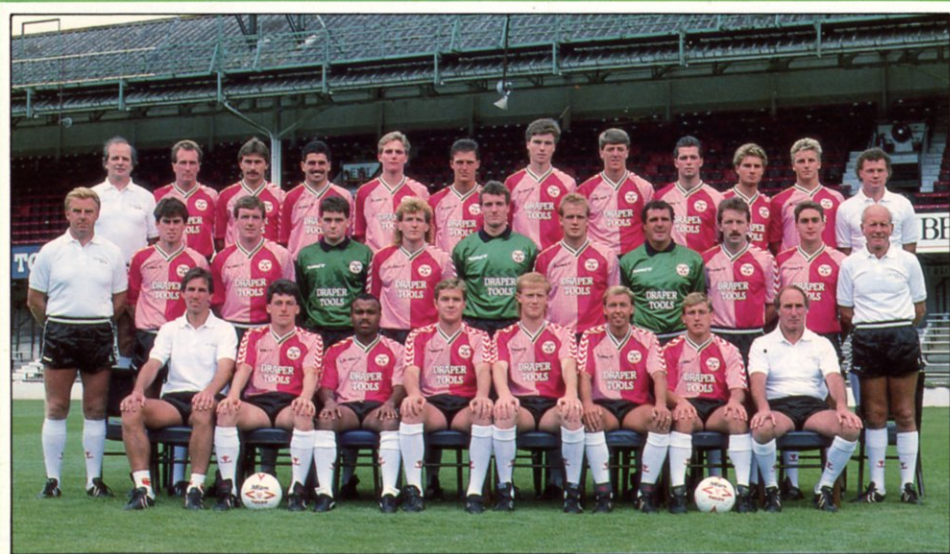
Football League record that was finally beaten by Liverpool in 1978-79. They made another semi-final appearance in 1924-25, going down to Sheffield United and another in 1926-27, going down to Arsenal.

Saints players of the thirties included Ted Drake, before his move to Arsenal, and Surrey cricketer Laurie Fishlock. In the forties, defender Alf Ramsey and striker Charlie Wayman were amongst their stars. In the fifties, Terry Paine started his long career during their spell in Division Three (South).

They eventually emerged from Division Three in 1960 and in 1960-61 reached the fifth round of the FA Cup for the first time for many years. In 1962-63, they reached the semi-final, losing to Manchester United by a single goal.

Martin Chivers, Mike Channon and one of Saints' best-ever signings Ron Davies helped them climb into Division One in 1966 for the first time ever and hold their own there. Then in 1975-76 Bobby Stokes' matchwinner gained them a magnificent first-ever FA Cup win just two seasons after slipping back to Division Two. On the crest of a wave they won promotion a season later and they have stayed up ever since.

They went down to Nottingham Forest in the 1978-79 League Cup final, were sixth in Division One in 1980-81 and runners-up in 1983-84. They also reached the FA Cup semi-final, losing by a single goal to Everton. 1985-86 brought them another semi-final appearance against Liverpool, when they went down 2-0, and last season they took Liverpool to two semi-final replays. By this time, Kevin Keegan had been and gone and Chris Nicholl had succeeded Lawrie McMenemy as manager.

Chris Nicholl, the one-time Town centre-half who became a regular in the Northern Ireland team for many years, is the man in charge of Southampton. He took over when former Saints boss Lawrie McMenemy left to move on to Sunderland. As a tall and commanding centre-half, Nicholl was one of the favourites at Kenilworth Road alongside Malcolm Macdonald and Co. He played for Northern Ireland, in the same team as Mal Donaghy, during the 1982 World Cup finals. As manager, he has helped rebuild the Saints team in recent seasons into an entertaining and established First Division force.

'Colin Clarke scored twice at Old Trafford'

This season, Chris's team made a good start with a win at Norwich and draws at Portsmouth and Nottingham Forest. They have since won at Coventry for the first time for many years, ended Arsenal's long winning run, by beating them at Highbury, and drew here and won at Old Trafford with two Colin Clarke goals in his second season since moving from Bournemouth.

He is likely to link with Guernsey-born Matthew Le Tissier, who scored the winner in the third round tie at Reading. Gordon Hobson (ex-Lincoln and Grimsby) is in his second season, giving width to the attack, while in midfield Graham Baker is in his second spell with the Saints after moving from Manchester City this season and Glen Cockerill is in his third season since moving from Sheffield United.

Jimmy Case has of course had extensive experience with Liverpool and has played in an FA Cup final for Brighton while up and coming Rod Wallace has been substitute recently.

In defence, Kevin Moore (from Oldham) and Derek Statham (from West Bromwich) are new this season, linking up with Gerry Forrest (from Rotherham two years ago) and Kevin Bond, who came from Manchester City in 1984.

In goal, John Burridge, who began his remarkable career with Workington and has won a League Cup medal with Aston Villa is now with his 10th league club and has, in his mid-thirties, taken over from Tim Flowers, the young goalkeeper who succeeded him in Wolves goal three seasons ago. Nor must we forget Waymouth man Andy Townsend, who may be pressing for a place in midfield.

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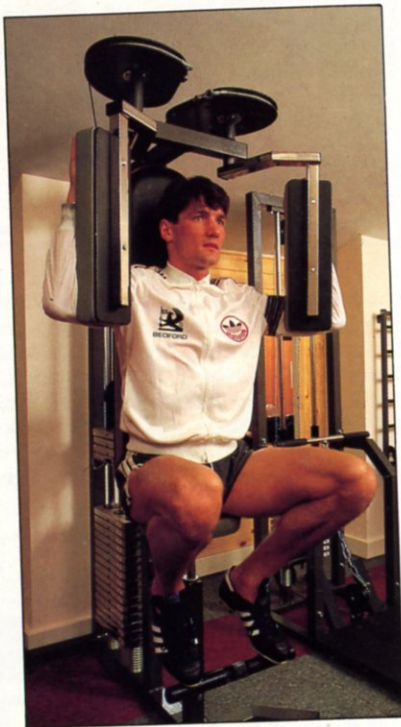

England B striker Harford, a target for West Ham, Spurs and Arsenal, rejected the chance of a glamour move by agreeing a £1,200-a-week contract."

Daily Express: "Luton could be denied the home leg of their Littlewoods Cup semi-final because of a Bradford fan's moment of madness... Sadly, the mindless antics of a few once again cast a shadow over what should have been a joyous night for Luton."

Daily Telegraph: "Steve Foster, the Luton captain, put his side on the way to a place in the semi-finals of the Littlewoods Cup and gave himself the opportunity to atone for his Wembley disappointment of five years ago when suspension cost him a place in the FA Cup final."

The Independent: "One moment's casual incompetence betrayed Bradford City just as they appeared to have acquired the poise to thwart a keen but ordinary Luton."



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LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

RIDING ALONG ON THE CREST OF A WAVE

Back in the Second Division for the first time in seven years the Town were riding on the crest of a wave as season 1970-71 approached, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Three seasons of unprecedented success had seen the Hatters rise from the depths of Division Four and it was an unwise man who was not prepared to put money on Luton Town walking straight back to the top League.

Don Givens, Jim Ryan, David Court and Roger Hoy had been purchased to strengthen a squad that already boasted the likes of Chris Nicholl and Malcolm Macdonald but the Town were brought back to earth with a bump when they were thrashed 4-2 at Bolton in the opening game.

'Oxford were seen off in a convincing fashion'

It was not until the fourth game that a win was recorded but Oxford, the visitors that evening were seen off in a convincing fashion as two goals from Matt Tees and another from Macdonald gave the Town a comfortable interval lead. Macdonald popped up again early in the second half and the Hatters were able to cruise home to the delight of the 16,173 crowd.

A run of home wins stretching through September and October then followed and such was the confidence running through the squad that away performances had to improve.

The all important first away win took place at QPR on 29th September in a happy return for skipper Mike Keen and manager Alec Stock who had both left Rangers two seasons before in acrimonious circumstances.

It was keen, in fact, who scored the only goal of the game in the first minute direct from a 30 yard free kick.

Probably the highlight of the season, for those lucky enough to witness it, came in the next away game when the Town won 5-1 at Sheffield Wednesday. The Hillsborough side had just been relegated from Division One and were expected to go straight back but they were made to look second rate by a Town side that played brilliantly.

The game was televised and the Macdonald hat trick was often repeated and probably led to his eventual transfer as the big clubs began to sit up and take notice. A word of praise must also go to the unsung Don Givens who scored two himself and by unselfish running paved the way to Macdonald becoming a household name.

The home bubble did eventually burst when Sunderland won 2-1 at Kenilworth Road on 31st October but the setback was quickly forgotten when the Town went to strongly fancied Hull the following week and came away with a 2-0 win that was rather easier than the scoreline showed.

The outstanding fightback of the season occurred the next Saturday when visitors Carlisle seemed to be in an innsalable position being 3-0 up with only 17 minutes to go but had to settle for a point as Jim Ryan, Alan Slough and finally Macdonald in the dying seconds scored to send the rainsoaked crowd of 14,837 home happy.

Wins over Sheffield United at home in another thriller and Watford away put the Town in a strong position and it was only a late equaliser by Norwich at Carrow Road that prevented the Hatters from being top of the table as Christmas approached.

Bad weather saw Christmas games missed and the Town were slow to resume after the festivities drawing at home 0-0 to QPR and losing 1-0 away to bottom club Blackburn.

The momentum had been lost and another spate of missed games in late January saw the Town slip down the

table and a 2-1 defeat at Sheffield United before a crowd of 30,986 increased the gap at the top which successive 1-0 wins over Watford at Kenilworth Road and Portsmouth away did little to help.

A mini revival of form then occurred when successive promotion aspirants in Hull and Birmingham were beaten at Kenilworth Road.

In the first game Hull were beaten 3-1 before a crowd of 19,566. Macdonald missed his second penalty in two weeks but made up for it by blasting the decider 10 minutes from the end. The match was televised by the BBC that evening and the commentator was heard to remark "Here we have a game between promotion rivals and only 19,000 have bothered to turn up!" - those were the days.

'Birmingham and the wonder boy took an early lead'

The crowd was swelled to 25,172 two weeks later when Birmingham were the visitors but a large proportion were Blues supporters who had seen their team go on a remarkable unbeaten run aided by 16 year old "wonder boy" Trevor Francis. Birmingham were 2-0 up after 20 minutes but in another fightback the Town hit three to win the game and push themselves back in the promotion pack.

Easter has often seen the end of Town hopes over the years and this was probably the finest example. On Good Friday Luton were 2-0 up at Bristol City at half-time but ended up losing 3-2. The next day saw a 4-0 thrashing at Millwall and on Easter Monday a 3-1 home defeat by eventual champions Leicester after being gifted an early lead via an own goal by City's Sjoberg meant the Town were completely out of the promotion scene.

The season drifted to a sad end but the final match of an eventful season left us thinking of what might have been. The Town needed to beat Cardiff by three goals to qualify for the Watney Cup and Macdonald as if stage managed scored a hat-trick in the 3-0 win with the last being blasted home in the 90th minute.

The hat-trick was said to have increased Macdonalds worth from the £150,000 offered by Newcastle to the £180,000 he eventually went for which is good business in anyones books.
