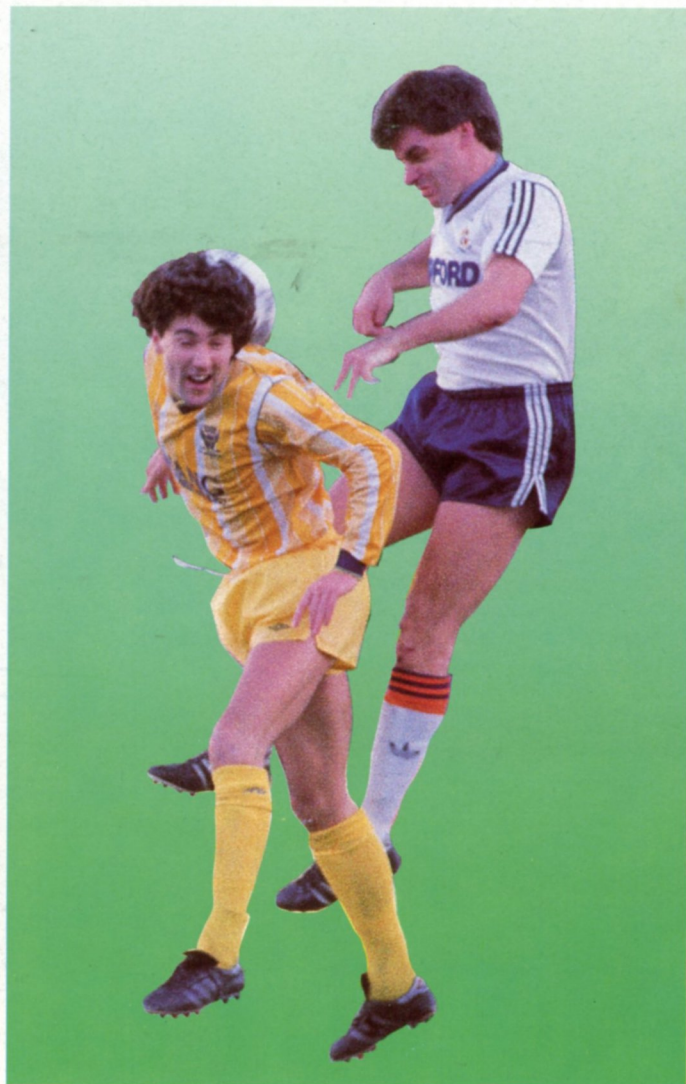

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RAY'S REVIEW



A warm welcome tonight to Queen's Park Rangers and their manager Jim Smith, a good friend and a real football character. After our tough tussle with QPR on Saturday, we know we shall face another close match tonight for a place in the sixth round. We have enjoyed ourselves this season in the cup competitions and hope to maintain our progress. A win would mean we have reached the quarter-finals or better in the Littlewoods Cup, Simod Cup and FA Cup – a great achievement by the players. Their level of professionalism has been very special this season and I am sure the example of the senior players has rubbed off. It was shown in the great victory at Everton last week in the Simod Cup when we bounced back from the defeat at Arsenal – our first in 10 games – in the best possible way.

Since my last notes, we have experienced that extraordinary league match with Oxford, drawn at Oxford in the Littlewoods Cup – and it is still only half-time in that semi-final with everything to play for when the teams meet at Kenilworth Road on Sunday – gone down at Arsenal, where they scored two quick goals to get on top, and won in the Simod Cup at Everton, with David Oldfield grabbing both our goals in a 2-1 win. We had several youngsters on duty for the first time in that match and they all acquitted themselves well. Further good news came later in the week when Mick Harford, who won his long-awaited chance in the England squad in Israel, came on for the last 20 minutes in Tel Aviv to earn his first full international cap. Everyone at the club was delighted for Mick who has worked very hard for his chance. Exactly the same feelings went with Danny Wilson and Mal Donaghy who played for Northern Ireland in Greece, Mal adding yet another cap to the collection which makes him Luton Town's most-capped player in the history of the club. It was more than a little worrying when they were unable to leave Athens for home after the match and we spent most of an anxious Thursday worrying about them returning on time for Saturday's clash at Loftus Road.

That match was a tight one and another night of excitement is in prospect. Give the team plenty of vocal support. Enjoy the match.

A long-distance fan

No-one should forget the 'out of town' fan and the 'missionary' work we long distance supporters do for the club. Being a Scot and never having lived near Luton in my life I am asked, on average, three times a week 'why do you support Luton?' Well, 'there is no answer to that' as a late great Town supporter used to say but I have followed the Town for 18 years now.

Over those years I have lived in a variety of places - Bristol, Leicester, Peterborough, Norwich, Ipswich and Bromley and travelling has been expensive for home games. At the moment, I am living in Wimbledon, so my 'home' game will be our away fixture against the Dons in March. Rest assured that I always wear my scarf in order to maintain a high Luton profile!

The first time I saw the Town play was in March 1975 - against (the then) mighty Leeds. It was my first ever English first division game and totally different from watching Hibernian at Easter Road. The trip was worth it: Town won 2-1. What I cannot

understand is why the people of Luton do not follow the best team in the world. I am prepared to travel miles and yet so many Lutonians stay away.

It has been difficult to defend our controversial 'away fans ban' and our artificial surface to other football supporters. Fans of the big clubs argue that we have an unfair advantage. Well there are two answers: (1) When they learn to behave they can come back and (2) last season, when I went to Old Trafford to see the Town lose 1-0, there were 200 Luton fans cheering (defiantly) in one corner and 38,000 United fans. Is this not home advantage?

Finally I swore years ago that I would never go to Wembley unless Luton got there (you can imagine the various tacky, tasteless comments I get) - well I am hoping that I shall soon be standing under the twin towers. On the pitch will be a small South Bedfordshire team playing in the now famous white, navy and orange.

GOAL FEAST

Luton Town 7 Oxford United 4

An incredible game, full of goals and thrills, left everyone exhausted after Oxford had become the first visitors to score four goals on our synthetic surface here earlier this month. The 7-4 win was the highest-scoring First Division match in our history, producing one more goal than the famous 8-2 win over Sunderland in 1955.

Both managers were puzzled, annoyed and deflated by events with Ray Harford at least able to console himself with three points for the Town after nothing less than an amazing 90 minutes. "But I'd rather have won 3-0" he said. Oxford boss Maurice Evans said it could have been 10-10... "and change service."

For the record, Mark Stein smashed his first league hat-trick in 11 minutes early in the second half during a spell when everything seemed to be goalbound at both ends. The details were:

FOOTBALL FOCUS



David Galley

One of the youngest physios in the First Division, Dave Galley took over in succession to Dave Kirby when he left the Town to devote more time to looking after his wife. Now Dave is on the verge of a possible Wembley final in less than three months with the club. He talks about his career and hopes in today's Football Focus:

Young physio enjoying his life in the big time

"I don't think I am actually the youngest physio in the First Division. I think Gary Lewin at Arsenal is only 23, but, as far as I know, I am the second youngest. One of the good things about being so young – I am 25 – is that I can do the exercises myself that I ask the injured players to do! I can make them work hard and be with them more.

"I was born in Stoke and grew up there. I was football-mad and used to play all the time. I played for Staffordshire schoolboys and joined Stoke as a schoolboy. I used to play four games every weekend, but in the end I had cartilage and then knee ligament trouble and that put paid to my hopes of a professional career.

"I had to have a lot of treatment at my local hospital and I got chatting to the physio and soon decided I was very interested in the job. It became my career and I was qualified by the time I was 21.

"I worked in general hospitals before joining my first club Port Vale as a physio and later moving on to Fulham. I had three years there

before leaving to go into private practice. Obviously, that was where I got to know Ray Harford. His offer to come to Luton came out of the blue but I jumped at it when the chance came and I love the job here. It is such a friendly club.

"I am married. My wife's name is Sue, but we have not got any children. Just a dog! We have bought a house in the area and everything seems to be going very well at the moment. I don't have any special feelings about tactics or playing styles or anything. But I do not like to give players injections if it can be avoided. Usually, it means the injury might be aggravated and it is often best not to play."

With a bit of luck Dave could be on the Wembley trail in April with his bucket and sponge. If he is he will thank the players. He said: "They are a great bunch of lads and really stick together well. That is the great thing about the club and the players."

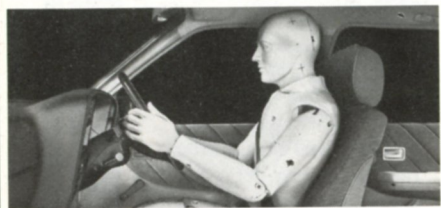
Our young players did really well in what was a big character test for them at Goodison Park, where David Oldfield scored twice. Marvin Johnson looked after me nicely too!

Finally, special thanks to our fans for their great support in the last few weeks. Please keep it up!

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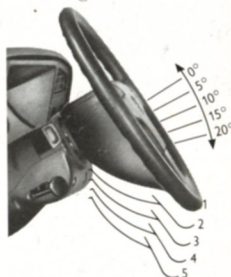

Ian enjoying new life with the Hatters



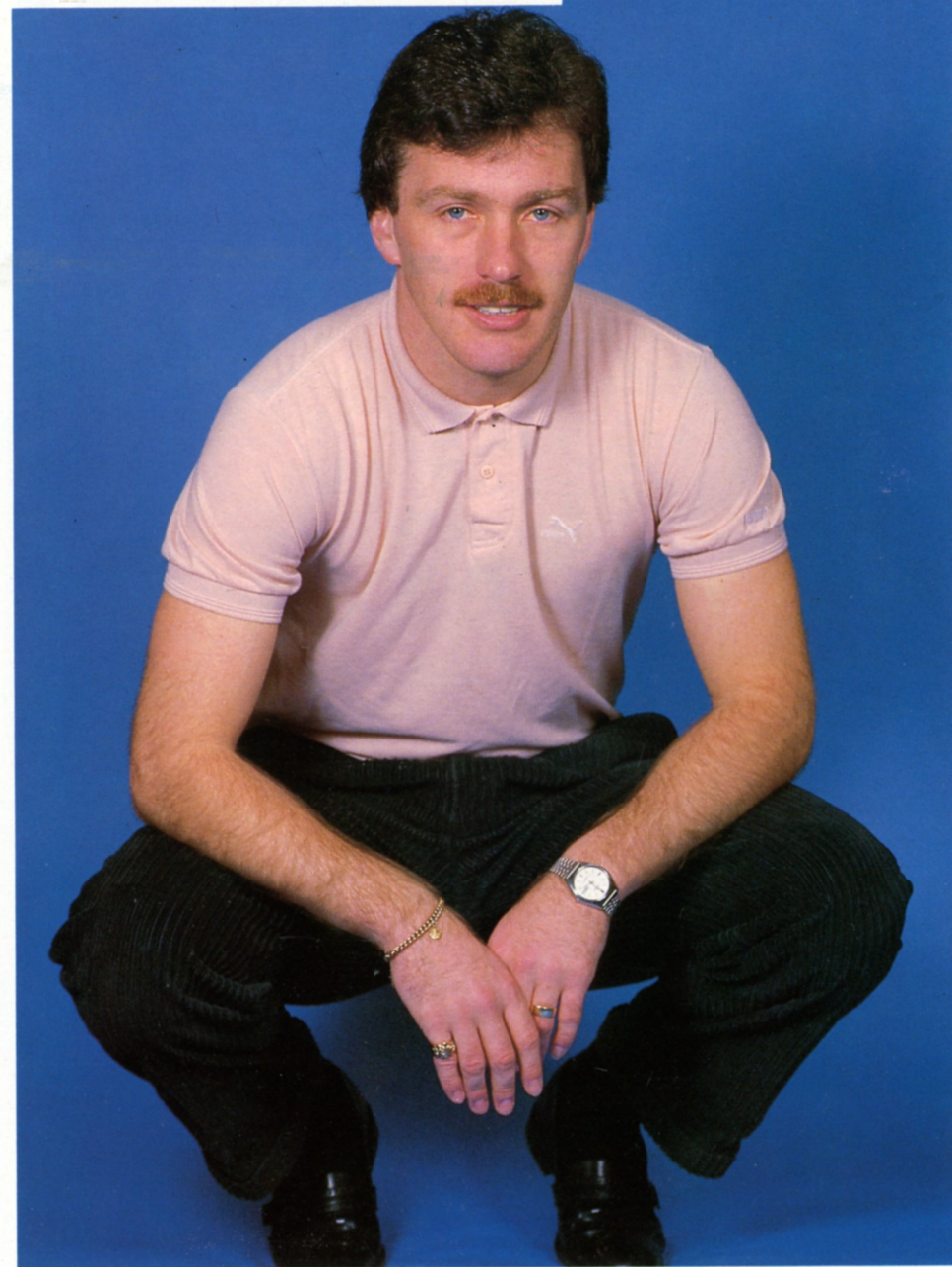
• Versatile: Ian Allinson.

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DRESSING ROOM

with David Oldfield

David Oldfield travelled up to Liverpool last week for our Simod Cup third round tie against Everton full of excitement and anticipation. Manager Ray Harford on Monday told him and the rest of the young debutant Hatters that they would be playing at Goodison Park on Tuesday evening. On Wednesday morning, he woke up to find he was a hero after scoring both goals in a famous 2-1 win. But David, as he explains in tonight's Dressing Room Talk, does not believe a word of it:

Great experience

"It was a great night for me, but I am not going to be fooled into thinking I have even claimed a place in the first team squad, let alone the team, on one match. In fact, I am not really sure of my place in the reserves. the competition for places is very hot, especially for front players.

"We have got international players in attack in the first team so I have got to just keep on working to try and match their standards before I can even think of anything else. And in the reserves and youth teams there are a lot of good players coming through. Sean Farrell and Paul Gray for example score goals regularly and have been making progress all the time. So, I have to work hard to just keep my place in the reserves' attack.

"The Everton match was not my first taste of first team football, though, as I came on during our win at Ipswich in the Littlewoods Cup. And I have been sub a few times as well without coming on. I have been included in the squad quite a bit in the last few months so I have got used to that part of it - but it did seem different to be in the hotel before the match and to know I was going to play.

"It is a great place to play and to make your full debut. I was lucky with the goals. The first one came from only about a yard out after Gary Cobb had played a one-two with me. His shot was stopped by Southall, but it fell to me and I scored from close in.

"I thought Cobbie did well to ride the tackle by Alan Harper before he shot. He was trying to bring him down but he got through to shoot. The second goal came after a nice move and a great cross by Ashley. I just put it in from about six or seven yards. It was a tremendous feeling - not too many people score twice against Southall!

"I know that after the match in the reports I was called the 'Wizard of Oz' and so on, but I was actually brought up in England. I was born in Perth, Australia, but came back with my family when I was four. My parents were teachers and went to Australia when they were campaigning for people to emigrate. My sister Beth and I were born there. Now we live at Ravenstone, near Newport Pagnell.

Moved up front

"I have always loved kicking a football around as long as I can remember. I used to be a midfield player before I came to Luton. Then John Moore who was youth team manager at the time moved me up to centre-forward. I started to score goals too which was something I had not done before at all! I've been there ever since except for a few games in defence in the last year when other players have been injured. Now I prefer it to any other position."

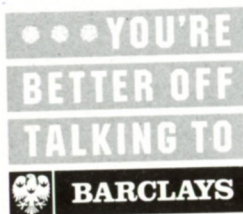

CLUB COMMENT

John Smith, Chief Executive LAUNCHING A FOOTBALL AID FOR OUR DISABLED SUPPORTERS

We are pleased to launch today a new Loupe system which provides excellent sound service from our hospital radio commentary for our supporters in the disabled area of our stadium. We are, I am told, the first Football League club to introduce a full Loupe system for the deaf and blind supporters in the ground. This is a fine achievement.

Our club chaplain Mervyn Terrett, who is also the secretary to the Hertfordshire Society for the Blind, has been closely involved with all the work. He has told me that he tested the system fully under match conditions during our extraordinary and entertaining victory over Oxford United on February 6. He said the Loupe system which surrounds the entire part of the enclosure devoted to disabled supporters helped to ensure that reception of the radio commentary via a special hearing aid was excellent.

Mervyn has discussed the success of the system with the chairman of the Hertfordshire Hard of Hearing League who were originally

responsible for putting us in touch with the Government's chief scientific officer. Mr Shaw indeed visited the club on two occasions to assist us with the establishment of the system.

Mr Shaw also said the Loupe system and its success at Kenilworth Road was sure to stimulate a great deal of interest among people with aural handicap throughout the country and could well prove to be something that may be adopted by other league clubs. We, at Luton Town, are proud to be the pioneers in such a valuable scheme for our own loyal and satisfied disabled supporters.

Schemes such as these can only reflect well on the club and in particular on the care and attention we are giving to our disabled supporters. Improvements within the ground have been numerous in recent years and, despite uncertainty over the long-term future, we have always attempted to ensure our fans enjoy the best conditions we can provide for their entertainment at Kenilworth Road.

QUEEN'S PARK RANGERS

An FA Cup replay brings to Kenilworth Road tonight a team now well established as a First Division club but who are, like ourselves, keen to win a major honour. Rangers have, been at Wembley just once before in an FA Cup final, taking Spurs to a replay in 1981-82.

Interestingly, if the fifth round FA Cup draw had not taken us to Loftus Road, we should have been meeting QPR here on the same day in a league game.

'Rangers recorded several Cup wins as a Third Division outfit'

Founded in 1885 as St. Jude's Institute, they became Queens Park Rangers two years later and joined the Southern League in 1898, moving with most members of that league to become founder members of the new Division Three in 1920. Though it was not until 1948 that they first won promotion to Division Two, they did pull off a number of FA Cup feats while in Division Three (South) including a win over Arsenal in 1922-23.

Their first spell in Division Two lasted only four seasons until 1952, but when they went up again from Division Three in 1967 they were on the crest of a wave, not only topping the table by a clear 12 points, but also winning the League Cup in the first final to be played at Wembley.

What is more they pulled back from a two-goal deficit to beat West Bromwich Albion. Maintaining the momentum, they went up again a year later, this time to Division One for

the first time. 1968-69, however, saw them tumbling straight back down again out of Division One.

Then came a period of stabilisation in Division Two before their next move forward. This was another spectacular one for in 1973 they regained their Second Division place and in 1975-76 they came close to the First Division Championship before ending as runners-up to Liverpool, only one point behind.

They were relegated again in 1979, but in 1981-82 they were runners-up to Spurs in the FA Cup final and just missed promotion to Division One. A year later they went up as Second Division champions and in the last four seasons they have finished successively 5th, 16th, 13th and 16th in Division One. Last season they averaged only just above one goal a game and they ended on a low note with only three points from their last seven games.

This season has been a happier one with five wins and a draw in their first six games and though they won only one game in December they have recently drawn at Arsenal. In the FA Cup they have won so far 3-0 at Yeovil and 3-1 at home to West Ham.

Formerly with Oxford United, under chairman Robert Maxwell, he surprisingly left after a very successful spell in charge when he had taken them to the First Division. Dubbed the 'bald eagle' Jim also had a highly-successful spell in charge at Blackburn Rovers. He began as a player with Sheffield United and later played for Aldershot, Halifax, Lincoln and Boston. As a manager, he has worked for Boston, Colchester, Blackburn, Birmingham and Oxford.

Mark Falco the former Spurs and Watford man has been in good scoring form recently since coming South again from Glasgow Rangers and Gary Bannister (from Sheffield Wednesday three years ago) may also pose a threat up front. John Byrne the former York striker has been substitute recently while in midfield Kevin Brock (who was with manager Jim Smith at Oxford) links up with home-grown David Kerslake, Gary Maguire and Martin Allen.

In defence Paul Parker has arrived from Fulham this season to link up with established home-grown Alan McDonald, Wayne Fereday and Alan Dawes. In goal Nicky Johns has had a wealth of experience with Millwall, Charlton and Tampa Bay Rowdies before arriving at Loftus Road this season.

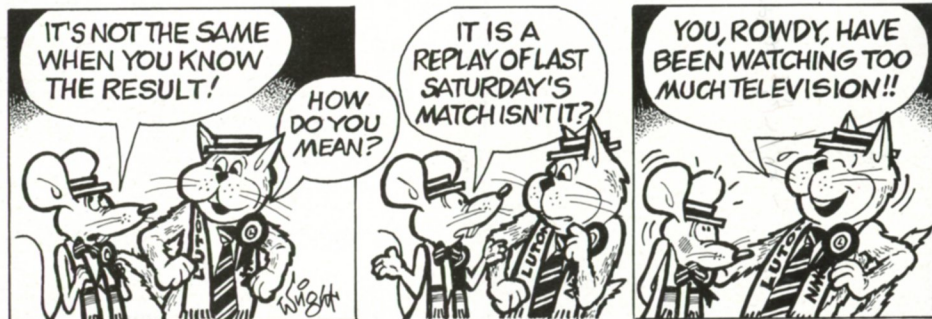

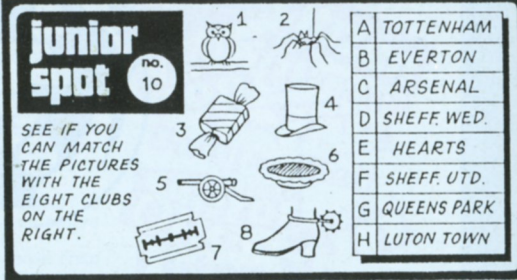

PENALTY PUZZLES OUTSHONE BY STEIN

Two penalties given against us and one appeal that was not rewarded went some way towards overshadowing a brilliant goal by Brian Stein during our 1-1 draw at Oxford in the first leg of our Littlewoods Cup semi-final. Here is a selection of the comments from the national newspapers:

Today: "Luton's players left Oxford last night convinced that Dean Saunders had conned referee Keith Hackett into giving the home side two penalties. Their one consolation was that Saunders missed the second penalty to leave Luton the favourites to reach Wembley after a 1-1 draw in this Littlewoods Cup semi-final first leg..."

"It was no real surprise when they fell behind to a Brian Stein goal five minutes before the interval. Luton unbeaten for eight games before arriving at the Manor ground took control right from the start."

The Times: "Harford exchanged passes with Brian Stein whose crisp drive from the edge of the penalty area almost up-rooted a stanchion. Oxford's response had been so limited as to be negligible apart from Hebbard's isolated long-range effort."

The Independent: "The Stein brothers danced round Harford as if he were an out of season maypole and neat play by Mick and Mark deserved a better finish by Brian who stabbed with the defence slithering. But in the 40th minute, he made amends, advancing on Oxford's harassed rearguard, playing a one-two with Harford, and letting loose a left-footer of low trajectory and perfect placing, just inside a post, that left Alan Judge helpless as it raged home from just outside the penalty area."

The Guardian: "The fine touch that Luton Town have developed on their artificial pitch should have won them the opening leg of their Littlewoods Cup semi-final against Oxford United on a mixture of snow, mud and slush at the Manor Ground."

LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

ANOTHER YEAR OF EXCITEMENT AND DRAMA IN THE PROMOTION RACE

The summer of 1968 saw intense activity behind the scenes at Luton Town. The club was not going to rest on its laurels with the Fourth Division Championship won the previous season and with an aggressive Board led by chairman Tony Hurst and an ambitious manager in Allan Brown further promotion as quickly as possible was the object, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Fuelled by Hunt's money and a huge upsurge in support Mike Harrison was signed from Plymouth, Laurie Sheffield from Oldham and Brian Lewis from Coventry for fees totalling £37,000 which was a lot of money in those days.

'Ecstasy as Watford are beaten in style

The season opened with a splendid 4-0 home win over Oldham with the Luton performance matching the brilliant weather followed up with a 3-0 win over local rivals Watford in the League Cup before an ecstatic crowd of 20167.

The sun continued to shine as relegated Rotherham were seen off 3-1 at Kenilworth Road in a game where Bruce Rioch rediscovered his previous seasons form by scoring twice and generally leading Rotherham centre-half Dave Watson a merry dance. We did not know it at the time but the opposition manager that afternoon, Tommy Docherty, was pencilling in the name of Rioch as a future purchase.

Barnsley were seen off 5-1 in another tremendous performance and as if to prove the press wrong that they could only win at home a 3-1 win at Gillingham followed with Lewis in brilliant form scoring twice and Tony Read saving a penalty taken by current Manchester City boss Mel Machin.

With seven games gone the Town were three points clear at the top and with a home game to come against Mansfield enthusiasm had reached a high point with 19315 turning up at Kenilworth Road to see a game that became the high spot of the season.

With the match three minutes old, Rioch was controversially sent off for allegedly striking an opponent in a fierce goalmouth melee (he did not touch anyone!) and from then on the Town faced an uphill struggle roared on by the seething crowd.

Amazingly, the Town took an interval lead courtesy of a Harrison penalty but shortly after the break the extra man told and Mansfield equalised. With Luton down to nine men for a time when John Moore had to leave the field for treatment and with skipper Terry Branstons limping the Town began to look a sorry sight but then a lifeline was thrown by the inconsistent referee Malcolm Sinclair.

As if realising his earlier mistake, he sent off Mansfield defender Phil Waller in the 65th minute for an innocuous foul and from then on it was all Luton as first Sheffield and then Lewis put the Town in a commanding lead.

There then followed what is regarded by many as the finest goal scored on this ground when Graham French after receiving the ball in his own penalty area loped the length of the field, beat three defenders and then the goalkeeper to calmly score with a low shot and then collapse with exhaustion under a mountain of celebrating team mates.

The cost of the victory was high with Moore, French and Branstons all injured and it was no surprise when the unbeaten record went at Brighton in a disappointing 1-0 reversal. The home wins kept on coming but they were less convincing and a string of away defeats meant that the top spot was lost to the new pacemakers Swindon and Watford.

In late October, manager Brown dipped into the transfer market again and bought cultured full back Jack Bannister from Crystal Palace and goalkeeper Sandy Davie from Dundee Utd. Both starred in a fine 2-0 home win over Swindon, the eventual League Cup winners, but were unable to help as the poor away form continued.

Shortly before Christmas, a bombshell was dropped when Brown was forced to resign after being accused by the board of being disloyal in seeking the vacant Leicester City managerial position which he actually did not get. His place was taken by Alec Stock who had recently been dismissed by QPR in similar controversial circumstances.

The players responded with a fighting 2-0 home win over Plymouth before the television cameras and then broke their poor away spell in winning 2-0 at Northampton in a game played on a sheet of ice.

Away performances continued to improve as typified by a 0-0 draw at Swindon but then in late January Bruce Rioch was injured in the home win over Walsall and the first of his many cartilage operations was the outcome.

Despite this setback, the Town, with further signing Mike Keen dominant, continued to string good, but close, results together but they had a big leeway to make up because of their away indiscretions before Christmas.

A 1-0 win at Oldham, courtesy of an own goal after 30 seconds, a 1-1 draw at foggy Reading and a fighting 2-2 draw at Rotherham put the Town firmly in third position but still five points behind second place Swindon.

A string of four home games with three wins and one draw followed by draws at Bristol Rovers and Torquay put the Town level on points with Swindon but then as has often been the case 'Easteritis' struck with a vengeance. 3500 Town fans journeyed to Mansfield to see if the unbeaten twelve match run could be extended but returned home disappointed when a lacklustre display earned a 1-0 defeat.

Thoughts of promotion were effectively ended on Easter Monday when Southport, with a ten man defence, managed to hold on to a 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road. Brian Lewis had a night he will never forget for he started at inside forward dropped back when Fred Jardine went off injured and finished up in goal (in a jersey two sizes too big for him) after Sandy Davie was badly hurt making a brave save at the feet of George Andrews who had been on the Towns books as a youngster.

'A 25,000 crowd saw the Town beat the champions-elect 2-1

With the pressure off, the Town actually played out the final five matches unbeaten and were at one stage within a whisker, once again, of Swindon.

Brighton and Stockport were beaten at home with a win at Tranmere and a draw at Southport sandwiched inbetween before the final match attracted a best of the season 25523 to Kenilworth Road to see if the Town could beat the champions-elect Watford.

The Town won 2-1 with goals by Ian Buxton, in his last game for Luton, and Keith Allen but with over 100 injured in crowd disturbances, three players sent off, and frequent pitch invasions the match is best forgotten. What must be remembered however in a season where only the top two teams were promoted, is that the Town finished ten points ahead of the fourth placed club and remained unbeaten at home boasting 20 wins and three draws.
