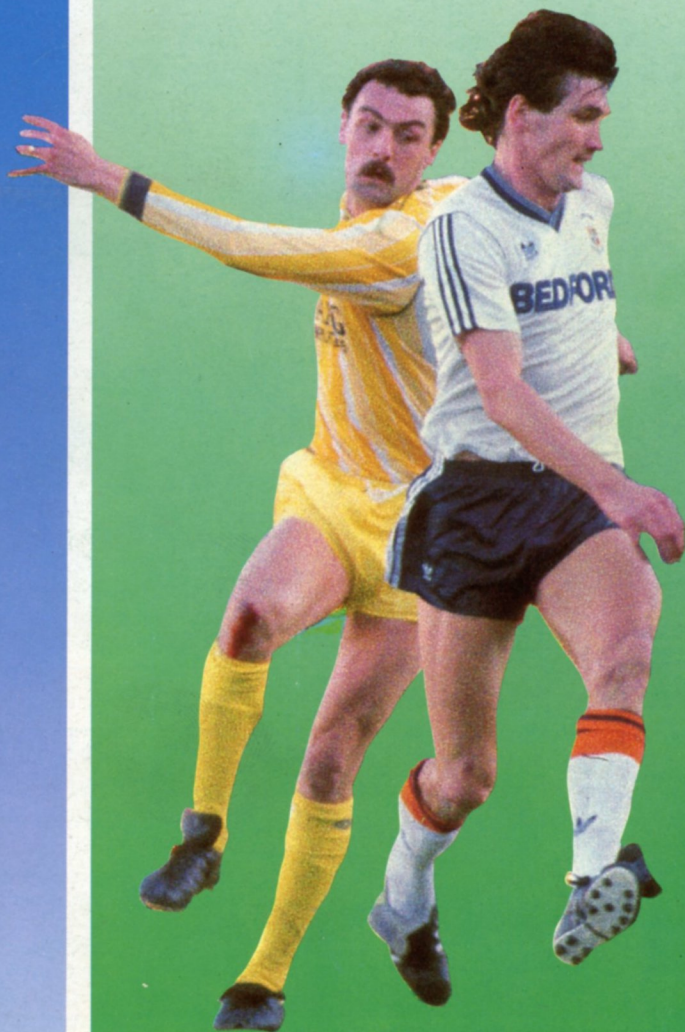

But here we are again only one match away from another possible visit to the capital of football. Everyone seemed pleased with the semi-final draw of the Littlewoods Cup, and why not? But no football supporter would be naive enough to under-estimate the uncertainty of a football match, especially a cup game. One look at a deteriorating 30-year-old straw hat will emphasise that point.

Having said that, I just feel that this could be the year when I find out whether or not it still fits me.

## RANGERS HELD

**Queen's Park Rangers 1 Luton Town 1**  
Mick Harford headed his 16th goal of the season after 65 minutes at Loftus Road last weekend to equalise for the Town against QPR. The goal cancelled out an earlier strike by the Londoners' Warren Neill and secured the draw which brought both teams back to Kenilworth Road last Wednesday night.

The goal was Mick's first in the FA Cup this term, but the Town deserved to draw after performing with patience and intelligence on a difficult surface. For an hour there was little to choose between the teams although QPR enjoyed most possession. Mark Stein was unlucky not to score when a shot was scrambled away and his rebound effort came back off a post.

The Town defence was in superb form with Steve Foster holding the dangerous Mark Falco well and Mal Donaghy, who was back from Greece only 24 hours earlier together with fellow Northern Ireland international Danny Wilson, also playing excellently. Brian Stein also caught the eye with several smooth runs between midfield and attack in his cunningly-played role of withdrawn striker.

# FOOTBALL FOCUS

## Danny Wilson



Last week's Greece v Northern Ireland international match in Athens turned into a test of more than just football skills for Town stars Danny Wilson and Mal Donaghy who played for their country in their 3-2 defeat. For after the game they discovered their scheduled return flights to London had been cancelled because of an industrial dispute in Greece. It led to a nerve-wracking 24 hours for both lads and Town officials who were planning ahead for our fifth round FA Cup tie visit to Queen's Park Rangers. Danny explains what the two Town players did to while away their time:

### Greek washing and a tour of the city in Athens

"After the match – they beat us with a very late goal in the last few seconds after we had led 1-0 and 2-1 – we found out about the problems. We had no idea before. Luckily, the Greek FA had sorted out the hotel arrangements and we were able to stay on. We heard about it before rushing off which was a good thing too.

"Our hotel was up a back street in Athens and I had a great view of the washing hanging out in the backs of all the houses. I got to know it all pretty well the next day when there was not much to do except hang around. We did go on a coach tour of the city – Billy Bingham, our manager, knew Athens well as he used to work there – for a few hours. But most of the time we were just playing cards and waiting to find out if we were going to get home in time.

"You might think we had a good time and it was like a holiday, but I can assure you it wasn't. It was certainly different. But that is all you can say. At one stage we didn't know if we were going to get back at all. Mind you, in a funny sort of way, it was a good thing because it took our minds off the FA Cup tie at QPR. Mal and I tried hard to find out what the score at Everton was in the Simod Cup, but we couldn't find out.

"Eventually, of course, we did get our flight back. And it was a very smooth one too on Olympic Airways. We were glad to get away as it was pretty boring really hanging around all that time... and we were never sure what was going on.

"For me, it was my first visit to Athens. I have never been before. The match gave me the chance to win my sixth cap – so I have some way to go to catch up with Mal who has won 62 caps now, I think. I reckon Mal will probably be one of the lynchpins in our next bid to reach the World Cup finals, but we have a tough group with Spain, Hungary and the Republic of Ireland as well as Malta in our section.

"Mind you, Mal will do well to survive at the rate he is going. He is certainly battle-scarred these days. He's had a bump on the head, bruised his ribs and had six stitches in his shin in the last few weeks! But he is a tremendously versatile player and has loads of experience too.

"It was a strange experience in Athens. But it did take our minds of worrying about the matches coming up. Just as the replay against QPR did too – that one kept our minds off today's match against Oxford. Sometimes too much time means too much tension."

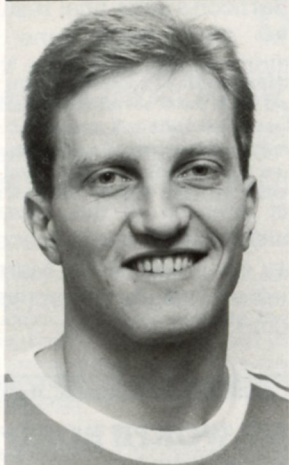

I hope both the Oxford supporters and our own will respect the occasion today and assist the police and stewards in crowd control, particularly at the Kenilworth End. The segregation arrangements are made more difficult by housing visitors and our own supporters in the same stand, we thank you for your co-operation.

Postponements have also complicated our fixture programme and this could be made worse by possible further cup replays in the future with our Simod Cup matches in most serious risk of further postponement if we are able to continue making progress. This is, of course, what it is all about!

### Delighted

I am delighted to see Jimmy Hill and John Motson here today. I have never beefed about the many appearances of the Mersey teams on television as I believe the producers choose successful and entertaining teams. So, it is a compliment to our players to have the BBC with us.

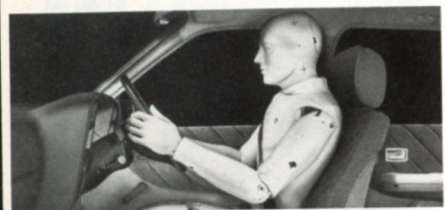

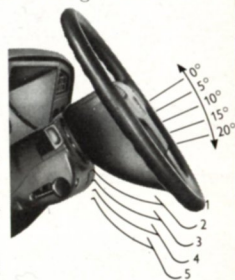

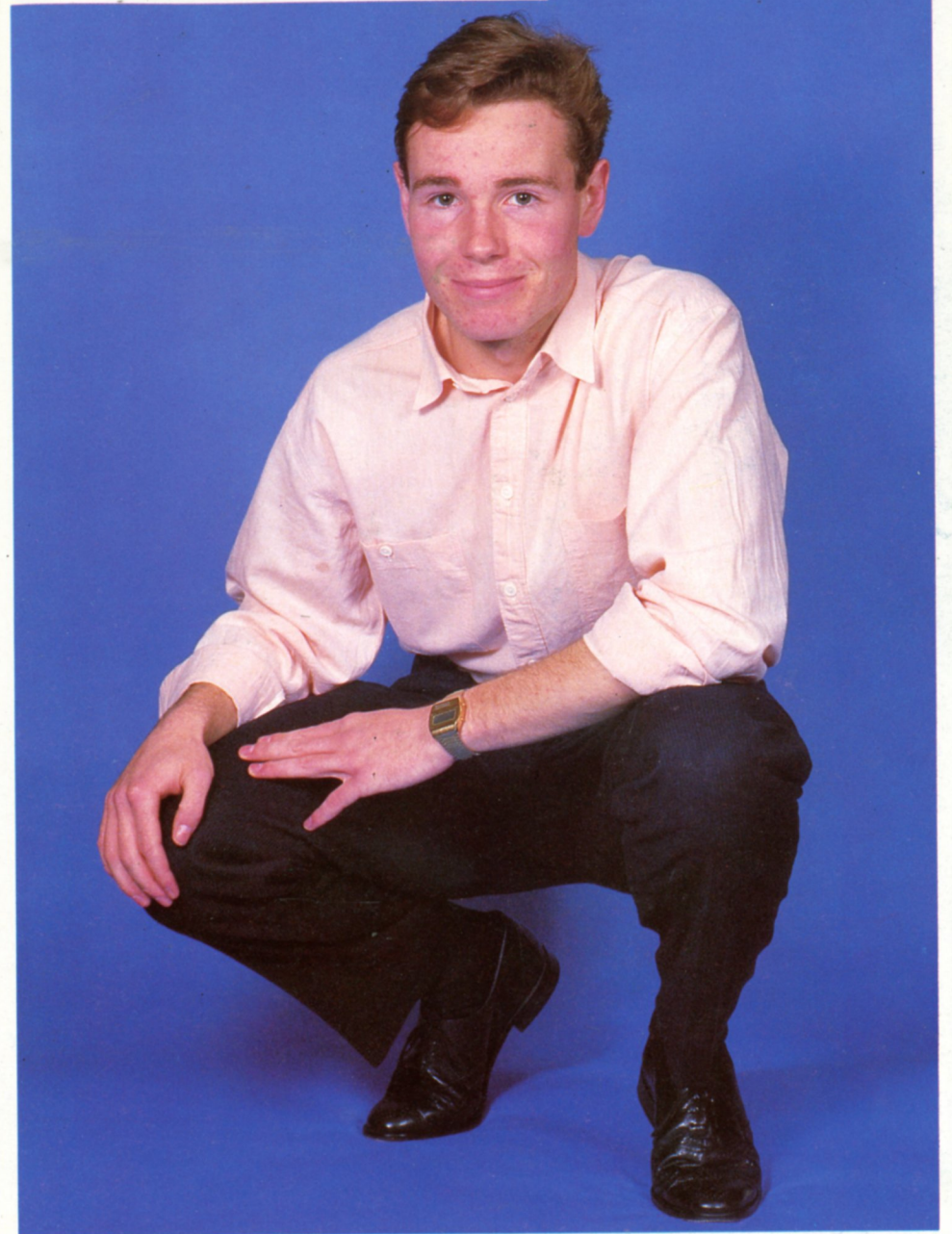

# DRESSING ROOM

with Mick Harford

*Mick Harford flew out to Tel Aviv last week to win his first England cap by coming on as a substitute in the 0-0 draw with Israel. Today, in Dressing Room Talk, he reflects on the honour of representing his country for the first time and describes his feelings after his first trip with the full England squad:*

## England cap

"It was obviously a great honour and a great experience for me. I have always been one of my two ambitions to win a full England cap. Everyone wants to play for their country and I have been very lucky to achieve that ambition. I can now only hope and keep my fingers crossed that I will get another chance in better conditions! The pitch was really terrible. My other main ambition, of course, is to play at Wembley in a cup final... so, with luck on our side, I might even cap my most successful season as a player by achieving both of my two main ambitions.

"I got the news of my call-up on my 29th birthday but I must say my first thoughts went to Cyrille Regis who was ruled out by injury. I feel very sorry for him, but I was very pleased and very proud to be picked for the squad. I enjoyed playing for the England 'B' team in Malta and was lucky enough to score the goal in that game. I did not hear any more from England after that and I was starting to think my chance might have gone, but I did keep on hoping.

"I've waited a long time for my chance and to get the news on my birthday made it even better. It is definitely the highlight of my career even though it was not a very good game. The strange thing was the conditions were great for the first two and half days we were there. It was beautiful. Sunshine all the time. The only thing was you couldn't get a suntan because you were working and running all the time! Then on the day of the match it just poured.

## Patience needed

"When I came on I saw quite a bit of the ball, but could have done with a few more crosses. I didn't have a chance to have a crack at goal. But it was good experience. You have to be more patient in international football. Bobby Robson said he thought I showed a few nice touches and he said it was difficult to come on with only 20 minutes left in such bad conditions.

"I knew quite a few of the England lads of course from playing against them and I roomed with Chris Waddle, who I've known for a few years going back to Newcastle days. We got on alright. There was not much time for relaxing or anything really. It was a serious trip with the full England team. But it was a really great experience... and I would love the chance to do it again."

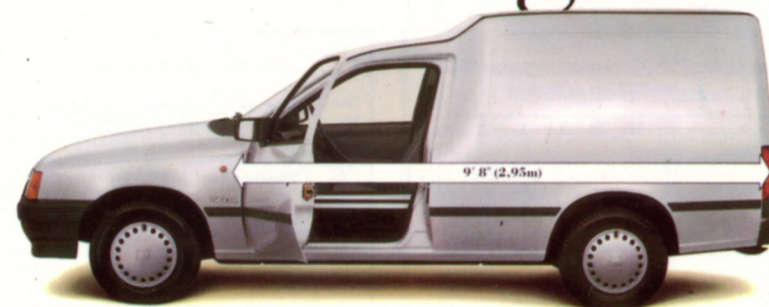

# INTRODUCING...

## OXFORD UNITED

For the fourth time this season, we find ourselves meeting Maurice Evans' Oxford United. It remains to be seen if today's Littlewoods Cup semi-final tie follows the pattern of our goal-laden league games, in which we have shared 18 goals or the much-tighter first leg in which we forced a 1-1 draw at the Manor, writes *Ceoff Allman*.

Though they have existed since 1896, Oxford are of course relative newcomers to the Football League. In fact, as Headington United, they were an amateur team in the Spartan League for many years, turning professional in 1949 and winning the Southern League three times.

### 'elected to the league in 1962'

In 1960, they changed their name to Oxford, reached the third round of the FA Cup in 1960-61 and were elected to the Football League in 1962 after Accrington Stanley had gone out of business. Since then, quite a number of well-known names have been connected with them.

Arthur Turner was the manager who not only took them into the Football League, but also led them to the last eight of the FA Cup in 1964, the first Fourth Division club to get that far. Their team, at that time, included Ron Atkinson, Maurice Kyle and Cyril Beavon in defence and Arthur Longbottom and Colin Harrington up front. By the time they reached Division Two in 1968, after promotion twice in four seasons, Republic of Ireland international David Sloan was one of their key men up front while Jimmy Barron had taken over in goal.

During their eight-season spell in Division Two, both Ron Saunders and Cerry Summers had spells as manager. Hugh Curran was their most consistent scorer while John Shuker

took his appearance tally past the 600 mark.

During their eight seasons back in Division Three from 1976 to 1984, Peter Foley emerged as a major goalscorer, Malcolm Shotton and Tim Smithers followed in the Oxford tradition of consistent defenders and Roy Burton gave great service in goal.

There was then a transformation when Robert Maxwell took the club over in January, 1982. Jim Smith was appointed manager and they topped Division Three in 1983-84 and Division Two in 1984-85. Their stalwarts at that time were strikers John Aldridge and Jeremy Charles, John Trewick in midfield and Bobby McDonald in defence.

In due course, Jim Smith moved to QPR and he had the traumatic experience of seeing his new club beaten 3-0 at Wembley by his former club in the 1986 Milk Cup final.

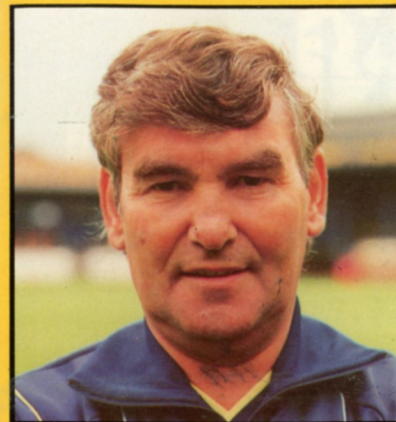
### 'a remarkable home record in this competition'

Though they have kept up their remarkable League Cup record of remaining unbeaten at home for some 30 ties, Oxford have, in general, been rather inconsistent this season. At the time of writing, their defensive record is the worst in the First Division. Apart from heavy defeats by us, they have gone down 5-2 at home to Wimbledon and 4-2 at Bradford City in the FA Cup. But, recently, we have been the only visiting team to score at Manor Park with Manchester United in Division One and Leicester in the FA Cup both losing 2-0 and Spurs being involved in a goalless draw.

Dean Saunders, who in recent weeks has scored two penalties and missed one against us is obviously a man to

Martin Foyle (ex-Southampton and Aldershot) also arrived last season and both he and former Bristol Rovers defender Neil Slatter scored against us in September, while ex-Birmingham midfielder Les Phillips and Richard Hill (scorer of 33 goals for Northampton last season) scored in the league game here earlier this month.

Others to keep an eye on are long-serving former Southampton midfielder Trevor Hebbard, who may be linking up with busy Gary Shelton (ex-Walsall, Aston Villa and Sheffield Wednesday) and former Chelsea man Peter Rhoades-Brown.

In defence, Gary Briggs has played nearly 500 games since moving from Middlesbrough and was last season joined by Tommy Caton (ex-Manchester City and Arsenal) and home-grown John Dreyer while, this season, David Bardsley has arrived from Watford. In goal, Steve Hardwick, one of many good goalkeepers to begin their careers with Chesterfield, arrived via Newcastle and has now played well over 200 games.

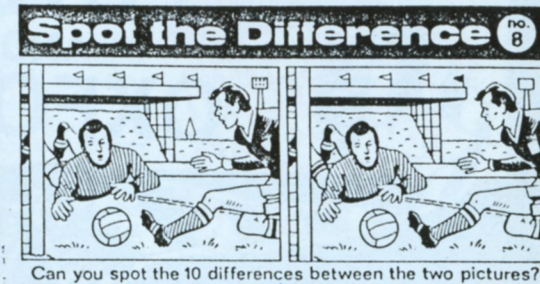

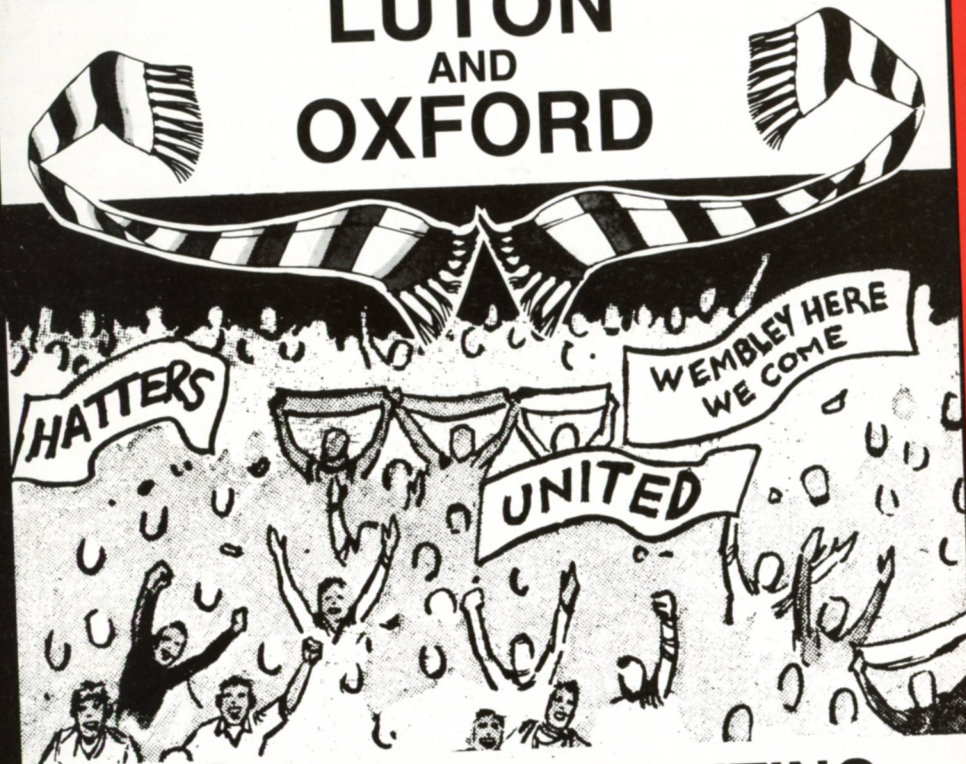

"For Harford, given his first England cap on Wednesday, it crowned a good week but was surely one of the weakest headers he has ever scored from. Although he appeared to make only modest contact with Allison's free kick, Johns, who is still deputising for Seaman, could do no more than help the ball on its way."

# LUTON TOWN GOLDEN OLDIES

## EIGHTEEN YEARS OF MEMORABLE NIGHTS IN THE 'OTHER' KNOCKOUT TOURNAMENT

As far as Luton Town were concerned, the Football League Cup was a natural successor to the Southern Professional Floodlight Cup which had proved fairly popular during the period 1955-1960, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The Town were quite happy to enter but only lukewarm response was received initially from the bigger clubs and it was not until ten years after the competition started that all 92 teams entered.

For their first game, on 19th October 1960, the Town had the unenviable task of travelling to Anfield to take on the then not quite so mighty Liverpool. A crowd of 10,502 saw Luton gain a creditable 1-1 draw with the Towns second-half equaliser being scored by Dave Brogan.

The replay saw an early exit from the competition with Roger Hunt scoring a hat-trick for the Reds in a 5-2 win at Kenilworth Road before a crowd of 6,125.

Luton went one better the following season for after disposing of a Terry Branston-inspired Northampton at Kenilworth Road, the Town succumbed to Rotherham in the next round after a replay.

1962-63 proved to be the Towns most successful in the competition until 1978 with the fourth round being reached before an unfortunate 1-0 defeat at Manchester

City put paid to the hopes of reaching the two-legged final.

Defeat by Coventry at the first attempt in the following season and by Aston Villa in Round Two in 1964-65 were par for the course as the Town sank down into Division Four and it was not until 1967-68 that a spot of giant-killing was on the cards as Charlton were beaten in a replay at the Valley.

The first game at Luton had ended 1-1 – a result that flattered Second Division Charlton – and an early goal by Matt Tees, later to play for the Town, in the replay looked like ending our hopes for another season. Bruce Rioch, however, scored an equaliser and went on to bang in the winner in extra time to earn the Town a trip to Leeds.

Leeds were at their strongest at the time and although the Town were beaten 3-1 they were not disgraced and received an ovation from the crowd of 11,473.

With the Town back in Division Three the following season and the club on the crest of a wave, a crowd of 20,167 turned up at Kenilworth Road to see local rivals Watford hammered 3-0. After seeing off Brighton in a replay the next time out an away visit to mighty Everton was the reward in round three.

Everton were at their irresistible best and the crowd of 30,405 saw the Blues take a 2-0 lead before the Luton players broke sweat. The game finished 5-1 but it is doubtful whether any team could have lived with Everton that particular evening.

1969-70 saw Luton draw 1-1 at Peterborough in the first round before winning the replay 5-2 and then win 1-0 at Millwall, again in a replay – the fluke goal being scored by Keith Allen in extra time much to the annoyance of a Den crowd of 14,125.

In the following year, the Town easily disposed of Gillingham and Workington (who had a certain John Burridge in goal!) in the early rounds before being drawn at home to Arsenal in round three.

Although Arsenal won the double that season, it is doubtful whether they had a tougher game during that campaign. How they kept their goal intact only Bob Wilson could answer as shot after shot rained on him with Malcolm Macdonald the Luton player most frustrated.

As so often happens when a team has the lion's share of play, they are caught out by a 'sucker' goal which is what happened when George Graham scored with a soft effort to win the game and send the majority of a crowd of 27,023 home miserable.

Defeat the first time out at Crystal Palace in 1971-72 was followed by a three-game epic against First Division Birmingham in 1972-73. The deciding game was won by the Blues at neutral Northampton courtesy of a goal by a certain Trevor Francis.

In the Town's promotion season of 1973-74, a hash was made of a relatively easy home game against Grimsby – a 1-1 draw being the result. The replay finished 0-0 and because the Town lost the toss of a coin the second replay was also played at Grimsby. This time a Hatters win by 2-0 was the happy outcome with goals from Tom Finney and John Faulkner earning another easy tie at home to Bury.

Another hash was made with the match finishing 0-0 and the Town were severely troubled in the replay before scraping through 3-2.

After these marathon cup-ties, it was rather surprising that the Town succumbed quite easily at Millwall in round four losing 3-1 in a game played on a Wednesday afternoon because of the deprivations caused by the three-day week.

The Town had enough on their plate trying to stave off relegation in 1974-75 and decided they did not want to win the League Cup. They lost in round three at Sheffield United, but kept the act going for a couple of seasons losing at Darlington first time out in 1975-76 and Sunderland in 1976-77.

The duck was broken in 1977-78 with a fine 3-1 win at Wolverhampton in round two before a 1-1 home draw with Manchester City appeared to end the Town's chances for another season. The Hatters however did remarkably well to hold out for a scoreless draw after extra-time and in the second replay, at Old Trafford, were actually ahead with a much weakened side before eventually bowing out bravely 3-2.

Season 1978-79 proved to be pretty dismal as far as League form was concerned but in the League Cup the Town advanced nearer to Wembley than ever before by reaching the fifth round.


