RAY'S REVIEW



Tonight we play our fifth cup tie in a fortnight dating back to that fine win at Everton when thanks to us being seeded in the early rounds, we made our first appearance in the competition. We already have enough fixture congestion to stop me even contemplating dreams of the famous twin towers. I have said all along that the league is most important... after all, it is the league position which will ultimately reflect our season.

Tension showed

One of the side effects of so much cup football is that the players get used to playing regularly. They virtually play instead of train, although, of course, they do continue to go through regular training routines to maintain peak fitness. Writing these notes before our meeting last Sunday with Oxford United in the Littlewoods Cup semi-final second leg, I cannot comment on our performance in that match. After our showing against QPR last Wednesday, I hope we were able to find our rhythm and pattern better. I felt we were tense in that game as we secured an FA Cup quarter-final meeting here with Portsmouth on March 12. We did, however, create the best chances of the night and the lads all worked very hard right to the finish.

Sometimes things do not 'click' easily into place and that seemed to be one of those nights, but we soldiered on and our sheer hard work and professionalism earned a narrow victory over Jim Smith's team. A similarly difficult game is likely tonight as we welcome Stoke City who have promised much under the guidance of Mick Mills. Give the lads your full support and enjoy the match.

INTRODUCING...

STOKE CITY

Founded in 1863, Stoke City are the second oldest Football Club in England, though it was only in recent times that the Potters enjoyed their best successes. At one stage in their history, the club dropped from the First Division to the Third Division but made a rapid recovery and in 1972 the side won their first major trophy, the Football League Cup. Stoke have qualified twice for Europe in the seventies, being beaten by Kaiserslautern (West Germany) and then Ajax (Holland).

When the original Football League was formed in 1888, Stoke City were invited to become one of its 12 founder members. After finishing bottom of the table in the first two campaigns, they failed to gain re-election. After another expansion they were given a fresh chance. The Potters began to find their feet and held their First Division place until relegation overtook them in 1907. Financial problems then reached such proportions that when, in 1908, an appeal was launched to rally around them and only three shareholders bothered to attend a crisis meeting, the club resigned from the League.

After 11 years of non-league football, Stoke regained a place in Division Two in 1919 to commence a hectic yo-yo period which saw them rise into Division One for one campaign (1922-23), then only four years later drop into Division Three (North). They were champions of the section at the first attempt and eventually returned to Division One in 1933, to remain until 1953. Then followed 19 seasons of Second Division football until promotion was achieved in 1963. Steady progress was made since then and in 1972 the club reached Wembley for the first time, defeating Chelsea 2-1 to win the Football League Cup.

Some of the truly great players to wear Stokes famous red and white stripes in modern times have included Gordon Banks, Peter Shilton, Stanley Matthews - Stoke discovered him before the war, then brought him in the sixties, George Eastam and Peter Dobing amongst many others.

Former England Captain Mick Mills took over as a Player/Manager in June 1985 and along with former Wolves Manager Sammy Chung, transformed the club. This season, Stoke are currently hovering in mid-table in the Second Division after selling their main asset, full back Lee Dixon, to Arsenal for a £400,000 fee. Players likely to be on duty tonight: **Steve Bould** (Defender). Local boy Steve has played in several positions including full back, centre half and centre forward. He developed through the apprentices ranks at the Victoria Ground and signed full professional forms in November 1980.

Chris Hemming (Defender). Another local product of the Youth Training Scheme Chris made his debut at Tottenham in March 1984. He played the last thirteen games of the season as centre-half and attracted a lot of publicity, as the first player to be fitted with a pacemaker.

Graham Shaw (Striker). A local born and talented striker, Graham has come through the ranks. He scored twice last season and is capable of getting a regular first team place.

Cliff Carr (Defender). 23-year-old attacking left-back Cliff was a £45,000 close season signing from Fulham where he was club captain. Also gained an England under-21 cap. He played over 150 games for Fulham.

Scott Barrett (Goalkeeper). Derby born, 24-year-old six-footer Scott began his career with Ilkeston Town, after

Mick Mills commenced a new career as player-manager of Stoke City on 1st July, 1985 and went on to make 31 Second Division appearances for the Potters last season. He began his career as an apprentice with Portsmouth in 1966 and later joined Ipswich, with whom he spent 16 years and made over 700 appearances - a record which may never be bettered at Portman Road. He led Ipswich to success in the FA Cup in 1978 and in the UEFA Cup three years later. Mick Mills' international career took off in 1973 when he won the first of the 42 caps for England against Yugoslavia, and was captain during the 1982 World Cup finals in Spain. In 1982, Southampton paid £50,000 for his services and made 103 appearances for the 'Saints'. In the Queens' New Years Honours list of 1984, Mick Mills celebrated his 38th birthday by being awarded the MBE for his services to football. Mick is happily settled in Staffordshire with his family, after signing a contract that keeps him at the Victoria Ground until 1989.

spending three seasons with Wolves he joined City for £10,000 in July 1987.

Steve Parkin (Midfield). Steve was still an apprentice when he made his debut for Stoke City against Nottingham Forest in April 1983. Steve has progressed through the ranks from schoolboy to apprentice and youth team captain in the 1983-84 Youth Cup Final team. He gained an England Under-21 cap as left back last season.

Carl Beeston (Midfield). A product of the Youth Training Scheme, Carl signed his first professional contract on his eighteenth birthday in June 1985. A midfield player, he made his league debut in the Forest Division game against Coventry City FA Cup in 1983/84.

Carl Saunders (Midfield). Born in Birmingham, Carl played for Erdington and Saltley Boys and was spotted playing a tournament in Skegness. Signed as an apprentice and playing mainly up front, Carl made his league debut as a substitute on 4th April 1983 at Everton.

Tony Ford (Forward). 28-year-old Tony signed from Grimsby Town in summer 1986 where he made 352 league appearances scoring 54 goals he provides extra experience up front. Formed a good understanding with Lee Dixon scorer of 7 goals last season.

Philip Heath (Forward). Born locally in Silverdale, Philip graduated through the schoolboy, apprentice and youth network, before scoring on his league debut at Southampton on the left flank. He hit the net three times this season.

Tony Henry (Midfield). Tony, 29, signed from Oldham Athletic for £40,000 just two days after scoring a penalty kick equaliser against us. Born in Sunderland he made almost 100 appearances for Manchester City before signing for Bolton Wanderers. He then signed for Oldham Athletic in March 1983 making over 175 appearances and scoring 24 goals.

Simon Stainrod (Striker). Previous club was Aston Villa, joined Stoke City at the end of 1987 for a £100,000 fee. Aged 28 and he was born in Sheffield.
