When we went 2-1 up against Coventry here last Saturday I could see no other result but a home victory, so it was a real sickener when David Speedie smacked in that 75th minute equaliser.

The strong wind spoiled the game in terms of entertainment value, but it had nothing to do with the fact that we tossed two more points away.

Coventry's first goal early in the second half came from a defensive error, but once Michael O'Neill had equalised I felt confident of the three points. When he was on the spot again to give us the lead I couldn't see the Sky Blues getting back into the game.

But at this level you invariably get punished if you are guilty of slack marking and Speedie was very happy to find himself free of a marker after Gary Kelly had blocked Micky Glynn's shot.

We have tossed away a bundle of points in recent matches — March has been a disappointing month. We have to start our Easter programme with victory over Luton, who went into last Sunday's Simod Cup Final against Reading the hottest of favourites to win by some margin.

Nearly 62,000 at Wembley saw them take an early lead with a Mick Harford header and it was a major surprise when the struggling Second Division club hit back to lift the trophy with a 4-1 scoreline.

But Ray Harford and his players deserve our congratulations on their outstanding feat of making it to Wembley three times this season with a fourth visit still in the melting pot.



Apart from the Simod Cup, they play Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup Final on the last Sunday of this month just a few days after taking part with us in the Football League centenary games at Wembley.

And next Saturday they take on Wimbledon at White Hart Lane in the semi-finals of the F.A. Cup. It's not surprising that they have played fewer League games than any other club in the four divisions and Ray Harford, who watched our game last Saturday, will be demanding a committed performance this afternoon.

We were hammered 4-0 at Kenilworth Road in November when we were always second best and Ray knows that we won't be as feeble this time.

We go to Derby on Monday and you can bet your life that Arthur Cox will have his players wound up against his old club. I still can't see any valid reason why we can't finish in the top eight. But we'll have to stop being as generous to visiting teams as we were to Coventry!





LUTON TOWN


LUTON have never known a season quite like this one.

They have a chance of smashing the club record by improving upon the seventh place they achieved last season and could be making FOUR trips to Wembley!

Last Sunday they played Reading in the Simod Cup Final at Wembley and they have qualified for the Festival of Football at the stadium, while they are also through to the final of the Littlewoods Cup. The next Saturday they face Wimbledon in the semi-finals of the F.A. Cup.

Luton's away form in the First Division has not been too impressive. Their only away wins in the League game at Oxford (5-2), sheffield Wednesday (2-0) and Watford (1-0). Their only other away point came from a draw at West Ham (1-1).

Luton usually play **Mark Stein** and **Mick Harford** in attack with **Brian Stein** playing just behind them. Mark Stein made his League debut in 1983/84 and has now established himself in the side. He has scored 11 goals this season. Older brother Brian has on two occasions been top scorer. He has played once for the full England team and also has three under-21 caps.



MICK HARFORD

Danny Wilson, Darren McDonough, Rob Johnson and **Ian Allinson** have been playing in midfield. **Kingsley Black** is often included as substitute. Wilson, who scored for Northern Ireland against Poland a couple of weeks ago, now has seven international caps. Signed from Brighton last summer, he previously played for Bury, Chesterfield and Nottingham Forest. McDonough was signed from Oldham last season. Introduced to Oldham's side in 1980/81, he made more than 200 first-team appearances for the side. Johnson, who can play in defence or midfield, was first introduced to League soccer in 1983/84 when he also played for Lincoln on loan. Allinson was signed from Stoke in October. For almost a decade he was a prolific scorer for Colchester. Arsenal signed him in 1983 and he moved on to Stoke last summer.

Steve Foster and **Mal Donaghy** play in the middle of the defence. Foster left Portsmouth for Brighton in 1979 and, while with the Seagulls, he won three England caps. Aston Villa signed him in 1984 and he moved on to Luton about a year later. Donaghy was signed from Larne Town in 1978 and has built a wonderful record of consistency, missing only seven League games in nine years. He has also established himself in the Ireland team, winning his 54th cap against Poland.

Tim Breacker and **Ashley Grimes** are the full-backs. Breacker, is a Luton discovery, got his senior chance in 1984 and has been a regular for the past three seasons. Grimes, a Republic of Ireland international, played some 100 games for Manchester United signing for Coventry in 1983. He moved on to Luton a year later.

Goalkeeper **Les Sealey** developed with Coventry City and held his first-team place for five years before joining Luton in 1983. In a brief period when he was out of the side, in 1985, he was loaned to Plymouth.

Luton have yet to win any of the game's major honours but they have a great chance of doing so this season. They played at Wembley on one occasion, losing to Nottingham Forest in the 1959 F.A. Cup Final.

There is some irony in the fact that, having played only once at Wembley during their first 100 years, they could go there four times within a couple of months this year!

MICK HARFORD

MICK Harford enjoyed the greatest moment of his soccer career when he was called on as substitute to play for England in Israel in February. Now he hopes he can keep on scoring and persuade Bobby Robson to include him in the England squad for the European Championship finals in West Germany this summer.

The former Newcastle striker has been at his sharpest this season and seems certain to top Luton's scoring list for the second time in three seasons. Injuries caused him to miss more than half of last season.

He began his career with Lincoln City, making his League debut at home to Gillingham in December 1977. He needed a couple of seasons to settle but in 1979/80 he was top scorer with 16 goals. He opened the following campaign with eight goals in his first four games.

By December, Mick had scored 13 goals for Lincoln and Newcastle swooped for his signature. The £200,000 fee was the highest ever paid for a Fourth Division player.

His stay at St. James's Park was brief and the following summer he moved on to Bristol City who had just equalled a dismal record by suffering relegation from the First to the Third Division in successive seasons. Needing an established forward to help them stabilise, they agreed a £150,000 fee for Mick.

The player soon started to repay the club with a stream of goals and he quickly established himself as their leading marksman. Sadly, City fell behind with their repayments to Newcastle and the club's finances were in such disarray that it almost collapsed under the strain.

Indeed, it was by deciding to sell Mick that City managed to carry on for a few more weeks.

Birmingham paid £100,000 for him and he provided a steady flow of goals for them until transferring to Luton for £250,000 in 1984. He scored 16 goals in his first season at Kenilworth Road, adding 25 in 1985/86. Mick has scored 20 times in all competitions for Luton this season.

MEMORY MATCH

NEWCASTLE UNITED 0, WEST HAM 3

August 23rd, 1978

THE result may have been wrong, but John Connolly has two special reasons for picking out this defeat as his Memory Match from the two seasons he spent at Newcastle.

It was his debut in front of the St. James's Park crowd, with more than 27,000 turning up to see Bill McGarry's side in their first home game of the season.

And it was virtually the only occasion that John was given the chance to play in England in what he always considered his best position.

The former Scottish international was always

thought of as a winger during his days at Everton, Birmingham and United, but maintained his best position was alongside the centre-forward.

That was the role which brought him 46 goals in 90 appearances in Scotland before his move to Goodison Park.

And it was the role he was given alongside his close pal Jim Pearson when St. James's Park was given its first glimpse of McGarry's new-look team.

Connolly says: "It may seem a strange match to choose when you look at the

scoreline, but it sticks in my memory because I was allowed to play as a striker and I enjoyed the 90 minutes as much as any other I played in England.

"I thought I did well — in fact, the team played pretty well and didn't really deserve to lose. And I've got to admit that it has always left me wondering what might have happened if I had been used as a striker with my English clubs."

At Newcastle, the experiment lasted just one game before Peter Withe made his first appearance and Connolly was sent out to the wing to provide the bullets for the big striker.

Withe certainly got his fair share of goals from chances created by the Scot, but McGarry's side wasn't good enough to climb out of the Second Division, although they flirted with promotion before falling away badly in Connolly's second season.

However, John has happy memories of his time on Tyneside when he was part of a strong Scottish contingent.


He says: "I loved Newcastle — the city, the fans and just everything about the place. If any player in Scotland asks me about going south, I always recommend Newcastle. Pass on my best wishes to the supporters and everybody at the club."

John, who was transferred to Hibernian in 1980, now lives in Ayr and works for a wine and spirit company.

He recently returned to football as manager of junior club Annbank United and admits: "I've still got the bug, so it's good to be involved again."

"I would like to think that this could be a springboard into a job with one of the league clubs, but we'll have to wait and see."







BACK in the first team picture and desperately hoping for an extended run. That's the current scene for Paul Stephenson, who last Saturday started a First Division game for the first time since Liverpool severely embarrassed us here in September.

"I was so nervous before the Coventry game — it was like making my debut all over again. But I really enjoyed it and was very disappointed when I was substituted just before the end", says the 20-year-old who was still a couple of weeks short of his 18th birthday when he lined up in top flight company for the first time.

That was back in December 1985 — the 14th to be precise. The opponents were Southampton, Paul's left back marker was the infamous Mark Dennis, we were ninth top — and Stevo had the ball in the Saints' net after just a few minutes.

Goalkeeper Phil Kite — making a rare appearance because Peter Shilton had a calf injury — rolled the ball out to Dennis and our eager No. 7 read the situation beautifully to intercept and score.

"You can imagine how disappointed I was when a linesman signalled that the ball hadn't gone out of the penalty area before I made contact, so I was denied a goal on my debut."

But a happy first appearance it turned out to be, with Glenn Roeder's header giving us the lead, Steve Moran equalising and then Peter Beardsley outwitting Mark Wright and Kite to score a brilliant 79th minute winner at the Gallowgate End.

Danny Wallace was sent off in that match and Paul recalls: "It was what every Geordie lad dreams of — playing for Newcastle United in the First Division.



"Billy Whitehurst made his home debut for us that afternoon, but what I remember most is the sheer quality of Beardsley. I knew what a good player he was just by seeing him in training, but actually playing with him in the First Division was a joy.

"Quite apart from the fantastic things he did on the pitch — he and I quickly struck up a good understanding and every ball he played to me was weighted perfectly. The way he encouraged me and helped me through that first game was tremendous.

"The fans also helped enormously. I reckon Geordies like nothing better than to see one of their own come through from the juniors and they certainly got behind me on that smashing day."

Once in the side Paul stayed in for more than 20 matches — and then a reserve team game against Everton after the first team programme had been completed cost him dearly.

"I tore the ligaments in my left ankle and it took so long to clear up that I missed the pre-season training for the start of the 1986-87 season. It was late September before I got back into the first team at Norwich," he recalls.

Having played his part in helping us to stay up last season, when Paul Goddard's goals and Paul Gascoigne's return from injury were critical factors, the youngster who first signed for Newcastle on schoolboy forms at 14 had every reason to believe that his third first team season would be better than ever.

He had played 46 First Division matches when this campaign got under way. But he has added only three League appearances plus one as sub to that total and had become something of a forgotten man until he sprang back into the spotlight at Arsenal a fortnight ago.

"I sprained my right ankle in a pre-season friendly against Blyth Spartans just before this season opened and that didn't help", he told us. It was September before I was back in the first team for the 2-2 result at Manchester

United when Mirandinha got his first League goal.

"The next game was that shaker against Liverpool at St. James's Park when they thrashed us, just as they have thrashed so many teams this season. After that I played just one more first team game — at Blackpool in the Littlewoods Cup when Tony Cunningham snapped up Gazza's back pass for the only goal.

"Since then it's been a long, hard slog in the reserves trying to prove that I was worth another first team chance. It's not easy in the Central League when you've had a taste of first team football, but I had a spell when I scored four times in five games and I suppose that as much as anything persuaded Willie McFaul to send me on at Highbury.

"Getting on from the start against Coventry was a big boost to my confidence and now I'm dying to stay in the side until the end of the season."


Very much a maker rather than a taker of goals, Paul has hit the net just once at senior level. That was on Easter Monday two years ago in the 4-1 demolition of Sheffield Wednesday here.

"I haven't scored enough," Paul confessed. "It's something I have to put right, but having banged a few in for the reserves recently I'd like to think I can do the same in the first team.

"These next few weeks are important to me. My contract expires this summer and there's no way I want to leave. I've had some disappointments this season, but people forget that I was only 20 in January.

"I've got years of football ahead of me — hopefully with Newcastle United. It's hard for me to imagine playing for another club."

TODAY'S REFEREE



YTS IN FOOTBALL

At the start of season 1984/85 the Government's Youth Training Scheme (YTS) was introduced into the Football League.

This was a very significant move in the history of the Football League as it allowed many of the current stars to come into the game at a time when the financial structure of 90% of the Football League Clubs was so bad that the number of apprentices had fallen to just over 240 amongst 92 clubs. Now through YTS even Fourth Division Clubs can carry between 10-15 Trainees the current term for Apprentices.

Here at Newcastle, Ian Bogie, Paul Stephenson and Brian Tinnion have come via YTS with five of our Reserve team also products of the same Scheme.

Anthony Lormor, who signed a full time contract in February, at seventeen years of age is yet another YTS trainee.

Without the help of YTS how many of our current young stars of

the Football League would still be playing their football on local parks instead of the great stadiums up and down the country?

Recently, Lee Howey, the brother of Steve Howey who is an Associated Schoolboy with us, had his career ended through injury at nineteen years of age. Because through YTS he attended College for two years following a City and Guilds recreation Course, he was able to get into a full time course at Wearside College, the same College as our Trainees attend every Thursday.

Through the co-operation of Gateshead Recreation Department, our Trainees go out to various Sports centres for a half day each week to gain work experience. This experience is essential to help trainees find alternative employment should they not make the grade as a full time player.

It is a very sobering thought that without YTS it is doubtful whether there would have been sufficient Junior teams to form a single Junior league let alone all the Area Leagues which are in operation.

YTS provides training for a wide range of occupations as well as training for professional footballers.



And the reserves are set to feature 18-year-old Archie Gourlay, a £50,000 signing from Morton, before the end of the season.


The juniors also suffered a setback in pursuit of the Northern Intermediate League, going down to a shock defeat at Halifax.


