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

WELL DONE LUTON. That was a magnificent achievement to beat Arsenal at Wembley and win the Littlewoods Cup. A euphoric experience which we remember from a few years back.

To have the Littlewoods Cup winners here this afternoon adds a little spice to the game and that's the sort of thing we relish here at Carrow Road as we go out to try and clinch the three points which will book our position in the First Division next season.

Our last match here had a touch of garnish to it when we held up Liverpool's claim to the Championship. It was a magnificent display by us but as had happened, after our victory over Manchester United the month before, we didn't get the press revues I feel we were entitled to.

It seems if you do well against the giants of the game the inference is always that they didn't play well rather than turning the spotlight on the quality of our game.

Let's not forget that NORWICH CITY are the only side not to concede a goal to the Champions over two games and that is some achievement this season.

Looking back on that game at Carrow Road, it provided the yardstick by which we should judge ourselves. We proved that night that we can stick with the top team in the country. And that is the standard we have to maintain.

Portsmouth, of course, was a different game. They are struggling for their First Division life and it was always going to be a battle against their physical approach. At the end of the day we could reflect that we let the match slip after being a goal up and that we were not as professional as we had been against Liverpool — handing Portsmouth two goals. But there were other strengths to applaud. Not least the players resolve and strength of character which in the end brought us back on level terms.

Once again these qualities were not reflected in the coverage of the match . . . perhaps today we can not only overcome Luton Town but also earn our just reward in the sport columns of the press.

We welcome Anglia TV's match sponsorship. Anglia's intention is not only to help the club but to make it a day out to remember for as many as possible. That is why they are entertaining 40 competition winners here today — and staging an Under 15 penalty "shoot out", which is always good entertainment. 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

We have to apply ourselves, as we did against Liverpool, week in week out. If we do that then we could be mounting the winners rostrum ourselves.

Still it was a good experience for the younger players, even for myself, to play against people of that quality and match them. It was a great crowd, a great atmosphere, and a great night all round.

Football is enjoyable when it is like that. The spirit on the field was good and although there were no goals, and it perhaps wasn't the greatest of spectacles, it was a typical English game and we were well pleased with it.

I was asked my opinion this week about the proposal to deduct League points from clubs with poor disciplinary records next season and all I can say is that I don't know if it will have the required effect.

In the main reactions on the field are down to the individual and it seems a little unfair to me to punish a whole team for individual actions. If a player's temperament is that way inclined anyway it is a little presumptuous to assume that they will curb their aggressiveness in the heat of the moment.

Anyway, back to this afternoon and what promises to be a good game of entertaining football. I hope you enjoy it.

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
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

Chairman's Message



I thought the Liverpool game was amongst the best performances I have seen from us this season without actually scoring, and I would have to say that I do not think David and the team got due credit for working so hard to make sure that Liverpool were never allowed to settle into their game.

Well done to the team on the unique achievement of not conceding a goal against Liverpool in the League this season. As usual we rose magnificently to the occasion of playing a top side and, trying to be objective, I thought we did most and came closest to earning three points. We were also very glad to take away a point from Portsmouth; a team that really needed to beat us.

I would like to welcome Luton to Carrow Road this afternoon and also to congratulate them on winning the Littlewoods Cup. We, of course, won this competition three years ago when it was the Milk Cup, so I know how proud everyone at Luton must be of this achievement. Congratulations.

Our last game against Luton, in December, was our first win after a series of six defeats and two draws — and it earned David and the team a second Barclay's League Performance of the Week Award. We are all looking forward to maintaining this record against the only other East Anglian club in the First Division.

On Tuesday we had the very pleasing news that the Football Grounds Improvement Trust had approved our application for a grant for our improvements to the disabled facilities and Family Area. Work on the scheme begins now.

These improvements have been a priority for sometime now and I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to the FGIT for their valuable help in this initiative to provide better facilities for our supporters.

Today we welcome Anglia Television as match sponsors, and in doing so would like to acknowledge the excellent work they do in keeping all our supporters up to date with the news from Carrow Road.

This occasion would seem to a good opportunity to mention that for some time now, we have been concerned by the severe imbalance in the current arrangements for the national televised coverage of League football matches; in short, we believe that the 'glamour' clubs get too much coverage.

Quite apart from the basic unfairness of this tendency, it also has the more subtle effect of promoting the 'glamour' clubs. And it is this promotion which makes it artificially harder for the rest of us to compete — not just on the pitch, but also in the transfer market.

This cannot be good for the game, or for the game's followers, when there are so many excellent teams and players to watch in the First Division of the League. Indeed, one could go further and argue that many 'ordinary' Saturday league fixtures produce better football and therefore potentially better viewing than many televised internationals.

Well, Coventry City Football Club are planning to table a motion at the Football League asking that any one ground is limited to one televised league match per season, and that the controversial system of television companies paying compensation to clubs — who claim their crowds suffer because of the presence of cameras — be abolished altogether.

This seems to us to be a sound initiative, and I am delighted to confirm that I, on behalf of the Club, have been asked to second that motion at the next Football League meeting. I will keep you posted on developments!



We then surprised the home side when **Rosario** latched onto a through ball, carried it for 20-yards, then slid his shot past the Watford keeper for a worthy winner.


We showed good character in this game which completed a hat-trick of wins over the top teams to take us to the top of the Combination table.

Welcome to . . .

IAN ALLINSON — Striker. Arsenal literally pinched him from Fulham when they nipped in to take advantage of a technicality and sign him for nothing in the summer of 1983. Ian had played over 300 games for Colchester United and had finished top scorer in his final two seasons at Layer Road. Born in Stevenage Ian made his Arsenal debut against Walsall (Nov. '83), in the Milk Cup. Was released by the Gunners last summer and joined Stoke City but in September Luton snapped him up. Although a member of Arsenal's first team squad last season he was not used in their Littlewoods Cup Final team and was also precluded from the Luton team to play in this year's final as he was cup-tied.

KINGSLEY BLACK — Forward. Talented young winger who gained England Under-18 Schoolboy honours in season 1985-86. At the time he was also holding a regular place in the Luton Town reserve side. Signed professional with the Hatters last season when he was 18 and made his senior debut against QPR (26-9-87). A left-sided player he combined exceptional close control with the speed of a sprinter, and made a lasting impression on the Littlewoods Cup Final.

ANDREW DIBBLE — Goalkeeper. Cost Luton £125,000 when they signed him from Cardiff City in the summer of 1984. Born in Cwmbran he joined Cardiff as an apprentice making his League debut against Crystal Palace (8-5-82). In all made 62 League appearances for the Welsh club helping them gain promotion to the Second Division. While at Ninian Park he was capped by Wales at Youth and Under-21 levels. Started season 1985-86 in the Luton goal until injury in the November cost him his place. It was because of injury to Sealey that he came back in to earn the headlines following a penalty save in Luton's Littlewoods Cup Final triumph over Arsenal.

MAL DONAGHY — Defender/Midfield. Luton's most capped International, with over 50 to his credit, he has now played in two World Cup campaigns for Northern Ireland. Within months of making his debut for Larne he was being chased by many English First Division sides and it was regarded as an astute piece of business by former Manager David Pleat when Donaghy was "stolen" for £20,000 in June 1978. Solid and dependable he forms, with Steve Foster, arguably the best central defensive partnership in the country. Ever present last season as he has been for six out of the last nine. Total League and Cup appearances for Luton to end 1986/87 476 — Goals 20.

STEVE FOSTER. Has been an influential figure at Kenilworth Road since his arrival from Aston Villa in November 1984. David Pleat plucked the former England pivot from Villa's reserve team for just £70,000 and rated the deal the best he'd ever done. Born at Portsmouth, Steve joined his local club as an apprentice and made 109 League appearances for them in four seasons. Brighton invested £150,000 for him in the summer of 1979 and he came to prominence as Albion gained First Division status and reached the 1983 FA Cup Final. In March 1984 Villa paid £200,000 for Steve but he did not figure in Graham Turner's plans when he took control. Won 3 caps with England and played for the Under-21 side.

ASHLEY GRIMES. Now 30, Dublin born Grimes enjoyed his longest spell in the Luton first team in 1986/87 after almost being transferred to Swindon during the previous

They show that Luton start and finish very strongly with 5 out of 6 first half goals coming in the opening 15 minutes and 10 out of 16 in total coming in the second half.

Luton appear to be vulnerable just after half time with 13 out of 24 goals coming in that period.

CLOSE SEASON. He played the early part of his career with Manchester United where he had 90 League games and appeared regularly for Eire. Transferred to Coventry in August 1983 he joined Luton a year later in a straight swap for Kirk Stephens but was then plagued with injuries during his first two seasons at Kenilworth Road. Total League and Cup appearances for Luton to end 1986/87 52 — Goals 2.

ROB JOHNSON. Born in Bedford and turning professional for the Town in August 1979 his career was almost over before it started. He suffered two extremely serious knee injuries which would have put most players out of the game but he fought back to make his debut against Birmingham in November 1983. He played most of last season at left-back but prefers the right-side. Total League and Cup appearances for Luton to end 1986/87 62 — Goals 0.

DARRON McDONOUGH. Belgium born McDonough scored on his League debut for Oldham against Notts County in December 1980 thereby joining an exclusive club. He signed for Luton early last season in exchange for £87,000 to become a versatile and valuable

EMEKA NWAJIOBI. Upredictable Nigerian International who burst on the scene with a scoring debut against Nottingham Forest on 2nd January 1984 only weeks after transferring from Dulwich Hamlet. On his day a match-winner who makes goalscoring look easy. Total League and Cup appearances for Luton to end 1986/87 71 — Goals 17.

LES SEALEY. Although born and raised in the East End of London Sealey made his League bow with Coventry for whom he signed in March 1976. Played 178 times for the "Sky Blues" before transferring to Luton in August 1983 for £100,000. Has found himself out of favour on more than one occasion but has fought back with many superlative displays to become the acknowledged number one. Total League and Cup appearance for Luton to end 1986/87 171.

MARK STEIN. Brian's younger brother who signed professional forms for Luton in January 1984 making his debut three months later in a 3-0 home defeat by Everton. He had to wait nearly 18 months for his next League game but has gradually forced his way into the side with last season being his most successful to date as 8 goals in 21 League appearance proved. Total League and Cup appearances for Luton to end 1986/87 32 — Goals 10.

DANNY WILSON. Ray Harford's first major signing, from Brighton, in the close season. Born in Wigan on January 1st 1960 he made his League debut for Bury in season 1977/78 before being transferred to Chesterfield three years later. His performances for the "Spirites" inspired Brian Clough to take him to Nottingham Forest in January 1983 but things did not work out at the City Ground and he moved to Brighton only ten months later. Qualifies for Northern Ireland through parentage and made three International appearances last season.


RAY HARFORD after a successful season as First Team Coach, Halifax born Harford's talent and belief in attractive play made him the natural successor to John Moore, as manager of Luton Town and he took over in the close season.

A former half-back he learnt his trade at Charlton making his League debut in 1965. Following a transfer to Exeter in January 1968 Ray made over 350 League appearances for several clubs in the lower divisions before finishing his playing career at Colchester who offered him his first coaching post.

He arrived at Luton in the summer of 1986 following a spell as Manager of Fulham and last Sunday led the Hatters to their first major trophy when they beat Arsenal 3-2 in the Littlewoods Cup Final.

One to watch

BRIAN STEIN



BRIAN STEIN became a national hero last Sunday when he scored two goals at Wembley to steer Luton Town to victory over Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup Final.

It was the highlight of a successful career at Kenilworth Road for the dusky striker who was born in South Africa but arrived here at an early age to forge a new life in England.

As a footballer Brian first came to prominence with Edgware and in October 1977 was offered a professional contract by Luton. Within weeks of arriving at Kenilworth Road he was in the first team, making his debut at Old Trafford against Manchester City in a twice played Football League Cup tie.

The young striker soon realised his potential with two goals in his first full home League game and since then he has been a regular choice scoring freely in all subsequent seasons.

A player with good balance, tight control and the pace to destroy defenders, he was given a run out with England against France in Paris in 1984, but it wasn't a good England performance and Brian suffered the consequences.

Now he has shown his class again and Sunday's triumph is no more than he deserves.

At Home with...

SIMON RATCLIFFE left the big city of Manchester to seek fame and fortune in Norfolk with the Canaries. Ambitions which have not yet been realised but ones which he is determined to make come true.

Disappointed of course he is. When he left Manchester United for Carrow Road it was to further his career and establish himself as a first team player. The fact that he has spent most of this season in the Canaries reserves reflects the frustrations he obviously feels.

"It is hard," admits Simon. "I'm looking to get into the team though . . . I have no thoughts of trying to get away.

"I really love this Club and have enjoyed my time here. The greatest disappointment for me though was the fact that I didn't make the most of my chances. First when I made my debut against Newcastle in September and then when I got back in the team.

"At Old Trafford I played as a centrehalf all my career but had a couple of games in midfield when we were hit by injuries. Ken Brown knew that and told me to have a go in that position in the First Division and that was a different ball game. I just didn't have the experience in that position to handle it.

"Now I find myself torn between two areas and am not sure what is my best position . . . I feel it is important for me to establish my own identity and authority on the place so I have got to decide whether I'm going to be a centrehalf or play in midfield.

"Gossy took over my role in midfield and has played very well. In fact there are a lot of good players at Carrow Road who are not in the team at the moment so the competition is tough. But I'm not going to lie down, I'm going to fight to establish myself.

"I said when I came here that I didn't expect to get straight into the first team. The side had finished fifth in the First Division table last season so there was obviously plenty of quality here and I knew it would take time. As it happened my chance came quicker than I expected and I failed to make the most of it.

"Reserve team football can become very frustrating more than anything. But if you want to get into the senior side then you have to first do your stuff at that level. That is the target which motivates you."

Disappointed but not disillusioned Simon says: "This season is over as far as my first team ambitions are concerned. I shall put it down to experience and work hard at getting really fit in the summer so that I can give it a real crack next season."


The summer could have meant a great deal more to Simon as well for as a Lancashire Schools cricketer and England trialist he could well have been swinging the willow at County level.

"I actually prefer cricket as a game," he smiles. "When I was 12 I could have gone either way, cricket or football. But the lads who eventually made that England team played cricket every night of the week. I played football for five nights and cricket for two so football had to be my eventual choice."

Born and bred in Eccles Simon is as aware as anyone that you can't have your cake and eat it. He is now happily settled in a new home at Poringland, where he is seen here with his girlfriend Helen, and aims to work hard to make a successful career with the Canaries. He's looked upon as something of a gardening expert by his colleagues at Carrow Road but grins: "At the moment it is just a novelty. I bought a bag of peat so they think I'm an expert!"

Simon will be more convinced when he receives the same accolade as a footballer.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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5 Years Ago

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


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IAN TAKES PRIZE

Regional programmes are spearheaded by the top-rated, daily news magazine 'ABOUT ANGLIA' at 6.00 p.m., which includes Eastern Sport on Mondays and Fridays presented by Gerry Harrison. On Saturdays at 5.05 p.m. there's a round up of the days sporting action and news with a further bulletin at 6.35 p.m. on Sundays.

The majority of Anglia's 600 hours of programmes a year are of specific regional interest but the company is also a significant contributor of programmes to the ITV network. Among the best known are their drama productions, including 'Tales of the Unexpected' and the 'P. D. James Murder Mysteries'. In May another Anglia, major drama 'Menace Unseen', a three-part computer crime thriller, will be screened; starring Ian Ogilvy and Judi Bowker. Anglia's internationally famous 'Survival' wildlife series is Britain's No. 1 television export with sales to over 100 countries.

I recently paid tribute to our lottery agents in general and Stan Burnham in particular. Today I would like to give a well-earned accolade to a contemporary of Stan's, George Howard.

George admits to being a young 73 and is now in his sixtieth year of supporting the Canaries, having first watched them from the terraces of the old Nest in 1928. To this day he can still trot out the names of the players who played in those far off days. George is something akin to a stick of rock; if you cut him open you'd find the yellow and green name of Norwich City etched throughout!

George, for many years a sales representative, joined the staff of the old Norwich City Supporters' Association, the fundraising arm of the Norwich City Supporters' Club, in 1976 when lotteries came into being. He had previously been assisting the Supporters' Association since 1959 as a part-time agent selling their pool competition tickets.

In 1980 George was 'transferred' to Norwich City Promotions, following the closure of the Supporters' Association office in King Street. For the next couple of years, until his 'retirement' in 1982, George was this club's lottery representative in-the-field servicing the hundreds of selling agents throughout the county.

George has never really retired; since 1964 he has been responsible for supervising the matchday sales, around Carrow Road, of the 'Canary' programme — a job he continues to do to this day.

Behind every good man is a good woman. In George's case this is his lovely wife, Vera. I have always told her she is too good for George but she tells me has got used to him after all these years. Vera has served the club, and the tea, for 20 years on match days. I know this as I am her self-appointed chief taster! May both Vera and George continue to be part of the Carrow Road scene for many years to come.



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
