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# CHIT CHAT

THE FOOTBALL GROUNDS IMPROVEMENT TRUST



During the past thirteen years, over £35 million has been spent by the Football Grounds Improvement Trust on safety and improvement work at League grounds throughout Britain. This money has been raised entirely from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters. FGIT's primary objective is to bring Britain's football stadia up to the highest level of safety possible. We take this opportunity to trace the progress of the organisation.

Last month Tom Wharton, Chairman of the Football Grounds Improvement Trust, announced that grounds in the United Kingdom had reached their highest ever level of safety. Commenting upon the progress made, Mr Wharton confirmed: "Three years ago, shortly after the Bradford City disaster, it was suggested that many League clubs would have to close. As a result of our safety programme, not one ground has been closed and football has come through perhaps its most serious period in relation to spectator safety."

Having invested £35 million, the Football Grounds Improvement Trust has become an integral part of the professional game. During the past three years alone, no fewer than 2,500 applications for grant-aid have been serviced, with every single League club throughout the

United Kingdom offered assistance in their endeavours to raise the level of safety and comfort at grounds.

The work of FGIT is visible throughout the League with the new stands at Watford, covering at Everton and Sheffield Wednesday and disabled facilities at a number of clubs including Hartlepool each a testament to the pools funded organisation.

The Football Grounds Improvement Trust was formed by the PPA in 1975 as a direct response to Parliament's passing of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act after the 1971 Ibrox Disaster in which 66 football fans were killed. "We're proud of our role," Chairman Tom Wharton stated. "We've gone a long way in helping our clubs make grounds safer and more comfortable for supporters."

The progress made has not been restricted to the professional game. Spotting-the-Ball contributes over £9 million each year to provide for the benefit of football at every level. Initiatives such as building pitches, providing changing accommodation, safety at 'non-League' grounds, research into hooliganism, closed circuit television, the cost of policing League matches and sometimes even paying for park team kit is all funded by the sister organisation The Football Trust.

### Arsenal 2 Luton Town 3

Brian Stein and Andy Dibble were the Town heroes on April 24 when the club enjoyed its finest hour in 103 years by beating holders Arsenal to win the Littlewoods Cup at Wembley.

In front of 95,732 fans, the Hatters produced a performance to grace the national stadium on a sunlit spring afternoon and a finish to leave everyone gasping for breath. "This is it," said chairman David Evans, MP, afterwards at the club's celebration dinner at the Savoy Hotel, "this is the greatest day in the club's history."

Brian Stein, in his benefit year, shot the Town in front after 13 minutes when a David Preece free-kick was half-cleared from Mick Harford's challenge to Steve Foster. His short oblique pass sent Stein into space and a low shot beat John Lukic.

Arsenal had nothing in response and could have been two or three behind when, after Mick Harford had limped off injured on the hour, they stormed back on terms. In a 10-minute spell, substitute Martin Hayes and striker Alan Smith scored and Dibble made three brilliant saves, including a penalty stop from Nigel Winterburn.



But Luton were not out and in a spirited late revival drew level at 2-2 when Mark Stein, Kingsley Black and Brian Stein helped create the chance for Danny Wilson to head the equaliser. It was all over with only seconds remaining when substitute Ashley Grimes did superbly to make room and cross, with the outside of his left boot, from the right wing. Brian Stein moved first and his crisp half-volley clinched the Littlewoods Cup for the Town.

Players win cups and we cannot thank our team enough for their great efforts in not just the final but the run all season to reach the final. I am sure all our fans feel the same, particularly those who have followed the club for a long time and been on fruitless journeys to such outposts as Rochdale, Darlington or Torquay in our Fourth Division days.

## Fixture pile-up

The style of the victory was splendid and satisfying, but we now have the job of working our way through seven fixtures in a short space of time, as I write. It is the penalty of success! Then we can look forward to a tour of Florida, a youth tour in Holland and a pre-season tour of Sweden.

In the aftermath of Wembley, we have been delighted with congratulations, but one in particular we enjoyed came in a telegram from Raddy Antic in Yugoslavia. It was nice to be able to respond by congratulating him on his appointment as manager of Real Zaragoza for next season in Spain.

Finally, the Littlewoods Cup itself, which was unfortunately damaged. I noticed it had an apparent weakness when we received it and it did not stand up to the stress of victory. The stem broke, but has been sent to professional repairers by Littlewoods who, like the Football League, fully understood the problem.

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

# WEMBLEY QUOTES

**Ray Harford:** "That finish took my breath away. I feel strange. I find this all hard to handle. I cannot sort out my emotions. I cannot smile, laugh or joke. The photographers came up to me and I just couldn't react for them. I'm delighted but I don't know how to celebrate. It's like a dream. Really weird."

"This means everything to Luton, European football and new players. We have knocked the knockers who said we couldn't play away from our plastic pitch."

**Brian Stein:** "It is the greatest day of my life. I've been here for 10 years and I've been waiting for something like this. It is tremendous. Fantastic. We wanted to do ourselves justice at Wembley after our disappointments here and we have done that."

**Andy Dibble:** "I knew it would have been curtains for us if I had not stopped the penalty. We would have been finished. But this has all been a fairytale. Until today, it was a heartbreak for me ever since I moved from Cardiff two years ago. I just haven't been able to get into the side."

"The boss told me on Saturday he had not made up his mind who to play in goal. Les who was almost fit, or me. So I rang home to tell my parents that I didn't think I was in. When I was picked I couldn't believe it."

"After the game, I just ran round Wembley trying to pick Mum and Dad out in the crowd...Now I want first team football. I am looking forward to that next few matches. This is all like a dream come true."

**Ray Harford:** "When the penalty came, I thought we were dead, but we deserved to win. It would have been a bigger gamble to play Sealey than Dibble and it was an even bigger gamble to play young Kingsley Black. But Black was sensational. He takes my breath away because he has so much talent."

**Brian Stein:** "I couldn't believe it when I scored the winner. I asked the referee how long was left and he just blew the whistle."

**Ricky Hill:** "It's a dream come true. I was actually looking forward to extra time when we got the winner. I didn't know how long was left. I asked the ref and he said 30 seconds. I couldn't believe it."

"Then I asked him again at the kick-off and he said 15 seconds. I knew that was it. They couldn't come back. It is absolutely great for everyone connected with the club."

**Mal Donaghy:** "We have waited a long time for something like this. It was a really great team performance and is obviously the highlight of my career."

**Mick Harford:** "This is the best. The tops. When the season began, I had two dreams, two ambitions – to play in a cup final for Luton at Wembley and to win an international cap for England. I've achieved both and it is magic. The fans were really great."

**Kingsley Black:** "It is a very great day for everyone at Luton, I had a lot of nerves and butterflies before the game and I was looking forward to playing. It was a really great occasion and we deserved to win."


## BARRY MCGUIGAN AT LUTON

# INTRODUCING...

## WATFORD

Today we welcome a Watford side destined to return to Division Two after six seasons during which they have established themselves as a First Division outfit in terms of the success and respect won on and off the pitch, writes **Geoff Allmann**.

Founded in 1898, from two earlier clubs, Watford joined the Southern League in 1903 and topped the table in 1915 before becoming founder-members of Division Three (South) in 1920.

They had to apply for re-election in 1927, but were in the top half dozen in the table in each of the last five seasons before the war and in this period between the wars some well-known players wore their colours, amongst them Frank Barson of Aston Villa and Manchester United fame and prolific striker Tommy Barnett.

### **'Pat Jennings began his career at Vicarage Road'**

They had to apply for re-election again in 1951, alongside Crystal Palace, slipped to Division Four in the reorganisation of 1958 and then won promotion in 1960 with Cliff Holton amongst the goals. Soon afterwards Pat Jennings began his illustrious career at Vicarage Road and then after several seasons as a leading Third Division club they climbed to Division Two for the first time ever in 1969.

They stayed up for three seasons, slipped to Division Four again in 1975 and then, with the arrival of Graham Taylor in 1977, embarked on the most successful period in their history.


During Graham's ten years at the helm they climbed out of Division Four in 1978, out of Division Three in 1979, and out of Division Two in 1982 to reach Division One for the first time ever.

There they ended up runners-up to Liverpool in 1982-83 before reaching the FA Cup final a year later and losing 2-0 to Everton at Wembley. They have finished 11th, 11th, 12th and 9th in the last four seasons but things have not been the same since Graham Taylor's move to Aston Villa last May.

### **'Consistent success has eluded both Dave Bassett and Steve Harrison'**

Neither Dave Bassett, who was in charge at the start of this season, nor Steve Harrison, Graham Taylor's former assistant, have achieved any consistent success and they have won only seven games up to the time of writing though interestingly they have done the double over both Arsenal and Wimbledon.

They also of course succeeded in the FA Cup in January and went on to beat Port Vale in round five before going out at Wimbledon.



**Born in Blackpool on December 26th, 1952, Steve Harrison began his career as an apprentice with his home town club, and was taken on as a professional on his 18th birthday.**

A defender, he made 141 League appearances at Blackpool, before being released to join Vancouver Whitecaps in Canada. In the autumn of 1978 he returned to England to join Watford, making his debut in a 4-2 home win over Oxford United on Saturday, September 23rd. Steve went on to make a total of 27 appearances for the Hornets that season.

He was later given the Watford captaincy and finished his Watford playing days at the end of the 1980-81 season, with 101 senior appearances. He then joined Charlton Athletic where he played for one season before returning to Watford - this time on the coaching staff.







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## Views from the media

### ARSENAL SHOWN THE WAY TO PLAY

Our victory at Wembley over Arsenal earned the team and the club a generous ration of praise from the national media. In Views from the Media today, we reflect them in the column written by James Lawton for the Daily Express of Monday, April 25, 1988.

"Let's kill one myth after a great Littlewoods Cup final.

It is the idea that victory for underdogs Luton can be explained only in terms of courage and emotion.

Luton won because they played superior, more varied football. They passed to feet. They got wide. When the physical pressure of Arsenal allowed they played creatively out of defence. They did many of the things that Liverpool do with their much greater resources – and Arsenal don't. In the end they gave Arsenal, a club so rich in playing strength, a biting lesson. They showed that power without subtlety may give you a high place in the League, more wins than losses, but it will not take you to the high ground of the game on a consistent basis.

Luton manager Ray Harford made a series of risky decisions. He played Ricky Hill and David Preece with no guarantees that they would survive anything like a substantial part of the action.

He sent out teenager Kingsley Black in the full knowledge that he could well turn to jelly in the great stadium.

Harford picked Hill and Preece because they are skilful passers of the ball.

He chose Black because the kid loves to run wide, take on defenders and put in the hurtful crosses. He knew he couldn't beat Arsenal with power. But with skill, a little subtlety, well, he might just have a prayer.

It's true that Arsenal came on formidably – especially after the arrival of Martin Hayes – and that Luton's goalkeeper Andy Dibble kept his team alive late in the second half. But let's not forget that Luton came so close to killing off Arsenal early in the second half, John Lukic saving superbly from Brian Stein and then being at the mercy of his brother Mark.

# LUTON TOWN GO ALL'DEN OLLDIES

## TRAUMA OVER AS TOWN AIM FOR THE TOP IN 1978-79

After the traumas of 1978-79 when David Pleat's new side narrowly escaped relegation to Division Three it was hoped that without the injury problems that had dogged the Town for more than six months something better could be expected in the new term, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The summer signings included Mike Saxby from Mansfield and, in one of the first tribunal set decisions, Tony Grealish from Orient. With David Moss fully fit again the squad had a rather more powerful look about

it especially in midfield and defence where the injury list had been the longest in the previous season.

We did not start off too well, drawing with Cambridge at Kenilworth Road in the opening game, and then losing at Bristol Rovers. Three straight wins then remarkably put the Town top of the table for the first time since 1954-55.

The home win over Orient was unremarkable, the away win at Leicester well earned but the 5-0 thrashing of a Swansea side that was rampaging

were not forthcoming leaving the Town in a supporting role amongst the promotion contenders.

If one particular game can be pointed to as the reason for failure to win promotion that season then the home defeat by Cardiff on March 14th was it. A miserable evening, poor refereeing, clogging opposition which produced the only major injury crisis of the season and missed chances made it a game to forget.

### 'Easter saw a fine victory at Charlton' and a 1-0 win over Watford'

A ray of light shone through in the next away game when the Town recovered from a 2-0 half time defeat at QPR to snatch a point but this was followed by yet another home draw, this time with struggling Burnley.

Easter saw a fine 4-1 win at Charlton followed by what was to be the ritual 1-0 win over Watford and then with the last seconds tucking away at Stamford Bridge with the Town leading through an early Grealish goal Chelsea equalised after a scramble which saw the ball hit just about every player on the pitch and the woodwork.

The next away game proved to be the decider with the Town visiting promotion favourites Birmingham for a four pointer. In a remarkable game of missed penalties and missed chances the Blues stole the points with a 1-0 win.

The Town pushed everyone up in the last fifteen minutes arid how the Birmingham goal survived only Jeff Wealands could tell you. A brave performance by the Hatters but a result that meant eventual promotion for the 'Blues' and a sixth position for ourselves.

After the injury problems of David Pleat's first season in charge it is remarkable to note that no fewer than eleven players made 39 or more League appearances in 1979-80.

through the Divisions caught the imagination as the team played in the true 'Pleat style' for probably the first time.

### 'A fine win which had all the hallmarks' of our cavalier approach'

A pair of 0-0 draws then followed but the Town bounced back with a 3-1 win at Fulham which bore all the hallmarks of the cavalier approach we were all to enjoy many more times before the season ended.

Typical of this approach were the two home wins over Bristol Rovers and Sunderland with the Town 3-0 up at half time against Rovers after producing a scintillating performance and then beating the 'Wearsiders' 2-0 before the TV cameras in a game where David Moss could do no wrong.

Back at the top of the League the following week was the Town's reward for a fine 2-1 win at West Ham with the position being maintained for a month despite a spate of home draws which included a 1-1 result against QPR and producing the highest crowd of the season at that stage - 19,619.

As Christmas approached the Town went off the boil a little and the home record went when Birmingham won 3-2 at Kenilworth Road. This defeat was quickly followed by a 3-1 defeat at Wrexham and a 1-1 draw at home to Newcastle which pushed the Hatters down to third place.

Bouncing back yet again Charlton were seen off at home and with only seconds remaining in the Boxing Day derby game at Vicarage Road, full-back Kirk Stephens stole in on the far post to convert Bob Hatton's long cross for probably the sweetest victory of the season - it was also 'Bashers' first goal for the club.

The cavalier approach was probably best typified in the 3-3 home draw with Chelsea on New Years day 1980. The Town could have had six but for the post bar and dubious offside decisions but despite all that Chelsea were allowed to escape with a point we could ill afford to lose. Wonderful for the fans but Pleat was probably beginning to age considerably.

The home draws were still arriving with annoying regularity through February and March but by now the away wins that had compensated earlier in the season
