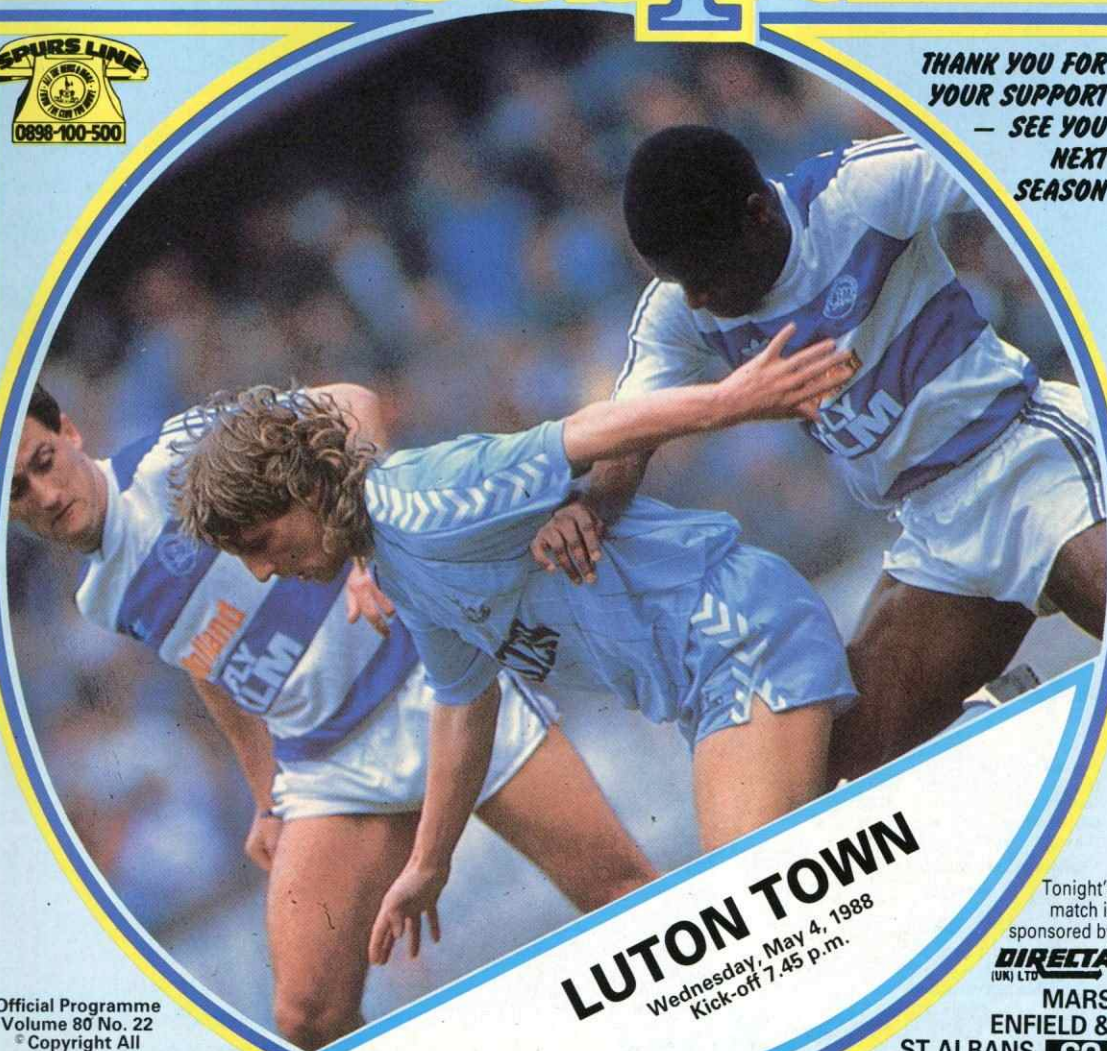

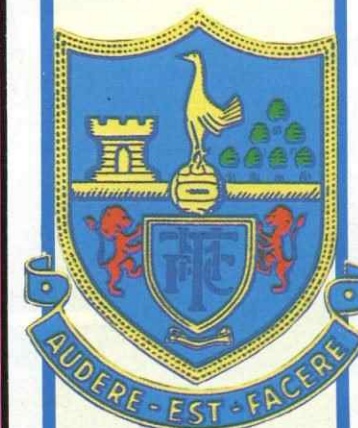

# THE · FUTURE · OF · THE · EAST · STAND ?

Change and progress are inevitable and whilst the East Stand has stood proud for nearly 60 years, it is now nearing the end of its lifespan and a decision on the future has to be made.

The alternatives are to either demolish and completely re-build or a mixture of renovation and upgrading together with partial development within the existing frame which will afford the opportunity of retaining the building's existing character.

Either alternative would need to contain a number of new box facilities which would substantially subsidise the works to be undertaken with the total development option culminating in an all-seater

stand similar to that of the West Stand.

The alternative proposal would give us the option of retaining a standing area with a capacity for 8,000 supporters fully under cover, the Police having agreed to remove the East Terrace perimeter fence giving an unhindered view of the playing area. This concession has been granted by the Police on condition that there are no disturbances or encroachment on to the field of play in that area of the ground whereupon they would review the position.

The upper East Stand seating area would be

completely renewed, replacing the original timber flooring and seats with modern materials. Whilst, at the moment, approximately one-third of the seats have an obstructed view due to the existence of six supporting pillars, this number of disadvantaged seats would be greatly reduced by the reduction in the number of columns to two which would support a new roof of similar construction to that which exists on the West Stand.

In front of the new boxes, which would be

located on the Upper East Terrace, new seats for approximately 2,000 spectators would be installed.

A new floodlighting system would be incorporated above the East and West Stands which would replace the existing pylons, having been installed in the early 1950s and now sadly lacking in comparison to modern standards.

Refreshment areas, concourses and staircases, together with toilet facilities will be substantially upgraded, a new souvenir shop will be included, and the entire stand will be brought into line with the recommendations as laid down by the Safety of Sports Grounds Act

1975. The whole safety aspect will be much improved by the increased availability of fire-fighting equipment and other measures, such as the enclosure of stairways into protected shafts and access for fire engines onto the perimeter track, which have been incorporated into the overall design.

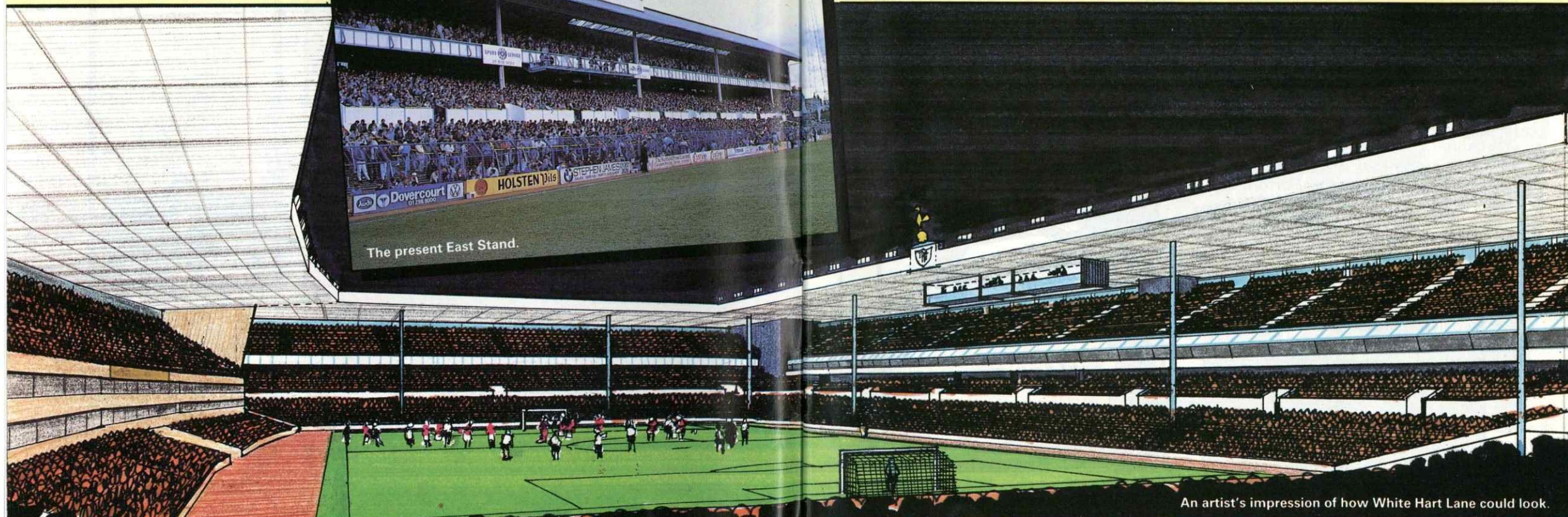
Looking even further ahead, a comprehensive long-term ground plan has been drawn up by the Club's architects to eventually replace the existing North Stand with a 'Kop' area for approximately 13-15,000 people with seating above. The entire area being covered by a roof design similar to that of the West Stand and proposed East Stand and at a similar

height.

Incorporated into the design would be a totally segregated standing and seated section for the Family Area and Club Members.

A planning application has been lodged for the second alternative and your views would be welcomed as to which of the two proposals would be more acceptable together with any other suggestions you may have. **No final decision will be taken by the Club until all relevant views have been considered.**

Obviously our determination to purchase new players when appropriate will not be hindered by this major investment.

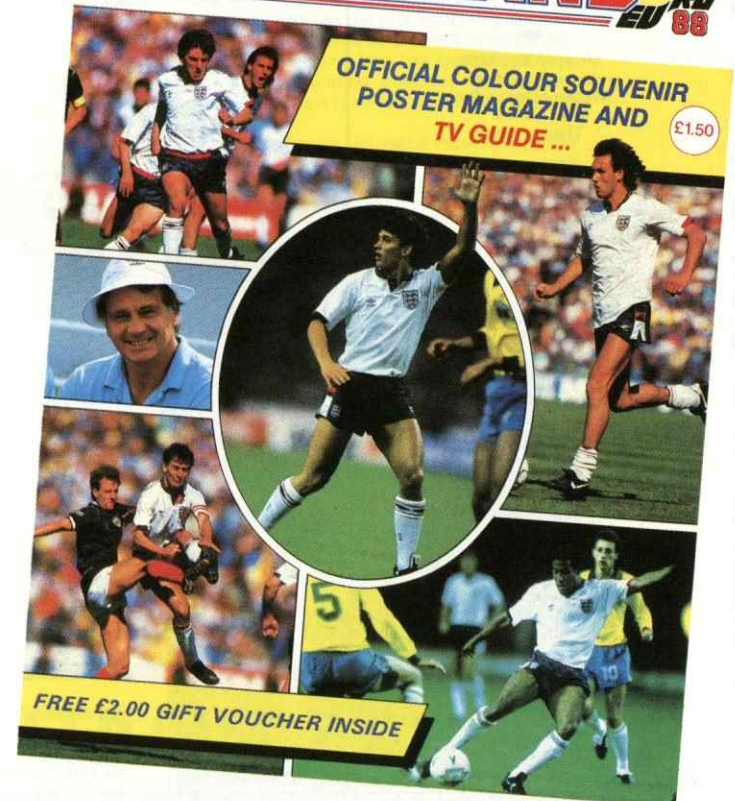

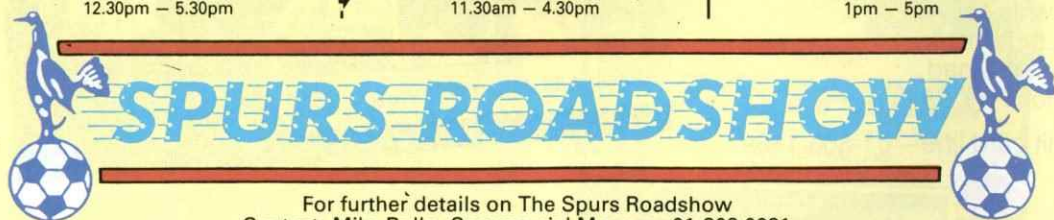

# S.P.O.T.L.I.G.H.T O.N.

## RAY CLEMENCE

**T**HERE is no need to press White Hart Lane's goal-keeping panic button in the wake of Ray Clemence's retirement. Who says so? None other than the great man himself. Bobby Mimms may have had his critics since signing in February, but he receives a vote of confidence from Clem, who believes he has left the Spurs number one jersey in safe hands.

"Bobby has the potential to become a very good buy for the club," says Ray, who was forced to quit through injury five weeks ago.

### IMPRESSED

"In goalkeeping terms he is still quite young, though he gained a great deal of experience at Everton. He played against Liverpool in the 1986 F.A. Cup Final, and I was very impressed whenever I saw him play.

"At Goodison Park he always had the advantage of playing behind a secure defence, who were full of confidence. Unfortunately he joined Spurs at a time when the team lacked confidence. Subsequently he has been a little exposed.

"However I am sure next season, when he will have moved down and settled into a new house, we will see the potential everybody knows he has."

Clem, with 61 England caps to his name, is worth listening to. For twenty years he was at the top of his trade, and he fully appreciates the pressure of keeping goal for a top side.

Sadly he can do so no longer, though nobody will hear the 39-year-old former England and Liverpool keeper bemoaning his ill fortune.

"It is a shame that injury forced me to retire, but I was lucky that it came towards the end of my career, not in the middle," says Ray.

At least football fans will remember Ray at his peak. Last season he was playing as well as ever, never falling below the high standards he set himself.

### OPERATION

The crunch came when he broke down in a Combination match at Brighton in March. An operation was needed on the ruptured achilles tendon which had kept him out of the first-team since October.

A specialist advised Ray not to play again, warning him if he attempted a comeback he might never walk properly again.

Clem is still on crutches and will remain in plaster until mid-June. Few would have thought Tottenham's 2-1 defeat at Norwich City on October 10, 1987 would prove to be Ray's last competitive match.

He has many fond memories, though. With Scunthorpe, Liverpool, Spurs and England, he established himself as one of the world's greatest post-war goalkeepers.

He set a British record of playing more than 1,100 competitive games and won countless honours.

"Season 1981-82 was the highlight of my time with Tottenham," says Ray. "We won the F.A. Cup, we reached the semi-finals of the European Cup Winners' Cup and the Final of the League Cup. Apart from that, we were also challenging for the title!"

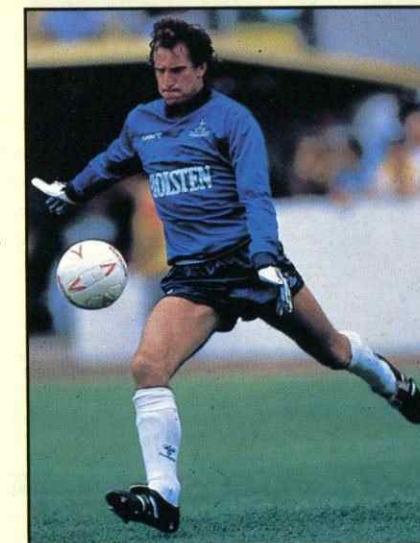
### PRIDE

For personal satisfaction nothing could match the sense of pride Clem felt when he led England out at Wembley against Brazil in 1981. And from a team point of view he picks Liverpool's 1977 European Cup win against Borussia Moenchengladbach as one of his career's high spots.

Few could even dream about what Ray has achieved, and he has not ruled out the possibility of staying in the game as a coach or manager.

For the time being Ray has been kept busy with his own building business and regular visits to White Hart Lane to maintain his general level of fitness.

Ray and his family will not be moving from the London area, and he will always be guaranteed a warm welcome at Tottenham. Few people have given better service to football.

# Diary

A detailed look at our visitors  
on a day-to-day basis over  
recent months.

### JANUARY 1988

- 1: A goal apiece for the Stein brothers and one from Mick Harford avenge Luton's 3-0 defeat away to Chelsea earlier in the season, as the scoreline is reversed.
- 2: Luton visit a rain-soaked Upton Park and Mark Stein's goal earns them a point.
- 9: Luton begin their FA Cup campaign with a 2-1 victory at Fourth Division Hartlepool. Micky Weir and Darron McDonough are the Town's scorers.
- 16: McDonough is on target again as Luton beat Derby by the odd goal at Kenilworth Road.
- 19: Bradford are the next visitors to Luton for a Littlewoods Cup quarter-final. Steve Foster's free-kick 11 minutes into the second half sets the home side on their way, and nine minutes later Harford's header seals their place in the semi-finals.
- 30: FA Cup action again as Southampton go to Kenilworth Road for a fourth round tie. With just seven minutes remaining the Town find themselves a goal down, but late strikes from Ian Allinson and Brian Stein give them victory.

### FEBRUARY

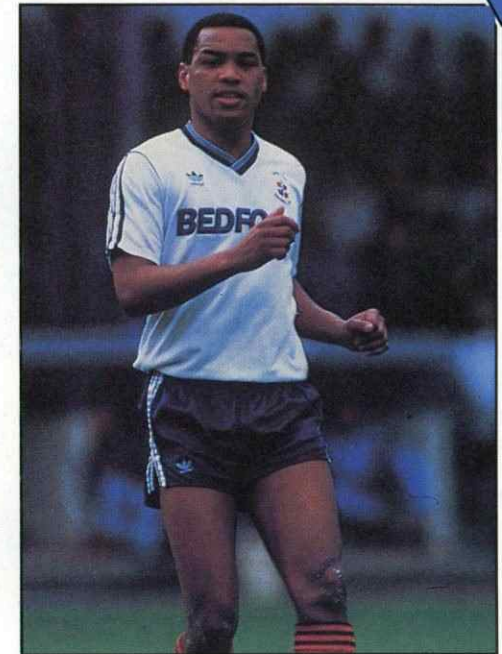
- 6: An extraordinary match at Kenilworth Road as Luton beat Oxford 7-4. Mark Stein hits the first hat-trick of his career, aided by Harford (2), McDonough and Brian Stein.
- 10: Oxford are again the opponents, this time in a Littlewoods Cup semi-final at the Manor Ground. A superb strike from Brian Stein and a penalty save by Les Sealey earn the Town a 1-1 first-leg draw.
- 14: Luton suffer their first defeat since Boxing Day, when they go down 2-1 at Arsenal. Mark Stein hits their consolation goal.
- 16: Rookie striker David Oldfield scores twice as the Hatters defeat League champions Everton 2-1 at Goodison Park in the Simod Cup.
- 20: A Harford header forces a draw at QPR and sends their FA Cup fifth round match to a replay.
- 24: An own goal from Warren Neill is enough to send Luton into the quarter-finals of the FA Cup as they beat Rangers 1-0 in the replay.
- 28: Luton reach Wembley for the first time in 29 years as they beat Oxford 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in the second leg of the Littlewoods Cup semi-final. Brian Stein and Ashley Grimes are the scorers.

### MARCH

- 1: Double strikes from Harford and Brian Stein earn Luton a place in the Simod Cup semi-finals as Second Division Stoke are overpowered 4-1 at Kenilworth Road.
- 5: Back to League action and Luton visit Wimbledon and are beaten 2-0.
- 8: Luton qualify for another Wembley Final as they defeat Swindon 2-1 (after extra-time) to reach the Simod Cup Final. Once again, the Stein brothers are on target with a goal each.
- 12: Goals from Danny Wilson, Mark Stein and Harford earn Luton a comfortable 3-1 victory in the F.A. Cup Sixth Round.
- 15: Luton are defeated 4-0 by last year's F.A. Cup winners, Coventry, at Highfield Road.
- 27: Luton are defeated by Second Division Reading in the Simod Cup Final at Wembley. Harford gives the Hatters an early lead but they are beaten 4-1.
- 29: The Town salvage some pride by thrashing Portsmouth 4-1 at Kenilworth Road. The Stein brothers and Wilson are on target, along with Paul Mariner who scores in his own net.

### APRIL

- 2: Luton concede four goals for the successive time away from Kenilworth Road as they are beaten 4-0 by Newcastle.
- 5: Sealey and McDonough are both injured as Luton draw 2-2 at home to Sheffield Wednesday. McDonough and Brian Stein are the scorers.



BRIAN STEIN

- 9: Luton's last visit to White Hart Lane ends in heartache as Wimbledon come from behind to beat them 2-1 in the F.A. Cup semi-final. Wembley beckons when Harford fires the Hatters into a 48th minute lead, but a John Fashanu penalty and a late Dennis Wise strike put an end to Luton's Twin Tower dreams.
- 12: Luton suffer an F.A. Cup hangover at Old Trafford where Manchester United win a re-arranged League match 3-0.
- 16: Luton make their second appearance at Wembley this season and lose again, to Manchester United — 2-0 — in the first round of the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival.
- 19: The Hatters receive a timely boost for their Littlewoods Cup Final against Arsenal, when they beat QPR 2-1 at Kenilworth Road. It is Luton's first win in six competitive games.
- 23: Influential midfielder McDonough is ruled out of the Littlewoods Cup Final when he is injured in training just 24 hours before the big match.
- 24: Luton stage one of the most remarkable recoveries in Wembley Cup Final history to score twice in the last eight minutes and beat Arsenal 3-2 in the Littlewoods Cup Final. They look dead and buried after Martin Hayes and Alan Smith both score to cancel out Brian Stein's early goal and it appears to be the last straw when the Gunners are awarded a 79th minute penalty. But man-of-the-match Andy Dibble saves Nigel Winterburn's spot-kick to spark off an amazing finale with goals by Wilson and Brian Stein clinching Luton's first major honour in their 103-year history.



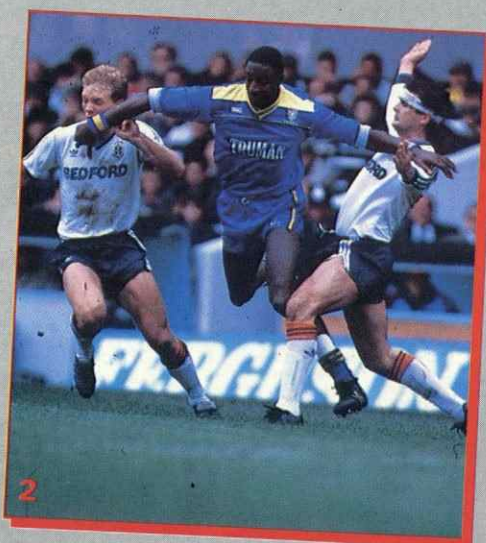
Luton Town's last visit here ended in agony as their dreams of reaching the F.A. Cup Final were shattered by Wimbledon at the semi-final stage. Having already lost the Simod Cup Final to Reading, it was a nightmare for the Town's Wembley hat-trick hopes but they came good in the Littlewoods Cup Final.

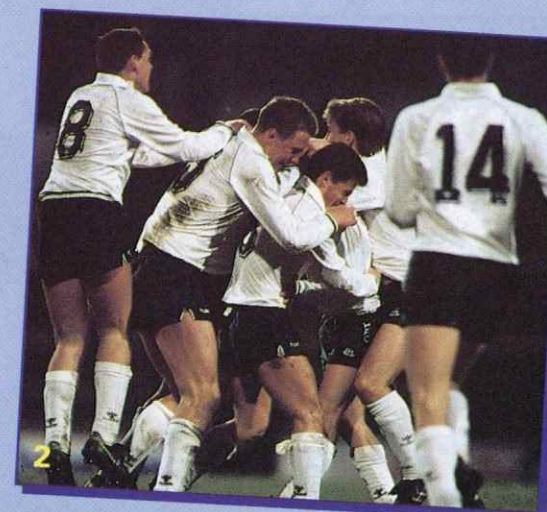
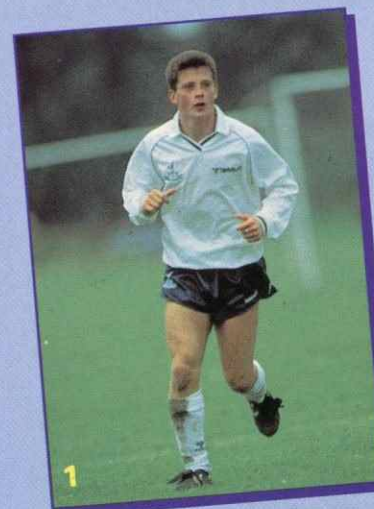

# LOOK BACK

Luton Town visit Tottenham for a Football League encounter for the nineteenth time tonight. Eleven of the prior meetings have been in the top flight, the first being on Christmas Eve, 1955.

A 41,168 crowd turned up for a morning kick-off which marked the Spurs' debut of Bobby Smith, signed a few days previously from Chelsea.

On a rain-soaked pitch, Tottenham took the lead through Len Duquemin's first goal of the season when his cross-shot passed over the head of Ron Baynham in the Luton goal. A rather fortunate goal by Johnny Brooks extended our lead before the interval. He mis-kicked, slicing the ball on to an upright and into the net!

Luton pressed for much of the second half but could only net once, 10 minutes from time, when Bob Morton — whose 494 League appearances still stands as a club record — set up a chance for Gordon Turner to score.

The two teams that morning were: Tottenham — Reynolds, Norman, Hopkins, Blanchflower, Clarke, Marchi, Dulin, Brooks, Duquemin, Smith, Robb.

Luton — Baynham, Dunne, Ahearne, Pemberton, Owen, Shanks, Cullen, Turner, Morton, Pearce, Adam.

Before the kick off last season's corresponding encounter — played on October 4, 1986 — new signing Nico Claesen was introduced to the 22,738 people present. Both sides could have done with his firepower as Clive Allen, Mick Harford and Brian Stein were among the absentees from this fixture.

Chances were created at both ends throughout but Ray Clemence and Les Sealey both put on impressive performances to each achieve a clean sheet.

The two sides last season were: Tottenham — Clemence, Thomas D., Thomas, M., Roberts, Gough, Mabbutt, Howells, D., Allen, P. (Ardiles), Waddle, Hoddle, Galvin. Luton — Sealey, Johnson, Grimes, Nicholas, Foster, Donaghy, Hill, Stein, M., Newell, North, Preece.

The opening day of the 1982-83 League season was red

letter day for two current Spurs' players who made their First Division debuts on opposing sides.

The date was August 28, 1982, the venue, White Hart Lane, the players, Gary Mabbutt of Spurs and Paul Walsh of Luton.

Each had served their apprenticeships with lower division clubs — Gary at Bristol Rovers and Paul at Charlton Athletic — before stepping up the League ladder by moving clubs in the summer of 1982.

The match saw Gary open his top-flight goalscoring account with a third minute header from Glenn Hoddle's free kick. Mike Hazard netted our second after rounding vising 'keeper Jake Findlay but by half time Luton, whose coach was involved in an accident en-route to White Hart Lane, had pulled one goal back. Brian Stein's shot rebounded from Ray Clemence to Ricky Hill whose header deflected off Spurs' defender John Lacy into his own net.

The second half saw David Moss put Stein clean through to net past Clemence for the Hatters' equaliser.

The two teams, watched by a 39,180 crowd, were: Tottenham: Clemence, Hughton, Miller, Lacy, Hazard, Perryman, Mabbutt, Archibald (Brooke), Galvin, Hoddle, Crooks.

Luton — Findlay, Stephens, Money, Horton, Goodyear, Donaghy, Hill, Stein, Walsh, Antic, Moss.

Eleven players have been involved in transfers between Tottenham and Luton.

Left-half Bill Crump was the first when he left Spurs for the Hatters in May, 1898. At that time we were in the Southern League while Luton had a three-year spell in Division Two of the Football League between 1897 and 1900.

Two Spurs' players moved on to Luton in 1905, right-back Bill McCurdy and winger Alf Warner. McCurdy made a dozen appearances in a Spurs' shirt during his year here but spent five years at the Bedfordshire club where nearly 150 matches were played.

Warner had scored 12 goals in 51 matches for Tottenham since signing from Notts County in May, 1902 and added another 11 in 47 appearances in his two years at Kenilworth Road. May, 1908 saw Harry Stansfield transferred to Luton. An outside-right, his 48 Southern League games at Tottenham yielded nine goals and in four years at Luton he scored 25 goals in 136 matches.

George Bowler became the fifth Spurs' player to join the Hatters around 1914 and in June, 1919 Jimmy Chipperfield was the first Luton player to leave for Spurs. An outside-left, he scored six goals in 15 matches in his first year here but failed to regain a first team place and moved on to Notts County in December, 1921.

Three players joined Luton from Spurs during the inter war years; John Pearson in June, 1923; Jimmy Armstrong in July, 1930 and David Colquhoun in March, 1935.

More recently we have made two purchases from the Bedfordshire outfit in defenders Paul Price and Mitchell Thomas. Paul joined us in June, 1981 and made 62 appearances before being released in 1984. Since leaving he has played for Swansea City and is now with Peterborough United, although born at St. Albans he gained 25 full caps for Wales, 11 while at Luton and 14 when a registered Spurs' player.

Goalkeeper Milija Aleksic joined us from Luton in December, 1978 and played in our 1981 F.A. Cup-winning side.

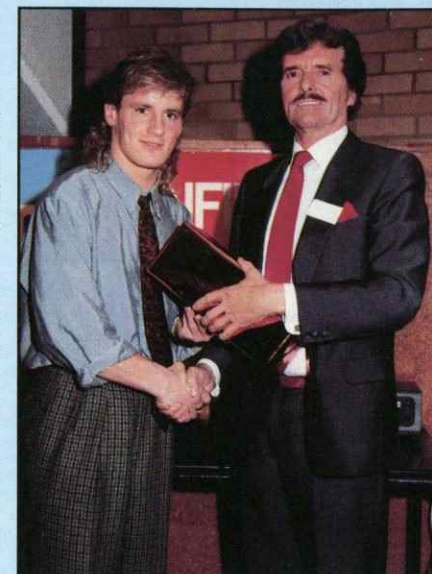

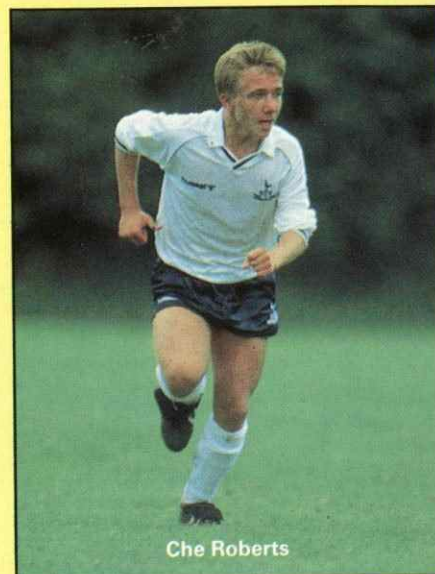

**LES SEALEY (Goalkeeper).** Transferred from Coventry City to Luton in August, 1983. He's a Londoner from Bethnal Green and a cousin of Alan Sealey, the former West Ham United winger. Les had developed through the apprentice ranks at Coventry, and had made his debut away to Queen's Park Rangers in April 1977. Back in season 1984-85 he played six League matches on loan to Plymouth Argyle.

**ANDY DIBBLE (Goalkeeper).** A full Welsh international who has also played for the Under-21s. He was born at Cwmbran and made his name with Cardiff City, who transferred him to Luton in July, 1984. He developed from Cardiff's apprentice ranks and made his League debut in the Welsh club's home match with Crystal Palace in May, 1982.

**TIM BREAKER (Defender).** A native of Bicester, he is a product of Luton's apprentice ranks and has been a full professional with them since August, 1982. He made his league debut away to Ipswich Town in March, 1984, and has since established himself as a senior player. Made 29 League appearances for Luton last season.

**STEVE FOSTER (Defender).** Trans-

ferred to Luton from Aston Villa in November, 1984. **RICHARD HARVEY (Defender).** A 19-year-old, born in Letchworth, Hertfordshire, and a product of the apprentice ranks at Luton. Made his League debut in the No. 3 shirt at home to Queen's Park Rangers in November, 1986.

**DANNY WILSON (Midfield).** Transferred to Luton from Brighton and Hove Albion last July. He's a well-travelled player with varied experience acquired in the service of a number of clubs. He was born at Wigan and started his League career with Bury, for whom he made 90 League appearances before signing for Chesterfield. After playing in a hundred League games for Chesterfield, he joined Nottingham Forest and later signed for Brighton. He was at one time a loan player with Scunthorpe United. Played for Northern Ireland in the recent game with Poland. Scored one of Luton's three goals against Arsenal in the final of the Littlewoods Cup last week.

**DARRON McDONOUGH (Midfield).** Transferred from Oldham Athletic to Luton in September, 1986 and made 18 First Division appearances in his first season at Kenilworth Road. His first League appearance for Luton was as substitute at home to Norwich City in October, 1986. A product originally of Oldham's apprentice ranks, he has settled well with Luton. He was born in Antwerp. Unfortunately, he had played for the Bohemians, who transferred him to the Old Trafford club in March, 1977. He left United for Coventry City in August, 1983 and made the further move to Luton in August, 1984.

**ROB JOHNSON (Midfield).** Was drafted into Luton's League team two seasons ago and has since established himself as a First Division player. He was born at neighbouring Bedford and can therefore be classed as a local discovery. He was signed as a full contract professional in August, 1985 and has made rapid progress.

**IAN ALLINSON (Midfield).** He's the former Arsenal player, whose career has seen quite a bit of change over the last year. Last June he signed for Stoke City after a spell of service at Highbury that had started in the summer of 1983 following his release on a free transfer from Colchester United. **BRIAN STEIN (Forward).** Attained full English international status four seasons ago. He was born in Cape Town and joined Luton as a full contract

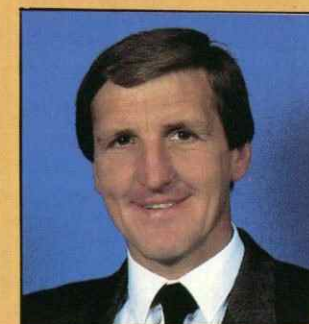

**KINGSLEY BLACK (Forward).** A 19-year-old player, who was born in Luton and joined the Town club straight from school. He's been a full professional with Luton since July, 1986 and has been introduced to League football this season. He came on as substitute against Reading in the Simod Cup at Wembley in March and also played in the final of the Littlewoods Cup against Arsenal last week. Made a successful international debut for Northern Ireland against France last Wednesday.

**DAVID OLDFIELD (Forward).** He's a 19-year-old from Perth in Australia, who has been introduced to first-team football by Luton this season. He was groomed in the apprentice ranks at Luton but has been on a full professional contract with them since May, 1986. His two second-half goals dealt Everton the knock-out in the Simod Cup at Goodison Park.



## THE MANAGER

RAY HARFORD has been manager of Luton Town since June of last year, when he was offered the post vacated by John Moore.

Ray, who was born in Halifax, has proved a good choice. As coach to Luton he already had a detailed knowledge of the playing staff at Kenilworth Road, and this made his promotion to manager smoother than it otherwise might have been.

A man of several clubs, Ray's varied experience in the lower reaches of the League has given him a deep insight into the ways of footballers and a good sense of values. A half-back, he played for Charlton Athletic, Exeter City, Lincoln City, Mansfield Town, Port Vale and Colchester United.

He became coach to Colchester and later filled the same post for Fulham under the management of Malcolm Macdonald. That was a step towards the managerial job he later filled at Fulham.

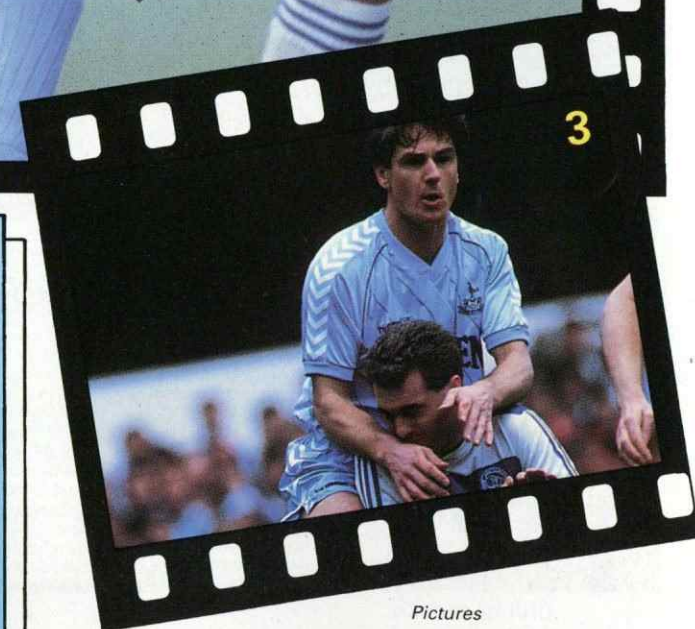
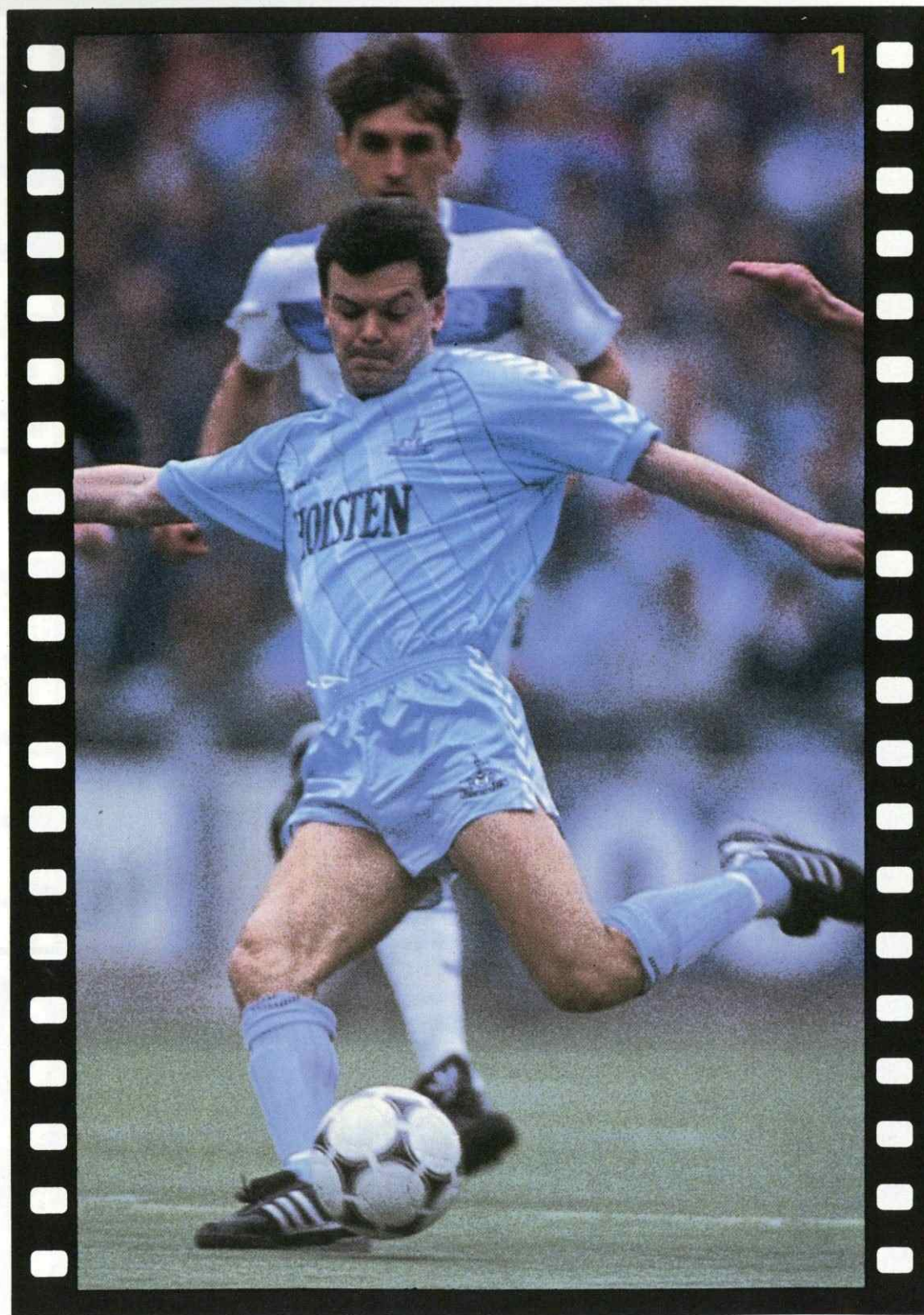
