



WILKINSON

The start of a new season is always a bit special. Optimism is at a peak, and a fresh beginning always inspires high hopes. And this season is extra special in that the kick-off almost exactly coincides with the 100th Anniversary of the launching of the Football League in September 1988.

I wonder if those 12 founding clubs knew what they were starting! After all, the game has become a national institution and plays a very significant part in the lives of millions. No doubt the league's founding father, William McGregor, would be astonished if he was aware of the developments which have occurred since 1888.

As the events of the summer emphasised, changes are still occurring. We can only hope these will be for the benefit of the game, and that those responsible for initiating them will take great care to push football in the direction it really needs to go.

In the final analysis, football is still essentially about two teams, each seeking to establish superiority, the object being to score more goals than the other side.

Our visitors today, Luton Town, won the Littlewoods Cup last season, and their success served to remind us of the bonus that cup competitions offer to those clubs the bookmakers refer to as "outsiders", by providing a massive cash windfall which can be a springboard to better things.

But the league is different. Cup favourites at the outset seldom make it to Wembley, but The First Division favourites at the start of the race are

almost invariably among the front runners at the finish. In the First Division over a long, hard campaign the inequalities that can be overcome in a series of one-off cup games are often cruelly exposed. It's the clubs with the best and strongest squad of players that lasts longest in the chase for the Championship.

We go into the new season knowing we have to make the best use of the players we have, aware that we must suit our style to the abilities of those players; and our pre-season work has been geared to this end.

As always, we have our short and long term targets. Obviously the first is a good start, for if we don't achieve that the others can become meaningless. After last autumn's experience, we know the price of a lean beginning, and I'm convinced we can't have a repeat of the ill-luck we had then, especially with injuries.

Thankfully, we are starting off with a fully fit squad. The return to fitness of Knight, Pearson and Cranson, plus the fact that Sterland and Worthington have finally overcome long term niggles, ensures ample cover at the back. I'm especially pleased to have obtained Alan Harper, who will bring experience and variety to our midfield; while David Hodgson, who has also joined us, I see as a "bonus" signing.

The summer has not been without its disappointments. Generally speaking, I am happy with our squad of players, but I know certain positions need strengthening. Unfortunately, my efforts to recruit the couple more players I wanted have so far been without success for reasons beyond our control.



TALKING POINTS

NEW BOY ALAN MEETS OLD PALS

New signing Alan Harper met up with a few old friends when he joined the Owls in a £275,000 move from Everton this summer.

Alan already knew Martin Hodge and Gary Megson; he played in the same England Youth side as Steve McCall and Mark Proctor, and he and David Hodgson were club-mates at Liverpool.

Alan, a Scouser, will be remembered for scoring against Wednesday in the 1986 F.A. Cup Semi-Final.

He has played in almost every position for Everton but sees himself mainly as a midfield man, and it is in this position where he looks certain to kick off his league career at Hillsborough.

Howard Wilkinson sees Alan as a good, value-for-money signing, and was impressed by the newcomer's showing during pre-season work.

He should bring extra depth to the midfield department, which was of course depleted by the release of Gary Owen at the end of last season.

Gary, we hear, has gone to Cyprus, while there have been several other departures.

Des Hazel has gone to Rotherham for £45,000, Mark Chamberlain to Portsmouth for £200,000, and Lee Chapman to French club Niort for a fee to be fixed by a U.E.F.A. tribunal.

All three were at the end of their contracts and free to sign for other clubs.

Alan Harper was at the end of his agreement with Everton, and David Hodgson was out of contract having split with Spanish club Jerez of Cadiz.

David and Mark Proctor are also buddies — David was best man at Mark's wedding.

JOHN HARRIS

It has been an eventful summer, with the arrival of satellite television hotting up the negotiations over T.V. coverage and resulting in a far bigger pay-out for football, and for the First Division clubs in particular.

And there have been those crazy transfer fees to keep fans talking.

But the saddest event for Wednesday was the death of John Harris after a long illness.


John was appointed chief scout at Hillsborough by Len Ashurst and



LUTON TOWN

It may be difficult for Luton to emulate what they achieved last season — by far the most successful in the Hatters' long history. They won their first major trophy when coming from behind to snatch a late victory over Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup Final at Wembley.

Luton also made two other trips to Wembley during the season. They were surprisingly beaten by Reading in the Simod Cup Final and they also qualified for the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival in April.

The Hatters looked set for a record-breaking four Wembley trips when they took the lead against Wimbledon in the semi-final of the F.A. Cup. But they allowed that to slip and lost 1-2.

At one point they appeared to have a chance of improving upon their best-ever placing of seventh in the First Division — achieved a year earlier — but a sequence of drawn games at the end killed off those hopes.

It was a memorable season but their success was very much deserved for Luton played a pleasing brand of attacking football which won many hearts.

At the end of the season manager Ray Harford repaid his long-serving former England forward Brian Stein by giving him a free transfer. He is now playing in France.

Another departure was goalkeeper Andy Dibble, who pulled off that dramatic penalty save at Wembley when Luton were trailing 1-2 to Arsenal. He has moved on to Manchester City where he is more likely to command a regular first-team place.

At Kenilworth Road he had been understudy for Les Sealey, getting his Wembley chance because of Sealey's injury.

Mr. Harford filled that void by signing goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain from Everton.

One key signing was that of Steve Williams, the former England midfield player who is relishing his new challenge at Kenilworth Road. Forward Roy Wegerle was signed from Chelsea and full-back John Dreyer came from Oxford.

If Luton are to improve upon last season's performance in the First Division, they will need to show more consistency away from home. Their only away victories were against the relegated pair, Oxford and Watford, and up here at Hillsborough last November.

Since winning at Watford shortly before Christmas, Luton have failed to win away from home in 11 league attempts though they have achieved away successes in cup football.

It is now six years since Luton returned to the First Division as Second Division Champions. After a couple of years of struggle, the Hatters have been establishing themselves among the more successful clubs. In 1984/85 they finished 13th in Division One, the following years achieving ninth and seventh positions. Last season they were ninth.

Luton, clearly, is a club that is going places and they have set new trends in several areas.

Their exclusive membership scheme solved their hooligan problem overnight and they have been busy in recent years encouraging local firms to take an interest in the club.

The Hatters are particularly proud of the family atmosphere they have developed at their Kenilworth Road ground. The club has spent over £1-million on ground improvements in recent years and they can now offer every one of their supporters either a guaranteed seat, or viewing position, or a special 20 per cent discount for watching from their family enclosure.

It is not only the field that Luton have been achieving outstanding success.

ALEC CHAMBERLAIN

(Goalkeeper)

Alec was signed from Everton for £150,000 during the summer. Once a reserve player at Ipswich, he made his league debut for Colchester in 1983. He remained ever-present for four seasons before joining Everton in 1987. At Goodison he remained in the reserves but he did play league football while on loan to Tranmere last season.

LES SEALEY

(Goalkeeper)

An injury caused Les to miss the Littlewoods Cup Final at Wembley but he is hoping to resume his place now. Les started his professional career with Coventry City, making around 200 senior appearances before joining Luton for £120,000 in 1983. He later spent a loan spell with Plymouth.



TIM BREACKER (Defender)

Tim completed his apprenticeship with the club and has been holding a first-team place for the past four seasons. In 1985/86 he won two England under-21 caps.

STEVE FOSTER (Defender)

Steve started as a striker with Portsmouth but soon switched to defence and commanded a £130,000 fee when he was transferred to Brighton in 1979. He did well enough to win three full England caps and he played for the Seagulls in the 1983 F.A. Cup Final replay. Aston Villa signed him for £200,000 in 1984 and he moved on to Luton a year later.

MAL DONAGHY (Defender)

With 56 games for N. Ireland, Mal is now the most-capped player in Luton's history. He joined them from Larne Town for a mere £20,000 in 1978 and has not been out of the side since.

JOHN DREYER (Defender)

John was signed from Oxford for £140,000 this summer. He developed in the junior teams at Oxford but made his league debut, as a Torquay player, while on loan, in 1985. He later served Fulham on loan before gaining his place in the Oxford side two seasons ago.

ASHLEY GRIMES

(Defender/Midfield)

Ashley spent several years as a Manchester United player and was capped by the Republic of Ireland on 13 occasions. Coventry signed him for £200,000 in 1983 but he moved on to Luton a year later.

ROB JOHNSON (Defender/Midfield)
Rob developed in the junior teams at Kenilworth Road and, during his early days, he played a couple of league games for Lincoln City. He eventually won himself a firm place in the Luton side two seasons back.

RICKY HILL (Midfield)

Ricky joined Luton from school, graduated to league duty in 1976 and now looks back on more than 400 league games for the Hatters. He played for the full England team on three occasions.


DANNY WILSON (Midfield)

Danny played in all of N. Ireland's internationals last season and now has nine caps. He opened his league career with Bury in 1978, moving on to Chesterfield for £100,000 in 1980. He was on the move to Nottingham Forest three years later but his stay at The City Ground was brief. Danny linked up with Brighton where he remained until transferring to Luton during the 1987 close-season.

DARREN McDONOUGH (Midfield)
Darren quickly established himself in the Oldham side after making his debut in 1981, remaining a fixture in the Latics' side until moving on to Luton for £85,000 two seasons ago.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield)

David grew up with Walsall, winning a fixed place about two years after being introduced to the side in 1980. When he moved on to Luton in 1984 a £150,000 fee changed hands.



STEVE WILLIAMS (Midfield)
Steve, signed from Arsenal for £300,000 this summer, has played for England at under-21, "B" and full international levels. He has six full caps. He learned his game with Southampton, entered league football with them in 1976 and completed more than 300 games before transferring to Arsenal for £500,000 in 1985.

MICK HARFORD (Forward)
Mick was the Hatters' top scorer with 21 goals last season, his splendid form at last winning him a brief appearance in the full England team.

GOALS POWER (Luton Town)

Luton are never beaten until the final whistle blows! Two goals in the closing seven minutes transformed the Littlewoods Cup Final at Wembley and the Hatters have notched some vital late goals in the league.

Defensively, they are most vulnerable during the first 30 minutes of the second-half.

He began as a top scorer with Lincoln, moving on to Newcastle for £200,000 — then a record for a Fourth Division player. In 1981, after a brief spell with Bristol City, he moved on to Birmingham in 1982 and he arrived at Luton two years later. He has on two occasions been the Hatters' best marksman.

IAN ALLINSON (Forward)
Ian made his name as a goalscorer with Colchester and it was after he had led their scoring list in successive seasons that he was signed by Arsenal in 1983. After enjoying two successful campaigns with the Gunners, he lost his place. He joined Stoke in 1987 but left for Luton within a few weeks.

ROY WEGERLE (Forward)
Roy was signed from Chelsea for £75,000 this summer. He was recommended to Chelsea by Tampa Bay Rowdies in 1986 but he got only occasional outings in Chelsea's First Division side.

KINGSLEY BLACK (Forward)
Kingsley enjoyed a meteoric rise last season. Soon after making his debut he played in Luton's Littlewoods Cup winning side at Wembley and, before the campaign was over, he was capped twice by N. Ireland.

MARK STEIN (Forward)
Mark has been on a weekly contract and it could be that he will have left Kenilworth Road by now. He followed his older brother Brian into the Luton side in 1984 and later served Aldershot on loan before winning himself a regular place in the Luton side last season.

PASSING BACK

WITH KEITH HOWARD

PASSING BACK

A piece of indelible history concerns today's teams in that they were opponents at Kenilworth Road in the very first Football League match played after the Second World War. Luton had beaten the Owls 3-0 in the first match of the 1939 season and were early leaders of the Second Division when hostilities took a hand.

The Football authorities decreed that the pre-war fixtures list should be identically repeated for the first season after war, and again the home team achieved victory by a three goal margin (winning 4-1 on this occasion) with the Owls goalscorer being the only Wednesday player to turn out in the two fixtures separated by seven years of war — Jackie Robinson.

The Wednesday side on that auspicious occasion in August 1946 included only three players who had appeared in Wednesday's colours before the war - Jackie Robinson, Goalkeeper Derek Goodfellow and full-back Frank Westlake — which meant — of course that the remaining eight were making their league debuts, probably making Luton the side against who more Owls players have made their first appearance than any other. Since this match, the list of debutants against today's opponents has included Eddie Kilshaw in December 1948 (then a record £20,000 signing from Bury) and John Quinn (in September 1959), the popular Mr. Versatility who played in almost every outfield position.

The first ever meeting with Luton was on 2nd December, 1899 at Owlerton and resulted in a 6-0 win for Wednesday - still the record victory to date between the two sides. The darling of the Olive Grove era, Fred Spikley hit a hat-trick to record the first such feat at Wednesday's present ground. Another hat-trick which will still be easily recalled by today's fans was that scored by Andy Blair in the Milk Cup Fourth Round Tie on 20th November 1984. Blair's goals all came from the penalty spot — a feat not only unique to Wednesday but the first-ever in the particular competition.

5 YEARS AGO

Howard Wilkinson's first game in charge of Wednesday brought a highly satisfactory 1-0 win away to John Toshack's Swansea City thanks to a Mick Lyons goal on the half

hour. The decisive goal, in fact, owed everything to dogged persistence with the ploy of a near post corner. After five attempts at the routine — Wednesday had 11 first half corners - Megson got it right at the sixth attempt and his neatly curved cross was judged perfectly for the unmarked Owls skipper to send a powerful header into the top corner.

The first game of the season saw Wednesday find a new ruthlessness in a watertight defence bolstered by a fifth man, the uncompromising Lawrie Madden, and although the attack lacked the ultimate sharpness needed, there were good efforts from Bannister, Morris and substitute new signing Varadi, which were well saved and augured well for the future.

In a First Division game with near-London rivals Arsenal at Highbury, Luton lost 2-1, Arsenal's Stewart Robson putting through his own goal.

10 YEARS AGO

A drab goalless draw at Hillsborough against Colchester United no doubt spelt out the problems facing Manager Jack Charlton — a lack of skilful forwards. This was Wednesday's fifth league and cup match of the new campaign which had resulted in only two goals scored and one of those was put in by an opponent.

Although the Owls were very solid at the back and never in any danger of losing, they appeared to have a surfeit of defenders who were too tentative to push forward.

Consequently the visitors goalkeeper was rarely tested - but his side were just as dull creating only one chance in the game. With Sabella and Co. grabbing all the glory across the City, it was all very frustrating for the fans.

Our visitors today travelled to Newcastle and lost by the only goal of the Second Division Game.

20 YEARS AGO

The earliest start to a league season in Wednesday's history (10th August) meant that when they met Chelsea it was already their sixth match and they travelled to a rain-soaked Stamford Bridge undefeated.

However, a momentary lapse of concentration immediately after half-time thrust the first defeat on a very gallant Owls side. In that moment — the 46th minute of a match divided into two distinct phases — Wednesday fell victim to the lethal shooting power of Bobby Tambling, the man who had grabbed more goals than any player in Chelsea's history — Jimmy Greaves included. Tambling's 30-yard drive skidded past Springett, who dived late enough to suggest his view was impeded, to give the home side their single goal victory.

This signalled a superb but unsuccessful effort from Wednesday, though Chelsea were not content simply to sit on their lead — all this was in stark contrast to a keenly-contested but tame first half.

SIDELINES

In a summer largely dominated by Super-league talk, a rapidly soaring transfer market and unexpected European Championship dismay, there was a couple of minor transfers that in their own way provided a timely reminder of how much things have changed in football inside the last ten years.

The two moves weren't a significant part of a transfer bonanza that one newspaper estimated as approaching thirty million pounds. The two players who were changing clubs were former Wednesday favourites, moving to new clubs unlikely to have a great deal of spare cash: Rodger Wylde left Barnsley for Stockport and Huddersfield's Brian Cox agreed to sign for Mansfield.

Wednesdayites will remember them for different reasons.

Wylde, an elegant striker who often seemed to be carrying along the hope of Third Division respectability, scored 54 league goals for the Owls before going to Oldham in 1980.

Cox kept goal for the Owls in just 22 league games, but although he did come up with a few good saves (he denied Brentford a goal with a penalty save at Hillsborough in 1979) he is most remembered for being the Huddersfield hero when in October 1983, he kept a clean sheet to stop Wednesday making it seven wins out of the first seven home games on the way to promotion.

Wylde and Cox — both Sheffield lads — last played together in a Wednesday league team on 27 October, 1979. The venue was Plough Lane, where the Owls defeated Wimbledon 4-3 in front of a crowd of 6,009.

It was a useful win and a stepping stone on the way to promotion. For the Dons, it was another slip on the path down to the Fourth.

Wednesday's manager for that game at Plough Lane was of course Jack Charlton, who had

a summer to remember this year as manager of Eire and the mastermind behind the Irish surge to the European Championship Finals in West Germany.

Charlton's tactical planning (with the aid of his former Hillsborough number two, Maurice Setters) played a big part in Eire's shock win over England though it should be said that little comment was made at the time of the part that Wednesday's Tony Galvin played in the build-up to the decisive goal. Indeed, Galvin's socks-down style on the left was important to the Irish in their three group games just as ex-


Owl and Celtic star Chris Morris was at right back.

Europe figured for Wednesday this summer too. Lee Chapman finally settled for a move to the continent but opted for a little-known French second division club, Niort, while on the incoming side was David Hodgson, who left Spanish football behind to return to this country.

On 27 October, 1979, Hodgson was playing for Middlesbrough at Ipswich, alongside Mark Proctor. Hodgson eventually went to Anfield, and Proctor moved to Forest.

Now they are team-mates again in the First Division with a club that nine seasons ago was working hard to get out of the Third Division. For some teams, players and managers, a lot has changed.



GENTLEMAN JOHN

A TRIBUTE FROM HOWARD WILKINSON

Sheffield football lost a good friend with the death of John Harris in late July, and while the start of a new season is traditionally a time for looking forward it is not inappropriate in the circumstances to take a moment to look back and reflect on a man who will always hold a unique place in local football history.

John, the quiet Scot from Glasgow, spent 18 years of his managerial career with our city rivals at Bramall Lane, but his final years in the game were at Hillsborough, and during his time here he made a significant contribution as we began the long climb back from the Third Division. He knew the game better than most, and he had a keen eye for talent and for assessing character, and Len Ashurst, Jack Charlton and myself greatly appreciated his knowledge, experience and influence.

His great tragedy was that his last four years saw him increasingly debilitated by a painful illness which he knew to be fatal; but even in this period he set us a wonderful example of courage and self-reliance as he drew upon his deep religious beliefs, gritted his teeth, and battled to the bitter end.

John, of course, was always a fighter; the nice, honest guy about whom nobody ever had a bad word, but ever a man of great determination.

"Gentleman John" (which is how we shall always remember him) was a credit to the game, an example to everybody connected with football management: a man of principle who, despite his public image as a silent man, could speak with passion and poetry about what he always called "a funny game".

Yet he was a modest chap. You never heard him boast about a playing career during which he was capped by Scotland and helped Chelsea to two wartime Wembley finals and captained them to a League Championship triumph. He was, according to



many, the best manager Sheffield United ever had, leading them to promotion twice and building teams which created excitement and enjoyed much success in the 1960s and early 1970s. His great achievement was that he did it with limited resources; and the Press dubbed him the star finder who shopped at Woolworth's rather than Harrod's.

He was born into football and the game was his life. His father, Neil, was a Scottish international centre-forward who later became a manager, and Neil's travels took John from Scotland to Ireland and then to Wales before he was 17. At Swansea his father made him a


professional and later sold him to Spurs. Neil was a hard taskmaster and John often took "stick" from his old man (including once after he missed a penalty against Wednesday!), but his father's influence was always apparent in John's philosophy of football.

It was not entirely surprising that Neil never wanted John to make a career in football, and he was particularly emphatic in advising his son never to become a manager. John himself often said he was reluctant to step into management. But he did — and a lot of people had reason to be grateful for that.





AT CLOSE RANGE WITH ALAN BIGGS

Sheffield Wednesday can feel confident of parading one of the best back-lines in the First Division this season — as a direct result of last year's defensive disasters.

Dark clouds and silver linings can seldom have had a starker contrast.

It never rained but it poured during the past 18 months. Four key defenders were scuppered and Wednesday's rearguard shipped 66 goals in 40 league matches.

But such has been the salvage work of physio Alan Smith that Wednesday might reasonably expect to concede only about half that number this time.

Three defenders, bought for a combined total of over £1 million, are heading back into commission. And Smith's flagship, Ian Knight, on whose potential as an England Under 19 defender it was impossible to put a price, has been miraculously saved from the scrapyard.

So, by a mixture of accident and skilful retrieval, Howard Wilkinson has gathered about him a defensive blockade of truly formidable proportions.


Each setback has been met with a positive response producing a measure of good. The bargain find of Nigel Pearson, dredged from the backwater of Shrewsbury, came as an indirect result of Knight's personal tragedy.

And it was Pearson's broken ankle that then hastened the arrival from Ipswich of Ian Cranson, among the best young centre backs in the country.

Cranson suffered the traditional welcome — ligament damage to add to the three fracture cases already occupying Smith's Hillsborough "surgery."

But all, including full-back Steve McCall, who picked up a knee problem just as he had recovered from a broken leg, are ready to play more than a walk-on part in the new season.

And that is a tribute to Smith's dedication and professionalism during his busiest-ever summer. Knight's injury was enough of a challenge on its own. Indeed, the 21-year-old's rehabilitation from a right leg smashed in seven places has been astonishing.

Smith would prefer to talk in medical rather than emotive terms but claims: "Ian's leg fracture was the worst injury of its type ever experienced in football. It was absolutely horrific."

Knight's courage has been highlighted — and rightly so. But not enough has been made of his dignity and self-control.

The publicity surrounding his predicament gave Ian countless opportunities to condemn Chester's Gary

Bennett, the man whose savage late challenge almost rendered him a cripple.

Yet he resisted all such pressure and temptation, sorely though it must have been felt.

Probably, the anger remains too deep for words. Maybe, too, the sinister silence from Hillsborough has dealt Bennett a more lasting and meaningful punishment than a furious but fleeting response.

Whatever the reason for Knight's decorum, he is worthy of still more respect for keeping his peace.

"I channelled all my feelings into getting fit," he told me.

"I didn't want to dwell on what happened. The main thing was to prove that an injury like mine could be overcome and I'm obviously delighted that all the hard work has paid off."

Certainly, Ian's recovery is an inspiration to fracture victims in every sphere of life.

"I've passed on tips to people with similar injuries," he reveals. "The big lesson is not to rush things and to deal with each hurdle separately."
