


The two matches were very different and while it was nice to score four goals against West Ham, particularly in front of our home fans, in some ways a 1-0 away victory is more satisfying.




Kevin, 12 on September 28, will be handed a Dekker Deluxe football by Saints manager Chris Nicholl before the home match against champions Liverpool on September 24.

# TODAYS VISITORS

# LUTON TOWN

It may be difficult for Luton to emulate what they achieved last season — by far the most successful in the Hatters' long history. They won their first major trophy when coming from behind to snatch a late victory over Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup final at Wembley.

Luton's visit to The Dell gives Steve Williams the chance to return to the scene of his early triumphs. Steve, who joined Luton from Arsenal for £300,000 this summer, started his professional career with the Saints. Steve won six full England caps, in addition to "B" and under-21 honours, and played more than 300 games for us before moving on to Arsenal for £550,000 in 1985.

Steve was one of four of Mr Harford's summer signings. Forward Roy Wegerle, goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain and defender John Dreyer were the others.

Wegerle, signed from Chelsea for £75,000 this summer, was recommended to Chelsea by Tampa Bay Rowdies in 1986 but he got only occasional outings in Chelsea's First Division side.

Chamberlain was signed from Everton for £150,000. Once a reserve player at Ipswich, he made his League debut for Colchester in 1983. He remained ever-present for four seasons before joining Everton in 1987. At Goodison he remained in the reserves but he did play League football while on loan to Tranmere last season.

Dreyer was signed from Oxford for £140,000. He developed in the junior teams at Oxford but made his League debut, as a Torquay player, whilst on loan in 1985. He later served Fulham

on loan before gaining his place in the Oxford side two seasons ago.

If fit, Les Sealey seems likely to retain the goalkeeper's position, though. Les started his professional career with Coventry City, making around 200 senior appearances before

joining Luton for £120,000 in 1983. He later spent a loan spell with Plymouth.

Mick Harford was the Hatters' top scorer with 21 goals last season, his splendid form at last winning him a brief appearance in the full England team. He began as a top scorer with Lincoln, moving on to Newcastle for £200,000 — then a record for a Fourth Division player — in 1981. After a brief spell with Bristol City, he moved on to Birmingham in 1982 and he arrived at Luton two years later. He has on two occasions been the Hatters' best marksman.

Ian Allinson made his name as a goalscorer with Colchester and it was after he had led their scoring list in successive seasons that he was signed by Arsenal in 1983. After enjoying two successful campaigns with the Gunners, he lost his place. He joined Stoke in 1987 but left for Luton within a few weeks.

Another contender for a place in attack is David Oldfield, a Luton discovery who made a spectacular entry into League Football last season with three goals in only six full League games.

Steve Williams has competition from Danny Wilson, Ricky Hill, David Preece, Darren McDonough and Kingsley Black for midfield places.

Wilson played in all of N. Ireland's internationals last season and now has nine caps. He opened his League career with Bury in 1978, moving on to Chesterfield for £100,000 in 1980. He was on the move to Nottingham Forest three years later but his stay at The City Ground was brief. Danny linked up with Brighton where he remained until transferring to Luton during the 1987 close-season.

Hill joined Luton from school, graduated to League duty in 1976 and now looks back on more than 400 League

games for the Hatters. He played for the full England team on three occasions.

Preece grew up with Walsall, winning a fixed place about two years after being introduced to the side in 1980. When he moved on to Luton in 1984 a £150,000 fee changed hands.

McDonough quickly established himself in the Oldham side after making his debut in 1981, remaining a fixture in the Latics' team until moving on to Luton for £85,000 two seasons ago.

Black enjoyed a meteoric rise last season. Soon after making his debut, he played in Luton's Littlewoods Cup winning side at Wembley and, before the campaign was over, he was capped twice by N. Ireland.

Luton possess one of the best, and certainly the most experienced, central defensive partnerships in the business in Mal Donaghy and Steve Foster.

With 56 games for N. Ireland, Donaghy is now the most-capped player in Luton's history. He joined them from Larne Town for a mere £20,000 in 1978 and has not been out of the side since.

Foster started as a striker with Portsmouth but soon switched to defence and com-

manded a £130,000 fee when he was transferred to Brighton in 1979. He did well enough to win three full England caps and he played for the Seagulls in the 1983 F. A. Cup final replay. Aston Villa signed him for £200,000 in 1984 and he moved on to Luton a year later.

Newcomer Dreyer seems likely to be challenging Ashley Grimes and Rob Johnson for the left-back position.

Newcomer Dreyer seems likely to be challenging Ashley Grimes and Rob Johnson for the left-back position.

Grimes spent several years as a Manchester United player and was capped by the Republic of Ireland on 13 occasions. Coventry signed him for £200,000 in 1983 but he moved on to Luton a year later.

Johnson developed in the junior teams at Kenilworth Road and, during his early days, he played a couple of League games for Lincoln City. He eventually won himself a firm place in the Luton side two seasons back.

Right-back Tim Breacker completed his apprenticeship with the club and has been holding a first-team place for the past four seasons. In 1985/86 he won two England under-21 caps.





# reserve & youth

An injury to goalkeeper Shane Wheeler marred Saints Youth a 1-1 draw in Tuesday night's South-East Counties League Division 2 match at Oxford.

The 17-year-old from Totton in Southampton was detained in hospital overnight after being carried off with a serious gash above an eye.

Wheeler suffered no fracture, but was due to be replaced by Gary French, from Yeovil, in today's home match against Tottenham.

With striker Lee Luscombe taking over as stop-gap goalkeeper, Saints Youth battled back to equalise through schoolboy Christian White. And Saints nearly grabbed the winner when a freekick from skipper Jeff Kenna hit a post.

Goals by Barrie Wilson and Neil Maddison, two new professionals, gave Saints Reserves a 2-0 home win over Norwich last Saturday.

Wilson, playing wide on the right, opened the scoring with a header from Gordon Hobson's left-wing cross. Then, before half-time, midfielder man Maddison increased the lead,

bravely beating the goalkeeper to the ball and injuring himself in the process.

But Saints goalkeeper Tim Flowers played a vital role in the victory. He foiled Norwich with two good saves early on and repeated the dose in the second half.

"Norwich were useful and it was a good competitive match," says Reserves coach George Horsfall. "Also, it was well refereed — no bookings and no petulance."

With striker Alan Shearer and fullback Raymond Wallace away with the senior squad, Saints were forced to reshuffle. Phil Underhill switched from midfield to right-back to replace Wallace.

Lee Cormack, an England Schools midfield player, partnered the experienced Gordon Hobson up front on his Reserve team debut.

"Young Cormack did quite well," says Horsfall. "He was neat, laid the ball off well and his passing was good."

Another debutant was striker Lee Luscombe. He came off the substitutes' bench for the last ten minutes, taking over from Cormack.

**Danny Wallace, returning from injury, played for Saints Reserves in Tuesday's 2-0 Football Combination defeat at Millwall.**

Dean Horrix, back with Millwall after a spell at Reading, scored twice in the second half.

With Wallace on the right wing, Saints started promisingly and striker Alan Shearer had three scoring chances. But Millwall took over after half-time.

In the previous match, Channel Islander Lee Luscombe played a starring role as Saints Youth cruised to a 4-1 home win over Crystal Palace.

The big, strong striker rapped in two goals and laid on one for Alan Shearer. The other goal came from Tommy Widdrington.

"We gave a very, very good performance," praises Saints Youth coach Dave Merrington. "Having Shearer in the side obviously made a difference, but this was essentially a team effort.

"Palace had an experienced side out, but their boys were kept in the dressing-room for more than an hour afterwards. In fact, the groundsman turned the light out on them!"

Luscombe, playing wide on the left, set Saints on their way by slamming in goal No. 1 via an upright. Then his deep cross, delivered on the run, enabled Shearer to score with a far-post header.

Leading 2-0 at half-time, Saints went further ahead when Widdrington cheekily ran past the offside trap to score. And Luscombe rounded off a four-man move with a scoring shot from the edge of the penalty-area before Crystal Palace grabbed a late consolation goal.







# FIRST DIVISION games & goals

## FOOTBALL'S FALSE IMAGE

**Judging from some newspapers, English football has hit a new low in the popularity poll. And, while we cannot deny that the England team hit rock bottom in the summer European Championships, it is certainly NOT true to say that our club football is rubbish.**

Neither is it true to suggest that the hooligan problem is getting worse.

Inaccurate reporting is partly to blame for presenting this very false image of the English game. But our administrators are certainly not without their share of the blame.

The League's management committee appeared to spend almost the entire summer in pursuit of money. Scant attention was paid to promoting the finer side of football.

The manner in which the committee played off one television company against another, in a bid to screw as much cash as possible, was distasteful in the extreme to all of us who hold this game close to our hearts. For it is through the correct presentation of the game on television that its long-term future lies.

The League has now succeeded in alienating certain sections of the television media so they can scarcely expect those people to be promoting the game in the manner in which it should be presented.

In recent years the League has been alienating television companies, national newspapers and football magazines — the very people who, more than anyone else, are in a position to publicise the happier side of football.

The situation reached its lowest ebb this summer when the League demanded a fee of

£750 from all publications for the right to advertise their own games!

For years it has been customary for weekly and monthly magazines to offer — completely free of charge to the League — important advertising pages through which the League, and its clubs, could advertise dates of matches.

Supporters — the paying customers upon whom the game relies so heavily — had been able to plan their soccer-watching in advance, ascertaining just when their favourite clubs would be playing in their region.



Many publications, quite rightly, refused to pay and it was the fans who suffered. And one more nail was driven into the coffin of the game's already tarnished image.

To expect the media to pay to advertise one's product is ludicrous and provides yet another example of how easy it is to damage the image of the game.

The League has complained bitterly about lack of publicity for many of its Centenary events. One example was the pre-season Wembley International Tournament which brought together four exciting clubs in Arsenal, Tottenham, Bayern Munich and AC Milan.

Wembley would normally have been filled on both days for such rich soccer entertainment. Yet, only around 30,000 turned up.

It was announced last week that Wembley had sold less



than 1,000 tickets for this season's first international against Denmark.

The signs are all there to be seen. The media as a whole is tending to reduce quite drastically its coverage of soccer in favour of sports more aware of the need for publicity.

If fans don't know about these events how can we expect them to turn up? If the League demands payment for advertising its matches then the percentage of publicity will decline still further.

The frightening thing is that, when the new TV agreements expire, the companies may well turn to other sports who are less greedy. Football could disappear from our screens altogether.

When that happens it could also disappear from the back pages of our newspapers.

Goalscoring was considerably up on the opening day of the League season. Here at The Dell we enjoyed four great goals and, with just a small amount of luck, it could have been six or seven.

Arsenal hit five goals away from home at Wimbledon. Everton's new golden boy Tony Cottee scored a hat-trick on his debut in a 4-0 win over New-

castle, who are themselves a team of considerable potential.

Liverpool won 3-0 away from home. Nine First Division games produced 26 goals, an average of very nearly three goals per game. That's well above the average.

This is one aspect of the game which should be emphasised. The quality of our club football — which was so obvious in our many European triumphs before the imposition of the ban — is really good.

Take the hooliganism problem. The way it was presented continually on television, and in our morning papers as headline news, during the European Championships made it appear that every English supporter was a lout.

It got to the point where the F.A. felt it diplomatic to withdraw its request to UEFA to end its ban on our clubs.

So English supporters have been denied another season of European entertainment.

Yet, the reality of the situation was revealed when the dust had died down and a German F.A. official proclaimed that the incidents in Stuttgart and Dusseldorf were no worse than he would normally expect on an evening after a routine

German League match.

Once again the British press, and television, had blown up the incidents to the detriment of the English game.

We cannot blame them, though. Our football authorities have given so little attention to correcting the situation, so why should the media take much interest in the good of the game?

Newspapers are in business to make money. If they can make a quick buck out of the uglier side of football who can blame them?

The move to present the game in its correct image has got to come from within the sport.

Warning lights have been flashing for such a long time now.

Several of our major clubs, too, could do a lot more to improve their standing with the paying public. Again, some seem to think their fame will last forever and rush to make money from a rare success when they should be planning for the long term.

Southampton's public relations exercise is good. So is Everton's and Manchester United's. Watford's is excellent. These clubs take great pains to market themselves in the correct manner. The goodwill created, if properly maintained, will continue to be enjoyed for years to come.

Others, like Liverpool and Tottenham, are pretty awful. For the moment Liverpool are riding upon their success. But, unless Tottenham start winning things, their support will drop alarmingly.

If football really was in such a sad state, we should have little about which to complain.

But football is not a rotten apple in the barrel of English sport.


In reality, it is a luscious peach ripe for enjoying. It is time we started bringing this home to the public at large.

## SAINTS AND PANINI HELP TO MAKE LUNG FOUNDATION PROJECT A SUCCESS

Saints are backing a unique year-long study of children's chest symptoms now being carried out in and around Southampton.

The project, which involves 200 youngsters aged eight and nine, is the first of its type in the world and is headed by Dr. Joanne Clough, a paediatrician based at Southampton General Hospital.

As an inducement to keep the boys and girls interested, Saints have given them the chance to fill a Panini album with stickers free of charge.

In conjunction with Panini, the world's No. 1 sticker manufacturers, the club arranged for every child to receive an album when the

study started and three packets of stickers each time he or she attends a clinic.

"The scheme involving these stickers has been amazingly successful," reports Dr. Clough. "Only five children have dropped out!"

"Originally, we thought of distributing signed photographs, but Panini albums and stickers have proved to be a big success!"

Dr. Clough, sponsored by the British Lung Foundation, sees each child every four weeks.

With the vital support of research nurses Sandra Smith and Sue Cook, she holds afternoon clinics at Totton Health Centre on Mondays, Hythe or Blackfield Medical Centres on alternate Tuesdays, Romsey Hospital on Wednesdays and Bitterne Health Centre on Thursdays.

On each visit, children perform a 20-minute lung function test which measures the sensitivity of their lungs.

Also, the children are required twice daily to use a blowing machine at home and makes notes and comments on their treatment and symptoms.






