

That does not mean however that we do not intend to keep Andy Dibble fully employed on his first return to Luton since moving north. We hope Andy enjoys his reunion with us but does not prevent us moving into the quarter-finals in defence of the Littlewoods Cup.

These notes were written before our trip to Norwich last Saturday owing to printer's deadlines and I cannot make any comment on that performance. I hope the team were able to maintain the improved form shown in the previous week's home match against West Ham. As I said in my notes for that programme, we were working hard to find a more creative and goalscoring blend. It worked that day and we put in a good all-round team performance. Enjoy tonight's match and please give the team your vocal support. Thankyou.

DRESSING ROOM TALK

with Roy Wegerle

Born in Johannesburg, South Africa, in March 1964, Roy Wegerle joined the Town during the summer from Chelsea after starting his career on the other side of the Atlantic with Tampa Bay Rowdies in the North American Soccer League. Today, in Dressing Room Talk, Roy describes his own career and reflects on his new career at Kenilworth Road:

Great experience

"I was born and raised in South Africa but left when I was 17. I won a scholarship to Miami University and it was while I was there that I took up professional football in the United States. At that time the NASL was full of star players and big names – people like Johan Cruyff, Franz Beckenbauer, Pele, George Best and so on. It was really good for me. There was a lot of razzamatazz attached to the game and it was a high standard being played.

"It may not have been so high as it is or was in the English First Division, but it was still a good standard. Playing in that league was fantastic for me and was my apprenticeship if you like. But it was always my ambition to play in England in the First Division and I got my chance in 1986 when I was able to join Chelsea.

High quality

"I was at Stamford Bridge for two years and then, as you know, I joined Luton this year. I have enjoyed my time so far at Kenilworth Road. Everyone has made me feel most welcome and the players have been great... We have a very high quality squad here and I am sure it is only a matter of time before we can make things click regularly.

"I am still living in London, in Wimbledon, but I am searching for a place to live much nearer to the club. The travelling can be a bit tiring sometimes as it is a long journey. I try and break it up by mixing up driving and the train journeys. But it is always going to

be a long journey in.

"My initial period with the club has been much as I have expected. It is going to take time to get used to players and to fit in with their styles and the pattern of the team. Now I think I am beginning to find myself a place in the side and it is up to me to keep working hard at it to make it my own. My favourite role is to play off a big central attacker, a bit like Brian Stein used to last year, but I am happy to be in the side wherever I am asked to play.

Score goals

"My job is to try and score and create goals – that is the main thing. We have had some criticism from the press recently, but we may have answered that with our four goals against West Ham when I was on the scoresheet with my first senior goal for Luton. Of course, we are not going to score four goals every week, even if we would like to. But it is good for confidence and I think we have yet to see the best of our team. We are settling down now and I just hope we can begin to put it together consistently."

CUP-TIE SCHEDULE ENSURES A BUSY TIME LIES AHEAD

Good evening and welcome to Manchester City, their directors, officials, players and, particularly, their fans and goalkeeper. I am sure they will have a big following here tonight and enjoy their visit to Kenilworth Road.

We have, as all our regular supporters know, made a special effort to bring in a system tonight to assist in our visiting supporters' accommodation with reduced inconvenience to our own fans by using the Maple Road bridge in a scheme suggested by our supporters and approved by the police.

I hope we are able to announce that the experiment is a success.

Simod draw

The draw for the third round of the Simod Cup – in which we reached Wembley last season – has taken place and paired us with either Crystal Palace or Southampton away from home. We were not involved in the competition until this stage because we were a seeded club.

As the match between Palace and Southampton has not been resolved, we are unable to give any firm date or venue for our third round tie. If tonight's Littlewoods Cup tie ends in a draw the replay will be at Maine Road on December 14 – an arrangement made because the Guinness Soccer-6 takes place in the first week of December.

It is likely the Simod tie will not take place until the New Year by when we hope also to be making significant progress in the Bedfordshire Premier Floodlit Cup and the F.A. Youth Cup.

We have been drawn away to Wootton Blue Cross in the Bedfordshire competition and are due to meet them at Wootton on Tuesday, December 6, kick-off 7.30 pm. If the match ends in a draw the replay will be held at Kenilworth Road on Thursday, December 15, kick-off 7.45 pm.



KINGSLEY NAILS HAMMERS
Luton Town 4 West Ham United 1

Two cracking long-range shots by Kingsley Black, an equally spectacular effort by Danny Wilson and Roy Wegerle's tap-in for his first goal for the club in the First Division ensured the Town swept to a commanding victory over West Ham in our last home match 10 days ago. In a bright all-round performance, it was the sharpness and movement of the midfield and forward players which caught the eye as the Hammers were well and truly nailed in the opening 38 minutes.

West Ham played their part in what was a thoroughly entertaining match and came back briefly in the second half when Alvin Martin scored from close range after 62 minutes, but there was never doubt about the eventual outcome. With a reshaped midfield, including David Preece for the first time since September, the Town were always on top and were able to enjoy winning with something to spare.

The win lifted the Town away from the three bottom places in the First Division but left them in 16th position in the table with 13 points from 13 games. Afterwards, Kingsley Black and David Oldfield earned special praise for their pace, but Martin pointed to the all-round skills and strength of Mick Harford as the Town's key asset. Town boss Ray Harford said he felt the performance was the team's best of the season and added that Preece had an excellent game in midfield.







OUR FIVE PREVIOUS MEETINGS WITH CITY

We resume our defence of the trophy tonight against a team that we have met five times before in the same competition albeit in the old League Cup, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The League Cup was in its infancy when we were drawn away to City in a 4th Round tie on 14th November 1962. Second Division Luton had already won at Southport and Barnsley in the competition that season and the thought of travelling away yet again did not bother us overmuch even though City were a First Division outfit at the time.

With the Final being played over two legs with the prospects of appearing at Wembley were non-existent with the result that attendances were poor and only 8682 turned up at Maine Road that night to watch a poor game settled by a first half goal from City's Alex Harley.

"A big crowd turned us into action at Kenilworth Road"

By the time the teams next the League Cup had established itself on the football calendar as proved by the Towns decision to make City's visit to Kenilworth Road for a 3rd Round tie on 25th October 1977 all ticket.

Roared on by a crowd of 16443 the Town outplayed City in the first half and sharper finishing by Ron Fletcher would have given him a hat-trick. The breakthrough came in the 50th minute however when Fletcher latched onto a mistake by Paul Power to score.

As the Town basked in the glory, City sneaked an equaliser within three minutes from Peter Barnes and that is how the score remained despite further heavy Luton pressure including a goalbound effort from Ricky Hill headed off the line by Tommy Booth.

The replay took place at Maine Road the following week and with the seconds ticking away and the match still scoreless Gary Heale was faced with an open goal but amazingly missed. The score remained level after

extra time and the 28254 City faithful went home relieved.

The second replay was fixed for Old Trafford on 9th November 1977 but in that short space of time the Town had lost the services of Paul Fletcher, badly injured in a road accident, and Jim Husband injured on the football field.

Jim McNichol was drafted into defence and a first outing given to a certain Brian Stein only recently signed from non-league Edgware.

For some peculiar reason the match was made all-ticket with the result that only 14043 bothered to roll up but the Town fans soon made themselves heard as Gary Heale suitably atoning for his mistake at Maine Road put Luton two up with goals in the 11th and 26th minute.


City, suitably shocked, managed to pull the game level at the end of normal time with goals from Dennis Tueart and Mike Channon before scoring an undeserved winner courtesy of Brian Kidd in the 113th minute.

It was only three years later that the teams met in the competition, again in Round 3, and again at Kenilworth Road.

This time the game was settled at the first attempt with City winning 2-1 but not without some scores along the way as the Town pushed forward especially in the second half.

City's first goal was scored in the 12th minute by Dave Bennett following good work by million pound signing Kevin Reeves. The Town equalised thirteen minutes later when Roddy Antic bent in a twenty yard free-kick but the winner was registered just before half-time by Tony Henry who scored with a clean header from a cross by City's other million pound man Steve Daley.

INTRODUCING...

MANCHESTER CITY

Tonight we welcome a Manchester City side who may be in Division Two but who are very much one of the country's leading clubs whether one looks at the talent at their disposal or at the measure of their support.

They were formed as Ardwick in 1887, growing out of a team called West Gorton, who had been playing as early as 1880. Ardwick played in the Football Alliance from 1889 to 1898 when they became founder-members of Division Two. In only their second season there financial problems were so great that they were wound up and they emerged as Manchester City. They did well enough to qualify for the 'Test Matches' (the equivalents of the present-day play-offs) in 1896 only to lose 8-0 to Small Heath (now Birmingham City). In 1899, however, they won promotion with Welsh international winger Billy Meredith netting 29 goals.

They stayed up for only three seasons and soon afterwards they were involved in a bribery scandal, but they survived and this has been the main characteristic in their history, that of coming back after a setback. Though they have been relegated to Division Two on no fewer than eight occasions they have never stayed down for more than three seasons at a time. Twice after losing an F.A. Cup final in one year they have won it the next and even though they were relegated in 1938 just a year after winning the First Division Championship they did get into the record 'books' again then by being the highest scorers in Division One.

Their most successful spell was under Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison in the sixties and early seventies when they topped Division Two in 1966, won the First Division Championship in 1968, the F.A. Cup in 1969, and both the European Cupwinners Cup and the

League Cup in 1970.

They lost to Wolves in the League Cup final of 1974, but then won it again in 1976 under Tony Book, beating Newcastle in the final. Managers came and went after that with Malcolm Allison having a second spell, then John Bond, John Benson and Billy McNeill all having ago. They lost their First Division place in 1983 after their longest-ever spell there lasting 17 years and though they bounced back under McNeill in 1985 they went down again under Jimmy Frizzell in 1987.

Last season under Mel Machin they consolidated their Second Division place ready for a promotion drive this season and they also enjoyed useful runs in both the Littlewoods Cup (losing to Everton in round four) and the F.A. Cup (losing to Liverpool in round six).

"Andy Dibble needs no introductions"

Despite an indifferent start they seem destined to improve on last season's position of ninth. Since crashing 4-1 to Oldham at Maine Road on the opening day they have not lost at home and their only away defeats have been single goal affairs at Ipswich and Hull. In the Littlewoods Cup they have won 6-3 at Plymouth and 4-1 at home to Sheffield United, young striker **Paul Moulden** getting a hat-trick in the latter game. He is likely to be up front today with **Wayne Biggins**, who came from Norwich during the summer and **Tony Morley**, who came from Northampton last season. In midfield **Nigel Gleghorn** (from Ipswich a few months ago), ex-Congleton man **Ian Brightwell** and much-travelled **Ian McNab** have all found the net this season. In defence **Brian Gayle** came from Wimbledon during the summer to join former Liverpool junior **Mark Seagrave** and home-grown **Andy Hinchcliffe** and **Steve Redmond**. In goal **Andy Dibble** needs no introduction to our fans while substitutes recently have included England Under-21 man **David White** and England Youth cap **Jason Beckford**.
