

Graham Taylor has done a terrific job since he moved to Villa Park and they are now living up to their reputation as one of the biggest and finest clubs in the land. We know we shall be facing a tough match again today, but after our recent unbeaten run we will be looking to make up for the disappointment of the 0-0 draw with Newcastle in our last home match. We missed Mick Harford's presence that day, but I felt that if we had scored once we might have gone on to relax and score even more. It was one of those days.

Last weekend, at Derby, we came away with another good result thanks to a terrific all-round team performance full of endeavour all over the pitch. I was told it was one of the hardest-working Luton Town performances in years and that pleased me. We have been trying to play further forward and work harder in the opposition's half, not allow them to play and come at us, and in recent weeks it has produced results for us. I hope it continues today.

After weeks of work in the transfer market, I felt some satisfaction this week at signing Iain Dowie from Hendon and I am delighted to welcome him to Kenilworth Road. He is a goal-scoring centre-forward with a real hunger to play in the First Division. I was disappointed in my bid to sign another player, but will still be looking for top-quality defensive cover. DRESSING ROOM TALK

with Richard Harvey

Born in Letchworth in April 1969, Richard Harvey is one of a current crop of several Town players who have broken into the First Division team after serving their schoolboy and apprentice days at Kenilworth Road. Richard was an England schoolboy international and has won caps with the England under-19 team as well. He made his debut as a 17-year-old at home to Queens Park Rangers in November 1986 and has recently enjoyed a run of four unbeaten appearances in the first team. Today he give an insight into life as a youngster in the First Division:

Lucky run

"I have been very lucky to have played in four of the last five matches when we have been unbeaten and it has helped me to build up my confidence. In fact, I have not been on the losing side in the First team at all this season. For me, it is my longest run since I made my debut and I am very pleased to have the chance.

"It does not get any easier as time goes on at all. But you do learn a lot about little things in the game. Every opponent is difficult in the First Division. No one is easy. But my most difficult match so far was probably against Dale Gordon at Norwich.

"He was strong and fast and very good with the ball. It was my first appearance of the season as well so I suppose it was a tricky match. I understand the manager wanted me to try and get forward and use my left foot for attacking purposes.

"It is one of the strengths of my game, but the major part of my job is really defending. I have to be able to both. To stop the opponent and to be able to get forward and create things if I can.

"I have always been a left-back except for a few occasions when I was a schoolboy and wanted to be a left-winger or a centre forward and to score more goals. I played for England schoolboys as a left-back and went on the tour of South America with the England under-19 squad as a left-back as well.

"That was a tremendous experience for me. We were away for 17 days and played against Brazil once and Uruguay twice. We played Brazil in a local team stadium, not in the Maracana or anything like that... but we did drive past it. It is absolutely fantastic.


"I have always been a Luton follower as I grew up in the local area and used to know about the team. My family have always followed Luton. But my brother went to Watford as a schoolboy while I was being coached by Luton. I was in John Moore's squad when I first joined.

"A lot of us have come through and playing in the team with so many of the other younger players does help. We've got Marvin, Kingsley and David who have all come through the ranks recently now in the first team squad.

"But it is the experienced players who make the most important moves to help. And in my case that really means Steve Foster and Les Sealey. What are they like? What do they say? Well, Fossie is a great motivator. He is always talking and chatting and encouraging. He is a big influence.

"Les is the same. He makes sure you stay on your toes if you know what I mean. He does not mess about much. But it all helps and of course there are other senior players around as well to make it all much easier.

"When I was a youngster I never really had any particular player I admired or modelled my game on, but I used to like watching Kenny Dalglish and Kevin Keegan the most. Neither of them were left-backs though!"

RAMS CHARGE REBUFFED

Luton Town 1 Derby County 2

A superbly-struck 19th minute goal by Mick Harford secured the Town's second away win in the First Division this season when they won by the only goal at the Baseball Ground against Derby last weekend. Harford thundered home a right-foot shot at the end of a flowing move which was completed by a skilful forward run and pass by Ricky Hill. Harford's England colleague Peter Shilton had no chance with his shot into the top corner from the edge of the penalty area.

With Harford returning to lead the attack after a one-match absence, there was a sharpness and shape about the team which had been missing in the previous week's clash with Newcastle. But they first had to overcome a powerful Derby opening during which the home team forced a series of nine corners in 15 minutes. Les Sealey pulled off two brilliant saves and, with Steve Foster marshalling the defence superbly, the Town gradually took control.

Impressive organisation and accurate passing were the hallmarks of the Town's performance, particularly in midfield, as they dominated the second half. Hill once bursting through but firing his final shot wide when he seemed set to score. It was the Town's fifth successive game without defeat and hoisted them further clear of the bottom of the table.



PLAYER PROFILE

STEVE FOSTER

Few players can have proved so influential to a team as Steve Foster has to the Town this season. Despite a near-incredible run of small injuries and cuts, the Hatters skipper has not missed a match and has proved his enduring and proven ability by nursing a youthful and transitional team along at the same time.

Who can forget the night he came off with his shirt crimson with blood against Burnley, or a similar scene against Arsenal in the First Division clash? Few strikers get the better of Fossie, battered or not.

Last season, Steve took on the additional duties of being a player-coach, a position he had to relinquish earlier this term following the arrival of twins and his onerous domestic life. "I could not do the job justice" he said at the time. He has concentrated on playing superbly ever since.

Born in Portsmouth, Steve has played with distinction for his home-town club, Brighton, Aston Villa and the Town, guiding Luton to their first trophy-winning appearance last season in the Littlewoods Cup final, another Wembley appearance in the Simod Cup final and two F.A. Cup semi-final appearances. He has won three England caps and was a member of the England World Cup squad in 1982 in Spain.







We welcome Aston Villa to Kenilworth Road today after a gap of one season and obviously hope at the risk of tempting fate, that their record here continues, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Our first league meeting with todays opponents was actually our first home game following our promotion to Division Two in 1937. A record crowd of 25,349 turned up on the evening of 1st September to see the Town run out 3-2 winners with goals from Albert Dawes, Joe Payne and Teddy Hancock.

Large crowds were queuing at the turnstiles when they were opened at 5 o'clock and they were closed again a little over an hour later. At a time when cars were still fairly uncommon every road within a half mile of the ground was jammed with vehicles and parking was allowed down the centre of some roads! So much for safety.

The return was played the following week at Villa Park and a crowd of 30,667 attended to

witness a 4-1 thrashing of the Town with all the goals being scored in the first half.

"Chiltern" reporting for the "Luton News" stated "I do not wish to be over critical" but his report was littered with words such as "abysmal", "inept" and "silly".

Not surprisingly Villa gained promotion at the end of the season and it was not until 1955/56 that paths crossed again following our elevation to Division One.

The 1-0 defeat at Villa Park on 12th November 1955 was regarded as a shock as the Town were going through a "purple patch" at the time which included a 5-1 victory over Wolves the previous week. The defeat proved to be a minor set back, however as the following Saturday Sunderland were walloped 8-2 at Kenilworth Road.

Games throughout the remainder of the 1950's were largely unremarkable apart from the fact that Gordon Turner proved to be a consistent thorn in the side of various Villa teams and it was not until 1972 after both clubs had suffered varying fortunes on the playing field that battle was resumed albeit in Division Two.

When the Town won 2-0 at Villa Park on 18th November 1972 it meant six away victories from nine starts. The only problem was that home games were being lost, usually by the only goal. Luton beat Villa at a canter with goals from Rodney Fern and John Aston and followed it up with a 1-0 win there the following season – Jim Ryan netting a disputed last minute penalty.

We were promoted to Division One at the end of 1973/74 and as we came down again the following season Villa went up and it was not until 1982/83 that meetings were resumed.

The game at Kenilworth Road on 9th April 1983 will live long in the memory for all who were fortunate to be there with David Moss scoring a last minute winner to set up a run-in which saw us narrowly avoid relegation in the final game.

Relegation was also staring the Town in the face when the teams met at Villa Park on 6th May 1985 but a single goal from Brian Stein virtually assured safety after a long and arduous season which included, a cruel defeat on that same ground in the semi-final of the F.A. Cup only weeks before.

INTRODUCING...

ASTON VILLA

Today we welcome an Aston Villa side who have lost on each of their last six visits, but who are very much part of soccer history and now, under Graham Taylor, appear poised to get among the major honours again during the next few seasons, writes **Geoff Allman**.

Villa were founded in 1874 from members of Wesleyan Chapel cricket team. They first played in the F.A. Cup (or English Cup as it was then known) in 1879/80 and they won the trophy in 1886/7 just two seasons before their committee member William McGregor was instrumental in setting up the Football League.

They were of course one of the twelve clubs with which the Football League kicked off and they won it in 1894, following up with an F.A. Cup win in 1895, the First Division Championships again in 1896 and the 'Double' in 1897.

"A great history which began in the 1880's"

By the outbreak of the First World War, they had chalked up six First Division Championships and five F.A. Cup wins and they won the F.A. Cup again in 1920.

Until 1936, they had never played anywhere but in Division One and, even though relegated then, they bounced back two years later and, by the outbreak of the Second World War, had a side that looked capable of going on to further honours.

By the time 'normal' football was resumed in 1946, however, men like wingers Frank Broome and Eric Houghton and defenders George Cummings and 'Mush' Callaghan were the wrong side of 30 and honours were in general out of their grasp.

They did however win the F.A. Cup in 1957 at a time when Eric Houghton was manager and his successor on the left wing Peter McParland was involved in the controversial injury to Manchester United goalkeeper Ray Wood.

They then won the Football League Cup in 1960/1, the first season of its existence when the final was not

played until the start of the following season.

After several seasons of struggling they lost their First Division place again in 1967 and in 1970 slipped into Division Three. In their first season there they reached the League Cup final and they emerged in 1972 to embark on an excellent run that took them back to Division One in 1975 with the League Cup thrown in for good measure.

They won the latter again in 1977, the First Division Championship in 1981 and the European Cup a year later. Relegation in 1987 was followed by promotion last season to celebrate Graham Taylor's first season at the helm and this was achieved despite failing to win any of their first seven games and only two of their last seven.

So far they have been a little inconsistent this season, but at their best they have won at Highbury and drawn at Old Trafford while at home they have beaten neighbours Birmingham 6-0 in the Simod Cup, Ipswich 6-2 in the Littlewoods Cup and Norwich 3-1 in the First Division.

Alan McInally, a £225,000 signing from Celtic last season, is currently leading scorer while **David Platt**, an opportunist signing from Crewe also last season got four of the six goals against Ipswich. **Tony Daley** is an exciting home-grown winger while in midfield, **Gordon Cowans** has returned this season from Bari, **Andy Gray** came from Crystal Palace last season and **Paul Birch** is an experienced home-grown product with an eye for goal.

In defence there is keen competition in the centre with **Allan Evans** in his 12th season, **Derek Mountfield** settling in well since his close-season move from Everton and **Martin Keown** in his third season since moving from Arsenal.

All are competing for the central places while on the flanks **Kevin Gage** is a former Wimbledon man on the opposite flank from newcomer **Chris Price** from Blackburn.

Home-grown **Bernard Gallacher** may also come into the reckoning while in goal **Nigel Spink**, who first starred in the European Cup win in 1982, has now played nearly 250 games and won one England cap.

Almost every League club has been assisted with essential safety work and further substantial sums have been spent to enable them to improve facilities in the past year alone. FGIT grants to Football League clubs totalled £770,561.

In addition to its safety programme, FGIT has also allocated £1.5 million to build or improve family and disabled facilities at League grounds during 1988.

WARNING

At the beginning of the season more than 110 League grounds in England, Wales and Scotland will be equipped with CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION which has been funded by The Football Trust.

It is there to increase crowd safety and to help the police. Recording facilities enable film and photographs to be taken of disorder, which may subsequently be used in a court of law.
