GOOD morning – and welcome back after the festivities. We also welcome Luton Town to White Hart Lane for a Boxing Day encounter that promises a good deal.

The last meeting between the two clubs on this ground was back in May as we ended the season with a 2-1 win. Steve Hodge fired us ahead on the half-hour despite goalkeeper Andy Dibble blocking his first shot and Ashley Grimes levelled for the Hatters six minutes later.

THRILLING FASHION

Skipper Gary Mabbutt netted the winner in thrilling fashion early in the second half with a superb volley which allowed us to make up for a 2-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road earlier in the season when Ian Allison scored both goals.

Our last game here saw Millwall visit White Hart Lane for the first time in Division One and depart empty handed as we produced a memorable performance to secure a deserved 2-0 win. Indeed, with more luck in front of goal, it could have been an even greater margin of victory.

Paul Walsh had already flashed one header wide and seen another effort kicked off the line before Chris Waddle stepped up to open the scoring with a searing long-range drive that dipped over goalkeeper Brian Horne and crashed in off the crossbar.

The goal came in the 18th minute and we continued to dominate without adding to that advantage until the 61st minute when Paul Stewart was brought down on the edge of the box and Paul Gascoigne produced one of his patented curling free-kicks into the back of the net before the Millwall defenders even sensed the danger.

Last Saturday we again produced an impressive performance to return from Upton Park with a 2-0 win over West Ham United.

Gazza was in inspired form – until an ankle injury forced him off at half-time – and, in



GOOD morning to all and welcome to Luton Town for what promises to be an entertaining Boxing Day fixture.

This game again gives us the opportunity to test our recent revival and we do so in good heart on the back of a good League run. Our only recent League defeat came at Everton and that was a travesty on our performance that day.

I am continually asked if we have now turned the corner and all that I can do is point out that we are playing better - up to now. We can't start saying that we have done it because that, in this game, is an invitation for a kick in the teeth.

We have got to keep working very hard and try to reach the level of performance we have achieved of late. We are improving all round as a team but I'll admit that, in the early days of the season, we had some very good parts but also possessed some aspects that were not too clever.

What we have done is to main-

tain the positive aspects of our play and worked hard on the other side. A new team is bound to throw up weaknesses and when you get one right another pops up and then another. For every side, the next half dozen games will be very interesting. We're all in the same position and we've all got it all to do.



Mitchell Thomas will always retain fond memories of Luton Town, the club that moulded his early career and set him up for life in the First Division.

The stylish left-back joined Spurs from Kenilworth Road in August, 1986, and there have been many media suggestions since that he would be on the move again. Mitch takes it all in his long stride: "If you started to take too much notice of what you read in the newspapers, you would go mad," he grins.

PROMISING YOUNGSTER

Mitchell, who still lives in Luton, has come a long way since the early days as a £25 a week trainee at Kenilworth Road. In fact, he was one of the first lads to take advantage of the new government-supported scheme which enabled soccer clubs to take on promising youngsters and was an outstanding success.

He was first spotted by Luton playing for the district's schools side and they continued to monitor his progress when he moved up into the Bedfordshire county team.

Yet, when he followed manager David Pleat from Luton that summer, Mitchell was under no illusions. Indeed, he had a deserved reputation as a consistent performer but he still had it all to do.

"In this game, you have to prove yourself in every match," he says. "There is no way you can let your standards slip for a moment because there are so many talented players queueing up to take your place – or else the manager can go out and buy somebody else."

"It's a continual challenge but, as far as I'm concerned, it is just great to have reached this level and I'm just out to improve as much as I can."

Mitchell agrees that having the former Luton contingent with him helped him settle during those early days at White Hart Lane. But he quickly became an integral part of the whole scene.

"I was accepted straight away and made to feel at home," he recalls. "I was happy enough at Luton, enjoyed my time there and am grateful for the help I received. But I could not resist the chance to join Spurs when it came along."

"You have to be prepared to stand up for yourself when you reach this level," he says, "and I think I have proved I can do that."

"At a big club like Spurs, second-best will just not do. Everybody worth their salt as a professional wants to play for England and I'm no exception. But first of all you have to prove yourself at club level and that is always the first target."

Mitchell, meanwhile, believes that playing in the Terry Venables sweeper-system has given him a new dimension to his game.

He says: "Although a full-back's job is first and foremost to defend, there is also the responsibility of setting up attacks and joining in forward movements."


"I've always loved the chance to get forward and have a crack at goal or maybe setting up somebody else to have a shot, so three at the back, allowing both full-backs to get involved in midfield suits me ideally," adds Mitchell who scored our second at West Ham last Saturday.

OPTIONS REDUCED

"Although the sweeper system aims to cut down the number of options the other side has in your half of the field, it is not purely a defensive tactic – not by a long way."

"The two marking players in the middle have definite roles to fill, but the sweeper and the two full backs get a lot more freedom. That means, on a good day, the entire team has more freedom to express itself as well."

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

His League form has gone from strength to strength since then as well, notably when he scored two top-quality goals in Luton's 4-1 win against West Ham United at Kenilworth Road last month.



TRUE BEACON OF OPTIMISM

PAUL MORAN'S climb to the First Division is an example of hope for any talented schoolboy player nurturing the dream of one day pulling on the famous white shirt.

Still Remembers

Striker Paul, who was 20 last May, still remembers – and always will – the red-letter day his teacher at Albany School in Enfield told him he was one of three boys chosen to take part in a trial at Tottenham when the club were looking to add to their complement of YTS trainees.

Paul recalls: "I was soon to leave school and really didn't have much idea of what I would do. Working in a sports shop was a possibility although of course, I always dreamed of how marvellous it would be to play football for a living – particularly for Spurs, the club I've always followed.

"When my teacher told me that I was one of three boys at the school picked out by Tottenham to have trials, I could hardly believe it. But I gave it everything, naturally, even though I didn't consider I had any better chance of

being taken on than the other two lads who I thought were just as good as me.


"But the club obviously saw something in me and I was offered the YTS place. I don't have to tell you how I felt do I! I was absolutely thrilled."

Thrilled

Tottenham's judgement in selecting Paul from all the hundreds of youngsters who are given a chance to become a Spurs trainee – they used to be called apprentices before the new government-backed scheme was introduced – has been fully vindicated of course.

He has remained firmly in manager Terry Venables' plans this season and has been widely acclaimed in the media as a real star of the future despite the competition at White Hart Lane.

"I don't mind that kind of challenge because I know that if I produce the goods I'll get every chance of a run in the team. At Tottenham everybody in the squad is treated as equal and if you get in the team, you are there on merit. That's all you can ask."



Mark Robson made his League debut when he was still only 17. That was for Exeter City in the Fourth Division and he had a dream start. Exeter beat Lincoln City 2-0 and Mark scored one of the goals.

Born in East London, he moved to Devon to join the Fourth Division club on a two-year apprenticeship in 1985. After a year, he was upgraded to professional status and made around 26 appearances for the first team scoring seven goals.

GOOD FORM

That form convinced us to bring him to White Hart Lane before the start of the season. He was drafted into the reserve squad and managed 19 combination appearances. But things were not going well for him.

"I found it really difficult to settle down at first," he remembers. "Coming from a tiny club like Exeter to a club like Spurs, which is one of the largest in the world, was a bit of a shock to the system."

"I didn't have a good season," he continues. "I only managed to score one goal, I didn't feel I was playing well and I lost all my confidence."

That confidence was soon restored by a loan period to struggling Reading, then of the Second Division. He went there hoping to save them from the drop to Division Three and, on that count, he failed; but he took a lot of credit for his six first team appearances.

Looking back on that troubled season he appreciates how much the time at Reading did for him.


"I held my own in the Second Division, which was very satisfying," he says. "There had been times when I wondered if leaving Exeter had been the right decision; but now I can see what coming to a big club like Spurs has done for me and I'm convinced I was right."


DEBUT



VISITORS



THE MANAGER

Luton Town have been managed by Ray Harford since June, 1987, when he was offered the post vacated by John Moore.

Ray, a Yorkshireman from Halifax, has proved a good choice for the job. As coach to Luton, he already had a detailed knowledge of the playing staff at Kenilworth Road, and this made his promotion to manager smoother than it otherwise might have been.

A man of several clubs, Ray's varied experience in the lower reaches of the League has given him a deep insight into the ways and attitudes of footballers and a good sense of values. A half-back, he played for Charlton Athletic, Exeter City, Lincoln City, Mansfield Town, Port Vale and Colchester United.

He became coach to Colchester and later filled the same post for Fulham under the management of Malcolm Macdonald. That was a step towards the managerial job he later filled at Fulham.

LUTON TOWN

LES SEALEY (Goalkeeper). Transferred to Luton from Coventry City in August, 1983. He's a Londoner from Bethnal Green and a cousin of Alan Sealey, the former West Ham United winger. Les developed through the apprentice ranks at Coventry, and had made his debut away to Queens Park Rangers in April, 1977. Back in season 1984-85 he played six League matches on loan to Plymouth Argyle.

MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender). First appeared in League football for Luton last season, making his First Division debut in the No. 5 shirt away to Wimbledon in March of this year. Marvin developed through the apprentice ranks at Kenilworth Road and was upgraded to professional in November, 1986. He was born at Wembley.

RICHARD HARVEY (Defender). A 19-year-old who was born at Letchworth in Hertfordshire and has developed steadily in the apprentice ranks at Kenilworth Road. He first appeared in Luton's League team in the No. 3 shirt at home to Queens Park Rangers in November, 1986. He's been a full professional since January, 1987.

STEVE FOSTER (Defender). A key figure at centre-half, and a powerful influence on the rest of the team. He was transferred to Luton from Aston Villa in November, 1984. Born at Portsmouth, he developed through the apprentice ranks of the Portsmouth club to full professional status, and later joined Brighton and Hove Albion. ASHLEY GRIMES (Defender). A full Eire international, who was born in Dublin and made his name with Manchester United. Previously, he had played for the Bohemians, who transferred him to the Old Trafford club in March, 1977. He left United for Coventry City in August, 1983 and made the further move to Luton in August, 1984.

IAN SCOTT (Midfield). A 20-year-old who was born in Luton and is therefore another of the club's home products. Has come through the apprentice ranks at Kenilworth Road.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield). Born at Bridgnorth and established himself as a League player with Walsall. Developed through Luton's apprentice ranks to achieve full professional status in May 1976. At that time he had already made his League debut as a substitute in a home match with Bristol Rovers in the preceding month. He celebrated that debut with a goal in a 3-1 win. Has made three appearances in the full England team.

ROB JOHNSON (Midfield). He was drafted into Luton's League team three seasons ago and has since established himself as a First Division player.

DANNY WILSON (Midfield). Transferred from Brighton and Hove Albion to Luton in July, 1987. He's a well-travelled player with varied experience acquired in the service of a number of clubs. He was born in Wigan and started his career with Bury, for whom he made 90 League appearances before signing for Chesterfield. After playing in 100 League games for Chesterfield, he joined Nottingham Forest and later signed for Brighton. At one time he was a loan player with Scunthorpe United. He's a full Northern Ireland international.

RICKY HILL (Midfield). A full English international, who was born in London and developed through Luton's apprentice ranks to achieve full professional status in May 1976. At that time he had already made his League debut as a substitute in a home match with Bristol Rovers in the preceding month. He celebrated that debut with a goal in a 3-1 win. Has made three appearances in the full England team.

MICK HARFORD (Forward). A full England international who joined Luton from Birmingham City in December 1984. He had joined

Birmingham from Bristol City in an unusual "three club" deal just before the deadline for transfers in March, 1982. He had signed for the Bristol club from Newcastle United in August, 1981 and it was necessary for him to be registered again with the Tyne-siders before the transfer to Birmingham could be completed. He was born in Sunderland and started his League career with Lincoln City.



IAIN DOWIE (Forward). Luton paid a substantial transfer fee to Hendon, the Vauxhall Opel League club, for his services just before Christmas. Iain had scored 27 goals for Hendon this season, and he is regarded as a first-class prospect.

All the records I play at White Hart Lane are available from branches of OUR PRICE RECORDS, all over the country.




Times Past

Luton Town come to White Hart Lane this morning looking to improve their recent record here. Of their last 15 League visits they have won just once, back in November, 1985, when a 3-1 scoreline saw them gain a Division One win bonus here for the first time.

Mick Harford pounced to give the Hatters a first half lead which Brian Stein extended 18 minutes into the second period. Richard Cooke notched our goal after Mark Falco nodded on Chris Waddle's cross but Ricky Hill struck a ferocious right foot shot past Ray Clemence with little more than a minute remaining.

The result brought to an end our stranglehold over the Bedfordshire outfit which had seen us unbeaten by them in a dozen League and Cup meetings at home and away since 1959.

It was their first League win here since 1948 and the first time they had defeated us by more than a single goal – a feat they have achieved in each of the last two seasons.

The two teams here in 1985 were Tottenham: Clemence, Stevens, Hughton, Roberts, Mabbutt, Perryman, Crook (Cooke), Falco, Leworthy, Hoddle, Waddle. Luton: Sealey, Breacker, Thomas, Nicholas, Foster, Donaghy, Hill, Stein, Harford, Nwajiobi, Preece.

The only previous League fixture over the Christmas

period between the two clubs was here on the morning of Christmas Eve, 1955. We won 2-1 thanks to goals by Len Duquemin and Johnny Brooks, Gordon Turner supplying the visitors' second-half reply.

A 41,168 crowd saw Bobby Smith make his Spurs debut a few days after joining us from Chelsea.

Luton provided the opposition for our final League match of last season which was played here on the evening of May 4.

Steve Hodge gave us the lead on 30 minutes in what was to be his – plus Clive Allen's and Johnny Metgod's – last appearance in our League side. His initial effort was saved by Andy Dibble but he was on hand to knock in the rebound. Ashley Grimes equalised six minutes later following a one-two with David Oldfield.

Skipper Gary Mabbutt netted our winning goal in the 53rd minute with a superbly struck half-volley from 25 yards for his second goal of the

season, his first coming on the campaign's opening day.

The sides that evening were Tottenham: Mimms, Statham, Thomas, Fenwick (Samways 46), Fairclough, Mabbutt, Allen C. (Gray 69), Allen P., Waddle, Metgod, Hodge. Luton: Dibble, Breacker, Johnson, R. Wilson, Foster, Johnson, M. Nwajiobi, Oldfield, Allinson, Grimes, Preece (Cobb 71).

Bill McCarty, a Scottish right back, was one of several players to turn out for both clubs in their Southern League days.

Standing 5ft. 10ins. and weighing in at 12st. his career started with Vale of Clyde, Third Lanark and Clyde in his native country before coming south to join Luton in 1900.

After just 15 League games he moved on to Nottingham Forest during the 1901 close season returning southward to New Brompton – now known as Gillingham – a year later. It was from the Kentish club that he came to Tottenham in May, 1904 as understudy to John Watson. His fellow Scot restricted him to just a dozen appearances in a Spurs shirt and in mid-1905 he joined the Hatters for a second spell.

This time he amassed 148 Southern League appearances until retiring from senior football in 1910, aged 34.

NEWCASTLE'S new manager Jim Smith hopes to see his team move out from the relegation area when he brings it here next Saturday. The Magpies celebrated his first game in charge with a 2-1 home win over Wimbledon – it was the first time the Magpies had scored a goal in seven games!

Mr. Smith clearly has the players capable of making Newcastle great again. Former manager Willie McFaul re-invested all the £2.2-million received from the sale of Paul Gascoigne to Spurs last summer.

He signed striker John Hendrie (from Bradford City), goalkeeper Dave Beasant and centre-back Andy Thorn (both from Wimbledon).

In spite of this Newcastle made a very poor start to the season and, though they ended their run by winning at Liverpool (2-1), Mr. McFaul was dismissed and, for a while, Colin Suggett took charge of the team. But, earlier this month, Newcastle made another change at the top when they persuaded Jim Smith to leave Queens Park Rangers.

One of his first moves was to return to Q.P.R. to sign midfield man Kevin Brock. Other players who have joined Newcastle over the past couple of months include midfield man Lee Payne (Barnet),

Liam O'Brien (Manchester United) and forward Rob McDonald (PSV Eindhoven). McDonald once played for Hull but had spent the past eight years in Dutch football.

Newcastle went into the holiday period with just that one away victory, at Liverpool, to their credit though they did draw at Charlton (2-2) and Luton (0-0).

They were beaten at Everton (0-4), Derby (0-2), West Ham (0-2), Queens Park Rangers (0-3) and Millwall (0-4).

Over the years Newcastle have lost many cup-ties to smaller clubs and this season it was Third Division Sheffield United who put them out of the Littlewoods Cup, defeating them 3-2 on aggregate.

Mr. Smith's immediate task is to bring some stability back to Newcastle after a season of turmoil. His first aim is to pull them clear of relegation danger but he clearly has more exciting plans in hand.

"This is the first club I have been with that has had the potential to win the League Championship," he said. "Some re-organising has to be done but I don't see any valid reason why we should not eventually do that."

Gazza – and Chris Waddle – will be particularly looking forward to this one!
