LUTON TOWN, who won their first major trophy when lifting the Littlewoods Cup in such dramatic

fashion at Wembley last season, are going through a transitional period at the moment. Manager Ray Harford has introduced several youngsters to the team this season in addition to new signings left-back John Dreyer (signed from Oxford), midfielder

Steve Williams (Arsenal) and forward Roy Wegerle (Chelsea).

So perhaps it is not surprising that Luton have been hovering in the lower part of the table for much of the season so far. But they have survived again to the quarter-finals of the Littlewoods Cup and a 4-1 home win over West Ham in November, — plus encouraging subsequent results,

suggests that the new-look team is beginning to find its feet.

Away form has not been good so it was surprising that their only away wins in the First Division leading up to the holiday games should have come at Everton (2-0) in September and at Derby (1-0) earlier this month. The Hatters drew at Nottingham Forest (0-0) and Norwich (2-2) but were beaten at Sheffield Wednesday (0-1), Southampton (1-2), Middlesbrough (1-2), Millwall (1-3) and Coventry (0-1). The Hatters survived a few early scares in defence of their Littlewoods Cup trophy. They were held at home by Fourth Division Burnley (1-1) in the second round but won the second leg by 1-0. They had to visit Second Division Leeds United and came out 2-0 winners.

In round four they achieved a 3-1 home win over another Second Division side, Manchester City, and they are now at home to Southampton in the quarter-finals.

The Luton side is expected to be selected from:

**LES SEALEY (Goalkeeper).** Les had the misfortune to miss last season's Littlewoods Cup final through injury. He spent many years as a Coventry first-teamer before signing for Luton in 1983. He later spent a short spell on loan to Plymouth.

**ROB JOHNSON (Defender).** Rob is a Luton discovery, first introduced to their League eleven during 1983/84 when he also played on loan with Lincoln.

**STEVE FOSTER (Defender).** Steve, capped three times by England, joined Luton from Aston Villa in 1984. He started as a striker with Portsmouth but switched to defence

before joining Brighton in 1979. He played for the Seagulls in the 1983 F.A. Cup final replay and joined Villa almost a year later.

**MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender).** Marvin took over the role filled for so many years by N. Ireland cap Mel Donaghy when he moved on to Manchester United in October. A former apprentice, Marvin was blooded in the First Division for a few games last season.

**RICHARD HARVEY (Defender).** Richard developed in the youth team and made his League debut against Q.P.R. in November 1986. He played a few more games that season but then had to wait until last month for a further recall.

**STEVE WILLIAMS (Midfield).** Steve was a member of the Arsenal side which won the League Cup two seasons ago though he did not appear in last season's final. Luton signed him for £300,000 this summer. Steve spent nine successful years as a Southampton first-teamer, winning the first of his six England caps as a Saints' player. He was transferred to Arsenal in 1985.

**DANNY WILSON (Midfield).** Danny, who won his 11th N. Ireland cap in this season's World Cup clash with Hungary, was signed from Brighton during the 1987 close-season. He played his early football with Bury and Chesterfield, joining Nottingham Forest in 1983. But he played only a handful of games for Forest before moving to Brighton in 1983.

**RICKY HILL (Midfield).** Ricky is a

one-club man who first played in Luton's senior team in 1976. He now looks back on more than 400 games and he has played for England on three occasions.

**DAVID PREECE (Midfield).** David emerged as a League player with Walsall in 1981 and it was after he had held a first-team place for just over two years when Luton signed him in 1984 for £150,000.

**KINGSLEY BLACK (Midfield).** Kingsley burst onto the scene last season when he was one of the stars of the Wembley Littlewoods Cup final. He also played twice for N. Ireland.

**ROY WEGERLE (Forward).** Roy was playing indoor football with Tampa Bay Rowdies when their coach Rodney Marsh recommended him to Chelsea, who paid £100,000 for him in 1986. But he was given few opportunities at Stamford Bridge and Luton were able to sign him for £75,000 this summer. Roy scored five times in three games at the end of November.

**MICK HARFORD (Forward).** Mick, who won his second full England cap in the friendly against Denmark in September, scored 21 times last season in spite of a long absence through injury. He began his career with Lincoln and commanded a then record £200,000 fee for a Fourth Division player when he moved on to Newcastle in 1981. He was soon on the move again, to Bristol City, and he spent just over three years with Birmingham before signing for Luton in 1985.

Lawrie started off the proceedings with a friendly back header into Webb's nose, followed it up with a rather ungamely kick in the face and finished off the act with the goal that sunk Brian Clough's men. The only words of consolation Sanchez could find afterwards were, "Neil never did track people down very well."

## Cawley Gone

The Fulham connection continues. After the departure of Andy Sayer to Craven Cottage, Pete Cawley has also made the move to Fulham. Cawley never recaptured his spot in the centre of defence after the Arsenal debacle in the first game of the season, although the young stopper did manage a share of the glory when he played against Liverpool at Wembley in the Charity Shield. Pete celebrated his return to first team action, albeit in the Third Division, by setting up Fulham's win-

ner in their clash with Preston on his debut at the Cottage. Unfortunately that was the last action Fulham fans saw from Cawley as he started a suspension the following week after being sent off in a Dons reserve team clash at Crystal Palace.

Footnote. Andy Sayer is rumoured to be the target for Middlesbrough. Amazingly his transfer fee has trebled in just three months. Fulham bought him for £70,000 and are likely to sell him for around £250,000.

The cynics who despise Wimbledon and Millwall's style would not be surprised to learn flowing football was almost non-existent. Wimbledon's match programme promised a festive football and very little football.

The expected midfield battle between hard men Vinny Jones of Wimbledon and Millwall's Terry Hurlock failed to materialise and it was Lawrie Sanchez who drew blood in that department. Hurlock suffered a bleeding nose

and mouth in an early brush with Sanchez and drifted out of the game to become almost as anonymous as Millwall strikers Tony Cascarino and Teddy Sheringham.

## Blocked

Wimbledon's winner came after Millwall failed to cut out a hopeful long throw from Jones.

Terry Gibson hit a shot on the turn which was blocked but Fairweather slid in the rebound. "It was not a great game but it was our third home victory in the League and that pleases me," said Wimbledon manager Bobby Gould.

MILLWALL'S poor away form continues to hinder their prospects at the top of Division One, while Wimbledon are gradually easing their plight at the other end of the table.

The Lions haven't won a League match outside the Den since their 3-0 success over Charlton on September 10 and struggling Wimbledon gave them no respite, battling their way to three valuable points.

The FA Cup-holders broke the deadlock eight minutes after the interval. A long throw by Vinny Jones was headed on at the near post by Eric Young.

Terry Gibson's shot was blocked by Brian Horne, but Carlton Fairweather was on hand to fire home the rebound.

The Dons could have wrapped it up in the 71st minute but Fairweather's shot was kicked away by Keith Stevens after Gibson had been put through by Dennis Wise.

Despite a fast and furious second 45 minutes, the first half must rate as one of the poorest played at a First Division ground this season.

## Speculative

Scoring opportunities were

few and far between as both sides struggled to create openings of any quality.

After four minutes a miskick by Lawrie Sanchez let in Les Briley, but he headed over from six yards to waste a rare chance.

Eric Young had Wimbledon's best attempt of the half, but his 31st-minute goal-bound header was deflected on to the bar and Briley cleared the danger.

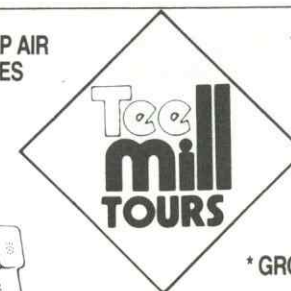
John Fashanu shot wide after beating Steve Wood and Gibson tried a speculative chip from 25 yards which ran past the post.

## WIMBLEDON v LUTON TOWN

This afternoon's visitors Luton Town come to Plough Lane boasting a fairly good record against Wimbledon in past encounters, indeed until last March the Dons had never beaten the Bedfordshire side in first team competition and were fast becoming a bogey side until two defeats in succession rectified that state of affairs.

One of those matches of course was the semi-final of the F.A. Cup at Tottenham in April, a game that somewhat unsurprisingly the Luton programme for our visit this season managed to gloss over in a couple of sentences of the seven matches played between the two clubs to date. It was clearly the most important of the lot and White Hart Lane was the obvious

choice of venue. The Dons had not played a game on a neutral ground for eleven years since seeing off Staines Town in the 1977 London Senior Cup Final replay at Dulwich, but the relative importance of the two games bore no comparison. Wimbledon's fans were slightly more numerous than Luton's in the 25,000 crowd, but when half-time came with a goalless scoresheet fate seemed to have turned its back on the Dons. Four times their attackers had been clean through against a square Luton defence only to be stopped by Luton keeper Dibble, whilst the Hatters had one similar chance. At the other end half-time gloom turned to outright despair when Mick Harford's well-taken goal gave Luton the lead early in the second half. After strong penalty appeals had been turned down, referee Hackett appeased Wimbledon's anger by giving a penalty for a foul on Gibson. Fashanu seemed to take an age to equalise from the spot, and thereafter it always seemed that there would be only one winner, but fortunately nerve ends were not stretched into extra time as Dennis Wise scored the winner in what must have been the tensest Wimbledon game of all time.

In comparison with that, mere League games against Luton do not evoke the same passion and intensity of action. It appears that Wimbledon's style is not suited to plastic pitches, and two draws are the best results gleaned from Kenilworth Road, while a win and a defeat apiece have occurred at Plough Lane, balanced out by a 1-1 draw in a friendly at Wimbledon in 1985. It seems unlikely that the drama of White Hart Lane will be repeated this afternoon since both teams are near the wrong end of the table and need the points urgently but we live in hope.

# THE THERVIEW



So we come to New Year's Eve 1988, and in view of the fact that Christmas printing deadlines mean that this is being written not far off New Year's Day 1988, it seems an appropriate option to look back at the only year this century that has got two eights in it.

So whilst everyone else was deliriously happy when the final whistle blew, I was piling up nine lumps of bricks at the thought of what I'd let myself in for. And then when it was all over it was too late.

I actually gained a lot more enjoyment when I saw the lovable canine win for the first time. This was of course a direct consequence of the FA Cup win because the bricks built me a nice few bob. But I don't particularly get much enjoyment when the phone bill arrives. Calling Newcastle is very expensive, especially

when the co-owner insists on giving me a stride by stride account of each race. And as fate would have it, the magnificent mutt was due to run at Wembley just before Christmas. On the same track our heroes paraded around some seven months earlier.

The year has not been without the odd hiccup or three. Back in July I stepped out of a cab at Newmarket and straight into a car being driven by a journalist who happens to work for the same paper as I do. Later that same month I was doing some studio photos of a very nice young lady when the whole neighbourhood had a power failure. She waited, then cleared off and I've never heard from her since. Hardly my fault, but when I did a job a couple of months ago without any film in the camera, then that was a night of sheer grovelling I won't forget in a hurry.

1988 has not been a vintage year for our national pastime. Fear of AIDS, I think. As for football, I'm not a fan of Luton Town, but they did well to pick up the consolation prize of the Littlewoods Cup. ## FLOOD LIGHT

### REVIEW OF THE YEAR

#### Continued

In this end of year programme, we bring our review of 1988 bang up to date.

**JULY:** Brian Gayle completed his move to Manchester City after turning down an offer from Steve Coppell at Crystal Palace. There was terrible news for Wimbledon as Don Howe was rushed into hospital for an emergency heart bypass operation after returning from the European Championships in West Germany. Bobby Gould's transfer troubles continued with Dennis Wise reported to be unhappy at the club while Andy Thorn, made skipper only two weeks before, left to join Beasant at Newcastle for £900,000.

**AUGUST:** Transfer rumours abounded as the season approached. Wimbledon were linked with every player who

seemed to come onto the market while Bobby Gould was busy turning down offers for the likes of Wise, John Fashanu and Lawrie Sanchez. The Vinny Jones saga continued when the midfielder was sent off for elbowing a part-timer in a pre-season friendly on the Isle of Wight. Gould immediately slapped an indefinite ban on Jones which meant he missed the Charity Shield defeat by Liverpool at Wembley. Roger Joseph completed a £150,000 move to Plough Lane from Brentford just in time to witness the opening day massacre.

**SEPTEMBER:** The Plough Lane blues were lifted a little when Don Howe returned to the club after his operation and on the pitch things were looking up a little with a 2-2 draw at Luton. Lawrie Sanchez demanded a move after failing to agree a new contract and was involved in a bust-up with Gould. Two defeats against West Ham and Middlesbrough did not help morale and even Vinny Jones return against Coventry could not stop the Dons slipping to a third straight 1-0 defeat, although two goals from John Fashanu gave them a good Littlewoods Cup start at Barnsley.

**OCTOBER:** Hans Segers arrival in the Wimbledon net seemed to inspire the Dons and they scored a superb 2-1 victory over Everton to start the month in style. And they followed that with a late, late win at Aston Villa thanks to John Scales winner. Dons slipped to a 1-0 defeat in the

second leg of the Littlewoods Cup but still made it through to the next round. Gould splashed out a record £500,000 for Reading's Keith Curle. Dennis Wise grabbed the glory with his headed equaliser against Manchester United to earn a point. But their inconsistency showed with a diabolical 4-1 defeat by Derby County.

**NOVEMBER:** November was dominated by yet another in the long line of crises to hit Plough Lane, namely the infamous 'tunnel incident' involving John Fashanu and Viv Anderson. Whatever the rights and wrongs of the situation, the sad fact was that the off-field hysteria made people forget that Wimbledon had scored a superb win over Manchester United. The incident cast a shadow over the following games and wasn't helped by Vinny Jones' reckless tackle on Gary Stevens which put the Spurs man in hospital and out of the game. A 1-1 draw with Charlton helped and a similar result at Liverpool eased the pain of a tragic month.

**DECEMBER:** The Dons went into the month with at least something to smile about — a clean bill of health from the FA disciplinary committee. A draw at QPR and a win against Southampton might have been the turning point but a defeat at Newcastle cast a familiar shadow. Then the Dons upset the form book clear of the relegation zone at Christmas after beating Forest at the City Ground.



## RIDING HIGH

Southampton have turned out to be Terry Burton's lucky side in the Combination this season. The reserves have played them twice in two weeks and come away with a double win, scoring six goals in the process.

Burton's side followed up their 5-0 drubbing of the Saints with a 1-0 in their final game of the year thanks to a delightful John Gannon goal, floating the ball over the Southampton wall direct from a free-kick.

That rounded off a successful year for the reserves. They finish 1988 well up the Combination and playing some attractive football.

Burton said, "This was another excellent Combination game. We played some good stuff and thoroughly deserved to win. It was nice to get two wins over Southampton because they're

recognised as a good side and just proves how well we've come on this year.

"We started off well against them and created several good chances. John put his free-kick away well and we could have had a few more before half-time. "The second half began well for us but they gradually came back into the game a bit more. But we defended tightly and didn't give them anything."

With Peter Cawley now playing — or rather suspended — at Fulham, youth team centre-half Brian McAllister has won a chance to prove himself in the reserves. The youngster acquitted himself well and looks set for a fair run in the reserves.

# Forest floored by Sanchez

THIS was a goal in need of a game. The Lord's Day Observance Society were in line for a rush on membership yesterday until Lawrie Sanchez struck 12 minutes from the end to relieve the tedium and lift Wimbledon out of the bottom three.

Sanchez's first goal since his Cup final winner was a rare flash of illumination on an afternoon as grey and unwelcoming as the football.

Forest's first defeat in eight games exposed so many flaws and limitations that anyone who witnessed it will scoff at the suggestion that Brian Clough is about to win his first trophy for eight years.

Wimbledon, who arrived at the City Ground with one win in eight League matches, were the most positive side throughout, had the

lion's share of the few chances created, and fully deserved their unexpected success.

It was a performance entirely in character. Pretty, no. Effective, yes.

The First Division's newest manager may have been hoping for some pearls of wisdom from his old mentor, or just boning up on Queen's Park Rangers' opponents in the quarter-finals of the Littlewoods Cup.

Whatever it was that drew Trevor Francis back to the ground where he enjoyed celebrity status as Britain's first tlm footballer,

he will have left happier than the 16,427 paying spectators, who filed out in stunned silence. Happy, that is, that QPR can make a nonsense of Forest's status as the bookies' Littlewoods favourites.

Threatened by crosses from both flanks in the first 90 seconds, Wimbledon must have feared the worst. They need not have worried. Franz Carr flattered to deceive, failing to use his match-winning pace on the wing to significant effect, and Lee Chapman's plodding performance brought to mind his days in purgatory with Arsenal.

Clough, infuriated with his £300,000 striker's anonymity in midfield, leapt from the dug-out to bellow: "Chapman, go and play centre-forward."

Such strikes as there were tended to be from hit-and-hope range and came mostly from Wimbledon, although Chapman did manage to stir himself sufficiently in the second half to shiver a post.

The decisive goal was typical Wimbledon — classic in its simplicity. John Fashanu headed down Keith Curle's cross from deep on the right and Sanchez, unmarked in the penalty area, had time to set himself up before belting the ball into Steve Sutton's left-hand corner from 15 yards.

LAWRIE SANCHEZ'S first goal since he won the FA Cup for Wimbledon yesterday heaped more misery on Forest who are doomed to mid-table obscurity unless they overcome their crisis of confidence at home.

Sanchez ended a seven-month famine that began after his moment of glory at Wembley by scoring a spectacular 79th minute match-winner at Nottingham's City Ground on a day when the experiment of switching to a Sunday kick-off failed.

There were only 16,427 — 1,000 less than at West Brom's home Second Division fixture — to witness the Wimbledon striker deliver a flashing left foot shot from the edge of the penalty area after

a headed clearance by Colin Foster, under pressure from John Fashanu, landed in his path.

The goal was sufficient to take his club out of the bottom three and Sanchez admitted: 'I have a habit of scoring at important times. It was my goal that took us out of the Second Division, then there was the Wembley match-winner and now this.'

### Assault

Manager Bobby Gould agreed: 'It was a smashing result and a thoroughly professional job. I am sure everyone expected Forest to win but we got stronger the longer the game went on.'

The sad truth for Forest is

that they were instrumental in their own downfall after a performance of such mediocrity that it was difficult to believe they were representing Brian Clough.

He has stuck by them despite the lowest pre-Christmas home points haul since he took charge almost 14 years ago. Gary Parker produced their only worthwhile attempt with a shot that Hans Segers palmed around his post but then Forest toiled aimlessly to negotiate a path through mid-field.

Clough now has the task of lifting his youngsters out of their depression but, even with the First Division so open, it is unlikely they can now climb high enough to think about a title challenge.



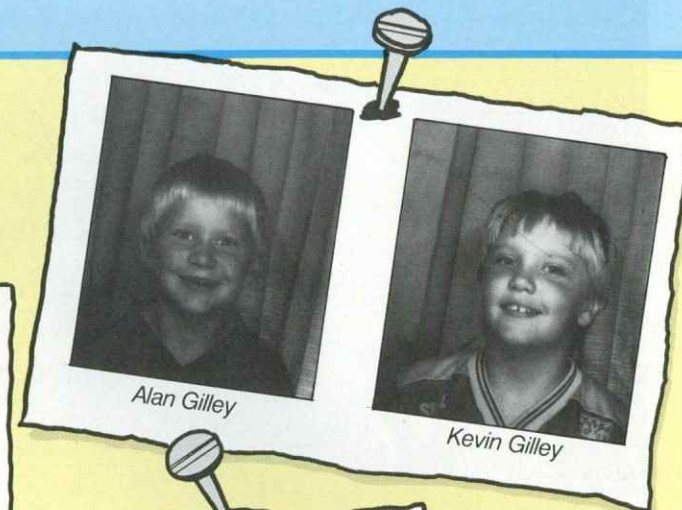

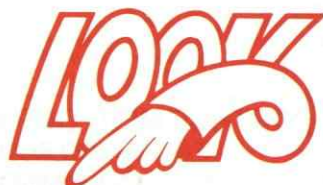
