THE DOGS **VERDICT**

WELCOME back to the Den for what should be an entertaining FA Cup third round tussle with our First Division rivals **Luton**.

We haven't enjoyed much success in the FA Cup over the past couple of seasons, and that's something the players are determined to put right – starting this afternoon!

We were dumped out of the competition by Fourth Division **Cardiff** during the 1986-87 campaign and last season we reserved one of our worst performances for our third round clash at **Arsenal**.

There is something very special about the FA Cup, and a good run in the competition can boost the spirits of both players and supporters alike.

That's why we are determined to clinch a place in the fourth round, but if we make it you'll have to set your alarm clocks to hear the draw because I'm told it will take place on Monday's Breakfast Time at 7.45am.

Today's game certainly won't be easy! We beat **Luton** 3-1 here at the Den last November, but the players know that result will count for nothing this afternoon.

Quite apart from wanting to avenge that defeat **Ray Harford's** men reached the semi-finals of the competition last season, and they will be looking for some more Cup glory.

They certainly warmed up in style, hammering **Southampton** 6-1 on Monday and

we will have to be at our best if we are going to finish them off at the Den this afternoon.

We looked a bit sluggish during the first half of our Bank Holiday clash with **Charlton**, but I was delighted that we ended up with all three points.

Our New Year's Eve victory at **Derby** took a lot out of the players, and that showed against **Charlton**, but we kept battling away and were rewarded with another late goal.

I'd like to be able to claim that sending on **David Thompson** nine minutes from time was an inspired tactical substitution – but in truth I was forced into the move when **Paul Stephenson** twisted an ankle.

It certainly paid off though and young David could hardly have picked a better moment to have scored his first ever League goal.

He is a completely nerveless youngster but I don't think he could believe that he had scored until he saw the goal on television during the **Arsenal v Spurs** game.

We ended 1988 by clinching our first double of the season at **Derby**, and David's goal meant that we started 1989 by completing another double, over **Charlton**.

We set very high standards for ourselves in 1988, now the challenge is to maintain them throughout 1989.

Thanks for coming, enjoy the game.

Meet the Manager: RAY HARFORD

Ray Harford enjoyed a remarkable first season as Luton's manager, leading them to three Wembley appearances last season.

Their first visit to Wembley was a disaster. They lost 1-4 to Reading in the Simod Cup final. Good League performances earned them a place in the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival.

It proved third time lucky for Luton at Wembley. They came from behind with two late goals to defeat Arsenal 3-2 in the Littlewoods Cup final. That was the first major trophy won by the Hatters in their 103-year history.

Now Mr Harford is hoping to make it to Wembley again this season. Luton are already through to the quarter-finals of the Littlewoods Cup and today he hopes to see his side make progress in the F.A. Cup.

Mr Harford initially joined the club as coach in 1986 following two seasons as Fulham's manager. He succeeded John Moore as Luton's manager in the summer of 1987.

A central defender towards the end of his playing days, Mr Harford spent a complete decade as a Football League player.

He started off with Charlton Athletic, making his League debut during the early weeks of the 1965/66 season. But, within weeks, he was on the move to Exeter City and it was at St James Park that he really established himself as a League player.

In 1967 he moved on to Lincoln City and for four years he was a regular member of the Red Imps' senior team, making 161 League appearances before transferring to Mansfield Town.

His stay at Field Mill was very brief, though. After only seven first-team games, he signed for Port Vale where he remained for just over a year.

Colchester United signed him in January 1973 and for the next two-and-a-half years he was a fixture in their defence. He was released in 1975 and, with a total of 354 League games behind him, he retired from League football.

Colchester gave him his first coaching job and he initially joined Fulham in a similar capacity.

IAN ALLINSON

Although born in Hitchin, Allinson made his League bow for Colchester against Preston in April 1975 in the same side as Ray Harford.

Made 308 League appearances for the "U's" before a contractual slip up made him a free agent and he signed for his boyhood favourites Arsenal in 1983.

After four years in and out of the "Gunners" side he joined Second Division Stoke in the summer of 1987 but was grateful to accept his old friend Harford's offer to come to Luton only a few months later.

ROY WEGERLE

South African born Wegerle was signed by Chelsea from Tampa Bay Rowdies for £100,000 two years ago.

A £75,000 signing by the Town last close season to add proper strength to the first team squad.

MARK STEIN

Brian's younger brother who signed professional forms for Luton in January 1984 making his debut three months later in a 3-0 home defeat by Everton.

He had to wait nearly 18 months for his next League game but has gradually forced his way into the side with last season being his most successful to date as 11 goals in 25 League appearances proves.

STEVE FOSTER (Player/Coach)

Harford's first move as Manager was to appoint Club Captain Foster as Player/Coach - a recognition of his exceptional qualities of leadership.

Portsmouth born Foster joined his local club as an apprentice breaking into the first team as a forward in 1975/76 - his home debut was actually against Luton. He moved to centre-back during the following season and after 135 League and Cup appearances was transferred to Brighton for £150,000 in 1979 following the Seagulls' promotion to Division One.

During his spell at the Goldstone Ground he earned three England caps, played in the 1982 World Cup as well as appearing in the 1983 F.A. Cup Final.

He moved to Aston Villa for £200,000 after Brighton's relegation and from there joined Luton in December 1984 for a bargain £70,000.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 164 - GOALS 11.

RICKY HILL

He joined Luton straight from school and is currently enjoying his 13th full season.

He made his League debut at home to Bristol Rovers over Easter 1976 coming on as substitute for current Town coach John Faulkner. Layed on a goal with his first touch and scored with his second.

Was included in Bobby Robson's first squad in 1982 and made his England debut against Denmark. Still in Robson's thoughts as proved by his call-up against Egypt two seasons ago.

Broke his ankle on Boxing Day 1987 but made a swift recovery to star in the Littlewoods Cup Final win.

An ambassador for the game who enjoyed a successful testimonial in 1986.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 463 GOALS - 59.

DARRON McDONOUGH

Belgium born McDonough scored on his League debut for Oldham against Notts County in December 1980 thereby joining an exclusive club.

He signed for Luton in 1986 in exchange for £87,000 to become a versatile and valuable member of the squad.

Was unfortunate to be injured just before the Town's Littlewoods Cup Final win.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 58 - GOALS 7.

GARY COBB

Local lad Cobb made his debut in the win at Charlton towards the end of 1986/87 where he set up the only goal of the game.

DANNY WILSON

Ray Harford's first major signing, from Brighton, in the summer of 1987.

Born in Wigan on January 1st 1960 he made his League debut for Bury in season 1977/78 before being transferred to Chesterfield three years later.

His performances for the "Spirelites" inspired Brian Clough to take him to Nottingham Forest in January 1983 but things did not work out at the City Ground and he moved to Brighton only ten months later.

Qualifies for Northern Ireland through parentage and is now a regular in the International side.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 52 - GOALS 10.

ASHLEY GRIMES

Dublin born Grimes played the early part of his career with Manchester United where he had 90 League games and appeared regularly for Eire.

Transferred to Coventry in August 1983, he joined Luton a year later in a straight swap for Kirk Stephens but was then plagued with injuries during his first two seasons at Kenilworth Road.

Now back to his best form he fully deserved his recall to the Eire team in 1987/88.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 94 - GOALS 4.

TIM BREACKER

Bicester born Breacker has been a regular member of the first team since his debut at Ipswich in 1984.

This England Under-21 International can perform in midfield but his normal position is right back where his surging runs on the overlap have become a strong feature of his play.

The Town only "ever present" during 1987/88 making 58 competitive appearances.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 175 - GOALS 2.

ROB JOHNSON

Born in Bedford and turning professional for the Town in August 1979 his career was almost over before it started.

He suffered two extremely serious knee injuries which would have put most players out of the game but he fought back to make his debut against Birmingham in November 1983.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 98 - GOALS 0.

RICHARD HARVEY

Born at Letchworth in April 1969, Harvey, following a number of fine performances for the Combination side as well as captaining the successful Youth Team, made his deserved full League debut at home to Queens Park Rangers in November 1986.

Made four further appearances towards the end of 1986/87, showing maturity beyond his years and is now recognised as a First team squad member.

He has toured South America with the England Under-19 squad.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 7 - GOALS 0.

DAVID PREECE

Bridgnorth born Preece signed professional forms for Walsall in July 1980 and made 134 appearances for the "Saddlers" before Luton paid £150,000 for his services in December 1984.

He made a scoring debut that same month at home to Aston Villa and has since become a firm crowd favourite because of his busy style of play.

Has appeared in only 30 League and Cup games in the last two seasons through injury.

MICK HARFORD

At the time Luton Town's record cash signing, at £250,000, from Birmingham in December 1984.

Sunderland born, Harford commenced his League career with Lincoln where 46 goals in 126 appearances encouraged Newcastle to pay £180,000 for his services in December 1980.

He never really settled at St James Park and the following close season Bristol City took him to Ashton Gate.

City were in a perilous financial state and were unable to fully pay the fee so six months later he was re-signed by Newcastle and promptly transferred to Birmingham.

He was therefore on the books of three clubs on the same day!

He enjoyed some success with Birmingham in a struggling side but was prised away by Luton where he has played the best football of his career fully deserving his England call up in 1987/88.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 136 - GOALS 66.

EMEKA NWAJIOBI

Unpredictable Nigerian International who burst on the scene with a scoring debut against Nottingham Forest on 2nd January 1984 only weeks after transferring from Dulwich Hamlet.

On his day a matchwinner who makes goalscoring look easy.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 85 - GOALS 19.

LES SEALEY

Although born and raised in the East End of London Sealey made his League bow with Coventry for whom he signed in March 1976.

Played 178 times for the "Sky Blues" before transferring to Luton in August 1983 for £100,000.

Has found himself out of favour on more than one occasion but has fought back with many superlative displays to become the acknowledged number one.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 214 - GOALS 0.

KINGSLEY BLACK

Hit the headlines with his performance in the Littlewoods Cup Final which prompted both Billy Bingham and Bobby Robson to fight for his International services.

Although Luton born he chose Northern Ireland which made his father a happy man.

Only made his League debut in October last year in the game at Q.P.R.

Pacey, skilful outside-left who is set to tease many a defender.

TOTAL LEAGUE AND CUP APPEARANCES FOR LUTON TO END 1987/88: 18 - GOALS 0.

MARVIN JOHNSON

Another former member of the talented Youth side. Wembley born Johnson signed professional forms last season and is knocking on the first team door for a regular place.

He has exceptional pace for a big man and has proved his worth with fine displays as deputy for both Foster and Donaghy.

JOHN DREYER

Close season signing at a cost of £140,000 from Oxford United. Joined United from Wallingford Town and appeared on loan for Torquay and Fulham before making his Oxford debut at home to Coventry in October 1986.

The Town's record signing at £300,000 Williams brings with him to Kenilworth Road a wealth of experience gained playing for Southampton, Arsenal and England.

Made his League debut for the Saints in 1975/76 and signed for Arsenal for £550,000 in 1984.


The shock of the round was Third Division **Bournemouth's** 2-0 home victory over the F.A. Cup holder **Manchester United**.

Not far behind that, though, came **Telford United's** 4-1 away victory at **Rochdale**.

Steve Moran gave **Southampton** the lead at **Notttingham Forest** 13 minutes from the end but **Paul Hart** seemed to have earned a replay when he equalised in the 83rd minute. But, within three minutes, **Moran** scored again to win the tie for **Southampton**.

10 YEARS AGO:

We were beaten 1-2 at home by **Blackburn** in round three. **Phil Walker** was our scorer.

Luton were surprisingly beaten 0-2 away to Fourth Division **York City**.

Non-League **Maidstone** scored first at **Charlton** and ended up with a 1-1 draw. **Charlton** won the replay 2-1.

Newport County ousted **West Ham** by 2-1 at Somerton Park.

A crowd of more than 31,000 saw **Southend** hold **Liverpool** to a goalless draw at Roots Hall. **Liverpool** won the replay 3-0.

Sheffield Wednesday and **Arsenal** met five times before resolving their third round tie. The Gunners eventually won 2-0 at Leicester.

15 YEARS AGO:

The situation looked bleak when **Graham Collier** gave **Scunthorpe** the lead in the 56th minute of our third round tie at The Den. But, with a quarter-of-an-hour to go, **Alf Wood** equalised to force a replay but we lost 0-1 at the Old Show Ground.

Only five minutes remained when **Jimmy Ryan** scored the goal that enabled **Luton** to draw 1-1 at **Port Vale**. The Hatters were more fortunate in their re-

play, goals from **John Aston**, **Peter Anderson** (2) and **Jimmy Ryan** earning them a 4-2 victory.

Derby were held at home to 0-0 by non-League **Boston United** but made no mistake in the replay. **Archie Gemmell** contributed a hat-trick to the Rams 6-1 victory.

After holding **Liverpool** to 2-2 at Anfield, **Doncaster** were beaten 0-2 at home in the replay.

Southern League **Hereford United** took the lead at **West Ham** and it was only a very late equaliser from **Pat Holland** which earned the Hammers a replay. But their embarrassment was merely delayed – **Hereford** won the replay 2-1.

20 YEARS AGO:

Derek Possee gave us the lead shortly before half-time at **Middlesbrough** but a second-half effort from **Mike Allen** saved the tie for the home club. Here at The Den, a goal from **Ron Howell** took us into the fourth round.

Luton went out 0-1 at **Manchester City** a **Francis Lee** penalty settling the issue.

A last-minute goal from **Ron Davies** enabled **Southampton** to earn a 1-1 draw at **Oxford**. The Saints won the replay 2-0, both goals coming from **Terry Paine**.

Kettering drew 1-1 at **Bristol Rovers** but were beaten 1-2 at home in the replay.

Stewart Scullion and **Barry Endean** netted in **Watford's** 2-0 home victory over **Port Vale**.

25 YEARS AGO:

The Lions had taken a shock first round exit against **Kettering**.

Luton crashed out 1-4 at **Fulham**, all the goals coming in the second-half. **Ray Smith** was the Hatters' scorer.

Newcastle were beaten 1-2 at home by non-League **Bedford Town**.

A **Francis Lee** penalty enabled **Bolton** to draw 1-1 at **Bath City** but **Bolton** won the replay comfortably by 3-0.

F.A. Cup holders **Manchester United** trailed 0-2 at the interval at **Southampton** but second-half goals from **Graham Moore**, **David Herd** and **Pat Crerand** gave them a 3-2 win.

Alf Arrowsmith scored four times in **Liverpool's** 5-0 home win over **Derby**.

Previous Encounters in the F.A. Cup

MILLWALL v LUTON TOWN

The first F.A. Cup tie between the clubs took place at **Millwall's** North Greenwich ground on February 3rd 1903 in the 1st Round.

The "Dockers" as **Millwall** were then known, comfortably won by three goals to nil. **R. Jones**, **Hulse** and **Watkins** were the scorers. Att. 9,800.

The third meeting was played at the Den on January 31st 1978 in the 4th Round. **Millwall** took the lead after 36 minutes through **Ian Pearson** from a **Chambers** corner. **Seasman** added a second during first half injury time. In the 68th minute **Pearson** made it 3-0 with a glancing header from a **Chambers** free-kick.

Pearson completed his hat-trick four minutes from the end, after an error in the **Luton** defence. Result 4-0. Att. 8,763.

GOALS GALORE

A year to remember for Teddy

Teddy Sherringham won't forget 1988 in a hurry! The Lions striker helped end **Millwall's** 103-year wait for First Division football and established himself as one of the country's most exciting young marksmen.

An England Under-21 call-up and an impressive start to life in the top flight moved **Sherringham** into the £1 million bracket, with a posse of clubs watching his every move – at least according to the national papers!

Yet it's a success story that very nearly didn't happen! Fed up with his lack of first team opportunities **Sherringham** almost quit the Den three years ago during **George Graham's** reign.

Luckily for the Lions, when **Graham** left to takeover at **Arsenal**, **Millwall** chief scout **Bob Pearson** persuaded **Sherringham** to sign a new contract, and the London born striker has never looked back.

'I made my League debut in January 1984, but it wasn't until **George** sold **John Fashanu** to **Wimbledon** in March 1986 that I got a run in the side and even then I got the feeling I was only a stop-gap,' he explained.

'It was very frustrating. I felt I was going nowhere and it wasn't until **John Docherty** took over that I really started to feel part of the club.'

Under **Docherty's** guidance **Sherringham** has developed from a raw youngster into a stylish target man – and it's a debt that he is determined to repay.

If you believe what you read in the papers **Arsenal**, **Glasgow Rangers**, **Celtic** and **Aberdeen** have all got **Sherringham** high on their wanted lists.

But the good news for **Millwall** supporters is that the 22-year-old goal ace is in no rush to leave the Den.

'I am under contract for another 18 months and I am very much a **Millwall** player,' he stressed. 'All I am concerned about is doing my job here to the best of my ability.'

'The chairman and the manager are both very ambitious. They've made it clear that they want to establish **Millwall** as one of the top clubs in the country – and I'd like to be a part of that.'

Sherringham's partnership with **Tony Cascarino** produced 47 goals during **Millwall's** Second Division promotion campaign, and with 21 between them already this season they are in the First Division's most prolific duo.

But they weren't an instant hit! In fact during the first few weeks of last season most people, including their own families, were giving their partnership the thumbs down.

'My family used to tell me that we were too similar to be able to work together and **Tony** got exactly the same treatment from his people,' recalled **Sherringham**.

'We used to meet up on the training ground the next day and discuss what each other's friends had been saying about us. In the end we decided that we had to work things out – just to prove everybody wrong!'

'You can play off the cuff for a few weeks and get away with it, but if you want to be successful you have got to get to know all the ins and outs of each others games.'

'It took quite a while before we started working as a partnership, but now when **Tony's** on the ball I've got a pretty good idea of what he is going to do with it and vice-versa.'

The goals and the chances may have dried up recently, but **Sherringham** is confident that **Millwall** can build on their remarkable start to life in the top flight.

'At the start of the season **Tony** and I were both getting quite a few chances, but recently the ball simply hasn't been running for us,' he explained.

'Everybody was really miserable after our defeat at **Wimbledon** on Boxing Day, but when we looked at the League table and saw that we were still fourth it put things in perspective.'

'Our form has wavered and because of the high standards we've set ourselves that's disappointing.'

'But if someone had told us at the start of the season that we would finish the year in third place, I don't think we would have been too upset!'

Sherringham has come a long way in his two and a half seasons as a first team regular, but the popular Lions striker hasn't had too much success in the FA Cup.


During the 1986-87 campaign **Millwall** were dumped out of the competition by Fourth Division **Cardiff**, and last season the Lions were given a run around by north London rivals **Arsenal**.

It means that **Sherringham** has never been involved beyond the third round – and that's something he intends to put right against **Luton** this afternoon.

Our Next Home Game: NORWICH CITY (Saturday January 21st – kick-off 3 p.m.)

Norwich City, the First Division's surprise team of the season, will be coming to The Den in two weeks time. Leaders of the table for much of the season, Norwich are now making a serious bid to win the League Championship for the first time in their history.

The Canaries have no big stars. But, like the Lions, they have a tremendous team spirit. And now manager, David Stringer, and his players, really believe they can take the title.

They have an excellent away record, with wins at Middlesbrough (3-2), Newcastle (2-0), Derby (1-0), Manchester United (2-1), Wimbledon (2-0) and Liverpool (1-0) behind them. They drew at Everton (1-1) but

were beaten at Aston Villa (1-3).

Norwich are a very good defensive side, very adept at scoring on the break. Their two main strikers are players of vastly different styles but they blend perfectly.

Robert Fleck, for whom Norwich paid a club record fee of £580,000 to Glasgow Rangers last season, has skill and imagination and creates as many goals as he scores. After the Christmas games he was top scorer with six goals.

Robert Rosario, who had netted five times, is very tall and a constant danger in the air.

Though they have no really big stars at the moment, the Canaries possess very many highly talented players. One of their danger men is

midfielder Andy Townsend, purchased from Southampton for £300,000 shortly before the start of this season. He is good at moving forward to score vital goals, one of which we saw in their recent live televised game when they defeated West Ham 2-1 at Carrow Road.

Goalkeeper Bryan Gunn has become a serious challenger to Jim Leighton, his former club colleague, for the Scotland job. At Aberdeen, Gunn was understudy to Leighton for five years. Now his performances for Norwich have put him in line to take over from Leighton in the Scotland team.

We are assured of some excellent football when Norwich come to The Den for they play the same game when travelling as they do at Carrow Road with the accent very much upon the quick counter attack.

But the Lions, in their present mood, could well put a spanner in Norwich's Championship works by beating them here in two weeks time.

But as most of you will already know, Millwall's board of directors have decided not to accept the 2500 tickets they are entitled to under FA Cup rules.

Instead the match will be beamed back to a giant television screen at the Den, and Millwall's chief executive **Graham Hortop** is confident that the coverage will be first class.

'There were problems with the picture quality when we screened the **Liverpool** game earlier in the season,' he admitted.


'But we have done a lot of research since then and we are confident that we have got the best system available.

'The **Starvision** screen is 48 metres square and will be erected at the Ilderton Road end. It has been used very successfully by **Glasgow Rangers** and I travelled down to **Portsmouth** to see it in action.

'The quality of the picture was first class, and that was in bright daylight. At night it will be even better so I don't foresee any problems.

'We felt that the 2500 tickets allocation would go nowhere near satisfying the demand from our supporters, and hopefully as many of them as possible will come along to the Den if a replay is needed.'
