



# WAITING IN THE WINGS...

*Perry hopes his chance will come*

Two years ago, Perry Groves revealed in these pages that he was hoping to earn an international chance with the Republic of Ireland.

Now Perry (who qualifies through an Irish grandparent) may be moving closer to his ambition – but he won't be trumpeting his claims for the honour.

Perry was born in Bow and grew up in Suffolk – and he's well aware of the Dublin joke, that FAI (Football Association of Ireland) really stands for 'find another Irishman'.

Irish scouts have checked Perry's form and Groves says: "I'd love to play international football, but I realise the implications."

He points to the furore in Ireland over the recent selection of Norwich's Andy Townsend, who qualified under the same grandparent regulation.

"I'd never go touting for a place. I realise how offensive that could seem to Irish-born players who hope to be picked," says Perry. One photographer found that out recently when he asked Perry to pose with a giant shamrock!

Anyway Perry reckons he's got enough problems trying to win a regular place in Arsenal's line-up, without upsetting people in Ireland!

Groves has spent most of the season on the subs bench.


"Paul Merson has come on fast, while David Rocastle and Brian Marwood have been so consistent. When I did get a chance, against West Ham, I found myself on the left wing. That's the wrong side for me. I'd never started there before and I kept drifting inside on to my stronger right foot, when the manager wanted me to go down the line and cut the ball across" recalls Perry.

"I missed a good chance just before half-time. So I was delighted, and relieved, to head us in front soon after the interval."

Perry says he's happy to be involved 'anywhere along the front line'. But he's sure he performs better in the centre or on the right.

He showed his pace again against France 11 days ago – seconds after climbing off the bench – when he sped down the right wing and sent over an early cross for Alan Smith to hit our second goal.


Islington/Camden meet Salford on March 4, with a semi-final place against Plymouth or Stroud at stake.

I was disappointed with the result at Coventry on Tuesday night. It was a frustrating evening for us, because all the major decisions fell in Coventry's favour. However, the Sky Blues are one of the best teams we've played this season, and on the night I'd have been happy with a draw. John Lukic made a superb save from Brian Kilcline's early penalty, but it was asking a lot to expect he could stop two penalties in one match.

You'd have thought the universe had moved, judging by the headlines which greeted the news that Arsenal had lost a game – though that's really a tribute to the standards we've set ourselves.

But we're still top of the League, four points clear of our nearest challengers, with a chance to consolidate our position against Luton today, then Millwall here on Tuesday.

Now is the time for us to stay calm and keep doing the things that have taken us to the top of the League. And if our fans can roar us on today, that will be a great bonus!

A 0-0 draw at Shepherds Bush last Saturday was a fair result. All our players worked really hard, but we couldn't summon up the extra quality to turn one point into three.

The state of the pitch, and the swirling wind, made constructive football difficult. Rangers also closed us down very fast. Our only consolation was that we collected a point even though we weren't at our best. That's always the sign of a successful side.

I was much happier with our performance against France. We boosted English football's reputation – and our own – with that 2-0 win, which was shown live on French television.

We played a lot of skilful football, particularly in the second-half. Our goals from Martin Hayes and Alan Smith, were both crackers. I was delighted with my substitutions too ... Martin scored with his second touch, and Perry Groves's first contribution set up Alan's goal. It's not often that substitutions produce such speedy results!


I hope English clubs will be allowed back into European competitions next season. That would help our players because they'd gain valuable experience against different styles of play. It would also create extra interest for the fans, because they could see top class continental teams again.

I appreciate the reasons why English clubs were banned from Europe after the Heysel disaster. But our clubs, in co-operation with the police, have been working tremendously hard to curb the hooligans, and I hope that work will be recognised.

I'm sure that if we were allowed back, our teams would once more prove themselves among the best in Europe.

I've been pleased with the progress of our two on-loan youngsters – goalkeeper Alan Miller and striker Kevin Campbell. Alan has earned praise from colleagues and opponents alike during his spell at Plymouth, while Kevin has been in impressive form for Leyton Orient. He's already netted four goals for them.

Thank you to all our travelling fans, who gave us such tremendous support at Millwall, Queens Park Rangers and Coventry. We really do appreciate you shelling out to cheer us in three successive away matches. Keep cheering today!



# ALL CHANGE AGAIN FOR STEPHEN! Morrow returns to the centre

Last summer, Northern Ireland youth international Stephen Morrow expected he'd spend this season at left-back, the role he filled in our F.A. Youth Cup-winning triumph.

Kenny Sansom had gone on the transfer list. So Stephen seemed Nigel Winterburn's natural understudy.

Instead, Morrow has reverted to the centre-back role he's filled for most of his two years at Highbury – and he says he's happy with the move.

"I'd expected to have a run at left-back. But it never happened. Kenny played regularly for the reserves until he joined Newcastle at Christmas. So Stewart Houston chose me again for the centre, which is the position I prefer anyway," explains Stephen.

"Before I joined Arsenal, I played most of my Irish League games for Bangor at centre-back. There's a much greater emphasis on full-backs getting forward, and I'd rather be facing the game.

"I made a rare left-back appearance for the reserves against Charlton recently. I didn't enjoy it. That game helped confirm my preference for the centre.

"I might get a chance if Nigel were injured or suspended. But the boss would probably consider other options – like switching Michael Thomas, Gus Caesar or Kevin Richardson – before he'd turn to me."

Morrow accepts that trying to win a first team centre-back place looks like the toughest job in the club. David O'Leary, Tony Adams, Steve Bould and Gus Caesar all stand in front of him, while Stephen's friend and reserve partner Pat Scully is aiming for the same target.

"It looks hard, but we saw what happened early in the new year. Tony and David were injured, and Gus was called up, though he'd only just returned after injury" says Stephen optimistically.

The young defender from Kilclenny recently signed a new contract, which has two-and-a-half years to run. "That gives me a while to develop – and if I don't break through in that time, then I never will!" he says.

A recent knee ligament injury came as a big blow, because Stephen reckoned he was re-discovering his best form after a disappointing spell just before Christmas.



"I had a few off-field problems and I was feeling homesick. Those worries did affect my form" he continues: "But I felt much more confident when I came back after Christmas. I think that's shown in my play. Now I'm seeking more consistency. Even during our great youth run last season, I still felt my performances were a bit up-and-down."

Stephen also hopes to spend a spell on loan before the end of the season. Goalkeeper Alan Miller and forward Kevin Campbell – his colleagues in our Youth Cup-winning side – have already benefited from loan moves and Morrow would like to follow them.

"They've both gained valuable first team experience, which will speed up their development. Now I hope I'll get my chance later this year," says Stephen.

# The Young Ones

## Ken Goldman reviews a Highbury tradition

**I**t was the Saturday before Christmas on a lovely crisp morning and I was standing on the pavilion balcony at the London Colney Training Ground waiting to grab some interviews. As the players walked back to the dressing-rooms a slim figure was noticeable jogging past them.

Without immediate recognition, I wondered which new player George Graham had brought to the club. It was only when the figure drew much closer that the realisation dawned: it was George himself who had just finished taking the training that morning!

George pointed out "I enjoy the coaching and training side of things very much. I often join in the five-a-sides and the various training games. I feel that it all helps to keep me mentally as well as physically fit."

That session prompted thoughts of Arsenal's special place in the coaching world. Both George Graham and Theo Foley have long had a history of coaching players – not only at their previous club Millwall, but with their earlier clubs as well.

However, the coaching tradition shows that in the last 20 years Arsenal have had no fewer than six F.A. staff coaches (one of the highest coaching honours in football) in charge of either the managerial or tactical sides of their game. The six? First Ron Greenwood as coach; followed by Billy Wright as manager and his coach Les Shannon. Then came Dave Sexton. And latterly, Don Howe – both as

manager and coach – and John Cartwright.

In addition both Ron Greenwood and "double-winning" manager Bertie Mee (who was also a full-badge coach as well as a top physiotherapist) were founder-members of the London Football Coaches Association, the largest coaching association in the world.

The coincidence does not stop there, because Arsenal have supplied no fewer than three of the five LFCA chairmen in its 25 year history. The respected Bob Wall, then Arsenal's secretary was the Association's second chairman and he was followed after a six year stint by Ken Friar, who is now, of course, the managing director at Highbury.

After Ken's ten year reign, the 'Arsenal connection' surfaced again, with the appointment of the current chairman Bob Wilson, for so long a Highbury favourite son and still the club's goalkeeping coach.

In the brilliant indoor facilities of the JVC Centre (soon to be restored in the new development) the London coaches have been privileged to take part in sessions conducted by Howe, Cartwright, Terry Burton and Theo Foley.

This shows Arsenal's dedication to coaching: a commitment which has reaped its own rewards with a conveyor-belt of youngsters – found by Steve Burtenshaw and his staff – which over the years has produced so many gifted players and saved the club millions in transfer fees.

Our youngsters grabbed a 0-0 draw at Norwich on February 11, despite having to field five schoolboy players.



# Luton Town

While Luton have been busily engaged in trying to hold onto the Littlewoods Cup – which they won in dramatic style against the Gunners at Wembley last season – their position in the First Division has become a little precarious.

Having disposed of Burnley, Leeds, Manchester City and Southampton, Luton set themselves up for a return to Wembley by scoring a 3-0 win at West Ham in the first leg of their Littlewoods Cup semi-final.

But the Hatters have lost both their last two away league games at Wimbledon (0-4) and Charlton (0-3).

Manager Ray Harford felt obliged to go into the transfer market to sign experienced centre-back Dave Beaumont from Dundee United for £150,000 and he made an impressive debut in their Littlewoods Cup win over West Ham. Beaumont joined Dundee United from school, made his League debut in 1983/84 and became a Scotland under-21 inter-

national the following season. Beaumont looks likely to settle in alongside Steve Foster to fill the void left by the departure of Mal Donaghy to Manchester United in October.

Foster, who skippered Luton's Wembley winners, began his career as a striker with Portsmouth but switched to defence before moving to Brighton in 1979. He played at Wembley for the Seagulls when

stayed in until his injury at Charlton.

Grimes, whose cross created the chance for Luton's last-minute Wembley winner, is a player of vast experience. He has been capped by the Republic of Ireland on 16 occasions. In his Manchester United days he played both in midfield and defence. He moved on to Coventry in 1983 and to Luton a year later.

Goalkeeper Les Sealey, a regular for most of the time since his £120,000 transfer from Coventry in 1983, had the misfortune to miss last season's final because of injury. He entered League soccer with Coventry in 1977.

Rob Johnson is hoping he can regain the right-back position. Johnson overcame many injury problems before making his mark with Luton. He spent a loan spell with Lincoln before establishing himself in the Hatters' side.

Former Arsenal midfield man Steve Williams has only made occasional first team appearances of late. Steve developed into an England player at Southampton after making his League debut for the Saints in 1976. In addition to his six full England caps, Steve played for England at under-21 and "B" levels.

Danny Wilson, David Preece, Ricky Hill and Kingsley Black have been filling the midfield positions.

Wilson scored Luton's equaliser against the Gunners seven minutes from time at Wembley. A Northern Ireland international, Danny picked up his 12th cap against Spain last month. Once with Bury and Chesterfield, he joined Nottingham Forest in a £100,000 move in 1983. After a loan spell at Scunthorpe, he joined Brighton in 1984. Danny was transferred to Luton for £150,000 in 1987.

Preece got his League chance with Walsall in 1981 and Luton paid £150,000 to sign him in 1984. He was a member of their winning side at Wembley last season.

Hill is Luton's longest-serving player and should chalk up his 500th senior game for the club before the end of the season. He has developed an uncanny art of scoring vital goals this season – five to date. During more than a decade as a Hatters' first-teamer, Ricky won three England caps.







You can easily spot physio Gary Lewin on away trips . . . He's the one with all the luggage!

Gary, the First Division's youngest physio, is completing his third season in the job: and this year he can count on even more state-of-the-art technology to help him.

"Our medical room has always been one of the best equipped in the country – and now the club have invested in a shortwave treatment machine and an ultrasound machine. They're both portable, so I can take them with me on away trips. I even lugged them along when we went to Bermuda . . . So it looked like I had twice as much baggage as the rest of the team!" says 24-year-old Gary.

Ex-goalkeeper Lewin quit playing at 19 to concentrate on a career in physiotherapy, first at Guys Hospital, then with the Gunners.

"I first came here as a 12-year-old schoolboy, so I'm continuing a long association" he says.

Gary's role means that he, and his gadgets, are available seven days a week to help injured players recover.

"If a player gets a knock, I treat him straight after the game. Then I have him in the next day to continue the treatment, even on Sunday," he says.

"I expect to be working part of every day; because, with a staff of more than 40, it's very rare when we have no injuries for me to treat" continues Gary, who also runs physiotherapy classes for our trainees!

"An injured player usually spends the week working with me. One of our club doctors will check him out on Monday and then again on Thursday.

"If he expects to come back and play on Saturday, we always like him to train on Friday to test for any reaction."

Who decides if a player is fit to appear? "That's up to the medical staff – Doctor Crane, Doctor Sash and myself" says Lewin.

The medical staff decide the treatment an injured player receives. But Gary works out the player's recovery programme.

"My short term priority is to get players fit for matches," he says.

"A bump or a knock is usually simple to handle, through intensive treatment over a short period. Long term injuries are a different matter. It's important for players to maintain their general fitness while they recover – otherwise they have to regain that fitness level before they can even consider playing again."

Gary leaves nothing to chance. He maps out an exercise schedule for each player, and notes the recovery time for each injury (he's also used that research for a learned article about sports injuries, which he hopes will appear in the British Medical Journal).

Lewin uses a variety of methods: running, weight exercises, and the famous bikes – which recuperating Gunners pedal for 10 miles a day around the Hertfordshire lanes near our London Colney training ground.

Mind you, Gary often accompanies his 'victims' during their exertions. "I share the pain . . . and all the exercise helps keep me fit too!" he says.

Lewin expects to be a busy man between now and May 13. Not, he hopes, having to treat serious injuries. (Fortunately, we've suffered few of those so far.) But he'll be a key figure in patching up the wounded and preparing them for their next appearance.

"Up until Christmas I wasn't too busy. Now the first team and the reserves are facing two games a week, I expect I'll be dealing with a lot more knocks and bruises in the next two months!" he says.





We reckon he deserves 'A' for effort!



# KEVIN SEEKS A EURO CHALLENGE

KEVIN RICHARDSON isn't just the only Gunner who's won a championship medal. He's also the only one of our players to have won a European medal – when he was one of Everton's subs in their 4-1 triumph over Rapid Vienna in the 1985 Cup Winners' Cup final.

That game was played a few weeks before English clubs were banned from Europe, after the Heysel disaster. Now Kevin hopes our teams will be re-admitted to European competition next season; and he's confident Arsenal would do well against continental opposition. "If the I.D. card scheme goes through, it might give us a chance, because people on the Continent can see the government is taking action, as well as football trying to put its own house in order" says Kevin.

"English fans' behaviour has improved since the tragedy at the Heysel Stadium; certainly at club level. Many other countries seem to suffer hooligan problems which are just as bad, maybe even worse, than those which English fans have caused."

For instance, only two years ago, eight different town councils refused to stage the Dutch cup final because they were worried about potential trouble.

Neo-Nazi groups have long been active at German Bundesliga grounds.

Greek fans fought each other when England won there 2-1 last month. The effects of hooliganism have reduced league attendances and Greek referees are demanding increased protection from angry fans.

The Real Madrid goalkeeper Buyo recently had to endure a firecracker attack in a Spanish league game; while all the other big Spanish and Italian clubs have to contend with their 'ultras' – a hard core of hooligans, often linked to extremist movements.

They're all worries which UEFA might investigate.

But Richardson's real preoccupation is on the pitch. "I'm convinced that Europe has missed our teams, because we provide plenty of excitement and give 90 minutes value for money" says Kevin.

Many critics have claimed the Euro ban has caused a deterioration in English standards, because our top teams can't face their continental equivalents.

Richardson agrees League players can learn a lot from such encounters. But he points out that most of the Everton squad who clinched the Cup Winners' Cup had never played in European competition before.

"It would be a great experience for our players – particularly for the younger lads – to meet a completely different style of football. They could put that knowledge to good use if they became international players" says Kevin.

"Yet even the best foreign sides don't relish meeting English teams, because of our determination and competitiveness. They know we'll put them under pressure for 90 minutes. That's one of our clubs' great strengths."


Kevin recalls our 3-0 victory over Bayern München last August and our recent 2-0 win over France as evidence of the Gunners European potential.

"We put together some penetrating moves in the second-half against Bayern, and we could have won by more against the French. Okay, we can't read too much into that result, because France were missing several experienced players from Monaco and Bordeaux. But that performance showed how well we can play against unfamiliar opposition. It also pointed the way for Scotland to approach their World Cup qualifier against France next month."

Kevin also believes our victory demonstrates the adaptability of British players too. "We'd come straight from a hard game at Millwall, when we had to compete and hustle: to play a typical 'English' game, if you like. We changed our approach to meet the French and played plenty of flowing football. That showed our flexibility" he continues.

"I was impressed with the French players technique and short passing. But they couldn't change their style. They kept playing the same way even after they'd gone two down."

"I'm not saying we'd dominate the European competitions straightaway, like we used to" concludes Kevin: "But if we were allowed back next season, I'm sure our best sides would do well."



# ALAN BIDS FOR FRENCH REPEAT

*Smith hopes for international vote*

FIRST Division topscorer Alan Smith is eager to keep his England place for the World Cup qualifier in Albania on March 8.

And the 19-goal striker hopes his next display against international opposition will be as successful as his last, when he netted a brilliant goal to clinch our 2-0 win over France 11 days ago.

Alan reacted faster than anyone to reach Perry Groves' low cross – and flick a spectacular effort over on-rushing 'keeper Joel Bats. That effort gave him particular pleasure, because he'd suffered some hefty marking from his French shadow, William Prunier.

"He showed a liking for my shirt right from the first whistle. In fact he took hold of it so often, I thought he wanted to swap jerseys after about half-an-hour rather than at the end!" recalls Alan.

But the England centre-forward was pleased with the service he received – especially that skidding centre from sub Groves.

"Perry's quick cross was exactly what I needed against such tight marking" says Alan: "It gave me the chance to escape for a split second. That accurate early service is just what forwards want against man-to-man markers.

"If the build-up is too deliberate, it becomes really hard for a striker to turn or try and twist away."

Alan remembers that experience from his first full England start, in Greece on February 8. Smith, and his old Leicester striking partner, Gary Lineker, had to make do with a patchy service.

They also had to shrug off frequent fouls by their Greek markers – often before the ball arrived. "The bad

thing about those defenders was that they were two-footed..." reflected Lineker ruefully, counting his bruises afterwards.

"I hadn't faced man-to-man marking often before. So that game was a real eye-opener" says Alan: "My marker kept tugging me before the ball arrived, and the referee just let it go on. It was hard to adjust to those tactics."

Peter Beardsley subbed for Alan just before Bryan Robson hit England's winner. That switch disappointed Smith, who wanted to play the whole 90 minutes, after making a brief sub appearance in England's previous outing in Saudi Arabia.

"Obviously I didn't want to come off. I've read that Bobby Robson knows the team he wants to field in Albania. I don't know his plans. But I hope I'm part of them. I've still got something to prove at England level" says Alan.

"I hope the goals I've scored since then, against Millwall and France will count in my favour when the manager picks his squad.

Alan wonders if media and fans expected too much of his renewed link-up with Lineker in Greece. Still, he'd like more opportunities to revive the partnership that brought Leicester so many goals a few years ago.

"Gary and I have been apart for four seasons. There's a world of difference between training and playing together every week, and meeting again just a few days before an international" he says: "Maybe we've changed a bit as players, because of the new demands placed on us as we've changed clubs. It would take time for us to reforge our old partnership. But I'm confident Gary and I can strike up a successful understanding again. I just hope I get the opportunity."


Millwall have made a tremendous impression during their debut as a First Division Club.
