RAY'S REVIEW



Good afternoon and welcome to Millwall. We still need to collect league points at a steady rate to make sure of our First Division future next season and I hope everyone will continue to give the lads their full support. It was marvellous to complete the victory over West Ham and make certain of another Wembley appearance, but as I have always stressed the league position at the end of the season is the most important thing of all.

As you will know Steve Foster is unavailable today and for the visit to Liverpool on Tuesday. While he will be sorely missed, I am sure we are now in a better position to cope with his absence than we were before Christmas thanks to the return to fitness of Darron McDonough and the arrival and successful integration of David Beaumont. We have more strength in depth in the department particularly as John Dreyer has also proved he can do well there. The position at full-back is a less happy one, however, as Rob Johnson has now succeeded Tim Breacker and Julian James in having hernia trouble. Rob has a slight tear and we are hoping a rest will help him recover. Our club doctor, incidentally, believes all three hernias are connected as the players have to do a lot of long kicking. I know of one other First Division club where it has a problem of near-epidemic proportions!

Rob and Sean Farrell are the only two major injury worries at the moment and that is encouraging as we move towards the final stages of the season. We have some good games to look forward to including some lesser occasions like the return leg of the final of the Bedfordshire Premier Cup on April 4. The tough 0-0 draw at Barton last Tuesday has set that one up well for the second leg. By then, we hope to have collected plenty more league points. Enjoy the match.

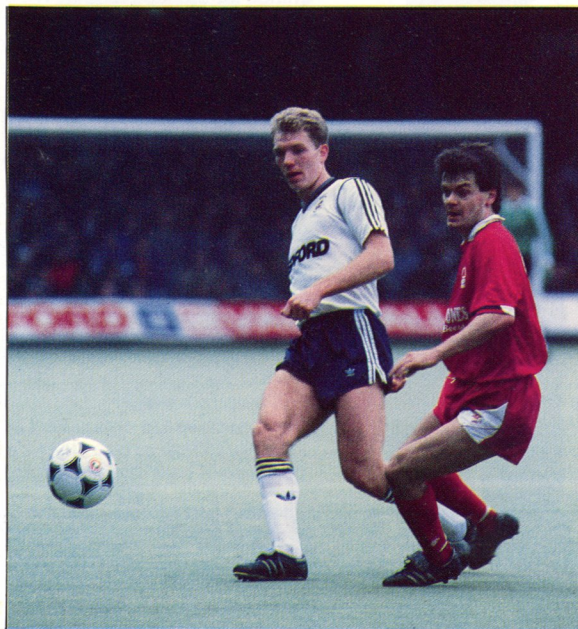

with Iain Dowie

Iain Dowie joined the Town shortly before Christmas from Hendon and soon made his mark with his positive approach to the challenge of playing the professional game at the highest level. He quickly forced his way into the first team squad and made a scoring debut when he played in the Simod Cup tie at Crystal Palace in January. Today in Dressing Room Talk, he reflects on his switch from part-time football to the First Division:

Hot face

"I am really enjoying it even if I sometimes find it a little strange to be coming in to train and play football every day. But I am getting more and more used to it and am pleased to have the opportunity to concentrate on improving certain areas of my game which have not had enough attention in the past.

"All the lads have been great to me. Every dressing room is much the same as another I should think with all the banter and so on, but the lads here have really made me feel welcome and helped me a lot. Steve Foster and Mick Harford and players as experienced as they are can teach you so much. I have already learned a lot from them.

"As a striker of course, I suppose I am learning most from playing with people like Mick, but that is not because I want to play the same way he does. I feel I have my own way of playing and will stick to that. Scoring goals is my strength and the thing I am confident I can do in the First Division given the opportunity and I have reminded the boss of this a few times!

"For me the Southampton match was a great experience. I loved it. There were no problems for me in coping

with the atmosphere and so on at all. In fact, I felt very keyed up and full of adrenalin for that match. It was tremendous.

"I suppose one of the big things I noticed at first when I started was the pace of everything in the professional game. That was the biggest thing. I have already adjusted to that a lot and am now working on my touch on the pitch. That is important especially the way we like to play here.

"I am full of confidence and happy with the way things have gone so far. I am confident I shall score a lot of goals as a pro. After all, I gave up a good job outside the game as a Development Engineer with British Aerospace at Hatfield so I have to be a success. I've given up too much not to be a success.

"Away from the game I am glad to say I have bought a house at Stopsley and am now getting it organised. With all the free time I am getting, I am concentrating on doing a few courses as well."

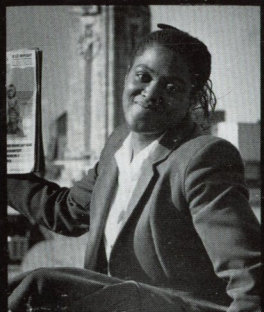

Luton Town 1 Middlesbrough 0

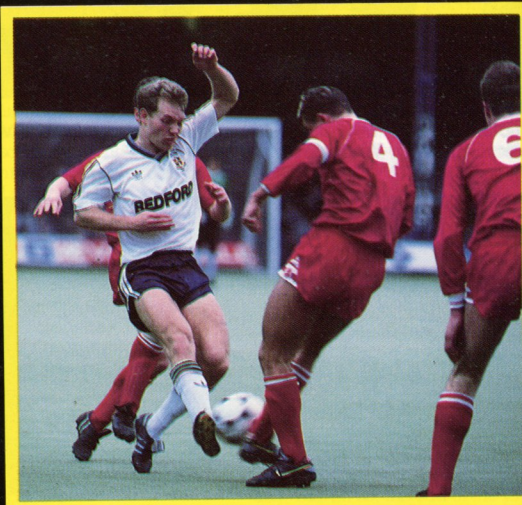

Having come to contain and play on the break, Middlesbrough had survived without too much trouble until Foster ended their hopes – and his winning goal left Rioch speechless.

The goal came when Mick Harford robbed Gary Parkinson and sent Black away down the left. SAFETY FIRST

Football grounds in England and Wales have reached their highest ever level of safety thanks to the £23,671,425 invested by the Football Grounds Improvement Trust since 1975.

Almost every League club has been assisted with essential safety work and further substantial sums have been spent to enable them to improve facilities. In the past year alone FGIT grants to Football League clubs totalled:

In addition to its safety programme, FGIT has also allocated £1.5 million to build or improve family and disabled facilities at League grounds during 1988.



HELPING THE GAME

The Football Trust receives £9 million annually from the Sporting the Ball competition run by Littlewoods. Venues and letters and spends it all on projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.

Since 1979 it has been committed to the development of the game at every level and its broad and varying initiatives have ranged from essential safety work at Tottenham to social work at Farnham, refurbishment at Wembley to repairs at Welling, closed circuit television at all League clubs to community facilities at Oldham Athletic, transport improvements at Sheffield Wednesday to storm damage in the South East of England, from paving costs at Hull City to an artificial pitch at Hyde United.

1988-89 will see the Football Trust increase its commitment by investing further sums in closed circuit television, transport facilities for supporters and projects to bring Football League clubs closer to their local community.

At the beginning of the season more than 110 League grounds in England, Wales and Scotland will be equipped with CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION which has been funded by The Football Trust.

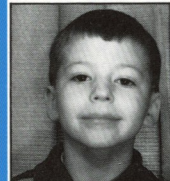

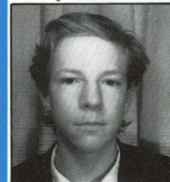

The team went away in the sun for a few days and played some golf. It was good for us to get away and relax before our heavy schedule on the run in to the remaining games of our football season.

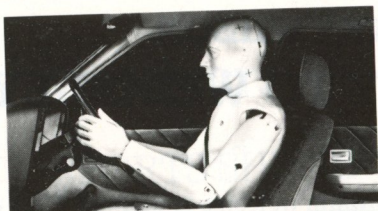

Goal'den Oldies

WELCOME BACK TO ONE OF OUR OLDEST COMPETITIVE RIVALS

We welcome back again to Kenilworth Road a club that can truly be labelled as being amongst our oldest opponents in competitive football writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Millwall and ourselves were founder members of the Southern League in 1894 and for its first two seasons the club could be seen as being head and shoulders above the rest. Unfortunately we were pipped to the post finishing runners-up on both occasions to Millwall.

After the brief parting of the ways following our decision to apply for a place in the Football League, regular meetings were resumed in the Southern League from 1900 onwards.

"Goals galore in the early fixtures"

During this period leading up to the formation of a Southern Section of the Football League in 1920 we also met twice in the FA Cup but the Lions were victors on each occasion - 3-0 in 1902/03 and 2-1 in 1908/09 both in the 1st Round proper.

Despite the apparent "one way traffic" in the preceding paragraphs the Town held the upper hand in early Football League meetings, going ten matches unbeaten against Millwall before losing 7-0 at the Den on 19th December 1925. The Lions repeated the scoreline the following season on Boxing Day 1926 but this came two days after the Town had thrashed the Londoners 6-0 at Kenilworth Road. The Town fielded the same team in both games!

Millwall were promoted in 1928 but relegated again six years later just at a time when the Town were beginning to have promotion aspirations themselves. The clashes in the Towns promotion season of 1936/37 both created headlines, the first for the wrong reason.

When the teams met at the Den on 21st November 1936 a best of the season crowd of 33,000 gathered to see if the highflying Town could be toppled. Goals from Joe Payne and Fred Roberts gave the Town a rather easy win but bookings for Luton centre half Jack Nelson and Millwall centre-forward Dave Mangnall for fighting almost caused a riot.

Reports would suggest that if the incident had occurred today both players would have been banned for life and a large crowd gathered by the Luton team coach after the game to have a chat with Nelson. The situation was diffused by Mangnall who walked to the coach with Nelson and shook hands with him as the team departed. Those were the days!

The return at Kenilworth Road came at a time when the Towns promotion hopes seemed to be slipping but with seven home games from the remaining nine fixtures a light could be seen at the end of the tunnel.

The Town were emphatic 5-0 winners that day before a crowd of 18,262 and for the record won their next six home games to clinch promotion. In the seven games the Town scored 29 goals with Payne netting 16 times.

Millwall joined us in Division Two one year later but after their relegation in 1948 we did not meet again until 1970 apart from 1963/64 in Division Three.

Season 1970/71 saw the Town actively seeking promotion but a disastrous Easter which included a 4-0 defeat at the Den put paid to our hopes. Revenge was sweet the following season, however, as goals from Chris Nicholl and Peter Anderson gave the Town a 2-1 home win while two goals from Anderson had secured a point in a televised game at the Den. One more point that season would have earned a promotion place for Millwall.

Our Final League meetings took place in 1978/79 following which Millwall dropped to Division Three and the Town narrowly avoided going down themselves. David Moss scored both Luton goals in a 2-0 Boxing Day win at the Den and was on target again in the 2-2 home draw over Easter.

INTRODUCING...

MILLWALL

Millwall's form this season, their first in Division One, has been something of a revelation and so far from just holding their own they have given every indication that they are capable of holding on to a place in the top three, *writes Geoff Allman.*

Founded in 1885 at a jam and marmalade factory, the name 'Millwall' was taken from a line of windmills that stood on a flood wall by the Thames. Known originally as Millwall Rovers, they played a number of friendly matches against Football League clubs such as Everton, Sheffield United, Spurs and Arsenal before joining the Southern League where they topped the table without losing a match in 1894-95. At one stage they declined the offer of a Second Division place, fearing the cost of long journeys.

As members of the Southern League they reached the FA Cup final in both 1900 and 1903 and then in 1910 moved to their present ground in Cold Blow Lane, hosting an England v Wales international in

1911. They continued to play in the emergency wartime leagues during the First World War and then became founder-members of the new Division Three in 1920, kicking off with a 2-0 win over Bristol Rover, watched by 25,000 fans.

They were consistently among the better teams in Division Three (South) after the Third Division had extended into two sections and in 1927-28 they produced a finishing burst of 11 wins in their last 12 games to win promotion. Though relegated in 1934 they became the first Third Division side to reach an FA Cup final when in 1936-37, they beat Chelsea, Derby and Manchester City and were rather unlucky to go down 2-1 to Sunderland after holding the lead.

A year later, they went back up to Division Two and they were looking capable of challenging for a First Division place when war was declared in 1939. For a time they played at Charlton's former ground at the Valley during the war after having their grandstand

burnt down and it was while they had Charlton goalkeeper Sam Bartram guesting for them that they reached the War Cup final of 1945, going down 2-0 to Chelsea in front of a 90,000 crowd.

They slipped back to Division Three (South) in 1947 and in 1949 survived a re-election application. They had to apply again in 1958 and though re-elected found themselves in Division Four in the reorganisation of that year. They climbed to Division Three in 1962 and to Division Two in 1966 and in 1972 just missed out on promotion to Division One at a time when only two teams went up. A season later they gained a remarkable FA Cup win at Everton and then in 1975 they slipped into Division Three only to bounce straight back up again.

Twelve successive seasons in Division Two culminated in promotion last season despite finishing in 16th place a year earlier. At just the right time they won eight games in a row and were unbeaten in twelve games from February onwards so that, though they lost their last game at home to Blackburn, the championship was assured.

"Off to a remarkable start this season under John Docherty"

Now in his third season at the helm since George Graham's move to Arsenal, John Docherty has seen them get off to a remarkable start in Division One being unbeaten until late October. Since beating us 3-2 in the FA Cup in January, they have lost three successive home games, but have since beaten Middlesbrough and Coventry at The Den and have drawn at Arsenal and won QPR.

Tony Cascarino in his second season since moving from Gillingham and home-grown **Teddy Sherringham** have both been scoring regularly while midfielder **Jimmy Carter** (ex-QPR) also scored against us in the FA Cup. **Kevin O'Callaghan** in his second spell at The Den since returning from Portsmouth is a lively winger while in midfield Welsh Youth international **Darren Morgan** links up with **Les Briley** (from Aldershot in 1984).

In defence, the men to look out for are **Steve Wood** (from Reading last season) and three home grown players **Alan McLeary**, **Sean Sparham** and **David Thompson** while vastly experienced former Brentford man **Danis Salman** has been substitute recently. In goal **Brian Horne** a former England Youth cap has made the position his own in the last three seasons.

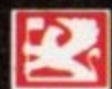
