

THE DOC'S VERDICT



GOOD afternoon and welcome back to the Den for today's clash with Luton.

First of all a big vote of thanks to the supporters who got behind us so superbly at Crystal Palace and Tranmere—and my sincere apologies about the results.

I know how disappointing those defeats must have been for you. It is always painful losing to your closest neighbours in a big derby game, always embarrassing when you are the victim of a 'giant killing'.

To suffer both in the space of three days took a lot of stomaching!

During our last few games we have played some excellent, highly entertaining attacking football, scored a stack of goals—and ended up empty handed!

We have been going at teams hell for leather, and that has left us looking very vulnerable at the back.

Our success over the past couple of seasons has been based on hitting the right blend between attack and defence.

Unfortunately during our last few games we seem to have lost that balance. We are amongst the highest scorers in the First Division, but we have also been shipping goals at an alarming rate.

The fact that we haven't been able to field a settled back four through injury and suspension has also been a contributory factor.

But although our recent results have been very disappointing I would be far more worried if we were playing badly and not creating any chances.

In fact some of the attacking football we produced against Palace and Tranmere was quite superb, although we do need to be even more clinical in front of goal.

We've hit the woodwork half a dozen times in our last two games and had several more excellent chances kicked off the line, those have got to start going in!

We proved against Nottingham Forest and Coventry that it is possible to play high tempo attacking football, without sacrificing our defensive security.

I'm confident that we can rediscover that exciting, match winning blend, starting with this afternoon's game against Luton.

Thanks for coming, enjoy the game and please get behind the players right from the start.

INTO THE LIONS DEN LUTON TOWN



LUTON SUFFER FROM AWAY DAY BLUES

INDIFFERENT away form has been keeping Luton close to the bottom of the table. Until they lost 0-1 at home to Aston Villa a fortnight ago, the Hatters were unbeaten on their own Kenilworth Road pitch but they come to The Den today with just one solitary away point to their credit.

That was collected from a goalless draw at Q.P.R. in August. Their other away games have ended in defeats at Tottenham (1-2), Coventry (0-1) and Manchester City (1-3).

Luton did win away in the Littlewoods Cup, running up a

4-3 first-leg victory at Mansfield. By winning the return 7-2, the Hatters moved comfortably into the third round and they were due to fulfil that fixture at Everton this week.

It was in the Mansfield match that Luton's new striking duo of Roy Wegerle and Lars Elstrup really sparked.

Each scored twice in the first-leg whilst Elstrup, the Danish international signed from Odense in August, scored a hat-trick in the return game. Wegerle grabbed another two.

Mind you until last weekend's 4-1 victory over Norwich, Luton's strikers have found

League goals a lot harder to come by.

Kingsley Black, John Dreyer, Steve Williams and Danny Wilson destroyed Norwich's record of not having conceded a goal away from home all season and left the Hatters in good heart for today's game.

So far this season Wegerle has two League goals to his name, but Elstrup is still waiting to open his account.

ROY PROVES HIS POINT

ROY Wegerle, Luton's top scorer with 12 goals last season, has now proved himself at top level after some top people doubted if he would make it.

It was former Q.P.R. and England favourite Rodney Marsh who first recognised Roy's talent.

Marsh was coach to the American club Tampa Bay Rowdies when South African born Roy joined them and Marsh later recommended him to Chelsea who signed him for £100,000 in 1986.

Unfortunately he got only occasional chances to play in Chelsea's first-team. Manager John Hollins, under pressure to produce results, preferred to rely upon his proven strikers so, in two years at Stamford Bridge, Roy played fewer than 30 senior games.

He did get a few more League games under his belt whilst on loan to Swindon, but his £75,000 transfer to Luton during the 1988 close-season really changed his fortunes.

It was a couple of months before he broke into the Hatters' First Division side but, once he was in, he was there for keeps.

they defeated Arsenal 3-2 in the Littlewoods Cup final!

Harford led Luton back to Wembley for last season's Littlewoods Cup final, but they were beaten by Nottingham Forest.

Harford was a central defender as he approached the end of his playing career. He started with Charlton, making his League debut in 1965, but within weeks he was on the move to Exeter and it was at St James Park that he established himself in League soccer.

In 1967 he moved to Lincoln and for four years he was a regular member of the Red Imps' senior side, making 161 League appearances, before transferring to Mansfield.

He stayed at Field Mill for only a brief time, though, before signing for Port Vale. In 1971 he joined Colchester and for almost three years he was a fixture in their senior side.

Harford joined Colchester's coaching staff and later went to Fulham in a similar capacity. He was appointed manager of Fulham in 1984 but he left two years later to link with Luton as coach. After a year he was elevated to the managerial chair.

In his two full seasons as Luton's manager, Ray Harford has led his Luton side to Wembley on four occasions. Not bad for a club which, in its previous 100 years, had visited the national stadium only once!

Harford succeeded John Moore as Luton's manager in the summer of 1987, but his first trip to Wembley was a disaster. Luton crashed 1-4 to Reading in the Simod Cup final.

Outstanding League performances qualified Luton for the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival but it was the Hatters' third trip to Wembley that was their best—

ARSENAL

Unless we are involved in a Littlewoods Cup replay with Tranmere, our next first-team game at The Den will be against the League Champions Arsenal on Saturday November 11th.

The Gunners have been showing a strong determination to hold onto their title. After crashing 1-4 at Manchester United on the opening day of the season, Arsenal were not beaten in their seven League games but that run came to an end when they lost the North London derby at Tottenham 1-2 just over a week ago.

Though manager George Graham boosted his squad during the summer with the signing of Iceland international midfielder Siggi Jonsson, from Sheffield Wednesday, he has so far kept faith in the men who won him the Championship in such dramatic style, with the last kick of the season at Liverpool in May.

The proposed signing of England goalkeeper David Seaman, from Q.P.R., fell through after details were leaked to the Press. But the thought that his manager was considering replacing him has only made

John Lukic even more determined to maintain the high standards that have made him the Gunners' first choice for almost five years now.

Up front, England striker Alan Smith has been fairly subdued and has scored only three times prior to last weekend. Young Paul Merson, who scored 14 goals last season, partnered Smith in early games but he scored only three times and Mr Graham gave Perry Groves another chance to establish himself in the side.


It has been midfielder Michael Thomas — their Championship winning hero — who is leading the Gunners' quest for goals. He scored a hat-trick at Plymouth in the Littlewoods Cup and his goal in the Spurs' game was his seventh of the season.

Last season it was lapses at Highbury that so nearly cost Arsenal the title so Mr Graham must feel a lot happier at the way things have been going at home so far. Though Wimbledon held them to a goalless draw, Arsenal have won all their other four home games without conceding a goal.

Though Liverpool are being named as favourites for the Championship, Arsenal look well capable of hanging onto it.

But we shall not be making life very easy for them when they face us at The Den where we see no reason why we should not register our first-ever League victory over the reigning Champions.



Childhood football hero: Johnny Giles.

What was your first success in football at any level?: Winning promotion from the Fourth to the Third Division with Wimbledon.

Although you've made your name as a midfield general, have you ever played in any other position?: I played as a right-back in my Wimbledon days.

What do you remember most about your league debut?: It was for Hereford

against Burnley when I was 19, but it was so long ago that I can't even remember if it was at home or away. I think we won, but I'm not 100% certain!

What's the best goal you've ever scored at any level?: It has to be the goal at Selhurst Park against Charlton last season. What has been your most embarrassing moment on the pitch at any level?: Scoring an own goal against West Ham in the reserves four years ago — I don't like to have too many embarrassing moments.

How did it feel to captain Millwall into the First Division for the first time in the club's history?: It was a great achievement for me personally and for the club because neither of us had been there before, so it's been the highest accolade for us both. And for me to get there so late in my career and as captain is a different class. It was the proudest moment of my life.

Now that you've finally joined the elite, what are your ambitions?: To be happy and successful in life, whatever I do.

Who is your best friend in football outside of Millwall?: Alan Gillette, the former assistant-manager of Wimbledon.

What is your ideal day off?: Relaxing at home with my girlfriend.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a footballer?: I like cars so much I'd have probably been a car-mechanic.

What will you do when you finally hang up your boots?: Either go into some kind of football management, or perhaps run my own garage.



GOAL-DEN MEMORIES

FLASHBACK

5 YEARS AGO:

We extended our unbeaten run to six games in the Third Division when drawing 1-1 at home to Bristol City. Yet, our run seemed likely to end when Trevor Morgan put City in front with little more than 20 minutes to play. But, with three minutes remaining, Steve Lovell scored our equaliser.

Luton dropped into relegation danger in the First Division after going down 0-3 at Sunderland.

Though Arsenal went down 1-3 at West Ham, they remained on top of the First Division. Ian Allinson netted for the Gunners with Tony Cotttee, Paul Goddard and Geoff Pike scoring for the Hammers.

Everton closed the gap on Arsenal to two points with a surprising 5-0 victory over Manchester United at Goodison Park. Kevin Sheedy scored twice, Adrian Heath, Gary Stevens and Graeme Sharp getting their other goals.

Gary Lineker scored a hat-trick as Leicester crushed Aston Villa 5-0 at Filbert Street.

Tony Cascarino scored for both sides as Gillingham drew 2-2 at home to Bradford City in Division Three. He opened the score for the Gills who went two goals up before Tony conceded his own-goal to put Bradford back into the game.

10 YEARS AGO:

The Lions pulled off a fine win away to Third Division leaders Sheffield United. Nicky Chatterton scoring the only goal after 13 minutes. That victory extended our unbeaten run to six league games and took us to within a point of the Blades.

Second Division leaders Luton's home record looked in grave danger when Steve Elliott gave Preston the lead in the 61st minute. But the Hatters were awarded a penalty 15 minutes from time and David Moss duly guided the ball home to save a point.

Manchester United's goalless draw at Everton enabled them to jump over Nottingham Forest and take over the leadership of Division One.

Forest lost 0-1 at Tottenham, for whom Glenn Hoddle scored in the third minute.

Ally Brown and Tony Brown each scored twice as W.B.A. defeated Coventry 4-1 at the Hawthorns.

Q.P.R. defeated the Second Division's bottom club Burnley by 7-0 at Loftus Road.

15 YEARS AGO:

Lyndon Hughes put West Bromwich into a 15th minute lead in our Second Division game at The Den but Alf Wood equalised within a couple of minutes. Then Barry Kitchener had the misfortune to concede an own-goal but, again within two minutes, we were on terms when Brian Clark had the ball in the net. The scoring ended at 2-2.

Luton found themselves trailing at home to Tottenham when Martin Chivers scored in the 67th minute. Only three minutes remained when John Aston netted to make the final score 1-1. That dropped point sent the Hatters to the bottom of Division One.

Arsenal, the club immediately below them won 3-0 at home to West Ham, John Radford, Liam Brady and Brian Kidd getting their goals.

Steve Heighway scored the only goal in Liverpool's home clash with Leeds and that enabled them to take a clear one-point lead at the top of the First Division as Manchester City were held to a 1-1 draw at Ipswich. Colin Bell scored the City goal after Brian Hamilton had given Ipswich the lead.

THE DEN IS NOT A HAPPY PLACE FOR LUTON

Last season we completed a hat-trick of wins over Luton. In addition to beating them at home and away in the First Division, we also achieved a 3-2 home win over them in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

Goals from Teddy Sheringham, Kevin O'Callaghan (penalty) and Ian Dawes in the opening 25 minutes set us up for victory at The Den in November. It was not until two minutes from time that Danny Wilson pulled back a goal for the Hatters.

When we clashed again here in the F.A. Cup we again got off to a flying start with goals from Sheringham and Jimmy Carter in the opening quarter-of-an-hour.

But, when Luton found their feet, they fought back with goals from Kingsley Black and Wilson (penalty) to level the scores by the 50th minute. It was a 72nd effort from Sheringham that settled the tie in our favour.

At Kenilworth road in March, two Carter goals earned us a 2-1 victory. Wilson converted another spot-kick for the Hatters' goal.

The Den is not a happy place for Luton who have won here only once in the League since the second world war. That was in December 1973 when a goal from Barry Butlin, nine minutes from the end, gave them victory.

Our association with Luton, of course, goes back to our Southern League days and we have been meeting in the Football League since 1920. During the 'twenties we had the odd distinction of running up 7-0 wins over them in successive seasons at The Den but in 1926/27 they got their revenge by hitting us for 6-0 at Kenilworth Road.

Most meetings since then have been close affairs. One exception was the game at The Den in April 1971 when Derek Possee scored twice, with Barry Bridges and Bryan Brown also scoring in a 4-0 victory.

The F.A. Cup run that the club enjoyed was the most successful for fifty years, for in 1936-37 the "Lions" reached the penultimate stage of the competition before going out to SUNDERLAND 1-2.

In the first round the "Lions" were drawn away to BRIGHTON and the tie ended all square at 1-1. The replay was duly won 3-1 at the Den the following Monday, with a goal from SHEPHERD and two penalties from full-back-cum-centre-forward ANSLOW.

MARGATE were then beaten 4-0 at the Den in round two with SHEPHERD netting three.

Local rivals CRYSTAL PALACE visited the Den in round three and were defeated 2-0 (ANSLOW, SHEPHERD) attendance 26,790.

For the fourth round MILLWALL had another home tie. The visit of famed cup fighters NEWCASTLE UTD attracted a huge crowd of 45,646. After 33 minutes play the Den erupted as ANSLOW put the "Lions" ahead. H/T 1-0.

It happened again in the 52nd minute when once again the bustling ANSLOW raced on to a through ball and hammered it past the helpless SIMPSON, although the Tynsiders replied a few minutes later, the HERO'S ALL of MILLWALL held out and won a famous victory.

BIRMINGHAM CITY ended any hopes of emulating the side of 1936-37 when defeating the "Lions" easily by four goals to one at the Den in the fifth round. Att. 41,000.


The first televised football match, 1937

The Football Trust has installed Closed Circuit Television systems at more than 110 British grounds. The cameras have a range of 150 metres and immediate close-up prints can be produced. Within minutes of an incident offenders can be identified and arrested with film made available as evidence in court. CCTV is the most effective anti-hooligan measure inside football grounds and the programme has been extended to include portable systems.

CCTV is only one of The Football Trust's many initiatives. Each year it receives over £9.5 million from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters and spends it on projects that benefit all levels of the game throughout the United Kingdom.




