LUTON TOWN

Luton Town our visitors this evening have had a disappointing season and before their match with Wimbledon at Plough Lane on Wednesday last week had taken 22 points from 23 league games.

They were six points clear of Charlton, next to bottom of the First Division and had failed to win an away game taking just five points from draws in their 11 matches on opponents grounds.

In fact the Hatters had an almost identical record to Charlton going 11 league games without a win before trying to break that sequence against Wimbledon.

Luton's away form has been dismal to say the least and they have not registered an away win since December 1988 - which is 21 First Division matches on opponents grounds without

success. The result of the game at Plough Lane was not known at the time of writing.

Last season was also a tough one for Luton who finished in 16th position to avoid relegation by two points finishing with 41 points from their 38 games. This season's record is as follows: Tottenham (A) 1-2, Sheff Wed (H) 2-0, Liverpool (H) 0-0, QPR (A) 0-0, Charlton (H) 1-0, Coventry (A) 0-1, Wimbledon (H) 1-1, Man City (A) 1-3, Aston Villa (H) 0-1, Norwich (H) 4-1, Millwall (A) 1-1, Derby (H) 1-0, C Palace (A) 1-1, Man Utd (H) 1-3, Southampton (A) 3-6, Tottenham (H) 0-0, Sheff Wed (A) 1-1, Arsenal (A) 2-3, Notts F (H) 1-1, Chelsea (H) 0-3, Everton (A) 1-2, Liverpool (A) 2-2, QPR (H) 1-1.

DARRON MCDONOUGH Belgium born McDonough scored on his League debut for Oldham against Notts County in December 1980 thereby joining an exclusive club.

He signed for Luton in 1986 in exchange for £87,000 to become a versatile and valuable member of the squad.

Was unfortunate to be injured just before the Town's Littlewoods Cup Final win in 1988 and was beset with further problems last season.

RICHARD HARVEY Born at Letchworth in April 1969 Harvey, following a number of fine performances for the Combination side as well as captaining the successful Youth Team, made his deserved full League debut at home to Queens Park Rangers in November 1986.

Made four further appearances towards the end of 1986/87, showing maturity beyond his years and is now recognised as a First team squad member.

He has toured South America with the England Under-19 squad.

DANNY WILSON Ray Harford's first major signing, from Brighton, in the summer of 1987.

Born in Wigan on January 1st 1960, he made his League debut for Bury in season 1977/78 before being transferred to Chesterfield three years later.

TIM BREACKER Bicester born Breacker has been a regular member of the first team since his debut at Ipswich in 1984.

This England Under-21 International can perform in midfield but his normal position is right back where his surging runs on the overlap have become a strong feature of his play.

JOHN DREYER Signed at a cost of £140,000 from Oxford United in the summer of 1988. Joined United from Wallingford Town and appeared on loan for Torquay and Fulham before making his Oxford debut at home to Coventry in October 1986.

PAUL GRAY Promising Portsmouth born youngster who is expected to press for a first team place this season. Made his debut in a Simod Cup tie at Everton in February 1988.


JULIAN JAMES Locally born James is another from the Town's youth scheme hoping to make a name for himself.

Came on as substitute three times towards the end of 1987/88 including the 1-1 draw at Anfield and appeared on four occasions last term.

ALEC CHAMBERLAIN Made his league debut for Colchester in January 1983 and after many fine displays Everton were prompted to pay £80,000 for his services in the summer of 1987.

Unfortunately due to the form of Welsh International Neville Southall, he did not manage a League appearance at Goodison Park but instead had a spell on loan at Tranmere.

Signed for Luton in the summer of 1988 becoming first choice 'keeper at the latter end of 1988/89.



STEVE WILLIAMS Brings with him to Kenilworth Road a wealth of experience gained playing for Southampton, Arsenal and England. Made his League debut for the Saints in 1975/76 and signed for Arsenal for £550,000 in 1984.

KINGSLEY BLACK Hit the headlines with his performance in the Littlewoods Cup Final of 1988 which prompted both Billy Bingham and Bobby Robson to fight for his International services.

He chose Northern Ireland and became a regular in the International side last season which was also his first full term in the Luton first team.

MARVIN JOHNSON Another former member of the talented Youth side. Wembley born Johnson appeared regularly last season in central defence where his exceptional pace marks him out as a man for the future.

GRAHAM RODGER Close season signing from Coventry City where he had been an almost permanent understudy to Brian Kilcline and Trevor Peake. Glasgow born Rodger who is an England Under-21 International scored the Coventry winner against the Town at Highfield Road last term.

DAVE BEAUMONT Another mid-season signing from Dundee United where he had been understudy to International pair David Narey and Paul Hegarty. Made his Luton debut in the Littlewoods Cup Semi-Final at Upton Park where his calm performance ensured that he remained ever present for the rest of the season.

A Scottish Under-21 International.

IAIN DOWIE A prolific scorer for non-League Hendon from whom he was signed for £30,000 early in 1989. Before turning professional Dowie was a Development Engineer with British Aerospace and is determined to make as big a success with his footballing career.

MICK KENNEDY Born at Salford in April 1961. He joined Luton Town in August 1989 from Leicester City. Has twice played at International level for the Republic of Ireland.






JIM RYAN

Scott joined Charlton from school where he represented Bromley and Kent.

■ CHARITY MATCH





VALIANT MEN

Don Welsh
The Manager

Name: Donald Welsh

Born: Manchester, 25th February 1911

Position: Centre-half, Left-half,
Centre-forward, inside-left.

League Record: Torquay Utd. 80 apps, 4 goals

Don played for Manchester and Lancashire Schools in 1924/25 and only a broken wrist prevented his inclusion in a North v South England Schools Trial. He joined the Royal Navy as a fifteen year-old in 1926 and served in the Mediterranean. Whilst based at Malta, he actually played a few games for Valletta. On his return to Davenport, he continued to play football and it was whilst playing for Western Command, against Devon County at Plymouth, that he was spotted by Torquay's trainer/manager, Frank Brown. He was signed on amateur forms and after a single reserve outing, a 5-0 win over Bath, he was thrust into the first-team, where he immediately claimed the centre-half berth for his own. He bought his discharge from the Navy for £40 and after a further twelve months as an amateur (an FA regulation of that time), Don joined Torquay's professional ranks in July 1934.

Charlton, meanwhile, were on the up and up, and in February 1935, with promotion from the Third Division (South) looking likely, Jimmy Seed set his sights on Welsh. In bringing Don to The Valley, Seed broke the club transfer record (£2,650 paid for Willie Rankin in March 1932) and invested £3,250 on his new acquisition. On each of Don's two previous visits to Charlton, he had been on the losing side (2-3 and 0-6!), but he made his debut for us before a crowd of 28,000 at The Den on 9th February 1935, Charlton winning 3-1 with a performance which had Seed purring, "Team played as well as I have ever seen... not a weakness anywhere". Only two defeats were suffered in our remaining fifteen games and Charlton were Champions of Division Three (South).

Twelve months on and promotion to Division One followed. Don moved effortlessly to left-half and then converted with equal ease to centre-forward. The Tour of the USA and Canada, at the end of a season in which we had finished runners-up in Division One at the first time of asking, may have paired Charlton with poor opposition, but Don's emergence as a goalscorer was underlined as he claimed twenty of the seventy-two goals we chalked up in just fifteen games. In 1937/38 he was our joint leading-scorer, although he only played up front on fifteen occasions. In the season before War, he added inside-left to his repertoire.

Don collected three England caps in the pre-war period; v Germany (May 1938, won 6-3), the shameful occasion when craven British officials ordered the

players to give the Nazi salute, v Switzerland (May 1938, lost 1-2) and v Romania (May 1939, won 2-0) when Don scored from inside-left. There was also a Representative appearance for the Football League and Don was perhaps a victim of his own versatility, often travelling as reserve because he offered cover in four key positions. During the War he continued to represent England, although these are counted as 'unofficial' Internationals. He served as a P.T. Instructor, with the rank of Sergeant Major and also, of course, captained Charlton in our two Wartime Cup Final appearances. There were also guest appearances for Brighton, Manchester City, Liverpool and Chester.

At War's end, Don led us back to Wembley for our two FA Cup appearances, finally collecting a Winner's medal in his thirty-sixth year. His last Charlton outing came on 8th November 1947, a 1-0 defeat by Blackburn, and three days later he left to become manager of Brighton. He also managed Liverpool (March 1951-May 1956), Bournemouth (July 1958-February 1961) and coached Wycombe Wanderers (July 1963-November 1964). He was then briefly on our administrative staff and held a number of other jobs including hotelier, youth club manager and Director of a horticultural business.

A superbly natural footballer, Don was unquestionably the most influential player ever to have worn a Charlton shirt. His captaincy was inspirational and his tactical awareness made him a perfect extension of Seed's footballing philosophy. His leadership went beyond the field of play, where he was protective of his team-mates and representative of their interests to management.

Don's advocacy of Charlton also went beyond his years at The Valley. Always welcoming, Ray Groom, a supporter since 1921, recalls the time he arrived uninvited at Don's door. Not only did he enjoy Don's hospitality but he was also driven back to the station afterwards.

And did I have to rummage through newspaper archives to find the facts for this article? No. Eight years ago I wrote a tentative letter to Don, asking for a few career details. By return, I received a four-page letter packed with information and a 'phone number. "It's nice to be remembered", he wrote.

But Don, how could we ever forget you!







IN OFF THE POST

Dear Sir,

On Tuesday this week I saw the BBC 'Breakfast Time' programme and the Charlton Football Club was featured. Unfortunately, I viewed only the last few minutes of the programme but it prompted me to write and seek your help.

If you are unable to assist would you please be kind enough to pass this letter on to others who may be in a better position to help.

During the past 18 months I have managed to trace old Army friends and comrades who served in a Medical Corps Unit during World War II. Some have died but many have been located in different parts of the country and two very happy and exciting re-unions have taken place, meeting together after 45-50 years!

From scant information I have carried out research and have been rewarded with many successes. I am now trying to find out what became of a Mr Young.

He was a Regular soldier in the RAMC at the outbreak of War in 1939 and in our unit held the rank of Staff Sergeant. The unit went over to France with the BEF in 1940 and during the hasty withdrawal to the port of Brest almost 3 weeks after the Dunkirk evacuation the Staff Sergeant met with a motorcycle

accident at night. The bike was severely damaged but Staff Sergeant Young was not seriously hurt and eventually escaped back to the UK.

I have been given to understand that he was a good footballer and when the opportunity presented itself during the War years, Mr Young played for Charlton Football Club. Is it likely that in your club archives there is some reference to Mr Young during the years, say, 1939 to 1946? If I had any earlier address and perhaps his full Christian names then this would be an excellent start for further research. If Mr Young is still alive he would probably now be in his upper 70s and maybe some of the club's 'Old Timers' may recall him?

I would be most grateful for any scrap of information on Mr Young.

Clive Richardson an avid Charlton fan since 1955, acts as Matchday Radio Room assistant at Charlton matches. He is a freelance "Soul Music" journalist and radio presenter and is currently involved with RTM Radio (formerly Radio Thamesmead). He has been administration Manager at a large London book store for the past 12 years.

When RTM Radio goes on-air on the FM waveband early in March, listeners within a ten-kilometre radius of the transmitter on Shooters Hill will have the opportunity of tuning-in to 'Charlton Chat' on a Sunday night from 8.30 til 10.00 p.m., co-hosted by myself and Steve Sutherland and bringing to fruition the chance to combine two of my favourite pursuits — those of radio presenter and avid Charlton fan!

My Charlton connection began in November 1955 when my father took me by bus to The Valley — memory tells me that we beat Manchester City 5-2 that day — though even before that I can recall asking dad "Did Ayre or Firmani score today?" whenever he'd been to a match. Eddie Firmani had moved to Sampdoria before my first game, however and the first team I remember was that captioned in the Gordon Hurst feature in the Southampton programme — Bartram, Campbell, Townsend, Hewie, Ufton, Hammond, Hurst, Gauld,

Leary, White, Keiman — with Sid O'Lynn and Bobby Ayre still around and Willie Duff, Sam Lawrie and Johnny Summers soon to become resident favourites.

I was there for the legendary 7-6 victory over Huddersfield and we also made banner headlines in the 'classified' News and Star with a 6-all draw with Middlesbrough, then a 7-4 goal-rush versus Portsmouth! Then the trauma of relegation and the demise of Jimmy Seed, balanced by the emergence of young talent in Alan Campbell, Billy Bonds, Marvin Hinton and Keith Peacock, with Brian Kinsey a stalwart on the left flank, not forgetting the indefatigable Peter Reeves at half-back (mid-field, I suppose, these days!).

There were always heroes and anti-heroes — Derek Hales was both at once to many fans, likewise the erratic Len Glover and did Dennis Edwards ever actually score? Matt Tees and Rodney Green were a dynamic scoring combination until the latter was badly injured by a brutal George Curtis tackle against Coventry — I was so incensed that I wrote to manager Jimmy Hill to complain and I still have his written reply apologising for some 'rough play'!

Two diminutive blond players became firm favourites, both industrious with youthful flair — Kevin Dickenson and Ritchie Bowman — while Dennis Booth was a utility stand-by and Peter Shaw remained in favour; another blond lad did make it, though — Colin Powell!

Down to the 3rd Division and away trips to rain-drenched Colchester, bleak Aldershot, remote (!) Walsall and the Thames-side pleasantries of Reading; Preston at home for the last game, needing to win for promotion, going a goal down then missing a penalty — though Bob Curtis soon made amends — but we did it. It must have taken an hour to reach Shooters Hill traffic lights that night, but who cared!

The Charlie Wright era, a scintillating Mike 'Flash' Flanagan hat-trick on a Tuesday

evening to demolish Chelsea, the emergence of supremely-talented Paul Walsh, not forgetting the consistency of Phil Warman and the dogged perseverance of Steve Gritt, who suffered a bit from spasmodic barracking from the terraces in his early days.

And so to Selhurst.....promotion and play-offs; the last four years have seen me fly off to New Orleans for 10 days in April for working holidays reporting on the annual Jazz Festival in my capacity as freelance soul music journalist, and getting strange reactions from my colleagues as I made transatlantic phone calls to check on Charlton scores then calculate the intricacies of our League position! Having suffered the inadequacies of BBC radio commentary for the Leeds play-off at Elland Road, I just had to travel to Birmingham for the replay; the range of emotions we experienced that night have been thoroughly chronicled elsewhere and it was still a happy coachload who finally made it back to Catford at 2.00 a.m. that night.

My radio work began back in 1981 and for some seven years I was involved in pirate radio, presenting acclaimed programmes of soul, blues and gospel on JFM and SOLAR Radio before joining cable station Radio Thamesmead in January 1987 to present the 'R&B Party' on Saturday nights.

In January 1989 Steve Sutherland and I were having a pre-match conversation in the restaurant and when Steve mentioned an interest in combining radio and football the seeds were sewn for the idea of 'Charlton Chat'. There was free airtime then on Sunday evenings at Thamesmead and Station Manager Bob Smith promptly approved our idea for the 8 til 9pm timeslot, latterly adjusted to run 90 minutes from 8.30 to 10.00 p.m.

During our on-air run with a limited audience on the cable system, we had lots of fun with studio guests like Paul Williams, Steve Gritt, Terry Morrison, cartoonist Den 'Smudge' Ethernon and Miss Charlton Athletic, Louise Durham, while Steve and I discussed commercial ventures and 'from the terraces' opinions were offered on our Saturday results.

Last summer Radio Thamesmead applied for and was granted an IBA incremental licence to broadcast on FM as RTM Radio and the station came off-air on August Bank Holiday to undertake the technical and administrative reorganisation necessary to launch our FM transmissions. As mentioned above, 'Charlton Chat' will retain the Sunday 8.30 til 10.00 p.m. timeslot, while modesty does not preclude my mentioning that R&B and soul music fans will be able to hear my 'R&B Party' from 8 til 10.00 p.m. on Saturday nights. This means that I have to forgo any away match travel, but can still fulfil my tasks assisting John Fuller in the Radio Room at all home games.

Dear Supporter,

As you will know, Greenwich Council's planning committee has rejected Charlton's application to redevelop the club's rightful home at The Valley.

In order to demonstrate the strength of our support across the borough and to gain publicity we now intend to contest every seat in the local council elections on May 3.

Although the council is controlled by Labour we take no party political stance on this issue. Indeed, there is no evidence that a Tory-run Greenwich would be any more helpful to the club.

The election work will be an enormous administrative task, but it has the full backing of the football club, the supporters' club and Voice of The Valley.

Now we need your help. There are 62 seats in 36 wards across the borough. We already have candidates for more than half of the seats, but we need more, both to complete the list and to act as reserves.

You must live and be registered to vote in the borough, but there is no financial deposit and we will do all the work for you, unless you are keen to get involved yourself. You do not have to stand in the ward in which you live.

Secondly, we need people to sign nomination papers. Each candidate requires the signatures of 20 people in the ward for which they wish to stand.

Again, your involvement can end when you sign the form if that is your wish, but with 62 candidates we will require some 1,240 signatures, so your part is vital.

If you can help in either respect, or have any ideas for the campaign, please get in touch with Roy King on 0322 433201.

We also need the help of supporters outside the borough. In April we intend to flood Greenwich with party workers, leafletting and knocking on doors.

And we urge everyone to write to The Mercury, the Kentish Times, the South London Press, the News Shopper and the Comet Leader protesting at the council's attitude towards the club. Remember, there are far more of us than there are objecting local residents. Let's prove that to the press!

But most of all, whatever you do to help the cause, remember to uphold the excellent reputation of Charlton Athletic supporters and don't allow your understandable anger to be misrepresented as hooliganism.



The Football Trust has installed Closed Circuit Television systems at more than 110 British grounds. The cameras have a range of 150 metres and immediate close-up prints can be produced. Within minutes of an incident offenders can be identified and arrested with film made available as evidence in court. CCTV is the most effective anti-hooligan measure inside football grounds and the programme has been extended to include portable systems.

CCTV is only one of The Football Trust's many initiatives. Each year it receives over £9.5 million from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettors and spends it on projects that benefit all levels of the game throughout the United Kingdom.
