We played together here of course and I remember assisting him in some of the finer points of golf in those days! We have played against each other since then, when he moved on to Aston Villa, and I shall obviously be hoping to enjoy a home win against him this time.

On the injury and news fronts, I am pleased to say Darron McDonough is progressing well and playing with greater confidence in his shoulder all the time. He is nearly there, but David Beaumont went to see a specialist this week after a setback in training and Graham Rodger is still on crutches after his operation. For them both it is very disappointing. We have had Ronny Rosenthal, an Israeli international striker, on trial from Standard Liege of Belgium and he scored twice for the reserves last Saturday. An interesting prospect. Give the players your support today. Thank-you.

The tournament was a tremendous success, a real family affair made possible by your kindness and support.







BREAK IN FIXTURES BRINGS SADNESS AND FIXTURE RIDDLES

• After an agonising series of injuries our enthusiastic defender Darron McDonough is back on the fitness trail. Darron had an operation to repair his dislocated shoulder and reports all is well following his comeback.

Welcome to Southampton, our first visitors after a month-long spell without a Saturday fixture in the Barclays First Division. Despite the lack of senior matches, it has been a busy period and we have had some sad news with the passing of Cecil Holloway and Eddie Connelly.

Both men had special associations with the club, Cecil as a long-standing supporter and former president and Eddie as one of our favourite players during the late 1930's and 1940's when he played either side of the war.

The last month has also seen the publication of the Taylor report which will obviously have a great influence on the club. Clearly all the recommendations will have to be implemented in the future one way or the other.

One I would like to draw special attention to this afternoon, particularly for our Kenilworth End supporters, is recommendation 13 in the report relating to gangways. These should be kept clear and painted in a conspicuous colour as the public announcements and our stewards will help to explain today.

Both the lateral and vertical gangways on the terrace must be kept clear for good safety reasons and we are hoping for the full understanding, co-operation and support of our Kenilworth Road customers.

The unexpected break in fixtures gave our reserves a chance to overcome Dunstable and secure their place in the final of the Bedfordshire Premier Cup, against Arlesey, and the first team squad a chance to take a break at a Centrepark in East Anglia where there were ideal training and recreational facilities.

For me, the boot was on the other foot. After enjoying the excitement of our great cup runs and the fixture congestion they brought in the last two years, I have this season found myself trying to rearrange fixtures postponed by other clubs' cup commitments, replay arrangements and, in the case of Aston Villa, venue commitments.

If, for example, Coventry and Nottingham Forest require a replay of their Littlewoods Cup semi-final, it will be held at a neutral ground – Villa Park.

This would not only mean our scheduled rearranged meeting with Coventry on March 7 would be off, but we could not meet Villa that week either.

All will be made clear on Monday, February 26, of course, when we shall know the result of that match and also know if we are playing Coventry on March 7, as now scheduled, or the following week on March 13.

Queen's Park Rangers took away a point they scarcely deserved on January 20 when the Town's impressive approach work created enough openings to have won Jim Ryan's first match in charge. But in the end the excellence of the visitor's goalkeeper David Seaman and some wayward finishing by our own attack allowed them off the hook.

David Preece, with his first league goal of the season, had opened the scoring after only six minutes. A mishap in the Rangers' defence presented Kingsley Black with a clear run on goal and, after Seaman had saved from both Black and Iain Dowie, Preece was left with a simple finish.

Rangers, with Roy Wegerle in the side and making his first official return to Kenilworth Road after his move to London last December, came back and levelled after 32 minutes. A mishit clearance by the otherwise excellent John Dreyer gave Mark Falco a clear chance from only 10 yards.



"I made my debut, my full league one that is, at Millwall last season and it was a difficult game for me. It came right after the Littlewoods Cup tie at Leeds when I was sent off and I felt very drained. It was hard because I did not feel I had any energy during those days and we had to battle all the way at Millwall.

"Compared with that, it was an easy game when we went to Wimbledon last week and won. That was much more my kind of game as they were just knocking it long and I could see it all clearly. It was quite easy to defend and I felt very comfortable. I suppose it is experience. I have generally felt it getting easier as time goes on."

After only a handful of games, Julian, who will be 20 next month, is already coming to grips with the First Division and life alongside John Dreyer in the heart of the Town defence.

"I am really starting to enjoy it now – Monday night's result at Charlton excepted – and it is good to be playing with someone like "Tumble" because he is an experienced player. But I am starting to shout and help him stay on his toes as much as he does for me now so I think that is a good sign."

Julian is grateful to the coaching staff at the club for their encouragement, particularly

as he went through a stage when he was told he lacked the necessary height for a centre-back.

"John Faulkner always told me I would be able to play centre-back alright so long as I was alongside a taller player. And that is how it has worked out. Now it is my aim to hold on to my place in the team when the others get fit again after injury."

Ironically, for a Town player, Julian grew up as a Watford supporter. His father was a steward at Vicarage Road. Now, as Julian says, he comes to watch him playing for Luton instead.

"I had trials as a schoolboy with Watford and Spurs and went up to West Brom. But Luton was nearer to home and had a very good youth policy. So, I came here and it has worked out well for me."

"I think 19 or 20 is about the right age to start breaking through into the team for me. I am getting experience and with Jim Ryan in charge there is a very good atmosphere at the club."

Julian said he had no particular professional players he admired individually as examples to him, but said he enjoyed watching Liverpool play. "They've got such good habits. They always pass well. They have great individuals, but they always play as a team."

As a youngster Julian played as a forward and enjoyed scoring a lot of goals. He was converted to a defender shortly before he was spotted playing in a district match at Hemel Hempstead by John Moore.

"I don't score many goals now," he said. "But it is just as satisfying to play well in defence in a good performance. We have shown signs of more confidence lately and if we can get another good run going I am sure we shall get out of any trouble."

CECIL HOLLOWAY – A STALWART SUPPORTER

Cecil Holloway, one of our most distinguished honorary life members and a former president of our club, died on February 5, 1990. He was 80.

Mr Holloway was well-known throughout Luton and Bedfordshire for his connections not only with Luton Town Football Club, but also with hospitals, business and the brewing industry. He was a founder member, former chairman and, at the time of his death, president of the Friends of the Hospitals of Luton and Dunstable.

Born and educated in Chester, he entered the licensed trade and moved to Luton to join J.W. Green in 1933. It was to be the start of a long association with the town and with Kenilworth Road where he

was a regular, loyal and long-serving supporter.

His outstanding support for the club was recognised when he became president in 1987 and he was able to enjoy the office as the club made two successive trips to Wembley for the Littlewoods Cup finals of 1988 and 1989.

In his public and business life, Mr Holloway held nine directorships including positions with the former Luton Water Company, J.W. Green, Flowers and Whitbread.

He is survived by his wife Vera, daughter Pamela and grandchildren Pippa and Justin to whom all at the club send their deepest sympathies.

EDDIE CONNELLY – AN OLD FASHIONED CROWD PLEASER

One of the most delightful crowd-pleasing forwards of the Town teams shortly before and after World War Two, Eddie Connelly died in Luton last weekend on February 16. He was 73.

Eddie, an inside-left with tricky skills, signed for the Town twice in seven years – once at each end of the war – and for a substantial fee each time.

Born in Fifeshire, Scotland, in December 1916, he joined the Town from Newcastle in 1938, left for West Bromwich Albion 18 months later and rejoined in 1946. In all, he made 88 league appearances and scored 24 goals for Luton before a cartilage injury ended his career in 1946.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, four daughters, Helen, Joan, Bridgett and Elizabeth and son, Eddie. The club sends its deepest sympathy to the family.

FROM ECUADOR WITH LOVE

The fame of Luton Town's pioneering has been spread across the Atlantic this season with an article on the club appearing in the Guayaquil-based sports newspaper Estadio.

The piece was written by Leslie Dickens, an Ecuadorean journalist, who visited the club last autumn and watched the game here against Charlton Athletic.

Leslie was impressed enough to include a lengthy reference to the Town in his feature which surveyed English club football and included reports on his experiences at other clubs like Liverpool, Queen's Park Rangers and Arsenal.

In a letter received at Kenilworth Road by General Secretary Bill Tomlins, Leslie wrote: "I do believe in flying the flag and showing people here that English football is not about

hooligans, but about years of tradition, about people dedicating their lives to the game, be it the groundsman or the chairman – it all adds up to the greatest club competition in the world.

"Each week, I watch live and recorded games from Spain, Italy, Germany and many other countries but none of them can be compared to the English league. I thank you once again for your hospitality and hope that during my next trip to England, I will be able to visit Kenilworth Road again."

Leslie's article was headlined "Pasion en Inglaterra" in the magazine and concluded that English football represented spectacle, professionalism, honesty and deserved to hold the title of best championship in the world.


The first televised football match, 1937

CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION

The Football Trust has installed Closed Circuit Television systems at more than 110 British grounds. The cameras have a range of 150 metres and immediate close-up prints can be produced. Within minutes of an incident offenders can be identified and arrested with film made available as evidence in court. CCTV is the most effective anti-hooligan measure inside football grounds and the programme has been extended to include portable systems.

CCTV is only one of The Football Trust's many initiatives. Each year it receives over £9.5 million from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters and spends it on projects that benefit all levels of the game throughout the United Kingdom.

1986/87 (contd.)

The Town started slowly again and without the injured Mick Harford it was difficult to see where the goals would come from. A previous season signing from Wigan, Mike Newell, soon answered that by scoring a hat-trick in the 4-1 demolition of Liverpool at Kenilworth Road as the team forced its way, into the top six shortly after Christmas.

Unfortunately all this was going on while the press were having a field day off the pitch due to the clubs stance on away supporters which resulted in exclusion from the Littlewoods Cup.

With all this going on around them the players did remarkably well to remain in the top six until the final day when a defeat at Everton pushed them to seventh which was still a record.

1987/88

Yet another managerial change preceeded the season with a "disillusioned" John Moore resigning to be replaced by his number two Ray Harford.

Despite the reasonable League form 1987/88 will always be remembered for the "three trips to Wembley". The Simod Cup final was reached after wins over Everton (at last), Stoke and Swindon before Reading tore the Town apart.

The Mercantile Credit Centenary Classic saw the Town lose to Manchester United and with a defeat in the semi-final of the FA Cup by Wimbledon we were thinking it was not going to be our year.

IT HAPPENED 40 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK ...

28th January 1970

In a tough, bruising encounter the Town drew 1-1 at home to fellow promotion contenders Brighton watched by a crowd of 17,584.

IT HAPPENED 55 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK ...

23rd February 1935

The Town hammered Aldershot 6-1 at Kenilworth Road in the middle of a run of six straight wins.

A crowd of 6,536 saw Fred Roberts and Sam Bell weigh in with goals alongside George Stephenson and Jack Ball who each bagged two.

All the disappointment was forgotten, however, when a marvellous game in the Littlewoods Cup Final against Arsenal saw a thrilling climax with Brian Stein scoring the winner in the last minute to give the club its first major trophy.

Due to the number of Cup games played – eighteen in total – the Town had a hectic run-in to the end of the season but despite that a creditable ninth position was achieved.

1988/89

After the glory of 1987/88 this was a season of change with long serving players such as Brian Stein and Mal Donaghy departing with new talent in the shape of Kingsley Black and Roy Wegerle emerging.

The traditional slow start saw the team hovering just above the relegation places from the off and although there were some, all too infrequent, eye catching results such as a 1-0 win over Liverpool and a 6-1 thrashing of Southampton the away form was poor.

The unthinkable then happened with three home defeats on the trot during March which coupled with the normal away reverses saw the situation get desperate just at a time when we should all have been enjoying life having reached the Littlewoods Cup Final for the second season running.

Winning away in the Littlewoods Cup did not seem to be a problem as victories at Burnley, Leeds, Southampton and West Ham proved but on the big day the Town were defeated 3-1 by Nottingham Forest, a score which many observers felt slightly flattered the Reds.

After that defeat only six games remained but by dint of a return to winning ways at home the Town survived courtesy of a 1-0 victory over Norwich at Kenilworth Road in the last match of the season.



SOUTHAMPTON

● We welcome Southampton to Kenilworth Road this afternoon and with them our former player Chris Nicholl who has been manager of the south coast club since 1985 when he succeeded Lawrie McMenemy. Chris played for the Town between 1969 and 1972, making 97 league appearances and scoring six goals.

● Southampton are currently 10th in the First Division, but, after enjoying a very successful start to the season, they have found it difficult to sustain their early form. Last weekend, they were eliminated from the F.A. Cup, 3-0 at Liverpool.

● The Saints have a reputation for loyalty and Chris Nicholl is only their seventh manager since the war. He has followed Arthur Dominy (1943-46), Bill Dodgin Snr (1946-49), Sid Cann (1949-51), George Roughton (1952-55), Ted Bates (1955-73) and Lawrie McMenemy (1973-85).

● Southampton was formed largely by players from the Deanery FC, which had been established by schoolteachers in 1880. Most of the founders were connected with the young men's association of St Mary's Church. At the inaugural meeting held in November 1885, the club was named Southampton St Mary's.

● The Saints were original members of Division Three in 1920. They finished runners-up in their first season, champions the next and remained in the Second Division

until 1953. After relegation, they regained their Second Division spot in 1960 and went on to reach the First Division for the first time in 1966, returning only between 1974 and 1978.

● Case, who will be 36 in May, has enjoyed an Indian summer at the Dell after a distinguished career with Liverpool and Brighton and this season he has earned some of the best reviews of his career for his crafty play and long-range passing.


