Supporters will be well aware that today's fixture was originally postponed because of our FA Cup sixth round commitment and then re-instated because if the delay in Everton and Oldham deciding their fifth round tie.

I well remember contributing an article to the club's official diary just before this season commenced.

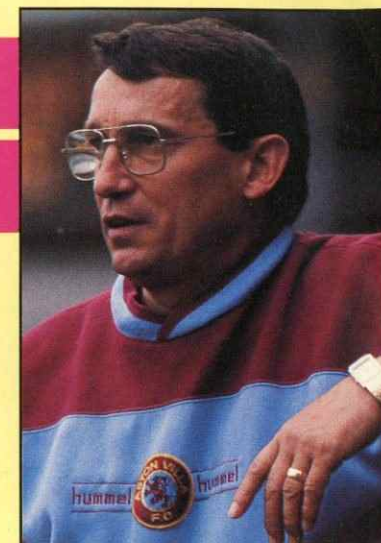
It was written, remember, in the aftermath of a tight finish at the bottom last May and when the actual formation of this season's team was by no means settled.

Had I predicted then that, come March, we would still be alongside Liverpool with the chance of a Cup and League double, I'm sure most readers would have felt I was entering the realms of fantasy.

Here, in fact, is a passage from what I wrote in August: "I happen to think that Aston Villa ended last season not too far off being a mid-table team and that this has given us something to build on. In other words we can lift ourselves above the level of 'also rans' and take the next step forward."

No-one would have argued with that prediction unless they felt I was slightly optimistic in rating us mid-table in 1988-89 when in fact we escaped going back down by a fraction.

Now, surely, we are entitled to take enormous confidence from the amount of progress we have made while acknowledging that the job of building a squad of players capable of constant



long-lasting success still has some way to go?

Including today we have five more home games and six away from home in which we will give total application to an attempt to re-produce our very best form and put together a run similar to in the past.

In addition we have at least one FA Cup-tie and hopefully more. Here again no effort will be spared in search of success.

I make no apology for repeating what I have said many times on TV and in the press ... we do not shout it from the rooftops when we have a good run, nor do we despair when we lose a game or two.

It has always been the case that, for the clubs trying to win honours, games get more difficult and competitive, as the season progresses.

It is only in the games between teams with little at stake where sometimes slightly easier points may seem to be there for the taking.

In these important final fixtures we will do our level best to combat all the demands placed upon us. Come the middle of May, whether we have tangible rewards or not for all the team's outstanding efforts, we will still have 'taken that next step forward' I was looking for last August, and more.

That alone would not be enough to satisfy us because we are as hungry for honours as any supporter ... but it will be more than many expected when the season started.

OLDHAM DAYS

Ian Ormondroyd knows what to expect if Villa should have to take on Oldham Athletic's 34-match unbeaten home record for a place in the FA Cup semi-finals.

It was three years ago this month that he signed for Oldham when they were closer to the First Division than at any time since their relegation from the top flight in 1923.

He was at Boundary Park for only two months but that was long enough for him to banish any serious fears about the plastic pitch.

"I don't know whether I would have fancied playing on it for a long time," he says. "But there's no reason to be worried about going there. It was okay to play on and I didn't find any real problems."

"A lot is said about the pitch because Oldham have such a good home record, but they're a good side and better than a lot of people give them credit for."

"There are only four or five players left from when I was there and one of those is Mike Milligan. They've made him captain now and that seems to have added a bit of responsibility to his game."

"I think he could go on to better things and maybe it will come by staying where he is because Oldham could go into the First Division."

"Denis Irwin, the right back, is another very good player. They got him from Leeds for next to nothing, but that's how Joe Royle has worked. He has bought very well and I know that his side will make it tough for us if we have to go there next week."

Ian's loan spell with Oldham might have ended with a permanent transfer but The Latics' cash offer was short of what Bradford City wanted.

"I was in and out of the Bradford team at the time," he explains. "The reason for the loan was that Ron Futchter was at Oldham and Terry Dolan, the manager at Bradford, really wanted him because he needed someone who was going to score goals."

"Joe Royle must have said that the only way Bradford were having Futchter on a permanent deal was if he could have me on loan. The manager eventually said I could go until the end of the season and that suited me fine."

"I really enjoyed my time there because it's a club very much like Bradford - small and tightly-knit."

Oldham finished third in Division Two but were denied promotion because it was the first year of a major change.

Ian recalls: "We were beaten by Leeds in the play-offs because of last-minute goals by Keith Edwards in both legs. Everyone was a bit gutted because they had worked so hard during the season."

The quarter-final draw means that Ian will meet up with another old friend if Everton should overcome Oldham in the second replay this afternoon.

The Merseysiders' Scottish World Cup contender, Stuart McCall, was captain at Bradford and they've kept in touch since following different paths into the First Division.

"I've got to give Stuart a ring," said Ian when we talked this week. "I'll be telling him to get his finger out and get Oldham beaten. Not that I'm really fussed which team we have to meet, but it's always nice to play against Stuart."

"He wasn't too happy that we turned Everton over earlier in the season, but from my point of view, it seems that things go well for me against them. We beat them in the League Cup at Bradford last season and I scored my first goal for Villa at Goodison Park."

"It's great to have happy memories,

but it won't mean a lot if we have to play Everton now. In the last eight of the Cup, you have got to go out and hope for the best wherever you are playing."

"Stuart McCall was an inspiration to everybody at Bradford because he was so energetic and loved the game. As our captain, he was an example to all the players and a smashing lad as well."

"I was well pleased for him when scored two goals in the Cup Final last year, although it was sad that Everton couldn't win. He's a Yorkshireman who talks just like me, but he's in the Scotland squad because his parents come from up there."

He's been involved in a few things with Scotland this season and I hope he gets to the World Cup.

"The two of us, and John Hendrie as well, were worth the best part of £2m to Bradford. I think we can say we did well for the club, but it's just a shame that they aren't doing very well at the moment. The first result I look for is theirs and I'd like to see them getting out of trouble."

PFA AWARDS

A number of Villa players could feature among the candidates for the 16th Annual PFA awards to be presented in London on Sunday 1st April.

The players' special night of the year

is a time of recognition for representatives of the clubs who have enjoyed success in the previous 12 months, and in particular, the first half of the season.

"I think a few of our lads could be featured," says club captain Stuart Gray. "David Platt must be a contender for the main award and I'd expect Tony Daley and Ian Olney to be in the running for the Young Player. In fact, 'Platty' could be in for both because he's still only 23."

"Any nomination would be a bonus and a compliment for what the team has achieved so far. The votes went in a month ago - a strange time in the season, really - and the one restriction is that you can't name players from your own club."

"Most of the lads here have gone for Matthew Le Tissier or Rod Wallace for the Young Player and there's support for John Barnes for the Players' Player because he's had such an outstanding season."

"The timing can be very important. I was reading an article about Peter Beardsley in which he said that for some reason he always seems to play better after Christmas. He's been playing out of his skin recently but maybe it has come too late for the awards."

In the past, Villa were honoured when Andy Gray won both major awards in 1977 and again when Gary Shaw was Young Player in 1981.

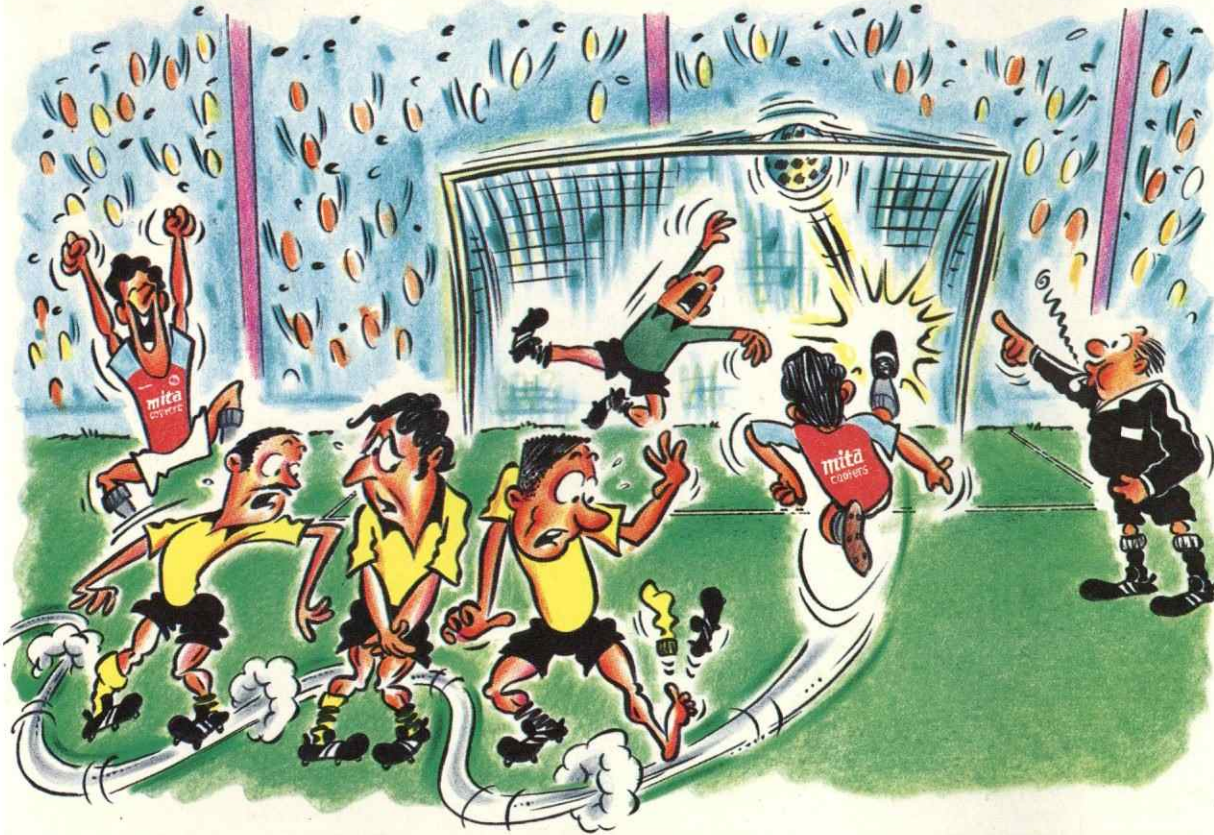

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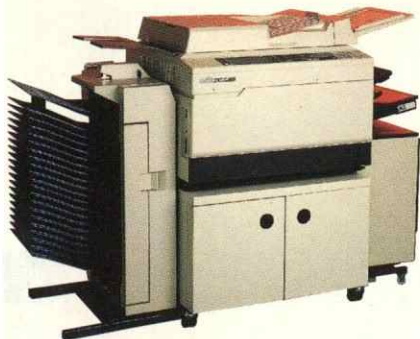

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MATCH FOCUS

There was a touch of irony about Ian Olney's first league goal for Villa, not least the fact it came against his home town club on April Fool's day last year!

For Ian was born in Luton and spent the first eight years of his life living there before moving to Gloucestershire.

"I still regard it as my second home because a lot of family friends and relatives still live there," he said.

"They were the first club I supported - my dad used to take me to watch them back in the days when the Futchers brothers were playing there - and even now I always keep an eye out for their results.

"So it was a bit special for me to get my first goal against them in that 2-0 win at Villa Park."

At the time Villa had gone eight games without a win and were slipping deeper into trouble near the bottom of the table.

"I'd come on as a substitute and will always remember Nigel Callaghan getting in the cross which I managed to knock back into the corner of the net," said Ian.

But even though he's Villa's second top scorer with 11 goals this season, he hasn't hit one in the league since scoring against



Manchester United on Boxing Day.

"I've had a couple in the Cup but would obviously love to get another one against Luton today.

"They may be down at the wrong end of the table but that will only make them all the more determined to get something out of today's game.

"It's a bonus game for us really seeing as we were originally due to have been playing in the Cup. After messing things up the way we did against Wimbledon in our last home game, let's just hope we make the most of it."

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LUTON TOWN

A DAY-BY-DAY DIARY

One of the most successful chapters in Luton Town's history effectively closed in January during a run of 11 games without a win.

With the squad seriously weakened by injuries and suspensions, the League position was giving cause for concern when manager Ray Harford departed shortly after a New Year's Day defeat at Everton.

In two-and-a-half years at Kenilworth Road, he was involved in three cup finals and steered The Hatters to a first-ever Wembley triumph against Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup in 1988.

Last year's Littlewoods defeat by Nottingham Forest was followed by a late dash for safety in the League, but the problems returned this season as Luton slipped to second from bottom at the time of the management change.

Mr Harford's assistant, Terry Mancini, was put in charge for one match and then the club made a permanent appointment by promoting Jim Ryan from the coaching staff.

A 44-year-old Scot from Stirling, he won a European Cup medal as a non-playing substitute with Manchester United prior to joining Luton in 1970. He was a member of their promotion-winning team in 1974.

Mr Ryan was given the toughest possible start to his new job with a trip to Liverpool, but The Hatters took a point at Anfield and later went to Wimbledon to register their first away win in 23 attempts.

We begin our diary of their 1989-90 highlights with a look at the news from last summer...

■ JUNE

14 Former England midfielder Ricky Hill joins the French club, Le Havre ... Ashley Grimes has also moved abroad on a free transfer to Escuda.

■ JULY

3 Mr Mancini, a former Arsenal and Republic of Ireland defender, is appointed assistant manager after working on a part-time basis since April.

12 Steve Foster, a successful captain since arriving from Villa in 1984, departs to Oxford in a deal worth £175,000.

26 A League Tribunal fixes a fee of £150,000, plus £100,000 after 60 appearances, for Coventry defender Graham Rodger.

■ AUGUST

16 Mick Harford will miss the start of the season because of a second ankle operation in three months.

17 Leicester's £300,000-rated midfielder Mick Kennedy moves to Kenilworth Road with full back Rob Johnson going to Filbert Street in part-exchange.

19 Kennedy makes his debut in an opening League defeat at Tottenham ... Former Everton 'keeper Alec Chamberlain, who took over from Les Sealey in April, retains the No 1 spot.

21 Lars Elstrup, scorer of eight goals in 12 internationals for Denmark, is signed from Odense for a club record £600,000.

22 New captain Danny Wilson scores in a 2-0 win against Sheffield Wednesday.

26 Elstrup appears as substitute in a goalless game at home to Liverpool.

■ SEPTEMBER

9 With Steve Williams sidelined after a cartilage operation, Elstrup is in the starting line-up for the first time as Charlton are beaten by a Wilson penalty.

19 Williams, out for less than three weeks, returns in a Littlewoods Cup win at Mansfield.

23 A costly point against Wimbledon ... Centre back Darron McDonough dislocates a shoulder and Kennedy faces suspension after being sent off.

■ OCTOBER

2 Former British Aerospace engineer Iain Dowie learns that he is in Northern Ireland's World Cup squad while on loan to Fulham.

3 Elstrup scores his first hat-trick in English football as Luton make it 11 goals in two legs against Mansfield.

14 Rodger is given his League debut but The Hatters are beaten by Derek Mountfield's goal for Villa.

21 Norwich lose their 11-match unbeaten record from the start of the season in a 4-1 mauling at Kenilworth Road.

24 Hopes of a third successive Littlewoods Cup Final disappear with a 3-0 defeat at Everton.

28 McDonough dislocates his shoulder for a second time during a 1-1 draw at Millwall.

■ NOVEMBER

4 Dowie replaces the injured Roy Wegerle and scores his first goal in Division One to clinch victory over Derby.

18 Luton are now without all three senior centre backs as Dave Beaumont (ankle) joins McDonough and Rodger on the injured list ... Full back John Dreyer partners 21-year-old Marvin Johnson in a home defeat by Manchester United.

25 The troubles continue when Johnson limps off with a twisted ankle in a 6-3

Much of this work has received help from The Football Trust. Each year the organisation receives over £9.5 million from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettlers and spends it on projects that benefit all levels of the game throughout the United Kingdom.

Not a Brit in sight as our top stars limp along in comparative poverty, lucky if they can get near to the 'derisory' £100,000 mark.

Money apart, a big, big topic in the

press has been that of grounds, new ones or re-vamped ones that is.

Since the 'all-seater' warning came in clubs have had to study not merely the immediate future but the demands of the year 2,000 and beyond.

Local papers came up with a supply of information about Villa's plans.

"VILLA RIP DOWN HOLTE END FENCES," announced Ian Willars' piece in the Evening Mail.

"Our team is top of the league and we want to see our supporters top of their league, too," explained chairman Doug Ellis in placing them on trust.

Three days later Willars' colleague Leon Hickman had an 'Exclusive' tag on a story under the banner: "NEW STADIUM AT COVENTRY".

This revealed that the FA are considering a plan to build a new national stadium, to replace Wembley, in partnership with Coventry City and near the junction of the M6-M69. Somewhat confusing that because the Council were thought to be near agreements with the FA for a similar scheme at Bickenhill.

Hickman's article explained: "The site to the east of Coventry could be just as

ideally placed as the NEC where the concept could founder on two details."

More recently the 'Express and Star', in Wolverhampton, came up with details of a scheme to convert Villa Park to an all-seater stadium in line with proposed government policy.

Villa have certainly been a newsworthy target for the press in recent months with no stone unturned, as the saying goes.

The Birmingham Post got into the act with a story about plans for a new pitch.

"Chairman Doug Ellis has called in a Scottish firm of turf specialists and plans are afoot to relay the whole surface in the coming summer."

Michael Ward's story added: "...problems with drainage compounded by the recent bad weather, have been blamed for the steady deterioration this season and the club are determined to rectify matters as soon as possible."

The moral of the story is that if British clubs are restricting wage bills to sensible proportions while investing in future safety, comfort and convenience for those who ultimately fund the wage bills, then it is an encouraging sign that common sense will prevail.

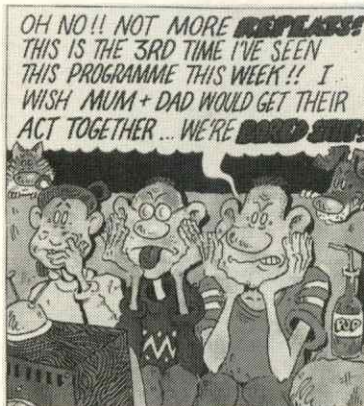

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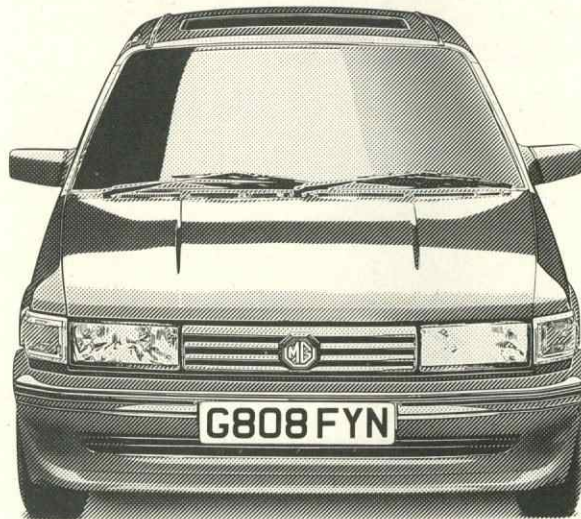

■ **Ian Baird** is to miss a Wembley appearance with his new club, Middlesbrough, but he's still expecting a medal at the end of the season.

The £500,000 striker played 24 games for Leeds United before moving to Ayresome Park and is confident that his old club will land the Second Division championship.

He says: "Barring accidents, I can't see any reason why they won't win it by five to ten points. And I'll be qualified for a medal."

Baird is ineligible for the Simod Cup Final and his priority is to make sure that Boro stay in the Second Division in a relegation struggle which could well involve as many as eight or nine clubs.

"As far as I'm concerned," says Baird, "the main thing is to get 50 points. That means you are safe."

■ **Sheffield Wednesday's** highly-rated goalkeeper, **Kevin Pressman**, has changed his transport that he can stay mobile while recovering from injury.

With his left leg in plaster after tearing a knee ligament away from the bone, Pressman couldn't operate the clutch pedal in his car but solved the problem by buying a replacement with an automatic gearbox. He is making good progress under the care of club physio Alan Smith, who has been appointed to work with the England B team as well as being placed on stand-by for the medical squad at the World Cup.

■ **Doncaster Rovers' injury-hit** goalkeeper, **Paul Malcolm**, could be forgiven for wondering if the fates turned against him on the day he declined a move to Darlington last April.

The former Barnsley and Shrewsbury understudy attracted a £20,000 bid but decided to stay because he was enjoying his first season at Doncaster so much.

Only a few days later, he suffered a complicated leg fracture which had to be pinned by a ten-inch plate. He is now resigned to hanging up his boots at the age of 25 and the club are to arrange a Testimonial game for him.

Meanwhile, Doncaster are celebrating a bargain transfer which could put Black Country-born striker John

Muir at Wembley only three months after leaving the Beazer Homes League. After being signed from Dudley Town for £5,000, Muir went straight into Doncaster's first team for a successful debut against Halifax in the Leyland DAF Cup. Now a Wembley chance hinges on two legs against Tranmere Rovers in the Northern Area Final.

Muir, 27 in April, played for Willenhall and Worcester before striking it rich with 85 goals in 117 appearances for Dudley.

But he nearly missed his big day with Doncaster. He narrowly avoided a pile-up in front of him while driving north and was delayed for two hours until the road was cleared. This meant he was too late for a matchday training session and it was only in the hour before kick-off that he met some of his new team-mates for the first time.

■ **Wally Downes**, a Wimbledon regular on their climb from the Fourth Division, has taken up an appointment at Millwall as reserve coach in new manager Bob Pearson's backroom team. Downes followed former Dons boss Dave Bassett to Sheffield United two years ago but had to retire with an ankle injury and moved back to London to play in non-League football.

■ **Les Chapman** was quickly reminded of the uncertainty of football management on becoming caretaker at Preston following the departure of John McGrath. The Deepdale club lost 6-0 at Reading in his first match but bounced back a week later with a hat-trick by winger Steve Harper in a 4-0 win against Cardiff. In between the two games, Mr Chapman signed John Thomas from Albion for £50,000 for his second spell with Preston. And his arrival coincided with the end of a five-match losing sequence.

■ **Bradford City** dropped into the bottom three in Division Two in a seven-match run without a win. With relegation worries building up, former Leeds and England defender Norman Hunter was replaced as first-team coach by Arthur Graham, the ex-Leeds and Scotland winger who was previously in charge of the youth squad.

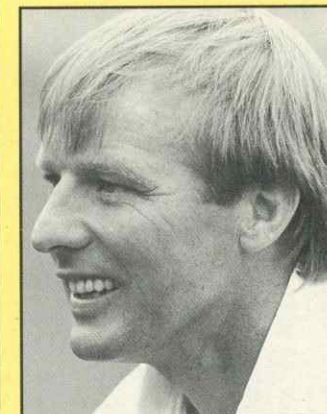
■ **OPR** applied for a work permit for Nigerian striker **Dominic Iorfa** after agreeing a fee of £120,000 for his transfer from the Belgian club, Royal Antwerp.

The 6ft 4ins-tall Iorfa was on trial with Sheffield United last month. He scored in a Central League match at Coventry but The Blades decided that the fee was too high. Manager Dave Bassett said: "A gamble of that size for someone who could not go straight into our side was too much for us to undertake."

■ The recruitment of overseas players continued with a West Ham debut for Czechoslovakia's World Cup goalkeeper, **Ludek Miklosko**, who cost a reported £300,000 from Banik Ostrava. This gave The Hammers another international 'keeper in addition to Phil Parkes, capped once by England in 1974, and Allen McKnight, who was first-choice for Northern Ireland until losing his club place a year ago.

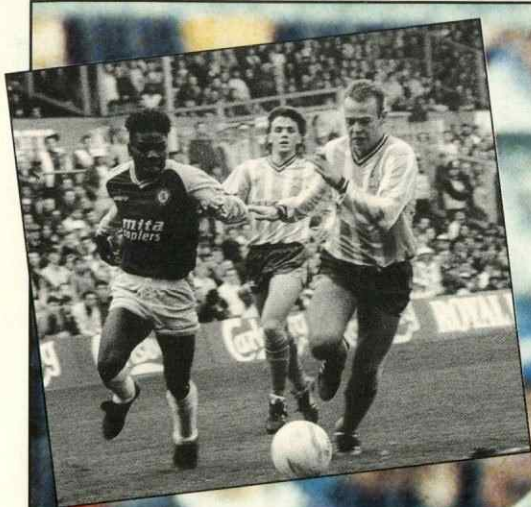
■ A number of clubs have opened up connections with the **Soviet Union**. Ipswich led the way last season by signing Sergei Baltacha and now Brighton have taken on midfielder Sergei Gotsmanov from Dynamo Minsk and Southampton have bought defender Alexei Cherednik from Dnepr.

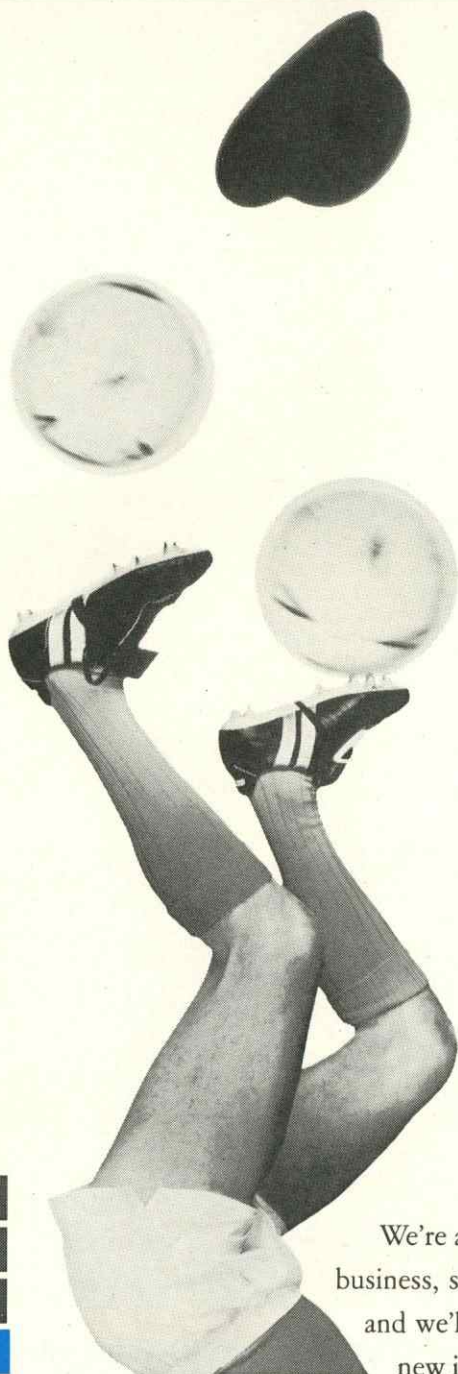

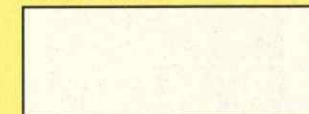

IN SEARCH OF THE LIONS

Eric Woodward (pictured right) continues his series of interviews with former Villa players. This week he talks to Harry Burrows.

It can now be revealed, 16 years too late, that Harry Burrows almost became an Aston Villa player for the second time in 1973.

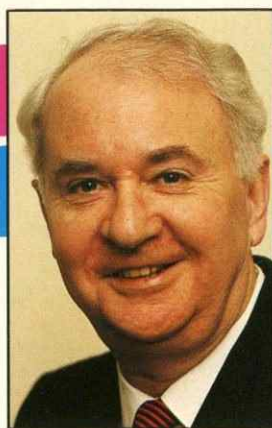
The story emerged when talking to this popular winger with the explosive left foot from his pub, The Rising Sun, Scholar Green, North Staffs.

Harry, you may remember, spent five years on first team duty at Villa Park after signing for the club on his birthday in March, 1958.

In all he played 181 games and scored 73 goals in this period and his tremendous

shooting prowess always raised a ripple of excitement whenever he was on the ball. In fact, it was quite a surprise when he left the club in March 1965 for Stoke City.

Burrows explained: "I didn't really want to go. I had been very happy at Villa and enjoyed my time there, but I left, in the end on a matter of principle. The club had just signed Johnny MacLeod from Arsenal and I was recently married. I wanted an extra fiver in my wage packet and was turned down.



"Now it was obvious that MacLeod was coming to Villa Park for a better basic wage than I had been given, and I thought I was worth more. The club wouldn't budge so I thought it was better to go elsewhere.

"To Stoke City, where they gave me £15 more on my basic wage. In fact, I had only been there two months when the manager, Tony Waddington, called me into his office, ripped my contract up and gave me a new one with an extra fiver. So I was £20 a week better off within two months of leaving Villa Park, and for a smaller club. I never could work that out..."

Burrows had a successful time with Stoke, surrounded as he was by a lot of mature talent, and in his eight years at the Victoria Ground scored almost 80 goals in around 270 games.

From there, he went to Plymouth Argyle which was his last league club, but how he got to the West Country is another matter altogether.

The then Villa manager, Vic Crowe, told me "Harry was always a better player than he was given credit for and when we were re-building the team and noticed he was available at Stoke, we moved in. But Tony Waddington wanted £30,000 and I thought it was too much at that stage in his career."

Burrows admits: "I would have loved to have gone back to Villa Park. I had played with Vic during my time there, and my wife is a Birmingham girl, so it would have been just right for us. The trouble was that Tony Waddington did not want me to go to another Midland club.

"In the end, I had a choice of going to Portsmouth, Carlisle United or Plymouth – presumably sufficiently distanced from the Midlands. And I went on a free transfer."

Burrows would have stayed with Villa as long as they would have wanted him, but for that £5 difference. "Sounds a bit pitiful these days, I suppose, but an extra fiver was badly needed as a newly married man, and I felt I had no alternative but to go."

Harry Burrows is one of the quiet ones. He speaks with a soft Lancashire accent and played for the same school team as Walter Hazelden, the well-built lad who set a new villa record as the youngest first

team player in the club's history, a record since overtaken by Jimmy Brown.

Burrows is also something of a surprise. When he was forcibly taken out of football by a recurring knee problem, he decided to stay in one place for a while.

"The kids were growing up and I felt we needed a little more stability, so I looked for something. Eventually I gained a Class 1 HGV licence and started a transport business with three articulated lorries.

"The recession in the late 70s became too much of a difficulty, and although I am a qualified F.A. coach, I didn't want to stay in football – so I became licensee of The Rising Sun."

It proved a happy turn in his life, and he is particularly proud that his children have done so well with their education.

The eldest son (now 24) graduated from Lancaster University with a degree in Physics and Electronics, their daughter is in her final year at Norwich University and the youngest son will be at University from next term studying politics and business management.

Harry is doing a spot of teaching himself. "It's only part-time" he said. "I teach at a local Education Centre on Do-it-yourself crafts. I was a painter and decorator for my Dad before I took up football, so I'm quite used to it."

He rarely goes to see Villa or Stoke these days. "It all seems a bit too predictable for me. And although I am

an F.A. coach I think coaches must bear some of the responsibility. There are too few kids coming into the game and too many youngsters have had too much coaching. It all seems so regimented and footballers really do have a duty to the public to entertain."

Harry Burrows comes from Haydock. "It's Rugby League country in that part of the world and, to be frank, I get more pleasure nowadays out of watching that than soccer."

Meantime, Burrows is happy at The Rising Sun, and bought the tenancy about four years ago. If you are going north on the A34 sometime, he'd be delighted to see you. His pub is at Scholar Green, between Congleton and Stoke.

But if you are a Villa fan don't ask him what his most memorable moment in football was – because it happens to be the game when Stoke beat Villa 6-1.

And Harry, who left over a fiver, scored three of them.

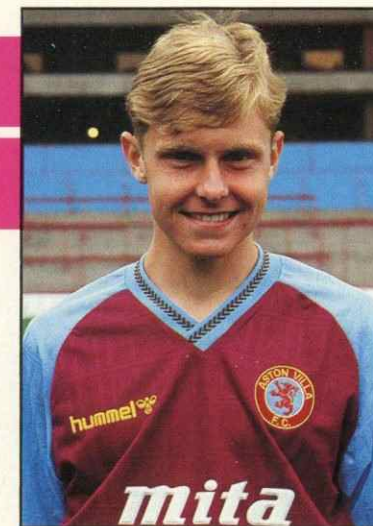
Last week's Central League match was postponed because Sheffield United were unable to raise a team, but the Reserves were scheduled for two games this week.

■ FENCE-LESS

Not defenceless ... but definitely fence-less: at our last match against Wimbledon fans were able to enjoy the freedom of the Holte End with no fence to impede the view.

The step has been taken as a demonstration of trust in supporters to help set a lead to the rest of the country in terms of common sense behaviour (see Steve Stride's message on the opposite page).

Since the Hillsborough tragedy perimeter fences have been systematically torn down by clubs around the League.

They do so in the knowledge that it encourages supporters to take on a responsible attitude in avoiding pitch invasions, the cause of their being erected in the first place.

Discussions are well in hand to bring about the necessary up-grading of Villa Park for the future.

No schemes have yet been finalised because of the complicated issues involved and the need for planning permission.

If legislation enforces seating on the Holte End the capacity of the ground will be vastly reduced and the roof will have to be significantly extended.

To make up for the loss of capacity an extra deck could perhaps be added on to the Witton Lane Stand but such

possibilities are merely in the 'possibility' stage.

One project which looks likely to go ahead is the up-grading of the pitch which has deteriorated from its former excellence due to unfavourable weather and years of usage.

Experts are being consulted and if their verdict is that a new pitch should be created then the work will be carried out in the close season.

■ LIGHT-LESS

Another Villa Park feature was removed as the floodlight at the junction of the Trinity Road and North Stands was recently dismantled and taken away (see pictures).

The demolition is part of the preparation for the construction of a hotel and new offices, work on which will be starting soon.

In effect, the loss of that particular light is not a problem. Fact is that

much of its benefit was falling on the roof of the stand, anyway!

As part of the new development the floodlighting question will be comprehensively covered.

■ GOOD SCOUTS

Eleven of the club's valued scouts around the country were entertained at Villa Park a fortnight ago.

RICHARD MONEY

Villa's youth policy was the bedrock of a successful club when players such as Cowans, Deehan, Gibson, Gidman, Hunt, Little, Shaw and Williams rolled off the conveyor belt in the 1970s.

And maybe it was no coincidence that the slump towards the Second Division began as the junior supply line dried up in later years.

While it's true that Tony Daley and Ian Olney emerged in difficult times, Graham Taylor recognised that the set-up needed re-building from the foundations when he arrived at the club nearly three years ago.

Dave Richardson was brought back from Leicester to organise youth development and for two seasons he worked in tandem with Bobby Downes. When Bobby moved up to the reserve team, Richard Money was appointed as youth coach last October.

After five months at Villa Park, the former England B defender expresses "a great deal of satisfaction" with what he has seen at YTS level and looks forward to his part in establishing continuity over a long period.

"The work done in the last two years is now beginning to come to fruition," he says. "Boys coming in next season, and even more so those who will come in a year after, will have been at the club for two or three years."

"Obviously, this means they will be influenced into our way of thinking before they actually arrive at the club. This wasn't the case in the last two years because Dave Richardson had to take boys who had no previous connection with Villa. That isn't an ideal situation and it has taken two years to get that right."

"Now we are getting a flow through all the age groups. We are down to 11-year-olds and there's a good chance that we'll be getting some of these lads into the club in the next four or five years."

The target is always to find a new Gordon Cowans or a new Brian Little, but Richard's definition of a successful youth scheme is broader-based.

He explains: "If you find a first-team player every two years, you have done well, but it's not only about boys who are good enough for the first team. There will be others who we think are good enough to be professionals but may not

be first-team players here. That's when you know a youth policy is working."

"For instance, people might look at Liverpool and say that they rarely get a young lad into the first team. What they don't realise is that they have had a number of players they took on as professionals and who then went on to lesser clubs."

"Quite a lot of that goes on at Anfield and it's what we need to be doing. If we sign on three professionals every year, we will have a build-up of pros within five years."

They aren't all going to stay, but there will be a good base for the reserve team.

"We are talking about having five or six regulars in the reserves who may not get into the first team but who will have a good chance of making a living from the game. That's what we have got to aim for."

Richard began to think about a coaching career when an injury he suffered while playing for Portsmouth at Villa Park in 1983 left him with a "dodgy" knee.

He went back to his first club, Scunthorpe, as player-coach in the first team in 1985, and was invited to take up a new role when Mick Buxton became manager in 1987.

"I was still playing but had got to the stage where I knew my knee wouldn't let me do what I wanted," he says. "The new manager asked me to see what I could do about starting a youth policy."

"There was nothing whatsoever at that level when I began the job. At first, I had to bring in boys who were not signed by other clubs. Dave Richardson was one of the people who helped me a lot with lads he had not taken on. In the end, I had eight boys, six of whom had been at bigger clubs."

"It was a good grounding for me in that I had to do everything. If anything was needed, I had to do it."

Richard believes that young players would be all the better for seeing what life is like in the lower divisions. "I started off at Scunthorpe, worked my way to the top at Liverpool, then went back down and started coaching at the bottom. I honestly think that this experience has stood me in good stead."

"Boys who come from school to a club like Villa haven't got a clue about life in the Fourth Division. I'm not being critical because they were good enough to come to a club which is better able to look after them."

"The young pros certainly don't realise what goes on elsewhere, although this is probably less so with the YTS players because their general duties are much the same at any club."

Richard was looking to climb the coaching ladder in the way that his playing career progressed with a £45,000 move from Scunthorpe to Fulham and then a £330,000 transfer to Liverpool.

The opportunity to join Villa represented a completely fresh challenge in a new set-up. As he said: "Different clubs have different ways of doing things, and the one thing that I knew would happen was that the manager would let me get on with it. That's how it has been; he has allowed me to do what I want to in training."

"The YTS scheme in football is the same as in any industry. We have to teach boys basic techniques and then put them through different styles and different systems."

"That doesn't mean moving them into different positions. If we know a player can play in two or three positions, then that's useful to me and beneficial to the boy. But with the majority, we have an idea where they should play and try to keep to that and not complicate things."

"I have played with a sweeper but I tend to think that 4-4-2 is the best way to teach youngsters."

Richard is pleased with the standard he has found here but is understandably cautious in assessing first-team potential. "Let's say that I would be disappointed if there isn't a player in this squad who will go on and make a reasonable living out of football."

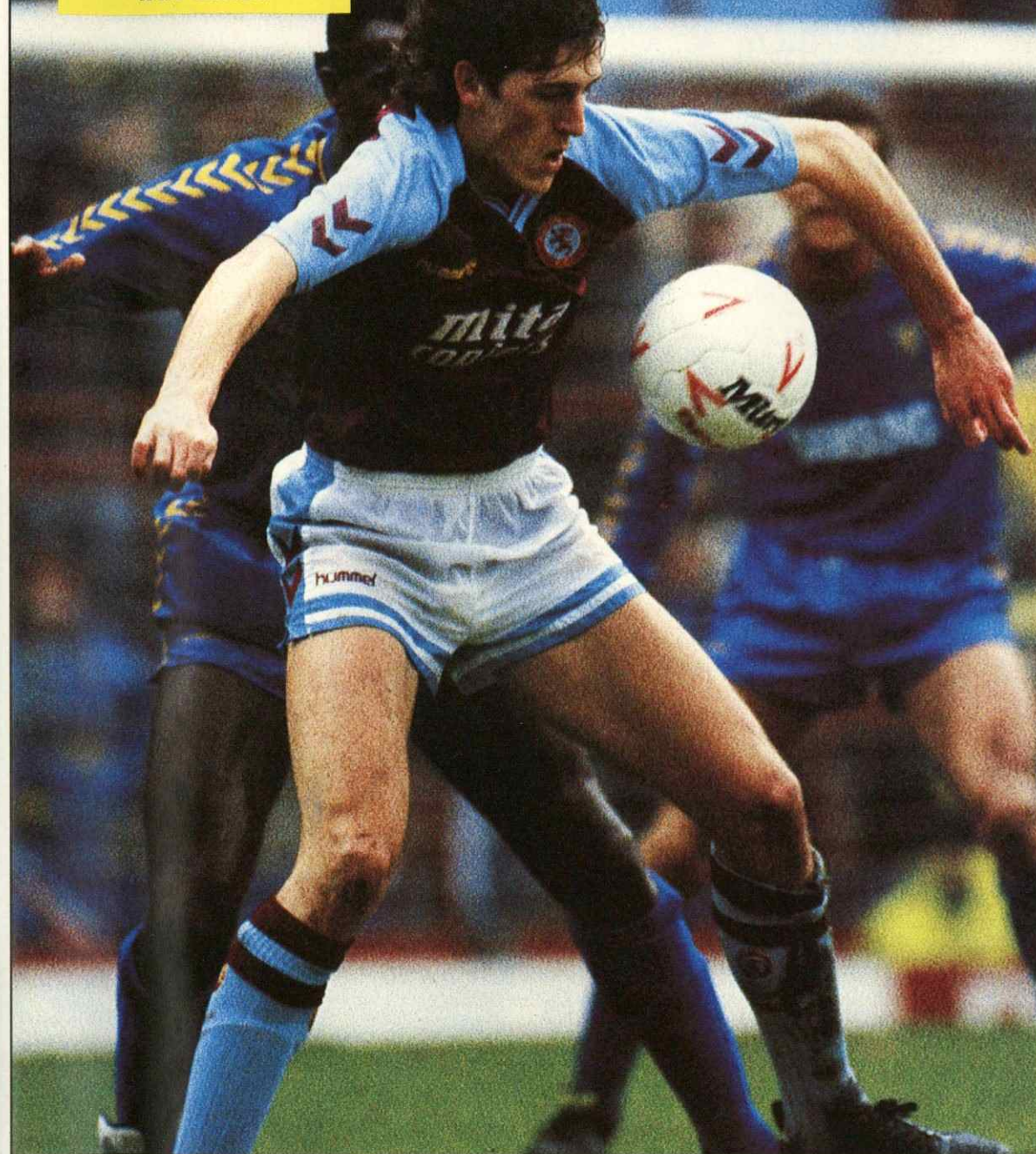
