

## Manager's Message

Since our last home game, we have played for two very big crowds at Maine Road, the home of Manchester City Football Club, and at Anfield, the home of Liverpool Football Club and our following at both these games was there in numbers and in excellent voice for all to hear. This was greatly appreciated by the players and the staff.

At Maine Road for the first time this season in the Football League we played with a sweeper, our Captain Mark Wright filling this role, also taking time-off from his defensive duties to score the winning goal from a free-kick taken by Michael Forsyth, with a superb downward header. Manchester City were a form team in the First Division when we arrived there and throughout, as expected, we were forced to defend very resolutely as a team and responded magnificently to all the questions their football asked us.

Our game at Anfield was surrounded before, during and after with emotion which is special only to Anfield and I was very disappointed for the players and supporters that we did not share the points. Once again Liverpool Football Club are League Champions and they will again, next season, be the team we must finish above to win the League.

I must make a special mention following these two games and the coming World Cup finals on the form of Peter Shilton. His performances in these two games were special for all the football supporters present. I sincerely hope this form continues for many years to come, because if I were Team Manager of any of the Countries competing in the World Cup finals, I would certainly sleep easy knowing he is my last line of defence. The reception given to him by the Kop was very touching and greatly appreciated by him and

Derby County Football Club. It is also my opinion that, if Mark Wright is included in any of the championship games, he will also produce performances to make Derby

County supporters even more proud of him than they already are, because his form this season has been a revelation. Whilst in this vein, I am genuinely sorry that due to injury, Ted McMinn will not be going with Scotland, because

I felt his form when injured would certainly have got him into their squad. I am also very disappointed for George Williams and Dean Saunders that they will not be going, when you think of the players of which their squad consists. Their performance for Derby County this season would have certainly made them important members of the Welsh squad.

We have had more than our share of serious injuries and I would like to pay tribute to the rest of the senior players for the way they have responded to helping young and very inexperienced players through this mean period — Rob Hindmarch, Michael Harford, Michael Forsyth and Mel Sage, and to the youngsters that have come in and had a taste of it — only the future will tell how much they have enjoyed it and how much more they want of it.

I would like to thank each and every one of you for your loyal and very genuine support during this difficult period we have just experienced.

COVER SHOT: To every cloud there's a silver lining or so the saying goes. Our youngsters have grabbed their chances this season and have been a credit to the Club. Paul Williams, in action recently against Everton, is one of many who can look back with pride on his progress. But he will know this is just the first stage of his professional career.


# Rambling Around...

Our photograph shows Frank McArdle and President Pat Yates presenting Ernie with a pennant as a token of their appreciation.






### STEVE'S DOING FINE

## What a Season that was!



This week  
we focus on  
season  
**1896-97**

The Rams had something to live up to as they had finished runners-up in the League and reached the semi-finals of the F.A. Cup, for the first time in 1895-96. It was Derby County's first season at their new home, the Baseball Ground.

This season did not start too well with a 0-1 reverse away to Wolves, followed by a 1-1 draw, here, with Nottingham Forest. A 0-2 away defeat to Liverpool, left the Rams with just one point from the first three fixtures. The first victory of the season came in the fourth game with a 4-3 home win in the return against Wolves, with Steve Bloomer scoring all four goals. He followed this with a hat-trick as the Rams defeated Bury 7-2 at the Baseball Ground.

That completed September, but the successes were isolated as the Rams lost the first three games in October. The first two were both at home, and by the same score 1-3 to Sheffield United and Aston Villa. Villa completed the 'double' over the Rams with a 2-1 victory, before the Rams gained their only point in that month with a 2-2 draw away to Sheffield United.

Conversely November saw the Rams gain four successive victories. Home successes of 5-1 and 3-2 against Stoke and Burnley respectively were followed by a 2-1 win away to Nottingham Forest. The Rams continued this good form with a 6-0 home win over Blackburn Rovers with Stevenson scoring four times. Sheffield Wednesday spoilt the month with a 2-0 home win over the Rams.

December proved fruitful with an away draw 2-2 at Stoke, and three successive wins. They were all at home with Liverpool (3-2), West Bromwich Albion (8-1), including a Bloomer hat-trick, and Bolton Wanderers 1-0.

The good form carried on into the New Year with further wins 2-1 away at Sunderland and a similar scoreline at home to Sheffield Wednesday. The Rams then lost their first game in seven with a 2-5 reverse at Blackburn. They finished the month with a 1-0 home win over Sunderland, and an 8-1 success over Barnsley St. Peter's, in the first round of the F.A. Cup. Bloomer once again scored a hat-trick, and repeated the feat in the next round as the Rams defeated Bolton Wanderers 4-1. That fixture came a week after the Rams had opened February with a 4-1 away win against West Bromwich Albion, with goals from Archie Goodall two,

Johnny Goodall and Steve Bloomer. The only other game in February was the third round F.A. Cup tie against Newton Heath, at the Baseball Ground. Goals by Bloomer and McQueen saw the Rams through to the semi-finals, with a 2-0 victory.

March started with a 3-1 away win at Bolton, and was followed two weeks later with the semi-final. Everton were the opposition in a game played at the Victoria Ground Stoke-on-Trent. The two Goodalls scored for the Rams who went down 2-3. The final game of the month was at home to Preston North End, and ended in a 2-2 draw.

So that left the final five games in April, four of which were away from home. The Rams won the first at Burnley by 3-2, but lost the next two, at Bury and Everton, 0-1 and 2-5 respectively. The last away game was safely negotiated with a 2-0 victory. However, Everton scored a 1-0 win at the Baseball Ground, and the season ended with the Rams in third place.

Luton Town were elected to the Football League Division Two in 1897.



Mark Wright levelled (top pic) but the game was put beyond our reach by a spectacular Kevin Sheedy left-foot thunderbolt.



## 1,000 for the Rams? and 'George' reaches 250

If the Rams can end the season, in the grand manner, and defeat fellow strugglers Luton Town, the team will record the 1,000th home win in the Football League. The first home victory, in the League, came on December 22, 1888, with a 3-2 success against Notts County. The Rams had won their first ever League fixture, 6-3 away to Bolton Wanderers, on September 8, 1888, and had to wait until the Notts game, the 12th match of the season, for their second victory. That win brought to an end a dismal run of eight successive defeats.

In the first three seasons, when 22 games were played, the best return for the Rams, came in 1889-90, with eight wins out of the 11 home fixtures. By season 1893-94, the First Division had been extended to 16 clubs and of the 15 home fixtures the Rams won nine and finished 3rd in the table. In 1895 they left their home, the County Ground, for pastures new, the Baseball Ground. The move seemed to do them good as they finished runners-up in the League, and reached their first ever F.A. Cup semi-final. The transformation was remarkable, as the Rams had to endure a Test Match against Second Division Notts County, in order to preserve their First Division status, at the end of 1894-95. In achieving their second placing the Rams had won 12 of their 15 home fixtures, the first time they had reached double figures in this respect.

The Rams continued to reach double figures, in terms of home wins, through to 1902-03. From 1898-99, they played 17 home games due to a further extension of the League. They achieved 13 home wins in 1902-03, losing and drawing two of the remaining four games. As they won only three games away from home the club could only finish in mid-table. There was a further extension to 20 clubs in the First Division, in 1905-06, but the Rams were to lose their First Division status the following season, with only eight wins in 19 home games, and only one away success.

In five seasons of Second Division football, the Rams achieved 'double' figures of home wins. In three of those seasons, starting in 1907-08, they reached a new high of 15 home wins, out of the

19 fixtures. That figure was backed up with eight away wins in 1911-12 as the Rams won the Second Division championship.

Following the First World War, the League was again extended with 22 clubs in the First and Second Divisions. The Rams were soon back in the Second Division, but returned to the First Division in 1925-26, accumulating 17 home wins, in the process. That figure was not achieved again until 1948-49, when the Rams finished in third place in the First Division. That total of 17 home wins in a season, is still the best that the Rams have achieved at First or Second Division level. The highest number of home wins, in the League was achieved in 1955-56, and

1956-57, in the old Third Division (North). The Rams played 23 home games in each of those seasons, winning 18 games at the Baseball Ground. A win today would also take the Rams into double figures, at home for this season. It would also be the first time that the Rams had reached double figures, in the First Division, since 1977-78. Since then the only seasons where the Rams have had such a good return from their home fixtures were the first three under Arthur Cox's management, in the Third and Second Divisions.

Last Saturday, Geraint Williams played his 250th competitive game for Derby County. He became the 42nd player to reach this milestone, and when playing his 247th game, the 2-0 home win over Millwall, he overtook former goalkeeper Reg Matthews. He has missed only one game since the Rams returned to the First Division, and that was in order to attend the birth of his son. Geraint is the first Rams' player to achieve 250, since Steve Buckley in 1984. Therefore, he also the first under present management.

In his first two seasons and 12 games, since his signing in March 1985, Geraint missed only 11 fixtures in the Third and Second Divisions, when he played in 112 of the 123 competitive games, two of his appearances being as substitute. Since the return of the Rams to the First Division, he has played in 138 of 139 competitive games. In total he has played in 250 of the Rams' last 262 competitive games up to and including last Saturday's fixture at Maine Road.





# Epic Encounters

The Rams had made a disastrous start to the season, with only one win in 15 League games. They had endured seven defeats in the previous eight fixtures, scoring just three goals, while conceding 17. Luton, like the Rams, struggling at the foot of the Second Division, had the boost of a 2-0 away win at Middlesbrough on the previous Saturday to give them confidence.

Derby Evening Telegraph reporter Wilf Shaw, said that 'previous attempts at 4-2-4 had left me cold'. However, on this

occasion it worked very well. Ray Young was the equivalent of an extra centre-half or full-back, so that the Luton attack was nullified before it could do any damage in the Rams' penalty area. In order for the plan to be effective, Phil Waller and Jack Parry, had to work that much harder in midfield. They succeeded in prompting the Rams' attacks, and covering the ground, leaving Ray Young in a purely defensive role. The plan worked because Parry 'paced his contribution over an exacting 90 minutes', while Waller 'gave every ounce of energy his young body could muster.'

The Rams poor finishing robbed them of a bigger margin of victory, as Waller and Parry dominated the midfield area and kept the forwards going with a plentiful supply of the ball. For long periods it looked as though the Rams' domination would go

unrewarded, but the goals eventually came, the first in the 73rd minute. Bill Curry scored his first goal, since September 22. Roby had been unlucky heading against an upright in 52 minutes, and Turner hit the foot of a post two minutes later. Early in the game McCann showed that he had the beating of McNally but did not always put this advantage to good use. Roby's was an improved performance, and it was his cross which provided Curry with a goal, albeit from a mishit shot on the turn.

Hutchinson, who had not scored since the end of August, scored a goal which showed his flair. Ron Baynham, who had an excellent game in the Hatters' goal, gave Hutchinson only the angle of crossbar and upright at which to aim. Hutchinson showed him the ball, tricked him into a false step and then sent the ball curling into the net. This reverse stung Luton into action and after Morton's shot had been blocked Turner pulled a goal back in 84 minutes. The Rams held on for a deserved victory. It was their first away win since the same combination of Curry and Hutchinson had given the Rams a 2-1 win at Brighton on December 9, 1961.

Young and Moore were solid down the middle, while Barrowcliffe and Ferguson stayed close to the Luton



# Turning the clock back...

5 YEARS AGO

The Rams' last game of the season, away to Newport, suddenly sprang to life in the last 20 minutes. Trevor Christie opened the scoring from the penalty spot. Then, five minutes later, top scorer Bobby Davison made it 2-0. It was his 26th goal of the season. Six minutes from the end, Graham Harbey extended our lead to 3-0. With three minutes to go, Tony Kellow pulled one back for Newport. The final score was 3-1. It meant we finished seventh in the Third Division.

10 YEARS AGO

By the time we played our last game of the season, away to Norwich, our fate had already been decided. The week before we had beaten Manchester City 3-1. Crowned as Champions the week before, the Rams completed the League programme with a goalless draw at home to bottom club Carlisle, who had already been relegated to the Second Division. Our largest crowd of the season — 38,000 — celebrated the second League championship in three years.

Luton drew their final game at home to Manchester City 1-1. Jim Ryan, now the manager, scored the equaliser 18

20 YEARS AGO

John McGovern scored the goal that earned us a 1-1 draw at Southampton. We finished fourth in the First Division, though some distance behind Everton, the runaway Champions. We had not been beaten in our last 12 games.

Luton, already assured of promotion from the Third Division, won 2-1 at Rochdale. Viv Busby and Malcolm Macdonald scored the goals.

25 YEARS AGO

The Rams' final appearance of the season was at Huddersfield, where we lost 1-3. Joint top scorer Edward Thomas got our goal. Like Alan Durban, he had 24 for the season. We finished ninth in the Second Division.

The Rams: Boulton; Richardson, Ferguson, Webster, Barrowcliffe, Parry, Hughes, Hopkinson, Thomas, Durban, Bowers.

Luton, who drew 0-0 at Workington, were relegated to the Fourth Division.

Peter Shilton showed at Maine Road on Saturday that England's World Cup hopes could not be in better hands.

Another ageless demonstration of the goalkeeping art took Derby to First Division safety and left Manchester City manager Howard Kendall shaking his head in disbelief.

Kendall had Neville Southall as his last line of defence when he was at Everton, so he knows the importance of a quality keeper and he was quick to praise Shilton at the end of Derby's 1-0 win.

In the *Daily Star* (April 30th), Kendall and winger David White saluted the 40-year-old keeper.

"Veteran keeper Peter Shilton over the hill? You must be joking!"

"If you need any further proof that he's still 'Peter the Great' just ask Manchester City."

"The Derby and England goalkeeper, just six months short of his 41st birthday, made the impossible look simple in the 1-0 win at Maine Road.

"Not bad . . . he's quite promising," mused City boss Howard Kendall after seeing Shilton turn on yet another vintage show between the posts.

"City's flying winger David White was repeatedly deprived by the staggering agility of World Cup bound Shilton and rightly enthused: "He's just so hard to beat. He made some really good saves and had a marvellous game."

The *Daily Mail* (April 30th) also applauded Shilton and centre-half Mark Wright who grabbed a later winner.

"It should have been a celebration for Manchester City. Instead it turned into a World Cup warm-up for Peter Shilton and Mark Wright."

"England's legendary goalkeeper and their second-choice central defender — currently the best in the country — were magnificent against a team determined to avenge a 6-0 defeat by Derby last November.

"That was City's worst beating in 20 years and spelled the end for manager Mel Machin. Since then Derby have struggled against overwhelming injuries and City have gained shape and confidence under Machin's successor, Howard Kendall.

"Derby, still at half-strength, could not hold back City's attacking waves, but Wright stood like a rock against them.

"City's most effective raiding came from winner David White, but he found Shilton looming whenever he opened fire."

The defence shone in Manchester, but against Millwall, it was the heading power of Mick Harford which ended the Londoner's brief spell in the top flight.

As the *Mail on Sunday* (April 15) reported: "Two-goal Mick Harford dispelled any lingering hopes of Derby's relegation fears — and doomed Millwall to the Second Division.

"Harford, who has scored twice in 13 games following his £500,000 move from

Luton, gave injury-ravaged Derby something to smile about in a season that threatened to collapse in alarming fashion.

"Derby, without a win in seven games, emerged from a first half to forget in triumph to leave Harford admitting: "We were desperate for the points — just as Millwall were."

But the next week, Norwich reversed the scoreline although Derby could have taken something from an entertaining game with sharper finishing, as the *Sunday Telegraph* (April 22) recognised.

"Derby are surely safe from relegation, but

their battle against a crippling casualty list has

taken its toll and yesterday an inventive

Norwich side condemned them to an eighth

home defeat.

"The loss of so many first-team players in recent months has left gaps which no amount of commitment and youthful enthusiasm can fill.

"Even so, had Saunders been at his predatory best, they could have earned a more tangible reward."



side of that time," said Trevor.

"He was such an exciting player who could simply score goals from just about anywhere. In my team he would be given a free role to move out of midfield and get forward as much as he liked.

"As for George Best, well perhaps not many people would agree but I think it was his temperament that made him such a great player. If it had been different, he probably would not have had the same flair.

"In fact he probably did as much for the game in the short spell he was involved than if he had been playing for ten years more."

Closely followed on the sheet, after that impressive duo, is another name synonymous with skill, pedigree and class, albeit in a different field, and that is Trevor's choice of goalkeeper — Peter Shilton.

"At present Shilton and Neville Southall are the two best goalkeepers in the country but Peter has the edge because he has been at the top and has achieved consistently high standards for 20 years."

In defence, Hebbert's persistence with ball-players continues, except perhaps for the right-back slot. With Alan Hansen and Colin Todd marshalling the middle and Terry Cooper free to raid down the left, Trevor has named former Liverpool stalwart Tommy Smith in the number 2 shirt "for a bit of extra bite".

Smith's merit is in winning the ball and perhaps the only criticism you could level at Hansen and Todd is that neither of them are known for their tackling, but Trevor believes their pace would see them through.

Alongside Best and Charlton in the middle of the park Trevor has picked Monaco's Glen Hoddle and former Saints man Alan Ball. Two players who like to knock it around but, according to Trevor, it was Ball that had the edge in that department.

"Alan could pass the ball in his mind

even before he had received it at his foot. His passing and awareness were amazing and he was such a competitor he tried to lift the whole team."

Kevin Keegan gets one of the front line places alongside Peter Osgood, "I think they would complement each other brilliantly. Keegan's partnership with John Toshack at Liverpool is legendary but Osgood had more skill than Toshack.

"He was a big centre forward that would win the ball in the air and never be found wanting physically, but for a big man he had a lot of skill on the deck as well and possessed the most brilliant touch."

Trevor has picked a side with only one guiding rule: "I wanted a side that I would want to watch play. Perhaps it isn't the most balanced but I certainly would not mind being its manager, certainly the ability is there to win the League."

And what about the fact he has so few of his contemporaries in the side? "I haven't gone out of my way to pick a side from the past. They are all players who have impressed me with skill and certainly John Barnes was not far away from making the side."

Is it just an excuse, or has the game really lost so many of its so-called characters? The 'things aren't what they used to be' brigade will no doubt be nodding their heads, but has British football really out-paced skill, artistry and imagination?

A quick look at Derby midfielder Trevor Hebbert's team of all-stars and you could easily be forgiven for starting to nod yourself. Despite Trevor still being a key player in League football, he has gone for a team that contains no fewer than eight players from yesteryear.

And not just any old players either. Trevor, who likes to pass the ball around himself, has gone for a team of entertainers.

There is a strong influence from the elegant Southampton team that Lawrie McMenemy built and in which Trevor himself played a part, but the first names on his team-sheet come from a golden era in Manchester United's past — Best and Charlton.

Trevor claims not to have a real footballing hero as such, but the former Oxford United playmaker admits to George Best and Bobby Charlton being the closest things to it.

"I was on holiday for much of the 1966 World Cup so I didn't see much of Charlton in that, but I can remember him from the great Manchester United

## THE SQUAD

**GOALKEEPER** — **Alec Chamberlain** was signed from Everton for £150,000 last season. A reserve player with Ipswich, he stepped into League soccer after a transfer to Colchester in 1982. Everton signed him for £75,000 in 1987, but after a loan spell with Tranmere last season, he moved on to Kenilworth Road.

**DEFENDERS** — Right back **Tim Brecker** is a former Luton apprentice who got his League chance in 1984. Within a couple of years, he was in the England Under-21 side, winning two caps. **Julian James**, who broke into the team in January as a centre half, is now playing at left back. He joined the club as a trainee and was introduced to First Division football two seasons ago. **John Dreyer**, who started the season at left back, is now playing at centre half. He was an apprentice at Oxford, but played League soccer while on loan to Torquay and Fulham before getting his chance in the Oxford side in 1986. Luton signed him for £140,000 in 1988. The other centre half is **Darren McDonough**, who has recently returned after a long lay-off through injury. He served his apprenticeship with Oldham, where he played over 200 first-team games prior to his £85,000 transfer to Luton in 1986. **Dave Beaumont**, who has come on as a substitute in recent weeks, is another centre half. Signed from Dundee United last January, he joined the Tannadice outfit from school and worked his way into their first team in 1984. Two other faces which have appeared in defence are those of **Richard Harvey** and **Marvin Johnson**. Harvey, a former England youth international, operates at left back. He made his League debut in 1986. Johnson, a centre back, made his League debut two years later.

## FORM GUIDE

Luton have spent all year struggling to avoid relegation.

Two of the main reasons are an unfortunate collection of injuries, which ripped the heart out of their defence, and the loss of experienced forwards, which accentuated their difficulty in scoring goals.

After a promising start it was not until December they started to nosedive, winning only once in 11 games.

That collapse of form coincided with the loss through injury of central defenders Darren McDonough and Dave Beaumont.

As they careered down the table, Luton conceded six goals at Southampton and three at each of Manchester United, Arsenal and Chelsea.

On 30 December, Luton hit second from bottom place in the First Division.

By then strikers Mick Harford and Roy Wegerle had both gone. Harford — joined the Rams for £480,000. Wegerle was sold to Queens Park Rangers for £1,000,000.

In their place, Luton have experimented with various permutations of Iain Dowie and one or two others from a selection of four. Dowie has certainly scored some valuable goals in the First Division. Three of his seven so far this season have won matches. Three others have earned a point.

Results started to improve in January when Ray Harford was replaced as manager by Jim Ryan, the former reserve team coach. Under him, Luton are still unbeaten at Kenilworth Road, having won three games and drawn four. Away from home, too, there were initial signs of progress. Luton drew 2-2 at Liverpool and won 2-1 at Wimbledon, their first away victory in 13 months and 22 games. But since then they have lost six on the trot. Consequently, they have not pulled themselves clear of the relegation zone.

Today they must win at the Baseball Ground and hope Forest win at Hillsborough. Failing that the Second Division beckons.

a few days before the start of the season. He broke into League soccer with Halifax in 1978, moving onto Huddersfield two years later. Middlesbrough signed him for £200,000 in 1982, but, two years later, he became a Portsmouth player. Bradford City signed him for £250,000 in 1987, but last season he moved on to Leicester, where he remained until his latest move. He has played for the Republic of Ireland on two occasions. Preece made his League debut for Walsall in 1981, winning a regular place two years later. Luton invested £150,000 when signed him in 1984 and last season he was capped three times by England 'B'. This season he has sometimes appeared on the left side of midfield, a position where one usually finds **Kingsley Black**. Sometimes Black has been asked to perform as a central attacker. Black made a remarkable impact after being introduced to the Luton side two seasons ago. He starred in their Littlewoods Cup win at Wembley and, within weeks, was in the Northern Ireland side. He now has nine full international caps. **Jason Rees** and **Richard Cooke** have both made occasional appearances on the right wing. Rees is an ex-trainee who made his First Division debut on New Year's Day as a substitute against Everton. Cooke played only occasionally in the first team at Tottenham, though he did win honours for England at Youth and Under-21 levels. He really made his name after moving to Bournemouth in 1986. Luton secured his transfer for £140,000 towards the end of last season.

**FORWARDS** — **Iain Dowie** has held a regular first-team place since starting his first full game of the season against the Rams in November. Until Luton invited him to join them for £30,000 in December 1988, he was happy playing non-League soccer with St. Albans, Hertford, Cheshunt and Hendon. With Hendon, he scored 80 goals in two and a half seasons. Besides Kingsley Black, three other players have accompanied Dowie in attack this year — **Lars Elstrup**, **Kurt Nogan** and **Paul Gray**. Elstrup, who was signed from Odense for £650,000 in August, is a Danish international with 12 caps. Nogan is a former trainee who turned professional last July. He was a prolific scorer in the reserves and was elevated to the first team in January. On his debut, a 2-2 draw at Liverpool, he scored. Gray joined Luton as a trainee and he has been eased into their senior side this season, playing mostly as substitute.

**MIDFIELD** — **Danny Wilson**, who is most familiar on the right side of midfield, has sometimes adopted a central role this season. Before joining Nottingham Forest in a £100,000 deal in 1983, he played League football for Bury and Chesterfield. He then spent a loan period with Scunthorpe prior to making a full transfer to Brighton in 1984. While with the Seagulls, he was introduced to the Northern Ireland side. He is now a regular, with 17 caps. Luton signed him in 1987. The players who usually patrol the central midfield are **Mick Kennedy** and **David Preece**. Kennedy joined the Hatters

## MANAGEMENT

Luton were in serious relegation danger when Jimmy Ryan, then the club's reserve-team coach, was invited to take over as manager in January. The club was also in a certain amount of behind-the-scenes turmoil following the departure of former manager Ray Harford a week earlier and the resignation of the Chairman the previous day.

The Hatters had failed to win any of their previous nine games and Mr. Ryan's first task was to take them to Liverpool!

"I can't think of a better place to start," he said at the time. "I am not at all daunted by the prospect."

Luton, in fact, came from behind to take a 2-1 lead at Anfield though, in the end, they had to settle for a 2-2 draw.

It has since been a long, hard battle for Mr. Ryan to try and save Luton's First Division status. It was one he was looking likely to lose but, in the end, the Hatters' fate depended upon the failure of others around them.

Mr. Ryan is a former Luton player though he started his professional career with Manchester United. He made his League debut for the Red Devils during the 1965/66 season and was a non-playing substitute when they won the European Cup Final in 1968.

There was much competition for senior places at Old Trafford, though, so in 1970 he decided to move on to Luton where he quickly established himself in the first team. He missed only two games as Luton clinched promotion to the First Division in 1974.

After leaving Luton in 1977 when his League days were over, he later turned to coaching. He returned to Luton in 1987 to work as coach to then manager John Moore.

## TRANSFERS

Last year Luton avoided relegation only by winning their last game of the season at home to Norwich.

In an attempt to improve matters, former manager Ray Harford signed two players during the summer.

Both came in part-exchange deals. Danish International Lars Elstrup was prised from Odense for £400,000 plus Raphael Meade, who was valued at £250,000. Mick Kennedy arrived from Leicester for £150,000 plus full back Rob Johnson.

Two other players left Kenilworth Road. Ricky Hill, who made his debut back in 1976, was rewarded for his long service with a £50,000 transfer to French club Le Havre. Steve Foster travelled to Oxford for £175,000.

During the season Luton have made two other sales.

Mick Harford joined the Rams for £480,000 and Roy Wegerle moved to Queens Park Rangers for £1,000,000, which was a record pay-out for them and a record receipt for Luton.

In all, Luton have signed cheques for £550,000 but cashed others for £1,705,000, an imbalance which probably reflects the difficult financial position they find themselves in just now.
