

# MANAGER OF THE YEAR . . .

*Kenny Dalglish*



LUTON TOWN have won at Southampton and Norwich this season, and those are not bad performances, by any standards. So we know that they are capable of pulling off a decent result away from home, just as they have shown that they can be caught out on their own Kenilworth Road pitch.

Football being the unpredictable game that it is, we should never be surprised at what happens, and when you come to think about it, Luton Town are probably one of the finest examples of a team which can do the unexpected, because they have shown on more than one occasion that they should not be written off.

This has been the case notably at the end of recent seasons, when they have defied the odds to hang on to their First Division status. They did it at Maine Road a few years ago, when David Pleat was their manager; and they did it on the final day of last season, shortly after Jim Ryan had taken charge of team affairs.

Like me, he had played for the club which gave him his managerial opportunity – in fact, Jim Ryan is a fellow-Scot whose career as a player goes back to his days with Manchester United... he was a contemporary of George Best, I'm told. Now he can look back over a long number of years at Kenilworth Road, where he graduated from player to reserve-team coach and then to the managerial chair. So he knows as well as anybody what makes Luton Town tick.

This season his side has had some useful results and some disappointing setbacks, including a home defeat against his old club, Manchester United; but the signs are that Luton don't intend to leave it to a last-day survival effort this time out!

In my time at Liverpool, we have had some good and bad results against our visitors. They were still in the Second Division when I arrived at Anfield, and they had to settle for a mid-table spot that term. Then they slipped down close to the relegation zone, climbed to finish in sixth spot in season 1979–80 and in fifth place 12 months later, then regained First Division status at the end of season 1981–82.

Their first game at Anfield was a 3-3 draw, and the remarkable thing about it was that during the game each of our goals was conceded by a different keeper... Jake Findlay had to go off injured, then came Kirk Stephens and finally Mal Donaghy, who was beaten by Craig Johnston – a goal which salvaged a point for us.

Season 1983–84 was another in which Liverpool and Luton made headlines – or, rather, I should say Ian Rush made headlines, because as we hammered Luton 6-0 here Rushy scored no fewer than five goals!



So we both have our memories of matches at Anfield ... and we won't know how the latest contest is going to turn out until the next 90 minutes have gone by. I'm just hoping that they will have seen us pick up three more points.

FORMED in 1885 by the fusion of the two strongest local sides, Wanderers and Excelsior, Luton Town have known various ups and downs during the century and more that they have been in existence. Early games were played on a friendly basis, but as better players arrived it was decided, in 1890, to pay 5s. (25p.) to the three rated the best; and the following year the whole team received payment – plus an allowance for working time lost through travelling to away games. So Luton became the south's first professional club.

Luton became founder-members of the Southern League in 1894, and in 1897 gained election to the Second Division of the Football League. By 1900, however, poor results and mounting debts forced a decision to return to the Southern League, and Luton remained members until 1920, when the Third Division (to become the Third Division (South)) was formed.

In season 1935–36, Town narrowly missed out on promotion – in that campaign Joe Payne made his debut at centre-forward and rattled in 10 goals against Bristol Rovers ... a record never likely to be beaten. The next time out, Luton won the championship of their division in style, as Payne set another record by scoring 55 League goals.

In 1955 Luton finally made it to the First Division, with goal average settling the issue in their favour, and in 1959 they made their first trip to Wembley, for the final of the FA Cup. But within six years Luton had slid down to the Fourth Division. Now they are again in the top flight – although their journey back has not been without its harrowing moments.

LUTON TOWN'S injury problems last season were emphasised by the final roll-call ... only three players were ever-presents, and only four more managed to make 30 or more first-team appearances. The three ever-presents were goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain and defenders John Dreyer and Tim Breacker.

Now, of course, it's another season and a time for renewed hope – and certainly Luton are hoping that this time out, they'll have far better luck when it comes to steering clear of long-term injuries, and that there will be no need for a last-gasp battle to retain First Division status.

Seven games into this season, and Luton were living comfortably in the First Division, with a haul of 10 points from their fixtures. That put them in seventh spot in the table, immediately after a 1-0 home victory over Coventry City. That was their third win of the campaign, although they had suffered three defeats, as well.

LUTON TOWN have certainly rung the changes over the past 12 months or so – at managerial level, as well as on the playing side. Ray Harford is now at Wimbledon, and his successor at Kenilworth Road is **Jim Ryan**, a 45 year-old Scot who crossed the Border in 1962 to try his luck as a winger with Manchester United. Also making his way at Old Trafford was another winger ... by the name of George Best.

Like Best, Jim Ryan collected a European Cup-winner's medal in 1968, though he had to settle for a role as substitute in the final against Benfica. And in 1970 Jim moved on to Luton, helping them gain promotion from the Second Division in 1974. He played for Luton until 1976, then moved into Soccer across the Atlantic, playing for Dallas Tornado and Wichita Wings.

He qualified as an FA coach in 1982, joined Luton's backroom staff in 1986, and became manager on January 11th this year. The rest is history, as Luton staged a last-gasp win at Derby which ensured that they remained a First Division club.

Now Jim Ryan and his No. 2 – **John Faulkner**, who was a team-mate during the 1974 promotion campaign – aim to help Luton consolidate in the top flight. Older fans will recall that Faulkner made his mark as a centre-half when he starred for Sutton United against Leeds United in the FA Cup in 1970 ... so much so that Don Revie signed him. However, a serious injury curtailed his career with Leeds, and he joined Luton in 1972. Like Jim Ryan, he went to the United States, became a coach and joined the Kenilworth Road staff with Ryan in 1986.

Luton kicked off by drawing 1-1 with Crystal Palace at Kenilworth Road, thanks to an equaliser from Iain Dowie; then they lost 1-0 on home ground against Manchester United and beat promoted Leeds United there by a similar margin. Mid-September saw them suffering a king-sized defeat, however, as they played Queen's Park Rangers at Loftus Road.

Rangers hammered in half a dozen goals to Luton's one ... and there was a touch of irony in the fact that former Luton favourite Roy Wegerle was a two-goal marksman. The other goals came from Andy Sinton, Ray Wilkins, Marc Falco and Paul Parker. But Luton recovered, to beat Coventry, and when they went to Carrow Road they gave Norwich City a 3-1 beating, with a hat trick from Lars Elstrup. That win took their points tally to 13 from eight matches, and kept them in seventh place, though a 2-0 defeat at Sunderland pushed them down a notch. In the next match, Luton drew 1-1 with Everton, then lost 2-1 to Derby County.

While the Ryan-Faulkner team tries to build for the future, several players have made their exit from Kenilworth Road ... notably defender **Tim Breacker**, who went to West Ham in a £600,000 deal, while **Mick Harford**, **Danny Wilson** and **Mick Kennedy** have also moved on. Harford was here recently with Derby County, who signed him for £400,000 last January, while Wilson is bidding to gain a promotion medal with Sheffield Wednesday.

LUTON TOWN have an 18-strong playing squad, and their last line of defence knows this area well enough, because goalkeeper **Alec Chamberlain** spent some time at Goodison Park, although the consistency of Neville Southall meant that he did not manage a League appearance for Everton and, instead, went on loan to Tranmere Rovers.

The one-time Colchester United man, who had cost Everton £80,000 in the summer of 1987, moved on to Luton 12 months later, became first-choice 'keeper at the latter end of season 1988-89, and was an ever-present last term.

Another regular is defender **John Dreyer**, signed from Oxford United for £140,000 in the summer of 1988. He had loan spells at Torquay and Fulham during his early days at Oxford, then he became United's regular left-back; but since he joined Luton he has switched to the centre of defence and made the No. 6 shirt his own. Crystal Palace made a big-money offer for him, but he decided to stay at Kenilworth Road.

**Darron McDonough**, an £87,000 signing from Oldham Athletic in 1986, has been unlucky with injuries during recent seasons, especially after he had taken over at centre-back in succession to Steve Foster, but he's hoping this term will turn out to be better for him.

And **Richard Harvey** is hoping that his career will flourish, after becoming established as a member of the senior squad. He skipped Luton's youth side, made his first-team bow four years ago this month, and has made solid progress since. He toured South America with the England Under-19 squad.

Another youngster who made the breakthrough is **Paul Gray**, while local lad **Julian James** has graduated to the first team after being groomed through the youth scheme. This England Under-21 international played 19 First Division games at left-back last season.

Luton's record-priced signing, up to the arrival of **Lars Elstrup**, was midfielder **Steve Williams**, who kicked off with Southampton, became a £550,000 buy by Arsenal and cost Luton £300,000 in the summer of 1988.

**Marvin Johnson**, who was groomed through Luton's youth scheme, has shown he can do an effective job as a central defender, and **Graham Rodger** was signed from Coventry City last year, after having been an almost permanent understudy to Brian Kilcline and Trevor Peake. However, this England Under-21 international had terrible luck with injuries, and he missed virtually the whole of last season.

**Dave Beaumont** was another understudy – he played for Dundee United, who had Scotland internationals

David Narey and Paul Hegarty barring the way to the first team. Beaumont, himself a former Under-21 international, came back from injury to help Luton stage their relegation-rescue act last term.

Like Beaumont, **Richard Cooke** arrived at Kenilworth Road last year, in a £140,000 deal. After kicking off with Tottenham Hotspur, he was unable to nail down a first-team spot, had a spell on loan at Birmingham, then joined Bournemouth in season 1986-87 and achieved instant success. He joined Luton just before the 1989 deadline.

**David Preece**, an England B-team player, cost Luton £150,000 when he left Walsall in December, 1984, while **Iain Dowie** is now striving to make his name in top-class Soccer after having been a prolific marksman for Hendon. He cost Luton just £30,000 last year, and already he has scored some valuable goals. Before turning professional, he was a development engineer with British Aerospace ... now he's a Northern Ireland international, as well as a first-teamer at Luton.

The squad is completed by **Kingsley Black**, **Kurt Nogan**, **Jason Rees** and **Ceri Hughes** – Nogan and Hughes played together for the Welsh Under-21 side against Poland, and Liverpool fans will recall seeing Nogan score on his debut for Luton when they drew here last season. Rees, too, has been a member of the Welsh Under-21 squad.

LUTON TOWN can boast two international players who have both made their mark in the not-too-distant past ... one is a Danish star, the other plays for Northern Ireland. Striker **Lars Elstrup**, of course, is an international team-mate of Jan Molby, and he became Luton's record-priced signing when he arrived from BK Odense in August of last year.

The fee was around £650,000, and Luton got themselves a striker who packs a powerful shot – this former idol of the fans who support Ajax of Amsterdam hit half a dozen goals in his first 12 international outings, and only a few weeks ago he was on target for his club, as he rammed a hat-trick past Norwich City in Luton's 3-1 victory at Carrow Road.

Luton are hoping that Elstrup will remain in top form after a lay-off through injury which cost them his services for a spell – and, of course, they are already indebted to their Northern Ireland winger, **Kingsley Black**, because a brace of goals from him salvaged First Division status for them at the end of last season. Black's second goal in the final game at Derby, was the dramatic match-winner, and it made him an instant hero with the Luton fans.

That wasn't the first time his name had hit the headlines, though, because he turned on a performance in the Littlewoods Cup final of 1988 which prompted two international managers to do battle for his services. One was Northern Ireland team-boss Billy Bingham, the other was former England manager Bobby Robson. In the end Black opted to play for Northern Ireland.

★ LUTON TOWN have been back in the First Division since the end of season 1981-82, when they finished as the runaway champions of Division 2. Luton totalled 88 points from their 25 victories and 13 draws, and that tally made them clear champions, because runners-up Watford finished on the 80-point mark, with third-placed Norwich City totalling 71 points.

★ SINCE THEY regained First Division status, however, Luton have experienced more than one season of real anxiety, as they have dived with relegation. At the end of their first season back in the top flight, for instance, they wound up in 18th position, although they improved after that to finish 16th, 13th, ninth, seventh and ninth again.

★ THE PAST couple of campaigns, however, saw Luton once again facing a battle to avoid the descent back to Division 2. In season 1988-89 they dropped to 16th place in the table, with a final tally of 41 points; that put them one ahead of Aston Villa and two ahead of Middlesbrough who, with West Ham and Newcastle United, were relegated.

★ LAST SPRING, Luton were in even greater peril, as they finished fourth from the bottom of the First Division ... in fact, they salvaged top-flight status only on the final day of the season, when they succeeded at Derby County's Baseball Ground while Sheffield Wednesday were losing their home game. So Luton stayed up, Wednesday went down ... and, since both clubs totalled 43 points, only goal difference separated them.

# Last Gasp Rescue

LUTON TOWN have been going well this season – in stark contrast to their end-of-season experience last term, when they salvaged First Division status by the skin of their teeth. In fact, last term saw no fewer than three different managers in charge of team affairs, at various times.

Luton had slid down to the relegation zone by Christmas, though their worst injury crisis for many years was the main cause of this, as five players had to undergo surgery, and that meant them missing a big chunk of the season. Early in January manager Ray Harford was replaced by his No.2, Terry Mancini, but after just one game – a 4-1 FA Cup defeat at Brighton – reserve-team coach Jim Ryan, who had played for the club, was put in charge.

It was certainly a mammoth task for Ryan ... Roy Wegerle and Mick Hartford had been transferred, by then; there were still serious injury problems; Luton were just one place from the bottom of the table ... and the next stop was Anfield.

As anyone who was here that day will recall, Luton staged a fighting display, to share four goals. John Barnes gave us the lead after 32 minutes, Kingsley Black levelled the score after 72 minutes ... and Kurt Nogan put Luton ahead two minutes later. It was left to Steve Nicol to earn us a point.

Gradually, with team tactics altered

drastically, and the introduction of some promising youngsters, Luton clawed their way almost to safety ... almost, but not quite. Late in March they beat Millwall, to edge out of the bottom three, but then they suffered three defeats on the trot – and with three games to go, they needed victory every time out.

Arsenal were beaten 2-0 at Kenilworth Road, Crystal Palace went down 1-0 there in the last minute, and on the last Saturday of the season everything hinged on the game at Derby.


Luton struck first, after just 60 seconds, with a goal from Tim Breacker, then Kingsley Black made it 2-0 inside 20 minutes. It was 2-1 after 29 minutes, when Mark Wright pulled a goal back, 2-2 on the stroke of half-time, as Geraint Williams scored for Derby.

And with the second half ticking away like a time-bomb, it seemed that Luton's chances of First Division survival were going to vanish in a puff of smoke ... then, with 15 minutes left on the clock, Black struck again to clinch the victory that meant so much.

At the end of the game, the first question on everyone's lips was what had happened to Sheffield Wednesday at Hillsborough. The answer came, loud and clear ... Wednesday had lost. So they went down, on goal difference.

## HELPING THE GAME

The Football Trust 1990 has been created to help the game at all levels and to assist clubs meet the requirements of Lord Justice Taylor's Final Report.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of women's and junior football particularly through community programmes, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettlers. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.

WHILE Steve Staunton has become a regular with the Republic of Ireland at senior international level, David Burrows – currently holding down the left-back spot at Liverpool – has had to settle for England Under-21 and B-team honours. And he knows that with Stuart Pearce and Tony Dorigo ahead of him, it's going to be a tough job to make the breakthrough.

But David, like Steve – and Gary Ablett, come to that – has become used to the weekly battle just to nail down a regular place at club level, because the competition is so strong. It's been like that for the past couple of seasons, too, with David and Steve more or less having an equal share of the job. Usually it's an injury which decides who goes in or who drops out.

This summer, Steve Staunton was on World Cup duty with the Republic of Ireland, and on his return he could well have hoped to slot straight into Liverpool's side ... but shortly after reporting back, he suffered Achilles-tendon damage, and David got the nod for most of the pre-season games.

When the action started for real, David Burrows found that he was earmarked for the No.3 jersey on a regular basis, though Gary Ablett took over for the Anfield game against Aston Villa. And now the Burrows ambitions are taking firmer shape than ever before.

David was 22 last month, and he recognises that this could be a vital season for him. As he says: "Life at Liverpool is all about grabbing your opportunities – you must make the most of your time in possession of the shirt." And he is aiming to keep the No.3 jersey to reinforce his claims for recognition at England level.

The way he sees it, if he's a Liverpool regular, it must improve his chances of playing for England, and his initial ambition is to add to his appearance for the B team.


Like **Bruce Grobbelaar**, David has just been honoured by being named in the Football League squad for the Irish League's centenary game in Belfast next Wednesday night, so that's another feather in his cap.

David admits he still takes some stick from the bench, especially if he's given the ball away, but at least he's become more confident, after an initial spell when he was still overawed by the big names around him. And after collecting his first medal for last season's championship success, he's hungry for more.



The one thing he never takes for granted, though, is that the No.3 shirt is his personal property ... he knows, better than anyone, that Steve Staunton and Gary Ablett are always there and breathing down his neck. And that in itself is a very real spur for David Burrows to succeed.



## IF YOU'RE GOING TO THE GAME AT COVENTRY ...

THE MAP below shows the location for home and visiting supporters at Coventry City's Highfield Road ground, where Liverpool are in action next Saturday, and our supporters are urged by the police to take note of the arrangements for crowd control at this all-ticket match. There are road closures and waiting restrictions in streets around the ground, on match days.

Drivers of coaches should approach the football ground from junction 2 of the M6 motorway and follow the A4600 to the coach park. Coach drivers should time their journey so that they arrive no sooner than an hour before kick-off, and they should be prepared to leave within 30 minutes of the final whistle. Coaches will be escorted by police motor-cyclists from the coach park to the city boundary.

Supporters arriving by train at Coventry railway station will be escorted on foot to and from the ground, and the map illustrates the segregation of home and away supporters. At the end of the game, visiting fans may be required to remain in their places for about five minutes, in order to allow the home supporters to disperse.



SUPPORTERS are asked to note that our Barclays League match against Coventry City at Highfields Road next Saturday will be ALL-TICKET and, therefore, if you have not got a ticket please DO NOT travel, since anyone without a ticket will NOT be admitted. 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★ **LEEDS UNITED** are due to visit Anfield on the first day of 1991, and that match, in a few weeks' time, will certainly revive memories of the days when we battled against each other for the championship, the FA Cup and for honours in Europe. Now it's another era—but Leeds still see Liverpool as the yardstick by which to measure their own progress. As we relate here . . .

THE £1M signing of midfielder Gary McAllister has coincided with a change in playing style for Leeds United—they've refined their long-ball game as they get to grips with the challenge of competing in the First Division. Another of their stars, skipper Gordon Strachan, reckons that not only do players think and move more quickly in the First Division . . . according to him, "they tackle harder."

Leeds' emergence from the Second Division, after their eight-year-long battle to clinch promotion, has seen a remarkable surge in interest from their fans. Leeds have sold 21,000 season tickets, worth an estimated £3M, and even though Elland Road has a capacity exceeding 31,000, tickets for visiting supporters are limited to just 1,302—all standing.

On the field, Leeds became the first club to collect a Barclays Performance-of-the-week award as they won at Goodison Park on kick-off day, when their team depended upon midfield men McAllister and David Batty, plus the guile of Strachan operating wide.

Strachan, now 33, has another year to go on his contract, and he has seen Leeds climb from 10th in Division 2, when he arrived, and consolidate in the top flight. When manager Howard Wilkinson moved from Sheffield Wednesday, Leeds were down in 16th place in the Second Division . . .

While Strachan has said he hopes Leeds fans won't think their team can "run away with the First Division title", he and his manager have paid this club and its manager some handsome tributes. Like this (from Strachan): "I'm sure Kenny Dalglish has helped me . . . I watched his working habits, his eating and rest habits when I travelled with Scotland. They have served me well. I'm better prepared for this season than when I was a 17-year-old."

The Wilkinson accolade goes like this: "You can count on the fingers of one hand the number of managers outside Liverpool who have won the title in the last 20 years . . . I've got to produce a team that will be consistently better than Liverpool, and that's well-nigh impossible.


"They're a team in every sense of the word, from chairman to tea lady. They under-play everything, apart from the standards they maintain on the field. The prerequisite at Liverpool is quality. Winning one championship is the easy part—it gets difficult when you have to win it again and again. That's why you should never under-estimate what has been achieved at Liverpool over the past 15 years.

"You know when you play them you'll have to score at least two goals to win. When you look at their team sheet and see Rush, Beardsley, Barnes and the rest, you can almost guarantee that one of them will knock a goal in. You've got to set standards on and off the field which are good enough to compete with Liverpool."

Yet Howard Wilkinson remains ambitious enough to believe his club can compete on level terms—"since the war, only two clubs have had the potential to be really successful . . . us and Liverpool." And he reckons Leeds "would have been where Liverpool are today", had Don Revie not departed.


Bruce Grobbelaar took his tally of appearances for Liverpool to 500, when he played at Tottenham Hotspur ... and finished up on the winning side.





# INFORMATION DESK

THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE has asked us to make it known that it views with concern the number of fans who continue to arrive at all-ticket matches without tickets. This can create crowd-control problems for both clubs and police but, perhaps more importantly, it can also present a safety hazard. It is therefore, in the interests of spectator safety that clubs are giving maximum publicity about all-ticket matches.

The League this season will be publicising all matches that have been designated all-ticket, and the information will appear in fixture lists.

An all-ticket game is defined as one where entry can only be obtained with a season ticket or match ticket purchased before the day of the match. It should be noted that this does NOT include matches that are designated all-ticket for away fans only.

FROM WIRRAL: Take the M53 to the junction with the M56, the M56 to the junction with the M6, the M6 south, then the route as above.


Street parking is permitted and the visitors' coach park is by the railway bridge in Walsgrave Road. From the railway station take a No.17 or 27 bus and ask for Gorford Green stop.

ONCE again, this season, supporters who travel to watch Liverpool away are reminded that the police operate a strict "Football Watch" scheme at all West Midlands grounds.

The West Midlands area covers **Aston Villa, Coventry City, Birmingham City, West Brom, Wolves and Walsall**, and while only Villa and Coventry are in the First Division, it should be remembered that we can be drawn against any of the other four clubs in Cup competitions.

The police have drawn up a list of actions which would constitute unacceptable behaviour at grounds in the West Midlands. These are: obscene chanting and gestures; racist chants or remarks; throwing missiles, threatening or violent behaviour; any criminal act.

LIVERPOOL, Everton and Tranmere Rovers football clubs have joined with Merseyside Police, the Liverpool Echo and the Littlewoods Organisation to promote a scheme known as "Passport to Good Behaviour".

In short, the scheme relies on the belief that if the supporters and players join together to condemn bad behaviour on and off the field, then it will inevitably have an effect on the mindless minority who damage the sport.

Each week the Echo will publish figures showing the totals of fans ejected from grounds, arrested in grounds, players sent off and players cautioned.

At the end of the season, when all teams have played in the same number of games, the club with the best record will receive £5,000 from Littlewoods to present to a charity on behalf of the Supporters Club. The runner-up will receive £1,500. The charities nominated are:—

Liverpool . . . Hillsborough Heart Foundation.  
Everton . . . M.E.N.C.A.P.

Tranmere Rovers . . . Special Baby Care Unit, Arrowe Park.

We very much welcome and support the scheme, which seeks to encourage our supporters to continue to act and behave sensibly, and to condemn those who seek to damage the

reputation of this great footballing area by their bad example.

There are a number of positive, practical steps that supporters can take, and we have listed them below, but we wish to emphasise our view that in collectively showing your displeasure at people who run on the pitch, shout abusive or racial remarks, or in other ways display unacceptable behaviour, they will come to realise and accept that they are very much in the minority and are no part of the game as we all know it and wish it to be.

1. Please arrive early.
2. Once inside the stadium, take up your position (stands or terraces) without undue delay.
3. Don't loiter in safety corridors—allow the club stewards to assist you in finding your place.
4. Abusive or offensive behaviour reflects no credit on you or your club.
5. Police "tannoy" messages are an important means of ensuring public safety—please listen carefully to the instructions given.
6. Remember, most stewards and police officers are keen football supporters and can often understand your frustration when there are delays etc. However, each has an important role to perform to ensure that your safety and comfort is not hindered. Please assist them.



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## Sidelines . . .

FIRST DIVISION gates are climbing at their highest rate for almost quarter of a century, and at the present rate of increase crowds in the top flight will go close to the 9M mark for the season. Not surprisingly, Liverpool, Manchester United, Arsenal and Tottenham Hotspur are among the leaders, while two of the promoted clubs are showing spectacular increases.

Leeds United's rise in gates is not so marked, because they were playing to big crowds throughout last season, but they still report an increase. Sheffield United's gates, however, are up a massive 36 per cent., while Sunderland show an increase of almost 50 per cent. on last season. FA Cup finalists Crystal Palace, who have been going well in the First Division, report a 27 per cent. rise in crowd figures. All in all, no fewer than 14 of the First Division's 20 clubs report an increase on last season's figures.

LIVERPOOL are going live on television again next month . . . the First Division match against Arsenal at Highbury has been switched from Saturday, December 1, to Sunday, December 2. Tomorrow it's the turn of Manchester City and Leeds United to feature in front of the TV cameras at Maine Road while tomorrow week ITV screen the Everton-Tottenham Hotspur clash at Goodison Park. And on Sunday, November 25, it's Manchester United v. Chelsea from Old Trafford, with the Arsenal-Liverpool game on the box a week later. All the matches kick-off at 3 p.m.

Incidentally, it's worth noting for future reference that the M62 and M63 motorways are going to be subject to severe traffic congestion during the next few months – in fact, it's expected that major roadworks around the Manchester area will cause problems from now right through until February, at least.

So – bearing in mind that we're due to play Manchester United at Old Trafford on February 2nd (and, of course, there could be Cup-ties in the New Year) – if you've got to travel towards the Manchester area, avoid the motorways, especially at peak times.


