

JIM RYAN



I permitted myself a moment of quiet reflection yesterday when I reached the first anniversary of my appointment as manager of Luton Town. I can still recall my feelings in those first couple of days before the Liverpool match with a mixture of excitement and a healthy dose of fear. Happily, the excitement is still with me now, 12 months later, while the fear has all but disappeared.

People often ask me about progress in relation to my first year. I suppose the most satisfying thing from my own point of view has been to see so many young players come into the team, make their debuts and do well. In recent weeks, two more - Sean Farrell and Mark Pemberton have done the same and it is probably a good gauge of my first year in charge to count up the number of players who have made their Football League debuts. This has partly been through circumstance and partly due to the knowledge John Faulkner and I had of the boys from our work with the reserve and youth teams.

The other part of the equation, of course, has been the first-class response of our senior experienced men who have had to "look after" the younger players. In this, they have been exemplary and allowed other young players like Harvey, Johnson and James to settle in with consistent runs.

Since I last wrote, we have had two downpoints - our display against Sheffield United at home and the unfortunate injury suffered by Ceri Hughes. While the injury will not heal before the end of the season, we at least had some compensation last weekend in seeing the team perform excellently and win at Sheffield United in the cup. Today, we welcome Southampton. Enjoy the game.



More than 200 Sunderland supporters left the north-east at midnight on Christmas Day for their Boxing Day game at Crystal Palace...arriving in south London on a cold wet morning at about 7 a.m. Luckily, as they shivered outside, the "Eagle-eyed" Palace officials spotted them early and invited them in for a full English breakfast in the Selhurst Park hospitality suites.

Fares for the trip to LEEDS will be £9.50 and £7.50 with coaches departing from Cranfield at 8.30am and from Luton at 9.30am.

A multi-national and multi-talented squad representing the Barclays Football League will fly out to Italy next week for an inter-league fixture with their Italian league counterparts in Naples. The match, arranged by the Italians, is aimed at being another major step towards the restoration of the special relationship which existed between English and Italian football before the shattering events at the Heysel Stadium in Brussels in 1985 when 39 fans died following a riot at the European Cup final between Juventus and Liverpool.

If the match is a success it could also help boost hopes that Liverpool will be re-admitted to European competition next season by UEFA, whose executive committee meets on April 19, and help improve the image of English league football throughout Europe. "We accepted an invitation to play the Italian League in order to help build bridges and widen our international experience after the English clubs' exclusion from Europe," said the Assistant Secretary of the Football League Andy Williamson.

"In reality, it is a flag-waving exercise, but we have an historic association with the Italian League. We played four inter-league matches during the 1960's and held several Anglo-Italian club tournaments during the 1970's. In many respects, we shall be renewing old acquaintances. We feel this match will provide everyone with a wealth of good experience while the game itself will, we sincerely trust, also assist in the overall aim of restoring the reputation of English football in Europe."

Town fans with memories of the 1970's will recall visits to Luton by various Italian clubs, including Bari and Fiorentina, in the Anglo-Italian cup and many may also remember the story of former manager the late Harry Haslam's visit to the Vatican in 1973. According to one report, 'Happy Harry' lost his balance and slipped down a flight of winding steps, bumping all the way down until he flung himself through some doors and into a room full of papal ceremony. Mr Haslam afterwards swore he had bumped into the Pope himself!





THAT SPECIAL FEELING IS REVIVED AGAIN

TAKING A TUMBLE!

Welcome to Southampton and a very happy new year to everyone at Kenilworth road today. We were all delighted to clinch a place in the fourth round of the FA Cup last weekend with our victory at Sheffield United. It was a nice feeling.

The FA Cup remains the most exciting traditional cup competition of them all and there is always a special buzz about FA Cup-ties which I think is unique to them. It is the one which always makes my heart beat that little bit quicker and I am sure it is the same for all our supporters. I bet Southampton's followers would have agreed too after their 3-2 win over Ipswich last Saturday.

We have been drawn to meet West Ham United, who we met only shortly before Christmas of course in the Zenith Data Systems Cup, or Aldershot in the fourth round here at Kenilworth Road. At this stage of the competition, you cannot ask for more than a home tie so we are pleased with that.

The unknown identity of our opposition, because West Ham and Aldershot are due to replay their third round tie next week, has added an interesting post-script to my comments a few weeks ago about police costs and the 10-days notice rule.

Aldershot had already conceded

home advantage and played the original third round fixture at Upton Park – and done extremely well to hold the Hammers to a draw – and the replay will again take place in East London.

The Metropolitan Police have insisted on the 10 days notice requirements to police the tie which has meant, in turn, that we shall not know January 16 just who we are going to be playing on January 26.

Of course, if the two teams draw again, we shall not know until the night of Monday, January 21, when the second replay is scheduled to take place. And if it goes to a third replay, that will really upset things because it will take place on fourth round day. All this possibly as a consequence of the 10-days notice!

Everyone in football understands and sympathises with the predicament of the police and, I understand, the FA have looked at his sort of problems over replays and talked about taking ties to penalties after replays next season.

This would end one of the traditional qualities of the competition, those stamina-sapping marathons of several replays which can grip the nation, and I must say it would be sad to lose that.

In this context, I find it surprising that the Metropolitan Police, unlike most

other constabularies in these situations, have enforced the 10-day rule at a time when the game is listening so attentively to them on so many issues.

I must say I am grateful that we have a good relationship with Bedfordshire Police who in the years I have been here have always been cooperative with replays and the extra costs involved in not using rest-day staff. I am told the costs for West Ham to have staged the replay this week would have been phenomenal.

For our own fourth round tie, against whoever it may be, we have taken a careful look at our allocation and disposal of tickets and decided to make the match all-ticket. We have also decided to give our members a much better opportunity to purchase tickets before any become available for guests.

We have a membership of 25,000 and clearly it has been necessary to make


the match all-ticket to stay in line with police advice and make administration as straight forward as possible. Much the same thinking is likely to be applied to the Liverpool and Tottenham home league matches. In all cases, the safety of all spectators has to be given first priority.

On a different subject, I know our team manager Jim Ryan was hoping to add another new name to our growing band of promising youngster this week with the anticipated signing of Paul Holsgrave from Wokingham.

A small fee in the region of £25,000 was expected to change hands for Paul 20, who is a midfield player with the talent to have attracted our attention at a time when we have a very strong youth policy. It is always important to keep on building up the strength of our younger players as we have been throughout all levels of the club in recent years.



This afternoon we welcome the playing staff and officials of Southampton to Kenilworth Road for today's Barclays League Division One match, writes *Luke Nicoli*.

Southampton have not made quite the start in the first half of the season many people had expected, winning just one league game away from home and losing seven, but there is a such a good balance of skill and experience in the side that it seems inevitable that the Saints will start to challenge the top clubs in 1991.

Manager Chris Nicholl has kept much the same exciting team as last season which includes such talent as England B internationals Matthew Le Tissier and Rodney Wallace, plus the experience of Jimmy Case and Glenn Cockerill.

The Saints only major signing this season has been that of Republic of Ireland international Alan McLoughlin, signed for a club record of £1 million from Swindon in December. With a solid central defensive partnership and an exciting forward line, McLoughlin is seen as the missing piece to the jigsaw which could see Southampton achieve a respectable position in Division One come May. This season has also seen Southampton create a

new First Division record when they included two Russian players in their side. Midfield man Sergei Gotsmanov, signed from Dynamo Minsk for £100,000 in the summer, joined Alexei Cherednik, who had established himself at right-back earlier in the season, though injuries have prevented them playing together recently.

Southampton F.C. were formed in November 1885 as St Mary's YMCA, playing at the Antelope Ground, now the site of Southampton's County Bowling Club. After turning professional and joining the Southern League in 1894, the club, now called Southampton St Mary's, won the Southern League Championship and became a limited company, joining the Football League in 1920. Southampton have had some success in their 105-year history. They won the Division Three championship in 1959/60, Division Three(S) Championship in 1921/22 and were Division One runner-up in 1983/84. The Saints also won the FA Cup in 1976. Manager Chris Nicholl is only the club's sixth post-war manager following such names as Ted Bates, Sid Cann and England assistant manager Lawrie McMenemy. Chris is of course a former Town player and was a team-mate of Jim Ryan's at Kenilworth Road.

OFF THE RECORD

FEATURING....KEN HAWKES

Ken Hawkes was born in Durham on 6th May 1933 and as befitting someone from the "hotbed of soccer" became interested in football at an early age, watching Newcastle one week and Sunderland the next writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Luton Town North East scout Dick Trembath, who introduced Jack Taylor and Ray Smith to Kenilworth Road, spotted Ken playing for Shotton Colliery Welfare with the upshot that he joined the Hatters in October 1951.

Progressing straight from the "A" team to the Reserves Ken was then called up for National Service.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my stint as I was stationed at Oswestry alongside other players such as Geoff Twentyman, Tommy Banks, Ray Hartle, Jimmy Dugdale and Don Howe and therefore was able to play plenty of football in various Forces sides. Luton manager Dally Duncan often used to secure my release to play for Luton Reserves as well so I cannot say I had a hard time", he said.

After leaving the Army it was back to Kenilworth Road and the records show that it was quite some time before Ken made the breakthrough.

At a time when both Southampton and Bristol Rovers were showing interest the first team breakthrough arrived and Ken replaced Les Jones in a home game against West Brom on 14th December 1957 which the

TEN YEARS AGO (3/1/81) Three second half goals from the Town saw off Orient in the F.A. Cup at Brisbane Road. The goalscorers were David Moss with two and Godfrey Ingram. Billy Jennings, later to join the Town, scored a late consolation for Orient.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO (3/1/76) F.A. Cup time again as Blackburn were beaten 2-0 at Kenilworth Road courtesy of goals from Ron Fletcher and Brian Chambers. A train carrying Blackburn supporters arrived just in time for fans to witness the second half.

TWENTY YEARS AGO (11/1/71) Malcolm MacDonald scored a hat-trick in an F.A. Cup Third Round replay at Kenilworth Road. Unfortunately, the visitors, Nottingham Forest, scored four in an epic game watched by 23483.

Town won 5-1.

"Some people say that you never remember your first game as it seems to pass you by. I, however, can remember everything about my debut and recall Bobby Robson saying afterwards that West Brom had been beaten by pure football".

Ken retained his place for the remainder of the 1957/58 season and was virtually ever present during the F.A. Cup Final season of 1958/59 and his tales of the club's preparation (or lack of) for the final are chronicled at length in "The Luton Town Story".

Until, perhaps, the more recent times that period represented the pinnacle of Luton Town as a football force and Ken obviously enjoyed being a part of it.

Following the break up of the Cup Final side and the eventual relegation from Division One Ken suffered injuries and when fit again found things had changed and decided to move to Peterborough in June 1961. A broken arm followed by a cartilage operation restricted his appearances with "Posh" and as he had married a Luton girl and wanted to stay local he enjoyed two seasons at Bedford followed by a spell at St Neots before throwing in his lot with Electrolux with whom he has now been connected for 25 years.

Ken rarely misses a game at Kenilworth Road and enjoys his football just as much now as when he first started watching at St James and Roker Park all those years ago.

Continuing our 'football diary' to keep you up to date with the domestic and global game:

Dec 11: Neil Webb is sent off as England B draw with Algeria in Algiers.

Sheffield Utd record their second win of the season as they defeat Oldham 7-2 in the ZDS Cup.

Crystal Palace sign Stan Collymore from non-league Stafford Rangers.

Dec 15: Liverpool maintain a four point lead over nearest rivals Arsenal with a 2-0 win over Sheffield United.

Chelsea sensationally beat Derby 6-4 at the Baseball Ground.

Dec 16: The Town lose to high-flying Crystal Palace 1-0 at Selhurst Park.

Dec 17: Speculation mounts throughout the tabloid press that Terry Venables is to become manager and chairman of Q.P.R. England captain Gary Lineker receives FIFA's Fair Play Award.

Dec 18: 12,181 spectators turn out to see Peter Shilton's farewell England game at White Hart Lane. An England XI defeat an Italia 90 XI 4-0.

Manchester United are drawn against French side Montpellier in the quarter-finals of the European Cup Winners Cup.

Dec 19: Arsenal skipper Tony Adams is jailed for four months at Chelmsford Magistrates Court as a result of a reckless driving charge.

In the European Championship qualifying games, Marco Van Basten scores five as Holland beat Malta 8-0. Emilio Butragueno grabs a hat trick as Spain defeat Albania 9-0.

John Barnes turns down a new contract with league leaders Liverpool.

FOCUS ON SOUTHAMPTON

Tim Flowers (goalkeeper): Tim began his career with Wolves and, after winning England youth honours, he was capped at Under 21 level. He enjoyed two full seasons at Molineux, making over 60 League appearances before signing for Southampton for £75,000 in 1986. He is now established as the Saints first-choice keeper.

Jason Dodd (defender): A first team regular for much of last season, Jason joined Southampton as a trainee and made his league debut v Q.P.R. in 1989. An injury to Alexei Cherednik has enabled him to re-establish himself in the side this season.

Mick Adams (defender): Sheffield born, Mick made his league debut in 1980 playing for Gillingham, where he gained England youth honours. He was transferred to Coventry for £75,000 in 1983 and spent three full seasons at Highfield Road before signing for Leeds in 1987 for £110,000. He moved on to Southampton in 1989.

Neil Ruddock (defender): Neil was signed from Millwall in 1989 and within weeks he was in the England Under 21 side, winning four caps. He started his career at Millwall but left to join Tottenham in 1986. After making only nine League appearances for Spurs, he returned to the Den in 1989 before signing for Southampton for £250,000 a few weeks later.

Kevin Moore (defender): Grimsby born, Kevin started his career with his home-town club and made over 400 appearances for the Mariners before moving to Oldham Athletic in 1987. After only a few weeks at Boundary Park he was transferred to Southampton.

Alexei Cherednik (defender): Alexei became the first Soviet to play in the English First Division when he made his League debut v Liverpool in 1989. A Soviet international, he was a member of the side that won the 1988 Olympic competition. Southampton signed him from Dnepro for £300,000.

Glenn Cockerill (midfield): Glenn started his career at Lincoln but moved on to Swindon for £110,000 in 1979. Two seasons later he returned to Lincoln, and topped their scoring list in his first season back with 11 League goals. In 1984 he was transferred to Sheffield United, then joined Southampton for £225,000 in 1985.

Barry Horne (midfield): Barry made his League debut for Wrexham in a 2-1 defeat by Swindon in 1984. He spent three full seasons at the Racecourse Ground before signing for Portsmouth in 1987. Southampton paid a then club record of £700,000 to sign him in 1989.

Alan McLoughlin (midfield): Republic Of Ireland international, Alan started his career at Manchester United. After two brief spells, both at Swindon and Torquay, he returned to Swindon for a third time where he established himself in the Robins' push for promotion. Southampton spent a club record of £1 million to sign him.

Matthew Le Tissier (forward): Guernsey born, Matthew made his League debut for the Saints in 1986 and went on to score ten goals that season. Last term he was Southampton's leading scorer with 24 goals in all competitions.

Rodney Wallace (forward): Rodney made his League debut for the Saints in a 2-1 defeat at Newcastle in 1987. The following season he was Southampton's top scorer with 15 League goals, and his impressive goal scoring exploits continued last season.

Alan Shearer (forward): Alan became the First Division's youngest hat-trickster when he hit three goals against Arsenal in his first full senior game in 1988.


