

Everyone enjoyed last Saturday's win over Liverpool. The team played well and deserved victory. But I cannot think anyone enjoyed Tuesday night's defeat at Selhurst Park against Crystal Palace. We did alright in the first half, but performed poorly after the interval. In the previous two games against Chelsea and Liverpool, we had imposed our game. We did more or less in the first half at Palace, but not in the second - and that is where we came unstuck. Today, as we start the final third of the league season without the distractions of any cup competitions to enjoy, we have to ask for the consistent reproduction of our best form from the players. We need to pick up points regularly, to achieve consistency, especially at home and we need to shrug off this trait of performing better against the better teams.

We were without Kingsley Black, with a groin strain, at Palace and Julian James went off with concussion in the second half. Both could be back in the reckoning today. Julian's injury gave Matthew Jackson, one of our young and promising defenders, his first taste of senior football on a difficult night and against strong and physical opposition. This is an aspect of the game he and all our players must learn to cope with if we are to achieve the consistency we are looking for. Now is the time to show the character we need to impose our own football on a match. Thank you for your continued and much-appreciated vocal support for the team.


SWEEP STAKE AID





MEDIA 'NO COMMENT' IS AN UNEXPECTED STORY

SCRUBBED CLEAN

We welcome Nottingham Forest to Kenilworth Road this afternoon with the hope that we shall enjoy another very entertaining match between the two clubs. This fixture has a habit of producing good football and Forest, of course, are one of the most attractive teams in the country.

This season they have been involved in a lot of cup football. Indeed, with their draw in the FA Cup with Southampton, they have maintained their record as the competition's replay specialists and kept alive their hopes of a run all the way to Wembley.

Since last Saturday's great win against Liverpool, we have been brought back to earth with a thud with our exit from the Zenith Data Systems Cup at Crystal Palace on Tuesday night. We were all very disappointed at the result.

I was much heartened however by the support for the team from our travelling supporters who were at Selhurst Park. They must have been as downcast as we were afterwards, but their efforts were appreciated. Julian James, incidentally, who suffered concussion during the game, was cleared as okay on Thursday.

While our view of the twin towers has disappeared for another season with the defeat, it has at least allowed me to

clear up our fixture backlog and rearrange our visits to Manchester City and Coventry.

We shall be visiting Maine Road now on March 5th, Tuesday night, and Highfield Road, the following Wednesday, March 13.

One of the 'behind-the-scenes' delights, for me, of last Saturday's visit by Liverpool (apart from the result) was Ian Rush's immediate cooperation and generosity in giving up his time to present a Welsh under-21 cap to Jason Rees after the game.

It was good of Ian to perform this formality and only a shame that Kurt Nogan, who is obviously keen to take his place in the Welsh team later in his career, was away with the reserves at Tottenham on the day.

I was surprised this week not to read more comment in the press about Manchester United's team selection for their defeat at Sheffield United on Tuesday evening. The press had pestered me and several other clubs about United's 'experimental' side which showed several changes.

Les Sealey, the established goalkeeper, was rested and Gary Welsh brought in for his first appearance in three years while Mark Hughes, Mike Phelan and Lee Sharpe

were also left out for a match which, it was pointed out to me, could have a significant effect on the final First Division table and the relegation issue.

Manchester United clearly had their mind on other things, as most press men noted. We and several other clubs had already expressed concern over the resting of so many players to the Football League who are, of course, keen not to see any devaluation of their premier competition, as per Regulation 20.

But clearly, when a goalkeeper who has not played in the senior team for

three years is selected it is something which raises the eyebrows. Now, along with most other clubs in the lower half of the table, we are curious to read what Fleet Street is going to write next about this episode, particularly after Tottenham's defeat at Wimbledon last Saturday.

Had the fixture had any bearing on the relegation issue, I am sure there would have been a considerable media outcry and it will be interesting to see what action and reaction follows United's defeat at Sheffield.

What a downer

Well, after Tuesday's disappointment at Crystal Palace, our Wembley hopes have gone for this season, leaving us to concentrate on achieving a good finish to the season in the First Division to make up for some very inconsistent performances earlier on.

After the result against Liverpool, when the whole side played well, it was a real downer to lose as we did at Palace in the second half. They are a direct and strong side, but we have to cope with that.

Today, we play Nottingham Forest who are still chasing a Wembley appearance themselves in the FA Cup. We know Forest always play good football and are always a danger so we are expecting an extremely difficult match this afternoon.

But we know too that if we can reproduce the sort of form we showed against Liverpool - the Dalglish factor played no part at all in our performance - we have every chance to getting a result and maintaining our most important aims of finishing in a safe and strong position in the league.

Molby's goal came from a spot-kick awarded when Steve Nicol's cross struck Julian James. But Liverpool, just 24 hours after the resignation of Kenny Dalglish, could not strike again and Black, heading in with aplomb, levelled after 47 minutes.



Then Dowie, ably supported by the lively Lars Elstrup, took over with goals after 53 and 80 minutes to steer Luton to a victory.




Few clubs could lose so many top-class players over the past three years and still survive as one of the First Division's most entertaining sides.

This afternoon we welcome the players and officials of Nottingham Forest to Kenilworth Road for today's Barclays League Division One match, writes *Luke Nicoli*.

Nottingham Forest's season has been none too dissimilar to that of the Town's, and can only be described as inconsistent. After a bright start to the season, they began to lose their way in October and November when they managed to win only once in seven League attempts. They then went down at Sheffield United, who hadn't previously won a Football League game this season, but bounced back with a remarkable 6-2 win at Norwich.

Injuries to key players have played their part in Forest's unpredictable season. England midfielder Steve Hodge has been nursing an injury for several weeks. Nigel Jemson then became a casualty, as did winger Franz Carr. Jemson was particularly missed because he was top scorer at the time with nine goals. At the time of writing, Nigel Clough is Forest's top scorer with ten goals, but their next best marksman is England left-back Stuart Pearce with eight.

Nottingham Forest were formed in 1865 and are therefore the third oldest club in the Football

League. They were named 'Forest' after their first home ground, the Forest Racecourse. The club originally formed not to play football, but a North Country variation of hockey known as shinny. The first use of a referee's whistle was recorded in a game between Forest and Sheffield Norfolk in 1878. Forest were also the first club to stage a game using goalnets, in 1891. After an unsettling period where they moved ground six times, they moved to the City Ground, where they have remained ever since.

Nottingham Forest's most successful period was in the late seventies when they won the League Championship in 1978, the European Cup in 1979 and 1980, and the League Cup in 1978 and 1979. They have also won the FA Cup in 1898 and 1899, the Division Two Championship in 1907 and 1922 and won the League Cup again in 1989.

Forest's much respected manager Brian Clough is the club's seventh post war manager. His hopes of winning the FA Cup with Nottingham Forest are still very much alive this season. Two weeks ago they beat Newcastle 3-0 in a fourth round replay with goals from Clough, Parker and Hodge. They now meet Southampton in a fifth round replay next week.

OFF THE RECORD

FEATURING....BRUCE RIOCH

Although he was not exactly a local boy – he did not move to Luton until the age of 14 – Bruce Rioch was looked upon as a Lutonian when he became the darling of the Kenilworth Road terraces in the late 1960's, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

"I had only actually been to watch Luton Play once – a cup replay against Ipswich in 1962 – before scout George Martin asked me to come to Kenilworth Road and I eventually signed professional forms in September 1964," he said.

"Although the club was on the slide I learnt a great deal from the old professionals still on the books such as Gordon Turner, Bob Morton and Dave Pacey and with coaches Ted Duggan an ex-Luton player and Stan Benthall, who had played alongside Dixie Dean pre-war, I could not have had a better grounding".

Bruce made his first team debut in a League Cup tie at Port Vale in September 1964 and his League baptism came two months later at home to Southend. In and out of the side in his first two seasons, he finally established himself in 1966/67 during a season when the Town finished eighth from bottom of Division Four and at one stage looked almost certain to have to apply for re-election.

Everything changed the following season as the Town walked away with the Championship and Bruce has many happy memories of that campaign and some of the 24 goals scored, mostly with great power, as the scouts flocked to Kenilworth Road.

"I can actually remember every game played and goal scored during the whole of my career at Luton, but if I have to pick out some goals, the promotion-

clincher at Halifax was special as were the two scored the following Wednesday evening as we made certain of the Championship by beating Crewe 4-0 at Kenilworth Road before a crowd of 18,904."

Bruce also recalled other goals from the promotion season – the run from the half-way line beating three defenders and the goalkeeper to score the only goal in the home win over Harlepool – the 35 yard screamer at home to Port Vale and, for me, the best of all a 40 yard volley at Barnsley.

The Town started off 1968/69 like world-beaters with Rioch again amongst the goals but a cartilage operation mid-season went some way to the team narrowly failing to gain promotion for the second season running.

We all knew that Bruce was too good for Division Three football and that a transfer was inevitable and with interest being shown by Fulham, Forest, Coventry and even Glasgow Rangers it came as a shock that the club finally accepted a bid from Second Division Aston Villa in the summer of 1969.

"I was slightly surprised that the club had decided to sell me to Aston Villa but the fee of £100,000 was a record at the time. Although ambitious I was sad to leave and I look on my six years at Luton as the best apprenticeship a player could have had. Certainly better than anything on offer today".

Now enjoying life as manager of Millwall, Bruce finished our conversation by telling me something I did not know – his first goals for Luton were scored against the Lions in a South East Counties League game!

FOCUS ON NOTTINGHAM FOREST

Mark Crossley (goalkeeper): Signed from apprentice, Mark has successfully taken over as first choice keeper from the unsettled Steve Sutton this season. He made his League debut in a 2-1 win over Liverpool in 1988 and is approaching his 50th appearance for Forest.

Brian Laws (defender): Wallsend born, Brian started his career with Burnley, making his debut v Watford in 1980. He moved to Huddersfield in 1983 before signing for Middlesbrough two years later. It was at Ayresome Park that he established himself as very competent defender, so Forest signed him for £120,000 in 1988.

Steve Chettle (defender): Steve made his Forest debut v Chelsea in 1987 and immediately became a first-team regular. He appeared at full back for almost two years, becoming an England under-21 international, winning 11 caps. Steve has since found himself on the substitutes' bench regularly, but more recently appeared as a centre back.

Des Walker (defender): Des has now firmly established himself in the England side and was regarded as one of the stars of Italia 90. A product of Forest's successful youth policy, he made his debut v Everton in 1984 and can now look back on over 200 League appearances for the club.

Stuart Pearce (defender): Club captain, Stuart is another regular in the England set-up at present. Coventry discovered him in Non-League football with Wealdstone and he quickly won a place in the Sky Blues' senior side. He made fifty appearances before signing for Forest in 1985.

Terry Wilson (defender/midfielder): Yet another graduate from the youth team, Terry was introduced to First Division football in 1987 and made his debut in a 3-3 draw v Southampton. He has been a regular in the Forest line-up for the past three seasons which has seen him earn Scotland under-21 caps.


Steve Hodge (midfield): Steve is now in his second spell with the club that launched his career. He quickly established himself following his debut in 1982 and went on to win eight England under-21 caps. Aston Villa signed him in 1985 and he was soon in the full England side. He was transferred to Tottenham for £650,000 in 1986 but did not settle. He returned to Forest for £550,000 in 1988.

Garry Parker (midfield): Garry started his career here at Kenilworth Road, making his debut for the Town v Manchester Utd in 1983. After moving to Hull City in 1985 he won six England under-21 caps, prompting Forest to sign him for £250,000 in 1988. In his first season at the City Ground he scored 13 goals which earned him an England B Call up.

Tommy Gaynor (midfield): Limerick born, Tommy was brought into English football by Doncaster Rovers who signed him from his home town club. After only two seasons at Belle Vue he signed for Forest for £25,000, and scored 31 League goals in his first two seasons. This term, Tommy has found himself regularly on the substitutes' bench.

Gary Crosby (forward): Gary was signed from Grantham in 1986 but did not make an impact in the Forest side until 1988, making his debut v Charlton. Now firmly established on the right wing for Forest, he made his first League appearance in the colours of Lincoln in 1986 before moving on to Graham.

Nigel Clough (forward): Forest's top scorer at the time of writing with a total of ten goals, Nigel was top scorer in each of his four full seasons in the side. His goalscoring consistency earned him 12 England under-21 caps before he made his full England debut in 1988. Nigel is yet another product of the club's youth team.
