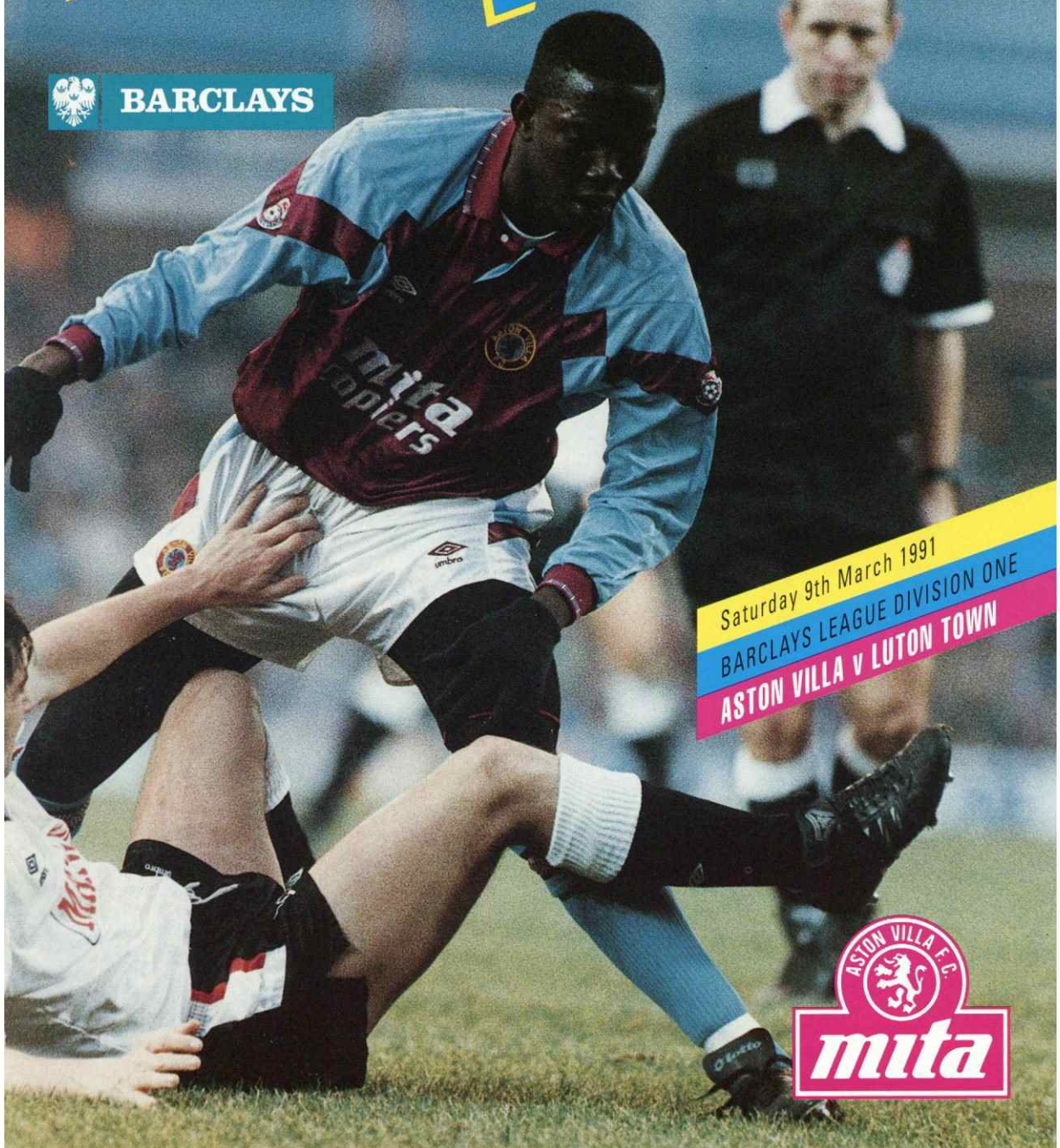

There has been quite a considerable gap since our last home game and in that time I have found myself involved in newspaper controversies not of my choosing.

This does not bother me very much because I understand that the press have to find topics to write about each day. The only thing that does concern me slightly is that our supporters should always understand the true situation.

In the case of Graham Taylor and his comments on BRMB I am quite sure that he was intending to make only constructive observations.

Graham has, himself, explained that he merely pointed out in answer to a question that, because of the uncertainty of his own future at the end of last season followed by a period when John Ward was in temporary charge and then by the arrival of a manager from overseas requiring a period of adjustment, there had been some delay in planning.

He has nothing but friendly feelings towards Aston Villa but if asked a question he is free to give an honest answer.

As for my giving an 'angry' reaction this was simply not the case. Those who deal with me will know it is not my style at all. As a matter of fact I did not hear the broadcast so could hardly have been upset by it!

I believe that all things should be dealt with in a friendly, sporting manner and I do feel it is a little unfair when I am reported as saying things that I have not said.

There has also been a good deal of publicity given to those players who are due to renew contracts this summer. This situation is quite normal and common to all clubs where individual negotiations with players have to take place.

These negotiations are underway and it is far too early yet for anyone to say exactly how they are likely to be concluded.

However, I have no arguments with the press. We maintain a very good relationship despite some of their unfavourable headlines.

A far more important subject is that of our achieving the necessary results up to the end of the season to finish as high as possible in the League. This is my one major objective at all times, supporters can be assured of that. Losing to Sheffield United last week was obviously a setback after achieving a draw at Nottingham Forest.

This has made it very important for us to get things right today. We have been very conscious of this in our build-up to the visit of Luton.

SHOCK MOVE FOR NEIL

New signing Neil Cox had still to taste Football League action when he watched Aston Villa beat Inter Milan in the UEFA Cup at Villa Park earlier in the season.

So it was hardly surprising that he described his move to alongside David Platt, Gordon Cowans, Paul McGrath and Co as "a bit of a shock" after completing just 25 games for Scunthorpe United.

Twenty-four-year-old Cox said: "It came right out of the blue. I kept thinking to myself 'I've got to stay in the first team' at Scunthorpe over and over again. Then the next minute I am in bed one evening when the boss rings to say Aston Villa are interested in signing me.

"I travelled down the following morning to complete all the contracts and the next day I was off on the Hong Kong tour! It's all happened so quick.

"I needed no persuading to come to Villa. I saw all their players on television against Milan and it's nice to be here with them. They have helped me to settle in quickly and feel at home."

Cox added: "It was another bit of a shock to be substitute against Nottingham Forest and I didn't even realise I would be travelling with the squad. I didn't feel nervous - although it might have been different had I gone on."

However, Cox is not getting carried away with matters. "I have come here to learn my trade. I have had a bit of luck in coming to Villa, a First Division club, and maybe if there are injuries etc I might get a bit more luck and have a chance to show what I can do.

"But realistically I am looking at 12 months before even considering the possibility of a regular place. It might be even longer - you never can tell."

Cox paid tribute to the help he received at Scunthorpe from Richard Money before his move to Villa in the early part of last season. He took a lot of time to be with the players and was always there if you wanted help any time of the day. I never thought we would both end up at the same club again."

Money recalled: "Neil came to Scunthorpe as a 14-year-old when I first

went back there. I went round with Bill Green, who is now the manager there, to sign him on schoolboy forms.

"He trained with the first team when he was 15 and I took him on as a YTS apprentice when I was youth development officer there.

"I coached him for nearly two years and he has suddenly broke through into the first team this season and has done extremely well.

"I didn't recommend him initially for Villa. His name came up via our scouting system and then I started to get a little involved and said I thought he was worth pursuing.

"We had him under the microscope for about a dozen games and almost all of the staff including the manager took a look at him and liked what they saw.

"He's a good passer, has two good feet,

has an excellent attitude and wants to learn. He can play in various positions including central defence and midfield but I think right back will end up as his best position."

FROSTED OUT

England Under-21 midfielder Mark Blake's over-riding feeling was of frustration during his recent month on loan with Wolverhampton Wanderers.

Blake said: "I needed a bite of first team football and said back in September it would be better for me and the club that I went on loan if I wasn't in the team.

"But because of the snow and bad weather I was only able to play two games for Wolves - against Bristol Rovers and West Ham United - which was a big disappointment to me.

"Wolves play the long ball and try to pick up the bits and pieces whereas at Villa

the accent is on ball to feet but I didn't take long to adjust and got a couple of good games in.

"The Second Division is a bit more physical but you have more time on the ball than in the First Division as I discovered when I came straight back in for Villa against Nottingham Forest two weeks ago."

Twenty-year-old Blake, who retained his place against Sheffield United last Saturday, also linked up again at Wolves in the West Ham game with Paul Birch following his transfer to Wolves. "When I left Villa to go to Wolves Paul said 'keep my place warm for me!'" said Blake.

NEW DEAL FOR ANDY

Central defender Andy Comyn, 22, has signed a new three-and-a-half-year contract. He said: "It's very pleasing. We have been talking about it for some time and both parties are satisfied.

"It gives me a lot of security and shows the club has confidence and faith in me. I'm happy with the way it has gone in my first two years with Villa and couldn't have wished for anything better."

RISKY BUSINESS

"Some of the worst conditions I have played in at international level" was Villa central defender Paul McGrath's description after helping the Republic of Ireland to a 3-0 win over Wales at Wrexham last month.

McGrath echoed the sentiments of rival managers Terry Yorath and Jack Charlton that the match should not have gone ahead on the Racecourse pitch.

"It was too much of a risk and if you had fallen awkwardly or been tackled hard then you could have been in real trouble.

"The last thing Ireland would have wanted was a serious injury before the European Championship match with England this month.

"Luckily both sets of players were sensible and there was no sharp tackling. You couldn't play good football and both teams spent most of the time trying to stay on their feet.

"But I still felt in the conditions we coped better although if Jack Charlton was using the match to look at the team and players I don't think he would have been able to learn much."

YOUTH TRIP

Villa turned in a creditable performance in the recent Under-20 tournament in Italy despite having to field a younger squad than had been initially anticipated.

Villa went out at the first hurdle in the 20 team competition, losing 1-0 on aggregate over two hard fought matches with Bologna.

Villa youth coach Richard Money said: "We went with a squad which wasn't quite as strong as we would have liked. Dwight Yorke and Mark Blake were in the first team and on loan respectively, Lee Williams was still recovering from a broken leg and people like Richard Crisp and one or two others were not available.

"Nevertheless we went with a good

attitude and did well. It was a very close affair against Bologna and we felt that we deserved to win the second game.

"It was good experience for the lads playing against a different type of football and we also took the opportunity to watch four or five games while we were out there.

"There were eight teams from overseas - all of whom were knocked out at the first hurdle - and 12 Italian clubs. That tells you how strong the Italians are at that level."

Mooney was particularly pleased with the performances of Darrell Duffy - in the sweeper's role - and in the second game of Bryan Small.

It was a hectic time for Small for 24 hours after flying back from Italy he collected another England Under-19 cap in the 5-1 reversal by Denmark at Oxford.

Villa goalkeeper Glen Livingstone was also involved as one of the substitutes but was not called into action in the bitterly cold conditions.

A WELCOME VISITOR

Former Villa favourite Brian Little couldn't resist calling in at the Bodymoor Heath training ground when taking a rare day off from his duties with Fourth Division promotion chasers Darlington.

Little was in the Midlands to visit his mother-in-law but also ended up watching our youth team in afternoon action against Walsall and having a chat with his old pal Peter Withe.

And just for good measure he made sure that his son will know where his future allegiances will lie by purchasing a claret and blue shirt for him from the club shop.

HUNT FUND

The Football Association have given their approval for a Testimonial to be organised in appreciation of Steve Hunt's services to football.

The Witton-born winger made his League debut in our promotion-winning season in 1974-75 and closed his playing career through injury in another Second Division promotion campaign in 1987-88.

Testimonial Committee chairman Dean Brookes, of 61 Boden Road, Hall Green, tells us that the first event is a Gala Boxing Evening at the Grand Hotel on 15th April.

Hunt left Villa in February to join New York Cosmos for £50,000 and returned to the Midlands with Coventry City for £40,000 in September 1978.

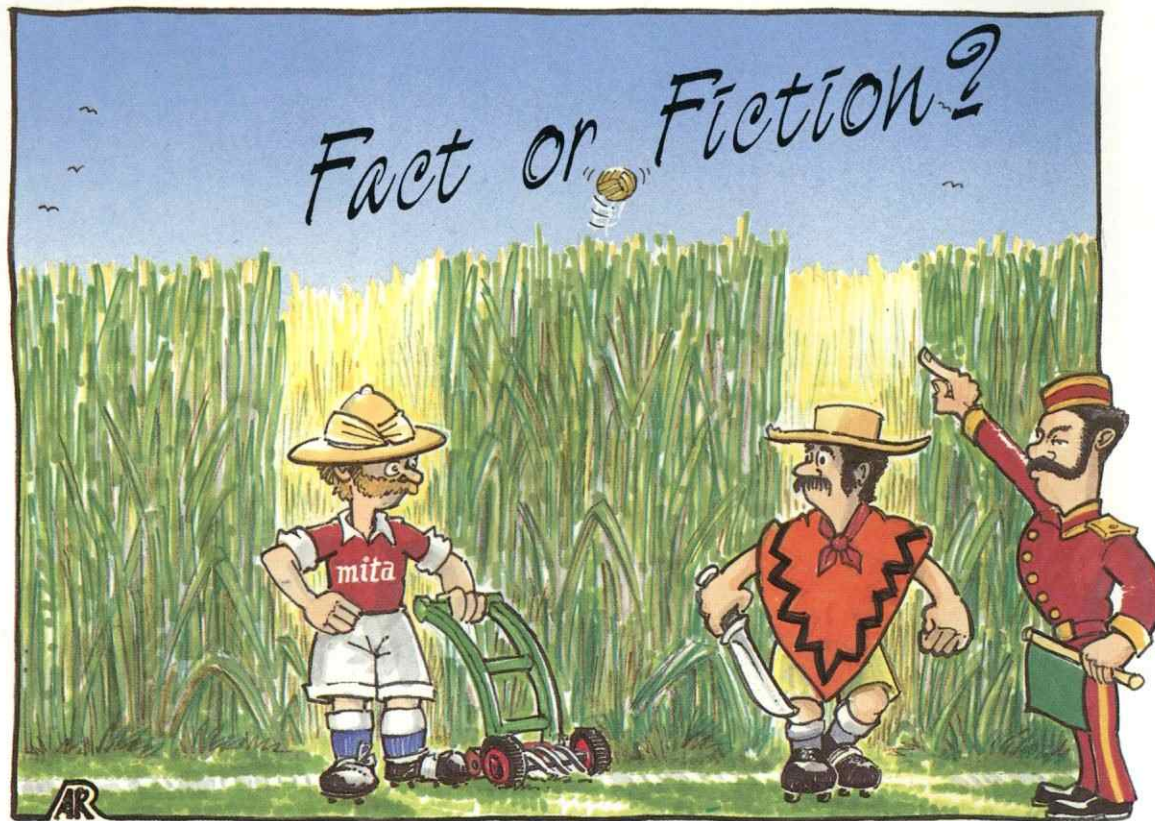

Villa and Luton have met 29 times before in the League. The first meeting was at Kenilworth Road on September 1st, 1937 when Luton won 3-2. John Maund and Alex Massie were the Villa scorers. Villa won the return game just five days later 4-1 at Villa Park.

Villa's biggest League win against Luton is 4-1 - that first meeting at Villa Park in 1937-38 and again in 1982-83. The 1-0 win at Kenilworth Road last season is Villa's only away success against The Hatters.

Luton's biggest wins against Villa are 3-0 at Kenilworth Road in 1957-58 and 3-1 at Villa Park in 1956-57.

The highest League attendances for this fixture were for the Second Division meetings in season 1937-38 - 30,667 at Villa Park and 29,372 at Luton.

The lowest home and away 'gates' are 7,696 at Luton in 1984-85 and 10,524 here the following season.

Several Villa players share the club's record of most goals in a League game with Luton. Frankie Broome and Charlie Phillips scored two each in the 4-1 success of 1937-38; Gerry Hitchens, two in the 3-1 home win in 1958-59, Gordon Cowans, two penalties in the 4-1 win in 1982-83; and Paul Kerr, both goals in the 2-1 win here in 1986-87.

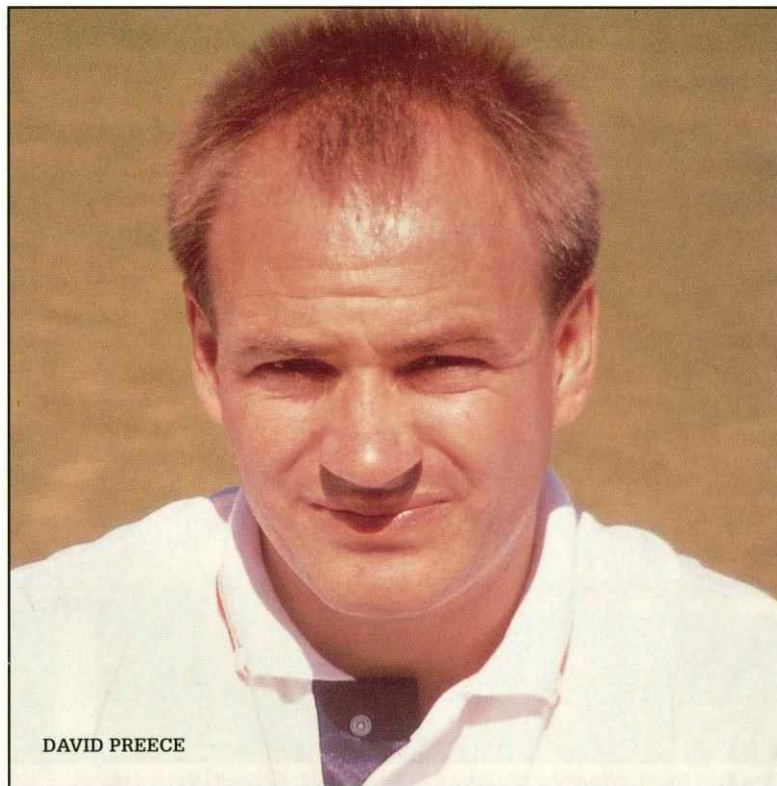
A DAY-BY-DAY DIARY

It was something of an injustice that Luton Town's best performance of the season appeared to be secondary to the motives of the media pack who descended on Kenilworth Road a fortnight ago.

The scribes were so busy raking over Liverpool's troubles that the merit of the Hatters' victory was submerged in thousands of words about Kenny Dalglish's departure from Anfield.

If the result was of national significance in knocking the champions off the top of the table, it was also vitally important to Luton after only one win in ten League games since their victory over Villa in November.

At that stage, they were comfortably placed in the top ten, but the subsequent slide - they took only five points out of 30 - put them fourth from bottom when Liverpool travelled to Bedfordshire.

Yet Luton's timely success was only in keeping with an impressive home record against the Merseysiders. They have won four and drawn two of their last seven meetings in League and FA Cup.

This is the Hatters' ninth consecutive season in Division One - easily the longest of their three spells at the top level - but last term they stayed up only on goal-difference after a last day of drama.

A 75th minute goal by Northern Ireland winger Kingsley Black clinched a 3-2 win at Derby and sent Sheffield Wednesday into the Second Division after their home defeat by Nottingham Forest.

That completed a hectic first four months in management for Jimmy Ryan, a former Luton player who was promoted from the backroom staff in January when the Hatters were second from the bottom.

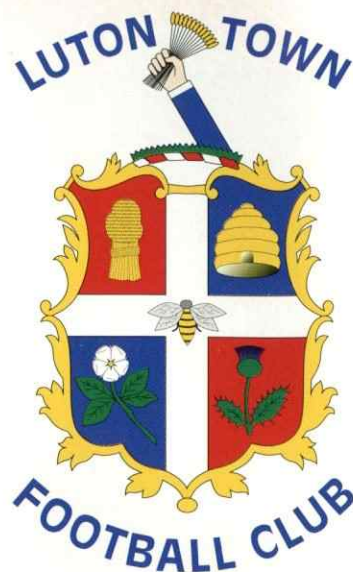
A bad run of injuries forced them to field four teenagers and three 20-year-olds at Villa Park in March, but they eventually survived by winning their last three games. The summer was a quiet time on the transfer front and we begin Luton's 1990-91 diary with important news from the boardroom...

MAY

22 Peter Nelkin is the new chairman after buying up a major shareholding in partnership with David Kohler, who also joins the board.

JUNE

7 Jimmy Ryan is to be offered a three-year contract in recognition of his achievement in keeping the club in Division One.



16 Luton say that the Football League's ban on artificial pitches from the start of 1991-92 will cost them £250,000 per year in bookings.

JULY

18 Former manager John Moore returns to Kenilworth Road as reserve coach... Luton finished seventh, their highest position in Division One, when he was in charge in 1986-87.

AUGUST

2 Northern Irishman midfielder Danny Wilson joins Sheffield Wednesday for £200,000.
17 Another midfielder, Mick Kennedy, goes to Stoke City for £180,000.
25 Darron McDonough and 19-year-old Welsh prospect Ceri Hughes fill the midfield gaps in an opening 1-1 draw at home to Crystal Palace.

SEPTEMBER

1 Another young Welshman, Jason Rees, 20, deputises for Kingsley Black (thigh) at Southampton... Danish striker Lars Elstrup scores twice and Luton's first win earns the Barclays performance of the week award.
4 McDonough (rib) is replaced by Richard Harvey in a home defeat by Manchester United.
8 A single goal from Black inflicts Leeds' first defeat since their return to the First Division.
12 Black and Iain Dowie are in Northern Ireland's side for the opening European Championship qualifier against Yugoslavia in Belfast.
15 Luton are swamped by five second-half goals in a 6-1 trouncing at QPR.
22 Dowie, who has battled on since the beginning of the season with a broken toe, scores the only goal in a home win against Coventry.
29 Elstrup, carrying six stitches in a head wound after a mid-week draw with

Bradford in the League Cup, sinks Norwich with a hat-trick at Carrow Road... Recalled midfielder Steve Williams lays on two of the goals.

OCTOBER

1 Elstrup is back in Denmark's European Championship squad after a year's absence from international football.
10 The League Cup campaign ends at the first stage after a penalty shoot-out at Bradford.
11 Former England Under-21 full back Tim Breacker completes a £600,000 move to West Ham.
20 Julian James (fractured cheekbone) misses a 2-0 defeat at Sunderland.

NOVEMBER

17 After taking only one point from four games, Luton are two down at home to Manchester City but recover to snatch a draw with a late penalty by John Dreyer.
24 Black and Elstrup score against Villa in the first League win for eight weeks.

DECEMBER

1 Two more goals for Elstrup in a draw at Nottingham Forest.
5 Young striker Sean Farrell, recovered from four knee operations last season, nets four times on Finals Night in the Guinness Soccer Six in Manchester... David Preece is the player of the tournament as Luton take the trophy and £52,500 after beating Liverpool 4-0... Rees and Kurt Nogan play for Wales in an Under-21 international against England at Tranmere.
8 Another Dreyer penalty holds Arsenal to a draw after Tony Adams is sent off.
19 West Ham, unbeaten leaders of the Second Division, crash out of the Zenith Cup at Kenilworth Road... Farrell grabs two goals in a 5-1 win for the Hatters.
29 After three successive League defeats, Luton overcome Chelsea to register their first win in five weeks.

JANUARY

1 Mark Pembroke, a 20-year-old Welshman, makes his debut in a 2-0 defeat at Wimbledon.
2 Hughes is likely to miss the rest of the season after a knee operation.
5 Farrell and Elstrup (2) are on target in an FA Cup triumph at Sheffield United.
11 Paul Holsgrove, a midfielder released by Aldershot last summer, is signed from Vauxhall League club Wokingham Town for £25,000.
30 West Ham avenge their pre-Christmas upset with a 5-0 win in an FA Cup replay at Upton Park.

FEBRUARY

2 Black puts his side in front against QPR but Les Ferdinand's last-minute strike gives the Londoners their first away win since October... Injury-troubled former Coventry defender Graham Rodger re-appears after a 15-month lay-off and Holsgrove comes in for the first time as substitute.
5 After only four League appearances, Pembroke joins Rees in the Welsh team for a 'B' international against England at Swansea.



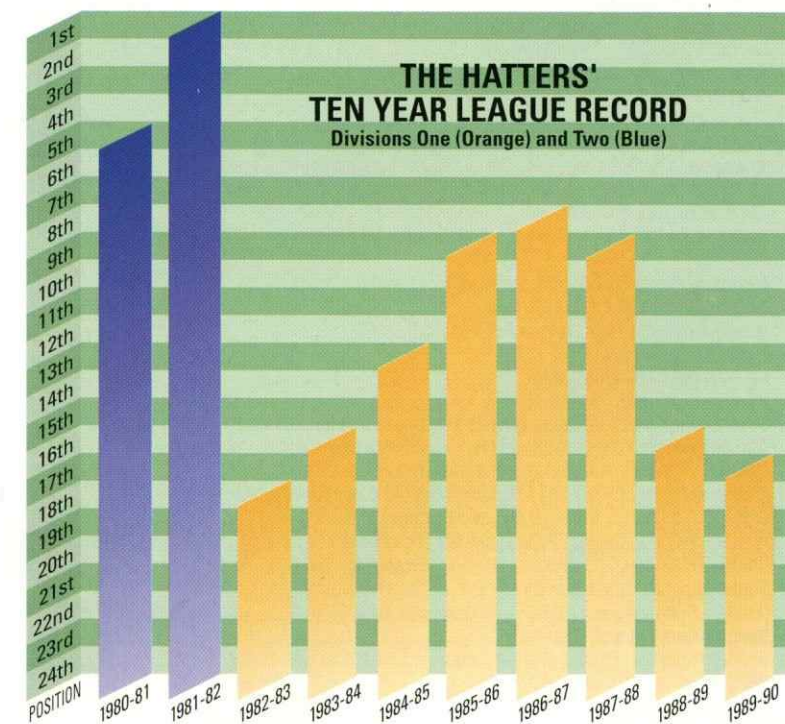

The Football Trust 1990 has been created to help the game at all levels and to assist clubs meet the requirements of Lord Justice Taylor's Final Report.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of women's and junior football particularly through community programmes, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettors. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.

Those who criticise Brian Clough for his waspish opinions on football might care to know that the Nottingham Forest manager is the flavour of month in Barnsley... for his chocolate bars!

A group of young Barnsley supporters couldn't believe their good fortune when they asked Cloughie for his autograph as he stepped off the team coach at Oakwell.

"Aren't you lot freezing standing out here 'cos I am? Come on, follow me." With that, he marched the kids into the Forest dressing room and told his players to sign anything they wanted.

When the autograph session was finished, he thanked them for coming and added: "Now go to our coach and tell the driver to give you a chocolate bar apiece." Exit one group of fans... gobsmacked!

Jinxed goalkeeper **John Keeley** reckons his luck went from "bad to dreadful" in six months after his £250,000 summer transfer from Brighton to Oldham Athletic.

He dislocated a finger 24 hours before his scheduled debut in August and as soon as he resumed training, he picked up a similar injury in his other hand.

A three-match suspension for being sent off in a reserve game halted his next comeback and now he is out again after fracturing a hand in another reserve match.

Even worse than the injuries, Keeley was a victim of two break-ins at his home. His wife's car was ransacked on the first visit and then burglars got away with £6,000 worth of furniture and equipment.

Manager Joe Royle agreed to transfer-list Keeley and prepared for his departure by re-signing his former reserve 'keeper, **Andy Gorton**, for £3,000.

Gorton left Boundary Park in the summer of 1988 and was later released by Stockport County and Lincoln City. This season he has played for Glossop in the Second Division of the North West Counties League.

Former Villa favourite **Brian Little** maintained Darlington's promotion push in Division Four with a win at York after deciding against applying for the manager's job at Birmingham City.

It was the first time Brian had been on the winning side this season in five meetings with his brother, Alan, another former Villa player who is now assistant manager at

York. Afterwards, Brian joked: "If we had lost, people would have said I should have gone to Birmingham."

Sunderland eased their position at the bottom end of the First Division with a third successive home win which justified manager Denis Smith's decision to take his squad away to Tenerife.

Mr Smith was prepared for some flak from supporters on the subject of a mid-winter break when Sunderland were out of the FA Cup.

But he countered: "I've heard it all before. They say a team struggling near the foot of the table doesn't deserve a holiday and should be training even harder, but that's not the way I see it.

"Throughout my career as a player and a manager, this has always seemed to work to the benefit of the club. Of course we would much rather have been playing in the Cup, but now that we're not involved, it's a good idea to take advantage of a blank week-end."

Hull City's assistant manager, **Mick Docherty**, was put out of work when the Second Division club appointed the Rochdale duo, Terry Dolan and coach Jeff Lee, as the new management team at Boothferry Park.

But Docherty soon found a new job... at Rochdale. "I needed somebody with experience and it helps to be able to bounce ideas off each other," said Dave Sutton, who became manager at Spotland following Mr Dolan's departure.

Mike Lyons, who left Everton in November after three years as reserve coach, is back in football as a member of Wigan Athletic's coaching staff.

Brian Little - promotion push.

Lyons, who had two years in management with Grimsby Town, was appointed by his former Everton team-mate, Bryan Hamilton, who is now charge at Wigan.

Peter Withe's brother, Chris, saved a penalty against his OWN club when he answered a call as emergency goalkeeper for Mansfield Town in a Third Division with Bury.

Chris, on loan from Bury, went between the posts when Andy Beasley was sent off for bringing down Tony Cunningham inside the area. The penalty was taken by Cunningham but Withe stopped his shot.

Bolton Wanderers set a club record on taking their unbeaten run beyond 20 league games... and kept skipper Phil Brown waiting for the return of a £400 bracelet.

The bracelet was put into a jewellers for repair in October just as Bolton were starting their long unbeaten run. Brown said he had no intention of re-claiming it until Bolton are defeated.

Stockport County are taking to the air in search of a place in the Third Division next season.

Already fifth in Division Four with the help of 15 goals from 6ft 4ins striker Paul Williams, they aimed even higher with a £60,000 investment in the 6ft 7ins Derby County forward, Kevin Francis.

Francis, a 23-year-old Brummie from Small Heath, joined the Rams from Mile Oak Rovers for £3,000 in January 1989. Now the local Scoreline Combination club are to benefit from a share of Derby's profit.

Port Vale sold reserve striker Ronnie Jepson to Preston for £80,000 and spent the money on Robin Van der Laan, a 22-year-old forward from the Dutch Second Division club, Wageningen.

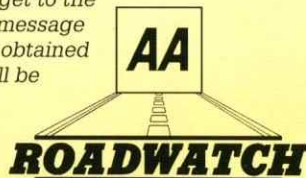

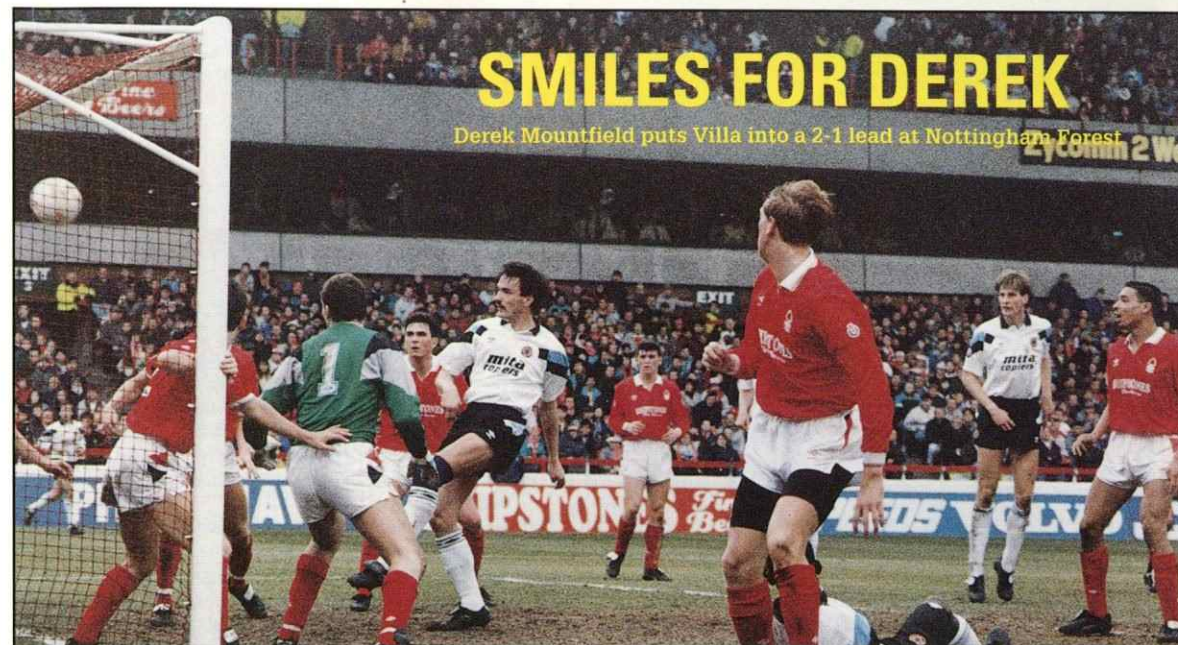

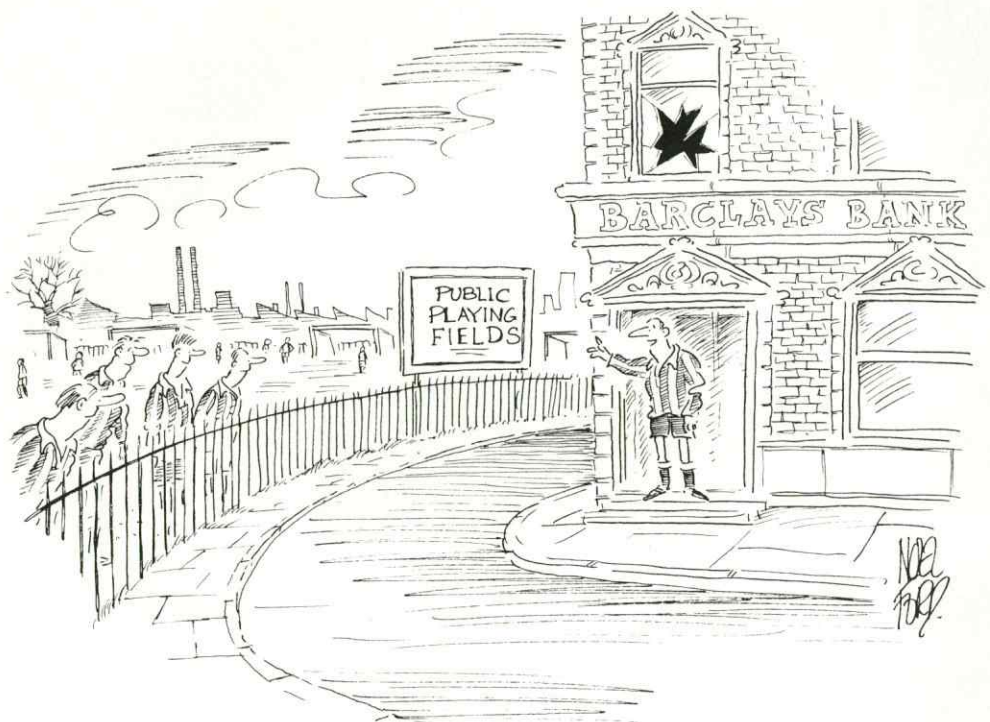

GARETH WILLIAMS

A season which was approached with great optimism by Villa midfielder Gareth Williams cannot end quickly enough after an injury-hit six months.

A recent hamstring strain would normally give little cause for concern - but in Williams case it has just added to the increasing frustration he has had to endure almost from day one this season.

A hernia complaint has been the main drawback but Williams said: "I seem to have been picking up so many niggling injuries that it is hard to keep count of them now!

"It has been getting a bit depressing with the hamstring about the last straw. Although I still need to get a bit more fit after being out so long, I had felt things were slowly starting to come together at last before this latest setback.

"I had been looking forward to going on the trip to Hong Kong and thought if I got a game in over there and did alright then it might boost my chances.

"But just before we were due to fly out I got a little bit of a niggly pull from the hamstring in training and had to stay behind which also got me down a bit.

"I think the manager Jozef Venglos believes I am capable of doing something - but it is a case of having the chance of showing him.

"As far as I am concerned I would like to wipe this season out of my mind and I have not really played a game where I have been 100 per cent fit.

"I can't wait for the season to end and to get on with the next one and I could do without the break in the summer. I think about the most games I have played on the trot this season is five.

"What I need is a good pre-season to start me off on the right track again and I just hope that next year is not as bad as this one for me."

It is a sharp contrast to just over 12 months ago when Williams enjoyed his first extended run of senior team action since being signed three years ago by Graham Taylor from non-league Gosport Borough.

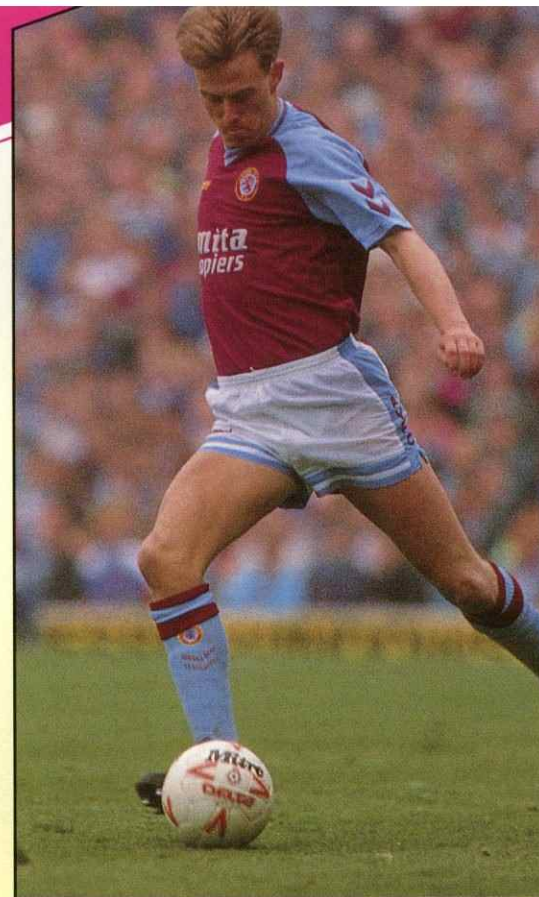
Williams put together a run of 13 successive games when he was in the final 13, including five in the starting line-up, from November through to January as Villa's title challenge gathered momentum.

Williams, who will celebrate his 24th birthday this Monday, said: "It was the time of my life and that's what makes events now seem doubly disappointing.

"The whole scene, the atmosphere, the big crowds and playing against some of the top sides like Manchester United really does work you up to play well while it is hard to get motivated playing in front of 200 people in the reserves.

"I thought I was beginning to make my mark and felt a little unlucky to be dropped but I had a bit of a problem then with a heel injury which I played on with before it got too sore.

"As we got nearer and nearer to challenging for the title I think Graham Taylor decided that the more experienced players might be able to help him a bit more when it came to the crunch.



"But I still reported back for pre-season training last July really relishing what the months ahead might have in store for me.

"I played in all the games on the tour of Sweden and did well and thought 'this is going to be my season.' It just proves how wrong you can be."

Williams, who has two years remaining of his current contract, said: "I had a little ankle injury in September which took a couple of weeks to get right but the hernia has been the main reason for the season being wasted.

"I was in considerable pain. It affected my game and the day after a match I could hardly walk and had to rest up for three days which was not doing me any good.

"We tried to let it settle down and the pain would gradually ease each time but it eventually started to get worse and worse and an operation became inevitable.

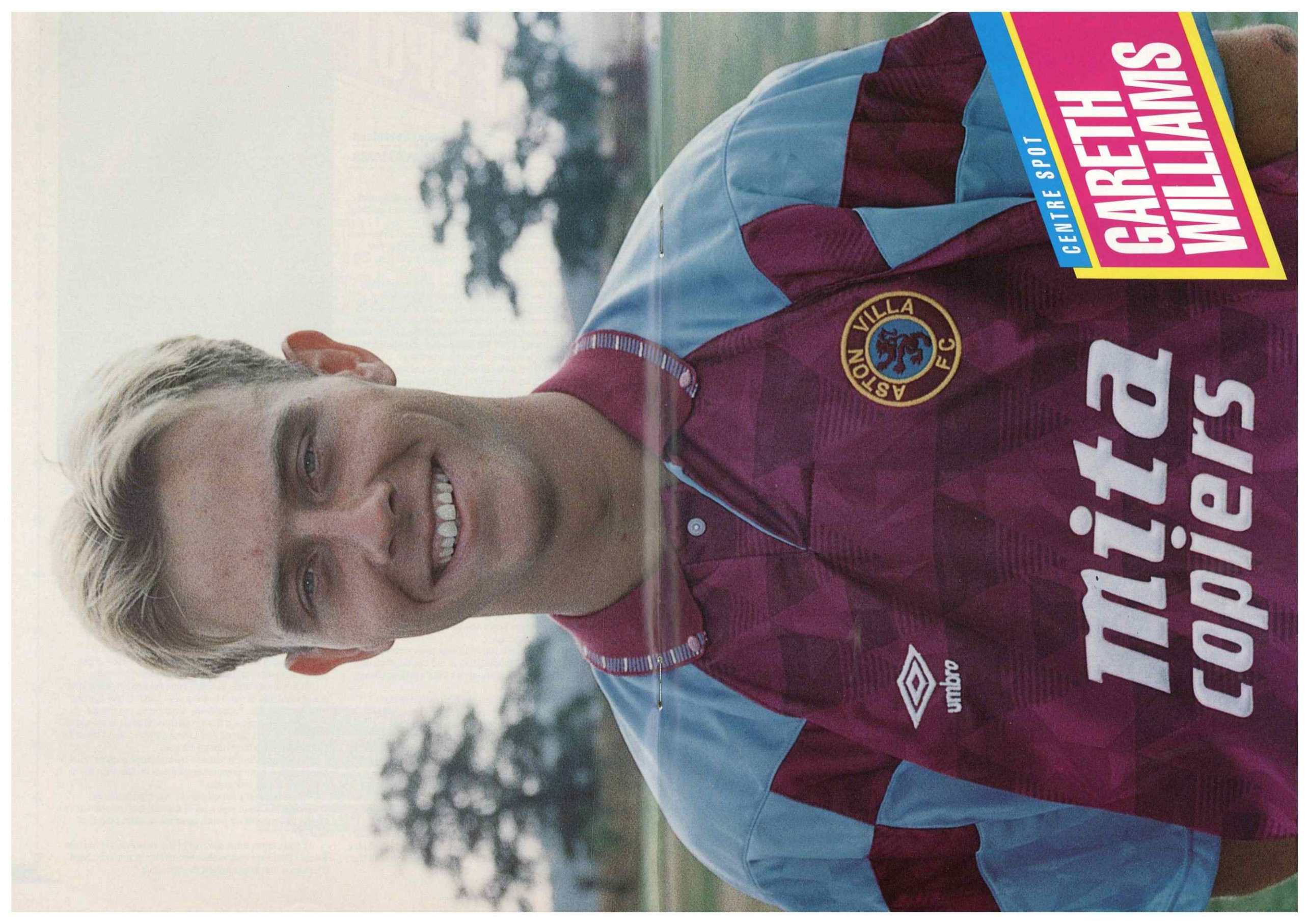
"It is a lonely time. You don't see very much of the lads - out of sight, out of mind as they say - and it is like starting from scratch again in gradually building up the fitness.

"You also wonder if the supporters, who gave me a good reception when I played and I think believed that I wasn't a bad player, have forgotten about you.

"The temptation is there to try and come back as quickly as possible but our physiotherapist Jim Walker kept me in order and it was a slow job."

"I was originally anticipating coming back around Christmas but there was a bit of a break and then one or two games were called off which gave me an extra couple of weeks.

"I don't know what the rest of the season holds in store for me. There are nine weeks left and it's going to be hard. The aim is just to get myself fit - yet again."

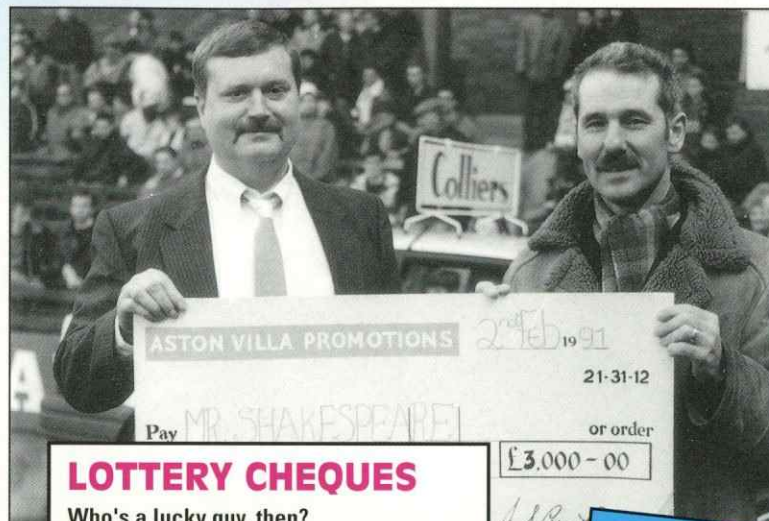

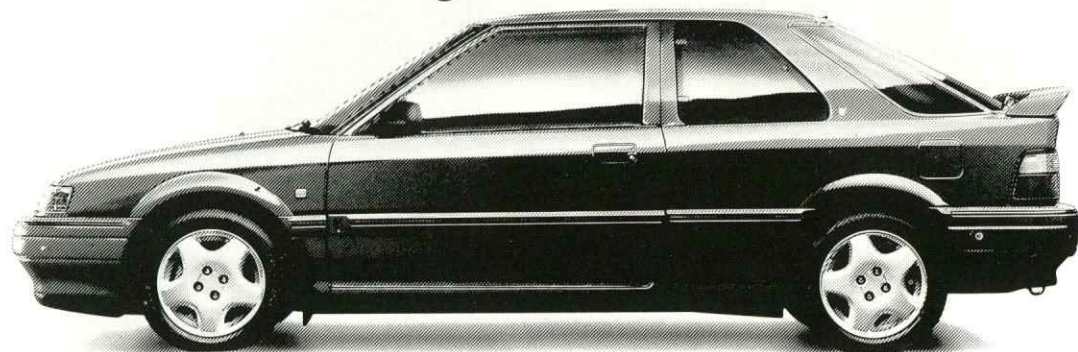

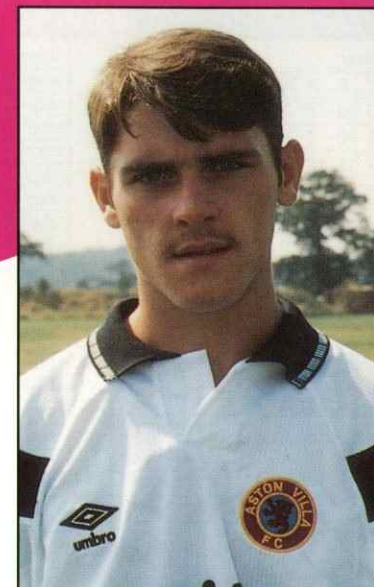

But, before he could get his career in France underway he had to undergo knee surgery and he then broke down immediately on his return, requiring more surgery.

Now there is a chance of his being available for the European Cup final stages.

WORLD CUP UK?
England have been officially named as one of the countries bidding to stage the 1998 World Cup Finals.

They have thrown their hat into the ring along with Brazil, Chile, France, India, Morocco, Portugal and Switzerland.

Bookmakers William Hill have quoted narrow odds of only 11-10 against England staging the finals four years after the USA event and 32 years since Alf Ramsey's side won against West Germany.

PLATINI JOB CHANGE
Michel Platini is showing signs of disenchantment with the French soccer scene which has been in so much turmoil in recent months.

Platini, the nation's greatest former player, hinted that he had received major offers when he said he could either 'take on more responsibilities in Paris' or move to a club job abroad.

However, at much the same time Platini was announcing a game between

England and France at Wembley on February 19, 1992. This would be a possible warm-up for the European Championship finals, assuming both nations qualify.

France were off to a flier in Group 1 with three wins out of three (against Iceland, Czechoslovakia and Albania) while England are involved in a far tighter schedule.

Graham Taylor's crunch match comes at Wembley on March 27 with the return leg against Jack Charlton's Irish Republic.

With both nations expecting similar results against Poland and Turkey and a draw already recorded in Dublin, the Wembley showdown could decide which nation goes through.

NOT MORE TROUBLE, DIEGO?
Diego Maradona continues to be the most newsworthy personality in world football.

On the heels of his World Cup Final pique, his break with his business manager, his returns to Argentina against club rules, his fines, his threats to quit, comes the latest bombshell.

From Naples came a report that his name was being linked to a drugs and sex ring uncovered through police tapping of telephone lines.

Amazingly, that report came only days after Napoli had announced that their rift with the Argentinian mega-star seemed to have been healed.

At last he had returned to the club's training ground for several successive days preparation and then scored two goals from penalties and set-up in the other two in a 4-2 victory over well-placed Parma.

Now his future in Italian football is in doubt again until the inquiries are completed.

All that apart, his life has been fairly dull lately...

Today: **BOBBY THOMSON**

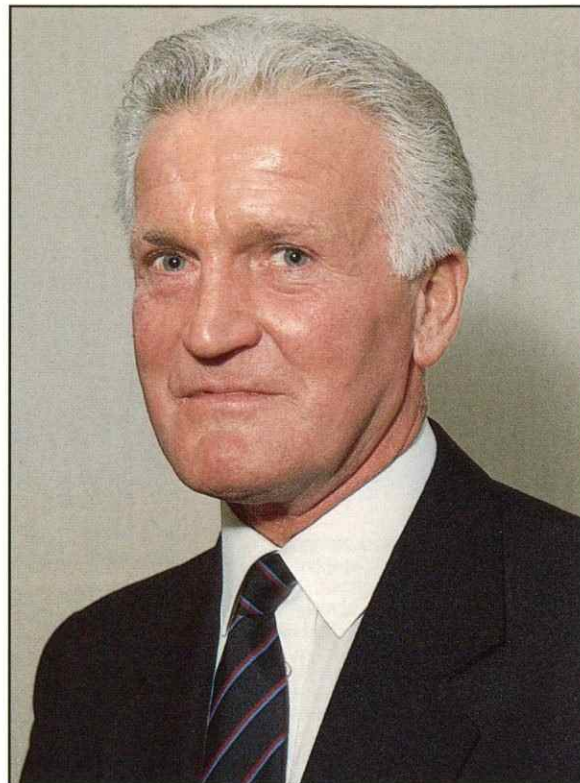
In June, 1959, Bobby Thomson was transferred from Wolves to Aston Villa, one of a few new players Manager Joe Mercer had drafted into the team following their relegation the season before.

At the time, I was chief football writer of the 'Birmingham Mail', and Thomson's arrival was a much-needed boost after the previous campaign's disasters.

Now Thomson had been sent off in his last game for Wolves and was given a two week's suspension by the Football Association, effective from the start of the new season.

So when I started writing the traditional pre-season articles on the West Midlands clubs prospects, I pointed out that Villa would not have Thomson in their team for the first three games.

Just after 2pm on the



day that piece was published, Joe Mercer called me. "You've got it all wrong" he said. "Thomson's only suspended for a week". My response was quick - and genuine. I promised to put the matter right in the remaining editions of the day, and set about doing just that. But ...

My Sports Editor wanted to know why I was changing the story. I explained. So then he wanted to know why I had been inaccurate in the first place; where had I got my original belief that a two weeks' suspension was involved?

I thought that it was something I had picked up and stored in my memory. He wasn't satisfied which, I suppose, was a back-handed tribute to my memory. "Check with the F.A." he said.

So I rang Lancaster Gate, and the F.A. spokesman confirmed: "Thomson is suspended for TWO weeks". My Sports Editor sniffed a bit of irregularity. "Ring Joe Mercer and ask him where he got HIS information from".

I duly called Villa Park. "Joe", I said, "I've been on to the F.A." ... and there was an anguished cry at the other end. "What have you done to me?" Joe wailed. By this time, I heard the penny drop. "Joe" I said, "you'd better tell me the whole story...."

And so the story came out. The F.A. had made a mistake. They had given Thomson a two weeks' 'sentence' alright - but the official notification was for only one, and all Joe had to do to make it legal was acknowledge it by returning a tear-off slip.

Of course the end of the story was that Joe was forced to call the F.A. and tell them they had made a mistake. They were very grateful. Joe was livid. And the following day's national newspapers reported the story of how honest Joe Mercer had told the truth, and the Football Association had been spared considerable embarrassment.

I tell this story today, for the first time, because I was reminded of it when Bobby and I met at a recent funeral. He knew nothing of it, naturally, and always thought he was down for two weeks anyway. And when he did finally play, he scored. He scored on his Wolves debut, and for Birmingham City when he stepped out for the St. Andrews side in September, 1963.

Now silver-haired, but immaculate and looking immensely fit, we had a great time remembering old times and old friends. He always felt that he stayed too long in the shadow of so many fine players assembled at Molineux, just as he had his most enjoyable period, from a personal point of view, with Blues.

For all three clubs he

was an incredible workaholic, either as an inside-forward or wing-half, despite a lifestyle in the fast lane. He worked as hard as he played - and that's no mean feat. And, in retrospect, he was better than he was given credit for.

A hard childhood led to a lengthy period at a military academy, and I always sensed that, come what may, he thought life was for living.

He scored 70 goals in 171 League and Cup appearances for Villa, and 26 goals in 125 appearances for Blues, plus his in and out appearances at Molineux. All three clubs had their monies' worth, though Bobby is adamant that he "wasted" his time with Wolves and should have left earlier.

These days, Bobby Thomson lives close to Birmingham's city centre, keeps active by playing a great deal of squash and tennis - but never watches football. "If there's something else on the telly, I'll watch it rather than football" he said. "No gripes. I'm one of those people who have to be participating. I was just the same as a player. If I didn't get the ball I would sulk".



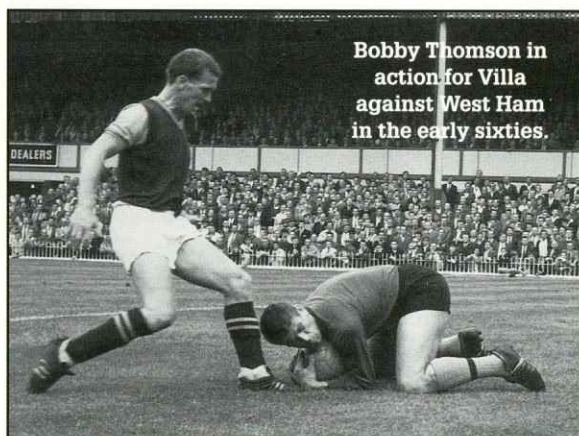

NEW SHOP TAKES OFF

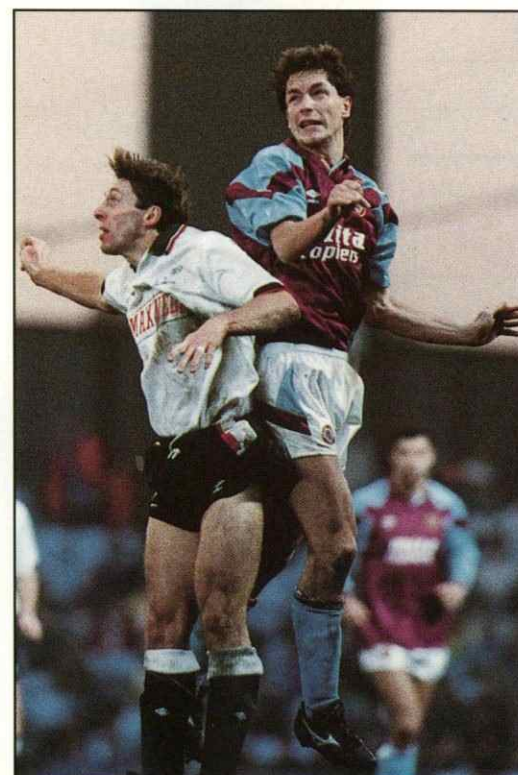
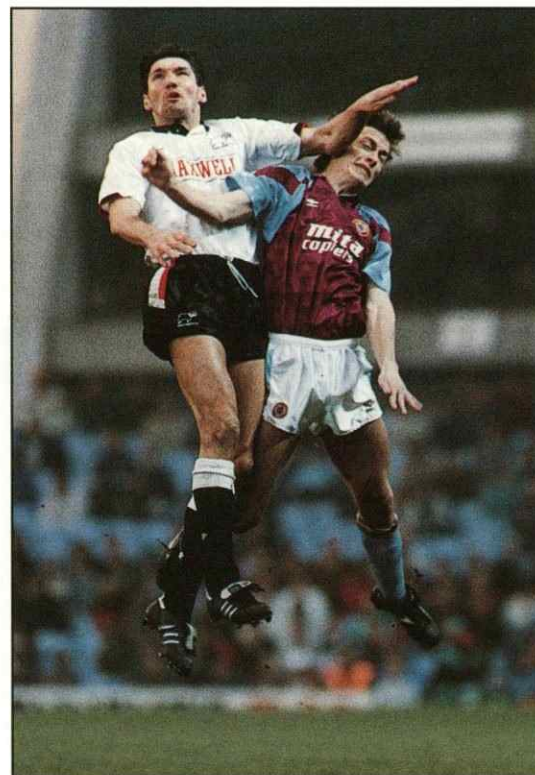
