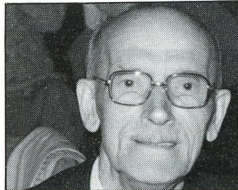
OLD MEMORIES

RETURN OF VISITING ON THE AGENDA - BUT

ALL IN THE LINE OF DUTY!

• Our first team squad enjoyed a relaxing and recreational visit to the Cranfield School of Management, courtesy of Murray Steele, on Tuesday. The outdoors problem-solving was good for team spirit and communication, said coach John Faulkner.

This afternoon we extend a warm welcome to Sunderland who are visiting Kenilworth Road for a league fixture for the first time since March 1985. Obviously, this is a vitally important fixture for both clubs, an experience we have grown used to in the last few seasons.

Judging from the interest shown in today's fixture, this is also being recognised by the media. Anglia Television will have five cameras here to film the action as their main regional match and, at the time of writing, Tyne Tees TV are also very interested.

Against a background of this level of interest, it is worth noting that we have had hundreds of applications from supporters of Sunderland - and Derby, too, for the final home match - to come to Luton and watch the match.

These supporters have all guaranteed their behaviour and since Sunderland nearly always take a following of at least 3,000 fans to their away games it is very difficult for me sometimes to enforce our position with our Membership Scheme at this time.

Many Sunderland supporters have pointed out to me that they only wish to enjoy the match and give their team the sort of backing which our own supporters supplied at the Baseball Ground when we played Derby

County at the end of last season. It is an invidious position to be in for me as I have to reject these pleas knowing our own fans travelled to Derby.

I have, of course, spoken and given interviews to several newspapers in the north-east explaining the situation and also asking Sunderland's supporters not to travel. There cannot be any change to the Membership Scheme this season.

We have looked at the possibility of beaming the match back live to diamond television screens at Roker Park, as we did for the FA Cup fixture against West Ham, but doubt the benefits and feasibility of this plan.

Opinions

It is at times like this that one feels most strongly the opinions of those people in the game who prefer to see visiting supporters at all matches and it is worth noting that, very often, the strongest opinions voiced against visiting supporters are held by non-football who have no interest in the game.

As many supporters already know, our board have expressed themselves very clearly in favour of the safe re-introduction of visiting supporters to our stadium on a controlled basis in the interests of the financial survival of the club.

SUPPORTERS IS BACK NOT THIS AFTERNOON

At the time of writing (on Wednesday), we were due to convene a scheduled meeting of the Safety Working Party who issue our Safety Certificate. Any of the club's propositions for changes to the stadium have to be submitted and approved by them.

I am confident that the outcome of the meeting will be well documented by the local press in the next couple of weeks and we shall take the opportunity of using our match programme for the game against Derby County on May 11 to explain all events and also to outline the price structure and membership arrangements for next season.

Even with the re-introduction of visitors, it will remain a priority for our own supporters to renew their membership in the interests of ensuring their own safety and comfort. Visitors, it is proposed, will be re-introduced in a safe and segregated manner.

Last weekend, the team played extremely well and were very unlucky not to get a result. As a supporter, I went home disappointed with the result but not the performance. Only one thing, apart from the result, marred the afternoon - John Fashanu's appalling tackle on David Beaumont

which, sadly, was not taken up by the referee who otherwise had an exemplary game.

The incident was made worse, I felt, by the equally disappointing way in which Ray Harford reacted, pre-judging the incident and making allegations about the actions of our physio as he ran on to treat David. The video clearly exonerates Dave Galley of any suggestion that he stepped on Fashanu and supports my view that he deserved congratulating for his prompt actions when a player had been hit so hard in the face.

Tongue

He could easily have swallowed his tongue, as Dave was well aware. It seemed to me that Ray was trying to deflect attention away from the original tackle. I have since spoken to him and he has told me that in hindsight he has seen the incident differently, admitting too that his words were not called for.

It is true Ray was caught up in the heat of the moment, but I believe his mistake was in believing he could speak off the record about such incidents at a press conference. A man of his experience should know better and should certainly have watched the video carefully before commenting.

In the end, only the excellence of goalkeeper Hans Segers and some profligate finishing stopped Luton from collecting all three points.

Lars Elstrup, Sean Farrell and Graham Rodger were the chief victims of Segers' form, but Fashanu, involved in a painful collision with David Beaumont in the first half, showed the way with the winner which he rifled into the roof of the net.

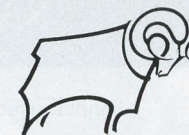

Saunders, who is partnered in attack by former Town favourite Mick Harford, has managed to score 14 League goals this season. His departure from the Baseball Ground now looks imminent. Meanwhile keeper Shilton has been earning continuing praise in the press recently for his fine displays.

Come to Kenilworth Road on May 11 to cheer on the Town in a game which could prove vital if the club are to remain in the First Division. Give the side as much vocal support as possible for the final time this season.

This afternoon we welcome the players and officials of fellow relegation strugglers Sunderland to Kenilworth Road. Promoted from Division Two last season, they have struggled to find their feet in the First Division this term, *writes Luke Nicoli*.

Sunderland fans could scarcely believe their luck when they heard last summer that the club would be promoted to the First Division in place of Swindon Town. Sunderland had lost 0-1 to Swindon in the promotion play-off finals at Wembley in May. Then came the shock verdict that Swindon would remain as a Second Division side after pleading guilty to abusing League rules. Sunderland were nominated to replace them in Division One. After an agonising wait, during which Swindon's appeal was rejected, the Rokerites were then able to lay plans for their return to the top flight after an absence of five years.

Manager Denis Smith made two pre-season signings to bolster his squad, paying Middlesbrough £300,000 for former England forward Peter Davenport and investing £350,000 in Portsmouth centre-back Kevin Ball. It was anticipated that Sunderland would find it difficult acclimatising to life back in the First Division, after all it is only three seasons ago that they were playing

Third Division football. They have won only one League match away from home, this was a 2-0 victory over Sheffield United, and have won only seven games in all. At the time of writing they are rooted in 19th position, five points adrift of the Town.

Sunderland A.F.C. were formed in 1879, the idea of local school teacher James Allan. The club was originally known as Sunderland and District Teachers A.F.C. and were successful in the area at amateur level. The issue of professionalism was almost the ruin of Sunderland, beginning with expulsion from the FA Cup after a tie with Middlesbrough in 1888. James Allan was so disillusioned he decided to break away and form a professional outfit called Sunderland Albion. The actions of Allan spurred the original Sunderland into action. They were determined not to play second fiddle. Backed by shipbuilding money, Tom Watson rejuvenated the club. They moved to Roker Park in 1889, the ground where they have remained since.

They won the League Championship in 1892, 1893, 1895, 1902, 1913 and 1936, the Division Two Championship in 1976 and the Division Three title in 1988. They have also won the FA Cup on two occasions in 1937 and 1973.

OFF THE RECORD

FEATURING...THOSE GOAL-DEN DAYS OF THE 1950'S

No article on the history of Luton Town would be complete without recounting the story of how in three successive home games against Sunderland a total of 21 goals were knocked in the "Wearsiders" net, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Season 1955/56 saw the Town in Division One for the first time and 19th November saw our first ever League meeting with Sunderland at Kenilworth Road. Luton were beginning to make their presence felt in this higher circle and had thrashed Wolves 5-1 in the previous home game.

Sunderland the "£125,000 team of all talents" were top of the table and were obviously seen as a severe test but on a day when the Town players all hit top form at the same time a remarkable 8-2 home win was the final result.

The game opened quietly and it was not until the 31st minute that a goal was scored when Gordon Turner banged home a penalty. By half time the Town were 4-0 up following goals from Mike Cullen (35 mins), Jim Adam (41 mins) and Bob Morton (44 mins).

With the second half only nine minutes old, Ray Daniel, the Sunderland centre half, pushed a back pass wide of his goalkeeper and Morton walked the ball into an empty net.

Turner converted another penalty and although Ted Purdon popped up with a consolation effort Cullen and Morton made it eight. In a despairing last minute rally Purdon scored again for Sunderland.

The national press obviously took great delight in the Luton performance considering the vast amounts

of money Sunderland had spent on their team compared to the Town and were more than pleased that Len Shackleton (the "Gazza" of the day) was not allowed a kick by Seamus Dunne.

Sunderlands visit the following season came on the opening day and another big crowd (23,049) turned out to see if a repeat performance was on the cards. The goals again flowed regularly with Cullen opening the scoring after 17 minutes and Turner banging in the number two straight after half-time.

Gordon Turner went on to score four goals that afternoon including a penalty with John Groves notching the other. Billy Bingham and Purdon scored for Sunderland.

A high score against the same opposition could not happen for a third season - or could it? Season 1957/58 saw Sunderland languishing at the wrong end of the table and by 8th February when they visited Kenilworth the proud record of being the only team never to play outside Division One looked likely to be broken.

This time the Town were 2-0 up at half time courtesy of goals from Groves and Allan Brown before Turner scored another four (47, 65, 69, 85 mins) taking his total to ten in the three games. Allan Brown finished off the scoring in the last minute making the score 7-1, Ambrose Fogarty having scored for Sunderland when the Town were already three up.

To everyone's disappointment Sunderland were relegated at the end of the season so we will never know whether a fourth hammering on the trot could have been achieved!

Apr 6: The Town throw away a 3-0 lead at Stamford Bridge to draw 3-3 with Chelsea.

Sunderland remain in 19th place following a 1-0 home defeat by QPR.

West Ham go top of Division Two following a 1-0 win at Port Vale. Yugoslav international Vlado Kasalo heads two own goals for German side Nurembourg and is, then arrested by German police for allegedly fixing matches.

Apr 7: Crystal Palace win the Zenith Data Systems Cup, beating Everton 4-1 after extra-time in front of 52,460 fans at Wembley. Bobby Robson's PSV Eindhoven remain top of the Dutch First Division following a 4-1 victory over closest rivals Ajax.

Apr 8: Proposals are made by the F.A. for an English 'Super League' of 18 clubs, which could quite possibly exclude the Town.

Clayton Blackmore receives a four month ban from playing for Wales following a sending off v Luxembourg last year.

Apr 9: In the race for the Championship, Arsenal are eight points clear after a 1-1 draw with Southampton at The Dell. Liverpool draw 1-1 at home to Coventry.

Motherwell face Dundee Utd in the Scottish Cup Final after beating Celtic 4-2 in their semi-final replay.

FOCUS ON SUNDERLAND

Tony Norman (goalkeeper): Tony started his career at Burnley but did not make his League debut until after joining Hull City in 1980. He spent nine seasons at Boothferry Park and made almost 450 appearances in all competitions. Sunderland signed him two seasons ago for £450,000. He is a Welsh international.

Gary Owers (defender): Newcastle born, Gary joined Sunderland as an apprentice, making his League debut v Brentford in 1987. He started the season in midfield, but has since reverted to the right-back position.

Paul Hardyman (defender): Paul was playing non-league football for Southern League side Fareham Town when Portsmouth signed him in 1983. He then spent six full seasons at Fratton Park, gaining England under-21 caps before joining Sunderland for £130,000.

Gary Bennett (defender): Club captain, Gary started his career with his local club Manchester City but got his League chance soon after moving to Cardiff City in 1981. He has been a regular at the heart of Sunderland's defence since 1984 and has made nearly 250 League appearances.

Kevin Ball (defender): Kevin, who was signed from Portsmouth last summer, started his career at Coventry but did not make their League eleven. After moving to Portsmouth, he made his League debut at Shrewsbury in 1984 and played over 100 League games for Pompey before his departure.



Marco Gabbiadini

John Kay (defender): John made his League debut playing for Arsenal in 1983. After failing to command a regular place in the Gunner's line-up, he moved on to Wimbledon in 1984. After three seasons at Plough Lane, which included a loan spell at Middlesbrough, he joined Sunderland.

Colin Pascoe (midfield): Colin started his career with Swansea and made his League debut v Brighton in 1983. While at the Vetch Field he became a Wales under-21 international before graduating to the full Wales team. Sunderland signed him for £70,000 in 1988.

Paul Bracewell (midfield): Paul returned for his second spell at Roker Park last season, joining the club from Everton. He has three full England caps.

Gordon Armstrong (midfield): Gordon is a former Sunderland apprentice who graduated to the first team in 1985, making his League debut v West Bromwich Albion.

Kieron Brady (midfield): Kieron is an ex-Sunderland apprentice who turned professional in July 1989. He made his Sunderland debut v Plymouth in November 1989, and has recently enjoyed an extended run in the first team.

Peter Davenport (forward): Peter began his career with Nottingham Forest where he earned his reputation as a goalscorer. Manchester United paid £575,000 for him in 1986 and he was their top-scorer in his first season with 16 goals. He joined Middlesbrough in 1988 before joining Sunderland for £300,000 last summer.

David Rush (forward): Nineteen year-old local lad, David is a fine prospect for the future. The Wearsider's reserve top scorer made his League debut at Crystal Palace on Boxing Day and scored in the Rokerite's 2-1 defeat.

Marco Gabbiadini (forward): Marco joined York City as a schoolboy and graduated to first-team duty with them in 1985. He made a reputation as a consistent goalscorer and, when Denis Smith left York to manage Sunderland, Marco was one of his early signings. He netted 22 goals in 1987/88, 23 the following season and last season he was top-scorer again with a personal best of 26.

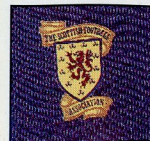
