




Staying in the First Division was our priority from November onwards. That objective has been achieved but there is a lot of work to be done if we are to build up to the success which we all want at Goodison Park.

It was pleasing that we avoided anxiety in the last month of the season. In many ways, this was due to a welcome improvement in our away form. We are unbeaten in the last five League games away from Goodison and with any luck we would have turned a couple of the draws into victories.

I would like to thank you all for your support. It hasn't been the easiest of seasons for Evertonians; even when we were virtually safe in the League, there was that big disappointment in the FA Cup quarter-final.

Here's hoping that we can round off the home programme today with a good performance. Luton Town are battling away at the bottom so we can guarantee that they will come out battling for a win.

The last two games here were not the best from our point of view. The defeat by Wimbledon was very disappointing and then we let a two-goal lead slip against Chelsea. We did that at Aston Villa as well and people might be asking: Are they sitting back? I don't think that is the case and I certainly haven't been instructing the players to hold what they have.

◆ After the way we played at Tottenham in our last game, it would be nice to put on a similar show in front of our own fans, but without conceding goals. When you go in front three times away from home, it is frustrating to finish with a draw.

It was a very entertaining game with some good combination play from both sides in the middle of the field. I thought our attitude was positive from the start and we got on top with the advantage of an early goal from Pat Nevin.

Spurs levelled it against the run of play, breaking down the left and putting in a good

cross for Paul Allen to score.

But we got on with the job again and went back in front with an own goal from Paul Stewart. Unlucky for Spurs but Peter Beagrie's cross put them in trouble and if Stewart hadn't made contact, the ball would have gone through to Nevin, who was waiting for what would have been a simple chance. As far as I'm concerned, it's always nice to see the ball in the back of the net no matter who puts it away!

Spurs came back strongly and equalised again when Gary Mabbutt connected with a tremendous volley, but we were still making chances and looking confident on the ball. The third goal came from a drive from distance by Andy Hinchcliffe.

I'm not sure whether Erik Thorstvedt was trying to catch the ball or put it over the top, but it was came down off the underside of the bar and there was Tony Cottee, ever eager for an opportunity, popping the rebound over the line.

Spurs eventually saved a point when Nayim decided to do something special. He bent his shot round everyone and the ball hit the far post before rolling into the net.

Disappointing, yes, but on the credit side, I think that certain individuals could possibly say they had their best games for a while.

That was our second trip to London in five days. It was certainly more eventful than the goalless draw at Crystal Palace, although did have chances there, especially in the first half, and didn't take them. The pitch wasn't in the best of condition and it wasn't easy to put together flowing movements.

We left Robert Warzycha on the bench at Selhurst Park because he didn't arrive back from playing for Poland until late on Thursday. He's only been with us for seven weeks and already he has played three times for his country.

That has meant an awful lot of travelling. Even with Poland's game in Ireland this week, he had to report back to Warsaw to join the squad.

◆ Finally, we are pleased that Pat Nevin has agreed to sign a one-year contract and that Kevin Sheedy has come off the transfer list. Naturally we are delighted that Kevin is to stay with us because we don't want players to feel unsettled.

We have released Neil Sang and Marcus Ebdon, two of our younger professionals, and we wish them well in the future.

Happy Birthday, Bellefield!



THE Bellefield complex is 25 years old this summer and today we acknowledge the silver anniversary with a step down memory lane.

England was gripped by World Cup fever in July 1966 when leading football administrators - who were on Merseyside for Brazil's first group match at Goodison - gathered for the official opening of "the best training facilities in Europe."

This was not a lofty claim by the club but a compliment paid by the national manager, Alf Ramsey, after an inspection of the construction work when England played Poland at Goodison Park in January 1966.

In the *Evertonia* column in a match programme that month, the Editor wrote: "The visiting Press and members of the England International party were most impressed when they saw the manner in

which we are making Bellefield, our training ground, into one of the finest in the land.

"The project of re-building will set us back £109,042, but the outcome should make us the envy of every club in the land.

"Work is proceeding apace. Gone is the old pavilion, and in its place has been built a new one which should soon be available. The vast indoor playing pitch is growing steadily, and we hope that by next month we may have Bellefield operating completely.


"The cost includes the purchase price of the ground, the groundsman's residence, boilers, draining, seeding and levelling pitches, and external work. The new pavilion alone costs £34,675, and the indoor playing pitch will swallow up £39,000. The indoor pitch means that full training can take place no matter the weather and in daylight or at night. There

can be few bigger, and glancing at it the first time you think 'they could play a match in here!'

"When we were there the roof had been completed, and heavy mechanical rollers were ensuring an absolutely level surface. Granted there seems a lot still to be done, but a few more weeks should see Bellefield really coming into its own.

"The plan is for Bellefield to take over completely as the training centre, leaving Goodison for matches only. At the moment the players report each day to Goodison for training, change and travel by coach to Bellefield for their work-outs then motor back to Goodison for baths and lunch before . . . off to Bellefield again.

"Shortly, however, it will be a case of farewell Goodison, for with the specially-designed Bellefield pavilion, all the work will be centred there. Baths, stripping rooms, luncheon rooms . . . the lot."

Bellefield has since been home to great players and great teams. Perhaps the greatest compliment to those who commission the project is that, after a quarter-of-a-century, the facilities are as good as, and in the main better than, any in the country.

The players were soon to appreciate both the luxury and convenience of their new weekday headquarters.

"It was great not to have to report to Goodison and then go up to Bellefield on the bus," recalls Jimmy Gabriel. "We came up here, parked our cars and walked straight into our own dressing rooms.

"We thought it was a great set-up. After training, there'd be a bite to eat and then we would relax with a game of table tennis in the players' room.

"The indoor arena was a great asset. Although you want to be outside whenever possible, we could train in all weathers.

When it was first laid, the pitch was red shale but nowadays it's astro-turf."

Bellefield became known as Harry Caterick's fortress. The gates were locked during training sessions and the famous manager had his office built so that he could look down on the two grass pitches.

"We'd sometimes look up and see a hand opening a tiny gap in the blinds," says Gabriel.

"We knew he was watching and everybody would run a little bit faster!"

"I also remember him making it very clear where he expected to park his car. There was no designated spot for the manager, but we soon found out which space he'd chosen. If anyone else parked there, he'd jam his car up behind theirs and they wouldn't be able to get out!"

SUMMER CHANGES AT GOODISON . . .

♦ Immediately the final game of the season is staged contractors will move in to commence a number of major projects which have to be completed for the opening game of the 1991/92 season on August 10th.

The creation of the new seated area on the *Gwladys Street terraces* has already been well publicised and work is already in hand.

The **Goodison Park playing surface** is also to be completely reconstructed during the close season. The existing surface will be removed to a depth of 100mm and replaced with a new sand/soil mix. Seeding is due to be completed by May 29th and the new playing surface will be ready for our opening game, which is expected to be a friendly game against Gornik F.C. on August 10th. This game with Gornik was arranged during our negotiations with Gornik for the signing of Robert Warzycha.

It is eight years since there was major surgery on our pitch which has been recognised as one of the best playing surfaces in the U.K. over recent years. The reconstruction will ensure that Goodison Park will continue to be one of the premier pitches.

The existing **Ticket Office** and **Promotions Department** is also due for a major refurbishing during the close season and both departments will be operating from temporary accommodation.

The computer software used to operate the Ticket Office has been upgraded over recent months and additional office space is to be allocated to the Dial-a-Seat service which is a fast growing side of the business. More and more of our supporters are making use of this service to reserve their seats and additional resources are being allocated to cope with the anticipated increase over the coming seasons. The new Ticket Office will have a number of new design features, including a Dial-a-Seat collection office and selling windows accessed direct from the street for use on match days. These alterations, coupled with the removal of the Members Only areas and the introduction of cash admissions to the Top Balcony next season are designed to make it easier for our supporters to buy tickets and gain admission to games at Goodison Park.



Almost every player who signs for Everton says that Bellefield gives a marvellous first impression of what the club has to offer.

Martin Keown and Ray Attewell are two who can confirm that the complex has stood the test of time. They were born in the year that Bellefield buildings were completed, and 25 years on, they are appreciative of the facilities provided for the players.

Comment

WHEREVER you stand on the issue of the so-called professional foul - "send them all off" or "let's apply some discretion" - there is little doubt that the hot potato landed in the referees' corner.

A number of our leading officials have run into controversy in their application of the instruction which basically says that it is a red card offence if a player brings down an opponent who is moving directly towards goal.

If the referee is satisfied on the two counts - i.e. that a foul was committed and a clear goal-scoring opportunity was lost - he has no option but to send off the offending player. The punishment applies irrespective of the physical severity of the challenge. A gentle nudge is no different to a violent tackle.

While referees are obliged to view such an incident as an open-and-shut case, there are bound to be occasions when there is an element of doubt as to whether the defending player is acting with intent. It is not always easy to decide whether a trip is intentional or merely a tangling of legs.

It is probably true to say that the dilemma which can present itself to all referees was brought into sharp focus when Tony Gale, the West Ham United defender, was sent off in the FA Cup semi-final. It would be totally wrong to comment on a particular decision, but judging from the letters page of The Daily Telegraph, it can be said that the referee is often placed in an unenviable situation.

A reader from Portsmouth took the television commentators to task for being too ready to blame the referee and added: "Gale was beaten all ends up for pace ... this is exactly the type of professional foul that the red card is designed for."

Another correspondent, from Manchester, criticised The Telegraph for a misleading caption to a photograph showing only the start of a situation which "culminated two or three seconds later in the deliberate push which Mr Hackett punished."

That was two votes in favour of the referee, but, in an adjacent column, another writer, from Buckinghamshire, was distinctly unhappy with a ruling which "ruined the game as a spectacle for the 40,000-plus spectators who went to the match as well as millions of armchair viewers."

Given the above conflict of opinion, it becomes obvious that some decisions, or even the cut-and-dried nature of the law

itself, will not meet with 100 per cent approval. The problem is that debate is timeless but the referee's interpretation has to be applied in a split-second.

◆ Another talking point from the FA Cup was the suggestion that Tottenham secured an early advantage for the Final in playing their semi-final with Arsenal at Wembley.

Few people in North London would have questioned a decision which was made purely for safety reasons, although The Telegraph noted the irony that Wembley Stadium station was closed due to engineering works.

Columnist Ian Ridley said: "It meant a larger than average throng at Wembley Park tube station coming through the pedestrian underpass on to Olympic Way. At the concourse by the stadium's twin towers, there was thus a crush."

Mr Ridley later turned to the argument that playing semi-finals at the venue devalues the mystique of the Wembley experience. Suggesting that this no longer applies, he quoted a supporting statistic: "When Birmingham City play there in the Leyland DAF Cup final, they will be the 38th League club to have played competitively on the turf in the last six years."

That is our cue, on behalf of all Merseysiders, to wish Tramere Rovers well on their mission to retain the Leyland trophy when they meet Birmingham on Sunday 26th May. They went to Wembley twice last season and could repeat a considerable double by returning for the Third Division play-offs again this year.

The Spring Bank Holiday festival adds to the surfeit of football at the old stadium. There were matches on three consecutive week-ends in April and this month the Leyland final will be the fourth in successive weeks, following on behind the FA Vase, FA Trophy and FA Cup.

◆ **The Rumbelows League Cup**
Final a fortnight ago prompted a gem of a paragraph from the pen of David Lacey in his preview in *The Guardian*.

Albeit with a show of misplaced optimism for Manchester United, he wrote: "So there is every chance that tomorrow Bryan Robson will be receiving the League Cup from someone called Tracy, Rumbelows' 'Employee of the Year', and not a character invented by Keith Waterhouse. But strange things can happen at Wembley. Three years ago, Wimbledon beat Liverpool and collected the FA Cup from a former child-minder called Di."

RAPID PROMOTION FOR BARLOW...

◆ **Former Business Houses League striker Stuart Barlow completed a rapid rise to the First Division when he played in the last two home games.**

And that was far more than the first-year professional from Fazakerley expected when he gave up his job in a supermarket last summer.

Stuart's main target was to do well enough to play regularly in the reserves and earn another contract. He says: "When I signed on for one year, Colin Harvey told me to do my best and then they would take it from there.

"It has certainly gone as well I could have hoped. Everyone has been saying to me that from coming Sunday football to the First Division in nine or ten months is quite an achievement."

He learned that he would be making his senior debut an hour-and-a-half before the kick-off against Wimbledon. And that was time enough for him to alert his family and his pals at his old Sunday club, Sherwood Park.

He said: "I think the whole of Fazakerley was there. They must have put a few on the gate! All my mates from the Sunday team always come along, even for the reserve games. I meet them afterwards for a chat and I always return the compliment by watching their games."

Stuart regarded it as "a big boost" to get a taste of first-team football. He added: "It would have been nice to win, but from my own point of view, it was good experience for me, just to see what it was like to play First Division football.

"I think it was probably better for me to come on as sub in the first game I played against Wimbledon. It gave me a chance to get the feel of what it was like and get used to the crowd."

"When I played in the next game against Chelsea, I was more relaxed because I knew what to expect."

FRIENDLY FIXTURES TO CLOSE SEASON...

◆ **When the League campaign closes at QPR next Saturday, there will be just two more games to wrap up a season's work for the Everton squad.**

We have provisionally arranged to play in a testimonial game against Hearts at Tynecastle on Monday 13th May and a friendly against Shamrock Rovers in Dublin on Friday 17th May.

However, the season will carry on well into May for those required for international duty.

Kevin Ratcliffe and Neville Southall will be with the Welsh squad as late as June 5th when they play in an important European Championship match against Germany.

The Welsh party will assemble on May 25th for two warm-up games. They are to play a testimonial at Craven Cottage for Fulham forward Gordon Davies on May 27th and will then travel to Poland for an international on May 29th which is likely to involve Robert Warzycha.

The summer break for the Welshmen will be less than five weeks before we report back for training in the first week of July.

For Ian Snodin, it will be a working close season. Having taken a complete rest since his last hamstring operation in January, he is now beginning a gradual build-up with light exercises. "I won't be starting the harder work until June," he says.

We have yet to finalise plans for pre-season fixtures. It is likely that we will go abroad for a couple of matches and we have also pencilled in a home friendly against Gornik Zabrze.

The League programme will begin with an away fixture on Saturday 17th August. The First Division will be back to its traditional format of 42 matches and a decision

will be taken during the summer on whether to introduce two-leg ties in each round of the Rumbelows League Cup.

Graeme Sharp's testimonial match against Glasgow Celtic, which was delayed because of cup commitments, will now be arranged for the earliest convenient date next season.

YOUNG BLUES FOR HOLLAND...

◆ **The youth squad are to join Arsenal in a top-quality tournament in Holland later this month.**

The two English clubs will be competing with Ajax Amsterdam, Feyenoord Rotterdam, PSV Eindhoven, Groningen (the host club), BV Veendam, Barcelona, Napoli, Galatasaray (Turkey) and the national teams of the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia.

The age group is under-19 and the matches will be played over three days, 18th-20th May.

The Everton party is expected to be: Walsh, Wilson, Moore, O'Neill, Jenkins, McDonough, Gouldstone, Priest, Unsworth, Bayley, Woods, Kenny, Langton, Doolan, Norris, Sharrock, Dulson.

Before travelling to Holland, the second-year YTS players will be taking a course for the FA Preliminary Coaching Award in the week beginning May 13th. Ray Hall says: "This will give them some idea of what it's like to be on the other side of the fence."

GOODISON 'KEEPER GOES TO SWEDEN...

◆ **Alasdair Monk (above), a YTS player for two seasons, has been released and is now starting a new career with a league club in Sweden.**

The 18-year-old goalkeeper left Goodison with best wishes for the future and already he is involved in the start of a new summer season on a part-time contract with IFK Stromstad.

While Monk departed, we welcomed a new schoolboy signing from Sunderland. Stephen Halliday, a centre forward, attends Southmoor Comprehensive School and was in the Sunderland under-15 side which reached the last eight in the English Schools Trophy before going out to Sefton.

EX-BLUES STARS ON THE BEAZER BEAT...

◆ **Two players who appeared as forward partners for Everton in the early 1980s met up this season in the Midland Division of the Beazer Homes League.**

And it was total surprise for Peter Eastoe when he walked into the boardroom at his club, Bridgnorth Town, and discovered that Bob Latchford is now a director of Alvechurch.

"I couldn't believe it when I saw Bob," said Eastoe, who, at 37, is still active as Bridgnorth's player-coach. "It's more like a game of golf to me these days. I'm relaxing and enjoying my football," he added.

Honours were even in this season's meetings between the two ex-Everton strikers. Bridgnorth won 3-0 at home but Alvechurch, struggling at the foot of the division, recently scraped home by a single goal in the return game.

Latchford is now a sales representative for a manufacturing company in the West Midlands and Eastoe is on the road as a van driver.





Now, on the subject of the great "Dixie", a brickbat from keen Evertonian statistician, Ian Kidd, of Southdene, Kirkby, who writes:

"In your Goodison Greats feature on Tommy Eglington, you state that 'Dixie' Dean twice scored five goals in a game for Everton... this should read three times, these being: 8.10.27 v Man. Utd; 17.10.31 v Sheff. Wed.; 14.11.83 v Chelsea.

The following may also be of interest. While Jack Balmer (from a certain other club) is credited with being the only player to score a hat-trick in three successive games, 'Dixie' did this in the 1920s: 4 v Burnley (a) 28.4.28; 3 v Arsenal (h) 5.5.28 (THE game!); 3 v Bolton (a) 25.8.28.

"Also, a certain soccer book gives the record of 'longest individual scoring sequence' as ten games by Aldridge (who?) Guess what? W.R. Dean beat this on two occasions!

"At the start of the 1929-30 season, he played in 12 of the first 15 games, scoring in all 12 (16 goals). During 1930-31 (Div. II), in 12 successive games from 6.12.30 to 18.2.31, he scored in each match (23 goals)."

LAST season Luton Town stayed up by winning their last three games. This time they may need to win the last two fixtures to retain their First Division place for a tenth season in succession.

The situation turned against the Hatters a fortnight ago when they missed a chance to "kill off" Sunderland, but there was a sniff of encouragement when Aston Villa, the other club fighting to avoid the last relegation place, were beaten at home by Wimbledon and Manchester City in four days.

Now Luton have to go all-out for victories at Goodison today and at home to the already-doomed Derby County next week - an uncanny repeat of last year's final game in which they saved themselves by winning 3-2 at the Baseball Ground.

Even a six-point maximum might not be sufficient to overhaul Villa, who are at Leeds today before finishing with home games against Norwich and Chelsea next week. But it's much closer in the battle with Sunderland, who face Arsenal at Roker this afternoon and then travel to Manchester City next Saturday.

Luton have won three times away from home, most importantly when they triumphed at Villa Park in March during a successful spell which also brought home wins against Liverpool and Nottingham Forest.

Earlier in the season, they were in the top ten - despite shipping ten goals in defeats at QPR (1-6) and Liverpool (0-4) - but the relegation pressure has built over the last two months. Their only points in the last eight games came from draws with Spurs and Chelsea.

Danish striker Lars Elstrup has enjoyed a productive second season with 17 goals and two of the more experienced players, defender John Dreyer and midfielder David Preece, have been towers of strength in a young side.

Northern Ireland international Kingsley Black is a much-admired winger and the

former Everton 'keeper, Alec Chamberlain, has earned regular praise for his outstanding performances.

Now they all face the most testing week of a difficult campaign. And Hatters fans won't worry too much about shredded nerves if their team should repeat the drama of 1983 when Raddy Antic, now manager of Real Madrid, scored with four minutes of the season remaining at Maine Road. The Yugoslav's goal kept Luton up and put Manchester City into Division 2.

RECORD SPOT

◆ GORDON TURNER scored 243 League goals for Luton between 1952 and 1964. He also hit 22 in cup-ties for a club record aggregate of 265.

Transfers...

◆ Luton revealed that they had little alternative but to sell Iain Dowie to West Ham shortly before the transfer deadline in March.

The Northern Ireland striker's £480,000 move to Upton Park went through only five months after the Hammers had paid £600,000 for Luton full back Tim Breacker.

Chairman Peter Nelkin said that Dowie, a £30,000 signing from non-League Hendon two years ago, was sold "purely for financial reasons".

Last season Luton raised nearly £1.5m for Roy Wegerle (QPR) and Mick Harford (Derby) and in the summer they parted with Danny Wilson (£200,000 to Sheffield Wednesday) and Mick Kennedy (£180,000 to Stoke).

Luton promoted a number of young players and achieved some promising results, partly on the goal-scoring ability of record signing Lars Elstrup, who cost around £600,000 last season.

Goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain delivered another success story. After one season as understudy to Les Sealey, the £150,000 recruit from Everton has been number one 'keeper for two years.

Skipper John Dreyer, who cost £140,000 from Oxford in 1988, is a cornerstone of a defence which has also included Dave Beaumont (£150,000 from Dundee United), Darren McDonough (£87,500 from Oldham) and Graham Rodger (£150,000 from Coventry).

David Preece, signed from Walsall by former manager David Pleat for £150,000, is a key player in midfield, but former England international Steve Williams (£300,000 from Southampton) did not regain his place after suspension in February.

This year, Luton paid £25,000 for Wokingham midfielder Paul Holsgrave and released winger Richard Cooke to Bournemouth on a free transfer, two years after buying him from the Third Division club for £140,000.



GOODISON GREATS

NOBODY who witnessed Tony Cottee's last-minute equaliser in that 4-4 FA Cup classic with Liverpool will appreciate how he felt more than Jackie Grant.


He had the same exhilarating experience in a replay against Wolves over 40 years ago and it is still fresh in his memory.

After gaining a creditable 1-1 draw at Molineux in January 1948 the teams returned to Goodison the following Saturday and with a minute to go Everton were trailing 2-1.

Wally Fielding, who had scored our goal, took a corner under the shadow of the church and it led to the highlight of Jackie's career.

"Two players went up for it," says Jackie. "I think it might have been Harry Catterick making the challenge. Anyway, the ball fell to me and I belted it as hard as I could into the roof of the net.

"Eddie Wainwright told me later that if he hadn't ducked the shot would have taken his head off."



Wally Fielding scored the winner in extra time but it was Jackie's equaliser that sparked off some remarkable scenes in a crowd nearly double the size of that for our replay with Liverpool.

Thousands who had been drifting out of the ground swarmed back in and Jackie recalls, "People clambered out of the paddock to lift me up."

That wasn't too difficult with a player who stood just over 5ft 4ins tall. "Even little Alec Stevenson used to call me Shorty," says Jackie.

"I never miss a home game and I couldn't help remembering my own late equaliser when I saw Tony Cottee score against Liverpool. I knew exactly how he felt and I envied him. It will be a moment he will treasure for years to come."

Jackie, a north-easterner, travelled down from Newcastle for a trial at Goodison in 1939. "It was a long lonely journey for a boy not yet 15," he says, "but it was also very exciting.

"Everton gave me a game on a Saturday night then signed me on, but the war broke out and I returned home to play for a team called High Spen.

"In 1942 a friend wrote to Everton's manager, Theo Kelly, about me and I was invited back to Merseyside where the club got me a job as a panel-beater.

"I made my debut at Anfield alongside such players as Alec Stevenson, who was on leave from the RAF, Tommy Lawton, Cliff Britton and Torry Gillick.

"Despite the upset of the war I managed to play with most of the greats who had brought the title to the club in 1939. T.G. Jones is still the best centre-half I have ever seen.

"But it was hard to hold a place at wing-half at Goodison in those days. In addition to Britton and Joe Mercer there was also Stan Bentham and Gordon Watson.



"Yet after the war Joe moved to Arsenal and I played a lot more games."

Despite his lack of height the little Geordie was remarkably versatile and played in seven different positions for the club, from full-back to outside-left.

"While that equaliser against Wolves was the highlight of my career, I must confess I didn't score a lot of goals," says Jackie. "In fact, I can remember most of them."

"We met Sunderland twice over Christmas and I scored in both games. Then there was a 25-yard volley I put away against Middlesbrough from Ted Buckle's corner-kick and I scored another against Huddersfield within a minute of the kick-off.

"I used to joke with the lads that while I didn't score many they were all good 'uns.'

Towards the end of his Everton days Jackie skippered the reserves before moving to Rochdale in 1956 with Eddie Wainwright and Glyn Lewis, shortly to be followed by Cyril Lello.

"It was very much a case of the Everton old boys association," says Jackie, "because Rochdale's manager was Harry Catterick, another former team mate. And his trainer was also from Merseyside, Joe Fagan."

After over two seasons with the Lancashire club, during which he made over 100 appearances, Jackie moved on to Southport where his old mate Wally Fielding was player-manager.

He hung up his boots in 1961 and returned to the motor trade with Fords where he worked for 24 years, although he retained his links with Everton through his



son David who helped us win the FA Youth Cup in 1965.

David is now working in property security while the other son, Leslie, is in the fruit and vegetable market. Jackie lost his wife, Lily, 17 years ago.

Since arriving at Goodison nearly 50 years ago Jackie has never strayed very far away. As a player he lived in Goodison Avenue and his present home is opposite

the main stand where he has Cyril Lello and Tommy Clinton for neighbours.

As a regular spectator he keeps in touch with other ex-players in Jimmy O'Neill, Derek Temple and Brian Labone.

Says Jackie, "The modern game is undoubtedly a lot quicker than the one we played, but while a lot of former players knock it I still enjoy it."

"And I tend to agree with what Derek


Temple said earlier in this series. If we had trained at today's pace we would have been able to play at it."





POWER PROJECT

◆ **Former Everton player and coach Paul Power has re-opened links with Goodison Park in a new career in the Football in the Community scheme.**

The 37-year-old Mancunian, who won a Championship medal in his first season with the Blues in 1986-87, was recently appointed Area Manager for the North West region.

This will eventually encompass ten clubs - four in Greater Manchester (City, United, Oldham and Stockport), three on Merseyside (Everton, Liverpool and Tranmere), plus Crewe, Wrexham and Chester.

"Basically, it's up to me to make sure that the projects are running smoothly at each club," says Paul. "It is a big change, although I'm still wearing a tracksuit.

"There's not as much coaching involved. It's more an administrative position. I tell everyone now that I'm brilliant at writing minutes and agendas for meetings!

"That part of the job is not beyond me and I'm quite comfortable doing it, but, yes, I do miss the involvement of being with a particular club and the excitement of matchdays etc.

"I've been to Everton a few times and Manchester City as well. What I try to do is go to a game at the clubs in my area. I'm still seeing plenty of football and I do find that I can watch now in more a relaxed way.

"When I went to games in the past on behalf of Everton, I was watching either a particular player or doing a team analysis. Now I can sit there and enjoy the games a little bit more."

Paul, of course, is well qualified to cope with the paper work, having studied for a law degree before becoming a regular first-team player with Manchester City.


The Community Programme started about four years ago with six clubs and since then it has snowballed. At the moment, there are 50 clubs involved - the

majority of the clubs in the North West, the North East and Yorkshire, as well as some in the Midlands.

The Football Trust has agreed to fund the project with the co-operation of the three major bodies in the game - the Football Association, the Football League and the Professional Footballers' Association.

"It's a good scheme," says Paul. "The idea is to make each club the focal point in the community. We want to use the facilities of the clubs as much as possible and we are looking for players from the clubs to go out with their community officer and promote the name of their club, in this case, Everton.

"It's really to try and encourage people to play the game and also to encourage them to watch the game. There are some who can't play - the likes of handicapped people, senior citizens and possibly ladies. We want them to come to the clubs and keep up football's share of spectator inter-

This last point was a factor in the judges' verdict this season. Gordon Wright, a leading programme collector, noted: "Everton continue to lead the way with excellent articles, superb use of colour, good sophisticated coverage, and with the minimum amount of adverts."

Tony Shaw, chairman of the panel of judges, said: "Once again Everton and Villa ran neck and neck for first place with Everton just winning with 'a better feel of a programme'."

The top two programmes are "stable mates" - produced and designed by Bernard Gallagher's team at Sport Projects Ltd and printed for a first season by Gerald Toon's newly-assembled "squad" at ACL Polar Colour Print (UK) Ltd.

Rivalry is preserved by individual teams for writing and photography. And there can be no arguments about neutrality... Trevor Hartley designs the Everton programme and he's a Villa supporter!

Mike Beddow, the editor at Everton, has been involved in our programme for 21 years, but this season's award is a first for our new photographer, John Cocks.

The club would like to add its congratulations to all concerned and also to acknowledge the work of the Football League Executive Staffs Association (FLESA) and MATCH magazine in organising the competition.

A special mention, too, for Wrexham on winning the Division Four award for a third season in succession. Their programme is a credit to a club which sells to gates of 2,000 or less.


