



## Welcome back for our 10th year at the top

Welcome back, particularly to all true "Hatters" supporters who have followed our fortunes through thick and thin and understand the particular and sometimes peculiar characteristics of our Club.

Luton Town are living precariously with the big boys for the 10th consecutive year, an achievement which will win no awards, but deserves recognition. It should not be forgotten that the foundation for that survival was laid during those tremendous years as we steered our way to the Division Two Championship. Since gaining the right to play at the top, the Club has been guided through a financial minefield by John Moore, Ray Harford and Jim Ryan and each of them has tasted the unique feeling of leading underdogs. They all did well.

I would particularly like to wish Jim Ryan well in the future. It was no surprise to receive a telegram at Upton Park last week wishing everyone well. But the realisation that a Football Club must be a harmonious team on and off the field was never more clearly manifested than during the events of recent seasons. Chairman - changing, like musical chairs, selling our ground, the acceleration of unaffordable wages, no selling of marginal players and as a result, a gradual erosion of the strength of the team; add unkept promises, that have unnerved our Bankers, and you understand the scenario.

To this you can add the diffidence towards our Club by the away supporters ban and the intolerance towards our artificial pitch.

Althea Gibson the American tennis player once piquantly remarked "No-one ever achieved anything without the help of others". I have come here with one thought; to pull together, observe and help improve the standing of our Club on and off the field.

I will need the help of everyone. Only

those with effort, energy, quality and loyalty will survive.

Welcome back to Brian Stein, and welcome to Philip Gray. Luton can be a perfect platform for his ambitions. We have a clear goal, short term and long. Initially we need maximum gates to support the genuine efforts of our players who can all improve and enable us to defy the odds and get amongst next seasons elitist group. Doing 'time on the grass' you make contacts and seek out the quality to ensure that when the opportunity comes, staff appointments are spot on.

Colin Murphy has done his miles. There are a host of players in the Football League that have responded to his style and advice. Terry Westley our Youth Coach is a newcomer highly recommended by his previous employer John Lyall and the Football Association. Brian Owen our Physiotherapist has served England, Wolves and Ipswich. I thought long, hard and thoroughly before handing them the responsibilities of advising me. John Moore remains to give us the knowledge and energies of his loyalty and is to be rewarded with a Testimonial game.

It is an exciting time ahead and we shall not be overawed despite the fearsome sums being paid for players. We must work together and apply ourselves in all areas.

I have relegated Liverpool's welcome to last spot. Welcome to their supporters and good luck to Graeme Souness and colleague Phil Boersma. I have tipped Liverpool to bounce back with the Championship. There is no substitute for quality but you need a big purse and the sensible philosophy to plough back the profits.

Enjoy the season - it should be exciting but it can only be successful if relationships are cemented everywhere within Kenilworth Road.

## First team action

The season opened last Saturday with a 0-0 draw for Luton in a bright and entertaining game at Upton Park, writes Robert Alexander. For both teams and most supporters, it was a more than satisfactory start as West Ham had marginally the best of the first half, thanks to a threatening spell shortly before the interval, and Luton the best of the second when Mark Pembridge hit the bar with a thumping shot from 25 yards.

The Town's goalless draw was, strangely the only one in the top division on a sun-kissed opening day which saw Arsenal held 1-1 at home by Queens Park Rangers, Chelsea and Wimbledon draw 2-2 (with Paul Elliott scoring for the Blues) and Liverpool coming from behind to beat

newly-promoted Oldham 2-1 at Anfield. Manchester City were 1-0 winners at Coventry City, hotly-backed Manchester United beat Notts County 2-0, Norwich City drew 2-2 with Sheffield United at Carrow Road and, in an entertaining game, Nottingham Forest overcame Everton 2-1. Ron Atkinson's Aston Villa, visiting his former club Sheffield Wednesday, won 3-2, a score repeated by Tottenham Hotspur at Southampton, where Spurs' new strike-force of Gary Lineker and Gordon Durie were on the mark.

Thus, the Hammers and the Hatters produced the only blank on a day of reunions with Tim Breacker, Mitchell Thomas and Michael Small performing for the Londoners and Iain Dowie waiting in the wings.

The 1991/92 League Season is now upon us and as usual Luton Town Football Club has had to deal with the financial realities of competing at the highest level. This summer has brought a Club already used to change, even more change.

Today, we welcome away fans, for Barclays League matches, gaze at the new grass pitch, marvel at the new stand, admire the new kit, salute a new Manager, ponder the prospect of a Super League and welcome yet another Chairman.

The recent events have led me to consider the well known phrase "be careful what you want because you might get it!"

There are two topics relating to the Football Club that bring this statement very much to the forefront.

Firstly regarding the resignation of Peter Nelkin which was a result of events subsequent to the change of manager. A group of so called Luton Town fans, decided between themselves that in their opinion, Peter Nelkin should resign in the best interests of the Football Club. They undertook a vendetta against Peter Nelkin and his family using various tactics such as letters, abusive phone calls and death threats, carried out over a number of weeks. I have in my possession proof that Peter Nelkin's phone number has been sent to various people in Luton.

This abuse is far beyond that which any reasonable person should be made to endure and as a direct result of this, Peter resigned as Chairman of the Club. The knock on effect of this was to plunge the Club into yet another financial crisis, which has taken up the majority of my time, caused me many sleepless nights and a

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cancelled holiday. The ultimate conclusion could leave the Board with no option other than to sell a player. Is this what they wanted?

The second topic is that of the proposed Super League of which much has been spoken and even more written. It is now public knowledge that ourselves along with all the other First Division Clubs have resigned from the Football League to set up the Super League. It is my firm intention that Luton Town will be a part of the Super League, both in terms of our playing ability and level of facilities provided in a new stadium (about more of which will be made public in due course).

Will the Super League be good for football? Yes and therefore good for Luton

# Inside view

## Welcome back after a summer of dramatic change

Once again, I cannot help referring, as I did 12 months ago, to the great changes we have undergone at the club in the close season as we welcome Liverpool to our opening home match. It seems these changes have become almost a part of life for any club which is competing to stay in contention at the top level.

Obviously, there are regrets. There always are. But in football, particularly in management, change is a part of the life. The current board are now looking for a period of continuity and stability. In my own position, of course, I form personal working relationships with the manager and I am glad that none of these have been severed by the events of recent years. More important, for the club, is the fact that I had a very good previous working relationship with David Pleat, who was instrumental in my joining Luton Town more than 10 years ago. His rapport with Luton and his knowledge of football needs no amplification from me.

This is our 10th successive year in the First Division and it is nice to see David taking the team into a new era with so much to play for with the Premier League in mind. I expect to make further comments on this later and for the moment am content to draw your attention to an article which throws some light on the subject on page 23. Naturally, there are strong views held and all I will say now is that by resigning from the League we show our

commitment to the Premier League and supported the principle of three up and three down. I only hope the Football League will be as far-sighted as the F.A. and help give football and its customers the chance to move into the 21st century as effectively as we can.

Big changes have been apparent at all levels. In addition to our new stand, our new grass pitch and re-styled programme, the team are wearing new kit and we have the first opportunity today to see the re-introduction of visitors to Barclays League matches at Kenilworth Road. This all helps to bring us into step with the other 92 clubs.

The board most certainly would not have embarked on these changes if they did not believe that the bad behaviour patterns of the past had changed. We have retained our own membership scheme to ensure the safety of our own supporters and whilst we shall be operating a guesing policy that enables our members to bring friends who support the visiting club with them, we will be making sure they are properly segregated.

Only four areas of the ground will have any visiting supporters: the Oak Road Stand, where they will have 2,274 seats, a small area of seats in the new stand, the main stand enclosure and 1,000 seats in blocks F and G of the main stand. The Kenilworth Road standing and seating will be for the accommodation of home supporters only. If any visitors find their way into that area, they will be ejected from the ground.

Naturally, there is some apprehension in the community about these changes, but as everyone in Luton knows there was widespread abuse of the Membership Scheme. This new system will certainly put Luton under the microscope with the media and I have been much encouraged by the support we have received from other clubs whose supporters will only be able to obtain tickets from their club's own official Ticket Offices. No 'away' supporters tickets can be purchased at Kenilworth Road.

While on the subject of tickets, our match at West Ham last Saturday was an all-ticket game, but the police, in their wisdom, decided at the final minute to let in several Luton supporters without tickets. This aggravated those of our supporters who had bought tickets in advance. This was clearly a West Ham police move and it is something which will not be repeated at Kenilworth Road.

Unfortunately, there is a pylon in front of the new stand. This is a temporary obstacle and will be removed in the coming weeks in conjunction with the proposed increase of our floodlights power to 1,000 lux to meet next year's new regulations. Enjoy the game.

# Today's visitors

Good Afternoon and a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of Liverpool for the opening home Barclays league game of season 1991/92. As the most successful club in England over the past thirty years, they need little introduction to regular followers of football.

The Reds start the new season determined to re-capture the League Championship from Arsenal, after ending last season trophyless. A newly added steel will surely emerge from the Liverpool squad this season due to the introduction of former Rangers boss Graeme Souness. Mr Souness has already made his intentions clear, signing England defender Mark Wright from Derby County in a £2.2 million deal and within days, his Derby team-mate Dean Saunders in a British club record deal of £2.9 million.

Two weeks ago, Liverpool also captured the signing of Rangers forward

Mark Walters for £1.5 million.

Liverpool's continuing dominance of the First Division has been achieved by some outstanding individual performances such as those of winger John Barnes and the excellent goalscoring form of Ian Rush, who scored a total of 16 league goals last term. Strength in depth has also meant that players of international class such as Jan Molby and Ronnie Rosenthal have been used effectively when called upon. Last season was not a success by Liverpool's high standards. They were knocked out of the FA Cup by rivals Everton. Their run in the Rumbelows League Cup was short lived, going down to Manchester United and they ended the League season in second place - a success by most club's standards, but not at Anfield. 1991/92 season also sees a return to Europe for Liverpool in the UEFA Cup. Their first game is against unknown Finnish side Kuusysi Lahti.

Liverpool were formed in 1892 by

businessman John Houlding, previously Everton's landlord and most ardent supporter. Everton were the only League club in Liverpool at the time and played their home games at Anfield. A disagreement between Houlding and Everton meant Everton moved, and Liverpool AFC were formed. Houlding established a limited company which achieved First Division status in just two seasons.


Liverpool have won the League title on eighteen occasions which is a Football League record. They won the F.A. Cup in 1965, 74, 86 and 89, and have won the League Cup four times, Liverpool also have an impressive record in Europe, winning the European Cup in 1977, 78, 81 and 84. They won the UEFA Cup in 1973 and 76, and European Supercup Winners in 1977.

Liverpool come to Kenilworth Road knowing that their record here is not a good one. They will hope a return to grass will change recent scorelines and hopefully set the club up for yet another successful season.

## Reds On Parade

**BRUCE GROBBELAAR** (goalkeeper) - Bruce has now played over 400 games for Liverpool since joining the club from Vancouver Whitecaps for £250,000 in 1981. He made his League debut in 1979 playing for Crewe, whilst in England holidaying. Bruce is a Rhodesian international.

**BARRY VENISON** (defender) - Barry started his career at Sunderland, making his league debut in a 2-0 defeat at Notts County in 1981. After becoming captain and making over 170 league appearances for the Rokerites, he signed for Liverpool for £150,000 in 1986.

**MARK WRIGHT** (defender) - Signed from Derby for £2.2 million last month, Mark made his League debut in 1981 in the colours of Oxford United. He joined Southampton in 1982 and it was during his time at The Dell that he established himself as an England international. Derby signed him for £660,000 in 1987.

**DAVID BURROWS** (defender) - After only two full seasons as a regular in the West Bromwich side, David was signed for Liverpool for £500,000 in 1988. Almost immediately, he became a regular, not only in the Reds' side, but also for the England Under 21 team.

**GARY ABLETT** (defender) - Gary developed in the junior teams at Anfield, but made his League debut on loan at Derby in a 3-2 defeat V Bournemouth in 1985. He spent another loan period at Hull City before making his debut for Liverpool in 1987. Gary is an England Under 21 international.

**STEVE NICOL** (defender) - Versatile Steve started his career at Ayr United, making his debut v Arbroath in 1979. He moved on to Liverpool in a £300,000 deal in 1981. Introduced to the Scotland side in 1984, Steve has captained both club and country and will be looking to form a strong defensive partnership with Mark Wright.

**RONNIE WHELAN** (midfield) - After joining Liverpool from Home Farm (Dublin), Ronnie scored on his League debut V Stoke City in 1981. He has since maintained a fine scoring record from midfield, and his form has been rewarded with over 40 Republic of Ireland caps and the Liverpool captaincy. He returns to the side after missing the latter half of last season through injury.

**STEVE MCMAHON** (midfield) - Steve started his career at neighbouring Everton, making his League debut V Sunderland in 1981. After three seasons at Goodison Park, he signed for Aston Villa for £300,000 in 1983. Liverpool signed him for £350,000 two seasons later and, after collecting six Under 21 caps, has now played for the full England team on 17 occasions.

**RAY HOUGHTON** (midfield) - Ray started his League career at West Ham but, after making only one League appearance for the Hammers, was transferred to Fulham in 1982. He moved on to Oxford who paid a then club record of £125,000 for his signature in 1985. It was at the Manor Ground that Ray made a name for himself, prompting Liverpool to sign him for £825,000 in 1987. Ray is an Eire international.

**RONNIE ROSENTHAL** (forward) - Ronnie is an Israeli international who was signed from Standard Liege in May 1990. He made a remarkable impact when introduced to the Liverpool side in 1990, scoring a hat-trick on his debut v Charlton Athletic. Unfortunately Ronnie failed to live up to the expectations expected of him last season, and constantly found himself on the subs' bench.

**JOHN BARNES** (forward) - John started his career at Watford, gaining a regular first team spot after making his debut in 1981. He was a member of the Watford side defeated by Everton in the 1984 FA Cup Final. John signed for Liverpool for £900,000 in 1987, scoring fifteen times in his first season. He has been capped for England on over 60 occasions.

**STEVE MCMANAMAN** (forward) - Steve, who is a product of the youth policy at Anfield, broke into the first team during the latter half of last season. His full potential has been realised by Mr Souness and could play today in place of the injured Ian Rush.

**IAN RUSH** (forward) - Ian scored 182 goals in his first spell at Anfield after being signed from Chester for £300,000 in 1980. He set a new club record with 47 goals in 1983/4, fastly becoming Europe's finest striker. He moved to Juventus in a £3 million deal in 1987 but returned to Anfield a year later. His phenomenal goalscoring record has continued, scoring 16 league goals last term.

**DEAN SAUNDERS** (forward) - Signed for a British club record of £2.9 million last month, Dean had previously been Derby County's leading goalscorer for the past three seasons. He emerged with Swansea. Then, after a loan spell with Cardiff, he was transferred to Brighton in 1985. He moved on to Oxford in 1987, leading their scoring lists with 21 in his first season. Derby signed him for £1 million in 1988.

**MARK WALTERS** (forward) - Mark, who played on England's recent tour to New Zealand, started his career at Aston Villa. He made his debut in a 4-1 defeat V Leeds Utd and established himself as a first team regular for the following six seasons. He signed for Glasgow Rangers in a £1 million deal in 1988 and linked up with his former boss again earlier this month.



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# Player profile

## David Preece

It has been anything but a quiet summer for David Preece. Determined to maintain his fitness level, he allowed himself only two weeks' break before he was back running to build up his stamina in preparation for the new season - and the arrival of his second daughter Ella at the end of July. For David, of course, the return to Kenilworth Road of David Pleat, in the manager's office, and Brian Stein, in the number nine shirt, has meant a reunion with old friends as he goes into his eighth season with the club determined to maintain the form and consistency which has made him one of the Town's most popular players since he made his debut against Aston Villa on December 8, 1984.

"I scored in that game," recalled David. "But it was a mis-hit shot and it went in the bottom corner and we won 1-0. It seems a long time ago now. I am 28 now," he said. "And I really want to keep on playing as long as I can. I really feel fit this year, perhaps because I worked hard in the summer. I would like to go on until I am 36 or more if I can. It may be because I missed the best part of two seasons when I had my knee and ankle injuries — although I was lucky enough to play in two Wembley cup finals, winning once — that I feel only 26 really. I think if I can keep clear of injuries I can keep on for years. Just look at Brian Stein for a good example of staying fit.

"He was one of our team of the 1984 to 1988 period who left the club and who came back last weekend and showed he could still do it. I think Brian showed he is as sharp and as fit as he has ever been and he has got a good head and great vision. With players like

him around, it is great for the younger lads. They can learn a lot from Brian.


"I learned a lot from David Pleat when I first came to the club and I enjoyed my work with him. I feel that if we all pull together we can, hopefully, produce just as much enjoyment for everyone again. I am always a bit of a pessimist myself and I must admit I expect it to be another very tough and competitive season. I will be happy if we are able to steer clear of trouble at least three or four weeks before the final match.

"At the top of the table, I expect it to be a lot tighter with Leeds and Manchester United right up there. Everyone expects it to be Arsenal and Liverpool again, but I think it will be closer this year. Our own problem could be scoring enough goals. With the departure of Lars Elstrup and his 18 goals last year, we

have to find a new source. It is not easy and goals are worth points at the end of the season.

"Having said that, we have a good squad with some great young players and a good team spirit. With a bit more experience, I think we could be a top 12 team again. I hope so because I want us to be there, Superleague or not. So far as that is concerned, I would only say that I'd like to see the FA and the League getting together instead of falling out.

"On a brighter note, I think it was great to see English clubs back in Europe last season. My only regret was that when we won the Littlewoods Cup in 1988, we did not have the chance to play in a European competition. I think we might have surprised a few teams. We shall be hoping to do just that again this season, of course!"

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## The Premier League debate

Q: What has brought about a Premier League?

A: The present League structure neither efficiently looks after the top of the First Division or the bottom of the Fourth Division. Effective change is virtually impossible under the current Football League system as its voting composition very often has a frustrating effect on real progress. All First Division clubs have unanimously voted in favour of an autonomous Premier League which not only looks after its own commercial affairs but also gives the lower divisions the opportunity to take advantage of new areas which hitherto have been unavailable to them with the guarantee by the Football Association to the lower divisions of financial assistance if needed.

Q: What will change?

A: The administration of the Premier League will run under the auspices of the Football Association probably from the Headquarters of the Football Association at Lancaster Gate with eventually a reduced number of clubs in the League (our view is that 18 is optimum) with rigid criteria on grounds so that the ultimate beneficiary will be the spectator.

Q: Will there be promotion and relegation?

A: This is absolutely essential – no one wants a sterile League. It is incorrect to say that the First Division are “breaking away” – we wish to preserve the flow from top to bottom and if administered efficiently all professional clubs will be able to benefit.

Q: Is this all about money?

A: No, its about progress, management, the future. Money of course plays a significant role – we need to compete and beat the best of the world’s opposition. We will never be in a position to do so unless the system allows for more equitable division of income and market forces are allowed to prevail. It should be appreciated that all monies generated get recycled back into the game. We only need to look how many of our best players have recently gone abroad for more fame and more fortune – Hateley, Hoddle, Waddle, Gascoigne, Platt. Its one

way traffic in the wrong direction. We must be in a position to retain our best players.

Q: Won’t a Premier League just benefit an elite few clubs?

A: Not at all, this is a popular misconception. The Football Association’s Chief Executive Graham Kelly has assured the lower divisions that the Football Association will indemnify them for any shortfall in their income stream due to the establishment of a Premier League. However we believe, and indeed the Football League’s own Commercial Director Trevor Phillips is on record as saying that with restructuring, the lower divisions will probably be better off. Clearly the Second, Third and Fourth Divisions are vital to English football and it is essential that they are encouraged and prosper.

Q: Who will be the ultimate beneficiary in the Premier League?

A: Firstly the spectator because there will be better facilities and stricter criteria for grounds. Secondly, the international team because when the Premier League is finally reduced, the England manager will have more time with his players. Thirdly, football generally because progress will be able to be made without the confines of an unwieldy system.

Q: When will the Premier League start and who will be part of it?

A: All current First Division clubs will be resigning from the Football League, and the Football Association will establish a Premier League for the commencement of the 1992/93 season. The 22 clubs who will be in the First Division at the end of this current season (after promotion and relegation) will represent the new Premier League. It is the Football Association’s intention that the Premier League will be reduced initially to 20 clubs by a system of probably three down and two up for two years.

Q: What is the situation with legal action?

A: We believe that this was a misconceived venture from start to finish by the Football League which has been proved in the verdict and it has cost Football League clubs £1 million to date in legal fees which is quite immoral and could have been avoided. At the time of going to print we understand that the Football League are considering appealing the recent Judgement – it is quite improper for the Football League to be wasting more money particularly when you consider that the First Division are funding an Action against themselves.

Hopefully we have now seen the end of legal hostilities and both the Football League and Football Association can conduct negotiations to effect a smooth transition for the Premier League to commence season 92/93.

Q: What will this mean to Luton Town?

A: This will give Luton Town an opportunity to enhance the club’s status, quality and facilities as rapidly and comprehensively as possible on and off the field. We do not want to be part of a sterile league.

Q: What role will television play in the new Premier League?

A: There will be joint negotiations between the Football Association and the Premier League together with broadcasters but the current television contract has another year to run.

Q: There has been some talk in the papers by Gordon Taylor the Chief Executive of the PFA about a players strike in order to discourage the formation of a Premier League.

A: Any talk of a players strike is quite irresponsible. We see no reason why any professional footballer will be put out of work because of the Premier League. Football will be healthier and wealthier due to the Premier League.

### ODDS AGAINST

The Town’s hopes of winning the championship have not been heavily supported by the odds on offer at the bookmakers this season. At 250-1, they are the rank outsiders. But that is unlikely to worry anyone at Kenilworth Road as we celebrate our 10th consecutive year in the First Division since winning promotion in 1982. Favourites for the title, according to Ladbrokes, are Arsenal and Liverpool at 7-4 with Manchester United 7-1 and Leeds United at 12-1.

### FROM PLASTIC TO GRASS

The Town’s return to a grass pitch this season means that for the first time in 10 years all the First and Second Division clubs will be playing on turf. Both Luton and Oldham have made the switch from synthetic surfaces to grass this summer, leaving Preston North End as the only club with an artificial surface.

## The day Mike Newell will never forget



The Town had started off 1986/87 reasonably well and by 25th October when Liverpool were due to visit Kenilworth Road, the team sat in a mid-table position, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

The main problem had been goalscoring, with only one effort finding the net in the previous six games. Mick Harford, who could normally be relied upon for a fair quota of goals, had not played at all that season because of injury, and with young Liverpudlian Mike Newell starting to become the butt of the crowd because of the unfair comparison, it

was difficult to see where goals would come from.

The mantle of goalscorer had fallen on the shoulders of Brian Stein but the pressure was beginning to tell as proved by a penalty miss at Old Trafford the previous week which would have produced the first point at Manchester United since Victorian times.

Liverpool were comfortably placed in third position and as you would expect from a team that had won the League and Cup double the previous season, started the game full of confidence with only three men at the back.

After 14 minutes Luton full back Rob Johnson sent a long ball down the middle and with Newell beating Jan Molby for pace it became a one-on-one situation with the goalkeeper which the Luton forward won.

Twenty minutes later Mal Donaghy found space on the left and put in a hard, low cross which Bruce Grobbelaar missed leaving Newell with a simple tap-in.

### buzzing crowd

The crowd was by now, quite understandably, buzzing and when Ricky Hill converted a David Preece cross after a mix-up in the Liverpool defence three minutes from half-time the atmosphere was euphoric.

Three goals up at half-time was beyond the imagination of even the most biased Luton supporter and when Newell notched his hat-trick, just after the break, with a brave diving header, after Ricky Hill had hit the bar, a cricket-score was on the cards.

Liverpool re-organised their defence and abandoned the offside trap after the fourth goal but it was too late and although they gained a consolation penalty, put away by Molby just before the end, it was still the heaviest defeat suffered by manager Kenny Dalglish.

### fair reflection

Dalglish, who had been unable to play because of a knee injury, admitted that the result was a fair reflection of the game and went home deliberating on the fact that Liverpool had previously gone 181 games since last letting in four goals.

The win proved to be the springboard which eventually pushed the Town up to their highest ever League position of seventh at the season's end and everyone now loved Mike Newell.



Why, indeed? The chairman said it was not his decision. Perhaps it wasn't. But almost before Brian had learned to say "Qui, Qui" we were badly missing the copper-coloured ace.

Think of Joe Payne, Hugh Billington, Jesse Pye, Gordon Turner, Ron Davies, Paul Walsh, Mick Harford. Mix all round skills and scoring ability with achievements for Luton Town and our Steinie comes out top of the lot.

Can Brian do it all again for the Hatters? Desperately, we hope so. He's certainly got the right man to tell him how.

DAVID PLEAT, welcome back!

Those of us with grey hair and long memory rate the football David produced in that super Second Division championship year, 1982, as Luton's finest ever.

At the beginning of the following season I asked David Coates, then the first team coach, if he was not a little jealous of Pleat receiving all the glory, praise and publicity.

"Never," he told me. "I coach using the

various things I've picked up at previous clubs where I've played and served.


lounge overlooks the pitch area from behind the main stand and has excellent seats within the main stand for enjoying the game.
