

I was very disappointed with the result at Aston Villa on Saturday. But I took heart from our performance. That was probably the best 90 minutes we've played all season. a big improvement on our form at Everton. We looked nothing like our usual selves at Goodison. We just 'went' after Everton's second goal. I said then, we needed to find our hunger again.

Our attitude was much better on Saturday. The spirit was good – but we didn't get the breaks.

The penalty just before half time gave them a lift just when they needed it, and put us under pressure. I thought the incident between Nigel Winterburn and Tony Daley happened outside the box. We thoroughly deserved Alan Smith's equaliser. We did the majority of the attacking and I was impressed with the link-up between Anders Limpar and Nigel Winterburn on the left. We're still making too many individual errors though, and we were punished for them. David Seaman was disappointed to be beaten by a long shot for their third, and overall, our defence is lacking its usual meanness.

They're priorities tonight: to eradicate the errors and regain our mean look. I'm optimistic we can build on Saturday's display.

Our first home game, against QPR, was very frustrating. Paul Merson's equaliser was the least we deserved. We did enough in the second half to have earned three points. We'll see a lot of visitors come here with a similar approach. They'll defend in depth then try and nick a goal on the break – though our defensive organisation was poor when Dennis Bailey scored.

Luton showed they could present a formidable barrier when they drew 0-0 at West Ham. The earlier we score, the better. But if we don't make an early breakthrough, we have to keep probing until we do find a gap.

That patience could be more important than ever this season, especially with the European games coming up. Thanks to the fans who travelled to Everton and Villa. We appreciate your support.





IN CONVERSATION:



How do you cope with a marathon season? Lee Dixon gives a player's view.

KC: If Arsenal go all the way in the cups, you'll be playing 70 matches – without England games and maybe the European championship finals next summer. Does the prospect frighten you?

LD: It's hardly ideal. But the players don't have any say, so we've got to learn to live with it. I played 50 matches last season, without internationals. You could call that useful preparation. It's going to be even harder this season. I don't think any foreign sides will play as many games as us!

KC: Were you surprised that the first division was increased to 22 clubs again?

LD: That seemed a strange decision. If it was right a few years ago, to reduce Division One to 20 clubs, why has the reasoning changed, so that we go back to 22?

KC: With so many games to play, is there a danger players could turn out carrying injuries and risk damaging themselves for later life?

LD: I don't think that would happen here, especially with a top physio like Gary Lewin around. I didn't miss a game last season, and I never played with an injury. But I take the point. The more games you play, the greater risk, because the body needs time to rest and recover.

KC: You're likely to play midweek games most weeks, for Arsenal or England. How will you cope with that strain?

LD: A pattern of Saturday-Wednesday-Saturday games is OK, because you can rest on Sunday and Thursday. During the season, training tends to be shorter and more concentrated too, because you've laid the basis of your fitness in the pre-season work. The

problems come if you have to play more than two games a week. That's caused the downfall of successful English teams in the past. People who were here in 1980 have told me how much that fixture pile-up took out of them. Obviously, the less time between games, the less time the body has to recover from knocks.

KC: It's often said that players prefer to play than train. How do you square that with the demands of a 70/80 match season?

LD: The games take care of your fitness. But you have to make the mental adjustment in the first place. It's always easier to play a lot of games if you're winning rather than losing. You have to steel yourself at the start of a season. Tell yourself that all those matches are what success is all about.

KC: 'Resilience' is always rated one of Arsenal's greatest qualities. It could be more important than ever this season.

LD: Yes. Winning builds belief. To lose just once last season gave our confidence a huge boost. The points deduction bound us all even closer together. We wanted to show everyone who wrote us off. That sort of spirit doesn't come overnight. We've built it up over several years. We were already keyed up to get the championship back. Lots of times, when we weren't at our best, we dug in and got a result. We're always hard to beat. That's why the scoreline at Everton was out of character. Manchester United caught us like that in the Rumbelows Cup last season. But we bounced straight back to beat Liverpool 3-0 and went on to win the title.



KC: The European Cup is the trophy everyone wants. Is that playing on the players minds, and affecting them in the league?

LD: It's very early days yet. Lose one game, and suddenly there's a 'crisis'. I'll make you groan when I say we'll take every game as it comes. I know that's an old cliche, but it's the only way to approach such a long season. Last season, we made a great start – and every time we suffered a setback we bounced back with a good run. We can't just turn our form on and off for the European Cup. We need to put together another run in the league, because that will set us up for the European Cup too.



PAUL SETS HIS SIGHTS HIGH



Paul Merson has set himself a hard task: to improve on his form last season. Looking back, that was a key year in his career.

The 23 year-old forward was named PFA 'Young Player of the Year' when we won the title two years ago. But injuries and off-field problems reduced his effectiveness the following season, when we slipped to fourth. If Paul's Highbury future was in doubt, he put those doubts behind him in our last title campaign.

He netted 13 league goals and proved his versatility by playing everywhere in the forward line. His performance on the right wing turned the game against Sheffield United last December, and he scored a brilliant goal cutting in from the left to set us on the way to F.A. Cup success at Leeds. Merson can slot into an attacking role behind the front two as well.

'1990/1 was the most important season of my career,' says our last minute saviour against QPR: 'I had to do well. Otherwise it would have been two out-of-form seasons on the trot, and I could have been offloaded. I sorted out my worries off the pitch, and starting a family obviously helped. Also, I'm a lot stronger in my attitude than I was two years ago. I can handle the pressure a lot better.'

He'll need that mental strength, because he's bound to attract a lot more tight marking after his form in our title success. 'It will be hard to improve on last season,' he admits: 'Getting to the top is tough. Staying there is even harder. That's our problem as a team. It's my problem too, because a lot is expected of me.'

Merson has already won the 'Man-of-the-Match' award in the Charity Shield, and looked lively in our opening matches, when he's switched between the right flank and a central striking role.


'Until last season, I'd spent most of my career as an out-and-out forward. It's different out wide. You may not get a pass for half-an-hour. Then suddenly everything's going through you. That's how it was in the second half against Spurs,' says Paul. 'When the ball comes, it usually comes to your feet too. So it's nice to be able to run at defenders, rather than playing with my back to goal.'

'I'm basically a right-footed player, so when I'm on the left, I usually look to cut inside,' adds Merson, who's scored some spectacular goals from the flanks. But I've built up a good understanding with Alan Smith over the past three years, and I can slot back into that partnership pretty fast too. I'm not fussy where I play though. I just want to have another good season, and make sure I don't slip back.'



Paul Read's 87th minute header earned the young Gunners an impressive 2-2 draw against West Ham in their opening South East Counties League game last Saturday.

Said youth coach Pat Rice: 'To draw at Chadwell Heath against a more experienced team was a very encouraging performance. I was pleased with the boys determination and the number of chances we created. We also tackled well and closed them down quickly.'

Arsenal - who included eight new trainees in their 13 - grabbed a third minute lead when Paul Shaw won the ball on the edge of the box and ex-Islington schoolboy star Soner Zumrutel fired home.

PAUL READ... EQUALISED AGAINST WEST HAM

Alan Miller and Stephen Morrow have left Highbury on loan.

Goalkeeper Miller has joined third division West Bromwich, who also include ex-Gunners winger Kwame Ampadu.

Northern Ireland international left back Morrow has joined second division Watford, after impressing against them in a friendly earlier this month.

'It's another good opportunity for them to gain first team experience,' says George Armstrong: 'We have a lot of players around the reserves at the moment, what with the first team squad players who need match practice and the youngsters coming through. Competition for places will be very hot.'

Armstrong cited the example of Gary McKeown at Portsmouth. McKeown had done well pre-season. But he only got a game in central midfield as a substitute, because we needed to give Siggi Jonsson and Mickey Thomas a run-out.

Alan - who's recovered from a back injury - and Stephen are happy to go on loan.

The England u-21 'keeper shone at Plymouth during another loan spell two years ago, while Morrow did so well for Reading last season, the third division club wanted to buy him.

Miller and Morrow had mixed debuts on August 17. Alan helped Albion beat Exeter 6-3. Two of Exeter's goals came in the last seven minutes. But there was nothing full back Morrow could do as Wolves central strikers Andy Mutch and Steve Bull scored to send Watford to a 2-0 defeat.



ANDERS PRAISES 'MARATHON' HEROES



No other league in the world imposes such physical demands on its players as the Football League. It's a tribute to British players that League clubs have won so many European trophies. That's Anders Limpar's view – and the skilful Swede should know, after playing in his home country, Switzerland and Italy as well as England.

Limpar himself had to adapt to those physical demands last season. He made a stunning start to his Highbury career. George Graham reckoned he was the most exciting player in the country up to Christmas. Then the crowded fixture list took its toll, before the 25 year-old winger returned with a flourish for our title finale, grabbing a hat trick in our 6-1 win over Coventry.

'Foreign players admire the British stamina and mentality,' says Anders: 'When you play for an English team you see 'close up' how much endurance the players must have. Those demands caught up with me for a while last season, though it should be easier to adjust this time, because I know what to expect. It will be harder in other ways though. We've seen already, other clubs are extra-keen to beat the champions. From a personal point of view, a lot is expected from me and defenders know more about me now.'

Anders was surprised the first division has increased to 22 clubs again this summer, which will only pile up the matches successful teams must play. Tony Woodcock used to say his German colleagues at Cologne didn't know whether to laugh or cry when he told them about the English fixture schedule – especially Christmas and New Year. Anders agrees.

'The biggest difference is the attitude to the cup competitions,' says Limpar. In Italy, for instance, the early cup rounds are played as virtual pre-season matches, before the title race begins.

'In Europe, clubs want to win the championship and a European competition most of all,' says Anders: 'It's a question of priorities. In England, there are two major cups, both hotly contested, and a Wembley final is one of the most glamourous days of the season. That puts even more pressure on British players. When you think teams like Liverpool were playing 65 or more matches a season, it shows how well the English clubs did to dominate Europe before the Heysel ban.'

'Manchester United showed the way again in the Cup Winners Cup. And there's no team more resilient than Arsenal. If we have to play 65-70 matches, we have the players to cope without complaint.'



ANDY AIMS TO BUILD ON PRE-SEASON CHANCES



Aggression round the box. That's what Andy Cole is seeking as he tries to build on his appearances in the Makita Tournament and the Charity Shield.

The slightly-built 'School of Excellence' graduate is doing regular weight exercises to build himself up and stop defenders knocking him off the ball. 'When we've finished, he'll look like Adonis!' laughs George Graham.

But the aggression Andy wants to increase isn't just physical.

'I ought to be scoring more', says the 19 year-old striker, who finished reserves top scorer last season with 14. 'George Armstrong is always telling me I need to be more positive with my finishing and my runs into the box. I know I need

to get in more goal attempts. Sometimes you have to go for hitting the target rather than looking for the perfect strike.'

Andy made one first team appearance last season, as an 85th minute sub against Sheffield United. So he was surprised to be called in for the Makita weekend.

'Even with Alan Smith and Kevin Campbell injured, I thought I was there for the experience. I hoped I'd get a run as sub,' he recalls. 'That's how it was against Panathinaikos. Then at the Sunday team meeting, I learned I'd be starting against Sampdoria. That was a surprise!'

Cole has gained plenty of knowledge against continental defenders, playing for England youth, and appearing in the u-19 European championships in Portugal this summer.

Facing the Italian champions was something else! 'I'd never met players like that before. It was great experience,' says Andy. 'You know continental defenders will mark a lot tighter than defenders here. Samp are experts. So you have to keep drifting, stretching them, taking them wide or trying to hit the spaces behind them.'

The task didn't overawe Cole. He wriggled free for our two best chances after Paul Merson's goal - only to be foiled by GianLuca Pagliuca.

The following weekend, Andy came on for 15 minutes of the Charity Shield and hit a last minute shot that beat Erik Thorstvedt and set our fans roaring.

'I thought it was in. Instead it was the side netting,' says Cole, reflecting on his Wembley winner that was denied him.

Andy's displays against the English cup winners, and two European Cup hopefuls, prove how much he's developed in the past year.

This time last August, Cole was hoping for a spell on loan as a stepping stone. He'd still grab the chance if it came. But now he has a bigger goal in sight - to force himself into George Graham's first team options.






WADDLE HELPS MARSEILLE KEEP UP THE PRESSURE

Chris Waddle helped Olympique Marseille keep up the pressure at the top of the French League by setting up two goals in their 3-1 win at Graham Rix's old club Caen.

France's top forward Jean-Pierre Papin struck twice. The Ghanaian, Pele, was also on target for Olympique, who welcomed England star Trevor Steven to the Stade Velodrome last Monday.

Leaders Monaco's 100% record went tumbling at the Parc des Princes, where goals by Perez and Simba earned Paris St. Germain's first victory of the season, 2-0, in front of 41,000 fans. Monaco's sweeper Roger Mendy was sent off after half an hour.

So Metz took over at the top, thanks to a 1-0 win over St. Etienne. Huysmann scored the goal after 17 minutes. But Metz's hero was goalkeeper Flucklinger.

Nantes stayed in fourth place following a disappointing draw 0-0 at struggling Nimes.

BIG MONEY TRANSFERS THIS SUMMER

English fans know all about the multi-million pound deals that have taken David Platt from Aston Villa to Bari and Trevor Steven from Rangers to Olympique Marseille.

The £5million Marseille paid for Steven, is £500,000 less than ambitious Bari paid for Platt.

But that £5.5million fee wasn't the biggest of the summer. AS Roma grabbed that 'honour' when they paid Juventus £5.8million for German midfield player Thomas Hässler.

Juventus meanwhile spent £5million on another German star, Jürgen Köhler from Bayern Munich, and Lazio coughed up £5million for Hamburg's Thomas Döll.

Perhaps the shrewdest move was made by Fiorentina. They sold Renato Buso (sent off here for elbowing Tony Adams) to Sampdoria, then paid £3million to Argentinian champions Boca Juniors for South America's top striker Gabriel Batistuta.

The only other club - Liverpool apart - making huge investments were Paris St. Germain. PSG, determined to break Marseille's domestic dominance, shelled out £5million for Benfica's Brazilian defender Ricardo Gomes and his midfield colleague Valdo.

AUSTRIA

Our European Cup opponents Austria Wien moved into joint second place after six matches, thanks to a 2-0 over Vorwärts Steyr. The Violets share second spot with Austria Salzburg, who dropped a point in a goalless draw at Linz. Rapid, who drew 0-0 at FC Tirol, have ten points, one ahead of Austria Wien and Salzburg.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Champions Sparta - who face Rangers in the European Cup - suffered a surprise defeat when they went 0-1 at home to local rivals in the big Prague derby.

BELGIUM

Champions Anderlecht, including new Dutch centre forward Johnny Bosman from PSV Eindhoven, opened their league programme with a comfortable 4-1 win at Kortrijk.

In the other big game of the opening day, Club Brugge won 2-1 at Standard Liege.

GERMANY

Former East German champions Hansa Rostock have made a great start to their first-ever Bundesliga campaign.

They've won both their opening matches, including an impressive 2-1 success at Bayern Munich.

Eintracht Frankfurt and Kickers Stuttgart are the only other teams with 100% records.

Leaders Eintracht hit top form to demolish Schalke 04 5-0.

HOLLAND

Bobby Robson's PSV Eindhoven began their league season with a 2-1 win over FC Utrecht. Feijenoord pipped Twente Enschede 1-0. Ajax didn't have a game last weekend.

POLAND

Widzew Lodz beat Motor Lublin 2-1 and maintained their 100% record at the top of the Polish League after four games. Sawisza Bydgoszcz are second after beating Olimpia Poznan 3-1.

Lech Poznan are the other 100% side. They hammered Pogrotour Debica 4-0, and have a game in hand on Widzew.

PORTUGAL

Champions Benfica crashed to first day disaster, 0-1 at home to the unfashionable Porto club Boavista. Vitoria Guimaraes scored the biggest win, 4-1 at Famalicao. The FC Porto-Sporting Lisbon clash will now be played on September 25.

SWITZERLAND

The champions Grasshoppers scored a 3-1 win over FC Zurich in the big local derby. Lausanne thrashed Servette Geneva 4-0.

YUGOSLAVIA

The Yugoslav federation may be breaking up, but the league championship goes on, and UEFA has refused to recognise a breakaway Croatian FA.

In the second round of the championship European Cup holders Red Star - still including last season's stars Dejan Savicevic and Darko Pancev - walloped Pelister Bitola 4-1. Zemun, who beat Sarajevo 2-0, are the only team with maximum points from two matches.



Siggi Jonsson aims to make up for two years of lost time this season. The unlucky Icelander has spent two seasons fighting back trouble. Now he's fit again and bidding to win the first team place that's eluded him since he arrived at Highbury in the summer of 1989.

'I didn't join Arsenal just to see out my contract in the reserves,' said the 24 year-old Icelandic international. He cost a tribunal-set £475,000 fee. But injuries have restricted him to just nine first team appearances – most as a sub. 'When I came to Highbury, Arsenal were champions, just like we are now. It was a good move for me, because I wanted to play for a successful team. I've still got a lot to play for. This season,

I hope I'll have the chance, without any interruptions.'

Siggi was a frequent sub early in the 1989/90 season. He scored in a 4-0 win over Manchester City and soon became a cult figure with the Highbury fans. But the only game he started that season was the Littlewoods Cup disaster at Oldham, when we crashed 1-3 on the Boundary Park plastic. Jonsson's campaign came to an abrupt halt two months later. He subbed at Stoke towards the end of our F.A. Cup third round win. Then the back worries kept him out for the rest of the season.

Last season turned out even worse. Siggi made a sound start in the reserves. He shone in an attacking position behind the front two. He broke into the first team for the 2-2 draw at Leeds and the 2-0 home win over Norwich. Then his back 'went' again.

While he was sidelined, young David Hillier stepped forward to play an important part in our title triumph.

'It was a nightmare. It created so many doubts in my mind,' said Siggi: 'Some days I'd turn up for training, then find the back had locked and I couldn't even take part.'

Jonsson needed surgery, battled through a strengthening programme with Gary Lewin – then continued his exercises back home in Iceland during the summer. Siggi returned to pre-season training a week later than most of his colleagues. But he stepped into action straightaway.

'The Monday I arrived, we had a reserve friendly against Kuwait. I went in, felt OK, and I've been playing ever since,' he said.

Jonsson has shown he's retained his old eye for an opening, and he banged home a spectacular free kick at Aldershot in the 1-1 pre-season draw. 'He's been looking sharp,' said reserve team coach George Armstrong.

'Now I want to challenge for the first division again,' said Siggi: 'It will be a relief to have people asking me about my prospects instead of talking about my injuries.'







Luton Town have escaped relegation in each of the past three seasons only by winning their final game. So new manager David Pleat, who returned for his second spell in charge this summer, is under no illusions as to the size of the task before him.

With both of last season's chief goalscorers now having left the club – following the departure of Iain Dowie to West Ham in March, 19-goal Lars Elstrup returned to Odense during the summer – early signs suggest that Mr. Pleat will be basing his survival plans around his defence.

After Luton had drawn their opening game of the new season by 0-0 at West Ham, Mr. Pleat remarked: 'I was pleased with the way we defended. A clean sheet means more to me now than when I started in management'.

That was, in fact, the first time Luton had not conceded a goal in 46 away games, dating back to September 1989! However, four days later the Hatters crashed 0-5 at Coventry, before recovering to earn a goalless draw with Liverpool on Saturday.

In a bid to boost his attack, Mr. Pleat tried to sign former England striker Clive Allen from Manchester City shortly before the start of the season, but that deal fell through.

So, though Mr. Pleat has re-signed striker Brian Stein, we are likely to see the Luton emphasis switch more to defence. Centre-backs Graham Rodger and John Dreyer looked very solid at West Ham while full-backs Dave Beaumont and Richard Harvey were rarely troubled.

Darren McDonough, who now usually plays in midfield, is a former defender and Mr. Pleat will probably be looking to David Preece and Mark Pembridge – who saw his shot hit the bar at Upton Park – to move up in support of strikers Sean Farrell and Stein.

Kinglsey Black, on the left wing, is likely to become a key figure in any Luton counter-attack.

ALEC CHAMBERLAIN (Goalkeeper)

Alec was signed from Everton for £150,000 in July 1988 and took over in the Luton goal towards the end of the following season. He was a reserve player at Ipswich but soon stepped into League soccer with Colchester after a transfer in 1982. Everton signed him for £75,000 in 1987 as cover, but after a loan spell with Tranmere, he moved on to Kenilworth Road.

DAVE BEAUMONT (Defender)

Dave, who was signed from Dundee United for £150,000 in January 1989, was unlucky with injuries in his early days with the Hatters. But he won a place at centre-back last season and opened the current campaign at right-back. He joined the Dundee club from school and worked his way into their first-team in 1984.

JOHN DREYER (Defender)

John was an apprentice with Oxford but played League soccer for both Torquay and Fulham, on loan, during 1985/86 before getting his chance in the Oxford side the following season. Luton signed him for £140,000 in 1988 and he has been an ever-present member of their side for the past two seasons.

GRAHAM RODGER (Defender)

Centre half Graham completed his apprenticeship with Wolves, but got only one outing in their League eleven. After moving to Coventry in 1985 he played four times for the England under-21s. Luton signed him during the summer of 1989.

RICHARD HARVEY (Defender)

Richard is a former England youth international. He made his League debut in 1986 and for the past two seasons he has been a regular member of the side.

MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender)

Marvin is a former Luton apprentice who broke into the first-team for a few games in 1987/88. Last season he played in both full-back positions. Marvin is one of the survivors of Luton's League Cup winning side against Arsenal in 1988.

JULIAN JAMES (Defender/Midfield)

Julian joined the club as a trainee and he was introduced to First Division football four seasons ago. He is an England under-21 international.

MARC NORTH (Defender/Midfield)

Versatile Marc returned for his second spell with the club this summer. He started his career with the Hatters, but made his League debut while on loan to Lincoln in 1985. He later had loan spells with Scunthorpe and Birmingham before transferring to Grimsby in 1987. Playing in attack, he led the Mariners' scoring list with 14 goals in his first season. Leicester paid £100,000 for him in 1989. Last season he turned out for Leicester – both in midfield and defence.

DARREN McDONOUGH (Midfield)

Darren completed his apprenticeship with Oldham and played more than 200 first-team games for the Latics prior to his £85,000 transfer to Luton in 1986. He was a member of the Hatters' side in the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final.

MARK PEMBRIDGE (Midfield)

Mark is a former Luton trainee who made his senior debut against West Ham in the Zenith Cup last December. He has won a regular place and has played for Wales at 'B' and under-21 levels.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield)

David made his League debut for Walsall in 1981, winning a regular place two years later. Luton invested £150,000 when they signed him in 1984 and he later played in two Littlewoods Cup finals for the Hatters. David has been capped three times by England 'B'.

KINGLSEY BLACK (Midfield/Winger)

Kingsley made a remarkable impact after being introduced to the Luton side four seasons ago. He starred in their Littlewoods Cup win over the Gunners at Wembley and, within weeks, was in the Northern Ireland side. He now has 15 full international caps. Two seasons ago he was joint-top scorer with 12 goals. He netted nine times last term.

JASON REES (Midfield)

Jason is an ex-trainee who made his First Division debut on New Years' Day in 1990, as a substitute against Everton. Last season Jason played his first game for the Wales under-21 side against England and he has since been capped by Wales 'B'.

BRIAN STEIN (Forward)

Brian returned to Luton this summer after spending the past three seasons in France. A Luton discovery, he was introduced to the Hatters' League side in 1977 and was their leading scorer on two occasions, form that won him an England cap. Brian scored two of the Wembley goals when Luton beat the Gunners in the Littlewoods Cup final of 1988. That proved to be his last game for the club for three years. He was transferred to SM Caen, then played for Annency before returning to Kenilworth Road.

SEAN FARRELL (Forward)

Sean completed his apprenticeship with the Hatters, but made his League debut while on loan to Colchester during 1987/88. He made his First Division debut for Luton two seasons ago.

PHIL GRAY (Forward)

Phil was signed from Tottenham for £275,000 shortly before the start of the season. He developed in the junior teams at White Hart Lane and made his First Division debut in 1987. Two seasons ago he went to Barnsley on loan.

KURT NOGAN (Forward)

Kurt is a former trainee who turned professional in July 1989. He was a prolific scorer in the reserves and was elevated to the first team in January 1990. He won his first Wales under-21 cap last season.
