game we must believe that we can and will do so. It must not become a phobia and we on the coaching staff have a responsibility to ensure that our players are prepared to sacrifice defensive positions to join the attacking play.

I have no particular queries so far with the way we have defended as a team. Excepting the rather false circumstances at Coventry, we have protected Alec Chamberlain more than adequately, but in doing so we have not played with enough invention when we gained possession. Sometimes the solution is a good result which can transform a nervous player into one filled with confidence. But make no mistake with this, if we cannot quickly show that we are capable of winning games, we will be attempting to manoeuvre the transfer market.

Over the weekend, we reluctantly decided that in the best interests of the club we had no alternative but to accept a £1.5 million offer from Nottingham Forest for Kingsley Black. It is not something I enjoy doing, but I wish him well in his future and I am sure he reciprocates those wishes as he is a Lutonian. We should not be too dismayed at this 'football fact of life'.

When I arrived first time around at Luton I sold Paul and Ron Fletcher for enough money nearly to re-generate a team. It took time, but the money made certain that we would not be embarrassed at

They already know that it will not be easy as the biggest clubs swoop on their outstanding players when their contracts expire and spirit them away. Despite the loss of the trio of Wallace brothers, Mr Branfoot will be pleased that Shearer has signed a new contract and that Le Tissier is still there to tantalise defences.

Luton's problems are not that different to Southampton's. We have started the season with a daunting programme, playing six of the first eight games away from home and meeting the champions of the last two seasons Liverpool and Arsenal in successive matches. Football is a physical and a mental challenge and although we have not hit the net prior to the Chelsea



that time with our bankers. I am hoping that, much as we regret Kingsley leaving, there will be some understanding of the situation which I face as manager.

Our two additions, Trevor Peake, an experienced campaigner from Coventry, and the young forward Philip Gray, from Tottenham, will both prove they can handle the fierce theatre of Division One football. The only thing to fear is fear.

In coping with Liverpool and Arsenal, we have met two of the potential championship contenders. It is a long season and the challenges ahead will be exciting.

It would appear that there is no magic wand or fairy godmother waiting in the wings to support us with some desperately-needed money. I sincerely hope that the behind-the-scenes activities at the club can help put us in a position where we are not too beholden to our bankers. It is always a difficult line to follow when you are

This conflict constantly catches many clubs out. We must be determined that over the next few weeks we can move into a situation where as a manager I can see a chance to move and to strengthen the staff without being under daily pressure to sell players.

I hope tonight's game is a good one and all our loyal Hatters supporters will back the team as much as possible in our efforts to improve our situation. The early season support at West Ham, Coventry and Arsenal is appreciated and does not go unnoticed.

News Update

The licensing of our game

Inspectors from the Football Licensing Authority will attend a special one-day seminar at the National Exhibition Centre in Birmingham this month. This will give club representatives an opportunity to talk directly to the individuals who will eventually issue licences to play professional football in this country.

Following the publication of the Taylor Report, the Football Licensing Authority has been appointed by the Government to oversee the implementation at Football League grounds of the recommendations contained in the report. The FLA will have extensive powers and football will only be able to be played at a league ground once the club has obtained a licence from the authority.

The one-day seminar, which has been arranged by the Football Stadia Advisory Design Council, has been organised around the Euro Stadia '91 exhibition which is expected to be attended by all league clubs.

The Open Forum seminar will be held on Thursday, September 12, beginning at 11am. The question and answer session which will involve inspectors from the FLA begins at 2.30 pm and is preceded in the morning by a look at the work of the Football Stadia Advisory Design Council.

Big or small

In an effort to ensure that clubs do not alter the size of their playing areas during the season, The Football League now insist upon pitch dimensions being registered at the league headquarters. In addition, league regulations now define both the maximum and minimum dimensions of the field of play permissible at clubs.

The biggest playing surface in the league can now be found at the Leyton Orient ground, Brisbane Road. Their pitch at 120 x 80 yards is bigger even than Wembley which measures a modest 115 x 75 yards by comparison. Swansea City's Vetch Field is the smallest pitch together with that at Fourth Division Halifax Town, both measuring 110 x 70 yards.

For the record, the biggest and smallest pitches in each division are: Division One - Nottingham Forest 115 x 78 yards, Chelsea, Leeds United, Luton Town, Southampton and West Ham all 110 x 72 yards. Division Two - Port Vale 113.5 x 77 yards, Derby County 110 x 71 yards. Division Three - Leyton Orient 120 x 80 yards, Swansea City 110 x 70 yards. Division Four - Carlisle United 117 x 78 yards, Halifax Town 110 x 70 yards.



Philip (pictured above) has already had one home outing against Liverpool while Trevor (pictured right, with our manager David Pleat) will be making his first home appearance tonight. Good luck to them both.

Do not let these early results mislead you! We'll come bouncing back

Good evening and a warm welcome to Southampton and their supporters on their visit to Kenilworth Road tonight. Like us, the Saints have been through a busy early-season period which has involved activity in the transfer market and some unpredictable results.

Last weekend, Kingsley Black joined Nottingham Forest for a £1.5 million transfer fee. Naturally, our best wishes go with Kingsley, as with any player who has been part of our club and moves on. This is normal and there is always a tinge of regret, but with Kingsley it is something different. He is and has always been a special case.

He had been with the club since he was a schoolboy. Indeed, we had been following him, tracking his progress, since he was 11 and he was, of course, a Luton boy through and through who grew up following the club and later joined us, from school, to become a successful player at full professional level.

Listening to him talking on the radio on Saturday, after completing the transfer, I was struck by just how much he has matured in recent years and, in particular, since he first came into the team at the time of the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final. I am sure there is a part of Kingsley which, as with many of our own supporters, will be happy to have seen the club accept a big fee for his transfer and, in doing so, be giving the manager some help in strengthening our squad.

As Kingsley leaves for another First Division

club, of course, further opportunities will open up for other players here at Kenilworth Road. Philip Gray, who we were very pleased to see opening his Football League goalscoring account at Chelsea, has joined us recently to further his own career and I am sure this will prove to be a very good move for him.

At the present time, the results are not going our way and the pundits are proving keen to write us off already. But these are early days and we have played only five matches, four of which have been away from home and against difficult opposition, three in London.

Some of the national newspapers publish current form tables during the season and it will be interesting to see the performances and results of other clubs during the season when they encounter similarly difficult sequences of fixtures. I have no doubt that our two points from five games will not look so bad at all then.

Despite our start, our Welsh boys are certainly not lacking in confidence or recognition and congratulations are due to Mark Pembrey, who has been selected in the Wales squad to meet Brazil in Cardiff on September 11, Jason Rees and Kurt Nogan, who have won further under-21 honours, and Paul Hancock and Mathew Holtam, for being selected by the Wales under-18's, together with Lee Rogers, who is on standby.

Incidentally, our other Welsh star Ceri Hughes is now only four or five weeks away from a return to competitive football following

his recovery from injury and we all, I am sure, wish him all the best as he works towards a full restoration of fitness and form and a recall to international duty.

Liverpool's visit in our opening home league match with the return of visiting supporters appeared to go off very well indeed, despite the natural and understandable apprehension of many people in the local community. The Mayor of Luton officially opened the New Stand and with a good atmosphere and good behaviour all round, I felt it justified our faith in the decision.

We were disappointed with the attendance, but given the time of the year and the traditional effect which the holiday season has had on our fixtures, it was understandable. With Liverpool falling 700 short of their full allocation of tickets, it seems there were 1,500 Luton supporters missing on the day in a potential capacity of 13,400.

Interestingly, I had a telephone call last week, after the Liverpool match, from a person who wished to protest at the return of visiting supporters to the ground before the first match took place. It was only after I informed her that the game against Liverpool had been played that she realised her words were somewhat in vain.

On the fixtures front, please note that we have been drawn to meet Birmingham City in the Rumbelows League Cup. The first leg will be played here on September 25 and the second leg at St Andrews on October 8 (details on page 13). The prices for this game have been reduced as in previous years for games played at this stage of the competition.

Once again, we shall be contesting the Zenith Data Systems Cup in which we have received a first round bye. In the second round, we will play away to Ipswich Town or Bristol City on October 22 or October 16, respectively, depending on the outcome of their meeting.

Finally, a warm welcome to our loan player Lee Glover, here for one month from Nottingham Forest, and a welcome home to Brian Stein. Also welcome to Jurgen Sommer, our new non-contract goalkeeper who you have to see to believe. He is so big that, as Bill Shankly always said of Ron Yeats, you have to walk round him to appreciate his size! Enjoy the match.

Sean to Miss Three

Sean Farrell, who was sent off at Coventry City, will miss three First Division matches through suspension. He is ruled out of tonight's clash with the Saints, our visit to Wimbledon on Saturday and the following week's home clash with Notts County.



I was obviously very flattered when Mr Pleat approached me and asked if I would be prepared to take over as captain. I said I would be proud and honoured if it did not upset any of the other senior players and the initial response from the lads to me has been fantastic, especially from John Dreyer who has been very helpful.

This evening, we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Southampton to Kenilworth Road. Like many First Division clubs, at the time of writing, the Saints have not made the start to the new league season they would have liked and new manager Ian Branfoot has already moved into the transfer market to strengthen his squad. Last week they signed former Town favourite Iain Dowie for £500,000 and Bury winger David Lee for £350,000.

Southampton started their campaign with a 3-2 home defeat at the hands of a rejuvenated Tottenham, with Alan Shearer and newcomer Richard Hall scoring the consolation goals. This result was followed in quick succession by defeat at Notts County 1-0, although they showed signs of a change in fortune with a workmanlike 2-0 win at Sheffield United. Last Wednesday evening, they met Leeds United and suffered a heavy 4-0 defeat.

Now under the guidance of former Reading boss Mr Branfoot, the Saints will be looking to improve on their indifferent form of recent seasons, form which has seen them fail to live up to the high expectations placed on them, as they get into their stride this term. Although goalscoring winger Rod Wallace departed for Elland Road during the summer, the Saints still have an impressive forward line-up. England hopeful Matthew Le Tissier, who was yet again top-scorer for Southampton with 19 league goals last season, will link up with England's mini-World Cup star Alan Shearer to form a potentially explosive front line.

Add to this the older heads of captain Glenn Cockerill and former England defender Russell Osman and it is easy to see that Mr Branfoot has a good balance of youth and experience in a squad with potential to do well this season. Success of course would ensure the Saints of a place in the Premier League and hopefully in a new multi-purpose sports stadium which has been proposed.

Southampton Football Club was created in November 1885 as Southampton St Mary's,

with the church's curate elected as president, and largely formed by the players from the Deanery FC, originally established by a group of school-teachers in 1880. They were then playing at the Antelope Ground, now the site of Southampton's County Bowling Club. The club turned professional in 1894 and joined the Southern League. They soon became a limited company, thereby relinquishing their church origins although the nickname "Saints" has persisted to this day.

Under the guidance of George Thomas, Southampton moved to The Dell in 1889 in a deal which cost Thomas £10,000. They have remained their ever since, establishing a reputation as one of the most friendly and admired clubs in the south.

The club have had limited success during their long history. They were Division Three Champions in 1959-60, Division Three (South) Champions in 1921-22 and FA Cup Winners in 1976. Mr Branfoot is the club's seventh post-war manager following in a list which includes such names as former Town favourite Chris Nicholl and England number two Lawrie McMenemy.

Saints On Parade

TIM FLOWERS (goalkeeper) - Tim began his league career with Wolves and, after winning league youth honours, he was capped at under-21 level. He enjoyed two full seasons in Wolves' first team before signing for Southampton in a £75,000 deal in 1986. After an initial loan spell at Swindon, he won a regular place in 1989.

MICKY ADAMS (defender) - Sheffield-born Micky made his league debut for Gillingham in 1980. After gaining England youth caps while at Priestfield, he was transferred to Coventry for £75,000 in 1983. Leeds paid £110,000 for him three years later and he moved on to Southampton in 1989.

JASON DODD (defender) - Jason joined the club as a trainee and he made his senior debut, as substitute, against York City in the Littlewoods Cup in 1989. He quickly established himself in the first team, gaining England under-21 honours.

ALEXEI CHEREDNIK (defender) - Alexei became the first Soviet player to play in the English First Division when he made his debut for the Saints, as substitute, at Liverpool in March 1989. He signed for Southampton from Dnepro for £300,000 and is a Soviet international.

RICHARD HALL (defender) - Richard was only 18 when he signed for the Saints in a £200,000 move from Scunthorpe in February 1991, after being a regular in their first team. Scored in Southampton's opening league game against Tottenham.

NEIL RUDDOCK (defender) - Neil was signed from Millwall in 1989 and within weeks was in the England under-21 side. He left Millwall for Tottenham in 1986 but, after making only nine league appearances for Spurs, returned to Millwall for £350,000 two years later. Oddly, he made only two appearances for the Lions before moving to The Dell for £250,000 a few weeks later.

JON GITTENS (defender) - Moseley-born Jon returned for his second spell at The Dell last season after spending three full seasons at Swindon. He made his league debut for the Saints in a 2-0 defeat at Birmingham City in 1986. He joined Swindon in 1987 before re-signing for Southampton in a £1 million deal towards the end of last season.

ALAN MCLOUGHLIN (midfield) - Another ex-Swindon player, Alan also joined Southampton in a £1 million deal last season. He started his career at Manchester United but, after failing to gain a first team spot, joined Swindon in 1986. The following season he was transferred to Torquay but returned to the County Ground a year later. Alan is an Ireland international who played in the 1990 World Cup finals.

GLENN COCKERILL (midfield) - Glenn started his career with Lincoln, making his debut in 1977. Three seasons later he joined Swindon for £110,000 before returning to Lincoln in 1981. He topped the scoring lists at Sincil Bank in his first season back with 11 League goals. In 1984 he was transferred to Sheffield United but then joined Southampton for £225,000 in 1985.

BARRY HORNE (midfield) - Welsh international Barry was introduced to league soccer by Wrexham in 1984. He scarcely missed a game for three years before moving to Portsmouth in 1987. Now an established First Division player, Southampton paid a club record £700,000 to sign him in 1989.



PAUL RIDEOUT (forward) - Yet another ex-Swindon player, Paul twice finished top-scorer at the County Ground before joining Aston Villa in 1983. With Villa, he won six England under-21 caps and was the club's leading marksman with 15 goals in 1984/85. At the end of that season he joined Italian club Bari before joining the Saints in 1988.



IAIN DOWIE (forward) - Northern Ireland international, Iain made his break in league football here at Kenilworth Road in 1989 following his transfer from non-league Hendon Town. He spent two full seasons at Kenilworth Road before joining West Ham last spring for £480,000. After helping the Hammers to promotion, he signed for Southampton for £500,000 last week.

DAVID LEE (forward) - Signed from Bury in a £350,000 deal last week, David joined his only league club from school in 1984. He made his breakthrough to the first team in 1986 and remained a permanent fixture in the Shakers' side until his transfer to the Saints.



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Player profile

Brian Stein

The big broad smile told its own story on August 17 after Brian Stein, now 33, had completed his Luton Town return by performing for the full 90 minutes at Upton Park. Since then he has put another four appearances behind him and shown he retains the ability and the fitness to perform at First Division level and play with great heart. "It has been a really nice feeling to come back," admitted Brian, who spent the last three years since scoring the last-minute winner in the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final, in France with Caen and Annecy. "But it has been a tough opening run. When I first saw the opening five games or so in our programme I could hardly believe it. We've had four away and only one at home and also played both Liverpool and Arsenal.

"I thought it must be a joke or that someone was trying to get rid of us! I just couldn't believe it. And, sure, it has been difficult and our results have been disappointing. But we know we have got to keep on going. The best thing that ever happened to me and to the club and the town was the day we won that Littlewoods Cup and we won that after getting promoted and fighting to stay up.

"It was a real surprise when the club released me after that and I still don't know why they did exactly. For me, personally, it was a good move to be given a free and to go to France, but I am not so sure it was good for the team. I think too many experienced players went at the wrong time. The club made some money, but you need experienced players to help the younger ones coming on.

"In France, it was very different for me. I learned a lot at Caen, but it was not easy and I had an injury which did not help. It was a big upheaval too for the family especially when Caen spent £800,000 to buy a replacement for me and I went to Annecy, a Second Division club, on the Swiss borders. It was a lovely place and I scored nine goals in 19 games. "Then I had offers to go to Greece, Holland and one to stay in France from Strasbourg, who are a big club with a fantastic stadium, but I felt it would be better for the family to move back to England for the children's education. It was just about the time Mr Pleat was re-appointed and I had stayed in touch with the club so they got in touch. I came for a week to prove my fitness and then signed a contract.

"If I am honest, I have to say the

standards are not so good now as when I left, right through the league I mean. Liverpool, for example, and Arsenal are not so good. Everyone plays power football now and, in my opinion, the football is not so good. For us, it is difficult. When you don't score, you get nervous and don't want to concede a goal and you stay back - it is a vicious circle. All you have to do is work harder and really enjoy it. I think I am stronger than ever now. Remember, I was a late starter and I used to have nightmares at first about pre-season training until I was about 25. Not any more though. Now I am looking forward to everything."

The European Viewpoint

Trevor Steven's recent record-breaking move to join Chris Waddle at Marseille, David Platt's transfer to Bari and Paul Gascoigne's impending switch from Tottenham to Lazio all prove one thing – that British football is going to become more and more involved in the European game in the 1990's as free marketing takes hold and a truly super European Super League begins to emerge.

It will be the same for everyone. The big clubs will be looking for new stars, the cheque books will be waved and the most talented players throughout the Common Market will be drawn, like moths to a light-bulb, to the biggest clubs with the heaviest backing from commercial interests.

Already the European transfer market has become very big business involving some of the biggest international companies. PSV Eindhoven in the Netherlands, for example, are backed by the Philips electrical empire, Juventus, in Italy, by the might of Fiat, AC Milan by Italian media magnate and industrialist Silvio Berlusconi and Olympique Marseille by Bernard Tapie.

As a result, the fees have risen with the level of competition. A look at the fees paid shows that. Marseille paid £5 million to take Trevor Steven from Glasgow Rangers to the south of France and Bari, down in the foot of Italy where life is slow and hot, paid £5.5 million for Platt, the former Aston Villa star who had performed so well in Italy during the 1990 World Cup finals.

Neither of these two was the biggest transfer fee of the close-season, however, as the top price of the summer was paid by AS Roma in securing the services of German midfielder Thomas Hassler for £5.8 million. Indeed, £5 million was almost a commonplace transfer fee this year as another German star, Jürgen Kohler moved from Bayern Munich to Juventus and Lazio added to their spending on Gascoigne by agreeing a fee of £5 million for Hamburg's Thomas Doll. Another club parting with £5 million for a player was Paris Saint Germain, now back under the control of Portuguese coach Artur Jorge, who led Porto to their Champions Cup triumph in 1987. They paid that sum to buy Brazilian central defender Ricardo Gomes and his midfield colleague Valdo from Benfica.

All in all this leaves, Liverpool's outlays on Mark Wright, Dean Saunders and Mark Walters looking more routine than exceptional in European terms as the Merseyside club returns to Europe in the UEFA Cup this month (September) with an easy-looking opening round tie against Kuusysi Lahti. It will be interesting to see how strong Liverpool – and Arsenal – are on the European stage this season, following Manchester United's exceptional performance, aided by Les Sealey and Mal Donaghy, in winning the European Cup Winners' Cup last season. Perhaps United's bright start to the new season here proves something too.

Certainly, in the European Champions' Cup, it could be that a late change of heart by the Spanish Football Federation could assist their clubs in challenging more strongly for the top honours in the game. For, after years of resistance, the federation has given way to the demands of the top clubs to permit the registration of four foreigners per club, doubling the limit at which the Spanish clubs have been held for the last decade. This will certainly assist Johan Cruyff's Barcelona in the Champions' Cup, Atlético Madrid in the Cup Winners' Cup and Real Madrid (guided of course by our former hero Radomir Antic now, as coach), Sporting Gijón, Oviedo and Osasuna in the UEFA Cup.

For many of us, Antic's fortunes with Real Madrid will be of great interest this season and it can be assumed that the telephone lines between Kenilworth Road and the Santiago Bernabéu stadium in Madrid will often be alive with football gossip and transfer chatter between two old friends. Antic, a wandering Yugoslav with ability in several languages, is a true European and in many ways a man ahead of his time, having left Eastern Europe to travel through the football markets of the west long before the latest revolutions within the old Eastern Bloc.

In his squad, he will enjoy the presence this season in Madrid of several great players, not least his fellow-Yugoslav midfielder Robert Prosinecki who is widely regarded as the Continent's most gifted play-maker and an almost certain star at next summer's European Championship finals in Sweden. Alongside him, he can field the Roumanian Gheorghe Hagi, who earlier in his career was described as the George Best of the East. It should make for an interesting season in Castille for Antic as he seeks to prove he deserved to replace John Toshack, Alfredo di Stefano and the rest.

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

Cricket Score Games Always Drew The Cameras

Newly promoted from Division Two, the Town became the team everyone wanted to watch in 1982/83 - but not always for the right reasons.

The television companies clamoured to cover Luton games because after only 15 matches the Town had scored 30 goals but had conceded 32. As manager David Pleat said "We are on route to score a hundred - the trouble is there might be 150 against"

The visit of Southampton to Kenilworth Road on 27th November 1982 attracted the BBC's "Match of the Day" cameras and surprisingly the second lowest home gate of the season reflecting that the fans probably wanted a couple of 1-0 wins rather than 4-4 draws.

The match started off in bright sunlight and the Town missed a couple of early chances before the Saints took the lead in the 26th minute when the speed of Danny Wallace took him past Kirk Stephens and Ricky Hill before smashing a terrific shot past Jake Findlay in the Luton goal.

Worse was still to come however as Southampton increased their lead just before half-time when Keith Cassells took advantage of a melee in the box to hammer the ball into the roof of the net.

The second half started with the Town on all out attack which left the defence shakier than normal, something which Southampton fully exploited with David Armstrong missing two good opportunities.

The Town then got a breakthrough when Chris Nicholl handled a Ricky Hill cross but David Moss hit the resultant penalty against the bar. Luton full-back Kirk Stephens volleyed home the rebound but the referee disallowed the effort as Moss was adjudged to be in an offside position.

The miss proved to be the spur the Town needed as they roared into attack and levelled the scores in the space of six minutes midway through the half.

As thick fog came down, Hill ran at the defence and hit a beautiful low shot past Peter Shilton quickly followed by a flowing move involving six Luton players ending with Brian Stein meeting a cross from Moss with a superb header.

The drama was not yet over, however, as with five minutes to go Southampton appeared to have earned the points when Armstrong hit a 25 yard shot into the net much to the dismay of the Town fans.

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The Town would not give up though and with the seconds ticking away, a shot from Paul Walsh rebounded off Shilton leaving Clive Goodyear to toe poke in the equaliser for his first goal in Division One.

Those lucky enough to have attended all the Town's games at that stage of the season had seen an average of four goals a match. No wonder we were so popular with the T.V. companies and oh what a joy to have a video recorder.

Gazing into my crystal ball....

So, here we are, back for our 10th successive season in the top flight and already enjoying the most successful era in the club's history. Five seasons in the late 1950's plus the 1974-75 season have been the only occasions in the past when we have rubbed shoulders with aristocracy of the game on a regular basis.

However, if history is to be relied on, we can make several predictions already about the new season. Firstly, the lads may struggle to avoid relegation and succeed by winning on the final day – this has happened four times in nine years, including the last three seasons in succession. Unfortunately, this term, Derby will not be around as in 1990 and 1991.

And would anyone like to make any predictions about our visits to the big clubs? Like Arsenal and Manchester

United? Well, our record since promotion is P 18 W 0 D 0 L 18...so last week's defeat at Highbury was at least consistent with previous results. At Old Trafford, incidentally, we are on an upward trend, having scored on our last two visits after seven previous games without finding the net.

As to most of the other Division One teams, we have enjoyed victories away from home in the last decade or so, with three wins at Everton, including the Simod Cup, and further triumphs at Tottenham, West Ham, Aston Villa, Southampton, Nottingham Forest, Manchester City and QPR. We have also managed three score-draws at Anfield against Liverpool. So, what makes Highbury and Old Trafford so tough? Answers on a postcard, please.

This year, we drew at West Ham on the opening day. I could have told you that would happen. In nine starts previously, we have won only once on the opening day. This was in 1984-85 against Stoke City. A dubious achievement too, as the Potters that year lost a total of 31 games out of 42, a First Division record.

At the start of 1981-82, we did manage to win...but this was in the Second Division and we went on to run away with the championship. Since then, however, it has been a sorry story with just the win over Stoke and draws against Spurs, Forest, Leicester and Crystal Palace to balance against defeats by Arsenal, Derby, Sheffield Wednesday and Tottenham.

Clearly, life is tough at the top, even after nine years of it. Just look at our away form. This must improve. Ten wins in four years speaks for itself, I think. But remember, back in 1982-83, when the season ended with Manchester City going down after that dramatic afternoon at Maine Road, we managed to pull off five First Division wins and the following season a grand total of seven. The time has surely come for a return to those good old days.

Keeping track – your day-by-day football diary

August 8 – Scottish Premier League side Falkirk sign Brian Rice from Nottingham Forest in a £65,000 deal. They also re-sign winger Kevin McAllister from Chelsea for £225,000.

August 9 – Liverpool sign Glasgow Rangers and England forward Mark Walters from Rangers for £1.5 million. Formerly with Aston Villa, for whom he made a sensational start to his league career, Walters is tipped to secure a regular place in the national team following his transfer.... Derby County sign Simon Coleman from Middlesbrough in a £300,000 transfer deal.... The Town go down 4-0 to Cambridge United in a pre-season friendly in the university city.

August 10 – Prolific Hartlepool striker Joe Allon signs for Chelsea for £250,000. He quickly goes on to prove his ability and potential with a bright start for the Blues, following on where he left off

last year after hitting 35 goals for Hartlepool. "I have done it in the lower leagues and I think I have the confidence and ability to have a right bash at it," he said of his switch to the glamorous London club from the north-east.... Abroad, in Yugoslavia, the national domestic league is plunged into crisis by the civil war which has torn the country apart. Mounting violence between the Croats and the Serbs was having a devastating effect on all sport, not just soccer, and the opening day of the league season was postponed. All 25 Croatian teams in the top three divisions of the Yugoslav league, including Hajduk Split, signed a declaration withdrawing from the league "in the interests of spectator safety."

August 11 – Charlton sign out-of-favour Crystal Palace forward Garry Thompson for £100,000 along with Brighton defender Steve Gatting.... Peter Beardsley scores on his Everton debut


against Gornik in a 3-0 victory which sets Goodison Park alight with dreams of a championship challenge this season.

He also has talks with former Hatter Steve Williams after he is not offered a contract at Southampton following his close-season move from Kenilworth Road.
