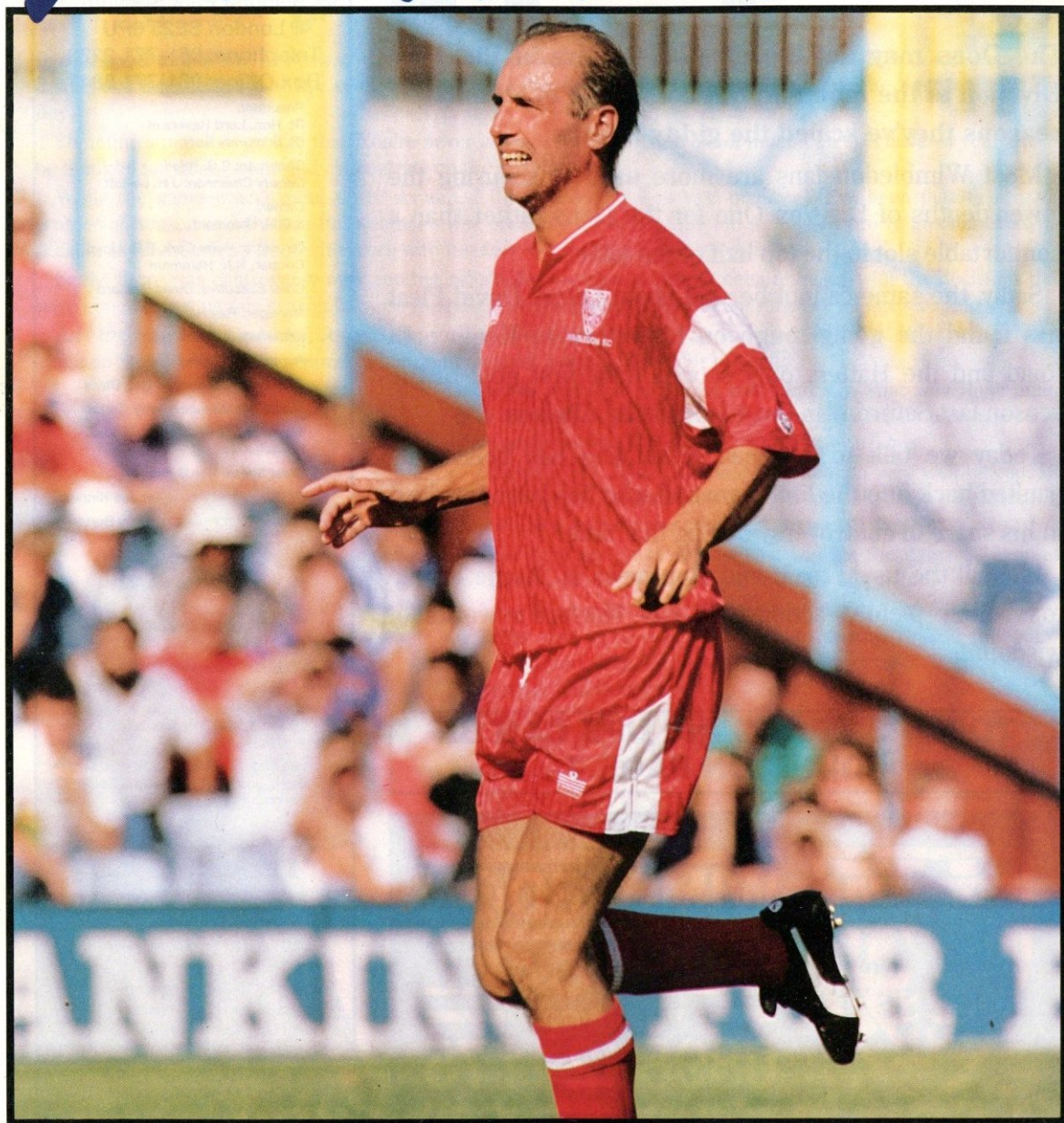

The Dons may not be hot pace-setters in the First Division at the moment, but compared to recent seasons they've scaled the giddy heights.

Most Wimbledon fans are more used to scouring the lower depths of Division One for the Dons rather than a comfortable slot in the top half of the table.

Sadly, the same cannot be said about Luton. David Pleat has found the going tough on his return to Kenilworth Road and the Hatters only scored their first goal of the season last Saturday in the 4-1 defeat by Chelsea.

It was good to get our first away win of the season under our belts up at Coventry. You could never say it was our best display of the season, but it was functional and I thought we were the best team on the day.

Sometimes matches go like that. You're never at your best, the game is not much of a spectacle so you have to be thankful for three points and concentrate on the next match.

While the game wasn't quite up to scratch, I thought our goal as real quality. We've been putting in good crosses all season and Carlton Fairweather's was probably the best of the lot. And when you've got somebody as reliable as Alan Cork up front who score with headers like that, then you're laughing.

Sadly, there was controversy over another refereeing decision. I haven't been unhappy with the decisions that have gone against us this season because the refs have been following guidelines that we all knew about.

And the referee at Coventry, Roger Dilkes, again interpreted the laws as laid down by FIFA. Hans Segers' challenge on Stewart Robson was purely a committed player going honestly for the ball.

People will look at the incident and say what was Hans doing near the centre-circle? But he's a sweeper keeper, he's paid to be alert wherever the ball is, not just in his 18-yard box.

I thought Mr. Dilkes handled the situation very well indeed. He knew there was no malicious intent, Hans didn't stop a goal-scoring opportunity so there was no call for the red card.

That's the sort of refereeing that will get the game back on an even keel and everybody will know where they stand.

Away from referees and rule interpretation, I'm quietly pleased with the start we've made. Normally by now we're near the foot of the table and drag ourselves out of trouble with a good run in November and December.

Hopefully we can still get that sort of consistency going again, but instead of pushing us up to mid-table it will see us climb towards the top of the table.

I'm sure David Pleat would welcome a run of consistency at the moment. Luton have been struggling for the first five or six matches and David hasn't quite been able to get the balance right.

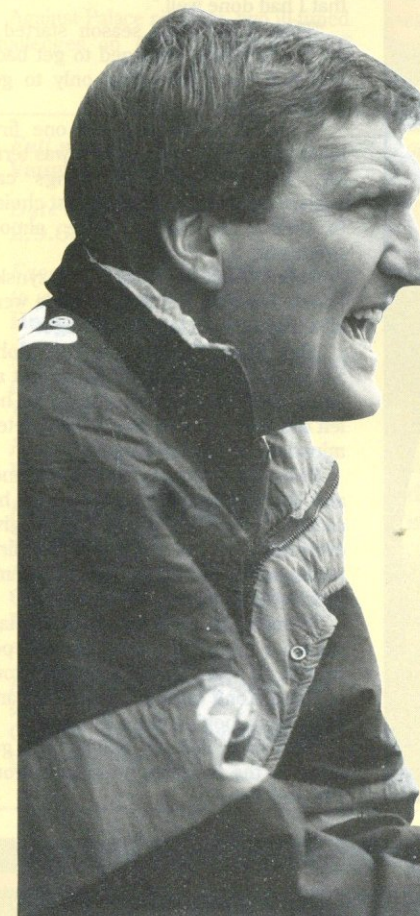
But I know David and I know a lot of the players at Luton. There's a lot of quality there and I'm sure if it's harnessed properly they will get themselves out of trouble.

Welcome back to Selhurst Park for our second game here in five days. Let's hope we can produce a better result than against Manchester United on Tuesday.

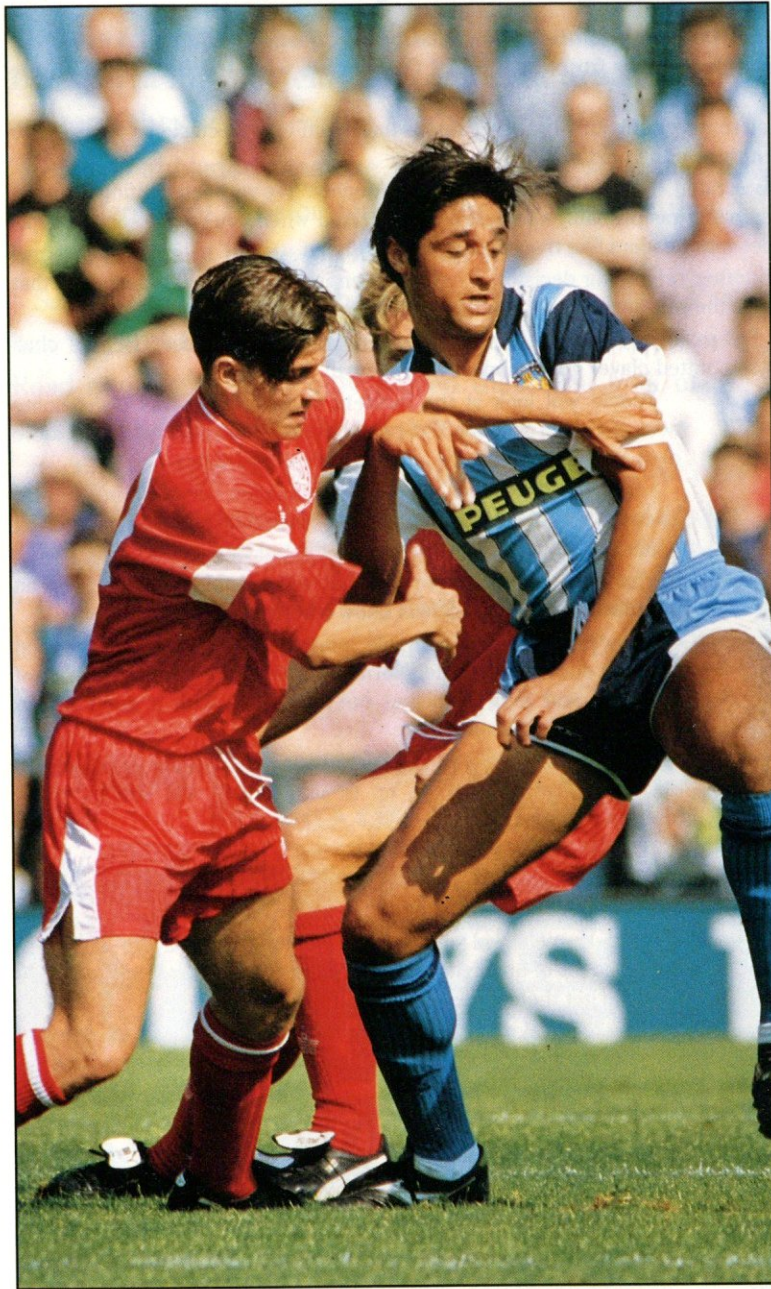

Back in the groove!

A Year ago Vaughan Ryan thought the only way to further his career was a move away from Wimbledon.

Twelve months later the gritty midfielder is back in the first team and is not going to give up his place without a fight.

Ryan said, "I seriously considered asking for a move a couple of times last season, I was that down. It seemed I'd gone from top of the heap to nowhere in less than a year through no fault of my own."

"The season before last was great, I'd played regularly all season and felt that I had done well."

"Then before last season started I got a bad injury, managed to get back into first team reckoning only to get another injury."

"I ended up playing just one first team game last season which was terrible. It's amazing how things can change for you, I went from first choice to fourth or fifth choice almost overnight."

"John Scales, Detzi Kruszynski, Lawrie Sanchez and Robbie Earle were all ahead of me a few months ago."

"But then Keith Curle left, John Scales dropped back and Sanch got an injury and Detzi was out of favour. That left the door open for me and I'm determined not to let it shut again."

Ryan sat down during the summer and thought long and hard about his career. "I realised that I had to give everything to get back into the first team, and the first thing was to get my fitness absolutely right."

"What with all the injuries last season, I think I was only about 90 per cent fit all year. Then I went on a tour of Hong Kong during the summer and came back looking like a Buddha!"

"So I cancelled my holiday and got down to the toughest pre-season work I've ever done."

VAUGHAN RYAN

Ryan is just the latest Wimbledon player to pay tribute to Jenny Archer, the athletics coach who has worked wonders on the fitness front.

He said, "Jenny has been brilliant, she's improved my whole fitness by 200 per cent. It's hard work but I can tell just over the first few games that there's been a massive improvement in my stamina. Part of my job is getting around the park well and she's helped me do that probably better than at any time in my career."

Ryan's whole-hearted attitude towards the game has always marked him down as one of the most combative Wimbledon players, but unfortunately it's also got him into trouble this season.

Against Palace recently, two ill-timed challenges on Andy Gray and Geoff

Thomas earned him his first senior red card, a fact that hurt Ryan.

"I was gutted because basically I got hammered because of one referee's inconsistency. Those two fouls were about the only ones I committed all night but because they happened one after another and the referee was looking to give somebody another red card."

"It's a joke really because I committed two fouls and got sent off against Palace but against Coventry I committed three fouls and only got a talking to."

"That's the sort of wall you're up against. We watched an official FIFA video during the summer on the new regulations. It was in three different languages and it looks as though we must have watched the French version!

"It really just comes down to the individual ref. Against Palace he was looking to his yellow and red cards for everything, but at Coventry, the guy knew how to handle a game properly, when to get tough and when to just have a quiet word."

"But until every ref thinks along the same lines, either all or nothing, nobody will know where they stand."

Fortunately for Ryan, his punishment will only be a one-match suspension, but even that cuts deep.

"It's really annoying because I've felt I've done well so far this season, but the suspension is going to break up that consistency."

"It also gives somebody else to get their hands on the midfield place for a match, but I'm determined not to give it up easily."

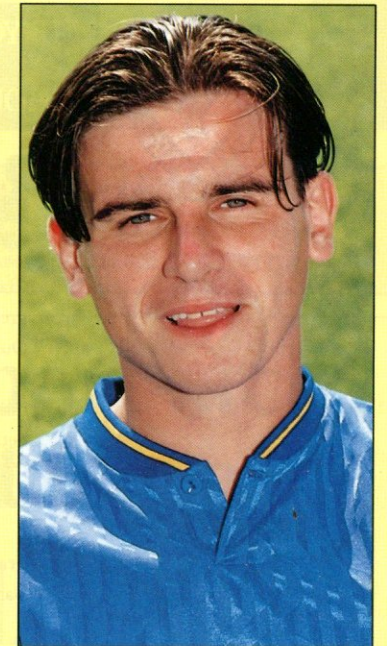

ALEX CHAMBERLAIN (Goal-keeper) Alec was signed from Everton for £150,000 in July 1988 and took over in the Luton goal towards the end of the following season. He was a reserve player at Ipswich but soon stepped into League soccer with Colchester after a transfer in 1982. Everton signed him for £75,000 in 1987 as cover but, after a loan spell with Tranmere, he moved on to Kenilworth Road.

DAVE BEAUMONT (Defender) Dave, who was signed from Dundee United for £150,000 in January 1989, was unlucky with injuries in his early days with the Hatters. But he won a place at centre-back last season and opened the current campaign at right-back. He joined the Dundee club from school and worked his way into their first-team in 1984.

TREVOR PEAKE (Defender) Trevor was signed from Coventry for £100,000 last month and immediately installed as team captain. A former England semi-professional international, with two caps, he joined Lincoln from non-League Nuneaton in 1979 for £15,000. He missed only a handful of games over the next four years before transferring to Coventry, for £100,000, in 1983. With Coventry, he won an FA Cup winners medal in 1987.

JOHN DREYER (Defender) John was an apprentice with Oxford but played League soccer for both Torquay and Fulham, whilst on loan, during the 1985/86 season before getting his chance in the Oxford side the following season. Luton signed him for £140,000 in 1988 and he has been an ever-

today's visitors

present member of their side for the past two seasons.

GRAHAM RODGER (Defender) Graham completed his apprenticeship with Wolves but got only one outing in their League eleven. After moving to Coventry in 1985 he played four times for the England under-21s and won an FA Cup winners medal. Luton signed him during the summer of 1989.

RICHARD HARVEY (Defender) Richard is a former England youth international. He made his League debut in 1986 and for the past two seasons he has been a fairly regular member of the side.

MATTHEW JACKSON (Defender / Midfield) Julian joined the club as a trainee and he was introduced to First Division football four seasons ago, Julian is an England under-21 international.

DARREN McDONOUGH (Midfield) Darren completed his apprenticeship with Oldham and played over 200 first-team games for the Latics prior to his £85,000 transfer to Luton in 1986. He was a member of the Hatters' side that played in the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final.

MARK PEMBRIDGE (Midfield) Mack is a former Luton trainee who made his senior debut against West Ham in the Zenith Cup last December. He later won a regular place and played for Wales at "B" and under-21 levels.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield) David made his League debut for Walsall in 1981, winning a regular place two years later. Luton invested £150,000 when signing him in 1984 and he later played in two Littlewoods Cup finals for the Hatters. David has been capped three times by England "B."

KINGSLEY BLACK (Midfield) Kingsley made a remarkable

impact after being introduced to the Luton side four seasons ago. He starred in their Littlewoods Cup win over Arsenal at Wembley and, within weeks, was in the N. Ireland side. He now has 15 full international caps. Two seasons ago he was joint-top scorer with 12 goals. He netted nine times last term.

BRAIN STEIN (Forward) Brain returned to Luton this summer after spending the past three seasons in France. A Luton discovery, he was introduced to the Hatters' League side in 1977 and was their leading scorer on two occasions, form that won him an England cap. Brian scored two of the Wembley goals when Luton beat Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup final of 1988 and that proved to be his last game

for the club for the time being. He was transferred to SM Caen, then played for Annecy before returning to Kenilworth Road.

SEAN FARRELL (Forward) Sean completed his apprenticeship with the Hatters but made his League debut whilst on loan to Colchester during 1987/88. He made his first appearance in the first Division for Luton two seasons ago.

PHIL GRAY (Forward) Phil was signed from Tottenham for £275,000 shortly before the start of the season. He developed in the junior teams at White Hart Lane and made his First Division debut in 1987. Two seasons ago he went to Barnsley on loan.

Luton Town have escaped relegation in each of the past three seasons only by winning their final game and new manager David Pleat, who returned for his second spell in charge this summer, is under no illusions as to the size of the task before him.

With both of last season's chief goalscorers now having left the club - following the departure of John Dowie to West Ham in March, 19-goal Lars Elstrup returned to Odense during the summer - early signs suggest that Mr. Pleat will be basing his survival plans around his defence.

After Luton had drawn their opening game of the new season by 0-0 at West Ham. Mr. Pleat remarked: "I was pleased with the way we defended. A clean sheet means more to me now than when I started in management."

That was, in fact, the first time Luton had not conceded a goal in 46 away games dating back to September 1989!

Scarcely had the euphoria of that occasion disappeared, though than Luton found themselves crashing 0-5 at Coventry four days later.

It was then that Mr. Pleat decided to sign Coventry centre-back Trevor Peake for £100,000. That deal was not completed in time for the new man to play in the next match at home to Liverpool. Nevertheless, the Luton defence looked good again as it held the Reds to 0-0.

Peake made his debut in the away game at Arsenal, which Luton lost 0-0.

But, if things were looking a little better in defence, the fact remained that Luton did not score a solitary goal themselves in their opening four games. So Mr. Pleat may yet feel it necessary to search for new blood here.

He did try to sign former England striker Clive Allen from Manchester City shortly before the start of the season but that deal fell through. But he did clinch a deal that took striker Brian Stein back for his second spell with the club. And Spurs' forward Phil Gray was signed for £275,000 shortly before the start of the season.

RED CARD RASH

The Dons have been involved in their fair share on controversy again early in the season and with three players sent off already this season, head the table in disciplinary points.

But much has been made about the inconsistency of referees in enforcing the new FIFA regulations.

John Fashanu misses today's match after being sent off for an ill-timed challenge on Ludek Miklosko which left the West Ham keeper with a bruise but no more.

Yet an Aston Villa player apparently knocked two of Barry Horn's teeth out with a punch in a match against Southampton and didn't even glimpse a red card.

And in the same game, Tim Flowers caught the ball outside his area. Technically that is a red card offence, but the referee felt it was an 'instinctive reaction.'

Well wasn't Terry Phelan handball against Palace instinctive? Whereas Flowers and Southampton remained unpunished, Phelo was given his marching orders and Andy Gray scored from the penalty spot.

Nobody is saying that referees will be perfect everytime, but the sooner they are allowed to make their own decisions and recognise

shades of gray without being controlled by FIFA's iron strictures, the sooner a lot more people will be happy.

PHELO REQUEST

Terry Phelan has handed in a transfer request, claiming that he and his family cannot settle properly in London.

But boss Ray Harford is hoping that he can convince Terry not to leave the Dons.

Harford said, "As a former player I can sympathise with Terry because having an unsettled domestic situation is probably the worse thing in the world.

"But I have recommended to the board that we don't sell Terry. He's an exceptional player who has been outstanding so far this season and would be a huge loss if he left.

"If we're looking to build something special at Wimbledon, we can't afford to let players of Terry's calibre leave."

HATTER OFF

Luton arrive at Selhurst Park today with an unenviable start to the season hanging round their necks. And the Dons will be looking to inflict a touch more misery today.

The Hatters were one of only three teams that Wimbledon did the double over last season. A 2-0 win at

Plough Lane and a 1-0 victory at Kenilworth Road clinched that achievement with John Fashanu being on the score-sheet twice over the two games.

Luton might just be breathing a sigh of relief that Fash is not on the prowling this afternoon.

The Hatters have lost the services of both Lars Elstrup and Kingsley Black. Black was a player that certainly interested Ray Harford and he had a £1.2 million bid turned down in the summer, but Luton could not resist an extra £300,000 that Brian Clough offered and Black joined Forest.

By the way, QPR and Everton were the other two sides to feel the wrath of the Dons twice last season!

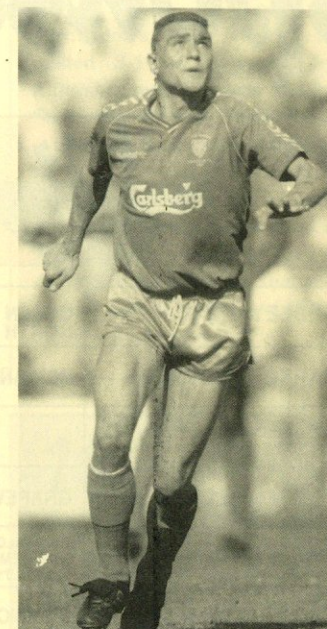
And no sooner had Vinnie let the ink dry on his Chelsea contract than he was in trouble.

But he added fuel to fire by saying that Chelsea had plenty of players 'who could look after themselves in a tunnel.'

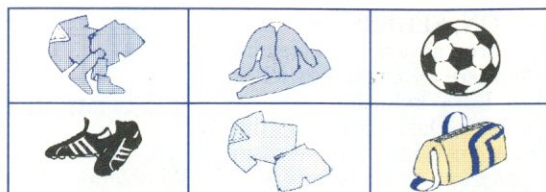

No hands, Hans! Hans Segers interprets the new FA regulations...



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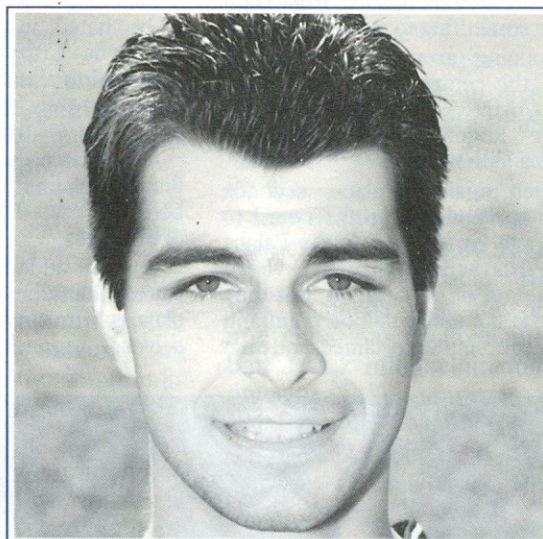
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Scott Fitzgerald who made his 1st Division debut earlier in the season has his kit sponsored by Thorn Associates.

The first leg at Cambridge was a battle from the start and Harry Bassett's boys were quite happy to come away with a 1-1 draw, happy in the knowledge that Plough Lane would see them through.

But poor league form was to translate into equally bad cup form. A 1-0 defeat at Newcastle did not bode too well and the Dons were held to a 2-2 draw with Cambridge and were promptly booted out of the competition on the away goals rule.

Another draw at home to Southampton and a 3-1 defeat by Liverpool at Plough Lane gave Wimbledon a taste of just how tough life in the top flight could be and it took some harsh words from Bassett to open some eyes in SW19.

10 YEARS AGO

The league Cup was still proving a thorn in Wimbledon's side. They were ousted 3-1 on aggregate by Aldershot over two legs and by September 15 they didn't have a point to their name. Defeats in the league against Doncaster, Fulham and Walsall only added to the misery and it wasn't until the Dons grabbed a draw at Bristol Rovers that the faithful had something - albeit flimsy - to cheer about

15 YEARS AGO

Wimbledon 5 Arsenal 0. A scoreline to send the average Dons fan into ecstasy! Unfortunately it was only a friendly match but it set the tone for a solid run in both the Southern League and the SL Cup. A 2-1 win at home to Chelmsford City was followed by a 2-0 extra time cup victory over Romford and a similar victory at Burton Albion in the league.

DAYS OF YORE

The 1934/35 season was the first real glory year for the Dons. They reached the final of the Amateur Cup for the first time and also won the Isthmian League. In the final they faced mighty Bishops Auckland and held the Geordies to a 0-0 draw at Ayresome Park. The replay was at Stamford Bridge and although Doc Doden gave the Dons a third minute lead, Auckland hit back with two goals to lift the trophy.

You will all be aware that Wimbledon will be playing their home games at Selhurst Park this season. As a result of this move, some supporters have formed a pressure group called "Supporters Against Merger" or S.A.M. for short. Over the past month, members of your committee have had several meetings with S.A.M. during which both groups have put forward their points of view. From these meetings it has emerged that we both have the same basic aims, that is to see Wimbledon Football Club return to play in the London Borough of Merton (though not necessarily at the much loved Plough Lane) and the prevention of any possible merger between Wimbledon and Crystal Palace.

S.A.M.'s main criticism of the committee has been over the lack of communication by us to you, the members. We accept that we could have done more and apologise for not having done so. In our defence I must say that despite asking for supporters views on several occasions through the local press we received just four letters on the subject. Bearing in mind that it costs in excess of £300 to contact all our members we decided, possibly wrongly, that we would reply individually to these letters rather than to the membership as a whole. I hope this, our second letter goes some way

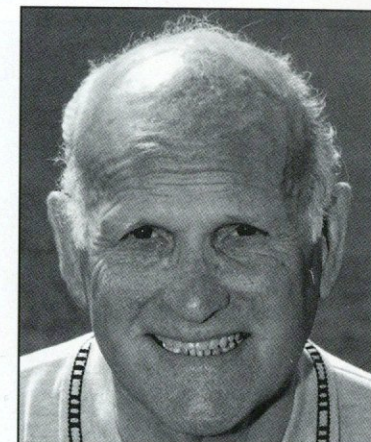
towards correcting the fault and preventing the same criticism being levelled at your committee again.

On a more positive note members of the committees executive went to the Houses Of Parliament to meet Dr Goodson-Wickes, MP for Wimbledon to discuss the various issues affecting the supporters and the football club. The meeting was very constructive with both parties giving an undertaking to keep the other informed.

Can I take this opportunity to remind members that it is now time to renew your membership. The usual benefits of membership apply such as reduced travel to all away games insurance cover and priority on applications for tickets (remember the Cup Final). In addition to these, we can for the first time in recent years offer exclusively to supporters club members the use of a bar, this will initially be a "Crystals" until approximately November when the total refurbishment of the "Glaziers" bar is completed.

Finally I would like to mention a forthcoming event for your diary, that is the Supporters Club Annual General Meeting which takes place on Monday September 23rd at 8pm in either the Dons bar or Nelsons nightclub at Plough Lane. In the past this has been a poorly attended meeting, but as this is a very important time in our history I would urge as many of you as possible to attend so that the committee that serves you can get a fuller understanding of your fears and wishes.

RON SUART - SEVEN CLUBS IN 52 YEARS - IS BARCLAYS BANK SERVICE TO FOOTBALL 1991 AWARD WINNER

Ron Suart, of Blackpool, Blackburn Rovers, Wigan Athletic, Scunthorpe United, Chelsea, Portsmouth and now Wimbledon - a man of seven clubs during his 52 years in the game - was named last night by the members of F.L.E.S.A. (the Football League Executive Staffs Association) at their annual dinner in London for the Barclays Bank Service to Football Award.

Ron, the 14th winner of this prestigious award, received a Barclays cheque for £1,000 and was also present with the inscribed silver rose bowl by Mr Barry James, a corporate director of Barclays Bank.

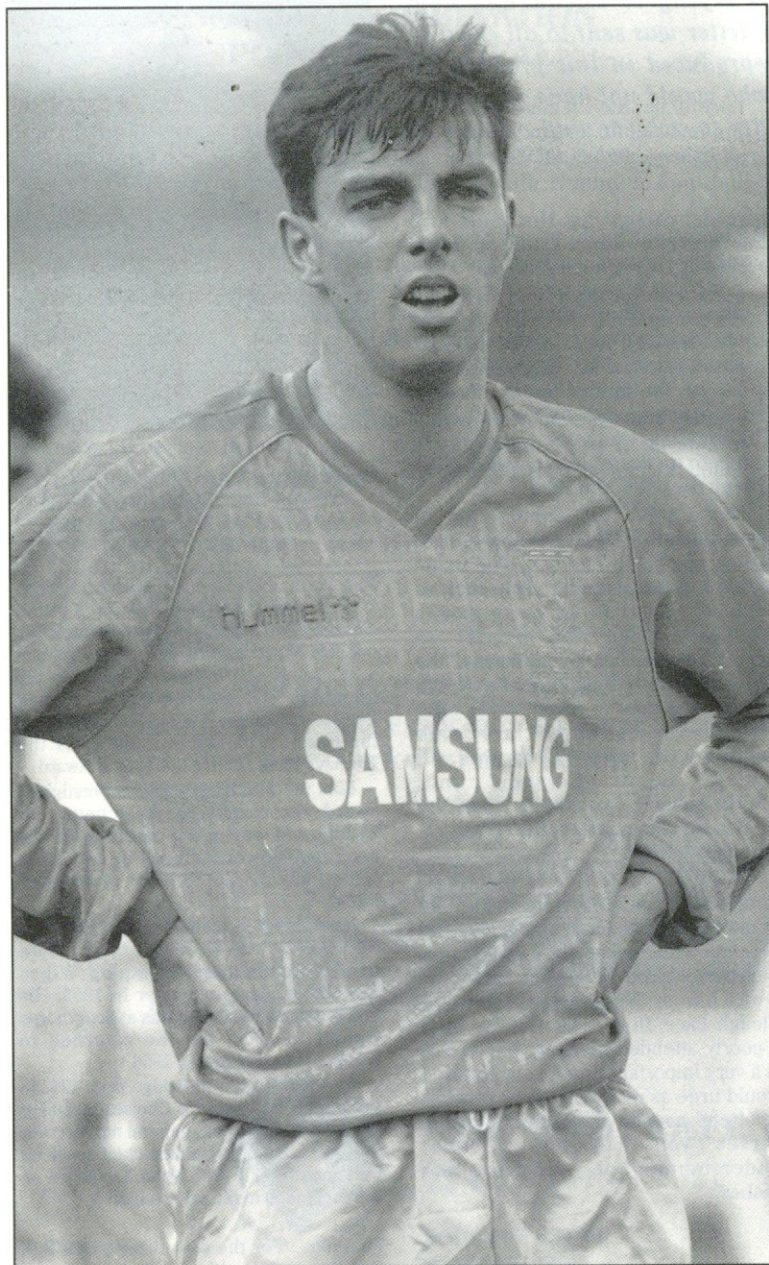
Ron started in football as a player with Blackpool in 1939. He moved to Blackburn Rovers in 1949 before joining Wigan Athletic as player-manager in 1955. His first full managerial post was at Scunthorpe United in 1956; and he returned to Blackpool as manager in 1958.

He was at Stamford Bridge from 1967 to 1983 in various roles for Chelsea including assistant manager and general manager for five years. He then became chief scout for Portsmouth until 1987 when he moved on to Wimbledon in the same capacity.

Footnote : For the past three years Ron was runner-up for this award.

Down the Lane

MILLERS TALE OF AGONY



Paul Miller has not kicked a football in over a year. Say it quickly and the sheer significant of that statement is easily lost.

But consider it for even a minute and the implications are awful. A young man in the prime of his career with at least another 10 seasons ahead of him is cut down by a vicious injury.

Injury is something every professional footballer dreads but lives with. Except it is difficult to come to terms with if the light at the end of the tunnel is more than 12 months away.

For Miller there has been no respite. He ripped his cruciate ligament in the right knee on the first day of last season. It was a freak injury. Turning for a ball played over his shoulder, the young striker's boot stuck in the Plough Lane turf and the knee sickeningly turned on itself.

From that day forward, every week has been a battle for 'Windy' not only to regain his fitness but also to keep his morale intact in the face of the worst crisis a footballer can face.

But suddenly, there is daylight ahead for him, as he explained, "It's been hard work but I'll be back in light training soon. I've done some jogging and general stuff but I think in a month or so I could be running on it.

"Then the next step is to try and start kicking a ball again. It's going to be strange because I haven't even thought about that for over a year.

"I don't want to tempt fate, but by October or November I should be getting back into it, although a lot still depends on how I do in the first weeks."

At least Miller has a fine role model. Clive Goodyear experienced exactly the same agony and battled through 18 months on the sidelines to break back into the Wimbledon first team.

Unfortunately Goodyear could not stake a permanent claim in front of Terry Phelan but his will-power won him a transfer to Brentford and his career is back on an even keel.

Miller said, "Clive has been a bit of an inspiration. He was always encouraging me, he'd been through everything I was going through and told me what to expect.

"I hope that I can recover as well as he has done. It took him a long time, but all I want to do is get back and play football again."

There have been times when Miller has suffered the dark depression of doubts. Fears that he may never play again have always reared their heads, but fortunately the healing process is almost complete.

That's a far cry from probably the most famous sufferer of torn cruciate ligaments, Paul

Gascoigne. Miller has more than a few words of sympathy for Gazza. "I felt for him because I know what he's been through. Obviously he's getting the best medical attention money can buy, because there is so much resting on his future.

"But he's talking of being back by

Christmas and that's incredible if his injury was a full rupture.

"He's probably slogging his guts out but he might have to be a bit more patient. The injury takes a long, long time to heal and it could be some time before he's back again."

Team selections will undoubtedly cause the managers major headaches this season, with more than 30 players competing for reserve and first team places and third-team players stepping up the reserves.

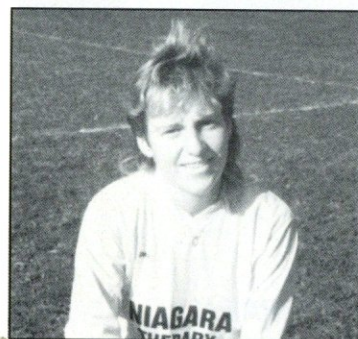
Both the reserves and third team will still play their league games at Merton Risley FC in Middleton Rd, Morden because no more than three games are wanted at the Lane in a weekend.

So return to Plough Lane for some classic football on September 15, kick off 2pm. Entrance will probably be free.

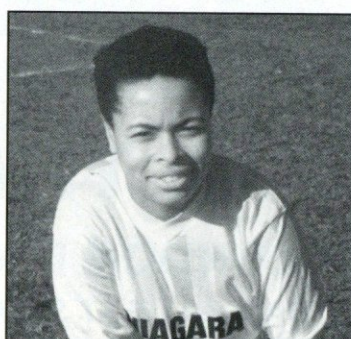

LEEDS COULD SURPRISE THEM ALL by Tony Pullein

In spite of this season's increase in goals, it was not until last Saturday that anyone managed to score a hat-trick in the First Division. And it came from a player who had never before scored more than once in a game.

Charlie Palmer netted his first for Sheffield Wednesday at home to Q.P.R. after only six minutes and he completed his hat-trick before the interval. In eight previous seasons in League soccer with Watford, Derby, Hull, Notts County and Wednesday, Palmer had scored only nine goals.

John Sheridan increased Wednesday's lead before Dennis Bailey scored a consolation for Rangers. That made Bailey, signed from Birmingham in the close-season, Q.P.R.'s top scorers with two goals but they were still awaiting their first win under new manager Gerry Francis.

Bryan Robson yet again came to Manchester United's rescue with a vital goal, his effort three minutes from the end of their home game with Leeds giving them a 1-1 draw and saving their unbeaten record. It was Robson's second goal of the season - twice as many as he achieved during the whole of the last season when he was so troubled by injuries.

Though Robson's international career seems almost certain to be over, United manager Alex Ferguson confirmed that he still has a major role to play at Old Trafford. "At 34 he is still a credit to the game," said Mr Ferguson. "He has this great determination to succeed and all of us derive inspiration from him."

United's Denmark international goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel finally blotted his Old Trafford copybook when he misjudged a cross which enabled Lee Chapman to put Leeds in front in the seventh minute. It was the first goal Schmeichel has conceded in five games with his new club.

With Arsenal, the reigning Champions, and Liverpool both faltering in the early weeks, Manchester United had emerged as favourites to win the Championship. Yet no one should discount Leeds.

The Peacocks made a triumphant return to the First Division last season, following an eight-year absence, and until a late stage they were in contention for the League Championship. They ultimately finished fourth and also reached the semi-finals of the Rumbelows League Cup and the Zenith Data Systems Cup.

In his quest for even greater success this season, manager Howard Wilkinson invested more

than £4-million in new players during the summer!

A large portion of that cash (£1.7-million) was spent on the Southampton twins Rod and Ray Wallace. £1.3-million was paid to Chelsea for England left-back Tony Doringo whilst another current England player - midfielder Steve Hodge - commanded a £750,000 fee when he arrived from Nottingham Forest.

A further £275,000 was used to acquire the services of two young Sheffield Wednesday defenders, Jon Newsome and David Wetherall.

It is strange, however, that for all that goal power up front - Lee Chapman was the First Division's top scorer with 31 goals in all competitions last season whilst Wallace scored 19 times for Southampton - the only goal to come from a recognised striker in Leeds' opening four games was that Chapman effort at Old Trafford.

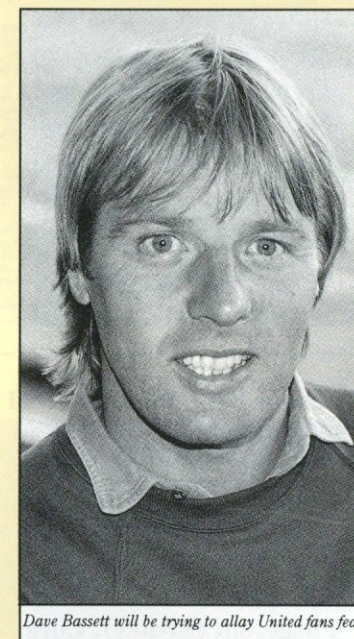
Joint-top scorers were midfield men Gordon Strachan and Gary Speed who each scored twice in an amazing 4-0 win at Southampton a few days earlier.

Sheffield United fans are fearful that they are watching an "action-replay" of last season. A year ago the Blades were only one short of an all-time First Division record when they failed to win any of their opening 16 games.

They suffered their third successive defeat here at Selhurst Park against Crystal Palace (1-2) last Saturday and by then they had collected only two points from five games. That left them in precisely the same position as they were at a similar stage last term.

Last season, though, they suddenly came to life and in one golden spell they won seven games in succession. But can they be expected to repeat that performance?

Luton, who come to Selhurst Park this afternoon, were in exactly the same position as the Blades. There was some consolation from the fact that the Hatters scored their first goal of the season at Chelsea last weekend. It came from Phil Gray, their summer signing from Spurs. But Luton went down 1-4 at Stamford Bridge and had conceded 11 goals in five games.

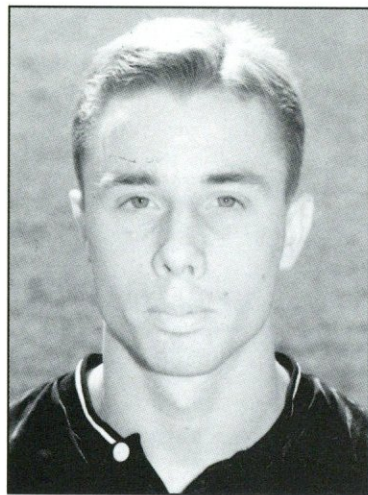

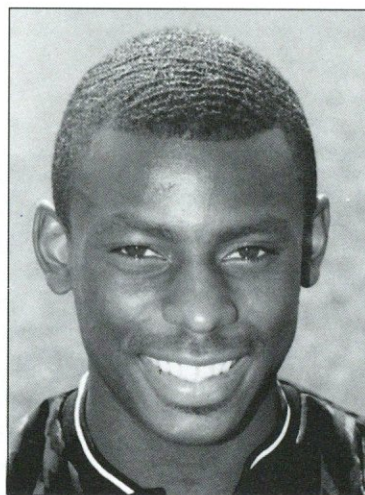

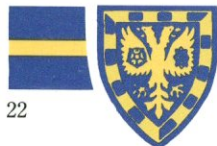

Last April in the programme for the FA Cup replay against Aston Villa, we featured the talents of second-year apprentice, Neal Ardley.

Exactly six months later the fair-haired midfielder made his first team debut on the hallowed Villa Park turf.

'I found out the night before I had a chance as sub, but at the pre-match meal Ray named the team and I was shocked to find I was actually starting.'

'I'm aiming to have a really good season in the reserves, though I'm not too happy with my form at the moment.

'But with the way its going in the first team with the sending-offs etc they will have to be giving players like myself an opportunity. If I get the chance I'll snap it up, though I'm happy just to be involved.

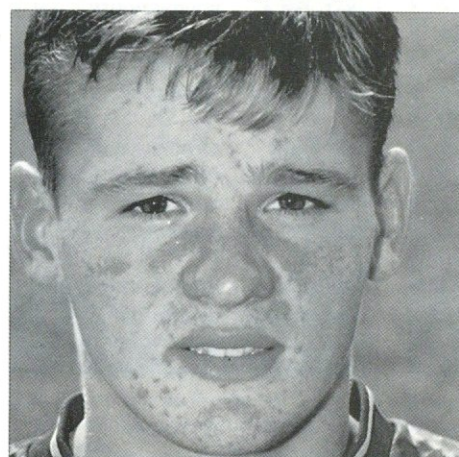
These words turned out to be very prophetic as Neal came on for the last 20 mins as sub. last Tuesday.

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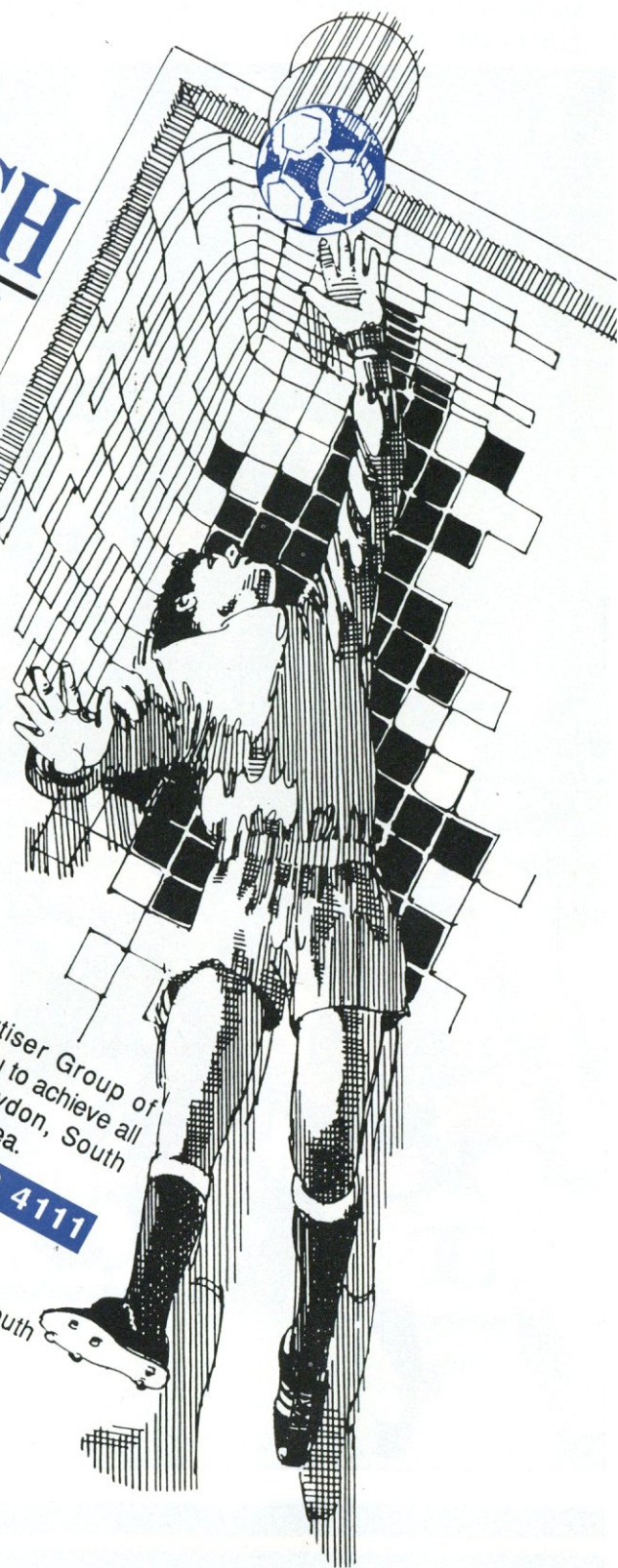
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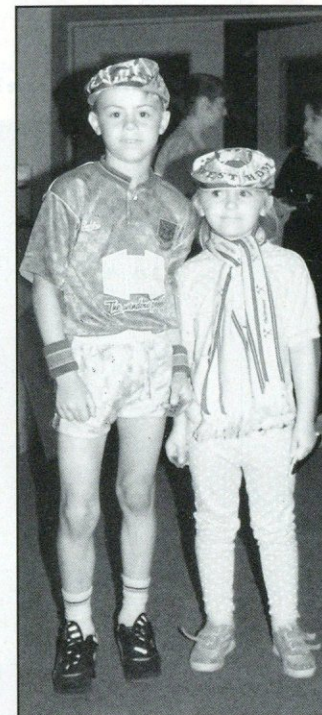
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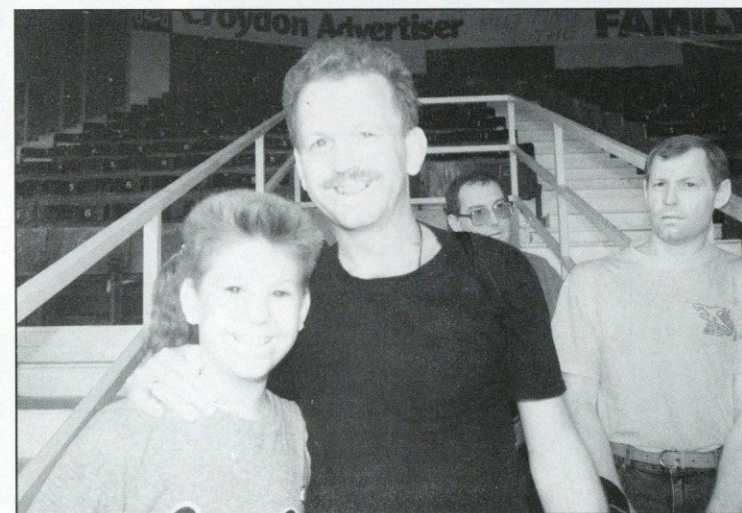
