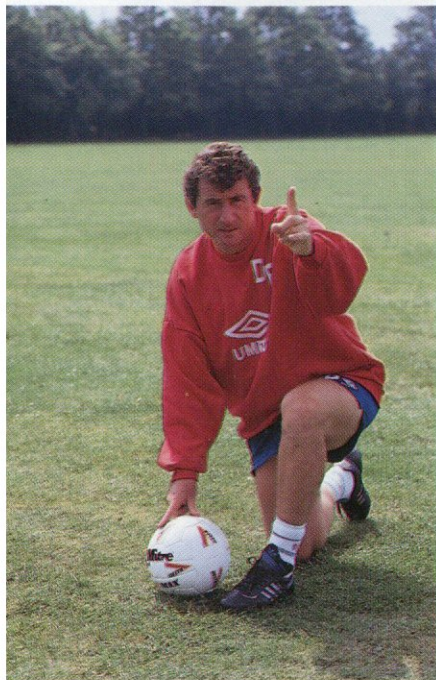

be highly-successful and a springboard for him to take the American green jersey for the 1994 World Cup finals from Tony Meola.

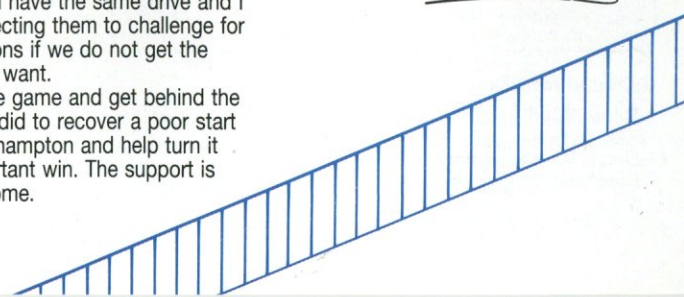

News Update

Old boys earning plaudits

It was interesting to read in the newspapers at the start of the week of the praise currently being heaped on two former Luton players now with London First Division clubs. Paul Elliott, who we saw at first hand a few weeks ago, is currently commanding the centre of Chelsea's defence while Michael Small, whom it was a pleasure to meet again on the opening day of the season, is now leading the West Ham attack. Last Saturday, the two came face-to-face at Upton Park where the outcome was a 1-1 draw. Many observers have stated already that they see Elliott as a future England player, a view first voiced during his days at Kenilworth Road in the mid-1980's. Since then he has played for Aston Villa, Pisa, in Italy, and Glasgow Celtic, in Scotland, before returning to the shop window with a London club. Small, meanwhile, has arrived in east London with the Hammers via Hitchin Town and spells with Go Ahead Eagles and Twente Enschede in Holland, Standard Liege in Belgium and PAOK Salonika in Greece after leaving Luton. We wish them both luck in their careers.

Last weekend's First Division action was again well-peppered with goals. There was only one goalless draw, between Aston Villa and Tottenham at Villa Park, and several games with at least three goals. The most surprising result of the afternoon clearly came at Highbury where visitors Coventry City won 2-1 against Arsenal, thanks to an early own goal from Dixon and an 85th minute strike by Ndlovu, before Adams replied. Manchester United stayed on top, of course, with a 3-0 trouncing of Norwich at Old Trafford and goals from Irwin, McClair and Giggs. United have now gone eight games without defeat. Liverpool kept pace with a less-handsome 2-1 win at Notts County where Rosenthal's introduction paid dividends. Leeds also impressed, extending their unbeaten run to six games with a 3-0 win over Manchester City, while our visitors this afternoon Oldham Athletic beat Sheffield United 2-1. This scoreline was repeated in Sheffield where Wednesday beat Nottingham Forest, complete with Kingsley Black. In the remaining games, Everton were held 2-2 at home by Crystal Palace and QPR and Southampton drew with the same score.

After last weekend's games, the highest league attendance this season remains that at Old Trafford on August 17 when they played Notts County on the opening day. The attendance was 46,278. The lowest was our visit last weekend to Wimbledon.

This afternoon we extend a warm welcome to the players, directors, staff and supporters of Oldham Athletic Football Club. We have not met the Latics for several years and look forward to renewing our acquaintance with a fine match and one that we hope everyone in the ground will enjoy.

Welcome to our latest signing, Steve Thompson, who joined the club on Monday from Bolton Wanderers. We hope Steve quickly settles into the Kenilworth Road atmosphere and goes on to enjoy a long and successful Luton Town career. Welcome also to Lee Glover who has joined the club on loan from Nottingham Forest. Lee played in our last home match against Southampton, but his arrival came too late for our press deadlines. We wish him the very best of luck.

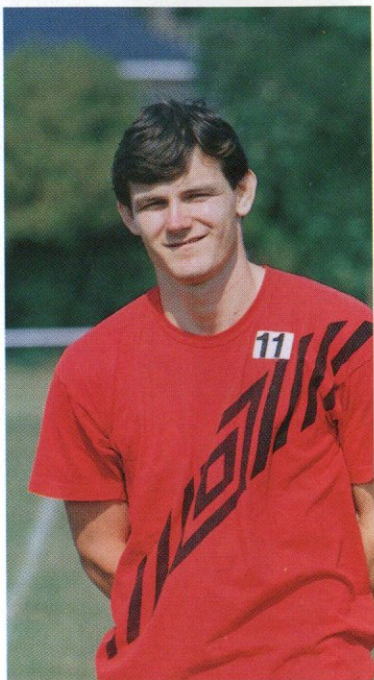

Welcome to Lee and Steve



Lee Glover (above) and Steve Thompson (right), pictured with our manager David Pleat, have both recently joined the club and I am delighted to welcome them to Kenilworth Road. Lee, of course, played for us against Southampton and is on loan from Nottingham Forest while Steve joined us this week from Bolton Wanderers. Our best wishes to them both.

Awarm welcome this afternoon to Oldham Athletic and their supporters, enjoying their return to the First Division for the first time since 1923. Oldham have, like us, had a hectic summer period as they too had to convert their pitch from a synthetic surface to natural grass in time for the new season.

Since my last column, for the home match with Southampton, there has been much more activity at the club with the arrival of Stephen Thompson and the selection of several of our players for international squads. We have also had to re-arrange, as I said before, the home fixture with Queen's Park Rangers.

This was originally due to be played on Wednesday, September 18, but has been brought forward by 24 hours to Tuesday, September 17, kick-off 7.45 pm. This change was made because of the decision of the major television companies, BBC and ITV, to cover live the Arsenal and Liverpool fixtures in the European competitions on the Wednesday night.

Clearly, this would have had an adverse effect on our attendance for that match. We had the full support of the league who obviously understood the effect such television broadcast could have on gates and

with the co-operation of Queen's Park Rangers and our own police we were able to re-arrange it for Tuesday.

Last weekend, there was a lot of talk in the media about the gate at our fixture against Wimbledon at Selhurst Park. The previous lowest gate for a Saturday First Division fixture was, I understand, also a match involving Wimbledon, but against Coventry City. Our previous low attendance game against Wimbledon at Plough Lane was a midweek match.

Talking to the officials of Wimbledon after last Saturday's game, it was interesting to note that we took 584 travelling fans to the match. In a crowd of no more than 3,231, this represented 18.8 per cent of the total attendance which shows a good level of relative support for Luton.

Supporters, like everyone else these days, have to look very closely at the cost of things, including their football. I am sure much the same sort of thing will be evident within and around other First Division clubs this season, like Notts County, Coventry, our visitors today Oldham, QPR, Norwich and Southampton.

Last season, it should be remembered, we had an average home gate of 10,200 and took an average of 1,600 with us away from home. This was a good record overall and we

are very thankful to our fans for their continuing support of the club.

Looking through the record books of recent transfer activity, I noticed that during the month of August there was a total of 100 transfers, including our own investments in Philip Gray and Trevor Peake. That is a lot of activity for this time of the year and with temporary transfers, or loans as they are better known, added at the top the total comes to 116, including our acquisition of Lee Glover from Nottingham Forest.

This is an interesting figure as it shows that managers are now waiting later than in previous years before completing their transfer business and it may be a result of the effects of the recession on the transfer market as a whole.

I also noticed, incidentally, that our referees must be a more widely-respected group than many supporters would like to believe, particularly in Europe. The list of referees chosen for the opening rounds of the European club competitions revealed that Neil Midgley will be in charge of the Grasshoppers v Anderlecht tie and that five of our other leading Football League referees will be in action in UEFA Cup ties.

This week, I was again busy with the increasing demands of Football League business, attending the EGM which took place on Tuesday. A meeting of all the First Division clubs also took place beforehand. Unfortunately, the EGM did not resolve anything finally – the meeting was called to vote on whether to retain rule 11, which insists that any club intending to leave should give three years' notice – and another adjournment was the outcome. This will take place on Monday, September 23.

Earlier this week, our youth team were in action in the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup, in a preliminary round match with Norwich City. The game ended in a 3-3 draw after extra time after Neil Watkiss had been unfortunately sent off under the strict new rules for handling outside the area. He was replaced in goal by David Green and we managed to fight back for a draw. The replay takes place at Norwich on Monday (September 16th).

Finally, my congratulations to Mark Pembroke, who was selected to play for Wales against Brazil in Cardiff on Wednesday night, thus winning his first full cap, to Phillip Gray on his call-up to the Northern Ireland squad and to David Green, who has recently signed a two-year professional contract, on his selection by the Republic of Ireland for their match against Poland on September 26.

Young players have to learn fast

It has been a difficult start to the season for us. There are no two ways about that. Having only two of our first seven games at home has not helped as we all know, especially as we have a number of young players in our squad and many of them are new to First Division football.

But I must say that after my short period of time here, I have been impressed with the quality of the youngsters and the great atmosphere and spirit within the club. Obviously, at my age, I am an experienced player but I think I know good young 'uns when I see them and I believe there are three or four here who will make very good First Division players in the future.

As I said, Luton Town is a very friendly club and I have settled in quickly. There have been no problems at all with the lads on the training ground or in the dressing rooms. Mind you, I still find time to watch a bit of television and, sometimes, the odd job around the house. Do not think I am good at it though. Whenever I start something that needs doing, it usually leads to lots of other jobs I create as I go along!

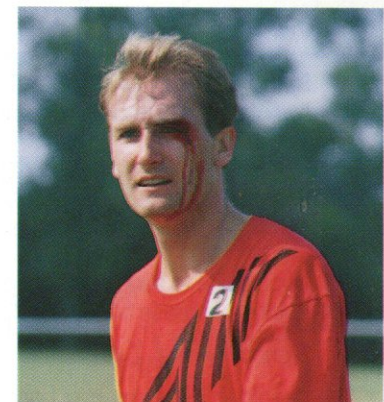
On the football front, it has to be said that our away form so far has been

dismal. We cannot afford to let this go on. You cannot start relying on home results in the First Division. That makes things for more difficult as I know from the past with Coventry.

At least everyone is trying to play good passing football here. That has impressed me right through the club. Luton has a real tradition for the passing game and that has not changed. I like to play from the back if we can, but it has to be at the right time. I am no advocate of the 'long ball and get after it' approach.

I am sure both Lee Glover, on loan from Nottingham Forest, and Steve Thompson, will enjoy the passing style the manager is urging us to play. I have played against them both before. Lee reminds me a lot of Nigel Clough. He likes to hold the ball up and to use it intelligently and he is also able to take punishment – and dish it out when he needs to! I think he would be a good acquisition for Luton Town.

Steve is an attacking midfield player who likes to get forward and score goals. I played against him in the Rumbelows Cup last year and he impressed me in both matches. He has a good goal tally from his Bolton days and he can pass the ball too. I am sure he is going to be an asset to us and enjoy his football. I certainly am – thanks for your support.

You will recall that I wrote to you on 31 July 1991 informing you of the existence of the National Football Intelligence Unit (NFIU) public "Hooligan hotline" and seeking your support in encouraging football clubs to publish the hotline telephone number.

You very kindly gave full support to the proposal and I am writing to seek your continued support for this initiative during the forthcoming season.

The NFIU have produced a poster and I enclose a copy for your information advertising our hotline number. This poster is currently being distributed to the football intelligence officer at all 93 league clubs for display within public viewing areas at police stations.

A further series of posters are being planned for distribution during the season and in the build up to the European Championship Finals to be played in Sweden in 1992.

To complement this advertising campaign, I am seeking your assistance in requesting that clubs continue to publish details of our hotline in their match programmes.

Approximately 150 calls were received during the previous season from people giving information regarding a wide variety of incidents, both concerning league and cup matches and incidents involving clubs in European competition.

I am sure that you would agree that this is encouraging news in our continued efforts to eradicate the hooligan element from attending football matches and I am hopeful that with increased publicity the forthcoming season will produce even more good information.

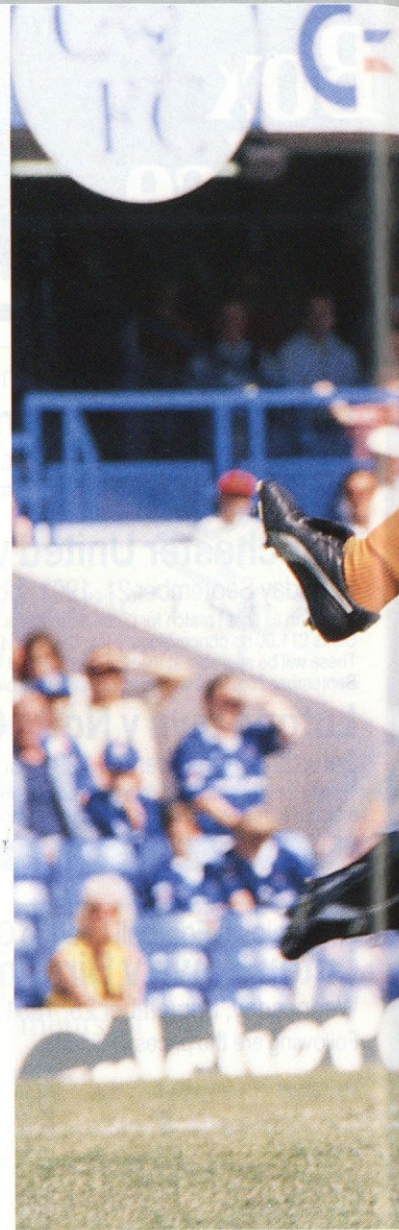

Good afternoon and a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of Oldham Athletic, whom we congratulate on their promotion to Division One for the first time since 1923.

Under the guidance of former Everton and England international Joe Royle, the "Latics" have shown in recent seasons that they are more than capable of adjusting to life in the top flight. Although still in Division Two, they reached the final of the 1990 Littlewoods Cup, knocking out the then League Champions Arsenal 3-1 before losing 1-0 to a very strong Nottingham Forest side at Wembley. In that same memorable season Oldham narrowly missed out on an FA Cup final appearance, losing to the eventual winners Manchester United 2-1 at Maine Road after the game had gone to a replay. So many matches in one season took its toll and halted the Latics charge for the Second Division championship,

which made last season's success that much more sweet.

Mr Royle has gone for First Division experience with his close-season signings. Graeme Sharp joined the club from Everton for £500,000 after becoming surplus to requirements at Goodison Park. He was followed in quick succession by his team-mate and former Oldham captain Mike Milligan in a deal worth £600,000. Brian Kilcline was also bought from Coventry for £400,000 to increase competition in a defence left weakened by the departure of Paul Warhurst to Sheffield Wednesday.

Oldham, like ourselves, have had a very difficult start to the season against some top-class opposition, and this has been reflected in their results. They opened their campaign with an ominous trip to Anfield and despite scoring first, they eventually lost 2-1. This bright start was followed with an impressive 3-0 victory at home to Chelsea. At the time of writing, Athletic are placed 11th in Division One after a 2-1 victory over fellow First Division newcomers Sheffield Wednesday.

It was in 1895 that Oldham Athletic were formed. John Garland, the landlord of the Featherstall and Junction Hotel, decided to form a football club. As Pine Villa, they played in the Oldham Junior League. In 1899 the local professional club Oldham County went out of existence and the liquidators persuaded Pine Villa to take over their ground at Sheepfoot Lane and change their name to Athletic. They moved to Boundary Park in 1906 where they have remained ever since.

Oldham's Second Division Championship win was the first in their history having previously won the Division Three Championship in 1974, the Division Four title in 1963, and the Division Three (N) crown in 1953.

It will be interesting to see how Oldham, like ourselves, fair at home this season after converting from an artificial surface to grass at their Boundary Park home. The Latics are sure to use this season finding their feet in Division One and, with the success rate of Mr Royle, silverware will hopefully not be too far away for the Boundary Park faithful.

Latics On Parade



JON HALLWORTH (goalkeeper) – Jon, who was an ever present during Oldham's Championship campaign, started his career at Ipswich but made his league debut on loan to Bristol Rovers in 1985. After finally securing a first team place at Portman Road he moved on to Oldham in a £125,000 deal in February 1989.

GUNNAR HALLE (defender) – Right-back Gunnar was signed from Norwegian club Lillestrom for £280,000 midway through last season. He quickly settled in to the Latics' line-up and is now established at No. 2. He has won 27 full caps for Norway.

ANDY BARLOW (defender) – Andy is the only Oldham-born player in the team. He was signed from local football in 1983 and quickly made his league debut in a 0-1 defeat v Birmingham City the following year. After many impressive displays in last season's championship campaign, Andy was called into the England B squad for the match against Switzerland.

EARL BARRETT (defender) – Club captain, Earl started his career at Manchester City, making his league debut in a 1-1 draw against the Town in 1986. After failing to command a regular place at Maine Road he signed for Oldham for £35,000 in 1987. His fine performances last term were rewarded with a full England cap in the Summer tour to New Zealand.

BRIAN KILCLINE (defender) – A close season signing from Coventry, Brian was captain of the Sky Blues' F.A. Cup winning side of 1987. He made his league debut in 1979 in the colours of Notts County, and went on to make over 160 league appearances for the Magpies before joining Coventry in 1984. Brian will provide added competition for defensive positions.

RICHARD JOBSON (defender) – Richard was signed from Hull City last season for a then club record fee of £460,000. He started his career under the guidance of England boss Graham Taylor at Watford before moving on to Hull in 1984. Last term he established a strong partnership and understanding with Barrett at the heart of the defence.

GLYNN SNODIN (defender) – Signed on loan from Leeds United at the beginning of the season, Glynn started his career at Doncaster where he made over 300 league appearances spanning nine seasons. He joined Sheffield Wednesday in 1985 but, after two seasons, joined Leeds and helped them gain promotion to Division One.

MIKE MILLIGAN (midfield) – Mike returned to Athletic during the Summer after an unhappy season at Everton. He cost a club record £600,000 after initially joining the Goodison Park club for £850,000. Mike captained the Latics to their only visit to Wembley for the 1990 Littlewoods Cup final against Nottingham Forest.

NICK HENRY (midfield) – Liverpool born, Nick will be hoping to re-establish the fine midfield partnership he had with Milligan before his departure to Everton. Signed from apprentice, he made his league debut in 1987 before joining Swedish club Halmstad on loan. It was on his return that he established himself as a first team regular.

PAUL BERNARD (midfield) – Signed from apprentice, Paul is tipped as a future star at Boundary Park. He made his league debut against Middlesbrough at the end of last season, and scored the goal against Sheffield Wednesday which effectively won Oldham the Second Division title.

PAUL KANE (midfield) – Paul, who is known for his relentless workrate in midfield, started his career at Hibernian and enjoyed seven full seasons at Easter Road. He signed for Oldham in a £350,000 deal last season and can also play equally well at right back when needed.

RICK HOLDEN (forward) – A firm favourite with the Oldham fans, Rick made a name for himself as an exceptional winger during his days at Watford. He started his career at Burnley but, after making only one league appearance for the Clarets, joined Halifax in 1986. He joined Oldham from Watford for £165,000 two years ago.

NEIL ADAMS (forward) – Stoke born, Neil started his career with his home-town club, spending one season at the Victoria Ground. He made a name for himself by making twelve league appearances during Everton's championship-winning season of 1986-87. After failing to command a regular first team spot the following season, he joined Oldham for £100,000.

GRAEME SHARP (forward) – Scottish international, Graeme started his career in Scotland with Dumbarton before joining Everton in 1980. He spent 11 loyal years at Goodison Park, winning League championship, FA Cup and European honours in the process. After the appointment of Howard Kendall as Everton boss for his second spell, Graeme found himself surplus to requirements, prompting Oldham to sign him for £500,000 this Summer.

ANDY RITCHIE (forward) – Andy is still a regular goalscorer after a career which began at Manchester United in his teens. He made his debut in a 6-2 thrashing of Everton in 1977 although he never gained a regular first-team place. He moved on to Brighton and later Leeds before joining Oldham in 1987. He has amassed more than 120 league goals in his distinguished career.

DAVID CURRIE (forward) – A £350,000 buy from Nottingham Forest, David started his career at Middlesbrough before moving to Darlington in 1985. His career really took off when he joined Second Division Barnsley and grabbed the headlines with his prolific strike rate. Brian Clough signed David for £750,000, but his stay at the City Ground was an unhappy one.

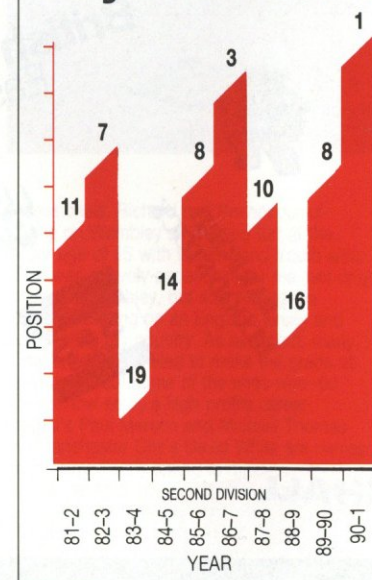
JOE ROYLE

Liverpool born, Joe started his league career in 1966 playing for his home town club Everton. A burly centre-forward, Joe amassed a very impressive strike rate of 102 goals in 229 appearances for the 'Toffeeemen'. Such a fine record prompted an England call-up although Joe never realised his full international potential, playing just six times for his country.

After eight loyal seasons at Goodison Park, he joined Manchester City, spending three full seasons at Maine Road. He saw out his playing days with brief spells at Bristol City and finally Norwich City in 1980.

Two seasons later, Mr Royle started his apprenticeship in football management, joining Oldham, where he has remained ever since. If the early days were a struggle, Mr Royle is finally seeing the fruition of hours of hard work, culminating in promotion to Division one.

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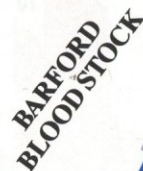
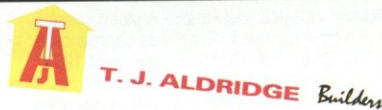
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Player profile

In an ill-tempered affair which saw three bookings and one sending off, Richard scored the winning goal from a well worked free-kick involving David Preece and John Dreyer. "Yes, that goal was particularly special for me as it was my first goal for the club. I felt such relief, not only for myself, but for the club and the supporters as well. It's always nice to get that first win under your belt." Richard's aim for the new season is simple, keep working hard, impress the manager and gain an extended run in the first team. "This is always my view at the beginning of each season, you cannot afford to relax. I went on holiday this summer with my fiance to Gran Canaria and although my main aim was to enjoy myself and un-wind, I still maintained a good fitness level with plenty of swimming and golf. When I returned for pre-season training I felt fresh. You always need to impress a new manager in training so I was more than pleased to find myself in the side for the opening three games."

professionals, Richard had the honour of playing on Wembley's hallowed turf at the tender age of 15 with the England Youth side. "That was a lovely experience for me, not only playing at Wembley, but also having the honour of putting on an England jersey and representing my country. As expected, many of my colleagues failed to make the grade at senior level, but some of the ones who did make it now enjoy a high profile career. Arsenal's Paul Merson and Michael Thomas and Manchester City's David White are names which immediately spring to mind."

As I've said, my aim for the new season is to impress the manager. I can only do this with plenty of hard work on the training pitch and convert this into good form on a Saturday afternoon, also a few more goals would not go

amiss! As for the team as a whole, we aim to maintain a comfortable position in the league with a view to competing in the inevitable Super League, anything else such as cup runs is a bonus. As with every other season, I expect the "Big Five" to mount a serious Championship challenge and in particular Manchester United who have impressed me so far this season. But there is always a dark horse in the pack who comes along with a late run, so why not us? particularly with the added incentive of European football to follow. Our great team spirit will no doubt help us through this testing season, and sometimes that can be as good as an extra player."

A Return To Former Glories

Former Town player and soccer enthusiast Frank Norris takes a nostalgic look back to how the game was once played, and hands out some constructive advice to today's modern players and management.

As a former member of Luton Town F.C. some fifty years ago, and as someone who played with, against, and witnessed the performances of some of the finest players this country ever produced over the last six decades I do speak with some authority.

It is up to those in charge to spell out correctly what is expected of youngsters who contemplate taking up professional football. Managers, training staff and most importantly players are in some way responsible for the events which led up to the Hillsborough disaster. Violence on the terraces is a direct reflection of what happens on the field of play. This swearing and arguing with both linesmen and referee after being spoken to for an offence is being transferred to the younger generation at an alarming rate.

Retaliation expresses immaturity, it solves nothing. If you think by that comment I'm suggesting modern day participants should behave like perfect gentlemen every time they are up-ended. Forget it! . . . I know exactly what it feels like to have both testicles rattled with a toe-cap.

Now correct me if I'm wrong. I was always taught the object of the game was to get the ball into your opponents net in the shortest possible time. There is little evidence of that happening today. This negative attitude has killed the idea stone dead. In one particular game last season at Kenilworth Road I counted no fewer than 26 passes of the ball between players to allow their side to keep possession and they still hadn't taken a shot at goal. If that's the kind of training players are brought up on it's no wonder they get frustrated. I'm glad I played in an era when individuality was allowed to flourish.

The continuous eagerness by managers and staff to shout instructions from the bench is getting a little out of control. When a player has reached professional status his movements should be instinctive. He shouldn't need to be told what to do at that stage of his career.

It may help clubs' future plans for success if the playing staff were told they are among the lucky ones to be earning a living at what most people regard as an over-paid enjoyable occupation. You don't have to get involved with under-the-counter business deals and swamp the public with advertising to maintain popularity. Appreciation from the fans is surely the best recommendation that a player can build his future on. I was given the opportunity to play at Kenilworth Road on more than one occasion so I do possess some knowledge on that score.

As for the repeated comments that today's game is played at a higher level than in the thirties or forties, that alone is an insult to the memory of players such as Alex James, Tommy Lawton, Stanley Matthews and Tom Finney to name but a few. Make no mistake, it will take a bit more than a few barrow seeds of grass and a good press agent to bring back the crowds. If

you don't believe that, talk to the football supporters of my generation whose average numbers at Kenilworth Road were 25,000 when you couldn't see across the pitch for fog, and the smoke came across the ground from the railway.

I thought it deserved a mention that as a seventeen year old and member of a talented amateur side, my colleagues and I were invited by the manager fifty years ago, then Mr George Martin, to take part against a Luton Town eleven which included such names as Tom Mackey, Les Lake and Wally Shanks, for charity. The fact that we ran out winners 5-2 is not important, except the result was kept quiet. What is important to me is that after the game many of my colleagues, including myself, were asked to sign on the dotted line which gives me the satisfaction of knowing I do have some remote connection with the club's history.

The critics will no doubt say that biased opinions are the result of living too long with a memory. My answer to that would be . . . absolutely correct! At least those players who's names I mentioned earlier were worth mentioning.

I certainly don't envy the task of today's managers. Even they cannot ignore the rules which have been introduced over the past two decades which have undoubtedly inhibited natural talent. In many instances the substitution law does not improve the team's performance yet it has a profound effect on the player who is being substituted.

So in conclusion, I would like to add the following statement. If managers want to be brave and stick your neck out by promoting the old style of play, I for one have a strong feeling they will not only gain the admiration of those fans who still enjoy tough but entertaining competition, but also for the many thousands of soccer's enthusiasts who wish the game to be returned to its former glory.

As one who will be keeping an eye on the Town's progress. I wish David Pleat every success in the coming season.

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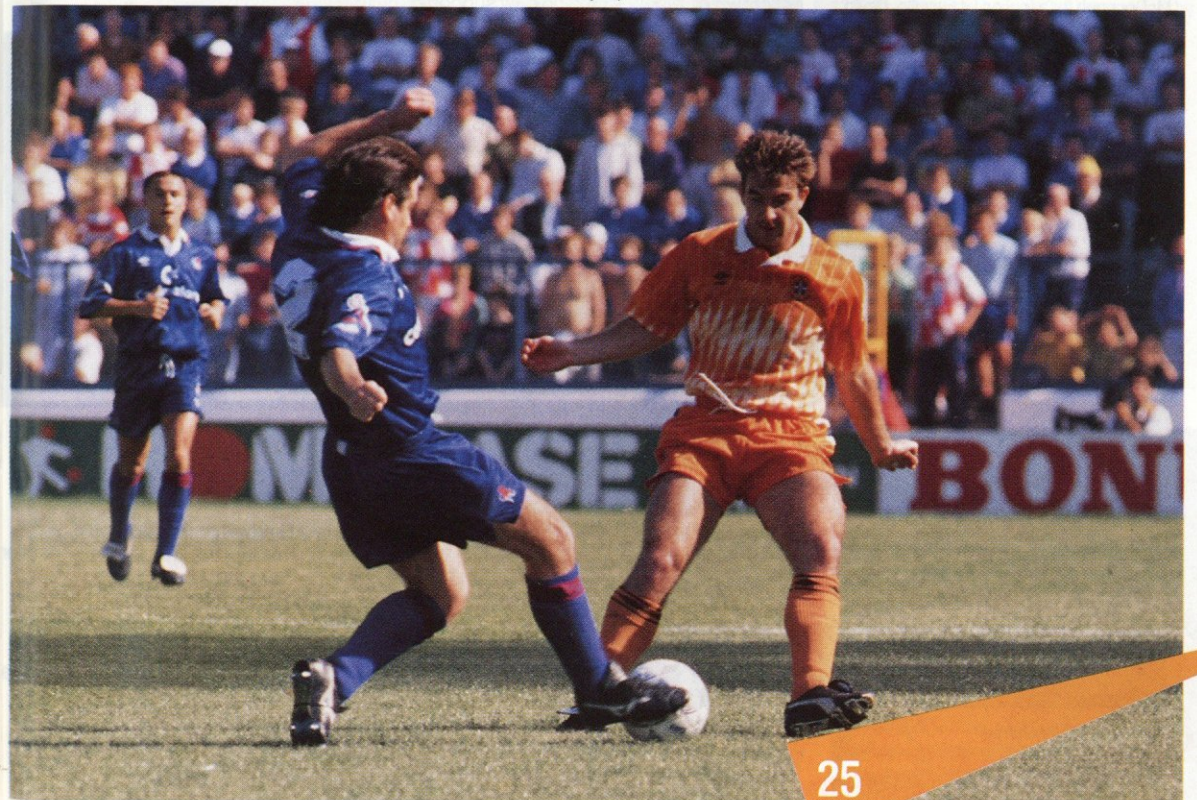

David Moss converted an early penalty after ex-Luton defender Paul Futcher fouled Brian Stein. He then made the game safe by scoring direct from the corner spot.



One to forget for Darron

A day to remember as the big-spending Hatters went to town!

Fresh from Division Four, Luton Town, with the help of chairman Tony Hunt, embarked on a pre-season spending spree as season 1968/69 approached.

The high sum of £37,000 was paid out for three players – Mike Harrison from Plymouth (£7,000), Laurie Sheffield from Oldham (£10,000) and Brian Lewis from Coventry (£20,000) together with £50,000 on ground improvements.

Pre-season games produced a 3-0 home win over Second Division Oxford together with a 2-2 draw at Norwich and it was quickly established that Lewis was a bargain, and with cover in every position, the Town were going to take some stopping.

The opening game of the season was at home to Oldham and a sun-drenched crowd of 14,747 including new supporter Eric Morcambe, turned up to see if the new boys could do it in a proper competitive match.

They did not have to wait to long to find out because after seventeen minutes the referee awarded a penalty to the Town when Lewis was upended in the areas by Walter Joyce. The spot kick was put away expertly by Harrison.

Oldham keeper David Best who had just slapped in a transfer request then stood between the Town and an avalanche of goals. He saved three on the line full stretch and tipped a couple round the post but was eventually beaten again just before half-time when Sheffield blasted a shot against the bar with Keith Allen drilling in the rebound.

Luton went off to a standing ovation at the interval and started the second half exactly where they left off with the full-backs Max Dougan and Fred Jardine working the overlap to provide endless opportunities to Lewis and Sheffield with "golden boy" Bruce Rioch waiting to pick up the pieces.

The only sour note of the afternoon occurred shortly afterwards when winger Graham French suffered a recurrence of a pre-season ankle injury and was helped off to be replaced by John Moore.

The players soon shook off this setback when Rioch set up an

overlapping Jardine who cracked a 25 yard shot past a helpless Best on the hour.

The rest of the game remained one-way traffic with both Harrison and Rioch hitting the woodwork before Lewis, in the dying seconds, latched on to a loose ball to smash it into the net for a goal he fully deserved.

Manager Allan Brown was obviously pleased with the performance and pointed out that the three new players had been chosen not for Division Three football but for the following year in Division Two.

Oldham boss Jimmy McIlroy, whilst acknowledging the skill and power of the Town, took the opportunity to point out that he was missing three senior players due to injury and suspension.

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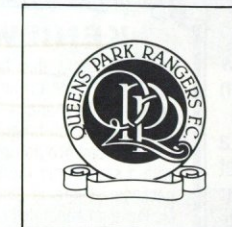

Newly appointed as first team manager this summer, Gerry Francis brings his Q.P.R. side to Kenilworth Road on September 17th.

Mr Francis is hoping to succeed at Loftus Road in the managerial field with the same determination he showed as a player in the 70's.

Rangers finished in a very creditable mid-table position last term after an injury-wrecked first half of the season. The loss of defenders Paul Parker and Alan McDonald through injury resulted in eight successive defeats which saw them placed second from bottom at Christmas. The signings

of Darren Peacock and Andy Tillson from Hereford and Grimsby respectively stabilised the defence and helped push Rangers to 12th position.

Francis - who captained Rangers when they finished league runners-up in 1976 - controversially succeeded former England coach Don Howe as manager in June after serving his apprenticeship at Exeter and Bristol Rovers. He has opted to keep the same squad he inherited from Mr Howe along with Birmingham midfielder Dennis Bailey, who scored on his debut at Arsenal. This means a return to Kenilworth Road for former Town favourite Roy Wegerle, Czech international keeper Jan Stejskal

and winger Andy Sinton, who has recently been at the centre of much transfer speculation.

Early results have shown that with the loss of England defender Paul Parker to Manchester United and the loss, through injury, of influential skipper Ray Wilkins, Rangers could yet again struggle to impress on Division One's pacesetters.

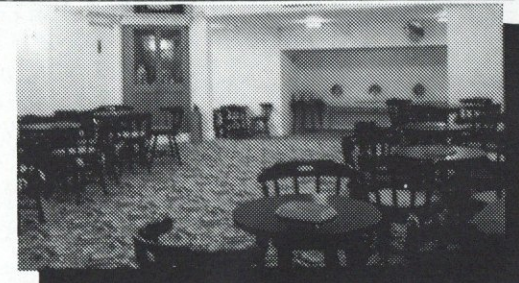

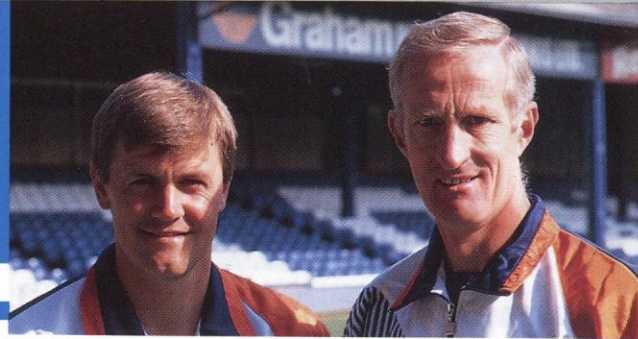

The first is our catering company. Although they are known as Luton Town Caterers and are under the absolute control of the club, they are set up as a separate company.

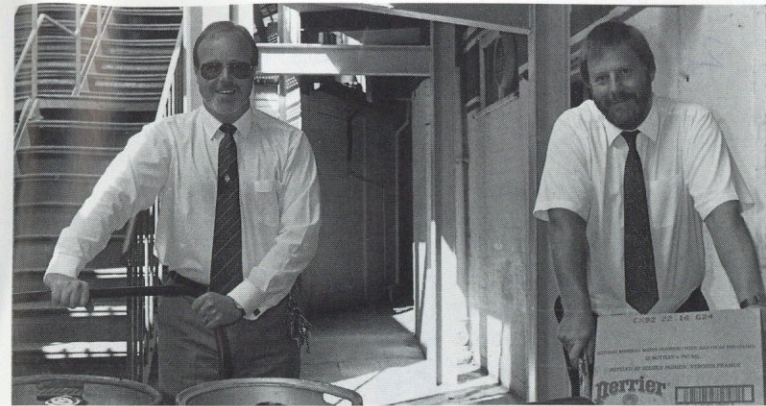

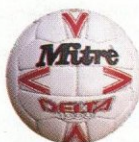
