



Tonight we give a warm welcome to Queens Park Rangers, their supporters, players and officials. It is to be hoped that more of their followers are backing them than the few that travelled with Southampton in our last midweek game. But there can be no doubt that the new seating arrangements will generate far more atmosphere than in the past few seasons and it is to be hoped that both sides will respond to that support and as a consequence the standard of football will be better.

The next few weeks will be quite important as our newly constructed side begins to find a playing pattern and I hope a harmony. Towards the end of last week, I made a decision to invite Michael Harford back into our ranks. It was not an easy decision because I am as aware as anyone behind the scenes

at Luton of the need to be prudent in all our trading. The price which Derby County demanded was a little more than I had hoped to pay. But Arthur Cox is happy with the deal and so am I or else I would not have pursued it.

The time was right and the prices we had been quoted for other "leaders of the line" were prohibitive. When a club pays £575,000 for a midfield long-thrower then one realises how crazy our transfer market is. I am sure we might consider reverting to a system where transfers in and out take place before the start of any given season. This way the coaches will have to earn their stripes, clubs would not be able to take advantage of strong resources against the clubs needing to sell and every player starting the season would know exactly what chance he had.

We know Michael Harford's qualities. He is a committed player who worked terribly hard in his early days after arriving at Lincoln City, managed then by Colin Murphy, from Lambton Street Boys Club. Since that time, he has become regarded as one of the finest headers of a ball in English football and a man whose first touch is as good as if not better than that of the current England centre-forward Alan Smith. Michael is no spring chicken now, but he has the benefit of years of experience with Newcastle, Birmingham, Luton and Derby.

This experience must rub off on our younger element like Paul Telfer, Matthew Jackson, Mark Penbridge, Ceri Hughes and Darren Salton, to name but a few, whose future is as important as our present results.

Our aim is clear. We must pull away from the tag of expectancy that we will be down among the dead men by the end of the season. The spirit in the club is good and we must create and take our chances. Our ambition is to progress the club. That means retaining our status.

It will mean a big effort from everyone, but I believe we took another step forward when we invested in the last 14 days in the passing ability of Steve Thompson and the striking leadership of Mick Harford. I hope tonight's game is a good one and that our performance deserves your cheers.

Blues on their way in Rumbelows Cup

For our newly-signed centre-forward Mick Harford, who we warmly welcome back 'home' tonight following his transfer from Derby County, this will provide an early opportunity to play against one of his former clubs. Like Steve Thompson, another warmly-welcomed arrival from Bolton Wanderers, Mick is not cup-tied for the Rumbelows competition. Doubtless, he will be looking forward to an early attempt to repeat our 1988 feat in winning what was then known as the Littlewoods Cup final at Wembley. To both men, we extend the very best of luck with their Luton Town careers.

Glover and Rodger in the wars

□ Lee Glover, who was injured during our 2-1 home win over Southampton earlier this month, and Graham Rodger, who sustained a cut head during training, were both struggling for fitness last week. Glover damaged ankle ligaments and was unable to train whilst Rodger was also kept out of action to allow his wound to recover after receiving six stitches.

Out on loan

□ Julian James and Sean Farrell both left the club last week on temporary loan deals to join Preston North End and Northampton Town respectively for one month. The loan spell will give them each a good chance to re-establish themselves in first team football and ensure they are at peak match fitness should there be any urgent need to recall them to Kenilworth Road.

□ Tonight we extend a very warm welcome to the players, directors, staff and supporters of Queens Park Rangers Football Club. We have met Rangers many times at all levels of the league over the years and sincerely hope this evening's fixture maintains the tradition for fine football usually produced by the two teams.

□ Alex Ferguson of Manchester United won the first of the season's managerial awards when he was named as Barclays Bank Manager of the Month for August. Shirt sponsorship deal is settled and ready to be announced

Good evening and welcome to Queens Park Rangers and their supporters. The West London club have undergone a change of management during the close season with the return of Gerry Francis at the helm and, like us, they have been active in the transfer market.

We were very pleased to complete some great business last week which resulted in Mick Harford's return to Kenilworth Road after 18 months in the Midlands with Derby County. Mick may no longer be a youngster in the game, but his fitness and application is in no doubt as he proved with his appearance record for the Rams. In his time with them, he missed only one game - against us at the Baseball Ground - and that was due to suspension and not injury.

We have also been delighted to complete our negotiations successfully for a new shirt sponsorship deal which will be announced formally in the very near future. This will be further good news for many of our supporters who have been inquiring after replica kits of our new strip.

These replica kits have been delayed owing to our decision to wait for the finalisation of our sponsorship

deal and I hope our supporters can understand why. The replica kits are clearly an integral part of the sponsors' package and the completion of this deal has been important to both the sponsor and the club.

Having said that, there may be some shirts available for sale outside our catchment area on the national market without the new sponsors' name on them and I hope everyone fully understands why.

Other items of business completed in the last week which have helped make it a hectic one behind-the-scenes have been the arrangement of loan deals for Julian James, who has gone to Preston North End for a month, and Sean Farrell, who has joined Northampton, also for one month.

This evening there will be a collection at the match, organised by the Luton and District bus company to raise funds for the Cancer Research Campaign. This is a good cause and I hope everyone will find the means to make a contribution.

Another excellent and worthwhile charity cause being supported by football this month is the 'Football Against MS' scheme which was launched on

September 5. This charity initiative, which is believed to be the biggest in the history of the game, aims to raise £3.5 million in support of Action and Research for Multiple Sclerosis (ARMS). It will involve people at all levels of our sport.

Football Against MS was conceived by the Wallace brothers, Danny, Raymond and Rodney and already has the support of league clubs in England, Scotland and Wales and the governing bodies within the game. It will encompass numerous events taking place between September 1991 and May 1992 with Raymond and Rodney's Leeds United team-mate Gordon Strachan playing a key role in the initiative in Scotland.

The focal point will be three simultaneous walks visiting every league club. Players, staff and celebrities will walk between each club ground and the public will be encouraged to raise money to walk with them. Two of the walks, which start on January 12 from Aberdeen and London, will finish at Wembley Stadium during half-time of the FA Cup final on May 9, 1992.

That should make the build-up next Spring to the final a very special occasion and hopefully raise plenty of funds for this worthwhile cause. Keep an eye out for further details.

Nearer to home, it was very encouraging to see more than 400 supporters turn out for reserves' home Football Combination match against Charlton Athletic at Dunstable. The fans helped make a great atmosphere which I am sure the players appreciated and gave them a lift.



This should be an exciting evening for everyone as we bid to make certain of a step towards the third round.

Finally, congratulations are due to Mark Pembridge for winning his first full cap for Wales last week against Brazil whilst some commiserations are due to Phil Gray who suffered a calf strain in training and was therefore unable to take part in Northern Ireland's goal-romp against the Faroe Islands. I am sure his time will come. Enjoy the game.







This evening we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Queens Park Rangers to Kenilworth Road for this Barclays League Division One match. Rangers, in similar fashion to last season, are struggling to keep in touch with the early season pacesetters as injuries and a loss of form start to take their toll.

Currently in 21st position and still seeking their first win, Rangers have been without key defender Alan McDonald, who missed most of last season through injury, but he played for Northern Ireland against the Faroes last week. New boss Gerry Francis also lost influential captain Ray Wilkins on the opening day of the season at Arsenal with an achilles tendon injury.

Mr Francis, who succeeded former England coach Don Howe as the Rangers' boss, will be looking for the team to turn around their fortunes in the style they achieved last season. Rangers finished a very creditable mid-table position after an injury-wrecked first half to the season which

saw them placed second from bottom at Christmas.

The signing of defenders Darren Peacock from Hereford, Andy Tillson from Grimsby and Rufus Brevett from Doncaster, proved that players from the lower divisions can perform equally as well in the top flight, helping push Rangers up to 12th position in the table, which included a run of 11 games without defeat.

During the summer, Rangers sold England defender Paul Parker to Manchester United in a £2 million deal. This gave Mr Francis some much needed cash with which to strengthen the team. Almost immediately forward Dennis Bailey was signed from Birmingham City. He was followed in quick succession by the transfer of midfielder Ian Holloway from Mr Francis's previous club Bristol Rovers.

Garry Thompson was also signed at the beginning of the season from Crystal Palace to add more experience to the forward line.

The remainder of the squad is virtually unchanged from last season. That means a return to Kenilworth Road for former Town favourite Roy Wegerle who joined Rangers from Luton for £1 million in December 1989.

It will obviously take time for the players to adjust to a new manager and for new players to settle in, but it is definitely within the club's reach to achieve success.

With the raw talent of forwards Les Ferdinand and Bailey, along with the more experienced heads of winger Andy Sinton and midfield dynamo Simon Barker, Rangers have a good blend of talent and experience, and in goalkeeper Jan Stejskal they have one of the safest pair of hands in the First Division...reason enough to feel confident.

Formed in 1885, Rangers have had more grounds than any other league club - 12 altogether - and have played individual home matches at two further venues. The club was formed as a result of a merger between two west London clubs, namely St Jude's and Christchurch Rangers.

The club have had limited success during their 106 year history. They won the Football League Cup on one occasion in 1967. They have also won the Division Two championship in 1983 and the Division Three title in 1967.

Rangers On Parade

JAN STEJSKAL (goalkeeper) - Czechoslovakian international Jan was an ever-present for his country during last year's World Cup finals in Italy. Although he signed for Rangers almost immediately after the finals from Sparta Prague, he had to wait until October before he could come to England, making his league debut in a 3-2 victory at Leeds.

DAVID BARDLEY (defender) - Right-back David was an England Youth international during his early years at Blackpool. He was transferred to Watford in 1983 and played for the Hornets in their 2-0 FA Cup final defeat V Everton. Oxford signed him in 1987 but he moved on to Rangers in the early weeks of the 1988/89 season.

DANNY MADDIX (defender) - Danny started his career at Tottenham but failed to gain a place in their first team squad. He made his league debut on loan to Southend in 1986, but moved to Q.P.R. the following season. He has been a first team regular for the past three seasons.

RUFUS BREVETT (defender) - Rufus signed from Doncaster for £250,000 shortly before the transfer deadline last March. He joined Doncaster under the government's Youth Training Scheme, and made his league debut for them in a 2-2 draw with Scunthorpe United in 1988.

ANDY TILLSON (defender) - Andy started his football career playing non-league football for GM-Vauxhall Conference side Kettering Town. He signed for Grimsby in 1988, making his debut in a 4-1 defeat at Cambridge United. An ever-present in the Mariners side for his two seasons at Blundell Park, he signed for Rangers for £450,000 last December.

DARREN PEACOCK (defender) - Darren started his career at now-defunct Newport County, making his debut in a 2-0 defeat at Plymouth in 1985. After five seasons at Somerton Park he moved to Hereford United, but after only one season he moved to Q.P.R. for £150,000.

RAY WILKINS (midfield) - Influential midfielder and club captain, Ray started his career at Chelsea, making his debut in 1973. After five full seasons at Stamford Bridge he moved to Manchester United in a £750,000 deal. For many years Ray was an England regular, winning 84 caps. AC Milan signed him for £1,350,000 in 1984, but he returned to the U.K. in 1987 with Glasgow Rangers. He joined Q.P.R. in November 1989. Injury may rule Ray out tonight.

SIMON BARKER (midfield) - Simon earned a reputation as a goal-scoring midfield player at his first club Blackburn Rovers. He topped their scoring list with 18 league goals in 1986/87, prompting Q.P.R. to sign him the following season in a £400,000 deal. Simon is an England under-21 international.

ANDY SINTON (midfield) - Andy started his league career at Cambridge United as a youngster and made over 100 league appearances before moving to Brentford in 1985. He gained a reputation as a hard-working, skilful player at Griffin Park, prompting Rangers to sign him for £350,000 in 1989. Andy was a member of the Football League XI which played the Irish League last season.



IAN HOLLOWAY (midfield) - Ian arrived at Loftus Road in a £100,000 deal last month from Bristol Rovers. He began his career at Rovers before moving to Wimbledon for £35,000 in 1985. Brentford signed him a year later and while still at Griffin Park he spent a short loan spell with Torquay United. Ian returned to Bristol Rovers in 1987.

CLIVE WILSON (midfield) - Clive started his football career with Manchester City, making his debut v Wolves in 1981. After five full seasons at Maine Road he headed south and joined Chelsea for £300,000 in 1987. After failing to gain a regular place in the Blues' line-up, he signed for Rangers during the 1990 close-season.

LES FERDINAND (forward) - A fringe player for much of his time at Loftus Road, Les made his league debut in a 4-0 defeat at Coventry in 1987. Signed from non-league Hayes, he has had loan spells with Turkish club Besiktas and with Brentford. Les enjoyed a very good run last Christmas scoring 10 goals and helping to pull Rangers clear of trouble.

BRADLEY ALLEN (forward) - Bradley, a former Rangers trainee, made his league debut three seasons ago, but had to wait until last term for another chance. He then scored twice in four full league appearances and is now a regular first team squad member.

ROY WEGERLE (forward) - Rangers paid a club record £1 million fee when they signed Roy from the Town in December 1989. He was playing for Tampa Bay in the USA when he was recommended to Chelsea. After only occasional appearances for the Blues, he signed for Luton and was top-scorer in 1989/90. Last season Roy was Rangers' leading scorer with a total of 20 goals.

DENNIS BAILEY (forward) - Dennis started his career with Crystal Palace but managed only five substitute appearances for the Eagles. After a loan spell at Bristol Rovers, he was transferred to Birmingham in 1989, leading their scoring list with 20 goals in his first season. Last season he spent another loan spell at Rovers before joining Q.P.R. earlier this summer.

GARRY THOMPSON (forward) - Garry joined Rangers from Palace for £250,000 at the beginning of the season. He started his career at Coventry, making his debut in 1978. He spent six fruitful years at Highfield Road scoring around 50 goals before moving to West Bromwich in 1983. He had short spells at Sheffield Wednesday, Aston Villa and Watford, before moving to Palace last year.


Meet the Boss

GERRY FRANCIS

Chiswick-born, Gerry is a Q.P.R. man through and through. He started his career with the West London club in 1969 and went on to make 289 appearances in a nine-year spell which saw him become captain and lead his side to second place in Division One in 1976. His combative skills and leadership on the pitch were rewarded with 12 full England caps during the seventies. He spent one season at Crystal Palace before seeing out his playing days at Loftus Road in 1980 where a knee injury prematurely ended his playing days.

His career in football management started at Exeter City, but he really established himself at Bristol Rovers where, in a three year period, he took a club with a shoestring budget and no home into the Second Division. He felt he could do no more at the club and this prompted many clubs to enquire about his services. Naturally he joined Q.P.R. and the Rangers fans will hope he can carry on with the same success he enjoyed at Rovers.

Graham Rodger

Graham Rodger knows what the term long-term injury really means. After badly damaging a tendon and ligament in his right ankle during the 4-1 home win over Norwich City in October 1989, he has spent most of his Kenilworth Road career in the treatment room. Until, that is, he finally recovered and forced his way back in the closing stages of last season.

It was a long and difficult comeback trial for Graham. "I missed so much work. It is difficult to recover your fitness properly and to regain form properly. I was out for a long time and when I first got back it was very hard going. Now, I feel a lot better and especially after getting a full pre-season training in."

To help him regain peak form and agility, Graham has started to play badminton. "It's not for the fitness, just the agility," he said. "And I really enjoy it. It is a change and I hope it helps make me lighter on my feet."

Graham's long-term injury has also brought another new interest to his attention - academic study. Bored with sitting around for long periods, he has enrolled for an 'A' level course in Human Biology at Luton's Barnfield College. But, he is quick to stress it is not a prelude to a chosen career in medicine or physiotherapy.

"It was just something that interested me," said Graham. "I looked at what was available and it was the one that interested me most. I am aware of most of the anatomy and workings of the human body thanks to all my injuries and I think it could be an interesting subject to follow. I get tired of sitting around in the evenings sometimes and it is a good way to keep the mind occupied."

Graham, who is still only 24, clearly has a broad view of life and this was also shown by his choice of holiday this year. He and his fiancee Vicky, from Weston-Super-Mare, chose to fly to

"Mick is a really experienced player who can score goals," said Graham. "He is a quality player and I am sure he will do a good job for the club. I have played against him a couple of times and he


is well capable of giving central defenders a hiding. He is a real handful. I am sure Steve is going to do well too. He looks a quality player in training.

The global game

England's meeting with Germany last week evoked memories and prompted dreams at the opening of an international season dominated by qualifying for next year's European Championship finals as Timothy Collings reports.

It was strange to go to Wembley last week and hear the voices of those heroes of 1966 reminding everyone of that great afternoon when Bobby Moore hoisted the World Cup. Gordon Banks spoke with real emotion, his voice crackling through on the car radio. Alan Ball with the same excitement. Martin Peters with pride and Geoff Hurst with a touch of dignity. Hurst, the hat-trick hero and scorer of the most controversial goal in the world's greatest football occasion, never collected the match ball after the game. That, apparently, had gone back to Germany with Helmut Haller - much to Hurst's obvious disappointment. "I believe his son has got it now which is nice," said our Geoff. "But I would dearly love to have had it."

Twenty-five years on from that day on July 30, 1966, the ghosts were still there and the figures, all pure imagination, still in their red sweat-stained shirts, still dancing with delight. Especially Nobby Stiles, his gap-toothed grin and jig engraving an image on posterity. George Cohen, Ray Wilson, who is now an undertaker in the Yorkshire dales and completely out of touch with the game, the giraffe himself, Jack Charlton, the workhorse, Roger Hunt, now a member of the pools panel and, of course, Bobby Charlton. What can you say about Bobby Charlton?

The fact that the Germans used Franz Beckenbauer, four years later, to man-mark him in Mexico during that classic quarter-final, at least until Charlton was withdrawn by Sir Alf Ramsey with England leading comfortably, shows what ability he had and in what respect it was held. Bobby Charlton, at his peak, was arguably England's greatest player, their finest goalscorer, their best ambassador and with it all a true sportsman. That image of Charlton with Eusebio after the semi-final against Portugal - who can forget that?

And so there we were, all 59,493 of us, in the new modern Wembley to

watch the next generation on the night Mark Pembridge won his first cap for Wales. And against Brazil too. Many experts have predicted that Mark will go on to win 60 or more caps already and it does not take a genius to see he is a player of exceptional ability, attitude, versatility and temperament for his age. Simply to have played a full 90-minutes on his debut at the Cardiff Arms Park and a part in Dean Saunders' winning goal against the greatest team of them all.

But Brazil, too, like England and Germany, had to play under the critical gaze of a public comparing them with their past...Garrincha, Pele, Carlos Alberto, Rivelino, Gerson, Tostao, Socrates and Zico. That samba magic has always been the uplifting heartbeat in the sport and the special Brazilian flair the greatest delight.


Wales' victory on the night England lost for the first time under Graham Taylor, at the 13th hurdle, provided encouragement for our domestic international game and left open the tantalising prospect of the Welshmen qualifying for next year's European Championship final if they can manage at least a draw against the Germans in Nuremberg next month. What a feat that would be!

Judging by their performance at Wembley, however, the new united Germany has strength in all departments and, particularly, a very impressive goalkeeper in Bodo Illgner whose performances have prompted comparisons with the great Sepp Maier.

In front of him, Germany had a new sweeper in Manfred Binz, the dangerous Andreas Brehme, the ruthless Jurgen Kohler, the scheming Thomas Hassler and the lethal Karl-Heinz Riedle, who scored a goal which left Mr Taylor complaining about "one minute of madness...There's your headline...Even if you do well for 89 minutes, it can all be lost in one minute."

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All that leaves one player notably unmentioned: Lothar Matthaus. He is the captain of Germany, the world's best midfield player and manifestly good enough to have won a place in the 1966 World Cup final team. It will be interesting to see if he can lead Germany's new united team - a strong enough side to look impressive with Jurgen Klinsmann left on the bench - into the European finals again. As World Cup holders, they should have no trouble in doing that on paper, but Wales, and Pembridge in particular, have plenty to play for in the weeks to come before October 16.

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



That win was a 'double' completed over the Town last term, following a 6-1 trouncing the previous September.

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Night the stars came out for the league's first 'plastic' clash

Having started off the 1981-82 season with a resounding 3-0 home win over newly-promoted Charlton, the big test for the Hatters was to take place on the following Tuesday with a trip to Q.P.R.

What made the game special was the fact that all the top national football reporters would be there together with many leading dignitaries from Sir Stanley Rous down - all to witness the first league match on an artificial surface.

Rangers' "Omniturf" was reported to have cost £350,000 to lay and the first impression one got was of a strangely coloured, slightly rucked carpet, completely different to the more advanced models laid later at Luton, Oldham and Preston.

It was generally agreed that Rangers could not have wished for better opponents in their bid to show the world that an artificial surface did not necessarily mean artificial football, as the Town were promotion favourites and were regarded as a footballing side rather than a "long ball" team.

This comment certainly fooled the 4,000 strong Luton contingent as the Town spent the first half slipping and sliding around and generally struggling to contain a lively Rangers attack.

Rangers took the lead on 34 minutes when ex-Luton favourite Andy King scored with a far-post header and the general concerns at half-time were that the Town were in for a thrashing and that we all hated plastic pitches.

As normally happens, we were proved completely wrong as a simple tactical change by manager David Pleat, in pushing Mark Aizlewood further forward, changed the whole complexion of the game. Godfrey Ingram was now able to resume his left wing foraging rather than covering

back as he had done in the first half, and with Brian Stein and Steve White balancing things out on the right, the Town now looked a much more potent attacking outfit.

It was now Rangers turn to go under the cosh and with the Luton confidence increasing by the minute, the famed one-touch play came to the fore placing great pressure on John Burridge and his defence.


The deserved equaliser came in the 70th minute after Ricky Hill had played a long diagonal ball across the penalty area where both White and Aizlewood were racing in to get to the pass before Burridge. Aizlewood it was who got the touch, gently lifting the ball over the keeper much to the delight of the Luton supporters behind the goal.

Ingram then missed a sitter ten minutes later before Ricky Hill finally got the winner that the Town's second half display deserved. White was half-tackled on the edge of the box and as the ball ran loose, Hill surged on to it to smack an unstoppable low shot past Burridge.

Rangers boss Terry Venables had no complaints and confirmed that by being brave and attacking in the second half, the Town obtained a just result.



How to start your collection

One of the fascinating aspects of programme collecting is that no two collections are alike - each is unique to the individual collector, reflecting his or her footballing influences, matches attended, and areas of special interest. Another feature of the hobby is that vast sums of money need not be spent - collecting football programmes can be tailored to anyone's age or budget.

A programme collection can be of any size - it can amount to tens of thousands of programmes accumulated over many years, or it can comprise this week's and next week's issues on the way towards building a collection. If a

journey of a thousand miles starts with a single step, then a collection to be proud of starts with a single issue.

The obvious starting point is to retain programmes from matches attended. These will assume a greater importance in years to come, because as you review the hundreds or thousands of programmes, you can relate special personal memories to programmes of matches attended. Friends and relatives will probably attend other matches, so why not ask them to buy an extra programme for you?

Amongst friends and schoolmates, there will inevitably be others who share an interest in football and programmes.

Swapping duplicated issues is another good way of adding to a small collection, and this can be done by obtaining more than one programme from the matches attended, in order to exchange surplus copies for other match programmes. Exchanging a programme in your collection for another issue with a fellow collector can help towards building a "set" or speciality of programmes in your collection - a subject we will discuss in the next article.




